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11 fire departments battle fire that totals Diemer warehouse

The Antioch Fire Dept. was called to a fire at the old Grass Lake Lumber Co., on Grass Lake Rd. at 4:27 a.m. on Monday.

A warehouse owned by Diemer Plumbing, located in back of the main building, was involved in flames when the firemen arrived.

In all, 11 fire departments, 50 firemen, fought the blaze which was extinguished within an hour. The last fire truck left the scene at about 8:45 a.m., reported Antioch Dep. Fire Chief Dennis Volling.

The fire began to spread to a closely warehouse also owned by Diemer, but was quickly put out by the firemen at the scene.

The cause of the fire is still under investigation and damages are estimated at \$200,000, according to Volling.

Haling, last of rare breed dead at 82

One of Antioch's oldest and most popular citizens, Charlie Haling is dead at 82.

When Haling took over his father's resort on Grass Lake Rd. as a young man, over 60 years ago, he became Antioch's "Mr. Outdoors."

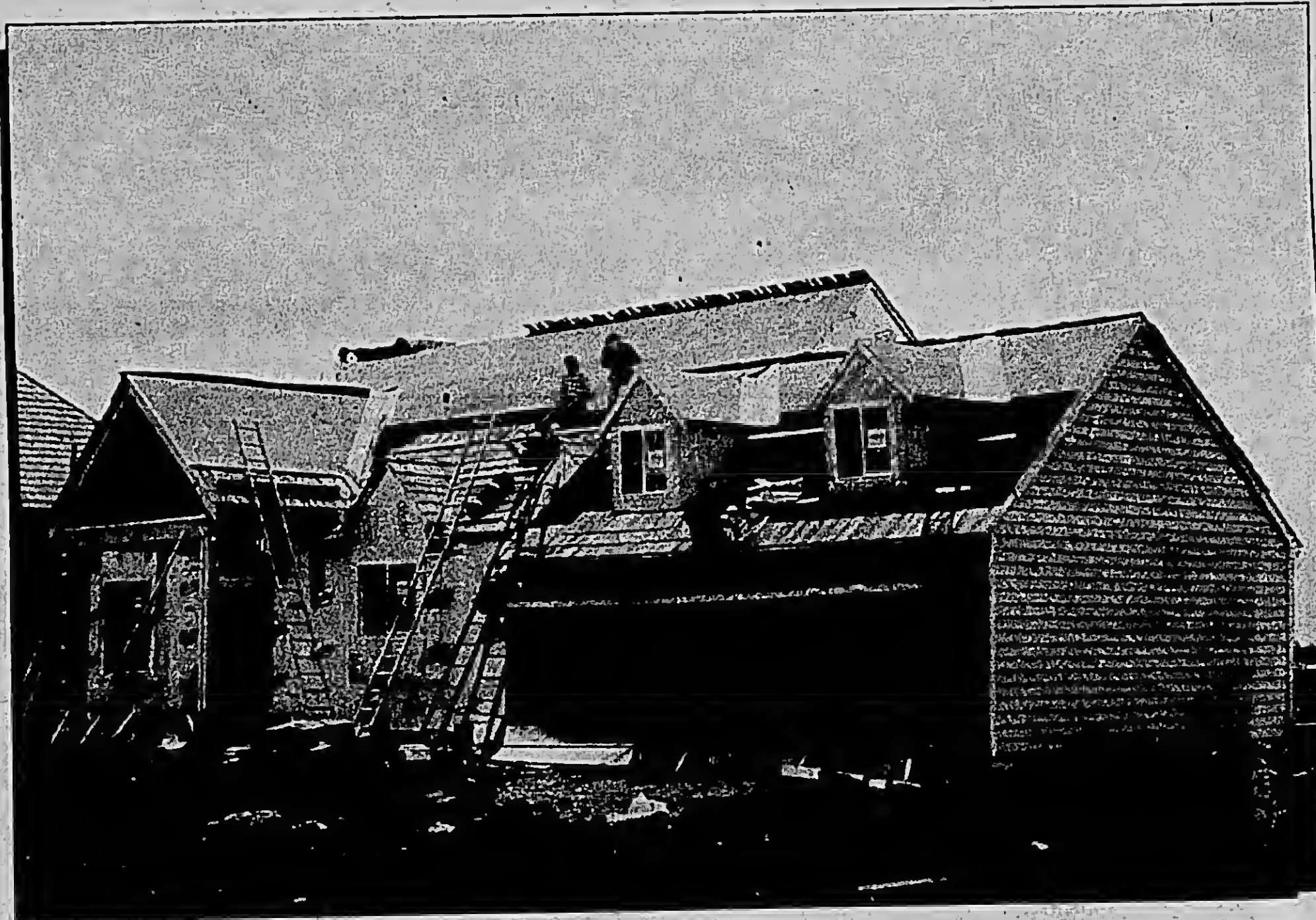
He loved and knew just about everything that was to be known about hunting and fishing, especially in the Antioch area. He belonged to almost all the local organizations at one time or other.

Fields put on probation on contribution flub

County Board Chairman Jim Fields and board member, Fred Popp appeared in front of the state board of elections in Chicago on charges filed by Antioch Atty. Robert Long.

Long charged Fields and Popp with not reporting election contributions amounting to over \$500 before the primary election.

The contributions Long is referring to are the costs of the printed endorsement of both by Antioch Mayor Ray Toft, sent out just before the primary election.

According to Fields the total cost of the endorsements was just over \$1,000.

Fields told the board that he had a new treasurer and they did not know the total cost of mailing of the en-

dorsement until after the deadline. Records show that the printing and mailing bill was paid after the primary election.

The election board put Fields on probation for a year. "This means I can't be late in filing my contributions this August before the November election," said Fields.

Popp lost to Suzie Schmidt in the primary so he will not be running for the Lake County Board in November.

St. Peter's Church Hall, 557 Lake Street, Antioch, Wednesday, June 15, 9 to 11 a.m. No appointment is necessary. Lake County Health Dept. Northeast Satellite 1819 27th Street, Zion, Friday, June 17, 9 to 11 a.m. No appointment is necessary. Wauconda Twp. Rte. 12 & Bonner Rd., Wauconda, Wednesday, June 22, 9-11 a.m. No appointment is necessary. Immaculate Conception School 770 Deerfield Rd., Highland Park, Friday, June 24, 9 to 11 a.m. No appointment necessary.

At the immunization sessions, children can be immunized against polio, diphtheria, tetanus (D.P.T.), measles, mumps, and rubella or German Measles.

Parents are asked to

bring their children's past immunization records. If a child has an immunization letter from the school nurse, it should also be brought to the session.

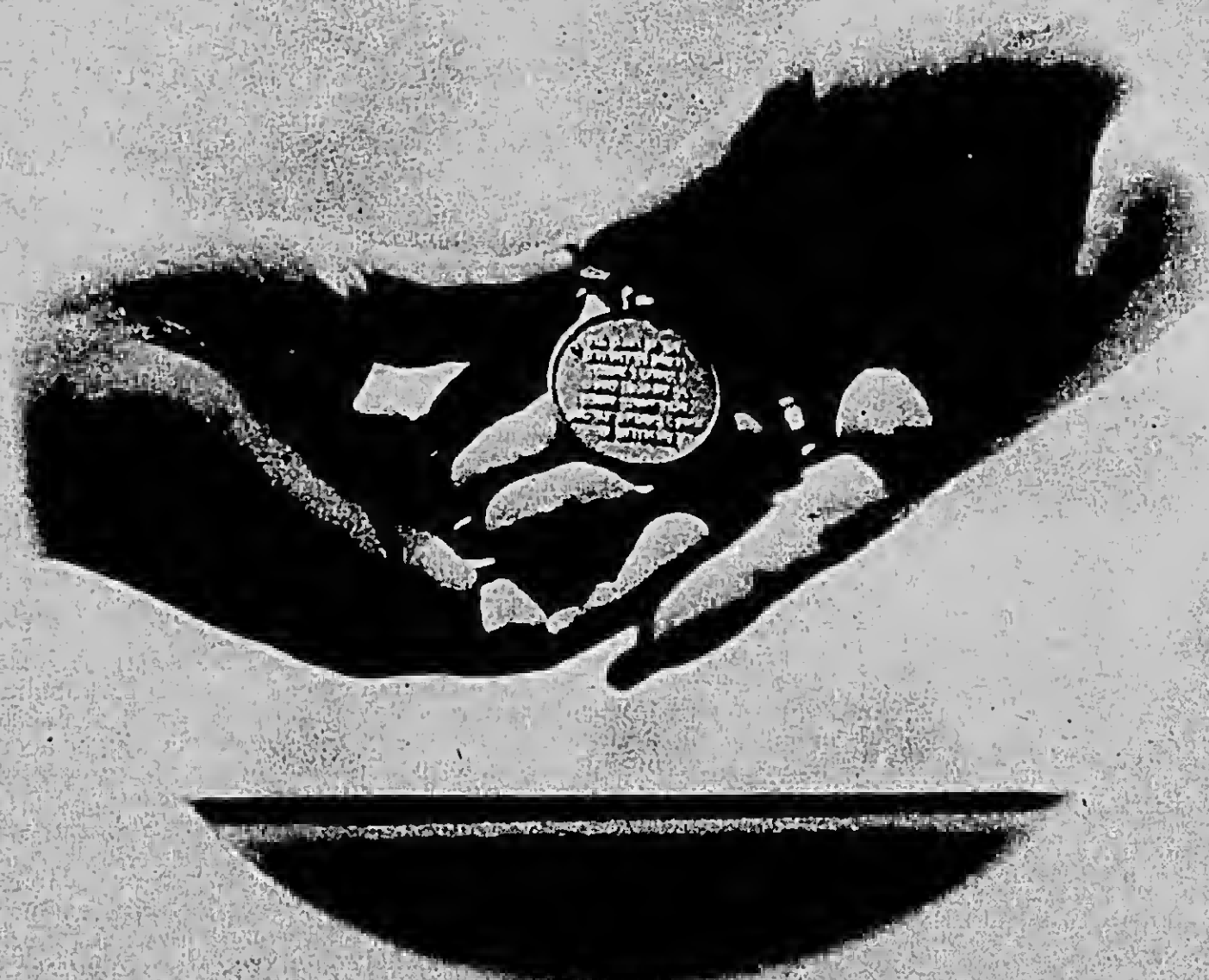

The curriculum uses puppets and stories to promote self esteem and inform children about harmful substances in their surroundings.



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## DOCTOR'S FORUM

### WHEN SHOULD YOU CALL A DOCTOR?

This article is second of a series dealing with commonly encountered first aid problems. Proper first aid administration and appropriate physician follow up are discussed. Today, tips are given on burns and fever control.

**Burns:** Severity of burns is described by three categories. First degree: redness with minor swelling. Second degree: redness, blistering, skin looks wet. Third degree: skin white or charred with loss of sensation.

First aid for first and second degree burns is similar. It consists of application of cold compresses or immersion in cold water until pain subsides, followed by gentle drying to avoid trauma to the burned area. These measures reduce redness and swelling, and relieve discomfort. Physician follow up is necessary for second degree burns because of blister peeling and the possibility of infection.

Third degree burns are severe, with first aid consisting of keeping the person flat and warm until a hospital rescue squad arrives for transportation to the emergency room.

**Fever Control:** Fever control is a chief concern primarily in children under six years old. High fevers in this age group can cause seizures. Measures to control fever in a child are: acetaminophen (Tylenol) taken orally or by rectal suppositories, undress the child in a cool room, place the child in a partially filled tub of luke warm water and sponge for 15 minutes, followed by vigorous drying.

This process can be repeated as needed. Children with high fevers should be seen by a physician. Immediate help should be sought for fevers accompanied by seizures, rash, stiff neck, shortness of breath, chest or stomach pain, severe headache, prolonged vomiting and diarrhea.

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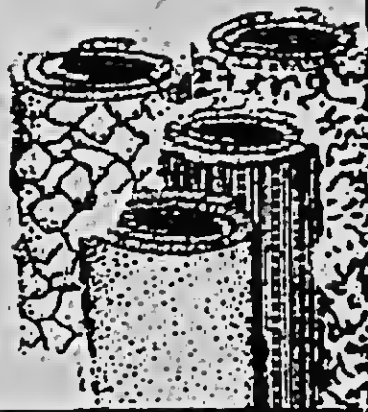

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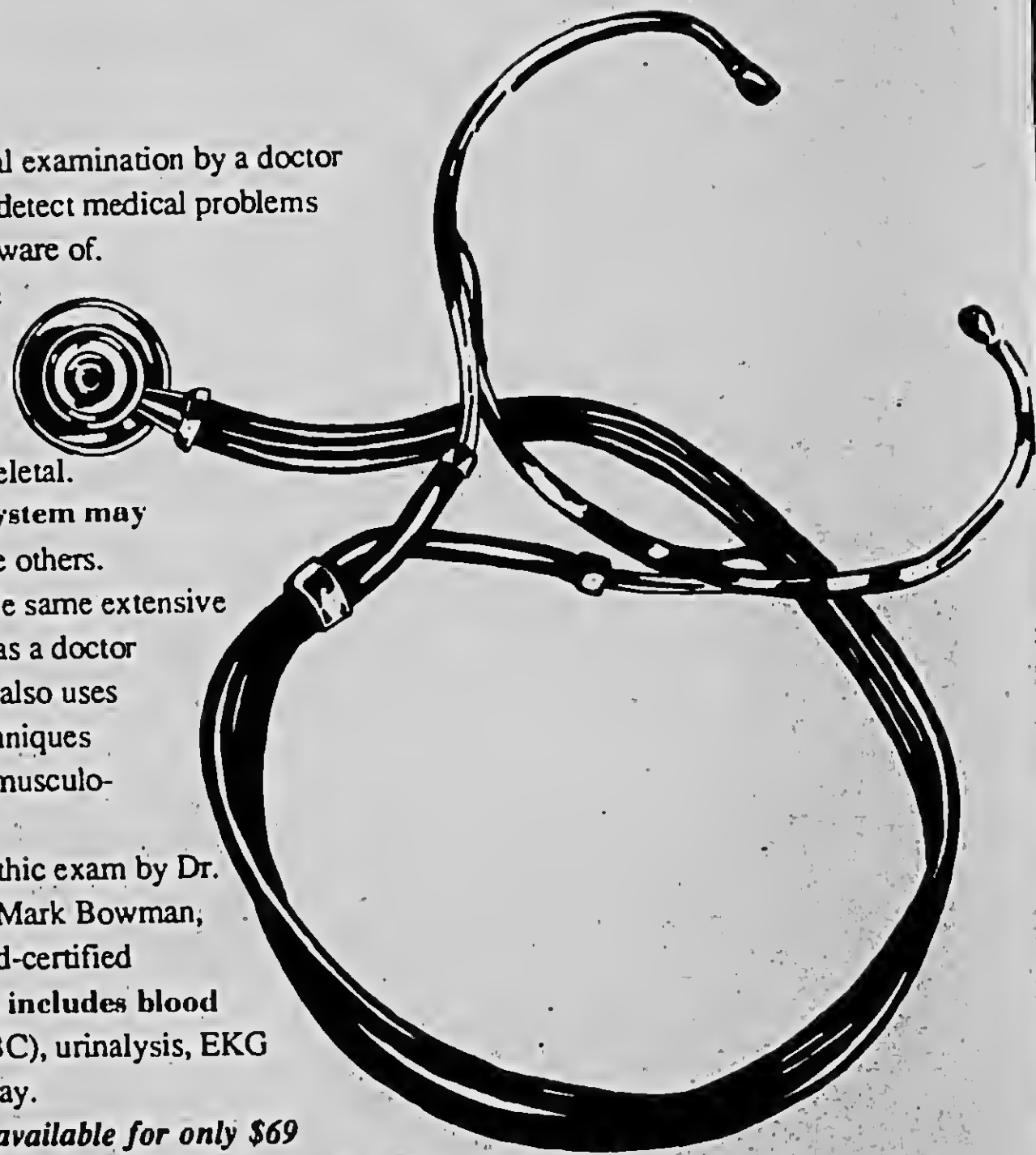

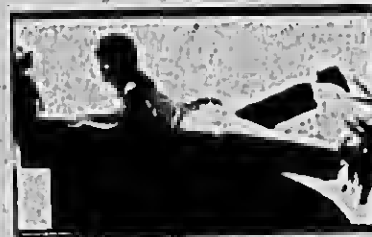

Editor:

At 4:30 p.m. on Memorial Day afternoon, I was returning to my suburban home and traveling on I-94, in Indiana, just east of the Illinois border. I witnessed a serious motorcycle accident. I told her that I was trying to report a serious and potentially life-threatening motorcycle accident. She insisted that a charge card or money was needed. I left the phone booth and secured change. What if I didn't have money with me?

I finally got through to the Illinois State Police and reported the accident. The policeman said, "That's in Indiana—I can't help you," and abruptly hung up. Couldn't he have offered to relay the information to the Indiana police?

I'm very troubled by the response of Illinois Bell and the Illinois State Police to what was a serious problem. Shouldn't we expect more from these agencies?

## Calls for tax increase

Editor:

I want to add my support to those groups and organizations calling for an increase in the state income tax to fund

education and other important state services.

Illinois operates with a lower income tax rate than neighboring states, and we haven't had a permanent increase in the income tax since its introduction in 1969. Our property taxes, which are the primary source of funding for our local schools, were decreased by more than \$2 billion from 1982-1985 by exemptions, not including those exemptions granted to senior citizens, veterans and the disabled.

Illinois also has Medicaid payments that have not been made, community mental health centers that don't have the money to operate and other examples of the critical need for more revenue.

Illinois has the resources to provide for these human needs; in 1985 our state ranked ninth in per capita income in the United States. However, Illinois ranks 44th in direct expenditures (as a percent of personal income) for elementary and secondary schools, 44th in per capita expenditures for higher education and 35th in the percentage of our adult population that has a college degree.

If Illinois is to enter the 21st century as a strong and thriving state, we must invest now in policies and programs that encourage economic development and job growth by strengthening our educational system and the quality of life in Illinois.

We cannot borrow against our future any longer. I urge the General Assembly to take a strong stand on this issue, and vote to support a much needed tax increase.

## Good idea not so good

For anti-drug hardliners, there's a certain headiness about proposals now before Congress to give the armed forces more responsibility in the war on drugs. In a conflict where society seems to be losing more ground every day, it's somewhat comforting to feel that there is a force of sufficient size and scope to go toe to toe with the elaborate and world-wide distribution system that constitutes the criminal drug element.

Good as the idea sounds, the hard fact is that the military isn't a very effective tool against the drug menace. Moreover, anti-drug operations by the armed forces have been extremely expensive.

In actuality, the armed forces totally are out of synch when it comes to battling the human scum spreading drugs around our nation. The Air Force AWACS surveillance plane is equipped to identify Russian MiG fighters traveling 1,200 knots at 45,000 feet, not a small two seater loaded with cocaine flying at 180 mph at 500 feet. Generally,

drug interdiction takes a back seat to military training and operations. That's the way it has to be.

Lake County State's Atty. Fred Foreman, speaking as the county's chief prosecutor and also as the new president of the national state's attorney's organization, makes no bones in saying that the federal government should send money out into the field to fight drugs, not soldiers. "We can use federal funds at the local level. That's where the war against drugs will be won," Foreman avowed.

Considering America's historical reluctance to have the military act as law enforcement officers and the less than enthusiastic response on the part of Army, Air Force, Navy, Marines and Coast Guard to play policeman, Congress should reassess the situation and drop the whole idea.

This is the case of an interesting idea running aground because of a mountain of impracticalities.

## Lake watching important

Lake Michigan, our rambunctious neighbor to the east, has been confounding experts and just plain folks for years with its penchant for varied levels. Lake Michigan always seems to be either high, or low or in a transition and now appears to be on its way toward a low cycle having dropped more than a foot in the last year after record high levels in 1986 and '87.

With a personality all its own, the constant state of wonderment seems to suit Lake Michigan fine, the fluctuations serving to keep human beings in a perpetual guessing game. Right now scientists are concerned about the "greenhouse effect"—increased carbon dioxide in the upper atmosphere that blocks heat radiating from the surface to space. This would lead to a warmer,

drier climate than in the past-- and lower lake levels. If global temperatures rise, hydrologists believe average levels of the Great Lakes could drop as much as five feet during the next 80 years. Lake Michigan has been more fickle than that, though.

Without a doubt, whether the shores are eroding or the beaches are widening is important and well worth studying. Even more important, however, is whether Lake Michigan contains enough water for thirsty human beings to draw off to supply their needs. It won't be long and water from the "big lake" will be coursing westward to supply inland Lake County communities.

We can't ever take Lake Michigan for granted. And even if we tried, she won't let us.

## Pay board deserves review

The Illinois Compensation Review Board, created in 1984 to take pay raise issues out of the General Assembly, may have outlived its usefulness in its short existence. It's time to assess the future of this non-political unit charged with handling very political business.

State Rep. Bill Peterson (R-Long Grove) was among a number of legislators who were aghast at the board's recommendation for a 9.5 percent pay increase, to be phased in over two years, for the state's constitutional officers, legislators, judges and department heads. At the time, Peterson correctly charged the board with total disregard for Illinois financial needs.

We think Peterson and like-minded colleagues acted wisely in voting against the recommendations or they would have taken effect within 30 days from their release.

Illinois legislators haven't been doing a very good job of funding specific core services, such as education and various human services. It was inconceivable that the board would recommend pay increases. We much prefer the old system where the solons had to grapple with pay problems. They're getting paid to handle the tough decisions. No more bureaus are needed to handle the hot potatoes.

Tax increases to be voted on in the November elections are being lined up. In Fox Lake there will be at least two, one will be a 50-cent addition to the current \$1.41 per \$1,000 tax rate by Fox Lake Grade Schools. This will be the third try within one year to raise the tax rate. Another chance for Fox Lake voters to decide a tax increase will come from the proposed Chain O' Lakes Park Dist. It will ask for up to 17 cents per \$100 to provide additional programs for township people of all ages.

Still another tax hike shaping up Mellenry where the school board will ask for a 60-cent tax increase to boost the tax rate from the current \$1.32 to \$1.92 per \$100 of equalized assessed value.



Another Grinnell has gotten a job by appointment. This one is William Grinnell of Mundelein, 32-year-old son of the Lake County sheriff, Clinton "Clint" Grinnell. The younger Grinnell was selected from four applicants to succeed Fremont Twp. Road Commissioner Eugene Wozney when he retired June 6.

Wozney, 66, has been with the township for 25 years, the last 12 as road commissioner. He was elected to the post three times, the last time in April 1985. He said "it's just time to retire."

Grinnell's father got the sheriff's job the same way. When Robert "Mickey" Babcox died in March, his father, then deputy sheriff, became acting sheriff. Within a few weeks he was appointed to the post by the Lake County Board. Last month the county's Republican Central Committee slated him as the party candidate in the November election.

If you haven't heard of Grant B. Farrell you might one of these days: If you attend a village board, township or some other civic meeting you might see him, too. The Antioch resident is running for the post of 62nd Dist. state representative held by Robert Churchill (R-Lake Villa). The district covers the north one-third of the county from the McHenry County line to Lake Michigan.

Farrell, who has taken off from his job as the vice president of a Zion plumbing firm, is attending every possible public meeting he can find. He said his wife, a member of the Baxter International management team at the Deerfield office, is supporting the couple. Farrell promises to be a full-time official is elected on the Democratic ticket, not a practicing attorney, like his opponent, he said.



Help for mothers in need of pre-natal care won't return soon. The Lake County Medical Society continues to thwart efforts of the Lake County Health Dept. to restore a program discontinued in January. The demise was blamed on staffing as well as funding.

Several meetings between the two bodies since that time aimed at a compromise have been almost complete time wasters. The one thing they proved is that doctors are more powerful than lawyers. This happened when prospective doctors were denied the privilege of seeing their patient through full term at such hospitals as St. Therese in Waukegan. The hospital was supported by the medical society, which says a physician must be in private practice in order to do this.

The Medical Society came up with another roadblock. It claims by working with the Health Dept. to get the pre-natal clinic back on its feet the profession is becoming too intimately involved. Hippocratic oath or not, the Medical Society is backing off this

matter. So what is going to happen to the 600-plus mothers each year who need this care? Can anyone explain the legal ramifications and petty jealousies of this to them?



There were a few laughs at the Lake County Republic Federation dinner held late last month at the Holiday Inn-Mundelein. Many of them were provided by the guest speaker, Congressman Lynn Martin (R-Rockford), who is co-chairman of George Bush's presidential Bid.

Martin recalled that when she was growing up in Chicago's 41st Ward everyone was defined by ward and parish. "That was when no Republicans were allowed in Cook County after 6 p.m.," she recalled.

"My aunt was active in politics," Martin said of her political upbringing. "She voted in every election. And she's still doing it, although she has been gone 20 years, God bless her soul."

"I remember how he came up to me, put his big arm around my shoulder and said, 'Don't worry. We'll take care of you up here.' And the people up here always have," the amiable state office holder said about the many friends he has in this county.

They unseated Jerry Beyer, an eight year county board veteran, and his running mate, Cuba Twp. Supervisor Wayne Miller for the GOP nomination.

"I can hardly wait to get back into politics," said the former eight-year Buffalo Grove trustee, who has been out of office one year. "I love it, crazy as it is."

O'Reilly said she has already received a warm reception from the

open space bloc of the County Board led by F.T. "Mike" Graham. "Anderson and I ran on the platform of open space, controlled growth, quality of life and protection of the environment," O'Reilly said. "Those are buzz words of the '80s, especially in Lake County. If we don't safeguard all of this now, tomorrow may be too late. Although Graham and I are totally different people, when it comes to these things we think the same." Now, the woman who moved from Buffalo Grove to Long Grove about one year ago when she left local office, can hardly wait to practice what she preaches in a county-wide forum.

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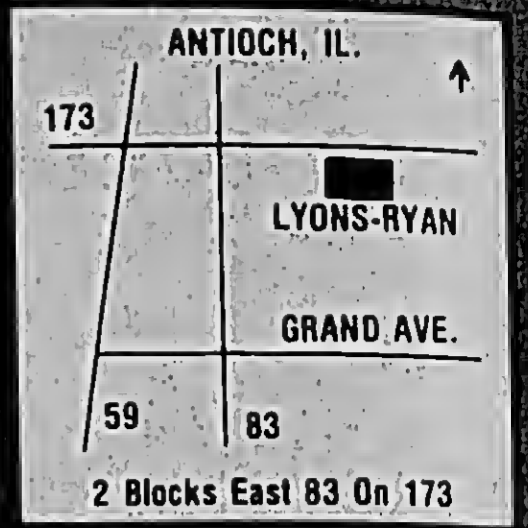
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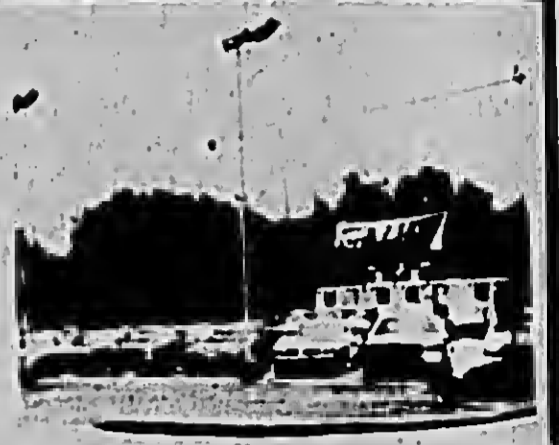

**Eight new hotels set to draw  
tourists by spring of this year**

Eight new hotels will be completed this spring and summer in Lake County, according to Charles Isely III, chairman of the Lake County Convention and Visitor's Bureau. When finished, these hotels will add 750 new guest rooms to the county, bringing the total number of rooms to 4,279.

"We have a healthy economy and a vigorous tourism industry and these hotel rooms as well as their meeting and convention facilities will be well used," said Isely, also president and chief executive officer of the Waukegan/Lake County Chamber of

Commerce. "Additional lodging will compliment the county's many tourist attractions by providing more accommodations for overnight visitors," he added. "An increase in overnight stays means an increase in revenue for the county."

The new motels under construction are Comfort Inn in Antioch, Days Inn in Gurnee, Courtyard by Marriott in Highland Park, Hawthorn Suites in Lincolnshire, Comfort Inn in Waukegan, Courtyard by Marriott in Waukegan, Airport Inn in Waukegan, and Holub's Inn in Zion.

# Quill survey says office product prices to rise in six months

Led by a leap in paper and steel costs, overall office product prices will rise about 3.8 percent during the six-month period from May to October of this year. The increase is over three times the 1.2 percent climb predicted for the previous six-month period, and the largest overall increase since available data (1982) from Quill Corporation, according to the 13th semi-annual price survey conducted by Quill, the nation's largest independent distributor of office products, headquartered in Lincolnshire.

Annualizing the projected six-month increase would bring the rising costs to about 7.6 percent, almost three percentage points above the United States government's current estimate of a national inflation rate of between four and five percent.

The report covers more than 8,000 items and 350 leading office products manufacturers.

Citing a six percent increase in paper costs, Quill President Jack Miller said mills operating at full speed with no additional capacity available and

rising pulp prices are causing a price squeeze.

He said the result is a chain reaction in the cost of computer paper, typewriter paper, and envelopes, invoices, ruled pads, self-stick notes and other paper products. Linerboard, which is used for filing storage products and packaging for many items, is also increasing in cost.

"The ongoing devaluation of the dollar and a lack of new United States industrial capacity are forcing prices up at a faster rate," said Miller. The survey predicts a steel price increase of from four percent to eight percent in the next six months. Costs are also rising for plastics, including widely-used styrene and resins. These increases mean higher prices for writing instruments, as well as shipping tapes and trashcan liners which, alone, are increasing by ten percent.

The survey forecasts a 9.9 percent price rise for warehouse and shipping supplies. A 2.8 percent rise is expected in the price of office furniture.

Among the most stable categories—binding

supplies, systems and accessories—prices will remain relatively flat for the next six months, continuing a three-year trend.

Reproducing products, primarily copy paper and toners (most of which are made in Japan), are expected to rise 5.6

percent. Typewriter prices are expected to stay unchanged.

A continuing, but slowing decline in computer disk prices is

helping hold the increase in data and word processing supplies to a moderate 1.8 percent gain between now and October.

The next price survey to be conducted by Quill will cover the period from November, 1988 through April, 1989.

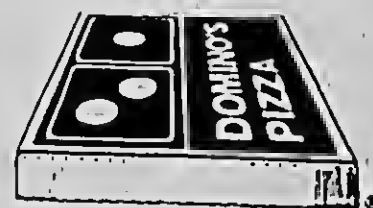

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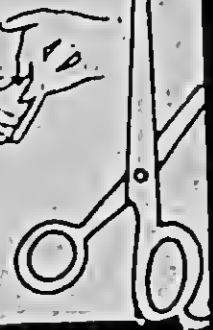

ISLAND LAKE—The Environmental Committee of Island Lake decided to drain as much water as possible from the lake to make it feasible for lakefront property owners to work on seawalls, make shore repairs, and to enable the environmentalists to clean the lake by removing silt from the bottom of the lake. What they did not count on, though, was that Mother Nature did not decide to help restore the water that went through the tubes to the Fox River. Some advice was offered by old-timers. Since Island Lake is a manmade lake, if someone can find and activate the springs on the bottom of the lake, that might be one way to "save the day"

**Cleanup at sludge farm**

RICHMOND—Removal will begin Monday, June 13, of 5.5 million gallons of non-hazardous industrial and commercial sludge on the Hillview Farm of bankrupt Arnold May, onetime prominent builder and land developer. Much of the sludge came from Abbott Laboratories Inc. in North Chicago, which is underwriting much of the \$100,000 cost of the cleanup as a corporate responsibility although it had previously paid May. The sludge will be disposed of by injecting into adjoining farm fields, as May did for years, despite opposition from thousands of residents in townships and communities on both sides of the Wisconsin-Illinois state line, both because of the odor and the unsightly operation.

WAUCONDA—The village board this week voted 6-0 to put up a vigorous defense against a lawsuit filed in Lake County courts by excavating contractor Max W. Berger. The legal action asks the courts to declare the Wauconda zoning ordinance as it applies to his property unconstitutional, null and void because it deprives him of reasonable use of the property. Berger wants to build 144 townhomes on 26 acres on the north side of Bang's Lake. The Zoning Board denied the petition on the grounds the area is zoned R-3 for single-family homes instead of the required R-4 for multiple family.

**Fremont revives classes**

MUNDELEIN—The Fremont School Board voted 4-2 to reinstate all non-mandated programs that were previously cut by the Board on March 21. Teachers who were cut along with the programs were also sent letters asking them to return to class for the 1988-89 school years. The programs were originally cut for economic reasons.

**Building booming**

Lake County's building boom continues unabated.

Take a drive any Sunday or, for that matter, any day of the week. Former corn fields and woodlands are giving way to bulldozers, earthmovers and the water and sewer mains that mark the beginning of new subdivisions. It's happening everywhere in Lake County, making this one of the fastest growing areas in Illinois. If not in numbers, certainly the county is No. 1 or close to it in the value of new homes.

While the growth is everywhere, it is most noticeable in the county's larger municipalities. They have the sewer, water, schools, police and fire services that buyers of these \$100,000-plus homes want and expect.

The southern portion of the county is where the fastest and most expensive growth is taking place. Mundelein, Vernon Hills and Lake Zurich have issued building permits in the 100's so far this year and for a comparable period last year. Slightly more than 100 building permits have been taken out in Lincolnshire, but like other villages in the vicinity, the valuation of the new homes runs into the millions. That is happening because the homes are bigger, more expensive and on higher-priced lots in an area where people want to live. And they are willing to pay for it.

By contrast, growth in new home construction is slower in the northern half of Lake County. In communities like Fox Lake, Lake Villa and Antioch, building permits for the first five months of 1988 and 1987 approximate one dozen. The exception is the 37 permits issued last year in Antioch. Lindenhurst, Gurnee and Round Lake Beach belie the slow-growth picture in northern Lake County. There is a lively building boom in Lindenhurst with 29 new home permits this year and 49 last year. Gurnee had 276 permits taken out last year through May and 190 for the same five months of this year. Round Lake Beach has a whopping 318 building permits out so far this year, up 64 from the 268 issued last year.

Those in charge of issuing permits in all communities point out the first five months of any year are the slow period for new home construction. They say the last six months are always busiest as buyers rush to get homes built before school opens or the cold weather arrives.

Last year, was more favorable to home building than 1988 has been so far, building commissioners say. The mild winter of 1987-88 allowed builders to work inside and out all but a few days.

How about the new home boom this year? Village officials and those responsible for building permits see no letup.

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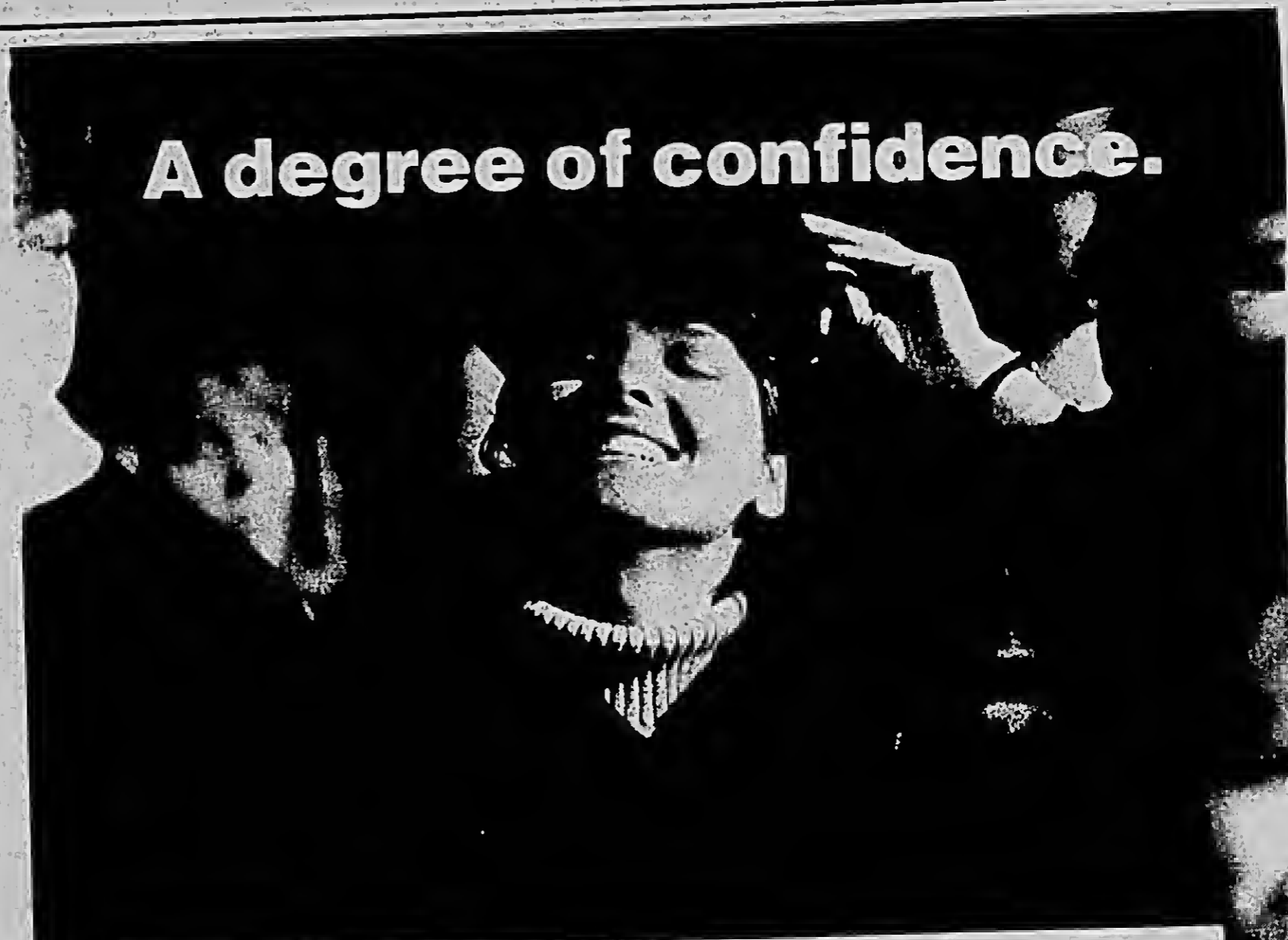

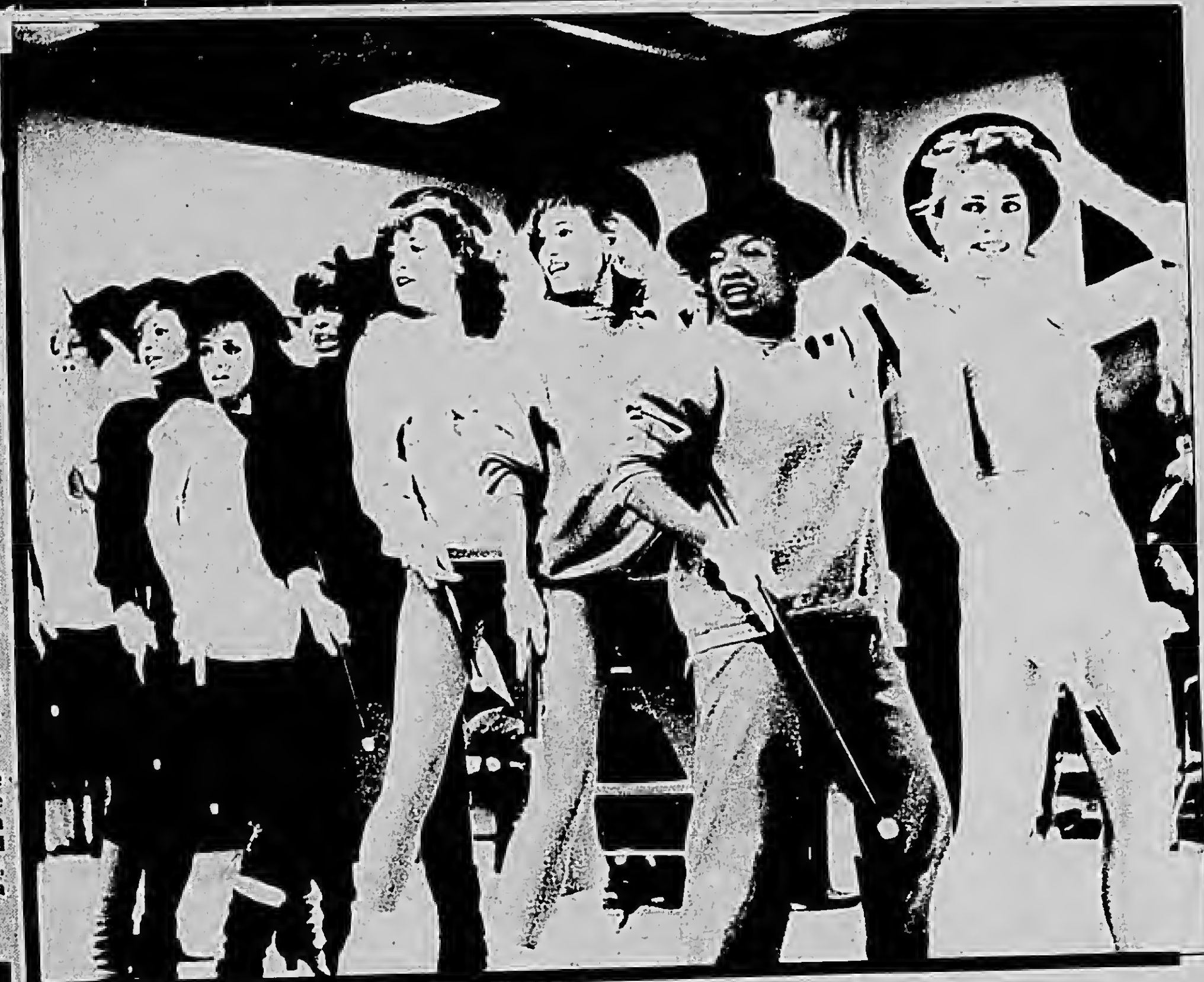

**'Rambo' is what he is, but nobody does it better** Yes ★★ ★

One thing bothers me about "Rambo III": No, it's not the countless explosions and killings, or torture scenes and mindless violence, or simplistic morality, or Rambo's unbelievable feats of superhuman strength. I look for that in a Rambo movie. No, the problem is: that title.

The first Rambo flick was titled "First Blood". The second was called "Rambo: First Blood, Part II". Now we have "Rambo III". Strictly speaking, this one should be either "First Blood III" or "Rambo II", shouldn't it? But that, as they say, is "neither here nor there". (What a dumb saying.)

There is nothing new about the plot of this movie. The hero is a deeply troubled man asked to come out of retirement for a special dangerous mission. He refuses until something happens that forces him to change his mind so he heads into battle as a one-man army.

So I didn't like it, right? Wrong. This stuff may have been done before, but not always this well.

This kind of movie—an "action picture"—is not for everybody, but, in this reviewer's view, nobody knows how to make this kind better than Stallone. A Rambo movie has a very specific image to live up to, and this one doesn't disappoint in that department.

In comparing the series, I have to say I liked the second film better, partly because of the brief but interesting relationship that developed between Rambo and a female commando he teamed up with. That part of the story brought out another side of Rambo, and made him more interesting as a person.

But "Rambo III" has its nice little extra touches, too. Rambo makes a couple of sarcastic wisecracks that work because of Stallone's ultimate deadpan delivery.

Much of the focus this time is on the friendship between Rambo and Colonel Trautman (Richard Crenna), which was also a very interesting element of "First Blood".

Crenna is an actor who has done good work before (i.e., "Table For Five", with Jon Voight) but tends to get overlooked. It's good to see him be a part of something that can bring him some widespread recognition.

Granted, Rambo movies won't turn up on PBS' Masterpiece Theatre. But they deliver what they promise. Now if they could just get this title-numbering thing worked out...

American film audiences have been fascinated by leading men who are super strong, silent (or should I say illiterate), brutal and capable of performing super human feats in the fight for freedom and justice for all ever since the introduction of the talkies and the advent of Tarzan back in the 1930s.

On that list are the early western heroes who never lost their white hats no matter how many of those black-hatted bad hombres jumped them. I often wondered if those running leaps onto their horse's back were the reason they always ended up kissing the horse and riding off into the sunset alone.

Then came the '80s and grunting Rocky, various interpretations by Arnold Schwarzeneger, and that ever popular grunting Rambo!

"Rambo III" has just opened at first run theaters everywhere and that makes two visits too many from our "First Blood" boy who was made interesting simply on the basis of shock value.

He also drew much sympathy which died at the end of the first of the Rambo series as far as this reviewer is concerned.

"Rambo III" is one big battle scene set in Afghanistan where our hero ends up trying to free his friend Richard Crenna who has been captured and tortured by the Russians.

The producers of this film must have used enough explosives to have retaken the real Afghanistan from the Ruskies as they blow up everything and everyone in sight in very bloody technicolor.

At least heroes like Superman are presented for what they are, non-human fantasies.

In "Rambo" we are asked to believe that the superhuman feats he performs are a result of keeping in shape, living off of the land and the excellent jungle fighting survival and training program Crenna put him through.

After battling a couple of hundred armed Russians for about an hour, running about 20 miles and climbing the sheer side of a mountain, our hero gets stabbed in the side, removes the broken blade which is imbedded there by simply pushing it out while grimacing once or twice, tosses a little gun powder in the wound, lights it so the wound is cauterized and then proceeds to reenter the foray.

Come on now! If you're really into explosions and blood, rent the video of the first two Rambo flicks and save that \$5.50!

## New Trier does it again—ousts Grant

I'm beginning to hate New Trier. Well, it's probably not exactly hate, but there is certainly a strong dislike for those crafty Trevians.

For the past three years, our area's softball survivor has reached the sectional tournament, the last two in the sectional final. That's the Sweet Sixteen and one win away from a trip to Pekin and the state finals.

Whether it be at Barrington, Arlington Heights or Skokie the location did not matter as the result was the same. "Becky had a rough first inning. They (the Bulldogs) were dismayed because they had so much confidence in Becky and she got down on herself. The last two games (Brace surrendered 10 walks against the Wildcats) she was throwing all arm and that is why she had more low pitches the last two games than she had all season long," Richardson said.

Grant faithful contended that the team was going up against not only a

fast pitcher in New Trier's Carrie Ramenofsky but one with an added advantage. The senior would jump off the mound as she was delivering each pitch. "Illegal pitch," the Bulldogs fans cried, to no avail.

### Overtime

But the Bulldogs did look like they were right in the contest when they answered with two runs in their first. Janet Selle walked, moved to second on a sacrifice and scored on a double by Linda Brace. Brace later scored on a wild pitch, cutting the lead to 5-2.

Ramenofsky then retired the next 17 batters before Linda Brace singled in the seventh. Becky Brace, who had come back to pitch, then hammered a consolation homer into left field to give

the Bulldogs at least a few seconds to celebrate.

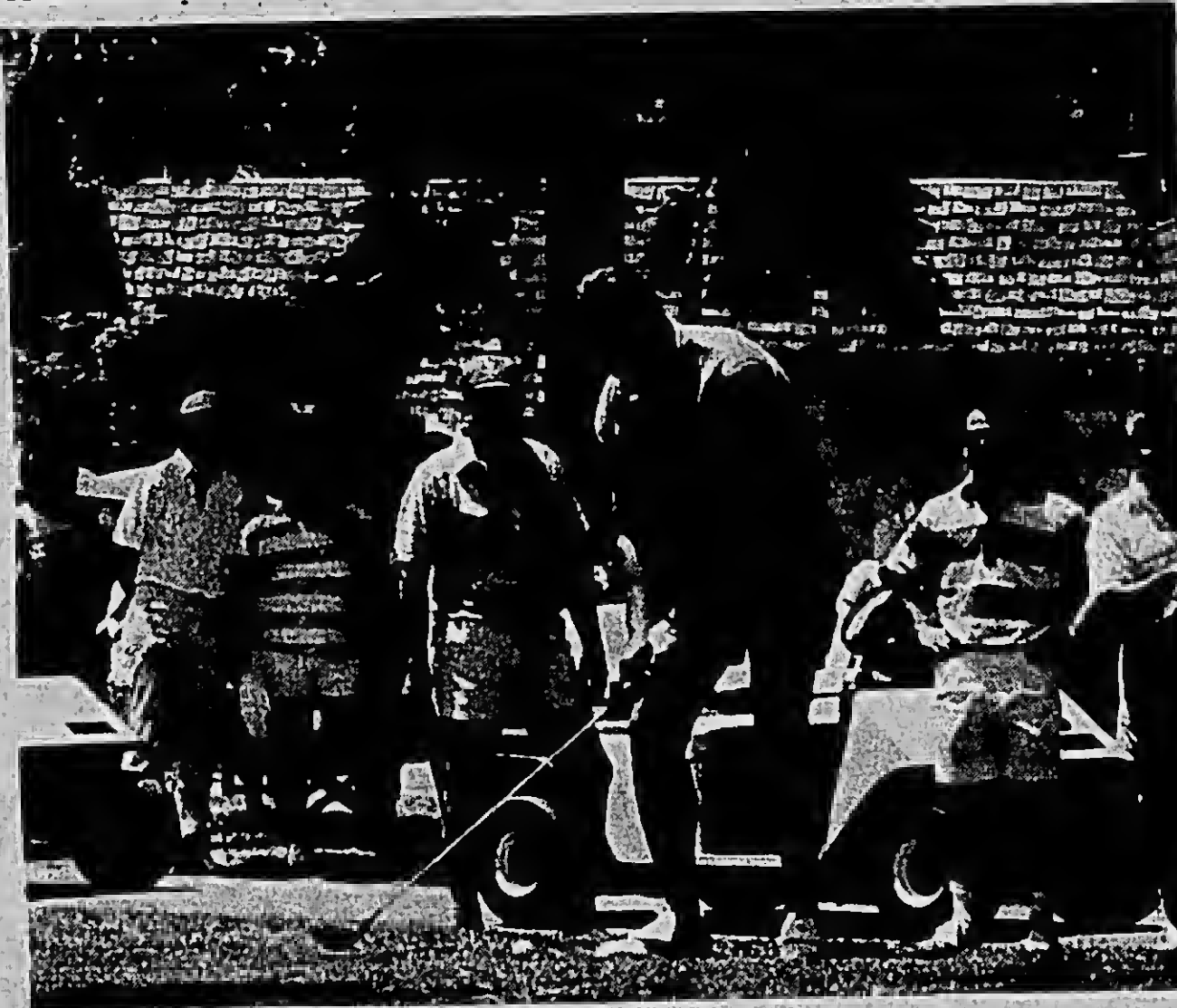

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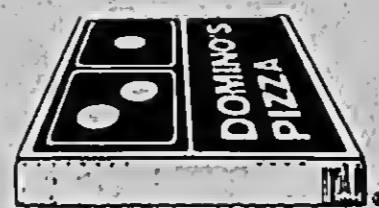

# Barrington eliminates Carmel from sectional tourney

Following a loss to the San Francisco 49ers in the National Football Conference championship game in 1984, Bears Coach Mike Ditka remarked that "in this game, you are either students or teachers. Today we were students".

And following the 8-6 loss to Barrington which eliminated the Carmel Corsairs from the baseball tournament in the first game of the Barrington sectional, Carmel Coach Joe Pudlo finds himself in much the same predicament.

The Corsairs lost because the Broncos had been the level of two games away from the state finals many times before. So, Carmel, want to score the first three runs? No problem, the Broncos answered. Want to rally from a 4-3 deficit to a 6-4 lead? No problem. Want to match us almost hit-for-hit (Barrington outhit CHS only 9-8) again, no problem the Broncos seemed to say.

"We just could not hold them when we had to. You can't give a good team like that so many opportunities," Carmel Coach Joe Pudlo, whose team ended the season at 23-11, said.

It was a sad and ironic twist that one of the greatest strengths of this year's Corsair club - a club which gave Pudlo by far his best of four seasons at the Mundelein high school - pitching, failed to do the job when it had to. Starting pitcher Shawn Chambers and relievers Pat Halverson, Greg Weber and Scott Stahoviak each combined for nine walks. Four of those walks scored, the

final two providing the winning margin in the sixth inning.

"That was very uncharacteristic for us. It stings a little bit," Pudlo said of the walks.

"Every kid who pitched kept us in a position to win. That is what you hope for," the coach added.

Pudlo refused to pin the loss on a controversial play at first base in the sixth inning. With two out and Eric Bruckseh already on second, Stahoviak apparently beat out an infield out. Much to the shock of the Carmel faithful, the umpire ruled Stahoviak out.

Barrington starter David Anderson and relief ace Chris Schubbe chalked up 10 strikeouts against Carmel hitters. They duo kept the Corsairs' one-two punch of Stahoviak and Bob Langer held to two hits in eight at-bats.

Carmel started the day on a bright note, scoring three runs in the second after one out. Paul Ostrowski singled, Bart Bair walked and Ricky Splitt drove both home with a single. Randy Splitt's single made it 3-0.

But setting the tone for what was to come, Barrington answered with a four-spot in the second and knocked Chambers out of the game.

Brian Bradley singled and after three walks scored another run, a single scored two more and a fourth run scored on a RBI single by Tony Mensik.

After Pudlo reminded the troops "it's still a one-run game", the Corsairs regained the lead in the fourth.

Bruksch, who reached base all three times he batted, singled. Ricky Splitt

also singled and both runners moved up on a wild pitch. Stahoviak then delivered a two-out double scoring the Splitts for a 5-4 Carmel lead. Langer then singled home Stahoviak but was picked off first.

Mensik took the wind out of Carmel's sails when he immediately tripled to start the hosts half. Adam Sobocienski doubled him home. Sobocienski later scored on a ground out to tie the game.

Stahoviak started the Barrington sixth, the fourth pitcher used by Pudlo.

He started the inning with three walks and then the game-winning hit, a ground ball by pinch hitter Chris Thompson.

Carmel tried its best to rally for two runs in the seventh. After one out, Chris Walsh walked and another out later, Bair did as well.

The go-ahead run was at the plate, but when Plaskas caught Sean McInerney's pop up in short rightfield, the lesson, and the season, were over for Carmel.

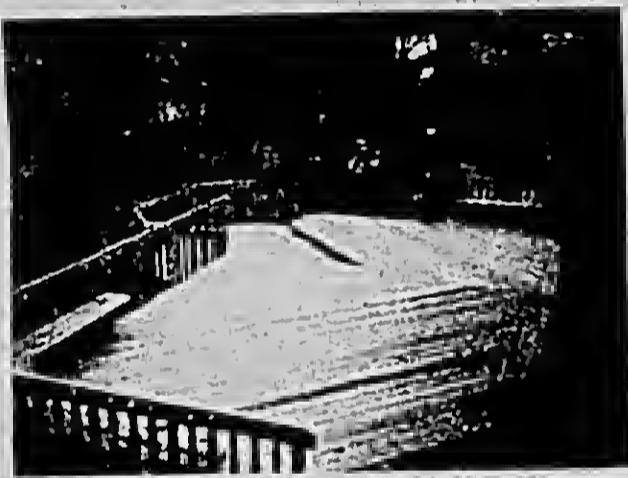

## North Chicago praises help

"I thought the air conditioning was falling down. It was just so loud and scary. All the desks rose from the floor," Kathy Heischberg said. Heischberg works at Coleman Cable Co., and was describing the fire at next door Traco Inc., a chemical firm in North Chicago June 1.

Virtually all Lake County Fire Depts. were brought to the scene from the county-wide MAVIS communication system.

Normal operations were expected to begin this week at Coleman Cable Co., which moved its operations to another North Chicago location on Davis St. following the blast.

Three people were found dead in the 48 hours

following the blast. The search for the cause of the blast continues.

Those listed as dead from the blast were Richard Steohens, 49, of Antioch and Karen and Jaye Muhlenbeck, 30 and 20, respectively, of Kenosha, Wis.

North Chicago Mayor Bobby Thompson had praise for those who helped during the disaster.

"Everybody who was involved really helped," the mayor said.

Seventeen to 18 fire departments sent equipment and personnel to the scene, meaning at one time, 80 to 90 people were battling the fire.

Some 2,000 residents were evacuated.
