NO OTHER FLOWER has so many combinations of color, especially of the delicate and unusual shades, and the name of Rainbow Flower is most fitting. They are absolutely hardy, as beautiful in form, texture and coloring as any orchid, and many are delightfully fragrant. They are not particular as to soil—and will grow where anything will, but do better in well-drained locations. The following list is selected after many years of systematic testing, similar to our Peony studies, and contains all the most desirable and distinct varieties, collected from England, France, Germany and elsewhere. We aim to have just as limited a list as will embrace all desirable varieties in shape, color, and combinations of colors, with as great a range of blooming period as possible. This list is arranged according to blooming, beginning about May 15th.

In the description, "S" indicates the erect petals or standards; "F" the drooping petals or falls. "Inches" mean height of bloom. A clump consists of from 3 to 5 tubers. Roots separated or not pulled apart, as desired. Will not sell less than 6 of one kind at dozen rate, or less than 25 at hundred rate. The prices per 100 and per dozen are for single roots. 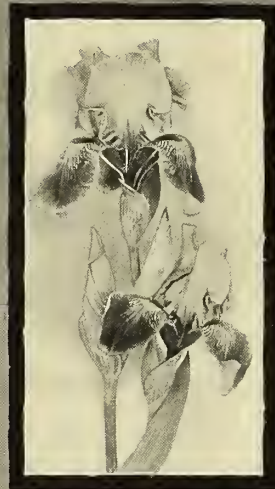
