Utah slayer refuses food

SALT LAKE CITY (UPI) — Condemied killer Gary Gilmore, who has lost eight pounds since starting a hunger strike four days ago, refused again today to eat but Ulah Siate Prison officials said he was "still healthy."

"If don't within we'd let him starve to death."

Girmore, 35, in isolation and under the constant watch of guards, has refused food and medication until he is allowed to speak by phone to his fiancee, Nicole Barrett, who Joined him an unsuccessful suicide attempt last week. She was involuntarily committed to the state mental—hospital Friday.

The slayer, who has vowed to give some of the profiles from the sale of his biography to the familities of two men he killed, has been accepting only coffee and water since last Friday. Cartel aides deny 20% oil price hike

VIENNA (UPI) — The Organization of Petroleum Exporting Countries denied Monday its Economic Commission will recommend a 20 per cent oil price hike at an OPEC meeting next month.



The Navy denies that the new eight-linch gun is __inaccurate, and intends to proceed with production of the weapon for its newer destroyers and cruisers. A production decision is scheduled to be made by the Chilef of Naval Operations executive board on Dec. 7.

For the Navy, the new lightweight, automated gun is an integral part of its plan to restore some bombardment power to its surface warships, particularly for use against fibror targets. At present, most of the Navy's warships carry one of at most two rapid-firing five-inch guns, which is the same caliber used by destroyers in World War II.

AMC settles suit

DETROIT (UPI) — American Motors Corp. has-agreed to a \$1.1 million out-of-court settlement in a California lavysuit that charged AMC with failing to meet emission control stan-dards.

dards.
AMC officials announced the agreement Sunday, saying it "resolves all open issues" in a \$4.3 million suit filed in Los Angeles last September by the California Air Resources

Board. The nation's No. 4 auto firm agreed to pay the \$1.1 over a five year period. In return, the California board will drop the suit, AMC said.

The lawsuit was the culmination of a dispute that began last January when the

board fined AMC 94.3 million, charging AMC's 303 cuble inch V8 engine exceeded California's automotive emission standards. State officials also necused AMC of falsifying emission reports.
California officials confirmed a tentative agreement but Tom Quinn, chairman of the antipoliution board, said he was reviewing the AMC agreement prior to filing II in Los Angeles County Superior Court Monday.

He refused to confirm the amount of the settlement or any details of the proposed agreement, including those portions dealing, with alleged falsification of emission reports.

The man who bought America's Congress

Park, now 41, is one of three sons in a Korean family whose main source of wealth was their clather's chain of gasoline stations, which distributed Gulf Oil products in South Korea.

While Park was attending Georgetown University, his father died, and a bruther. Park Kursak, took over operation of the tamily business. Their oldes bruther reportedly never took an active basiness role.

At Georgetown's Foreign Service School. Park reportedly formed friendships with a number of individuals who were eventually to hold positions of power and influence in Washington During the same period, he is said to have begun cultivating confacts at the Korean embassy here.



US, Romania sign broad trade agreement

BUCHAREST, Romania (UP1) — U.S. Commerce Secretary Elliot L. Richardson and President Nicolae Ceausescu held'a round of wide-ranging talks today just hours before the arrival in Romania of Soviet leader Leoniel I. Brezhney.

the Romanian Communist leader came less than 24 hours after Richardson signed an unprecedented trade agreement with Romania deerfleed as the most com-prehensive pact of its kind the United States ever has con-cluded with an east European country.

U.S. officials said they did not attach special significance to the coincidental visits of Richardson and Brezhnev but added the Romanlams made it clear Ceauseseu wanted to see the Americans stress the importance of U.S. Romanian relations despite the Russian's imminent arrival.

The Republican cabinet member mel carlier with Stefan Andrei, a Communist party secretary for foreign affairs, and among other topics discussed the Incoming administration of President-elect Jimmy Carter, a US spokesman said.



Vet treats sick, hurt

MOSCOW — Though most of his patients once were victims of shooting, a University of Idabo veterinarian who treats sick and injured wild birds as a hobby says shooting accounts for fewer cases now. "The number of shooting victims has declined." Dr. Erik Stauber sald, "probably

"The number of shooting victims has declined," Dr. Erik Stauber said, "probably because people are becoming more consclous of wildlife and endangered species, and less apt to view certain bird species as varmints." A veterinarian and livestock virologist who teaches a course in the disease of birds and mamals, he said many of his patients now have been injured accidentally, often by striking stationary or moving obstacles during flight. Stauber, who receives most of his referrals for services to sick; injured or abandoned wild birds from persons within a 50-mile radius of Moscow, first checks a birds' in juries and assesses its physical state.

first checks a bird's injuries and assesses is hapiscial state. If there are no bodily injuries, he takes it home for observation, feeding and treatment. If the injuries warrant, he takes it to the "Wishington" State "University College of Veterinary Medicine, for X-rays and possible

"Whishington State University College of Veterinary Medicine, for X-rays and possible surgery.

Later, he takes the bird home again for additional nursing. If it is too frightened or weak to eat, he must force-feed his patient until it and feed liself. Once it is well and strong, he releases it close to where it was found.

Starvation and broken bones are the main problems Stauber finds in his birds.

"Birds bones are hollow and splinter easily, often resulting in permanent disability," he explained. "However, broken bones may heal by immobilization with splints."

Emphasting the need to get qualified belp as soon as possible, Stauber cited the case of an injured Sawet owl found by well-meaning rescuers. It was only three or four inches high and evidently "so cute" that its captors wanded to keep it. However, lacking proper treatment, it soon stopped eating and died, he said.

To prevent such mishaps, Stauber advised persons rescuing injured, non-game birds to check first with a local office of the Idaho Fish and Game Department or with a veterinarian.

"You cannot legally possess wild birds without a permit for least present them without a

and Game Department or with a veterinarian. "You cannot legally possess wild birds with out a permit nor legally treat them without a rehabilitation permit." be explained. However, in an emergency or with the necessary permits, on a longer term basts, Individuals may care for birds. Stauber recommended the following widelines:

guidelines:

— Feed small songbirds birdseed or insects
and give the larger birds of prey small animals,
such as mice and other rodents, or lean meat.
The daily diet of birds should equal 16-20 per

The daily diet of birds should equal 16-20 per cent of their body weight.

—Do not handle or force the bird too much.

—It he bird is in fairly good physical con-dition, keep it in a large, dark, well-ventilated box in a quiet place until competent help is found.

When rescuing a wild bird, especially a bird of prey, Stauber, also a falconer, advised caution.

The cold and flu season is already here. There are three big waves of respiratory infections — in the fall, mid-winter and again in the spring. However, colds and related illnesses can occur at any time.

One of the most important concepts to understand is that these illnesses are all contagious illnesses. They are spread from person to person like other contagious diseases. They are not caused by exposure to cold weather.

A number of years ago a group of scientists decided to study, the Eskimos because of their exposure to cold. The Eskimos were all free of colds and had been for years until the scientists arrived to study them. Then the village came down with a whopping repidemic of colds. They had been infected by the visiting team of scientists — demonstrating dramatically the difference between the germ and the environment as a cause for the common cold.

The best way to avoid a cold is to avoid people who have one. Unfortunately people begin viruses that cause these illnesses several days before there are any apporent symptoms. But you can avoid exposure to people you know have a cold.

The diagnosis depends upon how the virus affects the body. If the virus illness involves the nose and situses with a mild, sore throat and limited fever, it is a cold.

Satety aides warn public whiskey barrels explode

WASHINGTON — The Consumer Product afety Commission Friday approved a plan to carn the public about the possible exploding

warm the public about the passible exploiting-whisky barrels.

The problem, the agency said, is that used white oak whisky barrels have become very popular for use as bars, could tables or other pices of furniture around the home.

But if the consumer uses the whole barrel with the plug or "bung" left in it, funes can collect inside from the estimated 29 pounds of whisky that soaks into the wood during the years the spirits were aging. As those funes collect inside the closed barrel, there can be an explosion if the barrel comes into contact with a heat source—such as a fireplace.

The commission said there have been three cases where that happened, with resulting burns-

and cuts for persons standing near when the barrels exploded. In each case, it said, the barrel had been exposed to a heat source— Commissioner David R. Pittle said the agency

Commissioner David R, Plittle sald the agency had endorsed a corrective action plan submitted by Schendey Distillers Inc. and a company which distributed the harrels. Lawrence R. McCoy and Co. Under the plan, the distributon notified its consumers of the problem and sent stickers to retailers for placement on the barrels saying the plug should be removed.

The commission said McCoy believes barrels are involved, most of them in sumer's hands,

Schenely said the plan amounts to the com-panies telling their customers to "get the bung out."



Spanish shaking off controls imposed during Franco's 40-year regime

MADRID, Spain (UPI)—
Since Generalissimo, Francelsco Franco died on Nov. 20, 1975. Spain has undergone deep change.
As politicians still haggle over the terms of converting the authoritarian structures of the Franco regime into a democracy, events appear to have overtakent them.
The 35 million Spanlards are not waiting—they already are

not waiting — they already are shaking off the controls im-posed during Franco's 40-year rule. The biggest change is that the spoken and printed word is now virtually free.

The process has been aided by the government of politically liberal King Juan

Carios, 38. Pledged to setting up a functioning democracy by next year, the government tolerates many activities still banned by Franco era laws. As a result, there has been a tremendous outpouring of ideus and demands.

At the last count political

ideas and demands.

At the last count, political parties number 430 — most of them still illegal and only a few with a substantial following.

"A veritable alphabet soup," said former interior Minister Manuel Fraga Iribarne. Inmself the leader of two rightist groups known by their initials, RD and AP, Next year's first free elections in 41 years are expected to cut the 'number down to manageable

size, as happened in neigh-boring Portugal.

Spanish attitudes are changing not only in politics, but in fields as diverse as labor relations and sex.

Pennisis groups campaign for contraceptives, divorce and abortion — all tabous under the rigidly purtantical Franco. They also campaign for an abottion of a law, which pun is hes convicted adulteresses by up to five-cers in iail, but lets unfaither

new call for bids.

The 1973 amendment requires a 10-per cent bond on all highway district construction projects except bridges (which need a 5-per cent bond).

Two of the three Oct. 25 hidders posted 5 per cent bid bonds, while the other posted none. On advice of Larry Duff, attorney for the district, commissioners rejected all bids and set the new

commissioners rejected in the call.

The highway district also is preparing for improvement of 3.7 miles of the Paul Road, major design features of the project were approved recently by the State Department of Transportation.

The improvement project would stretch north

from the main drain, just north of the Paul city limits, to just north of 300 North Road along the existing roadway. The road, which links Paul with state 24 to the

The road, which links Paul with state 24 to the north, is 22 feet wide. The construction would create a 34-foot width except for the last mile, which would be 22 feet wide.

The width is a compromise between the highway district and federal officials who wanted a minimum 32-foot width on the entire project to the Minidoka Rim.

The grade of the roadbed is to be 1 to 2 feet above the surrounding ground with the existing right-of-way widened from 50 to 50 feet by acquisition of five feet on each side.

Improvements in the existing drainage are planned to eliminate roadway flooding, particularly at the north end of the project.

Irrigation canals, laterals, drains, small ditches and siphons lying within the right-of-way are to be relocated and reconstructed with equal or better facilities.




