


The educational responsibilities of the home, church and school must always be faced on a partnership basis if we are to continue to graduate well qualified citizens from our schools.





CLASS HISTORY

Twenty-four little people started out on the bottom of the big team of Sheffield High School as Freshmen. Mr. Hartley was their coach and Rodney B. Card was their manager. During the first quarter their able teaching, plus the further guidance of Mrs. Shook, Mr. Spriggs, and Mrs. Leafgreen, enabled the following to progress to the second quarter of the game as Sophomores: Walter Hewins, George Ball, David Kirchner, James Lecakes, John Somes, Fred Van Alstyne, Robert Ball, Douglas Dean, Robert Radocchio, Shirley Curtiss, Isabel Gilligan, Shirley Golden, Priscilla Hall, Elaine MacKenzie, Janet Markham, Mildred Martin, Pauline Mintz, Claire Warner, and Eleanor Holcomb. Steve Delmolino and Arthur Brazee didn't attend practices, became discouraged, and had left the game early in the first quarter.

In the second quarter Mr. Card left them and Miss Mary Larkin took over their management. Also the guidance of Mrs. Shook was replaced by Mr. Theodore Williams, who became a capable referee.

They lost three good players when George Ball, Douglas Dean, and Robert Ball failed to report for practice at the beginning of the second quarter. During this quarter the group's knowledge continued to increase. Great was their sorrow when during this peroid Pauline Mintz and Mildred Martin lost interest in the game and departed from S.H.S.'s team. This left only seventeen, of whom all would be Juniors when they reported after the half.

When the first practice of the third quarter commenced, we found Mr. Bruce Martin had taken over Mr. Spriggs place. Fred Van Alstyne had moved and gone to play on Regional High School's team. Now there were only sixteen, and these happy and proud players were promoted to first team as Seniors upon the beginning of the fourth quarter.

As the players returned to the floor to play this last quarter, they learned that Coach William Hartley, whom they loved so well, had had to leave them, and that Howard V. Hennigar had taken his place. Mr. Hennigar soon proved to the team, however, that he was an able and progressive coach. Miss Rita Hannigan replaced Mary Larken, but Referee Mr. Williams changed over to manager of the team.

The last quarter began and the team managed to keep their score well ahead. Just before the automatic time out, Mr. Richard Mather came out on the floor to replace Referee John McCann. There are only a few seconds of the last quarter left now, and we, James Lecakes, Santi Gulotta, John Somes, Leonard Stewart, James Carter, Joseph Rueger, Harley Conklin, Dave Kirchner, Elaine MacKenzie, Isabel Gilligan, Shirley Golden, Eleanor Holcomb, Janet Markham, Claire Warner, Shirley Curtiss, and Priscilla Hall, though we have worked hard to attain our goal, will somehow regret the ringing of the bell to end the game--though we have won.' For then we will have to leave the confusion of this game for the greater confusion of the world today, where we will no longer have a coach or referee, but only the principles taught by them and our conscience as our guide.

At the end of this game the team of 1945-1949 will have a score of sixteen, which will be added to the previous scores in the History of Sheffield High School, as Alumni.

To Lenny, we give this shovel and rake So a good caretaker he will make, For Oaklawn Inn he plans to go To rake the lawns and shovel snow.


