

## III. JOURNAL OF THE CONFERENCE.

PROCEEDINGS OF THE THIRTY-THIRD SESSION OF THE IOWA ANNUAL CONFERENCE OF THE M. E. CHURCH.

### FIRST DAY.

OTTUMWA, IOWA; SEPTEMBER 6, 1876.

The Iowa Annual Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church met to hold its Thirty-Third Session in the First M. E. Church of Ottumwa, Iowa, Wednesday, September 6th, 1876, at 8:30 o'clock A. M., Bishop J. W. Wiley presiding.

After calling the Conference to order, the Bishop read from the Scriptures found in First Cor. iii., and announced the 707th hymn, beginning

"And are we yet alive?"

After the singing of the hymn by the congregation, Bro. Allender led in prayer, and the Bishop proceeded with the administration of the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper.

The former Secretary being absent, the former Assistant Secretary, G. N. The Conference proceeded to elect a Secretary. G. N. Power, H. E. Wing and J. C. W. Coxe were nominated. Brothers Wing and Coxe withdrew their names and G. N. Power was elected to the office. The following Assistant Secretaries were chosen: H. E. Wing, C. L. Stafford, C. W. Shepherd, T. J. Myers, and J. W. Cheney.

The transfer of G. M. Tuttle from the Vermont Conference was announced, and he was introduced to the conference. F. W. Evans and W. A. Presson were also announced as transferred from the Des Moines Conference. They are Elders.

W. R. Stryker was, on motion, appointed Post Master of the Conference. A committee of six was ordered to consider the revision of the Articles of Incorporation of the Conference, and the following brethren were elected to constitute such committee: A. Robinson, R. B. Allender, W. J. Spaulding, J. B. Hardy, W. G. Thorn, J. T. Simmons.

A committee to consider the subject of the solemnizing of marriage by unordained preachers, was ordered, and the following brethren were elected as such committee: I. A. Bradrick, B. Mark, W. F. Cowles.

O. P. Light was appointed to receive the collections for the Episcopal Fund.

E. L. Briggs was appointed to receive the moneys collected for the Educational Funds.

J. C. Kendrick was appointed to receive the collections for General Conference Expenses.

A motion prevailed that the Educational Collections of the Iowa Conference be applied to the Iowa Wesleyan University.

The following brethren were appointed a committee to nominate Trustees for the Iowa Wesleyan University: J. G. Barton, C. S. Cooper, H. E. Wing, U. B. Smith, J. W. Robinson, C. W. Shepherd.

It was moved that the preachers be instructed to report, as ministerial support, their estimated salaries only. Bro. Cowles moved, as a substitute, that the preachers report the salary and the estimated rental of the parsonage, or the amount paid by the society for rent where there is no preacher's house, which motion prevailed.

The hours of session were fixed at from 8:30 A. M., to 12 noon.

The bar of the Conference was fixed at the north side of the third window.

The Tenth Question was taken up, and the names of the effective Elders were called. I. A. Bradrick was represented and passed, and gave a verbal report of the Burlington District. The following brethren were passed: J. C. W. Coxe, J. B. Blakeney, J. G. Barton, O. C. Shelton, J. Craig, I. P. Teter, J. R. Noble, M. Bamford, J. C. Kendrick, S. S. Murphy, O. P. Light, G. W. Byrkit, P. F. Holtzinger, G. M. Tuttle, A. Robinson, E. J. Pike, E. W. Twining, J. Orr.

It was moved that when the names of the preachers in charge are called they report the Missionary Collection. Bro. Cowles moved, as an amendment, that the collection for Conference claimants be also reported. Bro. Power moved, as a substitute, that the preachers in charge report all their collections when their names are called. The substitute was lost. The amendment was lost. As the Dicipline provides for the report of the Missionary Collection, the original motion was not put on its passage.

The case of R. Stephenson was represented, and it was moved that he be located. Bro. Wells moved, as an amendment, that he be discontinued. Bro. Cowles moved, as a substitute, that his case be referred to a committee for trial, and the substitute prevailed. I. P. Teter was appointed to prosecute the case.

A draft on the Chartered Fund, for thirty dollars, was drawn by the President.

Dr. Reed, of the Parent Missionary Society, Dr. McCabe, of the Church Extension Society, Rev. Mr. Reed, of the Presbyterian Church of Fairfield, Rev. Mr. Freeland, of the West Virginia Conference, and Rev. J. G. Eckels, of the United Brethren Church, were introduced to the Conference.

The Conference was adjourned by expiration of time.

The usual announcements were made, the Doxology was sung, and the assembly was dismissed with the Benediction by Dr. Reed.

### SECOND DAY.

THURSDAY, SEPTEMBER 7-8:30 A. M.

The Conference was called to order by the Bishop. Bro. Light led the opening religious services.

The minutes of yesterday were read and approved.

The roll of yesterday's absentees was called, and the following brethren responded: Samuel Hestwood, R. S. Kenyon, Jas. L. King, T. M. Kirkpatrick, Dennis Murphy, George Nulton, John Orr, E. J. Pike, J. P. Rice, O. C. Shelton, George Swanston, and F. W. Evans.

C. P. Reynolds was appointed a committee on the New York Book Accounts.

The following were appointed a Committee on Church Property: C. B. Clark, Jesse Craig, and C. S. Jennis.

A communication from the Garrett Biblical Institute was passed to the Committee on Education.

The Tenth Question was resumed, and John Haynes, the Presiding Elder of the Keokuk District, was represented and passed. He presented a written report of his district. The following brethren were represented and passed: W. H. H. Pillsbury, John Wheeler, A. W. Haines, J. W. Cheney, E. L. Schreiner, R. B. Allender, W. E. Patterson, C. S. Cooper, Geo. Swanston, J. P. Rice, W. H. H. Smith.

W. F. Cowles, the Presiding Elder of the Mount Pleasant District, was represented and passed. He presented a brief written report. The following Effective Elders were represented and passed: D. Murphy, J. B. Hill, J. T. Coleman, J. Gassner, F. W. Evans, J. Davis, N. Wells, G. H. Clark, J. L. King, J. S. Ferguson, J. G. Thompson, J. W. Chaffin, W. I. Miller, W. J. Spaulding, J. R. Reasoner.

J. C. Brown, Presiding Elder of the Muscatine District, was represented and passed. He presented his annual report. The following Elders were represented and passed: J. W. McDonald, S. H. Thomas, R. J. Kenyon, U. B. Smith, E. Sampson, D. C. Bevan, J. B. Hardy, B. F. Karns, C. S. Jennis, A. McClintock, W. H. Honn, E. L. Briggs.

A paper from the Keokuk District, regarding the District Conference, was received and read by the Secretary.

I. O. Kemble, the Secretary of the Iowa Conference Missionary Society, being absent, Geo. W. Byrkit was elected to act in his place.

The Tenth Question was resumed, and D. C. Smith, the Presiding Elder of the Oskaloosa District, was represented and passed. He reported the work of his district. The following Effective Elders were represented and passed: C. B. Clark, C. L. Stafford, W. J. Thorn, B. Mark, J. W. Robinson, C. Morey, B. F. Shane, T. C. Miller, C. P. Reynolds, J. M. Coates, J. M. Mann, W. H. Presson.

Geo. N. Power, of the Ottumwa District, was repreresented and passed.

He reported the work on his district. The following preachers were represented and passed: J. T. Simmons, I. N. Busby, I. O. Kemble, Geo. Nulton, C. W. Shepherd, T. E. Corkhill, J. Potter, T. J. Myers, E. H. Waring, D. T. Monroe.

Bro. Monroe asked for a supernumerary relation, which, on motion of

Bro. Power, was granted.

The report of the Secretary of the Board of Trustees of the Iowa Wesleyan University was presented and referred to the Committee on Education.

On motion of Bro. Cowles the part of the above report which refers to vacancies in the Board of Trustees, was referred to the committee appointed to nominate Trustees.

Dr. Reed presented the claims of the Parent Missionary Society.

The following ministerial brethren were introduced to the Conference: Bros. Steward and Austin, of the Des Moines Conference; Bro. Wheat, of the Missouri Conference; Bro. Dobbs, of the St. Louis Conference, and Bro. Miller, of the United Brethren Church.

Rev. A. Ward, of the American Peace Society, addressed the Conference. On motion the following brethren were appointed a committee to draft proper resolutions regarding the subject presented by Bro. Ward: T. E. Corkhill, I. P. Teter, S. S. Murphy.

The following resolution was presented by Bros. Schreiner and Simmons,

and adopted:

WHEREAS, Rev. J. A. Wilson has been transferred to the Des Moines Conference since our last session,

Resolved, That he has our fullest confidence and sympathy as a faithful minister of Christ, and that we welcome him to a home in the Iowa Conference at any time he may desire to return.

Bro. Teter moved to reconsider the action of the Conference, yesterday, regarding the case of Bro. Stephenson, which motion prevailed, and on motion of Bro. Cowles, the case was referred to the Presiding Elder of the Burlington District for trial.

The usual announcements were made.

The minutes were read and approved. The Conference was adjourned by expiration of time. The Doxology was sung, and the Benediction was pronounced by Bro. Brown.

### THIRD DAY.

FRIDAY, SEPTEMBER 8-8:30 A. M.

The Conference was called to order by the President.

Bro. Morey led the opening religious services.

The Eighth Question was then taken up. The following supernumerary brethren had their characters passed, and their relation continued: M. Carrier, John Elrod, M. See, an Wm. Poston.

S. Hestwood was represented, and at his own request made effective.

On motion of Bro. Cowles, J. S. Rankin was granted a location at his request.

On motion of Bro. Power, Thomas Stephenson was made effective at his request.

The Ninth Question was taken up and the following superanuated preachers were represented and passed, and their relation continued: E. H. Coddington, John Hayden, B. Holland, A. W. Johnson, J. McCutchen, Joseph McDowell, R. S. Robinson, H. Runyon, A. W. Stryker, L. C. Woodford, John Burgess, James Haynes, John Harris, T. M. Kirkpatrick.

Bros. Johnson, McDowell, Robinson, and Kirkpatrick, being present,

addressed the Conference in fitting terms.

Bro. Bradrick, of the Burlington District, called up the case of E. W. Twining, who was granted a supernumerary relation.

The Third Question was called, and the following brethren of the first class were represented and reported by the Examining Committee, and continued on trial: Willey R. Stryker and Jacob H. Hard.

Samuel P. Craver, a missionary in Mexico, was represented and continued on trial.

Eugene S. Daily was discontinued at his request.

The minutes of the Muscatine District were received and placed on file The Fourth Question was taken up. The following brethren, belonging to the class of the second year, presented themselves at the bar of the Conference and were addressed by the Bishop: A. J. Belknap, L. C. Carroll, W. N. Groome, W. S. Hurt, A. Kershaw, D. A. Watters. They gave satisfactory answers to the disciplinary questions.

The following were passed, and reported their missionary collections. The examining committee reported favorably, their Presiding Elders represented them, and they were admitted into full connection and elected to deacon's orders: A. J. Belknap, W. N. Groome, W. S. Hurt, A. Kershaw, D. A. Watters.

L. C. Carroll was passed, and reported his missionary collection. The Committee of Examination reported favorably, his Presiding Elder recommended him, and he was admitted to full connection, having been previously ordained deacon.

G. F. W. Willey was passed and admitted to full connection. He too is a deacon.

The Seventh Question was taken up, and the names of the following deacons of the second class were called: A. V. Francis, A. R. Jones, E. P. Michener, C. L. Nulton. They were passed, were favorably reported by the Examining Committee, and were elected to elder's orders. S. R. Ferguson, a deacon of the first class, was passed, reported favorably by the Committee, and was elected to elder's orders.

The committee appointed at the last session of the Conference to investigate the management of the Iowa Wesleyan University, presented their report, and on motion the report was accepted.

It was moved that the report be adopted. An amendment was moved by Bro. Simmons, that the report be recommitted.

It was moved by Bro. Cowles to lay the motion to recommit on the table, which motion prevailed.

On motion of Bro. Haynes, the subject was made the order of the day for to-morrow at 9 o'clock.

A bill of \$205.50 from John T. Wheeler was presented, and on motion of Bro. Wing, it was referred to a committee of three. The following brethren were elected to constitute the committee: J. C. W. Coxe, J. W. McDonald, E. L. Schreiner.

Bro. Bradrick was, at his request, released from the committee on the solemnizing of marriage by unordained preachers, and Bro. Teter was, on motion, elected in his place.

The minutes were read and approved. The session was adjourned by expiration of time.

The Doxology was sung, and the assembly dismissed with the Benediction by Bro. Mark.

### FOURTH DAY.

SATURDAY, SEPTEMBER 9-8:30 A. M.

The Conference convened at the regular hour, Bishop Wiley in the Chair.

Religious exercises were conducted by Bro. Shelton.

Communications were read from Frank Paxton, Presiding Elder of the Davenport District, Upper Iowa Conference, with the Committee on Conference Claimants, and the pastor of the Fourteenth Street Church of Davenport, concerning the case of L. C. Woodford, a claimant on this Conference. The papers were referred to the Conference Stewards.

The Twenty-first Question was taken up. Anthony Housel came before the Conference with a recommendation from the Quarterly Conference of Riverside and Richmond Circuit, for deacon's orders. The Committee on Examination reported favorably. The Bishop stated that in view of the newness of the District Conferences, and the transition of duties from the Quarterly Conferences to the District Conferences, the administration, in some cases, has allowed the technical requirement of the recommendation from the District Conference to be dispensed with, when the candidate has been properly recommended by the Quarterly Conference. He was elected to deacon's orders.

The Secretary passed to the Auditing Committee certain accounts in his possession.

The order of the day for 9 o'clock, being the motion to adopt the report

of the committee appointed to investigate the financial management of the Iowa Wesleyan University, was taken up.

A motion prevailed, that those members of the Board of Trustees of said University, and of the Investigating Committee, who are not members of the Conference, be allowed to participate in the discussion of the subject.

It was determined, on motion of Bro. Power, to take up the report item by item.

The first item, regarding securities, was adopted.

The second item, regarding the neglect of the Board of Trustees to accept a donation of lands from Lee Claffin, was not adopted.

The third item, in reference to the failure of the Trustees to accept an endownent fund from Col. Geo. B. Corkhill, was adopted.

The fifth item, regarding the general management of the business of the institution was taken up. It was moved that the paragraph contrasting the present board with the former ones, be stricken out. On motion of Bro. Corkhill, this item was laid on the table for the present.

The fourth item, regarding the sale of the Claffin railroad bonds, was taken up. On motion of the Secretary, Henry Ambler, Esq., was requested to make a statement of his relation to the subject. The time of the session was extended to give Bro. Ambler opportunity to complete his remarks.

A motion that when we adjourn it be to meet again at 2 p. m. was carried. The conference was adjourned by expiration of time.

The Doxology was sung, and the assembly was dismissed with the Benediction by Bro. Barton.

### AFTERNOON SESSION.

SATURDAY, SEPTEMBER 9-2 P. M.

Rev. Banner Mark, by appointment of the Bishop, occupied the chair. Bro. Hardy conducted the opening religious services.

The minutes of the morning session were read and approved.

The business that was pending at the close of the morning session, the consideration of the fourth item of the report of the committee to investigate the affairs of the Iowa Wesleyan University, was taken up. The question was on the motion to adopt this item of the report.

Bro. Ambler occupied the time of the session. At the close of his remarks a motion prevailed that the subject be made the order of the day for Monday at 9 A. M., after which the Conference adjourned.

### FIFTH DAY.

Monday, September 11-8:30 A. M.

The Conference convened at the regular time, the Bishop in the Chair. The opening religious services were conducted by Bro. Holland.

The minutes of the Saturday afternoon's session were read and approved. Vouchers from the Sunday School Committee, amounting to \$99.10 for the Sunday School Union, were placed on file.

The Agent of the Publication Fund made his annual report, which was referred to the special committee on the bill of J. T. Wheeler.

Vouchers from the Committee on the Episcopal Fund for \$318.70 were filed.

The Sixth Question was taken up, and the following deacons were passed, reported on favorably by the Examining Committee, recommended by their Presiding Elders, and advanced to deacons of the second class: R. A. Carnine, L. O. Housel, James Hunter, Augustus C. Keeler, Americus V. Kendrick, Chas. H. Montgomery, J. T. McFarland, H. F. Pugh, H. E. Wing. The promoting of Charles H. Montgomery was, at his own request, made conditional upon his passing the examination for two years at the next Conference.

At his request, on motion of Bro. Brown, J. T. McFarland was granted a supernumerary relation.

E. H. Waring, at his request, on motion of his Presiding Elder, was granted a supernumerary relation.

The Twenty-third Question was then taken up. Fairfield, Knoxville and Marengo were put in nomination as the place of holding the next Conference. Fairfield was selected by vote.

Vouchers from the Committee on the Tract Society were filed to the amount of \$80.77.

John Haynes, I. A. Bradrick, J. M. Coates, T. E. Corkhill, Jesse Craig, O. C. Shelton, and J. B. Hardy, were made Triers of Appeals.

The Conference voted on the proposition to change Section II. Paragraph 70 of the Dicipline, that it may read: "They shall not allow of more than one ministerial representative for every fourteen members of the Annual Conference, nor allow of a less number than one for every one hundred." The vote stood, seventy for, and one against the change.

A vote was also taken on the proposition to alter Section II. Paragraph 157, to read: "To form the districts according to his judgment, the Annual Conference having the right to determine the number of districts; provided that no Conference shall have less than two districts, nor shall any district contain more than sixty charges. The vote stood forty-three for and forty-four against.

On motion of A. W. Haines, the following persons were elected Trustees

of the Bentonsport church property: N. Shepherd, James F. Bailey, Henry Gilbert, A. N. Stevens, George W. Jack.

On motion of the Secretary, the above named Trustees were instructed to transfer the Bentonsport property to a Board of Trustees to be elected by the Quarterly Conference of the Bentonsport Circuit.

Dr. Benj. St. James Fry, the editor of the Central Christian Advocate, ad dressed the Conference in regard to our church periodicals.

D. C. Smith and I. P. Teter introduced the following resolution, which, on motion, were adopted:

Resolved, That we request the agents to somewhat reduce the size of the entral Christian Advocate, so as to reduce the price of subscription to \$2.00 per copy.

Resolved, That we will stand by this paper, and make it our Conference paper.

C. R. Norton was, on motion, appointed Post Master, in place of Bro. Slaughter.

The order of the day was taken up. The pending question was a motion to adopt the fourth item of the report of the investigating committee of the Iowa Wesleyan University.

A motion prevailed that when we adjourn it be to meet at 1:30 o'clock.

The Bishop filed the following certificates of ordination:

Resolved, That the Bishop be and is hereby requested, in the arrangement of the districts, not to put more than thirteen appointments in a district;

The following resolution, introduced by N. Wells and J. Gassner, was put on its passage and was not adopted:

Resolved. That the Bishop be requested not to appoint any man to the office of Presiding Elder for more than one term until he has served at least four years in some other department of labor, unless in his judgment the interests of the church absolutely demand it.

The Conference adjourned by expiration of time.

The Doxology was sung, and the Benediction was pronounced by Bro. Hardy.

### AFTERNOON SESSION.

MONDAY, SEPTEMBER 11-1:30 P. M.

Rev. J. B. Blakeney, by appointment of the Bishop, occupied the Chair. The introductory religious services were led by Bro. C. B. Clark.

The minutes of the morning session were read and approved.

On motion of Bro. Cowles, the preacher in charge at Bentonsport was instructed to procure an abstract of the title by which the Bentonsport church property is held.

The question pending on the adjournment of the morning session, i. e., the motion to adopt the fourth item of the report of the investigating com-

mittee of the Iowa Wesleyan University, was taken up.

After some general discussion, it was moved by the Secretary, that after Henry Ambler shall have made his statement, one member of the Board of Trustees and one of the investigating committee be allowed to sum up the evidence in the case, when the vote shall be taken. The motion prevailed. Bro. Ambler addressed the Conference regarding the subject. Bro. Cowles presented the case for the Trustees, and Bro. Emory for the committee.

Pending the discussion of the subject the Bishop took the Chair.

The ayes and nays were called for, but the call was not sustained.

Bro. Blakeney moved to amend by striking out that part of the report which reflects upon Bro. Ambler.

It was moved as a substitute for the amendment, to change the item so as to make it read: "The committee is clearly of the opinion that Mr. Ambler ought to have had full knowledge upon the subject."

Bro. Blakeney withdrew his motion and accepted the substitute.

Bro. Cowles renewed Bro. Blakeney's motion to amend, and it was put to vote and laid on the table.

The substitute was then put to vote and carried.

The motion to adopt the fourth item, as thus amended, then prevailed. On motion the fifth item was then adopted, and then the report, as a whole, was adopted.

The Conference then adjourned.

The Doxology was sung, and the Benediction was pronouced by Bro. Shelton.

The report of the Committee on Book and Periodical Accounts was received and adopted. (See Report.)

The report of the Committee on the Bishop's Fund was read and adopted. (See Report.)

The Committee on the Bible Cause filed a receipt from O. P. Light, for \$40.45.

The Bishop announced that the claim of the Bishop's Fund upon this Conference for the ensuing year is \$1,000, and the distribution of last year was adopted.

The Conference Stewards made their report, which was adopted. (See Report).

On motion of Bro. Cowles, the Conference was given an opportunity to make an offering to Bro. Coddington, as a token of our affection and esteem — \$27.60 was the amount collected.

A motion prevailed that the Stewards be instructed to report as collections for Conference claimants only such funds as are passed into the general fund.

The report of the Committee on the State of the Church was read and adopted. (See Report.)

The report of the Committee on Education was read. (See Report.)

On motion the report was adopted, except the part recommending the appointment of an agent.

On motion, that part of the report which recommends the appointment of an agent was referred to the Trustees, with instructions to them to employ an agent whenever his support is guaranteed, if a proper person, in their judgment, can be found.

On motion, a committee of one from each other district was added to the committee already appointed at Mt. Pleasant, to provide for the support of the agent, as follows: O. P. Light, John Wheeler, A. McClintock, T. C. Miller, J. Haynes.

The report of the Committee on Temperance was read and adopted.

The committee to nominate Trustees reported the following nominations: For four years, J. B. Blakeney, E. L. Briggs, J. W. McDonaid, F. T. Campbell, J. Conayay, B. Mark.

On motion, these nominations were confirmed.

The resignation of W. I. Babb, as Trustee, was not accepted.

The resignation of E. H. Waring, as Trustee, was announced and accepted. The Committee on Nominations presented the name of D. C. Smith in his place, which nomination was adopted.

The Committee on Publication was instructed to print two thousand copies of the Minutes, to be distributed among the preachers in charge according to the membership.

The Auditing Committee read the following report, which, on motion, was adopted:

Your Committee desire to report that we have audited the accounts of Presiding Elders, respecting Missionary Funds of the past year, and find them to be correct.

Resolved, That we do hereby express our thanks to the families and friends who have so generously entertained us during our session in Ottumwa.

The report of the Committee on Memoirs, a memoir of Sister Mary A. Power, was read and adopted. (See Report.)

The Committee to Revise the Articles of Incorporation of the Iowa Conference made their report. The report was read and adopted. (See Report.)

The following resolution, presented by J. B. Hill and D. Murphy, was, on motion, adopted:

Resolved, That we do hereby respectfuly request the Bishop, in the arrangement of the plan of Episcopal visitations, to change the time of the session of this Conference to the last week in September.

The Statistical Secretary read his report.

The following brethren were elected Trustees of the Conference: J. G. Barton, J. B. Hill, E. L. Schreiner, I. P. Teter, C. L. Stafford, D. C. Emory, George House.

A resolution regarding a Central Methodist University of Iowa was, on motion, laid on the table.

The Treasurer of the Missionary Society read his report and placed it on file.

The Second Question was taken up. Coleson Fawcett, from Mt. Pleasant District, was presented to the Conference. The Presiding Elder, with the consent of the Conference, withdrew his recommendation, with the understanding that he may be employed as a supply. James H. Rockwell, from Ottumwa District, was presented to the Conference. He was represented and admitted on trial.

The following transfers were announced by the Bishop: Jno. S. Freeland, an elder, from the West Virginia Conference, and James W. Wright, and elder, from the Southern Illinois Conference.

It was moved that when we adjourn it be to meet at 2 o'clock P. M. The motion prevailed.

The Conference adjourned by expiration of time.

The Doxology was sung, and the Benediction was pronounced by Dennis Murphy.

#### AFTERNOON SESSION.

TUESDAY, SEPTEMBER 12-2 P. M.

The opening religious exercises were conducted by Bro. McClintock.

The minutes of the morning session were read and approved.

The following resolution was presented by F. W. Evans and I. O. Kemble, and adopted:

Resolved, That this Conference, in adopting the report of the Committee of Investigation, did not mean to cast the least imputation on the honesty and integrity of Bro. Ambler.

J. C. Kendrick, the agent appointed to receive money for General Conference Expenses, reported \$10.40 in his hands belonging to the fund. He was, on motion, instructed to send the same to the Book Concern.

The report of the Committee on the Sale of Church Property was read and adopted. (See Report).

The minutes were read and approved.

On motion, the Conference adjourned.

The Conference united in singing the 221st hymn, beginning,

" And let our bodies part."

Bro. Mark led in prayer.

The Bishop addressed the Conference, and announced the appointments for the coming year.

The Doxology was sung, and the Conference was dismissed with the Benediction by the Bishop.

### I. ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON REVISION OF THE ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION OF THE IOWA CONFERENCE.

Your committee report that, whereas, the interests of the corporation demand that the records and funds of the organization have some local permanency; therefore,

Resolved, That the third Article of Incorporation be substituted by the

following:

"The business of this corporation shall be controlled and directed by a Board of Trustees, of not less than seven in number, five of whom shall be members of the Conference, and two of whom shall be laymen who shall reside in Ottumwa, one of whom shall be the Secretary, and the other the Treasurer of the Board of Trustees, all of whom shall be elected or appointed annually by the Conference, and shall hold their office until their successors shall be duly appointed.

We desire also to state that some among us are involved in debts of this

kind, to a greater extent than would seem to be prudent.

who rendered most efficient services. The children's department was effectually sustained by brother Kemble, of our own Conference.

The camp meeting was well attended by an interested and earnest Christian people, and thousands came and went from day to day. The Lord was gloriously present, by his Spirit, throughout the entire meeting. About fifty persons professed conversion, and from seventy-five to one hundred persons professed to enter into the experience and life of entire sanctification.

The whole cost of the camp meeting, we take great pleasure in saying, amounting to \$369.95, was mainly met by the proceeds of the boarding

house and public collections taken on the grounds.

Your committee also recommends the appointment of a special committee to select a location for a permanent "Conference Camp Ground," and also to arrange for holding another camp meeting during the ensuing Conference year.

A .- REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON EDUCATION.

Your committee would report that in response to a communication received from the Garret Biblical Institute, and referred to this committee, the following resolution is presented for your adoption, viz:

That we hear with pleasure of the continued prosperity and success of the Garret Biblical Institute, at Evanston, Illinois, and recognizing as we do the utility of such an institution for the Northwest, and for the church generally, therefore,

Resolved, That we recommend that Dr. W. J. Spaulding and Dr. J. C. W. Coxe be appointed visitors to the above institution for the ensuing year.

In considering the interests of the Iowa Wesleyan University, your committee would recommend the appointment of the following persons as visitors for the next Conference year, viz: Revs. C. B. Clark, B. F. Karns, C. L. Stafford, Geo. M. Tuttle, J. W. Chaffin; N. J. Smith, Esq., of Oskaloosa, Mrs. Emma Sloan, of Eddyville, F. T. Campbell, of Newton, and Miss Ida Hindman, of Keokuk.

We also highly approve of the very satisfactory result in filling the chairs of the institution with able and efficient officers and professors. We recognize in the election of Dr. W. J. Spaulding to the presidency of the institution an accession of strength, and an officer of ability and integrity, who will, with his associates in the faculty, be amply able to manage and direct the educational and disciplinary matters to success and continued prosperity.

We also heartily approve of the appointment of Wray Beattie, A. M., and I. O. Kemble, A. M., to professorships in the institution, believing that the faculty has been greatly strengthened by their accession to it, and that the institution may reasonably look for even a greater degree of prosperity in the future than ever before.

The committee also recommend that an agent be put into the field for the purpose of increasing the endowment fund of the Iowa Wesleyan University, provided his salary can be secured by the plan proposed by the Board of Trustees, of one hundred persons pledging \$15 annually for his support for the term of three years. The committee also recommend that I. A. Bradrick be appointed said agent for the ensuing year.

The committee, having before them the agency of Rev. J. R. Reasoner for the past year, are impressed with the wise projection and feasibility of his plans for the endowment of the University, and the prime importance of the earnest prosecution of these plans. We further believe that, considering the great difficulty in the way, the results of the agency for the past year are as much as could be expected.

#### B.-REPORT OF THE VISITORS TO IOWA WESLEYAN UNIVERSITY.

The University buildings, Museum and Laboratories were carefully inspected by your visiting committee. We find the building in need of repairs; also that the museum and laboratories show some need of readjustment, and in some departments there should be additional appliances. These deficiencies occur, we believe, not from neglect on the part of any, but from want of means and teaching force.

Under the peculiar and somewhat unfavorable circumstances, we believe the management and present condition of the institution are all that can be expected, and deserve credit. The attendance of students in the preparatory department has been well kept up. The examinations indicate a good degree of thoroughness on the part of students, and skill and faithfulness on the part of instructors.

As is well known the great want of the institution is money. An increase of the endowment fund of \$50,000 does seem to be a necessity to the success of the University.

### VIII. MEMOIR.

Mrs. Mary N. Power died January 1st, 1876, in Burlington, Iowa, in the seventieth year of her age. She was the wife of the late Dr. John H. Power, and was born in Leesburg, Loudon county, Virginia, April 26th, 1806.

Her parents were active members of the Protestant Episcopal Church; but being deprived of their example and precept in early childhood, she remained a stranger to the quickening power of the Holy Spirit until her nineteenth year. In 1825, under the labors of Rev. John H. Power, who afterwards became her husband, she was led to seek the witness of the Spirit, and soon found peace in believing. At once she recognized the necessity of growth in grace, and from the day of her conversion her views became clearer and more enlarged as to the nature and extent of the plan of salvation, and of the privileges and enjoyments to which she was called as a Christian. She reached forth unto those things which were before, and pressed toward the mark, for the prize of the high calling of God in Christ Jesus, as well as hungered and thirsted after a full conformity to the will and image of the Master.

She was unobtrusive in her character, and all that she did. Through a frail physical nature, that made her a constant sufferer, there appeared a shade of melancholy in her life, yet she walked by faith, not by sight, and intimate was that communion with God which she frequently enjoyed; while the graces of the Spirit and the virtues of female character shone

forth in her with a pure and steady lustre.

As a christian she was dilligent and exemplary in the exercise and discharge of every duty; and until age and infirmity forbade it, she was ever found in her place in the sanctuary, always inspiring others through her

activities in every department of church work.

As a tender, affectionate, Christian mother, none have surpassed her; in proof of which the children nourished by her must testify, as they rise with her in that morning. Eight of the ten grew to man and womanhood; and all, through the godly example, and faithful instruction of Christian parents, have found pardon through faith in Christ; and this Christian mother must stand in the fore-ground of a saved family. She was ever faithful in administering correction, but never with impatience. She felt the responsibility of her relation to her children, which, on account of the absence of the father, frequently for months together, in the discharge of his itinerant ministerial duties, was greatly increased. Conscious that it was her duty to bring them up in the nurture and admonition of the Lord, she was induced to retire with them individually to the throne of grace, and commend them in prayer to the mercy of God, and implore the divine blessing upon the instruction she gave them.

If ever a wife deserved the division of honor that was given a husband, she did. During forty years, enduring constant physical suffering, she

cheerfully shared with him the labors of an itinerant, and lovingly facilitated his studies, relieving him of most of the cares of the family, that must have interrupted and materially impeded his progress in the acquisition of knowledge, and the discharge of duty.

To mitigate the sufferings of the poor always afforded the richest gratification to her feeling heart, until her slender frame, depressed beneath the influence of disease and age, could no longer follow the impulses of her beneficent disposition. Even to the end of life she was ever active in

planning for the relief and inquiring after the suffering.

Though devoted, she was ever fearful lest any one should think better of her than she deserved. She was always ready to acknowledge the sense she felt of her own unworthiness and unprofitableness. As the outward man perished the inner man was renewed day by day, so that it was evident to all around her that she was fast maturing for the church triumphant. She was enabled to contemplate the approach of the last enemy with

undisturbed serenity and unshaken fortitude.

Feeling that the hour of her departure was near at hand she took an affectionate farewell of her children, grandchildren and friends, and in response to an inquiry from her pastor, Rev. J. B. Blakeney, she said: "The Lord is my shepherd, I shall not want: yea, though I walk through the valley and the shadow of death, thou art with me. I will fear no evil, for thy rod and thy staff they comfort me." Thus she finished her course with joy.

### IX. PERIODICALS.

The Methodist Episcopal Church has always recognized its obligation to give to the masses a pure, Christian literature. She was early in the field, and has always been peer to any other organization in this department of labor. But we believe our church is capable of a still nobler work. She ought to give to the millions the purest, the best, and the cheapest period-

ical literature in the world.

Of the number and variety of periodicals there is no room perhaps for complaint. And as to quality, they are, or are about to be, as good as the best. Our Sunday School periodicals, we believe, are unsurpassed in Christendom. Our veteran "Quarterly Review" should be found in every preacher's study. As many as one at least of our "Advocates" should find a welcome in every Methodist household in the land. We are glad to learn that the "Ladies' Repository" is to be transformed into the "National Repository," and hope its reputation will be as wide, and its usefulness as lasting, as the nation.

Believing that our periodicals are great helps towards the conversion of souls and religious development of the church, we are resolved to do our

duty as agents in their circulation.

### XII. STATE OF THE CHURCH.

As the church is the salt of the earth and the light of the world, her condition should be a subject of anxious thought to every Christian. In proportion as she approximates the high standard designed by her Divine Head, will she be efficient and triumphant in the world. In contemplating the state of the church, we see many things to commend, some to deplore.

We fear she has fallen too much under the money-getting spirit of the age. Opportunities for rapidly acquiring wealth are tempting many away from earnest work for God. Service of Mammon is destructive of true service of Christ. The love of money, and its hot pursuit, eat up the word, choke out the wheat, and destroy the spiritual power of the church. There is great need of the church being called back to the doctrine of "Be not too careful for this life. Have faith in God in regard to these things. Seek and pursue first the Kingdom of Heaven."

There is also a spirit of worldliness that is pernicious in its influence. The amusements, pleasures and social demands of the world have crowded too much upon the church, and too many members are so absorbed by them as to have little time or disposition for work for God. These things are often insuperable obstacles to revival efforts for the salvation of souls. While we would desire no false or unnecessary isolation of the church from the world, yet we earnestly desire that her members should be so heavenly-minded as to draw a strong line of demarkation between them and the world.

We rejoice in the fact that houses of worship are being rapidly multiplied and the conveniences for church meetings are much greater than formerly, yet we deplore the neglect of the means of grace which is so widely prevalent. Such helps are indispensable to deep piety and spiritual growth. We consider it of the highest importance to the church, that her members be called to give heed to the third evidence that every one is expected to give of his desire for salvation, if he remain in the society, namely: "attendance upon the means of grace." Among these may be mentioned public worship, social and family prayers, class-meetings; and also to the command of scripture: "Neglect not the assembling of yourselves together."

We greatly deplore the fact that so many church members are living on year by year with very little or no actual religious experience. It is feared that many have never been converted; others have almost unconsciously lost their first love. It would give a great momentum to the church, did every member live in the enjoyment of religion, and sustain a vital rela-

tion to Christ.

We hail with delight indications of increasing interest in the subject of "Holiness unto the Lord;" and would urge upon the church the privilege and duty of claiming all the fullness of the blessing of the Gospel of peace. What victories will be won for Christ when the church is found without spot or wrinkle, or any such thing. Let the church be carefully and wisely

led up to the highest plane of religious experience and power.

In looking at the relation of the church to society and the state, we are impressed with the great obligations upon her. Social evils are great, and some of them increasing. The ruin that intemperance is causing is truly fearful in character and proportions. Dissipation and social impurity are cesspools drowning multitudes of our noble youth in perdition. The blighting spirit of avarice and corruption is sweeping through all social ranks. If these evils are removed, it must be largely by the church. Other agencies may act a minor part; she must be chief. We would recommend the church everywhere to a more direct and positive warfare upon these evils.

The church has a great work to do for the nation. Legal separation does not imply isolation from each other. The church is still a prime factor in our national life. The institutions of our holy Christianity constitute at once the foundation and bulwark of our free republic. In this day of unchristian and perilous influences, there is danger that the church will be too timid in her defense of Christian institutions and principles that especially touch upon national government. We would urge the church everywhere to a positive adherence to the doctrine that this nation has been, is, and must be kept a Christian nation, and everywhere teach the principles

of our holy Christianity as essential to republican government.

The relation of the church to the conversion of the world is most important. The work accomplished is most gratifying. But when we look at the opening doors of humanity everywhere, and then at the wonderful accumulation of wealth in the church, we cannot but feel that there is a lack of zeal and liberality in her great enterprizes. Providence is surely calling loudly for our advance all along the line, in this department of work.

We rejoice in the spirit of unity that is increasing through all the churches. We are especially gratified at the results of the commissioners appointed by our own church and the M. E. Church South. The removal of impediments to fraternization is a long step to that state of good will and oneness of feeling and purpose that will assuredly give a fresh impetus to the kingdom of God in the world.

### XIV. TEMPERANCE.

WHEREAS, Intemperance is the prolific source of innumerable evils opposing the influence of the gospel, and causing pauperism, wretchedness,

insanity, and crime; therefore,

Resolved, 1st. That we will preach against this sin specifically and pointedly, and we will urge total abstinence upon all as taught by the word of God and our Book of Discipline, and emphasized by the sad examples of the multitudes to whom moderate drinking has proved the stepping-stone to all the degredation of confirmed inebriety, and finally to a horrible and hopeless death.

Resolved, 2d. That since saloons are schools of vice and crime, in which our youth are being lured to their destruction, we therefore, in the name of God, declare against them a war of extermination, in which we call upon all good people to unite with us and despoil the spoiler of his prey.

Resolved, 3d. That steps ought to be taken to stop the manufacture as

well as the sale of intoxicants.

Resolved, 4th. That men addicted to drinking are not the men who should be placed in offices of trust, and we solemnly protest against committing the interests of the state and nation into hands unnerved by strong drink.

Resolved, 5th. That the organization of Bands of Hope in all our Sabbath Schools is an exceedingly important step, inasmuch as the most successful way to do away with intemperance is to prevent the formation of drinking

habits.

Resolved, 6th. That we bid a hearty God-speed to all who are engaged in the prosecution of temperance work, whether as Reform Clubs, Women's Christian Temperance Unions, or other organizations; and we hail with peculiar pleasure the organization and incorporation of a State Temperance Alliance, recently effected at the Clear Lake camp meeting, which looks to a concert of action on the part of all existing organizations, and the establishment of a solid and permanent financial basis for temperance work.

#### IOWA WESLEYAN UNIVERSITY.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE APPOINTED BY THE IOWA ANNUAL CONFERENCE, TO INVESTIGATE CHARGES MADE AGAINST THE TRUSTEES AND MANAGE-MENT OF THE IOWA WESLEYAN UNIVERSITY.

In the Journal of July 16th, "75, there appeared an article signed "A Citizen," charging upon the Board of Trustees of the Iowa Wesleyan University, as now, and in the past constituted, business incapacity, and that the funds of said institution are so loosely handled as to "create in the public mind a suspicion than there is at the bottom of this, more than an honest incapacity to manage the funds intrusted to them." Alleged examples of this mismanagement were cited.

This article coming to the notice of the Trustees, a special committee

was appointed to inquire into the matter cited.

This committee, consisting of Rev. D. Murphy, Rev. Wing, and E. L. Penn, Esq., met and investigated the matter referred to, and their report appears in the Journal of August 26th, 1875. In the Journal of September 16th, an article appears in answer to the report of this committee, charging upon the committee a want of honesty, in making their investigations, and signed by T. E. Corkhill, who is understood to be the author

of the aforesaid article signed by "A Citizen.

To still further investigate these and other matters referred to, the Iowa Conference, at the session held in Keokuk, in September last, appointed a committee consisting of three ministers and two laymen, viz: Rev'ds I.O. Kemble, J. W. Chaffin, and John Haynes, and Messrs. Jacob Kauffman, and D. H. Emery. This committee met December 8th, at the President's room in the University building, all being present except J W. Chaffin, and organized by the appointment of J. Haynes, Chairman, and I. O. Kemble, Secretary.

Dr. Corkhill was before the committee, and many other members of the Board of Trustees, who also furnished the committee with all possible facilities for the prosecution of their work, such as the books and records of the institution, together with much correspondence upon the questions involved. In making our report, we beg leave to call attention to the

question of securities.

#### SECURITIES.

It is alleged that funds of the institution are loaned upon insufficient securities. We have examined the loans and securities, together with the abstracts of titles, and are convinced that all the loans are fully secured.

#### TO DECLINE DONATIONS.

It is alleged that the Trustees have unwisely declined to receive dona-

tions tendered to the University. Two cases are cited.

First, that Lee Claffin, Esq., of Massachusetts, proposed, through Rev. T. E. Corkhill, in 1866, a donation of Iowa lands, an undivided interest of which he owned, in connection with other parties, and supposed to amount to ten thousand acres, and located, as nearly as we can ascertain, in the north and northeastern portions of the State. Upon division there proved to be about thirteen thousand acres of land. The conditions upon which it was proposed to donate these lands were as follows:

The Trustees were to execute two notes of five thousand dollars each, to be paid out of the lands as they should be sold, at the rate of one dollar per acre, the aggregate payments not to exceed ten thousand dollars, the Trustees to become immediately responsible for the taxes upon the lands, and probably for interest upon the notes. The reasons for declining this dona-

tion, as stated in evidence before the committee, were that the institution at the time was under extreme financial pressure, so that the Board doubted its ability to meet the expense of agencies, etc., which would be necessarily incurred in the acceptance of said lands, and the probability, as they judged, that the lands would sell slowly. It is our judgment that the donation, had it been accepted, would have resulted in a large increase of endowment, and its non-acceptance was a great mistake; and the reasons given for declining the offer do not, in our opinion, justify the action of the Board.

Second, That George B. Corkhill proposed to endow a professorship in the University, with at least ten thousand dollars, which proposition the Board rejected. I. O. Kemble objects to the finding of the committee upon this point. The facts concerning this proposed endowment are as

follows:

In 1871, Col. Corkhill, in connection with some of his friends, and friends of the University, proposed by his individual contributions, together with the contributions of special friends, to endow a department in the University, to be called the department of "Geology and Natural History:" that the endowment should not be less than ten thousand dollars, and suggested the name of Mason Bayles to fill the position of professor in this department, asking the privilege of providing for the salary of Professor Bayles until the endowment should be secured. He requested also that the Board of Trustees should authorize one of their number, understood to be T. E. Corkhill, to assist him in raising ten thousand dollars. The Board created the chair, elected Mr. Bayles to the profeesorship, and authorized T. E. Corkhill to assist in raising the money. Subsequently Col. Corkhill requested that T. E. Corkhill, by the proper authorities of the church, be appointed agent of the University, to enable him to carry into effect his proposition. The Board, for reasons which seemed sufficient to themselves, declined asking for such appointment.

We are compelled to believe, had Dr. Corkhill stated to the Board the grounds upon which his appointment was requested, also the field in which he was expected to operate, that the Board would not have hesitated in recommending his appointment. We cannot see, therefore, wherein the

Board is responsible for the failure of the Corkhill proposition.

#### THE R. R. BOND QUESTION.

It appears that Lee Claffin, Esq., of Boston, donated to the University, in 1866, county railroad bonds to the amount of four thousand dollars, two of the bonds held upon Powesheik count; and two upon Iowa county, this state. These bonds were retained by the University until February, 1871, when they were sold to Henry Ambler, Esq., for the sum of six thousand dollars, including interest. Of this sum there was paid: Cash in hand, \$1,300; in one year without interest, \$700; in ten years with interest at 7½ per cent, \$4,000; interest upon matured coupons, afterwards added, \$945. Total, \$6,945.

We find these bonds were worth at the time, not less than 90 cents to the dollar on the principal, and the interest was being paid in full. By careful calculation we find the value of these bonds at ninety cents on the dollar, to be with accrued interest, \$9,968. \$6,945 Making a difference of \$3,023. Amount received of H. Ambler,

But four thousand of this Mr. Ambler has for ten years at 7½ per cent, payable annually, while the bonds are bearing ten per cent payable semiannually, making a further loss to the institution of 21 per cent, on four thousand dollars for ten years, which would be \$1,000; this added to the amount above of \$3,023, would make the actual loss on bonds \$4,023.

We are convinced that the loss to the University in this bond transaction, reckoning the interest as paid annually, is not a dollar less than the above figures. Who is responsible? We believe the Board acted in good faith with the light they had, but we believe further information was accessible, which they did not possess. Our information is, however, that the Board depended nearly wholly upon Mr. Ambler for information upon the subject, he being a member of the Board, and acting as their attorney. The Committee is clearly of the opinion that Mr. Ambler ought to have had full knowledge upon the subject, which he failed to put into the possession of the Board, and is, therefore, in our judgment, responsible for this loss of \$4,023.00 to the University.

#### GENERAL MANAGEMENT.

The last item we wish to name in our report is the general management. While we have found instances where mistakes have been made in the management of the interests of the University, and even very grave mistakes, yet we have not learned that the Board, because of its connection with an institution of learning, should be held responsible for absolute infallibility in the administration of its affairs. We believe that the Board has learned wisdom by experience, and that the administration of more recent years exhibits greater business capacity than that of the earlier years of the institution. And in closing this report we wish to state that our investigation has not lessened our confidence in the Iowa Wesleyan University, but on the contrary, increased it. For its exact financial status, we refer to the Treasurer's financial exhibit in his annual report.
