Registration fee for the Summer Quarter is \$27.00 for the twelve weeks term. It is the same for six weeks. In addition to the registration fee, Out-of-State students pay \$75.00 tuition for twelve weeks; \$37.50 for six weeks.

A student may cancel a course before the fourth meeting of the class. Courses are canceled through the Dean's office.

A student may drop a course after the first three meetings of the class by obtaining the written permission of the instructor and presenting the approved card to the Registrar.

No course may be officially dropped after mid-term.

Failure to give official notice of withdrawal will result in a grade of "F" in each course for which the student was registered. Address your notice of withdrawal to the Dean.

#### ADMISSION AND REGISTRATION

1. A student's admission credentials must be on file in the Registrar's office before a matriculation card will be issued.

**REGULAR STUDENTS**—A complete official transcript of the high school and college record must be on file for students planning to remain at Memphis State College for more than the Summer Quarter.

Note: A transcript is not necessary for students attending another college and who plan to be at Memphis State for the *Summer Quarter only*. Instead of a transcript, they should have the Registrar send a statement of good standing to this office. The statement should give the student's classification.

- 2. All women students, whether they live in the dormitory or elsewhere, must have the Dean of Women's notation that place of residence is approved. Her office is on the 3rd floor of the Administration Building.
- 3. After registration in all courses has been approved by the instructors, the matriculation card must be presented to your major professor and the Dean for approval.
- 4. After the matriculation card is approved by the Dean, it must be taken to the Bursar's office, where all fees must be paid. Veterans attending under the G.I. Bill of Rights should report to the Veterans Coordinator on the First Floor instead of the Bursar.

#### VETERANS

- 1. Clear your entrance requirements with the Registrar.
- 2. Get your matriculation card from the office of the Veterans Coordinator on the first floor.
- 3. After the Dean has reviewed and approved your program of studies, leave your blue card in the Dean's office and take your approved matriculation card to Mr. Davis in the Veterans' office.
- 4. All questions concerning apartments on the campus for veterans should be referred to Dr. R. W. Johnson in Room 108 of the Administration Building.
