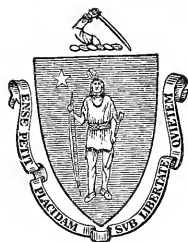

To the Honorable Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled.

In accordance with the provisions of section 30, chapter 31 of the General Laws, I hereby submit the thirty-eighth annual report of the Department of Civil Service and Registration, Division of Civil Service, covering the period from Dec. 1, 1920, to Nov. 30, 1921, inclusive.

REPORT.

PERSONNEL.

Mr. Payson Dana of Brookline was renominated as Commissioner of Civil Service for a term of three years, and approved by the Governor and Council on Dec. 1, 1920.

On Aug. 1, 1921, Dr. Joseph J. Reilly, who has been connected with the Division since July 1, 1912, resigned as Director of the Examination Bureau to accept a position as superintendent of schools in the town of Ware.

Mr. Percy A. Harrison, the deputy director of the Examination Bureau since April 12, 1920, was promoted to the position of Director.

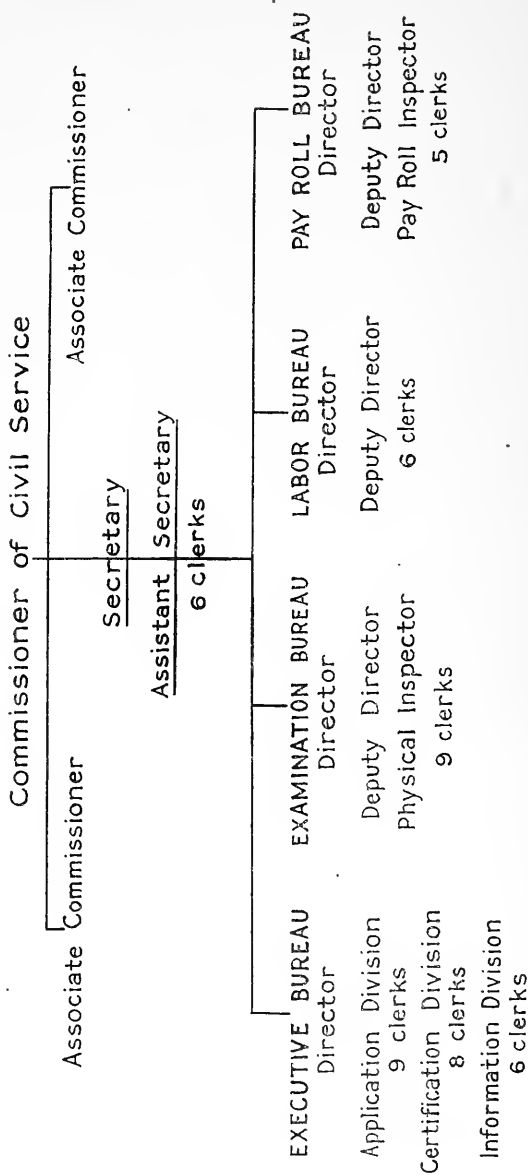
Mr. Herbert H. Edwards, with the Commission since May 26, 1902, and Director of the Labor Bureau since Jan. 12, 1920, was transferred to deputy director of the Examination Bureau.

To fill the position of Director of the Labor Bureau, a special examination was held, and Mr. James E. O'Neil, number one on the list, was appointed. Mr. O'Neil is a veteran of the World War, served across for two years, and was honorably discharged from the service with the rank of first lieutenant.

ORGANIZATION

VETERANS' PREFERENCE.

Under chapter 150, General Acts of 1919, the names of veterans, if they receive a passing mark, are placed on the eligible list ahead of all civilians. During the year covered by the present report 3,062 have been appointed, — 942 in the Official Service and 2,120 in the Labor Service (see Appendix of this report).

EXAMINATIONS.

During the year 885 general competitive and 477 non-competitive examinations have been held, and 11,664 persons have been examined. The larger examinations were for clerical service, with 871 applicants in January and 714 in July; for police service, with 639 applicants in January and 1,364 in September; for stenographer service, with 1,051 applicants in April and 382 in October; for fire service, with 791 applicants in June; for investigators and examiners of automobiles, with 885 applicants in January.

In nearly all cases the eligible lists have been established within sixty days from the date of the examination, and in many instances in a much shorter period of time.

The technical or special examinations are marked, under the supervision of the Director of the Examination Bureau, by experts. The remuneration they receive is small, and they give their services to the Commonwealth as a public duty. The Commissioner appreciates their generous cooperation and public service, and appeals to them and others for their assistance in the future.

ORAL EXAMINATIONS.

The Commissioners have continued the practice innovated last year of giving oral examinations to determine the personality and fitness of applicants for positions where personality is an important factor. The results obtained by these examinations have been very satisfactory.

THE INDUSTRIAL DEPRESSION.

The labor situation caused by the industrial depression has been taken care of in cities other than Boston by allowing heads of departments to call for one list of laborers to be employed for one week, and for another list for the next week, and so on. This rotation of work relieved the situation and gave general satisfaction.

ASSEMBLY OF COMMISSIONS.

The Assembly of Civil Service Commissions of the United States and Canada was held at Minneapolis, Minn., June 21 to 24, 1921. Massachusetts civil service was represented by Mr. Payson Dana, Commissioner of Civil Service, Dr. Joseph J. Reilly, Director of the Examination Bureau, and Mr. P. A. Harrison, deputy director. Mr. Dana was appointed to several important committees. Dr. Reilly declined re-election as president of the assembly, and Mr. Reece of the California State Commission was elected. Several interesting papers on various phases of civil service work, which were very beneficial to those in attendance, were presented to the assembly by representatives of the United States and other civil service commissions.

EXTENSIONS OF CIVIL SERVICE.

Positions in the Official Service of Westfield were automatically classified under the Civil Service Rules when it became a city on Jan. 1, 1921.

On Feb. 8, 1921, all women laborers employed by the city of Boston, and in the departments of the Commonwealth and in the different cities where the Labor Service is classified, were placed under civil service by an amendment to the Rules.

On March 4, 1921, all employees of the Boston Printing Department were placed under civil service by ruling of the Commissioner. This includes apprentices, compositors, press feeders, bookbinders, paper cutters, etc.

In July last the Commissioner of Civil Service ruled that the clerks and stenographers employed in the registries of probate and paid by the Commonwealth were under civil service, and the Attorney-General has recently given an opinion which sustains this ruling. This brings under civil service for the first time about one hundred positions in counties. All future appointments must be made after examination and certification from the civil service lists. For many years the Civil Service Commission has recommended

to the Legislature the classification of all county employees, and bills have been presented but have not passed. There seems to be no good reason why all county positions should not be under civil service as well as State and municipal positions.

During the legislative session of 1921 the following enactments relating to civil service were passed:—

Acts of 1921, chapter 17, "An Act extending the provisions of the civil service laws to the chief of police or commissioner of public safety of the town of Longmeadow."

Acts of 1921; chapter 174, "An Act to place the chief engineer of the fire department of Medford under civil service."

Acts of 1921, chapter 311, "An Act extending the civil service laws to the fire department of the city of Haverhill."

OPINIONS OF THE ATTORNEY-GENERAL.

The Attorney-General has rendered during the year the following opinions in relation to civil service:—

Conviction within One Year.

Can the Commissioner of Civil Service, under the law, accept the application of a person who has been convicted within a year for violation of the automobile laws, such as overspeeding, and other minor offences?

No. — Opinion of Attorney-General, dated March 1, 1921.

Inspectors in the New Bedford Police Department.

Do inspectors with the rank of lieutenant in the New Bedford police department constitute the next lower rank in the case of an examination to be held for promotion to the rank of lieutenant?

Yes. — Opinion of Attorney-General, dated April 1, 1921. St. 1921, c. 496, signed by the Governor on May 27, 1921, now provides that all inspectors shall be ranked as lieutenants dating from Jan. 1, 1917.

Boston Police Matrons.

Are the positions of chief matron and assistant chief matron at the House of Detention in the Boston Police Department classified under the Civil Service Law and Rules?

No. — Opinion of Attorney-General, dated April 28, 1921.

Clerks and Stenographers in the Registries of Probate.

Are the positions of clerk and stenographer in the different registries of probate throughout the State classified under the Civil Service Law and Rules?

Yes. — Opinion of the Attorney-General, dated Nov. 21, 1921.

RECOMMENDATIONS.

The following recommendations are made: —

1. That section 17 of chapter 31 of the General Laws be amended so as not to debar from appointment in the public service a person who has been convicted within a year of a misdemeanor under the laws relative to motor vehicles.
2. That section 31 of chapter 31 of the General Laws be amended so as to provide that the report of persons appointed to or employed in civil service positions shall be filed with the Commissioner of Civil Service as well as the city auditor.
