To either of the Constables of the Town of Montague, in the County of Franklin. GREETING .

Niche name of the Commonwealth of Massa-ehusetts, you are hereby directed to notify and warn the inhabitants of said Town qualified to vote in elections and in town affairs, to meet at Patneket Hall, in the village of Turners Falls in said Montague, on Monday the fitth day of March next, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, then and there to act on the following articles:—

1st. To choose a Moderator to preside in said

meeting.
2d. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year. Under the by-laws all town offi-cers required by law 10 be elected by ballot, must be voted for on the same ballot, except Moderator and Collector of taxes.

3d. To vote by separate ballot, yes or no, on the question "Shall licenses be granted for the

the question "Snail needs be granted for the sale of intoxicating liquors in this town."

4th. To hear the report of the Selectmen, School Committee and others, and act thereon.

5th To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for town debts, and expenses for the convincement and make appropriation of the ensuing year, and make appropriation of the

6th To act any thing relating to building and repairing highways and bridges.
7th. To act anything relating to rebuilding the bridge at the mouth of Millers river.

8th. To act on anything relating to sewers and drains.

To act on the list of jurors proposed by

the Selectmen.

10th. To see if the town will authorize the appointment of Police, and make appropriation tor the same.

11th. To see if the town will fix the time when taxes shall be paid, and act anything relating to interest and discount on taxes.

12th. To see if the town will appropriate one bundred dollars for Memorial Day, to be divided equally between the two Grand Army Posts.

13th. To see if the town will anthorize the sale of any portion of the Town Farm.

14th. To see if the town will authorize the Treasmer, to borrow money in authorize the fight

nrer to borrow money in anticipation of the collection of taxes.

15th. To see it the town will accept the location of J street, from Seventh to Ninth street, as made by the Selectmen, and build and establish the same as a public highway.

16th. To see if the town will accept the location of a town way as made by the Selectmen, to con-nect Fourth and Central streets, in the village of Turners Falls, and build and establish the

same as a highway.
17th. To see if the town will pay S. E. Ripley for his services as a member of the Sewer Com-

mittee.

18th. To see if the town will accept the provisions of Chap. 27 of the Public Statutes, Section 65, 66, 67 and 68, relating to the election of As-

sessors.

19th. To see if the town will assent to the alteration of the limits of Turners Falls Fire District, as petitioned by M. B. Collins and others.

And you are directed to serve this Warrant by posting up attested copies thereof, in some conspicious place in each of the Post Offices of the Town at least seven days before said meeting, and by publishing the same once in the Turners Falls REPORTER.

The total cost of sewers as per last report was \$65,827.45. The town voted that one-fourth of this amount, viz.: \$16,456.-86 should be assessed on the abutters, and authorized the Selectmen to borrow the sum of \$16,000 in anticipation of the payment of the abutters' assessment.

By the peculiar method adopted by the Selectmen of 1886, only \$11,259.38 was so assessed, leaving a deficiency of \$5,197.48, and a note at the Crocker Institution for Savings of \$10,000, with \$5,070.72 only to collect with which to pay it. This note has been reduced with collections of sewer assessments the past year, as will be seen by the Treasurer's Report, amounting to \$1,732, to \$8,268.00, with about \$3,300.00 to collect; this, if all collected, will still leave a deficiency of \$4,968.00. To this may be added the \$400 paid the past year as interest on the sewer assessment note from the Town Treasury, making a deficiency of \$5,368, to which may be added whatever abatements may be necessary for errors in the assessment, making with the accruing interest at least \$6,000 at the close of the present year, which the whole town has got to assume and provide for, and which the town intended should be paid by the abutters.

We would state in way of explanation that at the Town M eeting in December, we were authorized to borrow the sum of eight thousand dollars to meet the bills caused by the July freshet, and the repairs of the two suspension bridges.

We borrowed the sum of five thousand dollars of the Crocker Institution for Savings for three years, from January 1st, 1888, in accordance with the vote of the Town, but finding after paying all the out standing bills a sufficient surplus in the Treasury, we have paid the expenses on the two suspension bridges, viz. \$2631.98, without borrowing, and show over \$3700.00 besides in the treasury more than a year ago.

We herewith submit the report of the Board of Health:

The work of the Board is mainly confined to the villages of Turners Falls and Millers Falls, and in these two places forty-nine nuisances have been abated during the year upon complaint and investigation. There have been reported ninety-three (93) cases of scarlet fever, and of diphtheria four cases at Turners Falls, and thirty-two at Millers Falls. There have been four deaths from scarlet fever at Turners Falls, and three from diphtheria at Millers Falls. By promptly isolating all cases as fast as reported or discovered, these contagious diseases have been kept under control, and it has not been necessary to close any of the schools.

The health of the village of Turners Falls in the future must depend largely upon the condition and the proper use of the system of sewers there established, and in this connection the Board would make some suggestions. By vote of the town the entire matter of connecting private drains with the public sewers was placed in charge of the Board of Health. With the assistance of a competent engineer, arrangements were made for a safe and simple method of making such connections. Notice of the same was duly given, and so far as possible these arrangements have been carried out. A careful examination of the village should be made; every house, where practicable, should be connected with the public sewer, and all imperfect connections, cess-pools and other objectionable methods should be done away with. The man holes along the line of the sewers, in their present shape are not only a source of annoyance by reason of the intolerable stench that arises from them, but are also a fruitful cause of sickness. These should be made airtight, and as the sewer gas must have some means of escape, the Board would recommend extending the sewer on High street to some convenient place and there erecting a pipe of sufficient size and height to ventilate the entire sewer system without annoyance or danger. To make the present system more effective, the Board would recommend that the sewer on G street be extended five hundred feet, that on Railroad street three hundred feet, and that the Fourth street sewer be extended so as to take all the water coming down through the ravine. It is estimated that these changes would not cost over two thousand dollars.

All of these matters, connected so intimately with the public health, are of the gravest importance and demand serious consideration.
