1 and 2. **THE LAW AND WOMAN**—This course will be conducted by Mrs. Edythe Howden, a graduate of the University of Toronto and Osgoode Hall, who before her marriage practised law with the firm Kingsmill, Mills, Price, Barrett and Finlayson. The course will be given twice, once in the fall and again starting in January, 1965. The fall series is jointly sponsored with the Etobicoke University Women's Club as a community project. All interested will be welcome.

3. **ENGLISH LITERATURE**—Dr. Kirkwood, the lecturer, was for many years Professor of English at Trinity College. Her career at the University of Toronto in both Trinity and University Colleges and as Dean of Women of St. Hilda's College has been distinguished. This course is also jointly sponsored with the Etobicoke University Women's Club.

4. **INDIA, WHAT NEXT?**—Dr. Bryce, while being a gifted lecturer, is unique in other respects. She spent by far the greater part of her life in the Far East, particularly in India. She was born in Tokyo and grew up in Japan until she was twelve. All her degrees were earned at the University of Toronto, taking her B.A. in History, English and Moderns. She married in 1913 and moved to India in 1914, later returning to take her M.A. in Hindu Philosophy and Anthropology and again returned when she completed her Doctorate in Sociology (her husband's field) in 1937, in all cases returning to India where she was actively engaged in educational and social works. Dr. Bryce retired in 1953 and she and her husband came back to Canada. She was asked to return to India in 1959 to reorganize a school of social work which she previously began and was instrumental in raising this course from a certificate to degree level. She has now been in Canada from 1962 and has been active in University Women's work in North York.

Colonel Webb held the appointment of Chief of Operations for the United Nations Military Observer Group in India and Pakistan during 1961 and 1962.

the law and woman

(To be given separately in Etobicoke and at 84 Queen's Park)

This course is designed to enable women to understand the law as it affects them, and to recognize and protect their rights in their day-to-day household, business, and community activities and relationships. It presents, in everyday language, the legal problems likely to be encountered by women, and explains them in terms of everyday experiences.

THE LAW—Why we have laws, and how they are made and enforced.

2 lectures

TAXATION—Provincial and federal taxes including Income Tax, Succession Duties, and Canada Estate Tax.

3 lectures

THE FAMILY—Marriage as a contract; laws governing its solemnization; marital obligations; the rights of husband and wife, parent and child, both in and out of marriage.

2 lectures

SOCIAL AGENCIES—The Acts providing protection and assistance to women and children who require it.

1 lecture

INHERITING PROPERTY—Why a will is important; who may draw one; what is involved; a widow's rights and exemptions; how to provide for children; the importance of planning an estate.
