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#### SUMMARY OF FINDINGS

The total number of employed wage and salary earners in Australia in December 1987 was estimated as 5,899,700. This represents an increase of 111,000 (1.9 per cent) since September 1987 and an increase of 225,900 (4.0 per cent) compared to December 1986.

Over the last four years of the survey, the number of wage and salary earners has increased by 787,800 (15.4 per cent).

#### Private and public sectors

Growth in the number of employees in recent years is shown in Diagram 1 below, where it can be seen that the increase is concentrated in the private sector. In the year to December 1987, the number of private sector employees grew by 219,700 (5.6 per cent) to 4,166,700. This represents an increase of 692,500 employees (19.9 per cent) in the last four years.

Over the same period, however, growth in the public sector has been much slower. In the year to December 1987, public sector employment increased slightly, by 6,100 (0.4 per cent) to 1,733,000. This represents an increase of 95,300 (5.8 per cent) since December 1983.

The proportion of wage and salary earners employed in the private sector has continued to increase, from 68.0 per cent in December 1983, to 69.6 per cent in December 1986 and 70.6 per cent in December 1987.

Diagram 1 also shows:

 a sharp drop in public sector employment for December and January each year, principally due to temporary staff in the education industry not being employed after the end of the school year;

- an increase in public sector employment in June and July 1986, due to the employment of 40,700 temporary employees for the Census of Population and Housing; and

- an increase in public sector employment in July 1987, due to the employment of 67,600 temporary employees to con-

duct the Federal Election. This effect was partly offset by a fall in employment in July in the education industry due to the incidence of school holidays in most States.

#### **Industries**

Diagram 2 shows changes in the number of employed wage and salary earners, both for the year ended December 1987, and over the last four years, classified by ASIC division.


The Finance, property and business services industry continues to show the greatest employment growth, with an increase of 180,700 (33.8 per cent) since December 1983, and 48,400 (7.2 per cent) since December 1986, to 716,000 employees in December 1987.


The Recreation, personal and other services industry has also shown strong employment growth since December 1983, with and increase of 92,500 (26.3 per cent). Over the last year, however, this growth has been the strongest of all industries, with an increase of 46,100 (11.6 per cent) to 444,600 employees.


The Wholesale and retail trade industry has shown above average growth in the last four years, with an increase in employment of 170,500 (16.6 per cent) to 1,200,400 employees. In the last year, however, the increase was only 39,000 employees (3.4 per cent), which is slightly below the average growth for all industries.

Growth in employment in the Construction industry has been uneven. Over the four year period, the number of employees has increased by 37,700 (16.3 per cent) to 268,900. Almost half of this growth (15,200) has been in the last year, with the most recent three month period accounting for an increase of 9,400 employees (3.6 per cent).

The Electricity, gas and water industry is the only industry to show a fall in the number of employees in the last four years. Most of this decrease has occurred over the last year, with a drop of 6,900 (5.1 per cent), to 129,200 employees.







The Communications industry is the only other industry to show a fall in employment in the last year, with a decrease of 1,900 (1.4 per cent), to 134,700 employees.

#### Employer size


Estimates of private sector employment classified by employer size can be derived from survey data (see Table 14). Diagram 3 shows the contribution to total private sector employment of enterprises falling into three employee size groups. It can be seen that over all industries, enterprises with less than 20 employees account for approximately 33 per cent of private sector employment, employers with 20-99 employees account for approximately 23 per cent, while those with 100 or more employees account for approxi-

mately 44 per cent. This proportion varies greatly across industries, however, with enterprises with 100 or more employees dominating the Mining industry, while the Construction industry is dominated by enterprises with less than 20 employees.

#### Male and female wage and salary earners

Estimates of male and female, as well as full-time and parttime, wage and salary earners relate to the middle month of each quarter. In November 1987, there were 2,551,600 female employees - an increase of 62,600 (2.5 per cent) since August 1987, and 140,800 (5.8 per cent) since November 1986. In contrast, the number of male employees has shown a much slower growth rate. In the last three months,

the number of male employees increased by 45,500 (1.4 per cent) to 3,335,800 - an increase of 73,400 (2.2 per cent) in the last year.

For females, employment growth has occurred in both the private and public sectors. In the last four years, the number of private sector female employees has increased by 380,400 (26.4 per cent) to 1,821,500 in November 1987. The number of public sector female employees has grown by 99,100 (15.7 per cent) to 730,100. In contrast, employment growth for males was concentrated in the private sector, with an increase over the four year period of 304,200 (15.1 per cent) to 2,324,400 employees in November 1987. Public sector male employment decreased in this period by 12,300 (1.2 per cent) to 1,011,400.


Diagram 4 shows the increasing proportion of female wage and salary earners to total employment. This percentage has grown steadily from 40.5 per cent in November 1983 to 43.3 per cent in November 1987. The increase in the proportion of female employees is directly related to their high participation in part-time employment and in industries which display the strongest growth trends.


#### Full-time and part-time wage and salary earners

In November 1987, there were an estimated 4,504,300 full-time and 1,383,100 part-time employees in Australia. These represent an increase of 59,100 (1.3 per cent) full-time and 49,000 (3.7 per cent) part-time employees since August 1987.

Diagram 5 shows the growth in the number of full-time and part-time employees over the last four years. The rate of growth for part-time employees has been much greater than that of full-time employees - 37.2 per cent, compared with 9.6 per cent. In the year to November 1987, part-time employment has increased by 106,900 (8.4 per cent), compared with an increase in full-time employment of 107,200 (2.4 per cent).

Since November 1983, percentage growth in part-time employment has been similar in both the private and public sectors, 38.3 per cent and 32.6 per cent respectively. However, growth in full-time employment has been concentrated in the private sector - 14.1 per cent compared to an increase in the public sector of 1.6 per cent.






Part-time female employment has increased by 284,400 (39.1 per cent) since November 1983, while part-time male employment has increased by 90,700 (32.4 per cent). In the same four year period, the increase in the number of fultime female employees (195,200) is comparable to that for full-time males (201,100), but is more significant for females than males - 14.5 per cent increase, compared to 7.3 per cent.

#### Earnings

Total earnings for employed wage and salary earners in the December quarter 1987 are estimated as \$31,913.1m. This is an increase of \$1,735.7m (5.8 per cent) over the previous quarter and an increase of \$2,613.0m (8.9 per cent) over the previous year. Over the last four years, total earnings have increased by \$10,040.5m (45.9 per cent).

#### Revisions to series

Estimates of wage and salary earners and earnings for the Mining and Public administration industries for Queensland local government have been revised to incorporate updated information. Revisions for data in series not shown in this issue are available on request.



#### **EXPLANATORY NOTES**

#### Introduction

This publication contains results of the quarterly Survey of Employment and Earnings (SEE) which was introduced in the September quarter 1983. The survey is designed to obtain, from employers, information on numbers of wage and salary earners employed each month and their quarterly earnings. It replaces the civilian employees series, based principally on information obtained from payroll tax returns, which was discontinued after April 1980.

2. Background information on the reasons for the introduction of the new survey is provided in *Information Paper: Review of ABS Employment Statistics* (6239.0) published on 8 July 1981. Further information on the differences in concepts, methodology and coverage of the old and new employment series is provided in *Information Paper: New Statistical Series: Employment, Average Weekly Earnings, Job Vacancies and Overtime* (6256.0) issued on 21 June 1984.

#### Scope of the survey

- 3. All wage and salary earners who received pay in any pay period ending within the quarter were represented in the survey, except: members of the Australian permanent defence forces; employees of enterprises in the private sector primarily engaged in agriculture, forestry, fishing and hunting; employees in private households employing staff; employees of overseas embassies, consulates, etc; employees based outside Australia.
- 4. As an indicator of the number of employed wage and salary earners out of scope of the survey, and included in the first three groups above, the following estimates derived from other sources show the average number of employees for the year ended June 1987 as: New South Wales 68,800; Victoria 43,000; Queensland 40,800; South Australia 19,100; Western Australia 26,500; Tasmania 7,600; Northern Territory 5,700; Australian Capital Territory 7,000; and Australia 218,200.

#### Survey design

- 5. The survey is conducted by mail each quarter with data collected on monthly employment and quarterly earnings. For the first and last month of each quarter, only the total number of persons is collected; for the mid month of each quarter, details of males and females, full-time and part-time are collected.
- 6. For the *Private sector*, a sample of approximately 20,000 private employers was selected from the ABS register of businesses to ensure adequate State and industry representation. The statistical unit for the survey comprises all activities of an enterprise in a particular State. Each statistical unit was classified to an industry which reflected the predominant activity of the enterprise in the State. In a small number of cases where an enterprise had significant employment in more than one industry, a separate statistical unit was created for each industry. Periodically, a review is undertaken to determine whether existing enterprises which are split into separate statistical units should continue to report on that basis. In addition, larger enter-

prises which are not currently split into separate statistical units are examined to decide whether they should be split for the purpose of reporting employment. Any changes in reporting arrangements as a result of such reviews can have an impact on the industry estimates at the time of their implementation. The statistical units are stratified by State, industry, and size of employment. A simple random sample is selected from each stratum.

7. For the *Public sector*, statistical units are derived in the same way as for the private sector; data are collected in the survey from *all* public sector units.

#### Definitions

- 8. Reference period for the number of employees is the last pay period ending on or before the third Friday in each month.
- 9. Number of employees refers to all employees who received pay for any part of the relevant pay period. All permanent, temporary, casual, managerial and executive employees are included. Part-time and casual employees who may have worked only a few hours during the reference period are included. Employees on paid leave and those employees on workers' compensation who continue to be paid through the employer's payroll are also included. Casual employees who work on an irregular basis and who were not paid during the relevant pay period, employees on leave without pay, on strike or stood down without pay for the whole of the pay period are excluded.
- 10. Full-time employees are permanent, temporary and casual employees who normally work the agreed or award hours for a full-time employee in their occupation and who received pay for any part of the reference period. If agreed or award hours do not apply, employees are regarded as full-time if they ordinarily work 35 hours or more per week.
- 11. Part-time employees are permanent, temporary and casual employees who are not classified as full-time employees as defined.
- 12. Public employees comprise not only administrative employees but also all other employees of Commonwealth, State and Local government businesses and financial undertakings engaged in services such as railways, road transport, banks, postal and telecommunications, air transport, education, radio, television, police, public works, factories, marketing authorities, hospitals and welfare institutions.
- 13. Commonwealth employees are those employed by all departments, agencies and authorities created by or reporting to the Commonwealth Parliament. Those bodies run jointly by Commonwealth and State governments are classified to Commonwealth.
- 14. State employees are those employed by all State government departments and authorities created by, or reporting to, State Parliaments, including organisations for which the Commonwealth has assumed financial responsibility, e.g. universities. Following self-government, the

Northern Territory administration has been classified as a 'State' government.

- 15. Local government employees are those employed by municipalities and shires and other local authorities created by or subject to the provisions of local government legislation, such as county councils in New South Wales.
- 16. Reference period for earnings constitutes all pay periods for which the end of the pay period falls within the quarter.
- 17. Gross earnings are payments to employees before tax and other items (such as superannuation) are deducted. They comprise ordinary time and overtime earnings; overaward payments; penalty payments, shift and other remunerative allowances; commissions and retainers; bonuses and similar payments; payments under incentive or piecework; payments under profit-sharing schemes; leave loadings; annual and long service leave payments; sick leave payments; advance and retrospective payments; salaries and fees paid to company directors, members of boards, committees, commissions, councils, etc.; amounts paid to employees on workers' compensation which are not covered by insurance, i.e. 'make-up' pay; and severance, termination and redundancy payments.

#### Reliability of estimates

18. Estimates are subject to sampling and non-sampling errors. For more information refer to the Technical note.

#### Interpretation of estimates of movements

- 19. While estimates of employed wage and salary earners are presented in this publication for each month of the quarter, the survey is conducted quarterly and the sample of employers is updated each quarter to reflect changes in the ABS register of business units, from which the sample is selected. These changes arise from the emergence of new businesses, takeovers and mergers, changes to industry classification, size of employment, and businesses which have ceased operations. Periodically, the ABS takes special steps to improve the coverage of the register in specific industry sectors. Recently, a check was undertaken of all small businesses listed on the register. Such updating of the register can contribute to sudden changes in the estimates of employed wage and salary earners, and earnings for various industries.
- 20. Estimates of monthly movements within each quarter arise solely from changes in reported employment by employers but movements between quarters also reflect changes resulting from updating the survey sample.

#### Comparability of results

21. The new series differs in several important ways from the former payroll tax-based civilian employees series and estimates of employed wage and salary earners obtained from the Labour Force Survey (LFS). It provides an estimate of the number of jobs occupied by people, whereas the other two series provide estimates of the number of people in jobs. For the new series, data are obtained directly from a sample survey of employers drawn from the ABS register of business units which is more complete than the coverage provided by employers subject to payroll tax. Comparability with LFS estimates is affected by the use of

- a different survey methodology and definitions. In addition, because of unavoidable time delays, which can vary across States, lags occur between the birth of new businesses and their appearance on the ABS register. They will not be represented in the sample selected from the register for one or two quarters after such businesses have commenced operation. As a consequence, estimates of movements in this series will lag those produced from the LFS, particularly at a time of upward movement in the business cycle. A detailed description of the comparability between the SEE series, the former payroll tax-based Civilian Employees series and the series provided by the LFS is presented in the Information Paper: New Statistical Series: Employment, Average Weekly Earnings, Job Vacancies and Overtime (6256.0). Additional detail on the differences between the SEE and the LFS series appears in the Information Paper: Comparison of Employment Estimates from the Labour Force Survey and the Survey of Employment and Earnings (6263.0), and in the supplement to the December 1986 issue of the Treasury Roundup.
- 22. Separate estimates of full-time and part-time employees are included in Table 4. For definitions of these terms, see paragraphs 10 and 11. This table was first published in the June quarter 1987 issue of this publication and has not been published for previous quarters back to September 1983. This information is available on request. For the reasons outlined above in paragraph 21, it is difficult to compare estimates of full-time and part-time employees derived from the SEE with those produced from the LFS. Generally, the number of full-time employees is higher in the LFS series, and the number of part-time employees is higher in the SEE series. In the LFS, a person who works more than 35 hours a week in total in two (or more) parttime jobs is classified as working full-time. However, in this situation, the SEE would show two part-time jobs as having been filled.
- 23. The SEE collects total quarterly employee earnings primarily for use in estimating the gross domestic product component of the Australian National Accounts. Whilst average employee earnings can be derived from these data. the results will not be comparable with those from the Survey of Average Weekly Earnings (AWE) published in Average Weekly Earnings, States and Australia (6302.0). The SEE collects the sum of employee earnings paid in all pay periods ending in a quarter and the results will be affected by the varying number of pay periods from quarter to quarter, whereas the AWE relates to a specified pay period within a quarter and is not subject to such influences. In addition, certain types of payments within the scope of the SEE, such as retrospective pay, pay in advance, leave loadings and severance, termination and redundancy payments are specifically excluded from the AWE. The SEE earnings data are also subject to seasonal variations particularly in December and March quarters due to the incidence of holidays taken in January being paid in advance and the earnings being reported in December quarter figures.
- 24. Prior to July 1983 the number of public sector employees was derived from a variety of administrative sources and published in *The Labour Force*, *Australia* (6203.0). Commonwealth government departments and authorities

generally reported the number of employees on the payroll on the last working day of the month, but for State and Local government employees data were usually provided for the last day of the last pay period ending in the month. In an attempt to provide unduplicated estimates of the number of persons who were wage and salary earners, certain public sector returns were adjusted to exclude some part-time employees considered to have full-time jobs elsewhere.

- 25. Public employment figures for July 1983 and subsequent months are based on data obtained from government departments and authorities using the same questionnaire, definitions, reference period, collection and processing procedures as for the sample of private employers.
- 26. Differences occur between the new and old public sector series because of the changes to collection arrangements, reference period, the treatment of part-time employees and inclusion of public employees in forestry and services to agriculture (11,200 in May 1983). To provide a statistical link between the new and old public sector series, information on the new and old basis for April, May and June 1983 was released in the September quarter 1983 issue of this publication.

#### Industry classification

27. Industry is classified according to the Australian Standard Industrial Classification (ASIC) 1983 Edition, (1201.0)

#### Size classification

- 28. To derive estimates for Table 14, each of the approximately 20,000 statistical units (see paragraph 6) in the private sector is allocated a size classification based on the number of employees actually reported for the middle month of the quarter. This size classification reflects the employment size of an enterprise in a particular State or Territory and not the employment size of an enterprise Australia wide.
- 29. Data presented in Table 14 shows the contribution to total employment of enterprises falling into three size groups. Over a period, the composition of these categories will vary as changes in individual employment levels cause some enterprises to migrate from one size group to another. This will have some effect on changes over time in the distribution of employment by size of enterprise.

#### Semi-logarithmic graphs

30. Diagram 5 on page 3 has been drawn using a logarithmic vertical scale to facilitate comparisons of rates of growth in series of differing magnitude. Equal distances on the vertical scale (over equal time periods) indicate equal rates of growth.

#### TECHNICAL NOTE

#### Reliability of estimates

Estimates for the private sector in this publication are subject to sampling variability because they are based on information relating to a sample of employers rather than a full enumeration, (i.e. they may differ from the figures that would have been produced if the information had been obtained from all private employers). This difference, called sampling error, should not be confused with inaccuracy that may occur because of imperfections in reporting by respondents or in processing by the ABS; such inaccuracy is referred to as non-sampling error and may occur in any enumeration, whether it be a full count or sample. Efforts have been made to reduce the non-sampling error by careful design of questionnaires, detailed checking of returns and quality control of processing. Data for the government sector are obtained from a full enumeration of all agencies and thus are not subject to sampling errors.

- 2. The sampling error associated with any estimate can be estimated from the sample results. One measure of sampling error is given by the standard error which indicates the degree to which an estimate may vary from the value that would have been obtained from a full enumeration (the 'true' figure). There are about two chances in three that a sample estimate differs from the true value by less than one standard error, and about nineteen chances in twenty that the difference will be less than two standard errors.
- If the standard error of an estimate is large relative to the size of the estimate, the usefulness of that estimate is seriously impaired. For the tables in this publication, esti-

- mates with standard errors greater than 25 per cent have been footnoted.
- 4. Standard errors on levels for industries are shown only for the third month of the quarter. As the survey is conducted quarterly from a common sample of employers, who report employment details for each month of the quarter, standard errors on all estimates for total persons employed in each month are of a similar magnitude.
- 5. Standard errors on movements provide a measure of the reliability of changes in the level of an estimate. Table A shows standard errors for movements in the level of estimates for persons between the third month of successive quarters. Standard errors for annual movements are updated each December quarter as the magnitude of standard errors for annual movements does not change significantly over the course of a single year.
- 6. An example of the use of standard error on *levels* is as follows. If the estimated number of wage and salary earners was 5,500,000 with a standard error of 25,000, then there would be about two chances in three that a full enumeration would have given a figure in the range 5,475,000 to 5,525,000 and about nineteen chances in twenty that it would be in the range 5,450,000 to 5,550,000.
- Standard errors for earnings are approximately the same relative size as standard errors for employment. Detailed standard errors for both employment and earnings are available on request.
