## WARRANT FOR THE ANNUAL TOWN MEETING State of New Hampshire

To the inhabitants of the Town of South Hampton in the county of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Town on Tuesday, the 10 of March, at One o'clock in the afternoon to act on Article 1 and 2.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Town on Wednesday, the 11 of March, at Seven Thirty P.M. to act on Article 3 and subsequent Articles.

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To vote on the establishment of Historic Districts in Jewell town [properties of Coffin, Merrill, Oldak, Amsler, Miller, Rice, and portion of Capp] and Currierville [properties of Currier Heirs, Strickland, Verge, Riecks and Dodge.]
- 3. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and to make appropriations for the same.
- 4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$212.82 for the improvement of Class V Roads.
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to administrate, sell, or otherwise dispose of any real estate acquired by Tax Collector's Deed, any sale to be either by private sale to the previous owner, or by public auction with the Selectmen retaining the right to reject any or all bids
- 6. To see if the Town will authorize Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes.

- 7. To see if the Town will authorize the Board of Selectmen to make application for and to receive and spend in the name of the Town, such advances, grants-in-aid, or other funds for Town purposes as may now, or hereafter be forthcoming from Federal, State, local or private agencies that would be of benefit to the Town.
- 8. To see whether the Town will join the Southeastern New Hampshire Regional Planning Commission and authorize the Town's representation and appropriate the sum of \$417.60 for this purpose.
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for the support of the Seacoast Regional Counseling Center.
- 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,014.00 for the support of the library.
- 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$51.00 for the support of the Rockingham Child and Family Services.
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$102.00 for the support of Rockingham County Community Action.
- 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$6,500.00 for the maintenance of water holes and installation of a dry hydrant.
- 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for recreational purposes.
- 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000.00 to run the Fire Department.
- 17. To see if the Town will vote and appropriate the sum of \$2,700.00 to pay off the note on the fire truck and authorize the withdrawal of the amount required for this purpose from the Federal Revenue Sharing Fund.

- 18. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate \$1055.00 to purchase hose for the Fire Department, and authorize the withdrawal of the amount required for this purpose from the Federal Revenue Sharing Fund.
- 19. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate \$3,000.00 for the maintenance and upgrading of the Town Bridges on Hilldale Avenue and Whitehall Road, and authorize the withdrawal of the amount required for this purpose from the Federal Revenue Sharing Fund.
- 20. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the establishment of a Police Cruiser Replacement Trust Fund, to raise and appropriate \$250.00 for that purpose and to authorize the Selectmen to deposit Pistol Permit fees in that Fund.
- 21. To see if the Town will establish a committee of at least five members, to be appointed by the Selectmen, to investigate the acquisition of the Old Currier Farm [Vozzella House] for the use as a Town Hall Annex. [On the petition of 18 voters].
- 22. To see if the Town will vote to petition the Representatives and Senators who represent the Town in the General Court to support in the current session of the General Court, the concurrent resolution to amend the State Constitution to limit the annual increase in property taxes to five percent and to limit the annual increase in spending by the state or any city, town, or other governmental unit of the state to five percent. [On the petition of 13 voters]
- 23. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

## ANNUAL TOWN MEETING March 12th, 1980

At a legal meeting of the inhabitants of the Town of South Hampton, in the County of Rockingham, in the State of New Hampshire, qualified to vote in Town Affairs, held on March 11th, 1980 at the South Hampton Town Hall, the following business was transacted:

The Town Warrant was read by Moderator Horace Cressy at 1:05 p.m. Ernest Bonah made a motion to open the polls, seconded by Peter Martin and so voted.

Ballot Clerks for the election day were Shirley Michaud, Annette Krafton, Francis Smith and Helen Smith. A total of 348 votes were cast out of 487 registered voters.

## ARTICLE I - Town Officers were elected as follows:

Donald F. Currier, Supv. of the Checklist, 6 yrs., 235 votes, elected.

Stephen F. Jordan, Supv. of the Checklist, 6 yrs., 100 votes Peter W. Bryant, Selectman, 3 yrs., 194 votes, elected Michael Santosuosso, Selectman, 3 yrs., 151 votes Mary Mertinooke, Treasurer, 1 yr., 95 write-in votes, elected Andrea Condon, Treasurer, 1 yr., 18 write-in votes. Geraldine Riecks, Collector of Taxes, 2 yrs., 101 votes Kimberly A. Roy, Collector of Taxes, 2 yrs., 236 votes, elected

Jewell E. Currier, Auditor, 1 yr., 293 votes, elected Robert W. Fraser, Auditor, 1 yr., 293 votes, elected John Santosuosso, Highway Agent, 1 yr., 267 votes, elected Vincent H. Early, Trustee of the Trust Fund, 3 yrs., 306 votes, elected.

Vincent H. Early, Trustee of the Cemeteries, 1 yr., 290 votes, elected

Albert Gray, Trustee of the Cemeteries, 1 yr., 307 votes, elected

Walter A. Ross, Jr., Trustee of the Library, 3 yrs., 289 votes, elected

Judith L. Shivik, Trustee of the Library, 1 yr., 276 votes, elected

John Santosuosso, Constable, 1 yr., 258 votes, elected

ARTICLE II - Shall we adopt the provisions of RSA 56:40-a permitting applications for changes in party affiliation to be made with the town clerk? Ballot vote: 272 YES, 40 NO.

Vincent Early made a motion to close the polls at 8:05 p.m., seconded by Shirley Michaud and so voted.

Sworn in at open meeting by Moderator Horace Cressy were Kimberly Roy, Tax Collector; Donald Currier, Supervisor of the Checklist; John Santosuosso, Highway Agent and Constable; Patricia Nelson, School Board Member; Peter Bryant, Selectman; and Vincent Early, Trustee of the Trust Fund and Trustee of the Cemeteries.

The following evening on March 12th, 1980, Moderator Horace Cressy called the meeting to order at 7:40 p.m. Rev. Everett Scruton opened the meeting with a prayer and Chief Hess led the Townspeople in the Salute to the Flag. The remaining articles were acted upon as follows:

ARTICLE III - Ernest Bonah, Selectman, made a motion that \$56,900 be appropriated to defray town charges for the ensuing year and to make appropriation for the same, duly seconded by Peter Martin. Mr. Bonah itemized the expenses and explained the increases. The article was voted in the affirmative.

ARTICLE IV - Moderator Horace Cressy read article "To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$215.06 for the improvement of Class V roads. John Santosuosso, Highway Agent, moved to accept the article as read, seconded by Edward Hess. It was voted in the affirmative.

ARTICLE V - Anne Verge, Selectmen, made a motion to accept the article authorizing the Selectmen to administrate, sell, or otherwise dispose of any real estate acquired by Tax Collector's Deed, any sale to be either by private sale to the previous owner or by public auction with the Selectmen retaining the right to reject any or all bids. It was seconded by Wallace Verge and so voted.

ARTICLE VI - Ernest Bonah, Selectman, moved that the Town authorize Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes, seconded by Peter Martin and voted in the affirmative.

ARTICLE VII - Moderator, Horace Cressy, read article "To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to make application for and receive and spend in the name of the Town, such advances, grants-in-aid, or other funds for Town purposes as may now or hereafter be forthcoming from Federal, State, local or private agencies that would be of benefit to the Town." Peter Martin, Selectman, moved that the article be accepted as read, seconded by Peter Bryant and so voted.

ARTICLE VIII - Anne Verge, Selectman, made a motion that the Town join the Southeastern New Hampshire Regional Planning Commission and authorize the Town's representation and appropriate the sum of \$364.80 for this purpose, seconded by Ellen Cressy. James Quinn asked for an explanation of what the Commission does. Wallace Verge, Planning Board Chairman, stated that it provides useful information for the Town's Master Plan. Fred Anderson added it creates maps for this purpose too. The article was voted in the affirmative.

ARTICLE IX - Ernest Bonah, Selectman, moved that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$500 for the support of the Seacoast Regional Counseling Center, seconded by Audrey Miller. The article was voted in the affirmative.

ARTICLE X - Walter Ross, Library Trustee moved that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,291 for the support of the Library, seconded by John Santosuosso and so voted.

ARTICLE XI - Anne Verge, Selectman, made a motion that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$45 for the support of the Rockingham Child and Family Services, seconded by Jane Amsler. It was explained that it handled family problems as opposed to individual problems that Seacoast Counseling would deal with. Peter Oldak suggested listing the various organizations and services they provide in future Town Reports. The article was voted in the affirmative.

ARTICLE XII - John Santosuosso moved that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$6,500 for the Police Department, seconded by Norman Felch. Mr. Santosuosso explained the increase. A Budget Committee Member was asked why they did not recommend \$500 of this amount. Vincent Early spoke for the Committee stating it was up to the Town to make the final decision. Lawrence Baker questioned the estimate for gas and mileage. The article was voted in the affirmative.

ARTICLE XIII - Edward Hess, Fire Chief, moved that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$500 for the maintenance of water holes and installation of a dry hydrant, seconded by Alan Philcrantz and so voted.

ARTICLE XIV - Burchard Stackhouse, Recreation Commission Member, made a motion that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$300 for recreational purposes, seconded by William Courtney and so voted.

ARTICLE XV - Edward Hess, Fire Chief, moved that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,000 to run the Fire Department, seconded by Paul Morris. Mr. Hess briefly itemized the expenses. The article was voted in the affirmative.

ARTICLE XVI - Peter Martin, Selectman, moved that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,800 to pay off the note on the fire truck, seconded by Edward Hess. It was noted that this amount does not actually pay off the note but is this year's payment. It was voted in the affirmative.

ARTICLE XVII - Edward Hess, Fire Chief, made a motion that the town appropriate \$1,000 to purchase hose for the Fire Department and authorize the withdrawal of the amount required for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972. The article was seconded by Norman Felch and voted in the affirmative.

ARTICLE XVIII - John Santosuosso, Highway Agent, moved that the Town appropriate \$3,000 for the maintenance and upgrading of the Town Bridges on Hilldale Ave. and Whitehall Road and authorize the withdrawal of the amount required for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund

established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972, seconded by Edward Hess. Mr. Santosuosso explained that the State inspected both bridges and stated in a letter that the Hilldale ave. Bridge is capable of carrying passenger cars only. It was voted that the fire truck and school bus should not go over it and straightening of the bridge was also discussed. William Courtney read the letter and stated that with the recommended installation of diaphrams, the bridge could be posted for gross weight limit of 10 tons. Edward Hess commented that the fire truck weighs more than that. William Amsler suggested that the bridge be made safe but not straightened. The article was voted in the affirmative.

John Santosuosso made a motion to reconsider Article 18 to increase the money to be used on the Hilldale Ave. Bridge, seconded by Ann Zammitti, After further discussion, the motion was voted and lost.

ARTICLE XIX - Transaction of Other Business.

The Moderator introduced Peter Bryant, newly elected Selectman.

Fred Anderson moved that the Board of Selectmen notify the New Hampshire Public Utilities Commission and the Site Evaluation Committee that the Town Meeting requests that they conduct a public hearing to consider the alternative of underground high voltage lines vs. overhead lines in terms of the impact on "esthetics, historic sites, air and water quality, the natural envionment and the public health and safety." It should also be notified that it is the opinion of the Town Meeting that such factors were not considered during the 1973 hearings and that new information concerning these issues is now available. The motion was seconded by Peter Oldak. The Supreme Court's decision against the Towns was discussed and it was suggested that copies of the letter be sent to the Governor and Representatives. The motion was voted in the affirmative.

John Santosuosso again questioned the whereabouts of the settees stored in the barn formerly owned by Peter Eaton. Ernest Bonah, Selectman, said he had spoken to Mr. Eaton and was told they were moved to the Town Hall. He will check to see that they are actually there.

Norman Felch moved that the Town vote life tenure for Police Chief and Fire Chief After five years' service. The Moderator ruled that Mr. Felch would have to petition the Selectman to have this put on the ballot.

Ellen Cressy commented on the Pow Wow River Watershed Association and urged Townspeople to join this conservation group.

Fred Anderson moved that the Board of Selectmen notify the Nuclear Regulatory Commission that the Town Meeting opposes the issuance of an operating license for the Seabrook nuclear plant because of the inability of the Town to safely and expeditiously evacuate in the event of an accident at the plant, given lack of manpower and hardware. Further, the Board is instructed not to expend any funds for evacuation planning or implementation, unless all related costs are borne by Public Service Co., the plant operator. The motion was seconded by Peter Oldak and voted in the affirmative.

Vincent Early made a motion to adjourn the meeting at 10:00 p.m., seconded by William Amsler and so voted.

Mary Mertinooke, Treasurer, was sworn in by the Moderator.

# REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST FIRE SERVICE

Forest Fire Prevention: Your Business, Our Business, Good Business. Forest fire prevention slogans have been seen in association with Smokey Bear since the late nineteen forties when a national effort to check the spread of forest fires was implemented.

New Hampshire residents recognized that forest fire prevention and suppression was the responsibility of every citizen, a half century before this national campaign, when our legislature established our first forest fire laws in 1903. Since that date, the State has appointed a town/city forest fire warden who is responsible for forest fire law enforcement in his municipality.

All fires kindled out of doors when there is no snow on the ground must be approved in writing by the forest fire warden before being kindled. All forest fires must be suppressed by the warden and his deputies as soon as they are reported. The cost of fire suppression is shared jointly by the town/city and the State of New Hampshire, as are forest fire prevention and forest fire training costs.

This state and local municipality cooperative forest fire program has given New Hampshire one of the best forest fire records in the United States.

ARTICLE III - The town voted to express their appreciation to Sandra Landis for her eleven years of teaching grades 3 and 4. Mrs. Landis resigned her position because of her husband's job relocation. Seconded by Audrey Miller.

Thomas Harlow led a discussion on our tuitioning our students to Amesbury High. It was felt we should have more input for the amount we are paying. After much discussion, Mr. Harlow then made the motion, "That the school board continue a search for alternative high school education facilities in the state on New Hampshire and to make this a continuing process."

Seconded by Ted Nelson, all in favor - so voted.

Walter Hill spoke on what the board has done so far in trying to get our students into a vocational school and which ones were available in the area that they were pursuing. Mr. Harlow stated the board should be commended.

Vincent Early made the motion to adjourn the meeting at 8:40 p.m. seconded by Barbara Knapp.

#### SOUTH HAMPTON SCHOOL DISTRICT SCHOOL BOARD REPORT

To the citizens of South Hampton, New Hampshire

#### BUDGET

A budget proposal was submitted to the Budget Committee and eventually to the South Hampton School District meeting with one of the lowest increases in recent years. The school board was asked to look meaningfully at the budget. We hoped to avoid an extrodinary tax increase this year. The budget submitted this year is a 5.8% increase over 1980. The state is continuing to mandate programs of special education, but not providing adequate funding.

#### JOINT BOARD

The three members of the South Hampton District School Board met with five other districts in Supervisory Union No. 21 as the governing body of the supervisory union. The budgets, policies, and personnel administration was discussed. Lawrence Baker of the South Hampton School Board was elected Chairman of the Joint Board this year. We are a small school district, but hold many responsible positions within the union.

#### **ACCOUNTABLITY COMMITTEE**

For the past year, the accountability committee has met to work on developing Performance Indicators [PI's] and Essential Student Outcomes [ESO's]. These tests will be administered to students in the fourth, eighth and eleventh grades in the union. This year, your School Board Chairman, Walter Hill was elected chairman of this committee. Your citizen representative, Ted Nelson was chairman of the Operations Committee, Our teacher representative was Beverly Peeke and Principal, Terry Marinos who were also very active.

#### TEACHER CONTRACT NEGOTIATIONS

Lawrence Baker, school board member, is South Hampton's representative on the negotiations committee. They have met weekly since June. Additionally, a few concentrated sessions lasting thru the weekend and into the morning hours were necessary to complete a contract agreement. This is a very active committee doing a larger share of work than is normally asked of committees. The teacher contracts represent the dedicated participation of our school boards.

#### VOCATIONAL EDUCATION

This year, we were very proud to have three students placed in vocational education programs. This is the first time we have had this curriculum available to our students. Patricia Nelson, school board member, was responsible for most of the organizing of this program. The New Hampshire Region No. 18 Vocational School in Exeter opened in September of 1980. Students are admitted in their junior and senior years of high school. We have an annual quota of four juniors and four seniors designated from South Hampton. The program is exceptional. It is what South Hampton has been wooking toward for many years.

We would like to express our appreciation for a very successful year to the administration and teachers of Barnard School.

To the Citizens of South Hampton:

I submit, herewith, my annual report for your School District.

A small educational unit has to always battle to produce quality education at a reasonable cost. In my opinion your School Board and staff do very well -- both in terms of quality instruction and diversity of programs.

Additional opportunities are being provided through involvement in the Region #18 Vocational Education Center. I believe a greater percentage of your students will participate as the opportunities get more visibility.

The theme of my district reports this year is "centering down."

"Centering down" to me means a placing of one's interest in a central focus, a separating of the important and the not so important, mentally reducing things to a discernible entity.

To "Center down" in regard to our children is to me a putting into focus what we are here for. Children exist because we as parents want them. They are here because we have made a commitment.

The commitment may be listening to a first grader's chatter about what she had for lunch at school or it may be standing in a cold wind watching a son playing soccer. For that time one is "centering down" on his youngster and in so doing is helping him develop toward one's expectations.

I am often asked by a parent what can be done to help a student having trouble in reading. I am tempted to say the best moments to help have gone by. Sometime probably during the second year a bedtime ritual of reading should have been established. One hundred and one nights of reading the same Dr. Seuss episode may be tedious except for the knowledge that one is "centering down."

Have you "centered down" by climbing into a tent formed by the kitchen chairs and an old blanket?

Have you "centered down" by agreeing to putting up with what goes with a puppy?

Have you "centered down" as a grandparent?

Nobody can "center down" for a child like a parent or a grand parent can. The school, the town recreation league, and the television are not poor substitutes in that they aren't even substitutes..

The problem of time in "centering down" with offspring is compounded by the economy. To have a good paying job often means travel and a ten or eleven hour day. In many families to try to survive on one paycheck is unrealistic and a second family member has to be away from the nest. Not only is together time diminished but the spinoff effects of the working world such as frustration, anxiety, and guilt lead to the further separation of the family fiber.

An inflationary economy hurts us all. It is not a question of getting a raise to be able to enjoy a better standard of living. Rather it is a struggle with the grocery store, oil supplier, money lending institution and seemingly everyone else we have financial transactions with. We have to fight to maintain what we have. Few are able to do it.

I shudder when I price a testbook the same way you do every time you pull a box of cereal off the shelf in the supermarket. I am apprehensive about every electric bill for our schools. I peruse fuel oil bills with the same feeling of frustration I have when I pull up to a gasoline pump.

I wish I could tell you that your School District has found the ansewr, that here in South Hampton we are going to turn the economy of the country in a favorable direction.

Such is not to be. I will continue to spend a great deal of time with your Board members and your Principal and we can soften the impact but in the final analysis, the cost of operating the Barnard School will be affected by the inflationary spiral.

Notwithstanding the above, it is a pleasure to be part of the process of educating your children. I appreciate the efforts of all of you who are also directly or indirectly involved.
