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

Students take advantage of ways to spend time together and make lasting memories.






#### WEN'S BASKETBALL





This season was a growing experience for the Lady Bruins. Finishir 10th in the Northwest Conference, the women's tennis team worked hard to make a name for themselves in the conference.






#### WEN'S TENNIS










#### The Life of Oscar Romero
