NEWS ITEMS

Staff Notes

At the centenary celebrations of Laval University, the week-end of September 19, honorary degrees of Doctorate of Medical Science were conferred on Dean J. A. MacFarlane and Professor R. M. Janes, and Professor C. H. Best received the Doctorate of Science degree. The degree of Doctorate of Letters was conferred on Professor Etienne Gilson.

Dr. Healey Willan has been honoured by Queen's University which has conferred upon him the degree of Honorary Doctor of Laws. Dr. Willan's choral work, "An Apostrophe to the Heavenly Hosts," will be performed in Festival Hall, London, England, on November 24 at the St. Cecilia's concert. Dr. Willan plans to fly to England to attend the concert, which is under Royal patronage, and it is expected that the Queen and the Duke of Edinburgh will be present.

Professor J. F. Heard attended the International Astronomical Union meeting in Rome, Italy, this summer.

Dr. C. A. Chant attended meetings of the learned societies in Quebec City where a special presentation of the recent French translation of his book, *Our Wonderful Universe*, was made to the rector of Laval University.

Professor R. E. Williamson and Miss R. J. Northcott attended American Astronomical Society meetings at Victoria, B.C. Professor Williamson gave a paper on "Limitations in measuring the distribution of galactic radiation by radio telescopes." Papers by R. L. Baglow on "Two-colour photometric studies of the systems TW Drac, Z Herc and RS Vulp" and by R. F. Rodgers on "The frequency and characteristics of binary systems among bright-line B-type stars" were also presented.

Professor Helen S. Hogg gave a course of lectures as Visiting Professor at Harvard University Summer School and also lectured at a Harvard Observatory Open Night.

Professor Helen S. Hogg and Miss R. J. Northcott were guest speakers at the American Association of Variable Star Observers meetings at Potsdam, N.Y., and at the Astronomical League at Detroit.

Professor G. Norwood's *Pindar* has been translated into Italian, appearing in the series "Biblioteca di Cultura Moderna."

Dr. F. M. Heichelheim spoke on the Frankfurt Radio about "Greeks and Romans in Iceland" on July 18. He had a seminary on "Ancient Agricultural History" in Giessen on July 22 and 23, and read a paper for the British Council in Bonn on "Prehistory of Planning Economy" on July 29. Dr. Heichelheim attended the Seventh Papyrological Congress at Geneva Sept. 1–5 as the University's representative, and read a paper on "Autonomous Price Trends in Egypt from Alexander the Great to Heraclius I."

Professor W. P. Wallace gave two lectures in July in the Summer Seminar of the American Numismatic Society in New York on "Numismatic Evidence for Early Greek History."

Professor J. A. Irving led a discussion on "The Nature of the North Atlantic Community" at the Canadian Institute of International Affairs annual meeting held at Laval University on June 7–8. Professor Irving was one of three Canadian delegates to the Fourth Annual Conference on American Foreign Policy held at Colgate University, July 26–31, where he introduced discussions of "The Philosophy of the United Nations" and "International Cultural Cooperation for Peace."

Rev. R. F. Hettlinger read a paper on "The Doctrine of the Holy Spirit in St. Paul" before the Evangelical Fellowship for Theological Literature held in England. He also attended the Faith and Order Conference of the World Council of Churches at Lund as a delegate of the Church of England in Canada.

Rev. H. F. Woodhouse was recently awarded the degree of Doctor of Divinity by Dublin University. Dr. Woodhouse has edited and abridged "The Infallibility of the Church" by the late Dr. G. Salmon.

Professor B. Wilkinson was elected a member of the Council of the Mediaeval Academy at the annual meeting of the Academy in April.

Professor J. B. Conacher, who has been elected to the Council of the Canadian Historical Association, presented the point of view of the *Canadian Historical Review* in a symposium on the subject of local history at the annual meeting of the Association held in June.

Staff members of the Department of Italian, Spanish and Portuguese have continued their research work this summer in various countries: Professor E. Goggio in the United States, Professor J. Cano in Spain, Dr. U. Leo in Venezuela and Dr. B. Corrigan in Italy.

J. Molinaro gave a talk in June to the Ordine dei Figli d'Italia in commemoration of the fifth centennial of Leonardo da Vinci's birth.

Professor H. S. M. Coxeter spent five weeks in the spring visiting ten universities in Great Britain. In particular, he lectured on "Regular Honeycombs in Elliptic Space" and "Non-Euclidean Networks and Quadratic Forms," and "An Empirical Formula for the Betti Numbers of the Simple Lie Groups' at London, on "World Structure" at Dublin, on "The Golden Section with applications to Games and Botany" at Leeds, and "Interlocked Rings of Spheres" at Cambridge.

Professor B. E. Shore was a guest of the University of Zagreb at the International Seminar of Slavic Scholars, July 19–August 19, and later under the auspices of UNESCO travelled to other cultural centres in Yugoslavia.

Professor L. I. Strakhovsky lectured on Russian History during the summer session at Harvard University.

Professor V. L. Henderson attended the annual meeting of the Acoustical Society of America in New York, May 8-10.

Professor K. B. Jackson and J. J. Klawe attended the VIIth International Congress of Photogrammetry in Washington, September 3–13. Professor Jackson presented a paper on "Stereoscopic Projection."

Professor I. W. Smith attended the annual meeting of the American Society for Engineering Education in Hanover, N. H., June 24–27. He served as Chairman of the Machine Design Subdivision and was elected Secretary of the Mechanical Division. Professor Smith also attended the Special Vibration Session under the direction of Professor J. P. Den Hartog, at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, August 4–15.

N. P. W. Moore attended the 4th International Combustion Symposium at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, September 1–5 and presented two papers. Also, from September 6–10, Mr. Moore visited the National Bureau of Standards at Washington, and lectured on problems of flame propagation. He also visited the

research laboratories of the Texas Oil Company and lectured on problems relating to the combustion of methane.

During August Dr. J. M. Ham acted as a consultant on automatic control problems to the Canadian Armament Research and Development Establishment at Valcartier, Que.

Professors B. Chalmers and L. M. Pidgeon attended the Gordon Research Conference on Metallurgy, July 14-17.

During May and June, Dr. B. Chalmers attended the Conference on Reactivity in Solids at Gothenberg and presented a paper. He also gave lectures in London, Bristol, Birmingham, Oxford and Sheffield, England, and Delft, Holland. On September 3–4 Dr. Chalmers attended and presented a paper at the Royal Military Conference on Physics of Metals. He has been appointed Editor of the new international journal for the science of metals, "Acta Metallurgica."

Professor Lauchland, Mr. Kravetz, Professor Huber and Dean Tupper attended the American Society for Engineering Education Annual Meeting at Dartmouth College, Hanover, N.H., the end of June. Professor Lauchland and Mr. Kravetz participated in the electrical engineering summer school sponsored by the same organization prior to the annual meeting.

Professor G. R. Lord attended the Fifth Hydraulic Conference at the Iowa Institute of Hydraulic Research in Iowa City, Iowa, in June.

Dr. R. R. McLaughlin attended a meeting of the Canadian Pulp and Paper Association at Murray Bay, June 15–19.

As a representative of the Engineering Institute of Canada, Dean Tupper attended a Pan-American Conference of Engineers in New Orleans and delivered an address, in August.

Dr. G. N. Patterson made an extensive survey of teaching methods and research projects in aeronautics in American Universities during July and August. Lectures were given at the U.S. Naval Ordnance Laboratory and the University of Michigan. Periods of about a week were spent at the University of California and the Defence Research Board Laboratories at Suffield, Alberta, on problems of shock waves and high altitude physics. Dr. Patterson was recently appointed chairman of the U.S. Navy's Advisory Aeroballistics Panel, the first non-citizen to hold this position.

Dr. Arnold Walter was the guest of the Graduate School, University of Notre Dame, Indiana, for a week in April, when he lectured on Mediaeval Music.

Professor V. W. Bladen spoke at a conference of the American College of Hospital Administrators at Toronto in April. He also attended a conference of the Society for Applied Anthropology at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, April 4–6.

Professor F. C. Toombs attended the Case Method Conference sponsored by the Graduate School of Business Administration of Harvard University in April.

Professor John S. Morgan organized and directed the first training courses in civil defence welfare at the Canadian Government's Civil Defence Technical School, Ottawa, May19–June 14.

The Canadian Red Cross Society has announced the appointment of Miss Florence H. M. Emory as Honorary Adviser in Nursing and Chairman of the National Nursing Committee. In this capacity Miss Emory attended the International Red Cross Conference as a delegate and represented also the International Council of Nurses at these meetings, which were held in Toronto.

Lt.-Col. L. S. Lauchland represented the University at the Jubilee Convocation of the United States Military Academy, West Point, N.Y., on May 20. Col. Lauchland, Major W. R. Chamberlain, and Captain F. J. Murphy attended the C.O.T.C. Conference at Army Headquarters, Ottawa, on June 5–6.

College, Faculty and Department Notes

In August, St. Michael's College was host to International Pax Romana for the first session in Canada. This meeting brought visitors from all over the world to the University campus.

The main events of St. Michael's College Centennial Celebrations were held September 27–29. These included a Pontifical Mass celebrated by His Eminence, James C. Cardinal McGuigan and a Centennial Banquet at which the Lieutenant-Governor of Ontario was in attendance.

The Senate of the University has established the degree of Doctor of Social Work. This decision completes the re-organization of the professional curriculum of the School of Social Work undertaken by the late Dr. H. M. Cassidy in 1945.

For a six-week period during June and July a course for welfare officers of the Department of Public Welfare, Province of Newfoundland was offered by the School of Social Work and the Department of University Extension. This course was directed by Professor J. S. Morgan with the assistance of Professor E. Ray Godfrey, Dr. S. K. Jaffary, Dr. M. G. Ross and Jack Amos. Others participating in the instruction were Miss Doris R. Morris, Toronto Department of Public Welfare; D. Coughlan, Director of Probation, the Attorney-General's Department; Miss E. S. L. Govan, Secretary, Public Welfare Division, Canadian Welfare Council; Mr. Bert Beaumont, Director of Child Welfare, Provincial Department of Public Welfare; Eugene Forsey, Director of Research, Canadian Congress of Labour.

On May 2–4 the School of Social Work participated in a week-end workshop on "The Dynamics of Learning and Implications for Teaching Method in a Professional School of Social Work." Dr. Nathaniel Cantor, Chairman of the Department of Anthropology and Sociology, University of Buffalo, participated with the faculty in this workshop. On May 2–3 the field work supervisors of the School participated in an institute on "The Role of the Supervisor in the Creation of an Integrated Curriculum" which was led by Dr. Grace Coyle, Western Reserve University.
