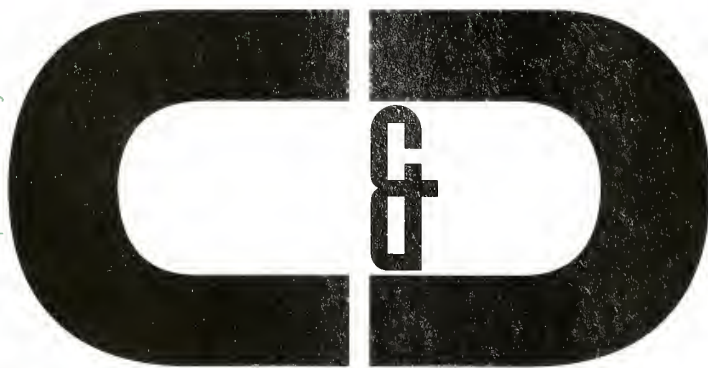

Prescribers by 2003

Pharmacists across the UK could be prescribing inhalers and HRT for patients by 2003 following the publication of a consultation paper on supplementary prescribing this week.

The document, MLX 284, issued by the Medicines Control Agency and the Department of Health, sets out proposals for pharmacists and nurses to prescribe "as part of an agreed clinical management plan for an individual patient", along with the necessary amendments to the POM order.

The proposed changes will apply throughout the UK, but the extent to which supplementary prescribing is adopted within the NHS in Scotland, Wales and Northern Ireland will be up to the devolved administrations.

The proposed changes would also apply to healthcare organisations outside the NHS, such as private hospitals.

For the purposes of the consultation, independent prescribers will be doctors or dentists. They will have discretion over what medicines they allow supplementary prescribers to supply. Supplementary prescribers will be pharmacists or nurses, able to prescribe after treatment has been initiated by a doctor. Independent nurse prescribers will be able to become supplementary prescribers.

Supplementary prescribing will be of most benefit to patients with specific, non-acute medical conditions (eg asthma, diabetes) or health needs (eg anticoagulation, hormone replacement therapy or prophylaxis against coronary heart disease). However, the MLX adds that the proposals are not intended to restrict supplementary prescribing to specific clinical conditions or medicines, with the exception of Controlled Drugs.

Jim Smith, chief pharmaceutical officer for England, said: "The proposals will improve patients' access to the medicines they need and make the best use of pharmacists' skills. This development is a key part of *Pharmacy in the Future*."

The NPA's Collette McCreedy said: "Any pharmacists, irrespective of the sector they

work in, should have the opportunity to demonstrate competency to prescribe."

She does not see the perceived barriers for community pharmacists in prescribing as an issue. "Separating prescribing and dispensing responsibilities is unnecessary because there are two healthcare professionals with responsibility for prescribing. Strong audit controls should be in place and changes in prescribing will be fed back to the original prescriber."

With regards to accessing patient records, she said: "Hand-held patient records is one answer. Records could also be included in the original care plan drawn up by the GP and the pharmacist."

Nurses and pharmacists will need to complete specific training before being able to prescribe. This will be planned with appropriate professional organisations. It is envisaged that nurses will begin training by the end of this year and pharmacists will start early in 2003.

Independent prescribers will also have to undergo "brief preparation" before entering the prescribing partnership.

Supplementary prescribing rules

- Patient safety should be paramount.
- The patient agrees to the arrangement.
- There should be benefit to the patients and NHS.
- Good communication between all prescribers and access to the patient's health record is essential.
- It should support, but not replace, multi-disciplinary care.
- Both the independent and supplementary prescriber will need preparation before entering a prescribing partnership.
- Prescribing and dispensing responsibilities should, where possible, be separate in keeping with the principles of patient safety and governance.
- The clinical management plan must be a written plan, relating to a named patient and their specific condition, agreed and signed by both prescribers.
- The plan must also specify:
 - the range of medicines that may be prescribed by the supplementary prescriber
 - the range and circumstances within which the supplementary prescriber can vary the dosage, frequency and formulation of the specified range of medicines as appropriate
 - when to refer back to the independent prescriber
 - known sensitivities to particular medicines
 - the date the arrangements for supplementary prescribing start and when they should be reviewed
 - that both prescribers share access to, consult and use the same common patient record.

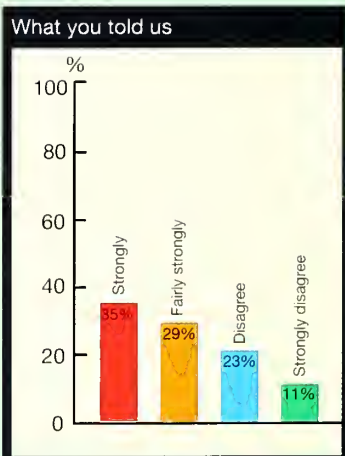

CCA raises public profile

After 104 years the Company Chemists Association is moving from under Boots' wing in Nottingham to new offices in Milton Keynes. Within the next few weeks it will also be advertising for a full time chief executive and a head of marketing and operations.

The move signals a higher public profile on professional issues for the CCA, which represents the larger national pharmacy multiples (with the exception of the National Co-op). The Association has four places on the 26-strong Pharmaceutical Services Negotiating Committee, but until now has lobbied mainly behind the scenes for members.

Digby Emson, Boots pharmacy superintendent and CCA chairman, said: "The appointments will enable the CCA to deliver its vision of a positive profile for community pharmacy. We want to achieve this by working closely with pharmacy

bodies, the NHS, the Department of Health, and the pharmaceutical industry."

The CCA is keen to stress that, while members will still compete in the commercial environment, it sees benefits in co-operation and collaboration on professional matters. This applies to relations with other national organisations and at local level with contractor representative bodies.

Mr Emson said the CCA will seek to drive the community pharmacy agenda with key players, including health professionals and patient groups. It will also draw on expertise from its members to respond to announcements at national level.

CCA representatives on contractor bodies in England, Scotland and Wales will be briefed via a new CCA website. Its primary focus initially will be within Great Britain, but may extend to Northern Ireland in the future. The new head of

marketing and operations will have a specific brief to support LPCs.

"We will be creating partnerships with the industry, both for the development of responses to consultations and to explore opportunities to develop local services which will benefit community pharmacy," said Mr Emson.

The CCA is also seeking to increase membership by looking at different membership options, he said, but would not be drawn on what that might mean for the newly formed Association of Independent Multiples.

The CCA is made up of Boots The Chemists, Lloydspharmacy, Moss Pharmacy, Sainsbury's, Safeway, Superdrug and Tesco. Membership requirements are "flexible" as far as branch numbers go, but all members claim to have a national presence and to be part of public limited companies.

Department of Health statistics for all prescriptions dispensed in community pharmacies during 2001 show 587 million prescription items dispensed at a cost of £6.1 billion.

The largest category was BNF Chapter 2, cardiovascular drugs with over 145m items dispensed at a cost of £1.46bn.

Pharmacies get security money

Croydon Local Pharmaceutical Committee has successfully bid for money to install security measures in pharmacies.

Twenty five pharmacies that are part of the supervised methadone and needle exchange schemes have been awarded £35,000.

Croydon Drug Action Team gave the money to the LPC following a spate of robberies in local pharmacies (*C&D*, March 16, p5).

The allocation of the money, £1,400 per pharmacy, has been based on the cost of installing three security measures recommended by the local crime prevention officer:

- a drop safe with time-delayed locking mechanism
- smoke notes which burst, releasing a red dye and coloured smoke – an electronic trigger sets them off 10 seconds after they leave the shop
- raid camera – a digital recording device that gives a sharp photo image of activity within the shop on a 15-minute cycle.

Andrew McCoig, secretary of the LPC, said it was still trying to find funding support for the remaining pharmacies in the area.

NORTHERN IRELAND

PSNI to consult over rise in retention fees

The Pharmaceutical Society of Northern Ireland will consult members next week over proposals to raise the annual retention fee from £120 to £170 from June. The pre-registration fee is set to go up to £300.

The proposed increases follow last year's decision to employ extra staff at the Society's Belfast office to help roll out the PSNI's continuing professional development plans for pharmacists.

It had been hoped that the Department of Health would fund the two positions – one full time CPD and one part time pre-reg facilitator – but the PSNI's application has been turned down.

However, the DHSSPS is helping the Society with the new regulatory powers it will need to remain an effective professional regulator. It has also supported the Northern Ireland Centre for Pharmacy Postgraduate Education in developing a CPD strategy to support the provision of health and personal social services.

At its meeting in January, the PSNI Council unanimously agreed it needed higher fees to cover the costs of

additional resources for the office.

The mechanism for increasing the registration fee has been complicated by devolution. All changes in statutory rules must now go to the Health Committee at Stormont. The DHSSPS will no longer act without the PSNI making a business case.

It is uncertain whether the process can be fully completed before June, whether the PSNI can collect a higher retention fee in anticipation of the increase being approved, and whether its programme will have to be delayed.

PSNI fees last went up in 1998.

The business case

The PSNI needs to develop and extend its regulatory framework to take account of the modern principles of self-regulation and clinical governance. This requires strengthening activity around professional quality and integrating it into the regulatory framework.

In 2002 the PSNI wants to focus on:

- The pre-registration training year. Demands from tutors and students have increased beyond current resources.
- Implementing a CPD strategy. The Society's CPD strategy is set out in its paper, *Vision 2020 - The Next Steps*.

The RPSGB has a similar programme and there is reciprocal registration between the two bodies.

To maintain this it is essential that PSNI develops in tandem to maintain parity.

The PSNI has costed the programme at £277,000 over three years.

The Council therefore is seeking a 42 per cent increase (£50) in retention fees to £170 for 2002 and a 350 per cent increase (£215) in the pre-reg fee.

RPSGB

Branches urge RPSGB to retain May date for BRM

Three branches of the Royal Pharmaceutical Society are calling on Council to reverse its decision to hold the 2003 Branch Representatives Meeting at the British Pharmaceutical Conference in September.

The Moray & Banff, South Cheshire and Shropshire branches, in a motion to this year's BRM on May 16, say it should continue to be held at Lambeth in May on the day after the annual general meeting.

This allows more distant branches to be represented at the AGM and is important to the democratic process, the branches believe.

For the second year running the Hull Branch is calling on the Society to provide a more transparent set of accounts no less

than 20 days before the AGM.

The Branch was "not convinced" by the reasons for turning down last year's motion – that internal committees oversee financial activities, and that Council provides no less information than is the minimum required by Companies House.

"The RPSGB is not a limited company ... it is a membership organisation and ordinary members are entitled to receive a full and clear account of the way their money is being spent."

Glasgow Branch wants the Society to establish standards for registration of technicians "as a matter of urgency" which meet the needs of the different British healthcare systems.

Master and slave scheme is tested in Fife

A repeat prescribing and dispensing scheme involving a GP practice and a neighbouring pharmacy in Fife went on test this week. It could be rolled out across Scotland.

Under the scheme the GP generates a master script and a number of slaves. GPASS, the IT system used by Scottish GPs, has been modified to produce either 28- or 56-day scripts for periods of up to six months.

The program also produces a patient summary – a brief medical history – which the patient will agree to pass to the dispensing pharmacist.

While initially paper-based, the scheme can be adapted for the electronic transfer of prescriptions, with the slave script

being sent to the pharmacy electronically.

Patients are tied to a single pharmacy for repeat medication. The slave scripts are dispensed as required and sent monthly to the CSA, while the pharmacy keeps the master, signed by the GP, as its authority to supply. The last script dispensed is the master, at which point the patient has to return to the surgery for clinical review.

Alison Strath, chairman of the Royal Pharmaceutical Society in Scotland – her pharmacy is running the trial – said some pharmacies rely on 28-day scripts to keep volume high enough to remain viable. However, if the scheme goes national and the prescription volume grows, it will have an impact on the global sum.

She hopes the scheme will be rolled out to other sites in Fife within six months, and is meeting chief pharmacist Bill Scott and Hamish Wilson, director of primary care at the Scottish Executive, next week to discuss the plans.

CONTRACT

New contract set for 2003

Next year pharmacists will see a new pharmacy contract that will change the way they are remunerated, according to Lloydspharmacy.

Andy Murdock, its director of pharmacy, said he had been “reliably informed” that this year would be the last that pharmacists would be paid under the “old” system. Lloydspharmacy and other pharmacy bodies are talking to the Government about the new contract’s structure.

Mr Murdock, speaking last Sunday at Lloydspharmacy’s professional practice conference, said the contract was one of a host of challenges pharmacists faced.

The relationships between pharmacy’s representative bodies need to be ironed out, he said. “While we have tensions between the professional bodies, the Government won’t listen to us. We’re our own worst enemies.”

How pharmacy businesses are managed has never been so important, as script volumes continue to rise while pharmacists’ reimbursement falls in real terms. Pharmacists are expected to accept this “unsustainable” situation, take on more healthcare services and deal with an NHS which is constantly being restructured.

NICE backs NRT and Zyban for committed quitters

The National Institute for Clinical Excellence is recommending the use of nicotine replacement therapy and Zyban (bupropion) for smokers committed to quitting.

Smokers who have set a “target stop date” should be prescribed enough NRT or Zyban to last a further two weeks. Normally this will be two weeks for NRT and three to four weeks for Zyban because it should be taken for about a week before the stop date.

Smokers should only be given a second prescription if they can show they are still trying to stop smoking, said NICE.

In deciding which therapy to prescribe, GPs should take into account:

- intention and motivation to quit and likelihood of compliance
- availability of counselling
- previous usage of smoking cessation aids
- contra-indications
- the smoker’s preference.

If smokers are unsuccessful in quitting, further courses of treatment should not usually be

prescribed within six months, said NICE. NRT and Zyban are among the most cost effective of all healthcare interventions, doubling the chance of a smoker quitting, said Anne-Toni Rodgers, NICE’s executive director.

Implementation of the guidance will cost the NHS £20 million-£50m a year. However, smoking-related diseases, which kill 300

people in the UK every day, cost the NHS £1.5

billion annually, said NICE.

Zyban has been linked with over 50 deaths and 7,000 suspected adverse reactions in the UK. But Dr Yvonne

Greenstreet, vice president and medical

director of GlaxoSmithKline, said: “There is no evidence of a direct causal link between Zyban and the reported deaths. Most of the deaths were due to underlying smoking-related conditions.” She stressed that GPs should consider the context of the disease along with the treatment benefits and side effects.

Reclassification for medicines

Only medicines classified as having General Sales List status within their marketing authorisation will be available as such, according to legislation passed on April 1.

Statutory Instrument 2002 No 933 is the start of enactment of MLX 279, which aims to simplify the reclassification procedure for Prescription Only Medicines to Pharmacy medicine or General Sales List status (C&D, 2001, Dec 22/29, p8).

The SI allows the legal category to be included within the marketing authorisation and so removes the need to amend legislation to move medicines from one category to another.

Any change in legal category to a product brand is only applicable to the product that is subject to the application for switching. Category changes would not apply to other product brands with the same ingredient.

Medical devices poorly regulated

Medical devices including pacemakers, replacement hips and intra-uterine devices may pose a safety risk because of weak systems for regulating products across the European Union, says *Health Which?*

The Medical Devices Agency is responsible for enforcing the EU Medical Devices Directive in the UK which requires all products to carry a “CE” mark. However, manufacturers can choose which notified body awards the mark. There is concern that manufacturers may shop around to find a less stringent notified body.

The April edition of *Health Which?* criticises low levels of safety and efficacy evidence required for the approval of some products.

Generic firms refute size of NHS fraud estimates

Sources within the generic industry have disputed how much generic manufacturers are alleged to have defrauded the NHS, insisting that it could not be anywhere near the £400 million reported in the national media.

Last Wednesday police and officials from the Serious Fraud Office raided six generic companies suspected of overcharging the NHS.

Department of Health figures confirm that the two products' sales during the period under investigation - January 1 1996 - December 31, 2000 - were worth £364m, which means the alleged overcharge would have been on a much smaller scale. One industry source reckoned the overcharge, if it did exist, could only be around £20m.

However, the scale of the two products' sales also reveal the impact of the 1999 price rises, which are the subject of a separate inquiry by the Office of Fair Trading.

In 1999 the net ingredient cost for warfarin doubled from £6.9m to £14.2m while the NIC for penicillin-based antibiotics rose from £56.6m to nearly £70m.

The Pharmaceutical Services Negotiating Committee said it was encouraged by the assurances of the chairman of the British Generic Manufacturers Association, John Beighton, that the incident



would not create shortages.

Sue Sharpe, the PSNC's chief executive, said no pharmacy owners were involved.

Meanwhile the SFO's investigation appears to have surprised many players in the industry, a lot of whom are astonished by the five-year period being scrutinised.

"If people thought that there was a collusion, why have they waited so long - or is this just part of the political weaponry ahead of the budget?" said a senior industry source.

But the Department of Health said it was "determined to fight fraud not only within the NHS but against it".

The DoH's directorate of counter fraud services had initially referred the case to the

SFO for further investigation.

The generic manufacturers involved have denied that they have broken the UK law when pricing generic penicillin and warfarin.

Ivax Pharmaceuticals UK said it was company policy to comply with all applicable laws and regulations. The two products' sales, it said, represented less than 1 per cent of its global turnover.

The company has written to all its customers to keep them informed of developments.

Generics UK said it was not aware of having done anything illegal but would co-operate fully with authorities to resolve the issue as soon as possible.

Meanwhile, Goldshield Healthcare's shares, which had been suspended for two days after they fell more than 30 per cent, were reinstated on the London stock exchange. They are currently trading at 377p.

Goldshield denies it has ever conspired to defraud the NHS, adding that it had never sold penicillin-based products. Its warfarin sales during the five-year period were worth £6.9m - 3.7 per cent of its total sales.

Nucare finds no reason to end control of entry

Nucare members see no benefits patients if current control of entry regulations are abolished, reports Nucare survey.

Early results - the survey is still receiving replies - suggest that practically all the respondents believe:

- patients are not losing out under the existing arrangements (97 per cent)
- the current system does not make it any more difficult for patients to get prescriptions (98 per cent)
- control of entry has not diminished the quality of advice being given by pharmacists (94 per cent).

They do question the economic reasons for changing the existing arrangements. Ninety-five per cent feel that the current system does not stifle competition.

Furthermore, 82 per cent believe that new pharmacies can open if they are in the public interest.

Mahesh Shah, Nucare's sales and marketing director, said: "So far the overall response is in favour of the current system. What we are now trying to arrange, with the Office of Fair Trading, is to carry out a consumer survey to assess what patients think of the service they get."

Following the OFT's announcement that it was looking at how pharmacy contracts are being awarded, Nucare sent out supplementary questionnaire to members in February (see *C&D* February 23, p10) along with the OFT's questions.

The response rate so far is around 10 per cent and Nucare is encouraging more members to return the questionnaire.

300 redundancies as SSL moves HQ to London

Up to 300 redundancies are expected at SSL International as it restructures its European operations. Half of the redundancies are expected to be at the company's UK locations.

SSL wants to reduce its European overheads by

eliminating over-staffing and duplicated activities.

The measures include the closure of SSL's current head office, Toft Hall, in Cheshire. The group's new head office will be at existing premises in London.

Manufacturing jobs will be

unaffected by the proposed redundancies. However, logistics and manufacturing processes will be addressed as part of an ongoing review by the SSL board.

The company said some staff from Toft Hall would be relocated

to other offices in the North West and the new London headquarters.

The restructuring is expected to result in one-off costs of £15 million during 2002, but the board expects to save around that amount every year.

Checking the heart at Portsmouth City Council

Lloydspharmacy is to screen the hearts of up to 9,000 employees at Portsmouth City Council under a new Corporate Healthy Heart Check scheme.

The chain will run a clinic at the council offices as well as involving three of its branches in the area to deal with the anticipated demand.

The agreement between Lloydspharmacy and Portsmouth City Council entitles every member of staff to a free heart check each year for the next three years – a service which normally costs £20 per test.

However, Portsmouth City Council will pay a “considerably discounted rate” for the service. Discussions are understood to be ongoing with other corporate bodies to extend the service.

Pharmacy 2U first to transmit live prescriptions

Pharmacy2U is the first consortium to transmit live prescription data electronically between a GP surgery, a pharmacy and the Prescription Pricing Authority.

The pilot currently involves the King Edward Road surgery in Northampton and P2U.

A second surgery is due to go live this week, followed shortly by a pharmacy owned by Co-op Healthcare (formerly Norwest Co-op). The pilot will eventually be rolled out to approximately 22 pharmacies and 40 surgeries.

“All the pieces of the jigsaw puzzle are now in place. This is a real milestone as we have been

working towards this for the past 12 months,” said Daniel Lee, P2U’s managing director.

The PPA said the transmitted prescriptions have been processed through its systems and will be included in March’s payment once the pharmacy’s paper prescriptions have been processed.

It added that more pharmacies are expected to come online once they have completed acceptance testing, which is due to be carried out during April and May.

The PPA is still working with the other two consortia, TransScript and Flexiscript, to test their systems before they can transmit live messages.

Pls a concern for ABPI

The UK’s trade balance in pharmaceuticals has grown 21 per cent to £2.9 billion, according to the Association of the British Pharmaceutical Industry.

Exports rose 27 per cent to £9.3bn while imports grew nearly a third to £6.4bn.

But Dr Trevor Jones, the ABPI’s director general, said there were still causes for concern.

“Parallel importing remains a matter of serious concern to the UK-based industry, and it is essential that action is taken at European level to curb trade that brings so few benefits yet does so much harm to the economy.”

Wanless puts script charges under the spotlight

A radical overhaul of the prescriptions system – especially exemption rules – has been called for in the Wanless report published with the Budget.

The recommendation by former bank chief Derek Wanless was unwelcome news for health secretary Alan Milburn, who has tried to avoid the political risks involved in ending some of the exemptions.

The Chancellor accepted the main Wanless recommendations, and is certain to seek action on prescriptions in return for pouring billions of extra taxpayers’ money into the NHS.

The report said: “The present structure of exemptions for prescription charges is not logical, nor rooted in the principles of the NHS.” Wanless recognised the political sensitivities and the

limited amount of money which might be raised by ending some of the exemptions, but he urged the Chancellor to take the opportunity in the future “to think through the rationale for the exemption policy”.

Currently 50 per cent of the population is exempt from the prescription charge. As a result, 85 per cent of prescription items are dispensed free to patients.

MORI research shows that those liable to pay, one in 20 fail to get all a prescription dispensed and a further one in 50 fail to part dispensed because of cost.

“On the other hand, some of those who are exempt could afford to pay and are unlikely to be deterred by the level of charges, especially as they are capped by pre-payment certificate arrangements,” said the report.

Comment

from the Editor



After the drama of the raids on six generic manufacturers last week there will be a long wait before the next instalment. Despite extensive newspaper coverage, little extra information emerged after the SFO's initial announcement of a major investigation into a suspected conspiracy to defraud the NHS in relation to prices charged by suppliers for penicillin and warfarin between January 1996 and December 2000. The inquiry will look at production, supply and pricing. Generic manufacturers have dismissed as a gross over-estimate the idea that the alleged fraud might amount to £400 million. The NIC for the two drugs supplied on prescription in England during the five years in question amounts to only £364m (see p10). Quite why the case was referred to the SFO by the DoH Counter Fraud Directorate has also been a source of speculation, as has the timing of the raids. Price fixing and cartels are more usually the preserve of the OFT: the SFO has never targeted a suspected cartel before, so once again its credibility is on the line. With last week's second reading of

the Enterprise Bill, creating a new offence of engaging in cartel activity, a tougher line on anti-competitive behaviour is forecast. Is this case being used to demonstrate that? With the focus in this week's budget on the NHS, the Government will also be keen to demonstrate that the phrase "rip-off Britain" will not apply to healthcare. Who knows what the SFO will make of the marketing and pricing practices of the generics industry; the consistent inability of the *Drug Tariff* (ie the NHS) to reflect realistic market prices for generics; and the arcane discount clawback which attempts to set right the *Tariff*'s inadequacies. With the generics sector distorted by the shortages which struck in spring 1999, demonstrating price fixing looks like being a tough task.

Sid Dajani goes public on the cost of being an RPSGB Council member

The cost of representation

In line with the wishes of many Royal Pharmaceutical Society members and some on Council who have argued for greater transparency, I am releasing details of my expenses and attendance fee claims for 2001, for the second year running.

Encouragingly, the disclosure of the Council's expenses is just the beginning and, hopefully, other disclosures will not be long in coming.

It is important that we are as open as possible to all our stakeholders. Needless to say, such accountability should not just be taken as a "fait accompli" and I would welcome any questions or suggestions, even though my expenses have been authorised by the Director of Resources and audited.

Since April 9, 2000, the daily attendance rate increased from £48 to £160 a day. Council

members are also reimbursed for first class train fare, hotel rates up to £136 a night, subsistence, and daily locum expenses up to £160 (if applicable).

Mileage rates for those with cars over 2,000cc are 63p (petrol) and 36p (diesel), and for those engines between 1501-2,000cc, 45p and 25p.

The criteria state: "A car may be used in exceptional circumstances when other modes of transport are not feasible, less economical, excessively time consuming or render the journey inconvenient." Being a carer for my father, who is disabled after a stroke, means I use a car perhaps more than some other Council members, since I need the flexibility. It saves carer costs and I spend less time in hotels.

I have separated the list of my activities under three headings, to clarify where money was spent.

The details for 2001 are:

- attended 18 local branch or regional meetings, or other events representing the Society
- attended 12 Council meetings
- attended 26 special Council

meetings, committee meetings, strategy days etc. Sometimes two were attended on the same day.

My total expenses, including accommodation, motor and other travel expenses came to £11,390. Attendance fees (which are taxable) for going to Council meetings amounted to £7,680.

My total reimbursement due 2001 was £19,076.

A corporate card was used whenever possible and the receipt for every transaction were submitted with each claim.

While I was reimbursed for total of 48 days on Council business, there were approximately 28 days for which I was not reimbursed. For example, days when travelling back the next after branch talks, preparation time reading papers or preparation presentations, or reserved day aside for Council business which were subsequently cancelled.

INDUSTRY VIEWPOINT

Does the NPA want a closed shop?

Is the National Pharmaceutical Association abandoning its traditional role as the progressive voice of pharmacy and slipping instead into becoming a reactionary and increasingly conservative organisation?

A key Government strategy for the new NHS is to make medicines more accessible and encourage patients to treat themselves for minor ailments.

The opportunities for pharmacists have been well publicised, yet in two recent initiatives the NPA seems to be opposing changes that could benefit community pharmacies.

The NPA's official position of opposing the open display of Pharmacy medicines has caused dismay among leading healthcare manufacturers who, through the Proprietary Association of Great Britain, have supported this initiative, and on whose support the profession relies.

The NPA's position is in direct

contradiction to the retail organisations which are leading the tests on open display of P medicines, many of whom are themselves NPA members.

Michelle Styles, the NPA's head of information, has positioned the Association in opposition to the flow of P to GSL switches by encouraging pharmacists to take actions to "stem the flow".

Yet the P to GSL switches should not be looked at in isolation. What the Government is encouraging is a seamless flow of POM to P to GSL switching as part of the drive to make patients move towards self-medication.

The aim is to make safer medicines more accessible. The major professional bodies should support, not oppose, this aim.

SFO raids challenge generic market assumptions

The news that the Serious Fraud Office is investigating six generic companies on suspicion of overcharging the NHS for penicillin-based antibiotics and warfarin came as a bit of a shock (*C&D April 13, p6*).

My initial reaction was based on the assumption that the generics market is fiercely competitive and has always delivered low cost products to pharmacists for supply to the NHS. That the arrangements for payment via the *Drug Tariff* do not respond quickly to market prices and require retrospective adjustment via the graduated discount scale is a perversity of the system rather than an opportunity for fraud.

However, it seems that this investigation dates back to the era of category 'D' and the shortages of a few years ago. It was certainly a period when the competitive market became distorted, fuelled by the category 'D' endorsement facility that allowed contractor pharmacists to claim the actual price they had paid for difficult to obtain generic drugs.

At the time many prices did rise astronomically and there were questions as to how this sudden shortage in the market could have occurred. The blame was attributed to the withdrawal of Regent Laboratory's manufacturing facilities by the Medicines Control Agency, but the knock-on effect

did appear disproportionate to the cause.

At the time I heard rumours that some manufacturers of generic drugs were attempting to establish a baseline price of at least £1 for every patient pack sold but, although there were wild fluctuations in prices, this level was never attained and certainly does not apply today.

This SFO investigation may be merely another installment in the saga of the Government's attempts to root out fraud throughout the NHS. If it unearths genuine skulduggery, then those responsible should be held to account. But in its zeal to stop wrongdoing the Government often risks alienating those pharmacists in the Health Service who do their best under what they perceive as unreasonable political pressures.

Successive administrations may not have acted towards pharmacy in a legalistic fraudulent manner but, when compared with the treatment enjoyed by other health professions, the governance standards applied by Government to pharmacy have fallen well short of equitable.

If the complexity that is pharmacy's relationship with the NHS is to be ruthlessly policed (and this investigation into generic drug companies may be but one example), then the Government must also deliver on its own promises of propriety.

Oxygen on-line – what a rave!



Providing oxygen is a vital service that I willingly undertake. However, I resent the lottery that determines how much I will be paid. This year the budget for fees has been set at the same level as last so, in effect, the Department of Health is saying I should now be paid less for the same work. Where have I heard this before?

I know my local pharmaceutical committee will fight my cause and the final settlement with the health authority may not be as gloomy as my prediction but, in order to supplement my income, I should perhaps be expanding my oxygen services to other client groups.

I understand from my rave-mad (but otherwise startlingly normal) niece that flavoured oxygen/air mixes administered through an intranasal tube are now all the rage in the club scene. Peach, jasmine and strawberry are but three available flavours.

I am uncertain of the legalities or ethics of administering oxygen other than on prescription. These minor considerations aside, why did I not think of it first! I am told the going rate for jasmine heaven is £5 for two minutes, or £10 for five. I could turn this to my advantage. Out with the nappies from the stockroom. A quick coat of paint, some fairy lights and on-line oxygen. Mix in some aromatherapy oils, re-employ Dotty as bouncer and I am ready to go!

Vantage goes on Health Watch

Vantage has launched a comprehensive patient care scheme centering on medicines management.

To be piloted initially by 25 pharmacies, Vantage Health Watch will offer patients a range of services with the first 12 planned including:

- blood pressure monitoring
- scheme to monitor and implement appropriate prescribing
- home delivery and support service for older people
- smoking cessation service
- smoking cessation service for chronic lung disease patients
- diabetes awareness and risk assessment service
- weight management service
- warfarin screening service
- coronary heart diseases prevention service
- older people prescription review service
- diabetes prescription review service.

The services have been developed to meet the NHS Plan, which requires every pharmacy

to provide a medicines management service by 2004. The programme's dedicated sales team, provided by Ceuta, will select pharmacists to spearhead the campaign. They will be visited weekly to ensure they are participating fully. There is a commitment to spend at least five hours each week undisturbed on medicines management. Services will be marketed locally with tailored promotional material.

While AAH will make the final decision on who participates, the sales team is recruiting the pilot pharmacies. Selection criteria include suitable premises, appropriately trained staff, time commitment and the "right sort" of personality in the pharmacist. Excellent, active relations with local GPs and other health professionals will be expected, and pharmacists will also have to commit to CPD.

Dr Mandeep Mudhar, AAH Pharmaceuticals' marketing

manager, acknowledged that pharmacists may be unwilling to become involved in medicines management because of workloads but, he warned, change is coming, and the profession must prepare for it.

The services being developed will shadow the requirements of the various standards, such as National

Service Frameworks, being adopted by the NHS. But rather than wait for NHS funding, Vantage believes the public will be prepared to pay.

"Waiting for government to stump up the cash is not the way forward," said Dr Mudhar.

"Large sums are not going to flow from the government now or in the future, and what is forthcoming will go to those who can prove their commitment."

Health Watch will mean that pharmacists will build up a data bank that will demonstrate the value that pharmaceutical care can have.

Steve Dunn, managing director of AAH Pharmaceuticals, has called on pharmacy to unite to respond to the changing influences affecting the profession.

Government, structural evolution and consolidation within the pharmaceutical industry are all having an impact on the provision of community pharmacy services, he said.

'Unite to face change'

Government is trying to cut costs and recover money from the distribution chain. At the same time it is trying to push healthcare delivery out into the community. This will force pharmacists to become primary healthcare service providers, and will nudge a more patient-responsible pharmacy profession into the front line.

Meanwhile, the independent pharmacy sector is in decline compared to the multiple sector. The most dynamic forces are the emergent multiple chains with a "grocery buying" philosophy. The remaining independents are increasingly re-focusing within buying groups.

And the pharmaceutical industry is continuing to merge and consolidate while

concentrating production and distribution on a global basis. "They are under consistent pressure to deliver improved shareholder value. This means new super-pharma businesses are emerging which currently struggle with supply chain management."

Combined with a growth in prescription numbers and fall in percentage gross profit on dispensing, Mr Dunn said the current remuneration system for pharmacy contractors is not working.

Pharmacists must address this issue before Government imposes its own solution, he said. Pharmacy also has to demonstrate it can add value with its services. "Until pharmacists can do this, the

Government will consider them a necessary evil, rather than an integral part of healthcare."

He also suggested an over proliferation of pharmacies – should the control of entry regulations be revised – would adversely affect the quality of services. "The Royal Pharmaceutical Society needs to represent pharmacy with one voice. Pharmacy must speak with one voice. In order to mitigate risks, pharmacy needs to sort out its act on professional representation."

Despite the doom and gloom, there are positive ways forward, and ways that will demonstrate the value that pharmacy can add to healthcare, he argued.

Face the winds of change

Pharmacists must consider what will happen to them and their businesses when the "big bang" of NHS reforms impacts, warned Ian Bray, AAH Pharmaceuticals' marketing director.

"You have two simple choices: adapt and survive, or stay the same and die out," he said. While the high street has changed in recent years, pharmacists have retained a presence because the Government, up to now, has seen community pharmacies as a safe and effective way of distributing medicines. "But do not be complacent," he warned.

"There are powerful winds of change heading our way," he said, alluding to Harold Macmillan's 'Winds of change' speech made in Cape Town in 1960. "Our strategy is to be open to new ideas and adopt

some revolutionary concepts."

This includes the introduction of medicines management schemes. Medicines management has been defined as "seeking to maximise health gain through the optimum use of medicine". It encompasses all aspects of medicines use, from prescribing to the ways in which medicines are taken or not taken by patients.

This could be put more simply as making sure patients get the right medicines in the right way at the right time for the right reasons, said Mr Bray. There is a need for such an initiative, since £1 billion is wasted annually on medicines each year.

Medicines worth £100 million are returned to pharmacies annually, and 10 per cent of hospital admissions are linked to problems with medicines. "The

costs to the NHS will double in the next 10 years if nothing is done," he said. "The Government wants you to be active in managing people's health. But if you do not get involved, someone else will."

Patients need encouraging to participate in healthcare

Patients should be encouraged to be more involved in their healthcare, argued Professor Roger Walker, director of pharmaceutical public health at Gwent Health Authority.

"We are still working towards getting the public involved in decision-making in the health sector. But we know they benefit far more when they do participate," he said.

Politicians also 'like' public health, he suggested. "If you do not engage with public health medicine, you do not engage with politics at the top table. Public health is the way you can engage with politicians."

Pharmacy over a long period has an established track record in public health. "You are involved in public health; you have to harness that and bring it together for your own and the public's benefit," he said.

He defined pharmaceutical public health as "the application of pharmaceutical knowledge, skills and resources to the science and art of preventing disease, prolonging life, promoting, protecting and improving health for all through

organised efforts of society."

As such, "we need to minimise uni-professional thinking and shift the focus from the individual, the wants of the articulate and those who have resources," he said. There needs to be more emphasis on defining, addressing and monitoring the real health needs of the population.

"There are clear barriers we have to overcome," he said. "There's little co-operation between sectors of the profession. We have a uni-professional culture that

understates partnerships."

There is also little knowledge of pharmaceutical needs, and there is a lack of data to monitor health needs, health patterns, and health-seeking behaviour.

"We need to use what data we have better," he argued. Better use could be made of sales data, for example, for monitoring cold and flu incidence, or head lice outbreaks.

In terms of sexual health, pharmacists could have a greater role as teenagers see pharmacists as approachable. But pharmacists should be more open to ways of getting advice across.

Citing a Welsh poster campaign, Prof Walker was concerned that pharmacists would be happier to display a factual but dull poster than to display one which was humorous and eye catching.

"Pharmacists can feel uncomfortable, although the students like the posters," he said.

"When you display posters, who are you trying to engage with? If you are trying to engage with the young, think things through from their perspective."

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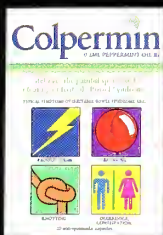

Moss offers food intolerance tests

Society seeks script price review

The Royal Pharmaceutical Society is calling on the National Assembly for Wales to review its prescription charges.

"The current charging system is at variance with the Government's stated policy of equal access for all to healthcare systems," said Andrea Robinson, chairman of the Society's Welsh Executive.

"There remain people on low incomes who are not exempt from prescription charges and for whom a prescription charge of £6

is not affordable," she added.

All patients under 25 are exempt from charges, which are set at £6 for the second consecutive year in Wales compared to £6.20 in England, Scotland and Northern Ireland.

The value of prescriptions written in England and dispensed in Wales has risen from £744,721 for the quarter ending June 2000 to £848,914 a year later.

Last month the Society called for a review of prescription charges in England.

How to handle stress

Objectives

- To revise physiology and symptoms of anxiety
- To know when anxiety should be treated
- To understand the drugs used in its management
- To be aware of dependence issues
- To be aware of alternative approaches

Anxiety is extremely common. It has been estimated that there are between 50 and 120 presentations per 1,000 patients per year. Over 7 per cent of people who consult their GP do so for a mental illness.¹

Anxiety may be an element in many other consultations and it is perhaps important to decide when anxiety becomes a problem.

Anxiety is a response to stressful situations and is probably suffered by most people at some stage in their lives. Patients tend to seek help when the symptoms of anxiety start interfering with their life. These symptoms can include irritability, restlessness, sleep disturbance and difficulties with concentration.

An overactive autonomic nervous system can produce several somatic responses including dry mouth, tachycardia, palpitations, tremor, bowel and sexual disturbances. It is these symptoms that commonly prompt a patient into seeking help. Anxiety often co-exists with depression so it is important to assess whether there is any mood disturbance, feelings of worthlessness, apathy, poor concentration or thoughts of self-injury or self-harm.

Mild anxiety is a common occurrence with examinations and life crises, and these symptoms may be short-term. However, chronic anxiety can be an ongoing problem in patients whose personalities have not developed sufficiently to cope with life's stresses and uncertainties. It is important to consider that other psychiatric illnesses, as well as depression, may be lurking beneath the surface and to consider concurrent drug and

alcohol abuse. The patient may have tried to mask or control his or her symptoms with excessive use of these agents, but they may simply be exacerbating the condition.

Having recognised that anxiety symptoms are significantly troublesome to interfere with daily life, what are the treatment options available?

Benzodiazepines

These drugs can be effective as anxiolytics, although there has been a tendency in the past to prescribe them to almost anyone with a stress-related illness or unhappiness. Benzodiazepines should be limited to the lowest possible dose and for the shortest duration of time. The Committee on Safety of Medicines suggests that benzodiazepines should be used only for short-term relief of symptoms, in anxiety that is severe, disabling or subjecting the individual to unacceptable distress, possibly occurring in association with insomnia.

Benzodiazepines should only be used as hypnotics when insomnia is severe, disabling and subjecting the individual to extreme distress. Dependence is particularly likely in patients with a history of alcohol or drug abuse and in patients with marked personality disorders.

Benzodiazepines have been erroneously labelled minor tranquillisers. This term is inaccurate and misleading, not only because they differ in chemical make up from the major tranquillisers but also because they can be highly addictive and cause significant side-effects.

The choice of benzodiazepine depends on the required duration of action (long or short) and whether it is being used as an anxiolytic or hypnotic (see table). The shorter acting drugs have a greater risk of withdrawal symptoms. My personal preference is to use diazepam in the dose range 2-10mg three times daily for a couple of weeks and then try to reduce the dose over the ensuing two to four weeks. If I were looking for a hypnotic effect, I would probably use temazepam 10-20mg at night, although increasingly I am using zopiclone, which is a cyclopyrrolone. Although not a benzodiazepine, zopiclone works on the same receptor. It has a short duration of action and little or no hangover effect.

Substitutes

If the patient is experiencing excessive somatic symptoms of anxiety, such as palpitations and tremor, I would consider adding a beta-blocker. These drugs have different affinities for beta 1 receptors, found mainly in the heart, or beta 2 receptors found in non-cardiac tissue. The beta-blockers used in anxiety,

propranolol and oxprenolol are non-cardioselective.

It is important to find out if there are any reasons why patients should not take these drugs. In particular anyone with a history of asthma or obstructive airways disease, uncontrolled heart failure, marked bradycardia or hypotension and any degree of heart block should not be prescribed these drugs in primary care. If I prescribe a beta-blocker I usually use propranolol, starting with 40mg three times daily and sometimes increasing the dose to 80mg three times daily, providing there are no side-effects. These can include bradycardia and possibly postural hypotension, exacerbation of both intermittent claudication and poor peripheral circulation with cold hands, excessive fatigue and sleep disturbances, and impotence.

The advantage of beta-blockers is that they are non-addictive and can help patients who subsequently need to withdraw from benzodiazepines.

I rarely use beta-blockers first line, for example in calming nerves before a stage performance, but propranolol 40mg daily or 80mg daily by sustained release, is used in situational anxiety.

Buspirone

Buspirone belongs to a class of drugs known as the azapirones, which are chemically and pharmacologically distinct from other anxiolytics. It is thought to act at specific serotonin (5HT_{1A}) receptors. Buspirone has low dependence and abuse potential, but is licensed only for short-term use (two to three weeks).

Objective improvement can be seen during the first week of treatment, followed by a progressive rate of symptom response. Reports suggest that it produces less sedation and psychomotor impairment than the benzodiazepines. It does not appear to interact with alcohol or other CNS depressants.

Buspirone does not alleviate the symptoms of benzodiazepine withdrawal, so the latter should be withdrawn gradually. It is thought advisable to withdraw benzodiazepines before starting buspirone.

Counselling

This can be a very effective treatment for anxiety. Counselling can occur whenever a friend or parent offers advice and support. Many GPs are able to offer effective short-term counselling to patients they know well; they can listen, understand, provide sympathy, empathy and support. However, if longer term counselling is required, it may be necessary to refer to other agencies including psychologists and counsellors attached to the community mental health team.

A useful resource in our area is an anxiety management class, which concentrates on offering patients strategies to deal with anxiety provoking situations. Some practices have counsellors with formal training who offer short-term intervention. In our practice we have a counsellor who is able to offer up to eight one hour sessions and many patients find this resource valuable.

Exercise

There is a growing body of evidence that regular exercise is a valuable treatment.¹ Taking 20-40 minutes of aerobic activity results in improvement in anxiety and mood that persists for several hours. This can occur whether individuals have normal or elevated levels of anxiety.² There have been a number of theories as to how exercise may help and possible mechanisms may be:

1. Lower catecholamine

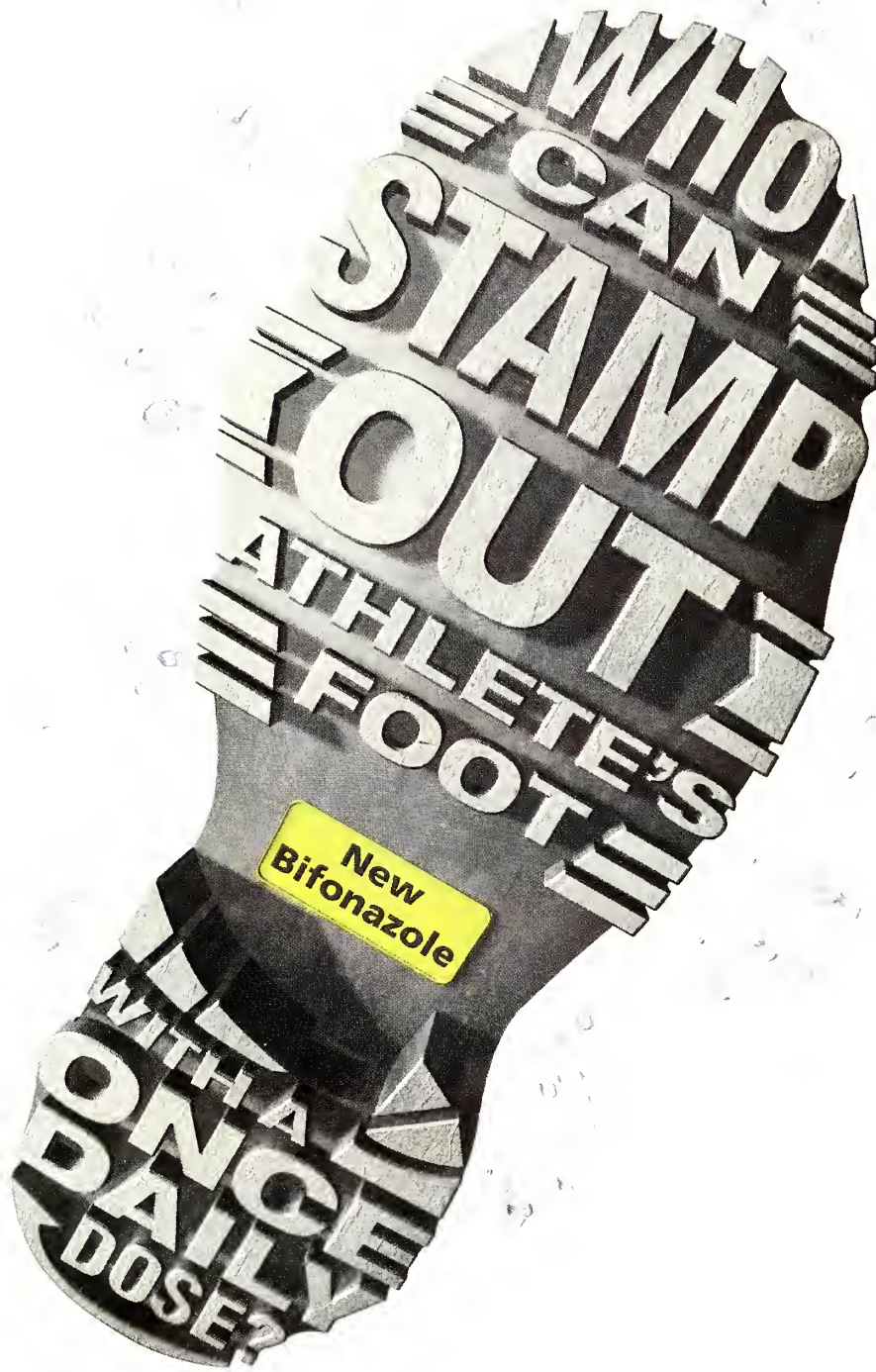

concentrations, which can be anxiolytic, after endurance exercise.

2. Measurable increase in circulating beta endorphins after vigorous exercise; these have been shown to be powerful analgesics.

3. There may be psychological factors, such as a sense of achievement in completing a period of exercise properly or simply having time out from a stressful situation at work. The exercise could take the form of a regular brisk walk or could be more formal in a gym, swimming, running or a team sport.

Management

Despite the CSM advice about short-term use, some patients do become dependent on benzodiazepines used to manage a generalised anxiety disorder. GPs will also have patients who have been on benzodiazepines for many years and this group may find it particularly difficult to withdraw from their treatment. It has been suggested that withdrawal should be gradual as abrupt abstinence may produce confusion, convulsions, toxic psychosis or a condition representing delirium tremens. The withdrawal reaction may occur some time after stopping benzodiazepines - anything up to three weeks - but can occur in a few hours with short acting drugs.

Some of the withdrawal symptoms can mimic the underlying condition that is being treated. It is recommended that benzodiazepines are reduced by about one-eighth of the total dose every two weeks and, if symptoms recur with dosage reduction, maintain the patient on this dose for a bit longer. It may take up to a year to withdraw completely off the drugs and patients can still exhibit withdrawal symptoms for several weeks afterwards.

Antidepressants

Antidepressants may be useful for patients with both anxiety and depression, as some antidepressants also have a

significant anxiolytic effect. These drugs are particularly useful if there is insomnia or other symptoms of depression.

The tricyclics are anxiolytic and also cause sedation. All have significant anti-cholinergic effects and should be used with extreme caution in patients with glaucoma, urine retention and prostatic hypertrophy. Significant risk of cardiotoxicity occurs in overdose (see *C&D, Pharmacy Update, January 12, p21-24*).

I would normally prescribe a two to four week course of antidepressant drugs then review the patient to check for any unacceptable side-effects. It is also useful to give a structured follow-up to patients with any mood disorder, particularly if there are thoughts of self-harm. I frequently refer patients on to the community mental health team.

The selective serotonin reuptake inhibitors (SSRIs) citalopram and paroxetine are licensed for the management of panic disorder. Although the

SSRIs are considered to be less sedating and have fewer anti-muscarinic and cardiotoxic side-effects than tricyclic antidepressants, they do have potential side effects ranging from nausea, vomiting, abdominal pain and diarrhoea to anorexia and weight loss. Some patients with anxiety experience an unpleasant and paradoxical hyper anxiety state. This has been linked to the surge of serotonin in the body - the serotonergic surge. This can be covered by a short-term prescription for benzodiazepines.

In the long term

My experience is that anxiety is a very common condition in primary care. Although ideally short-term treatment should be offered, many patients have chronic and disabling long-term anxiety that requires a multi-disciplinary approach. This includes both drug therapy and counselling. Regular consultations with the GP form an integral part of their long-term management.

3. Is one doctor (or practice) using a disproportionate number of these drugs? If so, what are you going to do about it?

4. Is there evidence (from the PMRs of the patients receiving these drugs) of CSM advice on short-term use being followed?

5. Is any doctor trying to control habitual use or misuse of these drugs?

To the above record keeping and analysis add any other factor you consider significant. For example, you may wish to add a reducing dosage regime for patients who have been taking a hypnotic for "years".

Nicorandil reduces coronary events in angina patients

Nicorandil has been shown to reduce major coronary events when used to treat patients with stable angina, according to a new study in *The Lancet*.

The Impact of Nicorandil in Angina (IONA) study was designed to determine whether nicorandil has cardioprotective properties as well as anti-ischaemic effects.

Over 5,000 patients with stable angina and additional risk factors

were randomised to receive nicorandil 20mg twice daily or placebo in addition to standard anti-anginal therapy. The average follow-up period was 1.6 years.

The rate of all cardiovascular events (CHD death, myocardial infarction, chest pain resulting in hospital admission) was reduced in the nicorandil group when compared to the placebo group (14.7 per cent versus 17.0 per cent).

The authors suggest that the beneficial effects of nicorandil may be through modification of the course of the underlying coronary heart disease.

However, the trial design did not allow the researchers to draw any conclusions as to the precise mechanism of this effect.

NICE backs spacer devices for asthmatics

The National Institute for Clinical Excellence is recommending that spacer devices be used with "preventer" metered dose inhalers as first line treatment in children aged five to 15 years with chronic asthma.

The guidance, issued last week, aims to maximise the benefits of preventative therapy and minimise the potential systemic absorption of corticosteroids.

For "reliever" inhalers NICE recommends that the choice of a particular type of inhaler will depend on the child's needs and preference.

NICE recommends that, in addition to therapeutic needs, the following factors should be taken into account when choosing inhaler devices:

- the ability of the child to develop and maintain an effective technique with the specific device
 - the suitability of a device for the child's and carer's lifestyle, considering factors such as portability and convenience.
- Where more than one device satisfies the considerations, then the device with the lowest overall cost should be chosen.
- NICE also recommends:
- individual practical training for inhaler use
 - monitoring inhaler technique and compliance
 - regular review of inhaler needs.

Women benefit from eating more fish

Higher consumption of fish and omega-3 fatty acids is associated with a lower risk of coronary heart disease in women.

The study, published in the *Journal of the American Medical Association*, was to correct the lack of data specifically relating to women as previous studies have only been carried out in men.

More than 84,000 women were followed up for 16 years and the more frequently they ate fish the lower the risk of CHD.

Although the women who ate more fish tended to have healthier diets and lifestyles in general, adjusting for this fact did not significantly alter the results.

The authors conclude that these findings lend further support to current dietary guidelines recommending fish consumption twice weekly for the prevention of CHD.



● Apparently healthy men, who have higher levels of the long chain n-3 fatty acids found in fish, have a reduced risk of sudden death according to a study in the *New England Journal of Medicine*.

As more than 50 per cent of all

sudden deaths from cardiac disease occur in people with no history, eating more fish or taking supplements would be a low-cost, low risk intervention, conclude the authors.

Drug benefit in dementia

Galantamine (Reminyl) has been shown to benefit patients with vascular dementia and patients with Alzheimer's disease combined with cerebrovascular disease.

Vascular dementia is the second most common form of dementia after Alzheimer's and there are similarities, both in terms of risk factors, vascular pathology and neurotransmitter abnormalities.

In a double-blind, randomised trial, 396 patients received 24mg of galantamine daily and 196 received placebo. Patients were assessed after six months using

the Alzheimer's disease assessment scale, cognitive subscale (ADAS-cog).

Galantamine showed greater efficacy than placebo on ADAS-cog and activities of daily living and behavioural symptoms. It was well tolerated.

The authors conclude that galantamine, being effective for dementia due to either cause, may provide a treatment option for patients in whom little pharmacological help has been available.

Study questions use of Wort

St John's Wort has not been shown to be effective in treating moderately severe depression, a new study has found.

In a double-blind, randomised, placebo-controlled trial, 340 patients received St John's Wort (900-1500mg), sertraline (50-100mg) or placebo.

After eight weeks patients taking St John's Wort or sertraline did not differ significantly from those taking placebo on the Hamilton Depression Scale.

However, sertraline was more effective than placebo on another scale, the Clinical Global Impression score.

St John's Wort is used to treat mild depression but the authors warn it should not be substituted for standard clinical care for major depression of moderate severity.

● A small study has shown that St John's Wort may reduce the effectiveness of chemotherapy drugs. The bio-availability of irinotecan was reduced by 40 per cent in those taking St John's Wort and this effect lasted beyond the three week interval period between courses of chemotherapy.

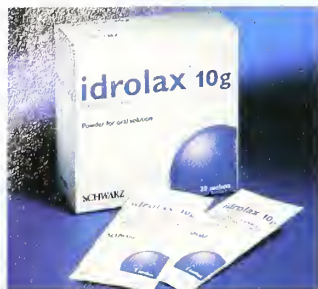

Steroids and emollients...

... have been the mainstay of eczema treatment for the past 50 years but a new treatment option is now available, as Gary Paragpuri reports

Topical immunomodulators (TIMs), the first new class of drug to be developed for the treatment of atopic eczema in half a century, have shown significant quality of life benefits.

Patients using TIMs report improvements in itchiness, pain, feelings of self-consciousness, being upset and sad, working, studying and sleeping. Patients are also highly tolerant to the side-effect profile of TIMs.

Protopic (tacrolimus) ointment, launched this week by Fujisawa as a Prescription Only Medicine, is the first TIM licensed in the UK.

Derived from *Streptomyces tsukubaensis*, it is thought to exert its effect by inhibiting the activation of T-cells and by inhibiting the release of mediators from skin mast cells and basophils.

Dr Malcolm Rustin, consultant dermatologist at the Royal Free Hospital, London, is currently investigating the immunopathogenesis of atopic eczema and the link with T-cell chemokines.

Tacrolimus ointment, he says, represents a major advance in the management of atopic eczema and an alternative to potent corticosteroids. For patients who require moderate to potent steroids or have facial eczema or dark skin, TIMs will probably be first-line treatment, and may eventually replace steroids altogether, he suggests.

Atopic eczema, an inflammatory skin disease with a chronically relapsing course, is characterised by episodes of intense pruritus, multiple lesions with erythema, erosions accompanied by serious exudate, lichenification, severely dry skin and a susceptibility to cutaneous infections.

It is estimated that 30 per cent of GP consultations and 10 to 20 per cent of dermatology referrals in the UK are due to atopic eczema and the incidence of the disease

is rising. Research from the American Academy of Dermatology suggests that it has increased by about 30 per cent in 30 years.

The prevalence is highest among industrialised Western countries, immigrants to those countries, urban areas and privileged socio-economic groups and smaller families. This suggests that changes in environmental factors and lifestyle may account for it.

The condition is currently managed with liberal use of emollients, topical and systemic corticosteroids, antihistamines and antibiotics.

However, patients who are difficult to manage, such as those with severe and long-standing disease or facial lesions, have limited therapeutic options. This is because of safety concerns over agents such as steroids, methotrexate, azathioprine or cyclosporin.

Studies into patients' concerns regarding

the use of topical steroids show that 72 per cent are worried about using them and 24 per cent admit to being non-compliant.

Protopic is licensed for the treatment of moderate to severe atopic eczema in adults and children aged two and above. It should not be used as first-line treatment but reserved for patients who are not adequately responsive to or are intolerant of, conventional therapies. It can be applied on any part of the body except mucous membranes.

A review of tacrolimus ointment in the *American Journal of Clinical Dermatology* suggests it can produce significant improvements in atopic eczema compared to placebo, with a relatively fast onset of action.

The review adds that short- and long-term monotherapy with tacrolimus is well tolerated by adults and children, and the majority of adverse events are localised, transient in nature and of mild to moderate severity.

Further studies in the *J. Am. Acad. Dermatology* have demonstrated that tacrolimus is safe and effective for long-term treatment in children.

Later this year a second TIM, Elidel (pimecrolimus), should be available from Novartis. It is derived from ascomycin, a substance produced by the fungus *Streptomyces hygroscopicus var ascomyceticus*. The Danish Medicines Agency has licensed Elidel for use in babies aged from three months.

A study presented in February at the annual meeting of the American Academy of Dermatology showed that 82 per cent of adults with atopic eczema experienced improvement on using pimecrolimus. On average itching eased within two days of beginning treatment.

“Itching is the most bothersome symptom of this disease and patients are looking for quick relief,” says the study's lead investigator Michael Meurer, professor of dermatology at the University of Dresden, Germany.

“In addition, many patients would like treatments that are free of the steroids currently prescribed, because they fear the side-effects associated with long term steroid use.”

To date, TIMs have demonstrated good side-effect profiles. A major plus is that both Protopic and Elidel do not induce skin atrophy, unlike corticosteroids. However, an article in *The Practitioner* warns that it remains possible that immunomodulators could reduce skin immune surveillance. The result could be a potential for increased rate of infection and skin malignancy with long-term use.

Developing the future

The Essex Community Pharmacy Practice Development Unit has been up and running for over a year. Heidi Wright, manager of the unit, outlines its progress to *Vanessa Sherwood*

The Essex Community Pharmacy Practice Unit was established by the two local pharmaceutical committees in Essex in response to the Government's pharmacy strategy *Pharmacy in the Future*.

ECPPDU supports the pharmacists who sit on the executive committees of the 13 primary care organisations in the county. Presently, all but one of the primary care trusts has a pharmacist on the executive committee. These "strategic pharmacists" are the lead pharmacists in the locality and are helped by support pharmacists. One of their responsibilities is to establish local pharmacy forums so developments in the PCO can be communicated to all interested pharmacists.

Heidi Wright spends half her week working for the unit and the other half working as a prescribing adviser for Southend PCT. "Before the unit was set up last February there were projects going on locally but there was nobody co-ordinating them or giving any practical support to anyone who was trying to develop a project," she says.

Her role is mainly to support the strategic pharmacists as "there is a lot of work for them with their day jobs, the strategic jobs and LPC work as well." The

strategic pharmacists are also normally the LPC representative for the area.

Mrs Wright tries to look ahead and see what projects will be needed, or could be developed to help PCOs meet national targets such as those included in National Service Frameworks. "I go out and make the connections, and try to find out where projects or services can be developed.

"It can work the other way round, though. Sometimes one of the strategic pharmacists will come to me and say: 'Our PCO is interested in a project. Can we do something around that?' and then I'll write something up."

For these projects Mrs Wright also prepares an executive summary so that any of the other strategic pharmacists can use the project for their PCOs. "These projects can be tweaked to fit locally and it saves having to do the same thing over again," she explains.

Mrs Wright says that working as a separate unit has helped in some ways. "You can go to a PCO and say we're not an LPC, we're a

stand alone unit. The separate identity is good." However, the majority of support for the unit comes from the LPC.

Mrs Wright, originally a community pharmacist, still locums in Essex. "I always try to do one locum a month," she says. However, she's keen to stress that providing locum cover is not part of her support role.

The ECPPDU works on joint projects with the pharmaceutical industry. "They are very supportive. Not only for money but for ideas as well. The industry has some good ideas that you can expand upon," she says.

However, there is no point in asking industry to get involved in local projects if their drug is not included in the PCO's formulary, she adds. There is still some scepticism, too, from PCOs about

the involvement of industry in local projects. "This is something the industry needs to address the unit may be able to help with."

Successful working with PCOs depends on your approach, says Mrs Wright. "I ask about the ideas and how they see pharmacy. Also what their aims and objectives are. I explain how pharmacy might be able to help them achieve those. NSF's are a priority because they are the 'must-dos' in the NHS at the moment."

Mrs Wright warns that there is no point in trying to get PCOs to do things that do not fit in with national targets.

Most PCOs in Essex have been very welcoming. "Nobody has turned round and said they don't want our help."

She admits the last year has been a learning curve but says her experience of working in Southend PCT as a prescribing advisor has helped.

"Working in a PCT means you now know who to target, where things fit in and how the system runs.

"The strategic pharmacists are beginning to learn things don't work as quickly as they'd like them to. The PCO doesn't say yes to a project today and it starts tomorrow," she warns.

Last summer, PCOs saw the pharmacy supply of medicines via patient group directions as expensive and this was a barrier to the development of projects (C&D, June 30, p4). Several months later she comments: "I think we might possibly have approached it in the wrong way. Now we are going to them and saying this project will help you achieve this target but it will cost you this much, rather than the other way round."

Another change in perceptions is that PCOs are just beginning to understand how pharmacists work and how they are paid. "Having pharmacists on the executive committee is helping to educate GPs about pharmacy."

Two PCOs in Essex have been accepted for the National Prescribing Centre's second wave of the collaborative medicines management pilots (C&D, February 16, p4): Castle Point & Rochford PCG and Southend PCT. Other PCOs there are preparing bids for the third wave.

Mrs Wright's work for the ECPPDU is focusing on local pharmaceutical service (LPS) contracts. "We're going to be asking PCO's executive committees what they want from LPS and how they see LPS fitting in with their local priorities." She is planning to develop generic LPS bids that can be used by pharmacists throughout the county but is not convinced that PCOs are familiar with the concept of LPS at the moment.

Mrs Wright believes the future for pharmacy lies in community pharmacists working together more efficiently. "It would also be easier if there was more national awareness of what pharmacy can and can't do and what the role of pharmacists is.

"I wish we were five years down the line when community pharmacy has its rightful place in primary care."

Projects

Those currently being piloted in Essex include:

● Four-way agreement

This covers the prescribing and dispensing of methadone and subutex. The aim is to encourage GPs and pharmacists to take on clients and reduce the pressure on drug units.

The client signs a contract to say they will abide by guidelines set down by the healthcare professionals. This helps to minimise disruption, violence and shoplifting.

● Daily dispensing

A pilot project in Southend for drugs that are abused eg benzodiazepines, dihydrocodeine.

● Pharmacy intervention project

This has been piloted in Southend, where it has made "huge" cost savings, and is now running in four other PCOs in Essex. The pharmacist makes simple interventions on repeat prescriptions eg branded to generic, dose optimisation or

inequivalence in quantities and notifies the GP and the prescribing adviser. The GP then actions the changes. Other PCOs have included it as part of the GPs prescribing incentive.

Other projects being considered by the ECPPDU include:

● Minor ailment triage project

Pharmacists will give out Pharmacy medicines for minor ailments free of charge to exempt. Pharmacists will be paid per consultation, fill out a "prescription-type" form, the patient signs the back if they are exempt. Non-exempt patients will pay the retail charge or the prescription fee, whichever is cheaper.

● One-off medicines management review in pharmacy.

● Nurse-led men's health clinics in pharmacies.

● Weight management clinics.

● PGD supply of emergency hormonal contraception for teenage girls aged 16 to 19.

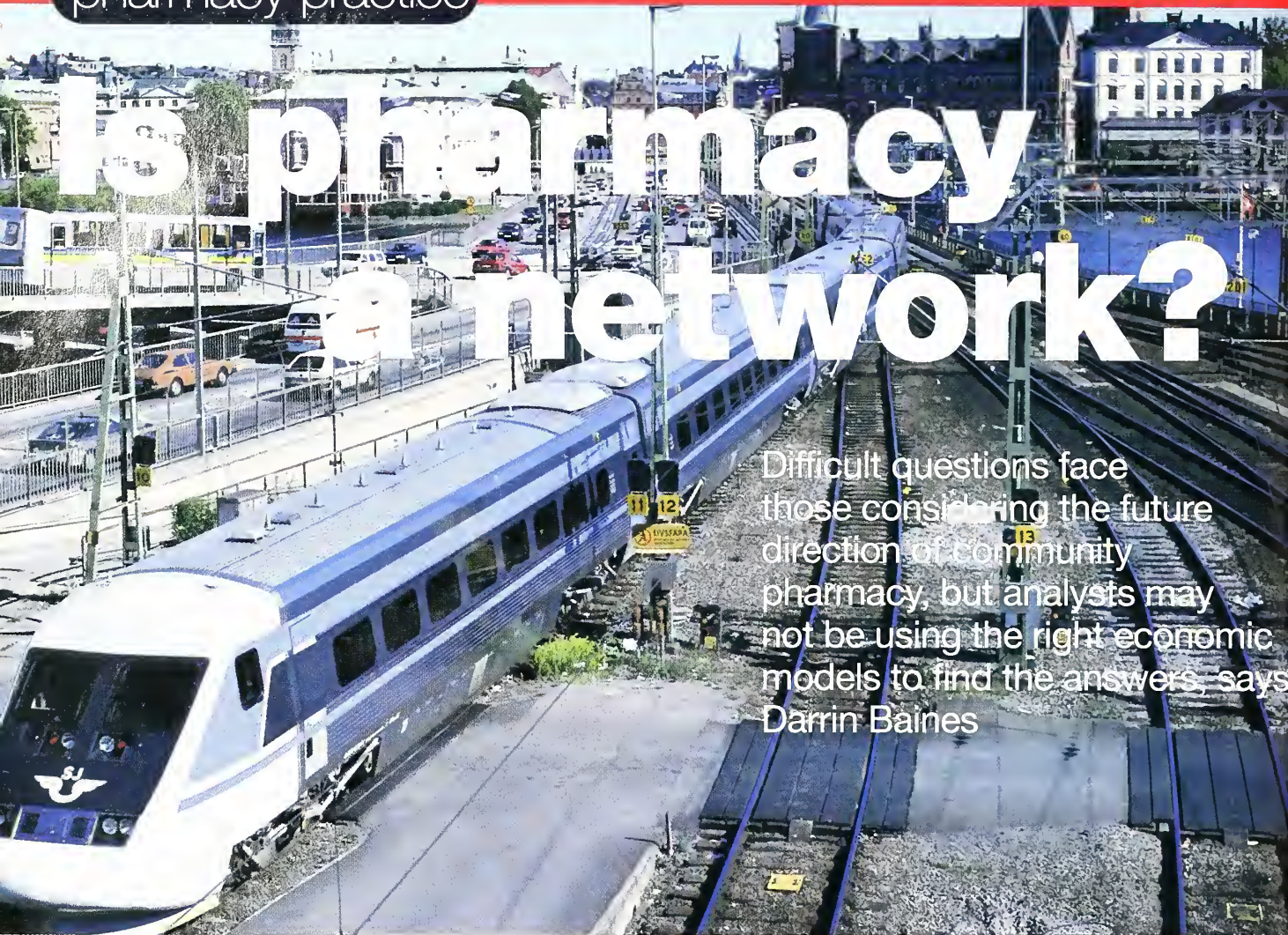

Is pharmacy a network?

Difficult questions face those considering the future direction of community pharmacy, but analysts may not be using the right economic models to find the answers, says Darrin Baines

Although most of us are happy to answer routine questions such as what's your name? or where do you work? we tend to avoid difficult questions which may lead to conflict.

For instance, sensible people do their utmost to dodge the following troublemakers: Who do you vote for? What religion are you? Are you a Tottenham fan?

Questions about politics, religion and football are not, however, the most threatening issues we can face. On the contrary, buried in our unconscious are questions so taboo we're often afraid to let them see the light of day.

Despite our efforts to remain in denial, however, there is a time in most of our lives when we're forced to address the underlying problems we'd rather forget.

Therefore, be warned – however much you try to fight your biggest anxieties, they're uncontrollable and one day they'll raise their ugly heads.

In recent years, the pharmacy profession has begun to ask an increasing number of questions about itself. At the simplest level, enquiring minds have examined a range of unthreatening issues such as: should we be called medicines managers? Should we work outside of our pharmacies? How much should we be paid?

At a deeper level, more controversial issues have been raised. Should the Royal Pharmaceutical Society be reorganised? Should we fight the Government over the dispensing fee cut? Should the profession continue on its current path of reforms?

Although these rouse strong feelings, there's

one question so fundamental, so divisive, that few pharmacists are brave enough to discuss it openly with their peers.

For those of you foolhardy enough to have read this far, the nightmare question is: should local pharmacies work together in a single network rather than as the unplanned, uncoordinated mixture of independents and chains operating today?

Despite efforts by pharmacy organisations and independent contractors to ignore this issue in the hope that it will go away, soon the increasing powers given to primary care trusts (PCTs) will make the question of the appropriate design of local pharmacy networks an agenda item few will be able to suppress.

From an economist's perspective, pharmacy negotiators and government analysts often apply the wrong economic models to the problems that they wish to analyse.

Economies offers many competing theories that endeavour to explain the operation of the world around us. Most people who study the subject tend to learn neo-classical economics, which views the economy as a series of markets in which rational buyers and sellers exchange goods and services at agreed prices.

Recently, this simple model has been challenged by economists who believe that an increasing number of the commodities we buy are "network products" produced in "network industries".

According to leading thinkers, telephones, e-mail, the internet, computer hardware, computer software, and video players, among thousands of other examples, are all network

products, while banking, airlines, legal services, on the other hand, are network industries.

To distinguish between the markets for normal goods and services (such as grain, baked beans or government bonds) and network products, an economist, Oz Shy, reported that things we buy in network markets have four main characteristics.

First, network products are usually complementary, compatible or based upon common standards. For example, compact disks are complementary with CD players, which requires them to be compatible and based upon common standards.

Second, networks have "externalities" in sense that the use of a network product by one person affects the use of that product by another. For instance, we wouldn't subscribe to a telephone network unless we could access other customers.

Third, joining a network often involves investment in hardware and software and time spent learning how it works. Consequently, once we regularly use a particular network product – such as Windows software – we

become "locked in", with significant "switching costs" involved in changing systems.

Fourth, most networks are expensive to establish, but relatively cheap to run. As a result, they usually offer significant economies of scale in production terms, as network products become much cheaper to produce per item when more and more people use them.

At present, some commentators argue that community pharmacy is a network. However, to be a "network" in the sense defined by economists, pharmacies have to be connected and standardised, with some form of lock-in and economy of scale.

On the first count, most pharmacies in this country are not directly connected with each other, even within the largest retail chains. In relation to the second characteristic, it could be argued that all pharmacies are standardised, as scripts can be cashed in any outlet and the PPA reimburses them all in the same way.

However, with the introduction of specialist medicines management projects and local pharmaceutical services (LPS), in the future there is the risk that no two pharmacies will operate in the same way.

Next, we could say that pharmacies have a high degree of lock-in by consumers because they have invested heavily in learning how to use their retail-based, community outlets. However, if we ignore the PPA reimbursement system, it is not currently necessary for pharmacies themselves to become locked into

any particular system (for example, a national patient record system) in order to provide services for the NHS.

Finally, the question of whether economies of scale exist is a moot one, as the NHS doesn't benefit if more prescriptions are dispensed (unless the dispensing fee is continually cut!) but some chains can cut their costs per item dispensed as their volumes increase.

In sum, community pharmacy could develop into a series of local networks, but it is not automatically clear what these networks would do and whether such systems would be desirable for patients, pharmacists or the NHS.

Network industries are not like normal industries. During the 1970s, they used to be called "natural monopolies" and economists suggested that a sole company should run them. As a result, governments used to transform network industries like railways, electricity distribution and telecommunications into big state monopolies.

During the 1980s, bad experiences of the inefficiency of large, nationalised industries led to calls for privatisation. Consequently, state networks were privatised, and new

companies were launched on the Stock Exchange.


During the 1990s, economic thinking on network industries began to change. On the one hand, the invention of the internet demonstrated that network-based companies could not operate successfully unless they captured enough customers, which many could only do by offering their services free.

On the other, problems with the railways, rising utility bills and falling profits amongst the listed telecom companies suggested that privatisation was not the answer to the problems faced in these industries. Consequently, the world became a very complicated place, and most network economists got themselves into a serious muddle.

In response to the failure of experience to support their grand theories, leading network gurus became defensive and, currently, the wise among them only advise governments of the following five things:

- don't try and create your own networks as we don't know the recipe for success
- standardisation should not be imposed but should evolve (or suddenly introduce) itself

- companies providing services via a network should not solely own the network
- fair prices are difficult to set on networks, with many only working if they are free
- companies should be charged for network "access" like train operators are charged for using railway track.

For pharmacists keen (or not so keen) on the development of local networks, these recommendations can be read in many ways.

However, what they really say is "be careful when designing local pharmacy networks, as we don't really know what works and what leads to dismal failure or outstanding success".

Soon, it is likely that PCTs will hold the money currently held nationally in the global sum for remunerating pharmacists, locally.

If such a situation arises, PCT managers, pharmaceutical advisers and local patient advisory groups will become increasingly concerned about the development and running of local pharmacies.

PCTs may consider the controversial issue of whether local pharmacies should be formed into a rational network, which avoids some of the current duplication of closely located outlets and improves access in under-provided areas.

However, when developing such networks, PCTs have the option of designing them to facilitate the:

- electronic transmission of prescriptions (ETP)
- purchasing of pharmaceuticals

- dispensing of drugs
- retrieval of patient information
- co-ordination of pharmacy outlets.

Given these possibilities, trust management should decide what tasks they wish local pharmacy networks to perform before they invest heavily in introducing their plans.

Although successful networks are difficult to design, some PCTs will decide to link local pharmacies in some ways. If you are confronted with a trust that plans to create a local network, here are five points (based upon economic theory) that you can safely make:

- pharmacy networks may become very popular with patients as NHS services can be used for free; however, many patients may not wish to register with a pharmacy as well as their GP
- many pharmacies are already networked for purchasing, and some for ETP; but there may be opportunities for promoting closer working

between outlets or sharing patient data between local NHS providers

- private investment, medicines management funds and the LPS scheme may be a good source of finance for the set-up costs of new networks; however, don't grant a monopoly any one company or consortia
- standardisation of networks is necessary; but PCTs should be careful when trying to impose standards themselves, particularly as this may exclude some local providers from joining newly-developed systems
- it is notoriously difficult to establish prices in networks because of economies of scale; therefore, it may be wise to charge pharmacists for access and have a separate schedule of fees for services they provide to NHS patients.

Given the difficulties involved in establishing successful networks, PCTs should pilot their plans first, and should be willing unsuccessful schemes to fail rather than struggling to support fantastic ideas that have no chance of working in practice.

Community pharmacy used to be a simple place. In the past, there was no medicines management, no LPS scheme, no clinical governance, no out-of-hours initiatives, no PCTs, no pharmaceutical advisers, no major reforms.

Once we've examined life's deeper issues, the world often becomes a harder place to understand. For pharmacies and PCTs, once the issue of developing local pharmacy networks is mentioned, there'll be no turning back.

Prevention is better than cure for actinic keratoses

We are pleased that you have highlighted the prevalence and potential danger of actinic keratoses (*Danger in the sun*, *C&D* March 23, p23-24) as these represent real concerns today.

As the manufacturers of Efudix 5 per cent cream (5-fluorouracil), we support the growing consensus that AKs should be treated, but we also endorse preventative strategies such as the use of sunscreens and sun avoidance. Some of our patient education material is designed specifically for this purpose.

We do, however, have some concerns about comments made relating to Efudix contained within the article.

To say that "the use of topical 5FU cream is currently restricted to dermatologist recommendation" is factually incorrect. We can confirm there are no such limitations on the Efudix licence. The product can be freely prescribed by any medical practitioner although it is usually initiated by a dermatologist.

Efudix is a topical cytostatic agent which affects both neoplastic and pre-neoplastic lesions without damaging normal skin. Efudix acts only on fast dividing cells and, therefore, has little effect on normal skin (*Goette, 1981*).

In some patients Efudix can produce a reddening where lesions were not visible but this is due to the action of the cream on the sub-clinical skin damage. Indeed, some authors have quoted that the inflammation is an essential part of Efudix therapy and is, in fact, a desirable action.

Also, one of the features of Efudix is that it rarely produces painful lesions and, therefore, analgesic therapy is not required.

The article includes a review of the recently introduced topical application of diclofenac (3 per cent)/hyaluronic acid (2.5 per cent) gel. The efficacy review focuses on two pivotal studies, where the active was shown to be superior to placebo.

However, no efficacy rates are quoted, unlike for Efudix. We

believe that to provide a balanced comparison, the efficacy rate of the new product should be stated.

Similarly, the article highlights the "side effects" of Efudix therapy, but comments that the side effects for diclofenac/hyaluronic acid gel are mild and transient, and rarely warranted withdrawal from the clinical studies.

However, in a study conducted in Australia and published in 1997 (*McEman & Smith*), 15/65 patients in the active treatment group ceased therapy due to local adverse effects (23 per cent)

Indeed, the SPC for diclofenac/hyaluronic acid gel lists the following as common adverse reactions; pruritis, rash, application site reactions, dry skin, parasthesia, erythema, hyperesthesia, oedema, skin ulcer, contact dermatitis, hypertonia, tingling, vesiculobullous rash, skin hypertrophy, eczema.

Six Ways to success

A dramatic incident spurred Badham Chemists to invest in a major refit.

Guy L'Aimable finds out why

When you're wondering whether to refit your pharmacy, a dramatic incident can concentrate the mind wonderfully.

David Badham, superintendent pharmacist of the Cheltenham-based chain Badham Chemists, remembers clearly what helped to sway his decision to refit the branch in Six Ways, Charlton Kings.

Before the recent refit, the branch's dispensary was at the back, which left the pharmacist relatively cooped up and unable to view the shop clearly.

"One Saturday some people came in with two black bags, casually filled them up and just walked out... at that time we had Sensormatic [security tagging] and CCTV, but it didn't stop those thieves," he says.

While they were later caught and prosecuted, the stolen goods were not recovered.

Mr Badham decided the refit was a priority. The Badham family, which founded the pharmacy business in 1940, agreed Six Ways needed attention.

The branch essentially consisted of four cottages joined together - and it showed because the "joins" had not been adequately hidden. Its last major refit was in 1986 and it was looking cluttered and "quaint".

The Badhams, after six months of planning, including trips to around a dozen pharmacies for ideas, broadly knew what they wanted to achieve:

- more open, professional-looking dispensary in the front of the branch
- less cluttered layout
- ergonomic design to maximise the potential of every aspect of the pharmacy.

Finding a shopfitter was not as straightforward. They turned down three recommended by UniChem and were wondering where to turn to next when someone introduced them to Mactra, based in Weston-Super-Mare.

Mactra gutted the pharmacy and started from scratch. To save costs, the Badhams poached the best metal fittings from their Bishops Cleeve outlet. "Metal fittings have many faults, but they're easy to clean and adjustable," says Mr Badham.

The refit began in August 2001 and was completed towards the end of October. Customers could, as a result, clearly see the new-look

dispensary when they came in. And, just as important, the pharmacist could see them because the dispensary's floor has been raised six inches. "People are therefore more conscious of me and [potential thieves] are far less likely to steal."

The dispensary sports a curved counter and continental drawers, which give Mr Badham a lot more storage space. "Every drug strength has got its own, dedicated compartment, which

helps reduce accidents," he says.

A suspended ceiling makes the pharmacy look more like a purpose-built outlet - not several "stuck" together - and the floor generally looks more open. Customers think the outlet has been expanded, when it was actually larger before the refit.

The Badhams spent around £75,000 on the refit, including £4,000 on an air conditioning system and £4,000 on CCTV. Fitting new electrics cost another £25,000. They saved about £20,000 using the Bishops Cleeve fittings.

The overall effect is a bit like Dr Who's Tardis. While the pharmacy looks fairly large from the outside, the exterior masks a labyrinth of eight consulting rooms upstairs, whose services include health and beauty clinic, chiropody, homoeopathy, acupuncture, hypnosis, reflexology and aromatherapy.

Meanwhile, the Alzheimers Society has its Gloucestershire HQ on the premises.

The shop floor, besides from display



considering the pharmacies only pay a nominal amount for the service, but believes it helps to boost pharmacy's image in the Cheltenham community.

The chain also offers monitored dosage systems to over 12 nursing homes.

Mr Badham is, understandably, extremely proud of Badhams staff training record. All the Six Ways employees, for example, have completed medicines counter assistant courses; most of its technicians have NVQ dispensing certificates, while the remainder are training for them.

Every month the chain runs a training evening and it harnesses the courses offered by manufacturers. Mr Badham particularly praises GlaxoSmithKline, which runs three training evenings a year on different therapeutic areas.

The chain has also developed a finely tuned programme to monitor and assess its staff training, which includes everyone, including Mr Badham.

All this effort has been recognised. In August 2001 Badhams retained its "Investor in People" certificate, 18 months after the award was first made.

Now with 56 staff, six outlets and a 11Q (including 3,000sq ft warehouse) in Cheltenham, what does the future hold? Badhams wants to acquire more branches around the Cheltenham area.

The chain also wants to roll out products for the disabled, such as walking aids.

Having recently celebrated 60 years in business, Badhams is laying the foundations for the next 60.

traditional pharmacy lines, has a few surprises. For example, it has a sizeable toys section. Mr Badham says this is a popular category which has immediate cash flow benefits. "When you buy a toy here, I'm putting money straight into the till - I don't have to wait a month to be reimbursed," he says.

Toys account for at least 10 per cent of Six Ways' OTC business. To further support this product area, Badhams recently launched a toy website: www.toysforkids.co.uk

Another unusual, although still lucrative, sideline is a recycling business which accounts for 10 per cent of the outlet's OTC sales. Medicines account for around 40 per cent, photoprocessing - around 12 per cent, homoeopathy - 10 per cent, baby care - 2 per cent and toiletries - 2 per cent. The outlet's NHS/OTC split is 0:30.

Six Ways' post-refit sales are up about 10 per cent, although Mr Badham is looking for a 10 per cent hike.

A successful pharmacy obviously depends on the quality of its staff and services - not just its range of lines.

Six Ways, along with the remaining five Badham branches, collects and delivers prescriptions for the elderly (particularly nursing homes), disabled, mothers/children. This service is available to its patients through a free

telephone number. And it handles several thousand scripts a month, with the help of two small vans, and Badhams even performs the same service on behalf of other local pharmacies - Mr Badham admits that's not cost effective,

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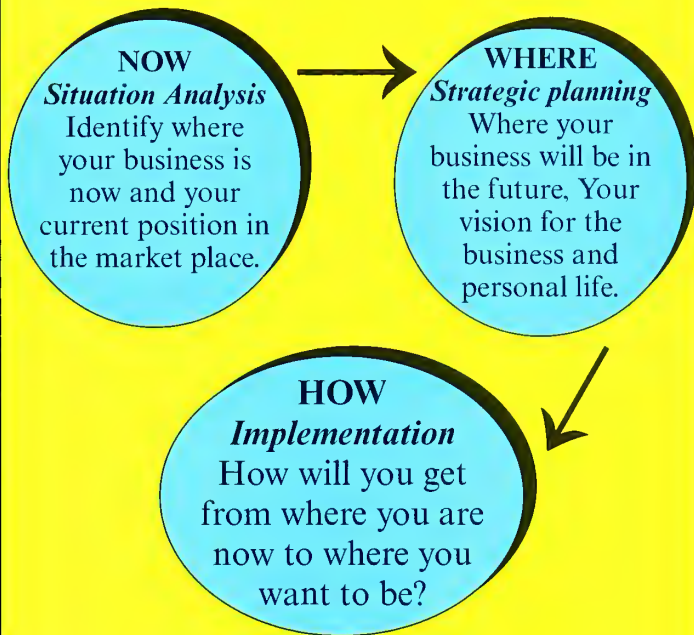

New stock line for hospital pharmacies?

Researchers at Vienna General Hospital have investigated whether newly available lightweight scooters can reduce exertion as

However, while a randomised cross-over trial involving 24 professionals in simulated in-house emergencies showed that after-scooting pulse rate was significantly lower than running, no difference was found in manual skillfulness and response time.

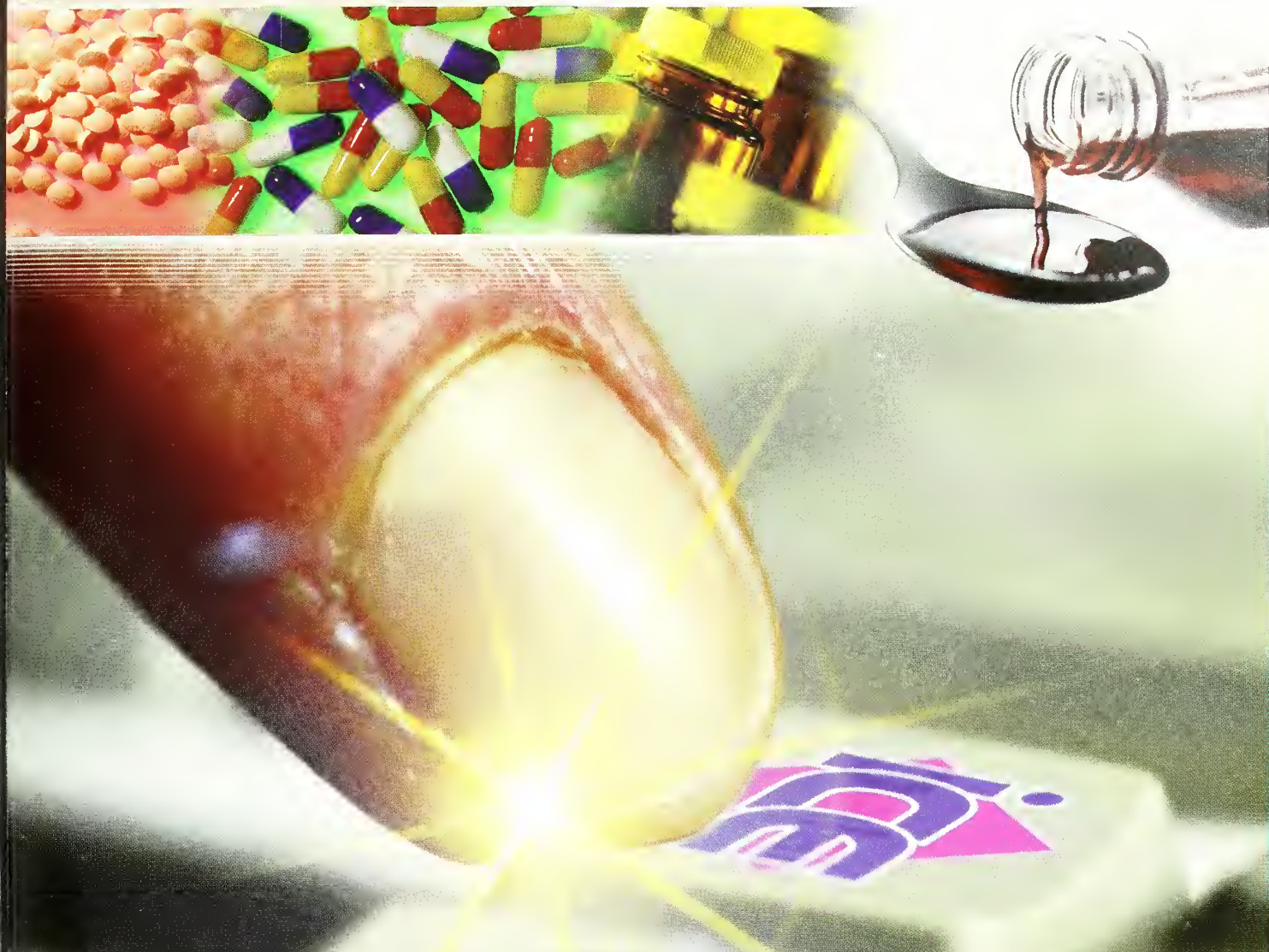

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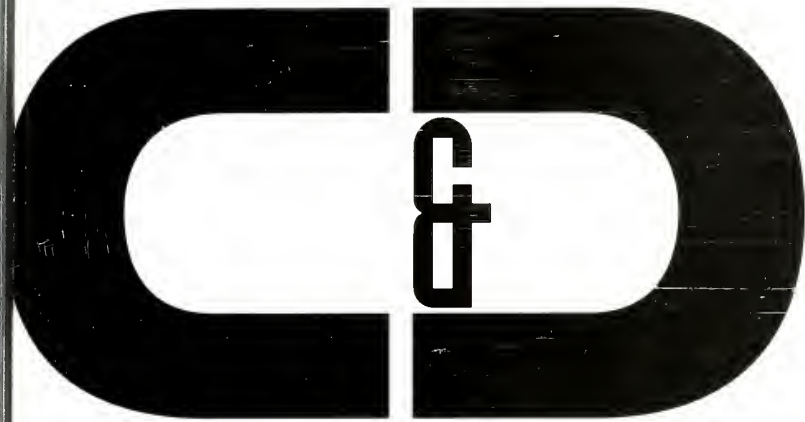
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Generics



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Who makes what: a unique source list

This C&D Generics Supplement not only lists the seven-digit PIP Codes, but also provides buyers with a unique source list for unbranded lines in pack sizes ranging from counter and dispensary to small-scale manufacture.

The list is arranged so that users can trace alternative suppliers easily, and at the same time have the relevant PIP Code for ordering and product identification. Entries are updated in the weekly Price List Supplement when changes are notified to C&D by manufacturers. C&D would be pleased to receive details in writing, of any packs not currently listed and for which codes are required.

As far as possible, the following compilation rules have been observed:

1. When the PIP code was converted from six to seven digits, a zero was placed before the old number, so retaining the existing check digit.

2. New PIP Codes are allocated randomly as under the six figure system and start with "1".

3. In the interest of continuity, priority in re-allocation of existing codes has been given to suppliers whose products carry the PIP Code on their packs.

4. Entries are generally under pharmaceutical name in order to bring all suppliers together for maximum buyer choice. However, counter packs will often be labelled with a popular synonym (eg Gee's linectus, Whitfields ointment). A cross-reference has been provided whenever products are shown under a synonym in suppliers' lists.

5. The "DT" symbol indicates Drug Tariff pack sizes.

The PIP Code

History

The benefits of a common code for pharmacy products have been long recognised, and over the years various working parties recommended the creation of such a code. In 1982 the National Pharmaceutical Association, in conjunction with Benn Publications (publishers of *Chemist & Druggist*), created the PIP Code in which they now hold joint copyright. This move had the support of several major pharmaceutical wholesalers.

Definition

The PIP Code is a product identifying number which has been allocated to goods distributed through pharmacies. All types of products are included and every pack size and colour or other variation has its own unique PIP Code number. The codes are published alongside each product entry in the *Chemist & Druggist* monthly Price List and weekly supplements, ensuring that a readily accessible and up to date PIP Code reference is widely circulated.

Initially, a six-digit code was chosen for ease of keyboard entry, but demand for the PIP coding system has necessitated the introduction of a seven-digit code. The last of these digits is a check digit (see p5) to minimise errors in recording.

Uses

The individual computer systems operated by manufacturers, wholesalers and retailers can be interfaced to recognise the PIP Code, which therefore provides a common language. This enables the retailer to

retain a freedom of choice of supplier and makes it possible for all involved in the distribution chain to benefit from streamlining their communications and merchandise handling systems.

Initially the PIP Code was used mainly as an interface between retailer and supplier for the purpose of placing and receiving orders, and virtually all pharmaceutical wholesalers can now recognise PIP Code when transmitted electronically. However, within retail pharmacy it is used increasingly for stock control and point-of-sale data capture. Most computer bureaux handle PIP Code data for clients, and many EPoS and dispensary systems make use of the PIP Code facility.

Computer users who choose to adopt the PIP Code as the primary code for their systems can avoid the time and expense of maintaining their own database. This is a considerable advantage to smaller businesses and pharmacies which have only limited clerical resources.

PIP Code principles

The Pharmaceutical Interface Products Code Regulatory Authority is the National Pharmaceutical Association, which takes advice from a technical panel representing retail and wholesale PIP Code users, plus *Chemist & Druggist* (who maintain the NPA's master PIP Code file).

The code is based on computer codes used to maintain the *C&D* Price Service but has been augmented to incorporate a number of product categories not considered appropriate for publication in the *C&D* monthly Price List (such as some watches, confectionery, stationery).

Code users may find the following points of policy helpful:

General

1. Manufacturer and distributor codes are published in Section 2 of the *C&D* monthly Price List.
2. Within the seven-digit PIP Code, codes have been reserved for users' own requirements (see para 12), but some wholesalers have allocated part of the series to "service" items such as bags and bottles. Retailers should obtain details of such allocation from their usual suppliers before using this series as dump codes etc.
3. Discontinued items are deleted from the *C&D* Price List upon notification by the manufacturer but remain on the master file for reference. If a product is re-marketed by the same supplier within that period, every effort is made to use its former code.
4. Where there are minor adjustments to pack sizes the existing code is generally retained to help retailers monitor sales performance. When the trade unit alters there is no requirement to issue new codes.
5. Both branded and generic product codes can be issued in advance of product launch with full security and confidentiality. The allocated numbers are reserved on the *C&D* computer pending advice of launch. Manufacturers of ethicals are particularly asked to use this facility so that codes can be notified on their standard letter to wholesalers. Intercontinental Medical Statistics (IMS) and *Chemist & Druggist* have available a joint form (approved by ABPI and BAPW) for prior allocation of both SDA and PIP codes. *C&D* has its own PIP Code allocation request form for use by manufacturers who do not require a SDA code.

Variants

6. Products which have no variants (colour, flavour, etc.) are identified by a separate "main" code for each pack size, representing singles wherever possible. This code appears immediately before the trade price column in the *C&D* Price List.
7. Where products include variants the "main" code does not appear - instead there are individual codes in italic type beneath the entry. However, the "main" code is allocated to a variant (e.g. neutral, normal, white, original, small etc) in order to reduce confusion for code users.
8. Where variants are added to an existing range the "main" code will normally be retained as the variant code for the original version. If this variant is subsequently discontinued its code will remain the "main" code but will no longer be published.

Special cases

9. PIP codes for unbranded products are shown in the *C&D* Generics Reference Book, distributed free to all *C&D* subscribers, additional copies are available on request. This supplement also lists wholesalers accepting PIP Code for ordering purposes, Generic Suppliers and Disallowed Dressings and Appliances section.

Note: Branded generics (ie. where a prescription calling for the brand name alone is sufficient to identify absolutely the product required) are to be found in the *C&D* Monthly P. L.



10. Certain surgical/sundries groupings are at present not fully covered by PIP Code. This applies particularly to products where the multitude of size and type variations is great and/or product developments are frequent, so that retailers are likely to rely on manufacturers' product number or full description for ordering from a wholesaler. However, some of the more standard and frequently prescribed brands and generic items (eg many NHS appliances) are coded in the *C&D* Price List and the Generics Supplement. With the introduction of a seven-digit PIP Code the product areas covered by PIP Code will be extended as soon as possible.

11. Products normally restricted to hospitals are indicated in the Price List with HP. Products are coded if manufacturers anticipate them being prescribed to out-patients.

12. Promotional, temporary and seasonal packs are not coded by *C&D* at the moment: retailers should use the 900-0000 series, and wholesalers use the 800-0000 & 700-0000 series. However, in the near future *C&D* will be coding (using the 500-0000 promotional and similar type products. These products will be listed in the monthly price list in a section at the back.

Check-digit calculation

The check (seventh) digit of the PIP Code is arrived at by the following calculation:

1. Take each digit starting with units position then tens position and so forth and multiply by 1,2,1,2,1,2, etc.
2. Add up resultants of 1. (Add the digits not the products ie if resultant is two digits then add them together).
3. Subtract the figure at 2 from the next highest multiple of 10.
4. Answer is the modulus 10 check digit. If no remainder then check digit is zero.

To check

1. Take each digit (including check digit) and multiply by 1,2,1,2,1,2 (starting in units position).
2. Total resultants as before.
3. Answer should be an exact multiple of 10.
