

Main arena, ¼-mile track, during Baseball Championship. Revolving score-board in the foreground. Men's grand stand on right.

















Facts about Canadian Corps Championships

1. Entries.

Approximately 70,000 Entries were handled before final Winners were declared. 750 Entries competed in Finals on July 1st, representing each Division and Corps Troops. Training Camps were established in various Divisions.

Team Events were most popular, involving a large number of average athletes.

2. Grandstands and Grounds.

Canadian Engineers supplied Supervision and Material. Seating Accommodation was provided for 6,000 people. All lumber used was cut in standard sections for building purposes and was salvaged in good condition. Canadian Corps Cyclists and Infantry provided labour.

3. Equipment.

Canadian Y.M.C.A. supplied Athletic Equipment, Tents, Tables, Chairs, Benches, Decorations, etc., value 140,000 Francs,

4. Catering.

Expeditionary Force Canteen catered for i,000 Officers: Canadian Y.M.C.A. catered for other Ranks:
