

We shall all be interested to ee by the Treasurer's Report where ach penny came from, and most of s will be able to read between the nes and appreciate the eager effort nd willing sacrifice involved. Those f us who went back to Sweet Briar or Commencement watched the proress of the Fund with interest akin excitement, for it was only during hat last week that the \$10,000.00 was ctually completed. The result thus ar must surely thrill each one of us with pride, as being an evidence of he loyalty and devotion of Sweet riar girls, who are able to report his as the result of their very first rganized effort. The spirit to which testifies means even more than the mount itself, for it speaks louder an dollars and cents. On the other and, we would take advantage of his occasion to repeat our expres-on of gratitude to the generous ontributors outside the Association, tho inspired the effort on such a cale, and without whose help the reult would have been discouragingly ifferent.

And now we start the new year 7th \$100.00 in our treasury and unounded zeal in our hearts! It will pur us on still more if we constant-7 remind ourselves that the Fund is

not an end in itself, nor a sum to be raised spasmodically, as our fancy dictates. Sweet Briar must rank with the finest colleges in our land, and this is the great goal to which the Endowment Fund is a necessary means. If we keep this ever before us, we shall re-dedicate ourselves to the cause with dauntless determination to arrive. With such splendid success for a beginning, we can only be satisfied with a still greater achievement this coming year. Of the \$10,000.00 now in hand, we, as an Association, raised only \$2,000. Our aim for 1915-1916 is to make our share \$5,000.00, and it has been roughly estimated that an average of \$200 00 from each chapter, plus individual pledges, will approximate that amount.

Any program will prove simple if we grasp our many opportunities to organize where we have not yet done so. Instead of only eight active chapters, there could and should be something like thirty-five. Surely no group of Sweet Briar girls will allow themselves to be deprived of a share in such a campaign as this? Such a state as Texas, for example, where there are ninety Sweet Briar girls, will surely not be satisfied to go any longer without any chapter at all! To every individual girl, where ever she is, let this be a challenge to count for something in her group. Don't let someone else get ahead of

you now, but have the fun and credit of organizing a chapter yourself. And don't let any of us be content with merely electing officers or getting together for jollification. Only active groups are to be recognized as chapters, so please show your colors. By keeping the wires hot, the larger chapters could plan something for every month, and with an early start could give five or six affairs before next June. Pledges and dues for last year still remain unpaid, and in last year still remain unpaid, and in states where girls are too scattered for regular work, some loyal mem-bers can do a great service by can-vassing their state for this year. If every single girl will feel a responsi-bility and do her share to carry out the plans of the Association, the result will be too glorious to foretell! Let's remember that an Executive Committee and a handful of workers are helpless in themselves, and that our success or failure this year depends upon what every individual girl does from now on! Here's to 1915-1916! Let our motto from now until June be "Never Stop," and see what happens!

# ARTICLE VI of the Constitution

#### DUES

#### MINUTES OF THE 1914 MEETING

On Monday, June 1, 1914, a meeting of all former students visiting Sweet Briar was held in the administration Building. Marion Peele presided over the meeting at which the following girls were present:

Eugenia Griffin, Bessie Grammer, Mayo Thach, Antoinette Johnson, Lucy Tait, Frances Murrell, Nan Powell, Margaret Eaglesfield, Eugenia Buffington, Martha Tillman, Frances Richardson, Emma Morriss, Claudine Hutter and Emmy Thomas.

The question of combining the Alumnæ Association with the Association of Former Students was first discussed. Mr. Manson and Miss Benedict spoke to the former students giving their views on the subject and advising that the two associations be combined. A motion was then made, seconded and carried that the Association of Former Students and the Alumnæ Association combine under the name of The Association of Alumnæ and Former Students of Sweet Briar College.

A committee was appointed to draw up a constitution for the new Association and the following officers for the year 1914-1915 were elected. President, Eugenia Buffington; Vice-President, Marion Peele; Secretary, Sue Slaughter; Treasurer, Katherine Wilson. An executive committee was then elected as fol-

lows: Eugenia Griffin, Mary Parker, Lelia Dew, Dorothy Taylor.

The next matter discussed was the formation of local chapters. It was decided to appoint, in each community from which several girls had come to Sweet Briar, one girl to organize a chapter of the Association in her community. The particular work agreed upon for the coming year was the raising of an endow-ment fund for the college. The executive committee was instructed to make plans for the year but in the meantime by a motion made and carried, it was agreed that every student then at Sweet Briar be urged to pledge a sum of money to be paid not later than June 1, 1915. (This plan was carried out on June 2, 1914, at a called meeting in the chapel.) As there was no other business before the Association the meeting was adjourned.

#### MINUTES OF THE 1915 MEETING

The second annual meeting of the Association of Alumnæ and Former Students of Sweet Briar College was held at Sweet Briar on Monday, May 31, 1915, in the Academic Building. The meeting was opened by the president who made a short speech of

welcome to the new members of the Association and thanked the old members for their spiendid help during the past year. In speaking to the new members Miss Buffington urged that they think and work for the college immediately, before other interests crowding in upon them should make Sweet Briar less vital. The secretary's minutes of the last meeting were then read and approved. Following this the treasurer's reports were read and ac-

cepted.

Miss Benedict spoke informally of her pleasure in the successful raising of ten thousand dollars as a beginof the thousand donars as a begin-ning of the proposed endowment fund. Asked to name a sum which she thought the Association might set before itself for the following year, she suggested five thousand dollars. From the Treasurer's report it had been seen that of the ten thousand dollars raised since 1914, only two thousand was given by the Association itself. The other eight thousand had come from interested outsiders or from the college itself. Thus in proposing that the Association set \$5,000.00 as the amount it alone should try to raise Miss Bene-dict placed no limit on the endowment fund as a whole but expressed her confidence that the Association alone might raise more than twice as much money in 1915-16 as it had done in 1914-15. After some dis-

cussion it was seen that five thousand dollars might easily be raised if every chapter then organized and every chapter to be organized before October, 1915, should make two hundred dollars.

Reports of the organization, plan of meetings, and methods of money raising were then made by the following girls: for Philadelphia, Henrietta Washburn; for Huntington, Rebekah Patton; for Ohio, Helen Lamfrom; for Norfolk, Mary Pinkerton; for Salem-Roanoke, Eugenia Griffin; for New York, Ruth Maurice; for Evanston, Eugenia Buffington; and for Sweet Briar, Marion

Peele.

It was moved and carried that all persons contributing one hundred dollars or more to the endowment fund be formally thanked in the name of the Association for their assistance. Following a report from the nominating committee the officers for 1915-1916 were elected. President, Henrietta Washburn; President, Marion Peele, Secretary, Sue Slaughter, Treasurer, Katherine Wilson: Executive Committee, Eugenia Ruffington, Rebekah Patton, Hazel Marshall, Grace Martin.

. As there was no other business before the Association a motion was made and carried that the meeting

adjourn.

#### LOOK HERE!

At the annual meeting of the Executive Committee of the Association at Sweet Briar during Commencement 1915, the members who were present decided to petition the Board of Directors of the College to grant the Association the privilege of having an alumna member of that Board, a privilege granted the alumnæ of other colleges of the rank of Sweet Briar.

This question was considered at the meeting of the Board of Directors held at Sweet Briar, October 29, 1915, and Mr. Manson, Chairman of the Executive Committee informs the Association that while at present it is inadvisable to enlarge the membership of the Board, the Board feels that an Advisory Committee with an alumna representative could be formed, such a Committee to act in connection with the Board. The plan would be to have this Committee made up of influential persons whose connection with Sweet Briar would aid its growth and development and who could ably confer with the members of the Board upon any questions concerning the college, but who, owing to the impossibility of making them actual Board members, would have no vote.

We feel deeply grateful to the members of the Board for granting

the Association the right to be represented on such a Committee, and with such representation feel that the alumnæ may keep in close touch with the plans for development and policies of the College.

#### CHAPTER REPORTS

N. B.—Only those chapters that raise money are considered organized.

Although the girls and faculty who are still at Sweet Briar cannot properly be termed "alumnæ" or "former students," their organized work for the Endowment Fund has been so plendid and bulked so large that we are glad to print an account of it at the head of the list of chapters.

#### Sweet Briar

With the opening of school last fall, a strong spirit seemed to be prevalent—that of each organization having some definite goal for the year. When the 'College Club was reorganized, it was voted unanimously that its special task be not only to whoop "College Spirit," but to give a rousing cheer for the "Endowment Fund of Sweet Briar College." This was adopted as the life work of the club and the other organizations, as Student Government and Dramatics soon showed that they could do as well.

Before Christmas the work was, I fear, a little half-hearted, though a "Tacky Party" was given by the College Club and well-attended by all the others. Besides this, all the classes began to work individually for the grand old cause, and the fund was being boosted, if not actually

swelled.

The greatest stimulus came the first morning after our return from the Christmas holidays, when Miss Benedict got up after chapel to announce that Mr. Manson would give \$1,00000 if we could raise enough more to make \$10,000.00. The excitement that reigned for five minutes would have done your hearts good! The College Club's chief work was now carried on by the classes, and each seemed trying to outdo the other in its gift, which, they decided, should go in this year and not be held until the last year. Student government also took up the matter quite actively, and the dor-mitories were organized under heads for the houses and corridors, and the work was carried on with a swing. Dramatics also promised that her surplus bank account would be turned over to the Fund at the end of the year. We were all beaming with hope still more when, in addition to Mr. Manson's \$1,000 00, Mrs. Emry promised to give \$1,000.00 if the other \$8,000.00 were raised. No one waited to question the result but went straight to work. The classes each gave a play or show of some kind and cleared close to one hundred dollars in each case. Besides this, the separate floors or dormitories worked together and made cake or popcorn balls or candy, and sold them in the other dormitories. The third floor of Manson was the first to do this, on the day the announcement 17

was made. Carson had breakfast three times on Sunday mornings in the Domestic Science "Lab" for those who were locked out of the Refectory. Batter cakes and syrup and coffee were served, and \$27.00 was cleared. They also served lemonade on hot nights in the Spring from 10 to 10:30 p. m. Grammer Hall gave a mock wedding and made over \$25.00. Randolph served salad and ice in the "gym" when basket-ball games were in progress. Gray gave a prize fight when wrestling on the front campus seemed in vogue, and made about \$30.00 from admission and the sale of refreshments. Each floor in each dormitory had a directory which read: "Marianne Martin blacks shoes" or "Margaret Grant darns hose," etc. Each girl in college was pledged to raise one dollar by her own efforts, and in many cases, by shampoos or tutoring, as much as six dollars was handed in. Numerous things were done which would scarcely be dreamed of, such as paying five cents for substituting in basketball or renting an alarm clock!

Noble assistance was rendered by the Faculty. First they presented "The Bachelor's Romance," and handed in nearly one hundred and fifty dollars. Those who were not on the stage were dressed as "befo' de wa'" mammies, to great effect, and sold ice cream cones and sang shouting songs at the back door!

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Besides this, the people "down the hill" had two teas which were very successful, and quite a sum was cleared. Among the individual work, none is more to be commended than that of Miss Carroll, who for weeks sent sandwiches through the dormitories every night, and cleared \$10.00 a week. Mlles. Prenz and Liardet made spatter-work sofa cushions and bags, and sold them for the Fund. Miss Chaney made nearly one hundred dollars and besides gave freely of her time to help all culinary efforts, advising and helping the Domestic Science Class to sell its wares instead of eating them! William Dew gave a circus at the Apartment House, and with the modest charge of five cents a person, was able to make a contribution of a dollar all by himself.

Thus the Fund grew, and we watched with bated breath Miss Benedict's bulletin which told of all the big things that were being done by you "old girls" outside, and our efforts seemed poor and futile. But still we hoped, and when, on May 28th, the sign said simply "\$10,000," our hearts were full to bursting!"

#### Chicago

The Chicago Chapter, reorganized last January as one of the chapters of the Sweet Briar Alumnæ and

Former Students Association, has enrolled as its members the Alumnæ and Former students who live in and Former students who live in Milwaukee, Highland Park, Evanston, Chicago and Oak Park, making a total enrollment of thirty-five or forty members. At the first meeting, held in January, 1915, Gertrude Eisendrath was elected chairman and Gladys Beyers secretary and treas-urer. Ways and means of raising money were discussed. By the last of January, some children's tableaux were worked up and presented in Evanston, netting \$130.00.

The second business meeting of the chapter was held in April. The question before this meeting was how best to collect Association dues and pledges. It was suggested that we canvass by letter all of Illinois, be-sides the towns that are represented in the chapter, making an urgent appeal to girls who had not paid dues and pledges, and reminding them that June 1st was fast approaching, and the Fund was still far from the \$8,000.00 mark. This suggestion was acted upon. An accurate report, however, of the results is hard to give, as so many of the pledges and dues were sent directly to Katherine Wilson the last week of May and the first two days of June.

The plans of this chapter for 1915-

'16 are as yet unformulated. Moneyraising, no doubt, will again be the widest plank in its platform. Besides the matter of dollars and cents, we'll probably consider and try out some scheme of publicity work for Sweet Briar in and around Chicago. The influence of individual girls, however, among their friends will no doubt prove far more successful in this line of work than any organized effort. "Arouse the interest and enthusiasm of every chapter member to the action-working pitch," is our slogan for the coming year.

#### Oak Park Ill.

#### New York

The first affair given by the chapter was the bridge party at the Plaza, when about \$100.00 was made for the Endowment Fund. Mrs. Anna McCall, a relative of the Williams family, was interested enough to come, and talked intimately about them with some of the girls.

In May, the Newark girls, under the leadership of Ethel Day, arranged to rent a photo play. They made about \$100.00 on the performance, and are to be lauded for their

work and energy.

#### Philadelphia

The Philadelphia chapter was organized to include not only the Sweet Briar girls of the city and immediate suburbs, but those also from nearby towns in adjacent states and east of Harrisonburg in the state of Pennsylvania. Beyond certain limits, however, this membership has proved purely nominal, because of distance, and it is only offering them a fair chance to suggest that central and western Pennsylvania have chapters of their own.

It was a large and enthusiastic group that gathered around a hearth fire in December to organize for action, and our hearts were warmed by the presence of girls just back from Sweet Briar for the holidays. We discussed ways for raising money and

finally decided to begin by working individually in our various sections of the city. For the benefit of new chapters, we must acknowledge that this was a mistake and waste of time. Our first combined effort was a rummage sale given in April. Friends outside the chapter added to our stock of merchandise, and we were able to get a small store in the colored section free of charge. A thriving business was done from nine in the morning until five o'clock in the afternoon. Prices were forced down alarmingly, but we came home with sixty-six dirty but precious dollars.

As soon as this was over, we began to plan for a bridge party, and on the eleventh of May the beautiful lawn of the Country Club was the scene of a gay assembly. There were refreshments; and boquets supplied by one of our finest florists free of charge, were given as prizes. At this we cleared \$60.00, making a total of \$125.00 over and above pledges and gifts. May we double it this

year!

#### Indianapolis

There are twenty-two Indiana girls who have been to Sweet Briar, but only eleven were in the state last winter. We have met several times a year for years, but organized in February, 1915, Carina Eaglesfield being elected president, and Margaret Recker secretary and treasurer.

In March we gave a rummage sale, and made \$90.00 for the Fund, and in April another, when we cleared only \$20.00, as there were only four active members in the town. The former was held in a downtown foreign tenement district, and the latter in a colored neighborhood. It was much easier to realize off of the rummage with the first people.

A bridge was planned in May, but there was no one left in town to give

it.

#### Norfolk Chapter

The Norfolk Chapter was not regularly organized until November, 1914. During the preceeding year the Sweet Briar girls in Norfolk had met together about once a month to drink tea and talk over old times. After the organization of our big Association, however, and the call for chapters to raise an endowment fund, we formed into a more definite group, elected officers as follows: President, Mary Pinkerton; Vice-President, Margaret Cobb; Secretary, Virginia Etheridge; and Treasurer, Edith Hyslop; and made plans for raising money. In December we sold Christmas cards on commission. We cleared very little money this way but as we had been at no initial expense we felt that the resulting "nest egg" was worth the work. Later in the winter we gave a card party, but as we were too generous to our guests the proceeds were very small. In the spring we began a "mile of pennies," which we will keep up next year. In May we finished our cam-paign with a rummage sale which we agreed brought more money for our trouble than anything else we had tried. #### WAYS AND MEANS Rummage Sales

Tried out by the following chap-Indianapolis (2), \$110.00; Philadelphia, \$66.00; Huntington, \$25.00; Norfolk, Louisville, October, 1915. (See Reports.)

The most popular, as well as the most profitable, method of moneyraising last year seemed to be by rummage sales. The chief advantage of a rummage sale is that it requires no initial expenditure. For the ideal sale, the store in which to "keep shop" as well as the dray or automobile to transport the old clothes, etc., are both lent by their owners. Nearly any article, from a collar to a bicycle, is saleable, provided it is in fairly good condition. Announce the sale some time in advance, so that your chapter members can collect their "cast-offs" gradually and beg contributions from their friends. Men's clothes sell well, and the larger the garment the more likely it is to be sold. Hang your wares on nails or ropes about the store, so that they can be seen without becoming shopworn. Mark every article with an approximate price, and then sell for whatever you think the buyer will pay. Advertise your sale conspicu-ously on the door of your store and in nearby windows for several days before the sale. Do not sell anything on credit. If you do not make a fortune this way, whatever you do

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make will be clear gain. The following is from a letter of Carina Eagles-

field's on the subject:

"The fall is really the time to have them. The gathering of the things is important-getting enough, and the right sort for the right locality. Colored people want gaudy, well-preserved things, and Hunyacks want service. We made the ninety dollars in a Hunyack neighborhood and off of durable women's dresses (large sizes), and men's trousers and suits. The second one that I ran alone was in a colored neighborhood, and they bought hats, waists, dancing dresses, etc., and I made \$20.00. The foreigners didn't buy a hat. Shoes didn't sell well in either place, though we had a raft of them. "Lynne" Brown sent a big box, mostly of shoes, from Sweet Briar."

Hold a series of subscription dances, if possible in your own homes, or have a progressive dance, going from house to house. If your chapter is composed of several small towns close together, each town might take its turn holding the dances.

#### "A Mile of Pennies"

#### Norfolk

Wellesley girls have raised money by miles of pennies. Coin holders, with places for twelve pennies, can be bought from Dennison and Co., New York, at \$7.50 per thousand, or if any chapter wishes to try out the system with a smaller number of slips, one or two hundred can be obtained from Edith Hyslop, 508 Graydon Avenue, Norfolk. Va., for 75 cents per hundred (not including postage). Each girl is given a certain number of strips to fill, and at stated times the money is collected. No one misses the pennies, and friends are glad to help, so that the "mile of pennies" is soon complete. For state chapter or towns in which it is hard to raise money by other means, the "mile of pennies" is a godsend.

#### Chain Letters

Laura Portmann gathered in over \$75 00 by a chain letter. She writes: "With the chain letter we reached many of the girls who didn't know anything about the Fund. I think several ought to be started among the old girls." This is a splendid plan, and we recommend that it be tried on a more extensive scale this year. Only have a distinguishing mark, in order to avoid confusion in case several are started.

## The Academy

Sweet Briar has opened this year with a difference in organization that perhaps a good many of you do not realize. For the first time the college and the preparatory department have been separated and organized as distinct schools. The younger girls who are doing college preparatory work are in the Sweet Briar Academy, with Mrs. H. N. Hills as their Principal. Mrs. Hills is a graduate of Wellesley and for a number of years had charge of Harcourt Place Seminary in Gambier, Ohio. Under her able direction the Academy is rapidly developing and doing splendid work in preparing students for Sweet Briar College, primarily, though its work is recognized by all eastern colleges of first rank.

For a long time there has been some confusion in the minds of outside people as to how girls could be students at Sweet Briar College and yet carry on work of the most elementary high school grade. So, in justice to the college, whose work is

recognized everywhere as being strictly that of a first-grade college, it has seemed best to separate the two departments and organize the college and the preparatory school independently. With this reorganization, the college can stand more for itself and its students be allowed the privileges accorded more mature students, which has heretofore been impossible.

Then, too, the Academy will benefit equally by the change. Formerly, when the academy students ranked as sub-freshmen in college there was necessarily very little part that they could have in student activities, as most all organizations were for college students alone. The Academy with its own athletic and dramatic associations, current events club, and separate publications offers the opportunities so much needed for developing school spirit, initiative, and a sense of responsibility to the school among the younger students.

The bulk of the news will be found in the list of addresses, which has been completely revised up-to-date, with the exception of about six cases, in which we have been unable to get information. New addresses, marriages and deaths are recorded there in condensed form, and those who can read between the lines will find a wealth of interest.
