ANNUAL REPORTS OF THE MEDICAL OFFICER OF HEALTH AND PUBLIC
HEALTH INSPECTOR FOR THE YEAR 1967

Mr. Mayor, Alderman and Councillors,

I have the honour to present to you my Annual Report for the year 1967.

Population

The Registrar General's estimate of the mid-year Home Population was 4,170 which was a decrease of 150 from that of the previous year.

Live Births and Birth Rate

The number of live births was 91 (43 M. 48 F.) which was an increase of 16 over that of the previous year, and the crude birth rate was accordingly 21.8 after adjustment by the Registrar General's Comparability Factor which is computed from a population standardised for age and sex distribution, the rate becomes 29.85 and was appreciably higher than that of 17.2 for England and Wales.

Stillbirths and Rate

One stillbirth was registered during the year and the stillbirth rate was accordingly 11.0 compared with 14.8 for England and Wales.

Infantile Deaths

There were three infant deaths registered during the year due to:-

Prematurity - 3 days

Prematurity: Acute Hydramnois: - 1 hour

Asphyxia due to inhalation of stomach contents and early
bilateral acute broncho-pneumonia. - 9 months

and the infantile mortality rate was 33.0, compared with 18.3 for England and Wales. These figures, however, are too small for valid statistical comparison.

Maternal Deaths and Mortality Rate

This rate was nil as there were no maternal deaths which is a reflection of the high standard of modern obstetric practice.

Total Deaths and Death Rate

The total number of deaths from all causes was 39 (22 M. 17 F.) and the crude death rate was accordingly 9.4 which, after adjustment by the Registrar General's Comparability Factor, as for births, becomes 12.5 compared with that of 11.2 for England and Wales.

The chief group cause of deaths was those from natural causes amongst the aged, namely Heart and Circulatory Diseases and Vascular lesions of the Nervous System; of those there were 17.

Disease of the Coronary Artery of the Heart was the cause of 11 of those deaths. The deaths were in the following age-groups: 1 between 35 - 44; 1 between 45 - 54; 2 between 55 - 64; 4 between 65 - 74 and 3 over 75 years. The causation is still obscure, but the disease is a common cause of death in old age.

Cancer, as invariably in previous years, was the ^{second highest} cause of deaths - 8 in the following age groups; 2 between 55 - 64; 4 between 65 - 74 and 2 over 75 years.

Cancer of the Lung was the cause of 4 (M.) deaths: 1 between 55 - 64 years and 1 over 75 years of age.

The other causes of death were miscellaneous and there was no unusual mortality. There was no death from Infectious Disease.

The Infectious Diseases

Measles

Ninety-four cases were notified. There were no deaths, or serious complications. As stated in previous reports, this Infectious Disease should not now be statutorily notifiable, by reason of the inconvenience to Practitioners, to administrative staff and also of the unnecessary expenditure involved.

Acute Primary Pneumonia

No cases were notified. There were 2 deaths from secondary Pneumonias which are not notifiable. One death occurred in the 65 - 74 age group and 1 over 75 years.

Tuberculosis

No new cases of Respiratory Tuberculosis were notified. One case of non-Pulmonary Tuberculosis was notified and the patient was in the 25 - 34 age-group - the site was the Endometrium.

In conclusion, I would state that the Public Health of the Borough was satisfactory throughout the year and I would take this opportunity of thanking you for your support of and interest in the Department and also the staff for their co-operation and efficient service.

SOCIAL CONDITIONS

The ancient town of Lydd is situated in the extreme south-east corner of Kent, part of its western boundary coinciding with the boundary between Kent and Sussex. The Borough of Lydd, the most extensive borough in the County, comprises the old town of Lydd, together with the coastal areas of Dungeness, Lydd-on-Sea and Greatstone (part). Its 12,000 acres occupy the majority of the well-known foreland of Dungeness. The area is very flat, and visibility is good. Within the boundaries are to be found the best and the poorest soil formations - rich alluvium providing fattening pastures for at least ten sheep per acre, and vast areas of shingle which, although a very poor 'soil' does nevertheless support some forms of hardy plant life.

The Borough is predominantly agricultural in character, being chiefly concerned in sheep and cattle raising and arable farming. There are a number of extensive beach quarrying and crushing plants within the district. The War Department own approximately one-sixth of the Borough, from the west end of High Street down to the sea. Within it are Lee, Metford and Clarke Camps and extensive anti-tank, mortar, rifle and machine gun ranges. Lydd (Ferryfield) Airport is situated one and a half miles from the centre of the town and many thousands of passengers and cars, in addition to large quantities of freight, are transported to and from the Continent.

The Borough has $9\frac{1}{2}$ miles of coastline, and of the coastal districts, Dungeness is largely devoted to the fishing industry, and Greatstone, where there is a large Holiday Camp, and Lydd-on-Sea, cater chiefly for the holiday-makers. Development for residential and holiday purposes continues with no sign of abatement in the last-mentioned two areas. A total of 20 private dwellings were completed during the year.

No new Council houses were in course of erection or completed during the year, but preparations were made for the erection of six old persons one-bedroom bungalows to Parker Morris standards at Park Street, Lydd, during the coming year.

At the 31st December, 1967, the Borough Council had provided 332 permanent dwellings, as shown in the Table below. Thus, more than one-fifth of the dwellings in the Borough have been provided by the Council.

In addition, the Borough Council own a further six dwellings not originally provided by them

Work on the construction of Dungeness 'B' Nuclear Power Station, which commenced in October 1965, continued throughout the year. This Station is due for completion in 1970/71, when the combined output of the 'A' and 'B' Stations will be in excess of 1,700,000 kilowatts.

The interchange of electric power between this country and France via the 400 Kv supergrid from Canterbury, the Converter Station near Pigwell, Lydd, and the Cross-Channel Cable, continued during the year.

Tenders for the Main Drainage Scheme Contract were invited in May, 1967, and a tender in the sum of £409,395. 8. 7. submitted by Messrs Coleman Bros. (Contractors) Ltd., was accepted in August. The Contractors commenced operations on the 23rd October 1967. The Contract is due for completion in October 1969, but the Contractors have indicated that they hope to complete the works before that date. On completion of the works a main sewer with a modern Treatment Works will be available to serve the whole of the built-up area of Lydd Town.

Community life in the Borough continued to be very much in evidence, local organisations covering a wide range of interests, including an Angling Club, Ancient Order of Foresters, Badminton Club, Boy Scouts, British Legion (Men's and Women's Branches), Brownies, Football Club, Girl Guides, Wildflowers Society, Methodist Youth Club, Methodist Women's Guild, Mothers Union, Oddfellows, Parents and Teachers Association, R.A.O.B., Royal Naval Association, St. John Ambulance Brigade, Seniors Club, Small Bore Rifle Club, Table Tennis Club, Women's Institute, War Memorial Institute Club, Dungeness Sports and Social Club. The Clubs and Societies again combined their efforts in organising the now well-known "Lydd Club Day" on the third Saturday in June. The Lydd Youth Set was formed during the year to improve the recreational facilities for the youth of the Town.

There was virtually no unemployment in the Borough and social conditions were generally satisfactory.
