



To the Editor of Our Town:

There has been much said regarding the need of additional school facilities in Narberth, and no one, after seeing the congested conditions in the present building, can question the crying need, either for a new building or an addition to the present

Most of our residents know of the efforts of our School Board to secure a loan for the purpose of building an addition to the present plant and that the said loan was defeated twice. The writer is convinced that the loan was defeated on both occasions only because a majority of our voters thought it a mistake to add approximately \$50,000, practically doubling our present investment, in a location far removed from the center of the borough; a location which members of the School Board have publicly admitted is undesirable and would never have been chosen by them for a school site; a property forced upon us when the borough was incorporated.

Our borough is growing rapidly and to attract the right kind of people additional school facilities must be provided. We all know our school buildings should be centrally located. Why not start now with a building for the lower grades and save our little ones the tedious climb up the hill?

It seems to me that after two unsuccessful efforts to provide for increasing the present plant, our School Board should be willing to try a loan for a centrally located building. Such a proposition. I believe, would meet with success.
