

The third building was erected over a period of three years, and was dedicated in June, 1944. The present pastor has served the church since June, 1940.

#### CONSTITUTION

PREAMBLE: We, the messengers of Baptist churches in the County of Cleveland, State of North Carolina, and territory adjacent thereto, do hereby propose to establish and maintain the order and rules of a district Association in conformity to the following plan:

ARTICLE 1. The name of this organization shall be Kings Mountain Baptist Association.

ARTICLE 2. The membership of the Association shall consist of such messengers as may be selected by the churches comprising it and duly certified to in the annual letters sent by the churches to the appointed meetings, the basis of representation being two messengers for each church having a membership not exceeding fifty, and one additional messengr for each increase of fifty or major fraction thereto in church membership. All pastors serving constituent churches together with all regularly ordained ministers holding membership in these churches shall be members of the body. The courtesies of the floor may be extended to representatives of the denominational interests, and also to ministers and members of other Christian organizations.

ARTICLE 3. The Association shall meet annually, the time and place being determined at the previous session; and each annual meeting shall organize itself by enrolling its membership, and by electing from its membership the following officers: Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, and Historian, whose duties shall be to serve in the usual capacity of such officers and who shall hold office, unless duly deposed by the electing body, until their respective successors are elected.

AMENDMENT (1): At the discretion of the Association, all officers may be elected at the close of one session to serve until the close of the succeeding one.

AMENDMENT (2): There shall be a Nominating Committee appointed at each session to serve during the coming year. This committee shall come to the Association prepared to make the usual nominations.

ARTICLE 4. At each annual session a General Board shall be appointed by the Association, which Board shall consist of the general officers of the body together with the superintendents of the S. S. and

ARTICLE 5. The prime purpose of this Association shall be to counsel together for the enlargement and strengthening of God's Kingdom by promoting unity and growth among the churches composing it, and by co-operating with the programs of the State Baptist Convention and the Southern Baptist Convention in the work of Missions, Christian Education, and Social Service, and any and all other objects. At each annual meeting one or more delegates shall be elected to represent this body in the ensuing sessions of these conventions.

W. M. U. Work, the president of the B. Y. P. U. Convention, the president of Gardner-Webb Junior College, the pastor of each church composing the Association, and two members from each church, which members shall be nominated by the church or by delegates present from the church and approved by the Association. This Board shall hold meetings either monthly or quarterly and shall exercise the functions and discharge the duties usually committed to an executive board or committee. At its discretion it may select out of its own number an Executive Board of not less than seven members to act in its behalf between sessions of the full board.

The purpose and plans of this General Board in all its meetings shall be to promote the interests and carry forward the work of the Association and of its constituent churches as this work is outlined in Article 5 of the constitution. The Board may select a time and place and arrange a program for holding extra sessions of the Association for inspirational and devotional meetings. In case of emergency it may also arrange for special business sessions of the body; provided, however, that no action taken in such extra business session shall conflict with any action of a previous regular session, and provided further that the business of such extra sessions shall be limited to the object for which it was convened, and the membership of such special business sessions shall be made up of the messengers elected by the churches and accredited to the previous regular session.

ARTICLE 6. The Association may receive other churches into its fellowship on letters of dismission from other like organizations. It may also receive newly constituted churches whose articles of faith harmonize with the Confession of Faith attached hereto, and whose practice conforms to the purpose of this Association as set forth in Article 5 above.

ARTICLE 7. While disclaiming the right or authority to interfere in the affairs of any local church, this Association asserts its privilege of using its discretion in receiving churches into its fellowship, and in withdrawing fellowship from any church found on careful investigation, to be walking in disorder or failing in practice to endorse and support the missionary and benevolent work of the Baptist denomination.

ARTICLE 8. This Association shall conduct its business sessions in accordance with parliamentary practice as set forth in any well-authenticated book dealing with the subject.

ARTICLE 9. This Constitution may be changed or amended at any regular meeting of the Association; provided, however, that each proposed change or amendment be submitted in writing on the first day of the session to be voted on during the day following, and two-thirds of the members present shall concur in its adoption.

#### CONFESSION OF FAITH

- 1. We believe the Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments to be a divinely inspired revelation from God.
- 2. We accept the New Testament alone as revealing the only plan of salvation and as the final authority in all matters of church policy and practice.
- 3. We believe Jesus Christ as revealed in the New Testament to be the Son of God and the divine Savior of all who truly accept Him as such.
- 4. We believe in the personality of the Holy Spirit, and in His abiding presence with the spirit of all the elect of God, in His quickening presence with the spirit of the unregenerate moving to repentance and faith, in His witnessing presence with the spirit of the regenerate comforting and guiding throughout life in His sustaining presence in the experience of death, and in His continuing presence in the life to come.
- 5. We believe salvation is attained through spiritual regeneration in the act of repentance and acceptance of Jesus as Savior.
- 6. Since spiritual redemption was made available by the death, burial and resurrection of Jesus, we believe that every regenerate person should symbolize his own salvation by being buried with Him in baptism.
- 7. We believe that a local church modeled after the New Testament order is a company of regenerate persons voluntarily joined together for the purpose of extending God's Kingdom on earth.
- 8. We believe that each church should from time to time, as a congregation, celebrate the Lord's Supper as a memorial to Him.
- 9. We believe in the ultimate triumph of God's Kingdom over all opposing powers, and that every regenerate soul shall have a share in that triumph.

Boiling Springs Baptist Church Thursday, Ocotber 19 Flint Hill Baptist Church Friday, October 20

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#### FIRST DAY-Thursday, October 19th, 1944-9:30 A.M.

- 1. The Ninety-Fourth Annual Session of the Kings Mountain Baptist Association met the first day with the Boiling Springs Baptist Church promptly on scheduled time. Moderator Suttle and all the officers were present when the hour arrived.
- 2. Song, "Alas And Did My Saviour Bleed" was led by H. B. Easom, Associate Pastor, First Church, Shelby.
- 3. Moderator J. W. Suttle called the association to order for his thirty-second year as Moderator.
- 4. The time having arrived for the opening worship, W. G. Camp, pastor of Bethlehem church, asked Ralph Carpenter to lead the congregation in the opening prayer. Mr. Camp then read some verses of Scripture from the first chapter of Ephesians.
- 5. The order of business was adopted with the privilege of making any changes that would accommodate the writers of the various subjects.
- 6. The following new Pastors were recognized: Earl M. Redding, a student of Gardner-Webb College, pastor of Love Valley church; T. W. Fogleman, pastor of Grover church; L. C. Pinnex, pastor of Kings Mountain First Church.

- 8. Special music for the morning was rendered by the College Glee Club under the direction of Miss Fuller, with Miss Miller accompanying.
- 9. The report on Sunday School was read by N. L. Whisnant, Superintendent of the Sunday Schools of the Association.

#### SUNDAY SCHOOL REPORT

Today, as never before, we shall accept the teachings of the Holy Bible as the Holy will. The greatest teacher that ever walked the earth came by the singing of the angels, "Glory be to God and the highest, peace on earth and good will to men." He administered to the human needs and chose the twelve and taught them three years in the three ministries; The Judean, the Perean and Gallelian Ministry.

In this changing world we have one of the greatest and most dreadful things on earth, and that is this terrible war we have been enduring for the past three years here in the United States. This is taking our best blood, the best minds and the best Christians that the world has ever known, and, leaving the faulty and the unfit in this land.

There are 25 million white people in the South that are not enrolled in any Sunday School. There are 2 million Baptists that a Bible school is not reaching. There are 15 million over 9 years of age that are lost. This runs parallel with the crimes that are increasing to one crime every 23 seconds. There are 3,879 crimes every 24 hours. Think of 12,000 people in our county that are not reached and are our possibilities. These people are starving for the bread of life. This is what Christ came and died for.

If sin and death are not realities, certainly Christ would never have left Heaven to die for our sins.

Our teachers are supposed to be the best Christians that we have. Going about to testify the blessed reality of forgiveness and deliverance, peace and rest, joy and satisfaction through faith in Christ. The Disciples asked us to pray—may we establish the family altar in each of our homes. And to our hearts Jesus said, "Tarry here while I go yonder and pray." So many of us are still tarrying and not praying. Certainly not doing the work entrusted upon us.

The mother of the great Spurgeon, while her husband preached, read her Bible, and died with her hand on the verse, "And Christ raised Lazarus from the dead and Jarius' daughter and many other miracles." When he yielded his life on the cross the earth shook and darkness came over the land. Those trusting the word that he has left for us will spend a happy eternity somewhere.

We thank each and every person in the association and the churches and remember you for your outstanding work. May you increase this work as much as possible in the coming year. May the Blessings of the Heavenly Father rest upon you is my constant prayer.

#### REPORT ON CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

and

#### GARDNER-WEBB COLLEGE

The denomination that does not have an education program will soon have no program at all. The Baptists in the past have been criticized, perhaps justly, for putting too little emphasis on education, especially of their ministers.

As their part in the training of the youth of the state, the Baptists of North Carolina maintain six schools. Two of these are senior colleges, located within 20 miles of each other in the central part of the state. The other four are junior colleges. Wake Forest and Meredith, the two senior colleges, and three of the junior colleges, Campbell. Wingate, and Mars Hill are supported in part by the Baptist State Convention. Unique among the colleges of America in the matter of support, Gardner-Webb, our other junior college, receives all its support, except for student fees, from the churches of the Kings Mountain and the Sandy Run Associations. These two associations loyally support the other schools as well as Gardner-Webb. Sixty percent of our undesignated gifts goes to state objects. Of this amount thirty-seven per cent goes to the five schools mentioned for current support and debt service.

As to the task we are not meeting it. Eighteen thousand or more boys and girls graduate from the high schools of North Carolina each year and never go beyond that. Add to these the thousands who do not finish high school, the hundreds of untrained ministers, and the multitudes of adult men and women, white and black, who need to know more of how to improve their economic status as well as to enjoy the finer things of life and one sees how inadequately we are meeting our task. The time has come when we should rethink our entire educational program and act on wisdom and insight.

#### GARDNER-WEBB

Gardner-Webb has its capacity of fine students. Many more would have been here if we had room. The college has no debt. It is operating on a balanced budget. The churches are increasingly rallying to its support. Last year thirty-three of our forty-eight churches paid on the current expenses of the college a total of \$8,355.26. These amounts from the churches ranged grom \$1.00 to \$1,500.00

The expansion campaign under the leadership of Horace Easom and Mal Spangler is progressing satisfactorily. This association has contributed approximately \$180.000.00, all told, to the expansion campaign.

We have great faith that we shall finish raising the money to build the needed plant. When the buildings are completed, we shall have a college to go into them of which you will all be justly proud.

Every church should give its people a chance to invest in this expansion program. Every church, also, should place in its annual budget a worthy amount for the current support of our college. The college on its part should render back its services to the people.

#### WOMAN'S MISSIONARY UNION REPORT

As I come to render an account of my stewardship as superintendent of Woman's Missionary Union in this association for almost twenty-five years; I find there are mixed emotions within this heart of mine. There's gratitude for being allowed to serve so long in this position, there's gladness—yea, rejoicing over the work that has been accomplished through the years and—a feeling of sadness over the things that have been left undone.

In the year, 1920, I was elected as Superintendent of W. M. U. in this association. At that time we had 31 organizations—today we have 100.

In these nearly 25 years your superintendent has written 12,450 letters and cards, made 900 talks, held 875 meetings and traveled 38,500 miles. W. M. U. has contributed in these years \$161,800 to mission causes. Through these years W. M. U. has heard the pleading call of our missionaries and that great cloud of witnesses saying: "Carry on: Follow on: Lead on: Pray on: Press on". Today I pass on these appeals hoping that each of you too may hear and heed. We must heed if the generations to come are to know of God's love and saving power.

The chief aims of Woman's Missionary Union are: Prayer, Study, Missionary, Education of Young People, Community Missions and Tithes and Offerings. So you see ours is a progressive program. New opportunities are ours every day and we as leaders and followers should never retreat but give the best that we have to the service of God and humanity. Our supreme task is trying to make right that which is wrong in the world today, in the name of our Christ.

In a vision of the world today as it is, there is despair and death, in a vision of God and His gospel there is life and hope. A vision of the nations as they are today shows the unspeakable need of all mankind for the transforming remedy of the gospel, and it shows also that

men are hungry for the Bread of Life.

There has never been a time in the world's history like the present. How we need courage of body and mind, but most of all we need spiritual courage, the courage that takes God at His word, and goes forth to conquer in His name.

Awake, O Christians from thy sleep. And heed thy brother's call! He cries to thee across the deep, Where darkest shadows fall. From sin and guilt and wretchedness He knows not where to flee. Go tell him how the Lord can bless. Thy brother calls to thee. Awake, Go tell, Press on, Carry on—Pray on! Is my message to you.

#### MINUTES OF KINGS MOUNTAIN W. M. U. OF 1944

The Woman's Missionary Union of the Kings Mountain Association met for its 50th annual session with the Woman's Missionary Union and members of the Boiling Springs Baptist Church as hostesses.

Mrs. John F. Wacaster, the Superintendent, presided over the meeting which was opened with the singing of the W. M. U. Hymn for the year, "The Morning Light is Breaking," followed by the repeating in unison of the watch word for the year, "That the Generations to come might know." Psalms, 78-6.

Rev. J. L. Jenkins led in the opening prayer.

Theme for the day's program was, "Face To-day—Plan for To-morrow".

On motion of Mrs. W. D. Bostick, the calling of the roll was suspended and those that had registered and would register should constitute the organization for the day. Mrs. J. R. Cline made a motion that the program in the hands of the delegates, with whatever changes might be necessary, be adopted as the order of the business for the day.

Mrs. L. B. Conner, of Dover Church, gave the devotional for the morning session. She centered her thoughts around the weapons needed for today and tomorrow—Verses from 1st Joshua, Psalm 18, John 5, John 3 and Proverbs 29, were read and from these we gathered the weapons of strength, courage, faith, love and vision.

At this time. Mrs. J. D. Huggins, president of the hostess church, W. M. U., made us feel very much at home with her sincere greetings of welcome. Mrs. Lawrence Roberts very graciously gave response to

the warm words of Mrs. Huggins.

The Roll Call of churches with W. M. U. organizations was heard and most all churches were represented. This was followed by recognition of a number of Kings Mountain Association Pastors and among the visitors were recognized: Dr. I. G. Grier, Superintendent of Baptist Orphanage at Thomasville; Miss Attie Bostick, returned Missionary from China; Miss Ruth Keller, W. M. U. Field Worker; Dr. and Mrs. A. B. Wood, from Mecklenburg Association, and Rev. and Mrs. Weaver from Mt. Zion Association.

At this time reports were heard from the different officers of the organization. Mrs. W. R. Casstevens, the Treasurer, made her report as follows:

Mrs. J. R. Cline, Stewardship Chairman, gave an interesting report of her work. She said that since 1940 new emphasis has been placed on Stewardship, as that time nine memberships in 100,000 clubs were reported and at the end of 1943, 117 memberships were reported. She urged that our Pastors preach Stewardship, hold Stewardship classes in the churches and observe Stewardship night. Greetings were brought from Mrs. E. S. Elliott, Stewardship Chairman of the Hickory W. M. U. Division.

At this time, Mrs. Wade Bostick, the Mission study chairman, gave her report. This was very gratifying. 98 classes in mission study were held during the year with 1,073 enrolled. She urged that the churches plan classes and that she would be glad to assist in any way that she could be of service.

Mrs. O. P. Hamrick, Chairman of the Margaret and Training School Fund, gave her report stating that we now have 10 Margaret Fund students in our Christian Colleges and 20 students at the Louisville Training School, 3 of them from the Hickory Division.

Next, Mrs. J. E. Whisnant, Young Peoples Leader, made her report and appealed for more cooperation from our churches and W. M. U. organizations.

Mrs. John Wacaster, the Superintendent, made her report and this

showed that the work in the association is going steadily forward. There are 37 Womans Missionary Societies in the association at the present time, leaving 11 churches unorganized. Gifts for the year were \$10,630.18. Our association reached all points in the standard and was singled out at the state W. M. U. meeting held in Charlotte in March.

All reports were adopted as given. The following committees were appointed by the Superintendent:

Nominating—Mrs. G. B. McSwain, Mrs. Lawrence Roberts, Mrs. M. L. Smith, Mrs. M. H. Hamrick and Mrs. J. B. Price.

A nominating committee to serve through the year and report at next meeting were appointed consisting of Mrs. J. L. Jenkins, Mrs. Rush Stroupe, Mrs. Z. V. Cline, Mrs. Fred Washburn and Mrs. G. S. Royster.

Dr. H. H. McMillian, returned missionary from China, was presented to the association by Mrs. Wacaster. He spoke on "Missions To-Day and Tomorrow", and began by characterizing To-day as darkness and war, Tomorrow, as light and peace. Southern Baptists must admit that the doors are closed, not to Christ but to Missionaries and that China is calling for Christian light. To-day is the time for mobilization, Tomorrow is the time for advance. Today the world is divided, Tomorrow the world will be united. To-day China is our greatest mission field and Tomorrow she will be our greatest Christian force. He urged us to pray that Chinese Christians will not lose faith.

At the close of Dr. McMillian's addres, an offering was made for Chinese relief and this amounted to \$110.00.

Report of Literature Chairman, Miss Mary Lou Richards, came next and she urged all to give attendance to reading. This was followed by presentation of the magazine girl portrayed by Miss Margaret Wacaster.

Dr. I. G. Greer, superintendent of the Baptist Orphanage, spoke to the association on the subject: "Our Youth To-day and Tomorrow". He pleaded in his message for Christian people to do their best to win spiritual and moral victories at home; that a military victory would come to naught if the home front is not maintained. He especially emphasized the question of strong drink and gave us some startling figures concerning the great ills that come from legalized strong drink.

He concluded by urging that Christian people dedicate themselves to make this nation a safe place in which to live and a real home for our returning soldiers.

Rev. W. A. Elam led the closing prayer for the morning session. Adjournment for lunch,

#### AFTERNOON SESSION

The devotional for the afternoon session was given by Miss Sadie Clark and Miss Margaret Wacaster of Gardner-Webb Junior College. Miss Clark read the 23rd Psalm and Miss Wacaster used "By the Still Waters", as a vocal solo.

Miss Addie Bostick, returned Missionary from China, spoke to the association on the subject: "God's Wonder Working Grace". She told of her work in China, beginning with her first trip in 1900. As she related her story we felt that truly God had used her.

At this time students of Gardner-Webb College gave an interesting skit on "Tomorrow Looks at To-Day". Mr. Philip Elliott, president of the college, was recognized at this time.

Miss Ruth Keller, W. M. U. worker for North Carolina, spoke on "Teaching Teachers How to Teach". Some of the ways suggested were: Prepare to make it effective; Prayer, Presentation and Preservation of that which is taught.

The college double quartet sang two numbers—"Glorious Things of Thee are Spoken" and "We may not climb the Heavenly Steps." This was followed by a report from Mrs. W. P. Biggerstaff concerning the linen shower for our Baptist State Hospital at Winston-Salem. This was a gratifying report and a large amount of linens and some cash will soon be turned over to the hospital.

Mrs. H. H. Gold, Chairman of Community Missions, made her report. She urged that each society study the book Community Missions.

Then a beautiful demonstration "Committed to Missions" was presented by Sandy Plains Church. This presentation was full of information and suggestions as to how we could more fully carry out plans and ideas of the Community Missions.

At this time, the reports of the Committees were heard:

21. The report on Orphanages was read by A. M. Kiser, who yielded his time to Rev. W. C. Reed, superintendent of the Kennedy Home near Kinston. The Kennedy Home is one of the divisions of the Orphanage work of North Carolina Baptists. Mr. I. G. Greer is general superintendent.

Mr. Reed brought a stirring message to a large crowd of people who always hear our orphanage workers with pleasure and profit.

#### NORTH CAROLINA BAPTIST ORPHANAGE

Article 1 of our constitution says: "This institution shall be known as the Baptist Orphanage of North Carolina, Incorporated, formerly known as Thomasville Baptist Orphanage and later known as the Mills Home, according to its amended charter, and shall have for its object the support and caring for and training of dependent children of the white race."

There are two officials of the Orphanage, a general superintendent and a treasurer. Dr. I. G. Greer is the general superintendent and Mr. R. D. Covington is treasurer. Their offices are in Thomasville and are located on the Mills Home grounds.

The Orphanage maintains two homes, the Mills Tome in Thomasville and the Kennedy Home near Kinston. These are not two orphanages but are the **two homes of the Baptist Orphanage**. Each of these homes has a superintendent, but neither has a separate treasurer, for the Orphanage treasurer handles all the finances of both homes. Miss Sarah E. Elmore is superintendent of Mills Home and Rev. W. C. Reed is superintendent of Kennedy Home.

The Social Service Department, Mrs. Louise L. Blake, director, receives all applications for the entrance of children into the orphanage, and after investigation makes recommendation to the general superintendent, who makes the final decision. He says whether the child is to be accepted and if so into which home. If it seems best he places the child in a boarding home or establishes a mothers' aid home.

We have cared for during 1943 698 in the two homes, 23 in boarding homes, and 60 in their own homes. We have been able to place a larger number than ever before, thus enabling us to be of service to more children.

Attendance in school reached almost 99 percent, due to the general good health of the children and almost total absence of any contagious diseases.

As a result of good food, regular hours and the cooperation of all workers, the health of our children is far above that of the outside population.

Many activities are involved in the production of good food. The farm from which we receive fresh vegetables in abundance along with pork and beef, the dairy from which each child receives a quart of whole milk daily, the poultry yard where all of chickens and eggs are produced, and the 100,000 jars—(half gallon)—that are filled with every kind of fruit and vegetable by our friends all over North Carolina. All of these good things are sent out to our 19 kitchens of the two homes where they are prepared as well balanced meals under the supervision of trained workers.

Clothing to a great extent is made by the children, with the aid of competent supervisors.

More than 10,000 pieces pass through the two laundries each week. The greater part of this work is done by the girls. Colored help is employed for the heaviest of the labor.

The physical education program goes on the year round with trained directors in charge.

A graded Sunday School, B. T. U., and W. M. U., both at Kennedy Home and Mills Home helps in rounding out the lives of our boys and girls.

Charity and Children is published each week at Mills Home and covers the activities of the entire Orphanage. Along with the paper a profitable commercial printing shop is maintained and many of our boys are trained.

In our enthusiasm to win the war, in our anxiety about our boys who are at the front giving their last full measure of devotion we should not overlook the things for which we are fighting. We must win the war, but in winning it let us continue to make men and women who will be worthy and capable of rebuilding a shocked world and carrying on the work of the Kingdom of God. Each day 600 children must depend upon friends of the Orphanage for support. These friends have not failed in the past and are not going to fail now.

On account of the increased cost of living the monthly contributions and Thanksgiving offering should be larger this year than they have been ever been before.

In the name of Christ whose love for the orphan child was supreme and as an opportunity for enriching our own lives, let us rededicate ourselves to the task of supporting and training the boys and girls committed to our care.

#### LITERATURE

Our first concern in promoting the use of Christian literature is to see to it that the Bible is the text-book of our homes and Sunday schools. That is basic if we are to make an impact on our generation. Recognizing that the Bible is the basis for all our living, we do not advocate less study and reading of the Bible, but more. "Back to the Bible" is our motto.

Christian products do not come by placing one thing upon another to build those products that you wish, but Christian products come by the tried and true methods of a New Birth and growth in the Christian way of life. Hence we get a Christian literature only as a product of Christian journalism, Christian publishing, and Christian editors. We have so many of the so-called magazines in abundance littering our newsstands and magazine counters that we are unable to find the magazines of a better nature. Let us cry out against the use of paper to print these unwholesome spreads which discriminate against the good, and train and educate our children to enjoy the best literature.

We have our denominational publications, The Biblical Recorder, our state Baptist publication, with more than 27,000 subscribers; The Commission, journal of Foreign Missions; The Home Mission Magazine, Royal Service, Charity and Children. These are meeting the growing need of our denominational life. In addition to all these publications, the Sunday School Board publishes more than a billion printed pages of the best literature each year. Quarterlies, promotional magazines, story magazines, tracts and many books come from our presses each year. All these help in the proper training of our people, but they are not so widely read as they should be. In this report, I would call us back to the Bible as the foundation of all literature and then to build on that foundation and branch out to include all our Christian literature and all other worthy literature to the end that our lives might be full and sweet and meaningful from childhood through adulthood.

#### THE BAPTIST HOSPITAL

The North Carolina Baptist hospital, located at Winston-Salem, N. C., is owned and controlled by the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina, and is state-wide in its service. The Baptist Hospital was established for the purpose of providing good hospital treatment for the entire state, but primarily for those who are not financially able to pay for treatment. In 1943, 7,609 patients were received into the hospital for treatment. Of this number 2,336 patients received free service. This is the largest number of free patients ever entered in one year. The hospital depends almost entirely on the Mother's Day offerings and the Duke Endowment fund for caring for the large number of free patients. The mother's day offering for 1943 was \$72,584.08 from the state—1944, this year in digest of church letters \$2,875.36. 1943—Duke Endowment funds \$26,899.00. In 1943—Kings Mountain Association, \$1,839.68, gain over 1943 of \$1,035.68.

This enlarged service is made possible further: first, by the Bowman Gray School of Medicine of Wake Forest College working with the hospital. This is a full four-year medical school and provides for nearly 200 students. Second, by the large hospital staff of doctors, composed of professors in the medical school, the resident doctors, and internes. The medical students help out in a fine way. Third, by the training school

for nurses. The profession of nursing requires young women of the highest type—mentally, physically, and morally. The school is composed, at the present, February 14, 1944, of 105 students. There is an urgent need for young women to work in the field of nursing.

Last April the W. M. U. of the Kings Mountain Association made a worthy offering of linens to the hospital—Value, \$625.00 plus. Mrs. John Wacaster, Superintendent of the Union, delivered the shower to the hospital. This work is to be commended and the hospital needs more linen showers.

May we welcome these opportunities to minister to those in need? May we pray, give and witness for the Master and be a blessing to suffering humanity?

A new building is being constructed now for additional quarters for nurses. A recent gift of \$100,000 from a friend was received for the building of an out-patient department.

#### TRAINING UNION REPORT

The great world conflict, through which we are going, has helped to teach us more and more the necessity of well trained soldiers. No soldier is at his best until he has been well trained. For a long time, secular organizations have realized that if they are to be successful they must have trained workers. When we examine our Christian work, we find that the training program is not getting much emphasis in

many places. In the Kings Mountain Association, we have some kind of Training Union organization in 20 of the 49 churches. We have a Training Union membership of about 1,498 and a church membership of about 16,000. Therefore, we have only one person out of about every 10 enlisted for special training. An army only one one-tenth trained would not be very effective in its undertakings. The army of the Lord is not as effective as He would have it when it is so inadequately trained.

Last year, the Annual Association voted to secure an associational worker to lead in developing different interests of the churches including the Training Union. Therefore, no officers were elected to the annual meeting. However, the committee was unable to secure the desired worker and later in the year, the General Board asked the former leader to continue for the year. Therefore, the full organization was never completed as suggested by the Associational Training Union standard.

The work, including the intermediates and below, was very much hampered during the summer because of the infantile paralysis scare.

On November 23, 1944, the Associational wide meeting, featured by the State and Southwide organizations, was held in the First Baptist Church of Shelby. The meeting had a large attendance and the program was received with enthusiasm. Also in the spring, the usual contests were sponsored.

In spite of the enthusiasm shown in some instances, some of the figures given above will show that a very small percent of our people are interested in training to improve themselves in the Lord's work. The majority of those we have are young people and children. Only a very few of the adults seem interested in growth.

We have enlisted in the army of the Lord, now let us train to become good Christian soldiers.

The message was to the point and was received by a large crowd of B. T. U. members and workers from all over the Association.

#### GENERAL BOARD

The General Board of the Kings Mountain Association held ten meetings during the past associational year. The months of July and August were omitted due to revivals, the pastors being worked hard during these months.

The Clerk has mailed to each member, consisting of all the Pastors and two members from each church, a notice of each meeting. The meetings, have been fairly attended. Many of the pastors and other workers have brought helpful messages along all lines of the denominational work.

A committee that was named by the Board and indorsed by the association to find a full-time Missionary for the association, in the last meeting, recommended through its chairman, W. A. Elam, that the matter be tabled for the present. The association in its regular session, Oct. 19, at Boiling Springs, approved the suggestion.

Perhaps the most outstanding piece of work done was led by the late Rev. Wade D. Bostick in lining up all of the churches in the association in what will be an Associational Wide Simultaneous Mission Study Week which will be held in March, 1945.

35. D. Boyd Cannon, for the committee on Preachers, made the following report: That the Introductory Sermon be preached by Dr. Zeno Wall; the Doctrinal Sermon be preached by L. C. Pennix; The Missionary Sermon be preached by W. G. Camp, and the Inspirational Sermon be preached by President P. L. Elliott.

36. The following report on the co-operative program was read by W. A. Elam. The report was discussed by Dr. E. L. Spivey, missionary of the General Board of Raleigh and W. E. Elam.

#### REPORT ON THE CO-OPERATIVE PROGRAM

The Co-operative Program is the best method yet devised to properly support all the objects in our Convention work. It is a plan by which every person can have a share in the support of the Lord's work. It grows in favor with the people in general each passing year.

Last year, that is the calendar year 1943, the undesignated gifts to the Co-operative Program stepped up around 25% over 1942. Thus far receipts for 1944 are up more than 20% over last year.

It looks now as if the income in North Carolina for the Co-operative Program for 1944 will be \$700,000.00. The total income from designated and undesignated gifts will be around one and one half million dollars.

The Kings Mountain association, last associational year only, gave \$10,880.03 to the Co-operative Program while the designated gifts and specials together with the Co-operative Program amounted to \$70,215.30. Of course the larger part of the designated gifts was for Gardner-Webb College.

Good news comes to us. It seems now that the convention will be out of debt, or so near out this year, that we will not be asked for con-

tributions either for the Hundred Thousand Club or for the Wake Forest Chapel Fund.

In view of the above facts, we should, in the Kings Mountain Association, greatly increase our gifts to the undesignated funds. The association could easily give \$35,000.00 next year to the Co-operative Program.

Next year, 1945, the Southern Baptist Convention will celebrate the one hundredth anniversary of its organization. Let us crown the century with a great Crusade for Christ. Seek to win the lost to Christ and enlist all the people in Evangelism and Stewardship. The Southwide Centennial Goal for the Co-operative Program is \$10,000,000. After the war is over, we will have the greatest opportunity for the spread of the Gospel, the world has ever known.

We suggest the following:

- To magnify the Co-operative Program for the financial support of all our work.
- 2. To observe the special days and seasons as listed in the calendar of denominational activities.
- To make the Centennial Crusade with all its objectives, State, Southwide, and Worldwide a matter of constant prayer and effort.

Martin, leader of the dry forces of N. C., arrived and by vote of the association was given thirty minutes on the program.

#### PUBLIC MORALS

Brother Moderator, Fellow Delegates, Ladies and Gentlemen:

For some reason, I was named to make a report to this association on public morals, and I submit the following:

Sabbath desecration in this country is one of the outstanding violations of God's Holy law. And we, as Christian people, should demand that the laws against this sin should be enforced.

Juvenile delinquency is breaking the hearts of millions of good people in this country. Little is being done about it. This association should demand a law compelling parents of these children to go into the courts with them and take part of the punishment. Such a law has worked wonders where it has been tried.

Profanity in high and low places is growing at a rapid rate. People who permit such violations of God's laws must suffer, and we should

make every effort possible to eliminate such low practice from our speech.

Gambling among most all classes is so prevalent that many seem to take it for granted, but it is making crooks out of thousands of our young people.

Picture shows, or movies, have become so respectable in the eyes of some people, that many that one time preached against and criticized them, attend them without a blush. And that notwithstanding the fact that thousands of our young and older people are being sent to prison because of the influence of said shows.

Millions of our people are being demoralized by filthy, obscene magazines and other rotten periodicals, that are being sold in otherwise respectable places. It is so filthy that the post office department refuses them the privilege of the mails. This association should demand that this outrage upon common decency be stopped. Much of this rotten stuff carries pictures of nude persons. And nudity itself has become so common that it is taxing the moral stamina of thousands of our people today. When modesty takes its flight, this or any other nation is in a sorry plight. One of the greatest empires of all times was destroyed by nude photography.

Alcoholic drinks is probably the outstanding menace to our civilization today. This nation is spending six billion dollars per year for hard liquor alone. Add to this the cost of beer, wine, gin and other kinds of drinks you have a total of more than all the money spent for the uplift of humanity. Last August the government permitted the distillers to make 50 billion gallons of liquor besides other kinds of intoxicating drinks. This nation is spending nearly sixteen billion dollars per year for crime. From reliable sources we learn that the people in our capital city are consuming nearly five times as much whiskey as any other city of its size. A good man who lives in Washington told me that the main theme in this city is wine, women and song.

The party thrown by old Belshazzar comes to mind when we read of the terrible things that are happening in our supposed-to-be Christian country today. The call for sincere repentance by our people and nation as a whole is urgently needed as never before in the history of our country.

41. J. R. Cantrell suggested that special prayer be offered for all Men and Women in the service of our Country. The prayer was led by A. M. Kiser.

42. The time having arrived for the election of Officers, H. B. Easom made a motion that the rules be suspended and that the following officers be re-elected to succeed themselves: J. W. Suttle, Moderator; W. A. Elam, Vice-Moderator and J. W. Costner, Clerk-Treasurer. The vote was unanimous.

43. The report on the "Retirement Plan for Ministers" was read by H. B. Easom. Mr. Easom, Moderator Suttle and D. F. Putnam discussed the subject and urged all ministers and churches to join in the interest of the pastor who will be the beneficiary in the event of old age or physical failure.

#### REPORT OF MINISTERS RETIREMENT PLAN

The Ministers Retirement Plan was inaugurated in 1938 by the Southern Baptist Convention, which later, in cooperation with the Baptist State Convention, worked out a plan for North Carolina ministers and church employees which offers protection in the event of physical disability, worthy annuities upon retirement and some safeguards for loved ones in the event of death.

Over 8,000 preachers in the Southern Baptist Convention hold certificates and more than 10,000 churches are contributing regularly to the plan. In North Carolina 493 certificates were issued up to March 1, 1944, which left 348 unenlisted pastors in the State. 665 churches were enlisted which meant that 1,909 churches were enlisted on March 1st of this year. Our North Carolina Convention paid to the Relief and Annuity Board in combined dues and contributions for Ministers Retirement Plan last year the total of \$63,948.06. Eighteen retired ministers, 3 disabled ministers, and 7 widows in North Carolina are now receiving checks regularly from the Relief and Annuity Board under this retirement plan. They received last year the total of \$8,350.08. Thus, you will see, that we paid into the fund over \$57,000.00 more than we drew out.

The Federal Government, industry, and all far-seeing businesses are giving attention to the matter of looking after the disabled and aged. It is the duty of the churches and religious organizations to see that their pastors and employees are cared for.

We, your committee, recommend that all of the churches adopt this retirement plan for their pastors and full-time workers at an early date.

# AMERICAN BIBLE SOCIETY

Southern Baptists are taking a leading part in the essential task of providing the printed Word of God for missions throughout the world, through their gifts to the American Bible Society for its missionary non-profit work of translation, publication and world-wide distribution of the Scriptures.

Because Baptists so strongly believe in the importance of Bible distribution, and because the Society's foundation policy is to supply the Scriptures "without note or comment," Southern Baptists have recognized that the work of the American Bible Society is an integral part of their own program of world-wide missions.

Southern Baptist missionaries, for many years, have appreciated the indispensable service which the Bible Society renders in supplying for their work Scriptures in the native language of the people. As one leader expresses it, "A contribution to the American Bible Society is a gift to missions."

On foreign mission fields the Scriptures are regularly sold at less than cost, because most people living on the low income levels prevailing in mission lands are not able to pay even the production cost of a Gospel portion. The difference is met by continual gifts to the Bible Society from Bible-loving and missionary-minded Christian people.

To the Armed Forces, war prisoners, refugees, inmates of penal institutions, and many others in special need, the Scriptures are given without charge.

Voluntary gifts make possible all the services of the Society, including aid now to the war-crippled Bible Societies of Europe and preparation for supplying heavy post-war Scripture needs. While America sends food throughout the world to relieve physical hunger in the postwar reconstruction, we dare not fail to send to these same people, the Bread of Life to satisfy their spiritual hunger.

It is recommended that each church in our association make at least one offering each year to the American Bible Society and that this offering be sent through the regular channels to the Baptist State

Convention Headquarters office to M. A. Huggins, Treasurer, Biblical Recorder Building, Raleigh, North Carolina.

For brief periods he was pastor of churches here in North Carolina also. The fruits of his labors in China will make glad the City of God. REV. D. G. WASHBURN 1874-1944

Dennis Gordon Washburn, the son of Charles and Sarah Washburn was born in Cleveland county on April 16, 1874. He was educated at the rural school near his home, Shelby High School, and Wake Forest College. He graduated from Wake Forest in 1900.

Shortly after his graduation he accepted the pastorate at Casar and other Baptist churches. In December of 1900, he married Miss Ella Hamrick, daughter of Elijah Hamrick. They continued to live in Double Springs Community, where they both had lived prior to that time. Six sons and one daughter were born to this union.

For thirty-eight years Brother Washburn served as pastor of churches in Cleveland and Rutherford counties, never moving from Double Springs. His longest pastorates were at Pleasant Grove for 26 years and Zion, 19 years. He baptized two thousand into the fellowship of the twelve churches, attended hundreds of funerals and marrid many couples.

Our departed friend and beloved fellow-worker was one of a family of sixteen children, ten boys and six girls. Brother Washburn had as little guile as any man we have known. He was an able Gospel Preacher, a faithful pastor, powerful in prayer. He often had the assurance of victory when he prayed for the sick, the lost or someone in trouble. He fought a good fight, he kept the faith, and won the victory.

REV. WADE D. BOSTICK 1874-1944

Wade Dobbins Bostick was born January 22, 1874, in Rutherford County, was reared in Cleveland County. He was graduated from Wake Forest College in 1899. He went to China as a missionary in 1904 where he served for 31 years as a missionary of the Southern Baptist Convention. During that time he made 8 trips across the ocean, coming home on furloughs from his post at Pochow, China. In 1935 he was retired by the Foreign Mission Board and came to Shelby to make his home. During his residence here, Mr. Bostick continued active about his home and supplied pulpits in this area.

His first marriage was to Miss Flora Holloway, in Wake County, who died in China in April, 1934. Soon after coming to Shelby Mr. Bostick was married to Mrs. Estelle Perry Gough of Wake Forest who survives, together with two children by his first wife, W. H. Bostick, of Atlanta, Georgia, and Mrs. A. J. Moncrief, of Toronto Canada. Mr. Bostick is the last of seven Bostick brothers. He is survived by one sister, Miss Attie Bostick who was also a missionary in China for 43 years, who recently returned home on the Gripsholm. Another brother, the late Rev. G. P. Bostick, was a missionary also in China. His body sleeps beneath the sod in the land where he gave his all for Christ. The three Bostick Missionaries served a total of 111 years.
