

The committee heads were re-elected and are as follows: Box-office promotion, J. Arthur Hirsch; Legislation, Mayor A. J. Mason; Intra-Industry, Jack Chisholm; Finance and Organization, Morris Stein; Resolutions, F. Gordon Spencer; Television, H. C. D. Main; Public Relations, Clare J. Appel.

Famous Players Canadian Corp. Limited declared an extra dividend of 20 cents per share, to be added to the regular quarterly dividend of 30 cents payable Dec. 24th, 1953.

Canadian Motion Picture Industry Council's Annual Meeting, was among a week of Film Events, in Toronto, which Events had their opening meeting, November 23rd, and finished off with the Grey Cup Game Event, on Saturday, which was a special inducement for a large film delegation from all over the west to come to Toronto.

VARIETY Club, Tent 28, Toronto, honored Jack Cooke, responsible for Variety's Annual Baseball Night, at the Maple Leaf Stadium. Last June, \$52,000 was raised for Variety Village's program of rehabilitating handicapped children.

The Jack Cooke Appreciation Night was held in the Variety Club Rooms, Prince George Hotel, Toronto, on Tuesday, November 24th.

Reuben Bolstad retires as Chief Barker and William (Bill) Summerville Jr. is inducted as Chief Barker, Variety Tent (28) Toronto.

A. W. Perry leaves for Universal-International Coast Meeting. The President of Empire - Universal Films Ltd. will meet with top executives of the company, and will see four of the company's big pictures screened.

National Committee of the M.P.-E.A. Association of Canada, passes a resolution, opposing the practice of producers and distributors "releasing pictures at advanced prices in the present arbitrary manner and further it is the considered opinion of the national association that no picture should be removed from general release in Canada to be played at advanced admission prices until its merit has been established by consultation with a Committee of this Association."

Ask Arch H. Jolley, executive secretary of the Motion Picture Theatres Association of Ontario, about the threatened strike of Canadian railway employees in January and he will tell you that the plan for emergency film-delivery service is ready, having been arranged last August when there were signs of a walkout of railwaymen which did not materialize.

Co-operating in the details were Clare Appel, executive director of the Canadian Motion Picture Distributors Association, and George Altman.

The same set-up worked effectively at the time of the national strike several years ago.

Ontario exhibitors have been advised that the title of "The City Is Dark," a Warner Bros.' picture, has been changed to "Crime Wave."

The Famous Players' Capitol Theatre at Windsor, managed by Joe Lefave, had an international stage feature in a Sunday evening concert Dec. 20 of the complete Detroit Symphony Orchestra, an organization of 105 musicians, as part of the Christian Culture Series at the Border City.



Continuing its lengthy and successful season of Italian features, the Pylon Theatre, Toronto, secured further nice business with a hit program consisting of "L'Elisir d'Amore" and "Lucrezia Borgia."

A move is reported to transfer sponsorship of the 1954 trade show at Toronto to the Motion Picture Industry Council of Canada from the Motion Picture Theatres Association of Ontario which supervised the first equipment exhibition last November, the proposed step being intended to broaden the scope of the show. No change in the show management has been mentioned.

An unusual example of chain booking was seen in Toronto with the playing of "Reaching From Heaven" at six units of B and F Theatres, these being the Donlands, Lansdowne, Grover, Parliament, Plaza and Radio City, all day and date.

Ian MacNeill of the National Film Board was named interim president of a Canadian Film Society at a meeting in Toronto, the purpose being to coordinate the operation of some 40 community film organizations in seven provinces.

The society, which is holding its first general meeting at Toronto in May, is planned as a branch of the Canadian Film Institute which has its office in Ottawa. Guy Glover of Ottawa has been named as the society's advisor.

Announcement is made that the new organization will operate a central film booking service.

At the Capitol Theatre, Brantford, where preparations have been made for the introduction of Cinema-Scope, Manager Bill Burke had something out of the ordinary for a seasonal Saturday morning show for juveniles which featured real animals such as reindeer and a trained goose along with appropriate actors, including Santa Claus.

A presentation of "Bwana Devil" for which no special eyeglasses were required was featured in an engagement at the Savoy Theatre, Toronto, prior to Yuletide, this theatre being equipped with a panoramic wide-vision screen. For its Canadian premiere at Loew's Theatre last Easter, the patrons used 3-D glasses.

The Odeon Theatre on Queen Street West, operated in conjunction with Twinex, is among the latest Toronto houses to be fitted with a wide-vision screen.

MGM's Caesar—Best Film For 1953

Hollywood's film version of William Shakespeare's Julius Caesar has been chosen the best picture of 1953 by the National Board of Review of Motion Pictures, it was announced.

Henry Hart, chairman of the board's committee on exceptional films, said the M-G-M film was chosen because "it was not merely an able transfer of a stage play to the screen, but an unusually skillful portrayal of a historic event."

The film, which starred James Mason, Deborah Kerr, Marlon Brando, Louis Calhern and Greer Garson, headed a list of the committee's choice for the top 10 pictures of the year.

Following Julius Caesar, the board selected Paramount's Shane for the number two spot. Other selections, in the order chosen, were From Here To Eternity, Martin Luther, Lili, Roman Holiday, Stalag 17, Little Fugitive, Mogambo, and The Robe.

As the best foreign film of the year the board chose A Queen Is Crowned. Second place went to Moulin Rouge; third to The Little World of Don Camillo; fourth to Strange Deception, and fifth to Conquest of Everest.

Jean Simmons was selected the year's best film actress for her work in Young Bess, The Robe, and The Actress.

English star, James Mason was voted the year's best actor for his appearances in Face to Face, The Desert Rats, The Man Between, and Julius Caesar.

PRAIRIE NEWS

Roxy Theatre, at Canora, Sask., operated by the Regal Amusement Co., of Regina, has been sold to Dr. Paul Kowalishin and C. Hochman, of Canora. It is understood the deal involves the proposed new drive-in at Canora.

The Roxy was built in 1936, replacing the Royal, built in 1911.

President of Regal Amusement Company is I. Reinhorn, who operates the Roxy in Regina.

E. C. Williams has added an electrically - operated, gold - colored screen to his Gary Theatre in Indian Head, Sask. The screen can be operated from the projection room, the box-office and from two points in the stage area.

Newly-opened suburban theatre in Edmonton, Alta., is the Jasper, a 528-seater built at a cosf of \$100,000 by William Rueb and Wallie Klak. Mr. Rueb has built theatres in Wetaskiwin, Devon, Leduc and Trochu during the past seven years and has had some part in the management of them. Mr. Klak has been associated with Mr. Rueb in the theatre business for two years. Theatre has a "cry room" and a panoramic screen.

George Stevens was named the year's best director for Shane.

In the realm of outstanding documentaries, the board selected Walt Disney's The Living Desert, the first feature-length picture of his true life adventure series.

FILM DAILY POLL

Audrey Hepburn and Jose Ferrer today were named top movie stars of the year in the annual poll of critics by the Film Daily.

Miss Hepburn, a screen newcomer, was also labelled top "find" of the year because of her performance in Roman Holiday. Ferrer was cited for his acting in Moulin Rouge.

Citations for best supporting performances went to Frank Sinatra for his straight dramatic role in From Here to Eternity and to Gloria Grahame for her portrayal in The Bad and the Beautiful.

Fred Zinnemann won the nod for the ablest directing and Daniel Taradash for the best screen writing, both for From Here To Eternity.

JOHN SCHUBERG

Vancouver's first showman is dead, the man who introduced "sound" pictures to B.C. 55 years ago, John Schuberg, in his 80's, passed away after a long illness in Hollywood Sanitarium, New Westminster. Schuberg was Canada's oldest showman and showed the first pictures in this area. The feature pictures he liked to relate were Newsreels of the Spanish-American War. He was a life member of the Canadian Picture Pioneers. He was one of five Canadians still living who have seen motion pictures grow from a flickering, uncertain novelty to a billion-dollar entertainment industry.

His last activity in the Motion Picture business was as a partner of the Strand Theatre, now a part of the Famous Players chain here. Prominent old timers in show business and brother members of the Canadian Picture Pioneers were pall-bearers at the funeral. They were Maynard Joiner, Earl Hayter, Harry Wolfe, Bill Jones, Art Grayburn and Howard Boothe. He was honored last year at the Golden Anniversary of moving pictures last November at Toronto. The funeral was well attended by a large crowd of amusement and film exchange personnel to honor Canada's oldest exhibitor.




CAPITAL STORY

The importance of the documentary film in contributing to the unity of Canada as a nation was emphasized by Dr. A. W. Trueman, head of the National Film Board, at a luncheon meeting of the editors and public relations group of the Professional Institute. Dr. Trueman pointed out that the unity of any country depended a great deal on communications and the use made of the various media in interpreting one part of the country to another. As one of the methods of communication, the documentary film was playing an important role in Canada, the Government Film Commissioner said. Last year, the NFB's documentary films had a nontheatrical audience of about thirteen and a quarter million people.

Ottawa movie theatre managers helped to play Santa Clause to some hundred men who work in the city and found themselves far away from home and families on Christmas Day. Managers invited the men to free shows following a turkey dinner sponsored by the YMCA.

Third dimensional films are beginning to come back on local screens. Latest in this medium is I, The Jury, currently playing the Elgin Theatre. But the calibre of films in general during pre-Christmas week are much below standard and will continue to be until New Years when a number of important productions will have their premiere showings at the mid-town theatres.


