THE RE-SETTLEMENT OF ACADIA.

The rocky slopes for emerald had changed their garb of gray When the vessels from Connectient came sailing up the bay; There were diamonds on every wave that drew the strangers on, And wreaths of wild arbutus decked the brows of Biomidon.

Five years in desolation the Acadian land had lain, Five golden harvest moons had wooed the fallow fields, in vain, Five times the winter snows carcessed, and summer sunsets smiled On lonely clumps of willows, and fruit trees growing wild.

There was silence in the forest, and along the Minas shore, And not a habitation from Canard to Benuséjour, But many a ruined cellar, and many a broken wall, Told the story of Acadia's prosperity and fall.

And even in the sunshine of that peaceful day in June, When nature swept her harp and found her strings in perfect tune, The land seemed calling wildly for its owners, far away, The exiles scattered on the coast from Maine to Charleston Bay.

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[After the expulsion of the Acadians in 1755, the lands they had for so long owned and tilled, lay waste, until tinally, by invitation of the flovernment, a large number of New England people, chiefly from Connecticut, emigrated to Acadia, and entered into possession of the fertile French farms. They were conveyed to the shores of Minas Hasin in a fleet of twenty-two vessels, attended by a brig of war mounting sixteen guns, Captain Pigot, and arrived near Town Plat, mow Starr's Point), Cornwallis, the 4th of June, 1769.]

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INTRODUCTORY SKETCH.

Written by Rev. William Hadley Eaton, D. D., of Keene, New Hampshire.

FIRST GENERATION.

JOHN EATON, with his wife ANNE and six children, two sons and four daughters, is known to have been in Colchester, now Salisbury, Mass., as early as "ye 26th of ye 6th mo. 1640," when there were granted to him "2 acres, more or less, for his house lott, lying between the house lotts of Mr. Samuel Hall and Ralfe Blesdale," said to be about equally distant from the Atlantic and the Merrimaek. He remained here about six years from the above date, when he removed to Haverhill, about fifteen miles up the river where he received a deed of land dated Nov. 25, 1646, from Rev. Nathaniel Ward of Ipswich, for which he gave "the full sum of twelve pounds of wheate and pipe staves, six pounds worth of one and six pounds worth of the other." He resided here the remainder of his life. Anne, his wife, died Feb. 5, 1660. He married for his 2nd wife Mrs. Phebe Dow, Nov. 20, 1661. He died, testate, Oct. 29, 1668.

JOHN EATON was a cooper and farmer, and dealt considerably in real estate. He was a man of strong will power, tempered by a sound practical judgment, who believed in liberty of conscience and toleration in society. Endowed with these qualities of mind he was well fitted to act a highly useful part in this new country.

Of his two sons, John and Thomas, John settled in Salisbury and became the head of a numerous race which for convenience sake we call the SALISBURY BRANCH.

Thomas settled in Haverhill and became the head of a long line of descendants which we call the HAVERHILL BRANCH.

JOHN and ANNE EATON, it is supposed, were married somewhere in England about 1618, as their first child seems to have been born in 1619. It is thought that their six children were all born in England, though their names are recorded in Salisbury in the following order. without date, except the first. The other dates are given by calculation :--

NOTE .- Jonathan, the father, died Jan. 20, 1723. Ruth, the mother, died April 2, 1743. In the settlement of the estate only the names of James, Jonathan and Ruth, are mentioned.

FOURTH GENERATION.

JAMES EATON⁴ (Jonathan,³ Thomas,² John¹) was born in Haverbill, March 9, 1696, and was married to MRS. RACHEL AYER, of Haverhill, June 13, 1728. Her maiden name was KIMBALL, and she was first married to Samuel Ayer, Jr., of Haverhill, May 17, 1726, by whom she had one son, Samuel, b. Feb. 13, 1727, m. Mary Carlton. Mr. Aver soon died, and his widow, for her second husband, married James Eaton. James was the only child of his mother, and tradition says that he was very feeble for many years. He married rather late in life, but became the father of 9 children of more than ordinary ability. He was a farmer.

David was the ancestor of the Nova Scotia family.

Timothy was the ancestor of the Eatons now living in Haverhill. James was my own grandfather.

Susanna was the ancestor of Dr. Judson's 3rd wife.

Nationiel was the ancestor of Gen. John Eaton, of Washington. Ebenezer was the ancestor of an Albany family.

Enoch was the ancestor of Dr. J. R. Eaton, of Chittenango, N. York, and a host of others.

THE NOVA SCOTIA EATONS.

In the fifth generation from John and Anne, was born of James, son of Jonathan and his wife Rachel (Ayer), David Eaton, the eldest of nine children (David, Timothy, Sarah, Rachel, James, Susannah, Nathaniel, Ebenezer, Enoch.)

David Eaton was born in Haverhill, Mass., the family home, 1st April, 1729. He married first, in his 23rd year, Deborah White, of Coventry, Conn., 10th October, 1751, having removed from Haverhill to Tolland, Conn., a short time before, probably in the same autumn.

Connecticut had attracted an increasingly large number of settlers from Massachusetts during several generations, and the town of Tolland near the boundary line of Massachusetts, now nearly forty years old, was the centre of a steadily growing population. Whether David Eaton had friends there or what may have directly moved him to migrate to Tolland we cannot know; one of the earliest settlers, and the founder of a numerous and influential family in that part of the state was William Eaton, but since he was of another line-that of William and Martha, of Reading, it is unlikely that the young David was acquainted with the family. Deborah White, whom he married so soon after his arrival in Tolland, was a native of Coventry, the adjoining town. She was the daughter, and one of 13 children, of Thomas White, a great grandson of Elder John White, one of the first settlers of Cambridge, Mass. and afterwards of Hartford, Conn. and Hadley, Mass., who left England for Boston in the ship Lyon, Capt. Peirce, the 22nd of June. 1632 and arrived Sept. 16, of the same year. He was closely conneeted in Cambridge and in Hartford with Rev. Thos. Hooker, who eame from Chelmsford, Essex, Eng., and it is probable that he had lived also in that vicinity.

Elder White's first house in the new world was at Cambridge, then called Newtown, where he had at first three-quarters of an acre of ground allotted him in what was known as "Cow Yard Row." Afterward he obtained three-quarters of an acre more for a eow yard, and on or near this spot now stands the handsome library building of Harvard College, Gore Hall. He was admitted a freeman the 4th of March, 1633, and made one of the first selectmen in Feby., 1635 (the

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others were John Haynes, Simon Bradstreet, John Talcott, William Westwood, William Wordsworth and probably James Olmstead, all prominent men). Finally he sold his property to Nicholas Danforth and Nathaniel Sparrowhawke, and in 1636 removed to Hartford, Conn., with Rev. Thos. Hooker and about a hundred other persons. There he became as he had been in Cambridge very prominent in the affairs of the settlement, but after Mr. Hooker's death he removed to Hadley, Mass. for a time, returning to Hartford and becoming an elder in the South Church in 1670. His wife Mary died in the Winter of 1683. His eldest son, Captain Nathaniel White, was like his father, a public man, being elected to the legislature from Middletown for very many consecutive years.

A son of Captain Nathaniel was Jacob, the father of Thomas, and grandfather of Deborah, wife of David Eaton.

Thomas White was born in Middletown, Upper Houses, 14th Aug., 1701. He settled as a farmer in East Middletown, (Chatham), but in 1731 removed to the north part of Lebanon, Conn., within the present town of Andover. His farm lay on 1 oth sides of the Hop River and was partly in Coventry. About 1748 he removed to Coventry east of the Skungamug River, and died probably after 1773. His first wife, the mother of Deborah, was Sarah Miller, probably daughter of William Miller, of Glastonbury, who died 10th August, 1736, aged 36 years, and was buried in Chatham. By her he had six children, Sarah. born 13th Sept., 1726, m. a Benton; Thomas, born 7th Feby., 1728, died unmarried; Samuel, born 30th Nov. 1729, m. Rachel Tilden; Deborah, born 19th May, 1732, m. 10th October, 1751, David Eaton, of Tolland; William, born 21st Feby., 1734; Jacob, born 20th Jany., 1736, m. Anna Lothrop. By his second wife Hannah Woodward, whom he married 3rd Feby., 1737, he had seven children, Hannah. Henry, Lemuel, Elizabeth, Silas, Abigail and Joel.

The Whites are and have always been one of the most prominent families in Connecticut. In the same line with our ancestress, in the present generation is the distinguished scholar and author, Richard Grant White, recently deceased.

In the office of the Registry of Deeds, Salem, Mass., are the following records :

"James Eaton of Haverhill, yeoman, to David Eaton of Haverhill, cordwainer, his son, for 66£-6-8 (which sum aforesaid I give sd. David as part of his portion), 9 acres in Haverhill." Dated 2 Feb. 1751.

"David Eaton of Tolland, Conn., cordwainer. to Joseph Eaton of Haverhill, husbandman, for 66£-13-4, 9 acres in Haverhill." Dated 20 May, 1752. The Joseph Eaton mentioned in this latter extract is Deacon Joseph Eaton of Haverhill, who married Sarah Webster and had ten children, one of whom named Peter, graduated at Harvard College in 1787, received the degree of D.D. in 1820, and was pastor for more than fifty years of the church in Boxford, Mass. Joseph himself was for many years deacon of the Congregational Church of the West Parish, Haverhill, and a second cousin of David.

The same spirit of enterprise which impelled our ancestor to leave that part of the country where his early home had been, in time led him to migrate still further, and in the spring or early summer (probably) of 1761, between the births of their sixth and seventh children, David and Deborah with five children, Susannah, Stephen, Elisha, Timothy and Elijah, removed to Nova Scotia. Of these five children, Susannah, the eldest, born 23 Sept., 1752, died 18 Oct., 1761; Elijah, born 29 May, 1760, died 15 Aug., 1761. They had lost a son, Timothy, born 17 July, 1755, before the birth of the second Timothy.

There are few more touching incidents in history than the expulsion of the French from Acadia, and the burning of their prosperous village of Grand Pró on that ever memorable 5th of September, 1875. But the forcible removal of the disloyal Normandy peasants left unoccupied large tracts of fertile land about and near the shores of the Basin of Minas, some of it in a high state of cultivation. "At the river-Canard," as Beamish Murdoch tells us, "was a fine country, full of inhabitants, a beautiful church, abundance of worldly goods, and plenty of all kinds of provisions," but after that last sad gathering in the French church at Grand Pré, this "fine country" remained uninhabited, until "on the 12th of October, 1758, a proclamation was adopted in council relative to settling the vacated lands in the Province, in conformity with the directions the governor had received from the Board of Trade." In accordance with the foregoing proclamation, a description of the land was ordered to be published, which reads: "these lands consist of upwards of one hundred thousand acres of intervale plow land, producing wheat, rye, barley, oats. hemp, flax, These have been cultivated for more than a hundred years past. etc. and never fail of crops, nor need manuring. Also, more than one hundred thousand acres of upland, cleared and stocked with English grass, planted with orchards, gardens, etc. These lands, with good husbandry, produce often two loads of hay per acre. The wild and unimproved lands adjoining to the above are well timbered and wooded with beech, black birch, ash, oak, pine, fir, etc. All these lands are so intermixed that every single farmer may have a proportionate quantity

of plow land, grass land and wood land; and are all situated about the Bay of Fundi, upon rivers navigable for ships of burthen."---(From the report of the Secretary of the Council.) In April (1759) agents from a number of persons in Connecticut and Rhode Island, who designed to become settlers on the vacant lands in the Bay of . . . In May the agents, having viewed Fundi, came to Halifax. the vacated lands and returned to Halifax, the four gentlemen from Connecticut, who represented 330 signers, proposed to settle a township at Mines, "joining on the river Gaspereaux and including the great marshes, so called, which township to consist of 100,000 acres to 200 families," the grants to be in fee simple, subject to the proposed quit rent. The block houses were to be built and garrisoned for their defence. Fifty families of the number were to have from government an allowance of corn of one bushel to each person per month, or an equivalent in other grain, for one year, and arms and ammunition for defence. The people with their moveables, stock, etc., to be transported at the expense of the government. The township of Canard, 100,000 acres, to be settled by 150 families, on the same terms, with protection of one block house, etc. All these propositions were agreed to by the governor and council, on Thursday, 17 May, 1759, and the forms of grants were ordered to be prepared accordingly. May 21st, the grants of the townships of Horton and Cornwallis being completed and approved of by the agents from Connecticut, were ordered to pass the seal of the Province,"

The agents from Connecticut were, Major Dennison, Messrs. Jonathan Harris, Joseph Otis, and James Fuller, and also Mr. John Hicks from Rhode Island.

Among the hundreds of enterprising and industrious families attracted from Rhode Island and Connecticut to this new land of promise was that of our ancestor. He was now in his 33rd and his wife in her 30th year, they had been married less than ten years and their eldest child, Susannah, was not yet nine years old. He received his grant from the government on the 31st December, 1764, the fourth year of the reign of King George III. It is signed by Richard Bulkeley, Secretary of the Council.

This document reads as follows :

"To all to whom these presents shall come greeting, Know ye that I, Montague Wilmot, Esquire, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief in and over His Majesty's Province of Nova Scota or Acadie Vice-Admral of the same, Colonel of the eighth regiment of foot, and commanding His Majesty's troops in said Province by virtue of the power and authority to me given by His present Majesty, King George the Third under the Great Seal of Great Britain, have given granted and confirmed and do by these presents, by and with the advice aud consent of His Majesty's Council for the said Province give, grant and confirm unto Samuel Beckwith, Archelaus Hammond, Isaac Bigelow, John Lowden, John Cocks and Moses Gore, Moses Dewey, Simeon Porter, Jehiel Rust, Joshua Eals, Peter Pineo, Stephen Rogers, James Fox, James Congdon, John Sweet, Joseph Congdon, Nathaniel Bliss, Isaac Bigelow, junior, Thomas Ratchford, Asa Clerk, Amos Sheffield, Benjamin Congdon, Daniel Huntley, Seth Burges, Stephen Herrington, junior, Reuben Cone, David Eaton, Stephen Post, Caleb Gillett, Judah Wells, Stephen Chase, junior, Samuel Borden, Joel Parish, Caleb Iluntington, junior, the heirs of Nathaniel Hatch, Stephen Post, Caleb Burges, Stephen Chase, Stephen Chase, junior, Samuel Borden, Joel Parish, Caleb Iluntington, junior, the heirs of Nathaniel Hatch, Stephen Barnaby, Thomas Raud, Caleb Rand, Elias Barbridge, William Proctor, Benjamin Congdon, Simeon Newcomb, Barnabas Lord, John Wood, Hannah Coats, Nathaniel Curtis, Joseph Chase, Jethro Chase, Timothy Barnaby, John Rand, Jonathan Rand, Benjamin Newcomb, Eliakim Tupper, David Star, Zephaniah Stark, Jabez West, Jonathan Woodriff, Peter Wickwire, junior, and Stephen Strong, their heirs and assigns in severalty a tract of land situato lying and being in the township of Cornwallis, in Kings County in the Province, aforesaid, being fifty eight shares or rights, and three-eighths of a share or right of said township, and that in the following proportions, vizt : unto the said Samuel Beckwith, Archelaus Hammond, Isaac Bigelow, John Lowden, John Cocks and Moses Gore, one share and a half each unto Moses Dewey, Sinneon Porter, Jehiel Rust, Joshua Eals, Peter Pineo, Stephen Rogers, James Fox, James Congdon, John Sweet, Joseph Congdon, Nathaniel Bliss, Isaac Bigelow, junior, Thomas Ratchford, Asa Clerk, Amos Sheffield, Benjamin Congdon, Daniel Huntley, Seth Burgess, Stephen Herrington, junior, Reuben Cone, David Eaton [and 19 other names] *one share*, each, each share or right of the granted premises to consist of six hundred and sixty-six acres and two t

These grants were subject to an annual quit rent of "one shilling sterling money on Michaelmas Day for every fifty acres so granted and so in proportion for a greater or lesser quantity of land granted, the first year's payment of the same to be made on Michaelmas Day next after the expiration of ten years from the date hereof" the right to be forfeited in case three years quit rent should at any time be behind and unpaid, or in case the grantee should within ten years from the date of his grant alienate or grant the right or any part of it except by will, without license from the Governor, Lieutenant-Governor or Commander-in-Chief, under the Seal of the Province. The grantee also bound himself to plant, cultivate, improve or inclose one-third part of the land granted him, within ten years, one-third within twenty years, and the remaining third within thirty years from the date of his grant, a failure to fulfil this obligation, obliging him to forfeit such lands as should not be under improvement or cultivation The terms of the grant further compelled the grantee to plant within ten years two acres with hemp, and to keep up the same or a like quantity of acres during successive years, and to settle at least one family with proper stock and materials for the improvement of the lands on or before the last day of October, 1765.

In the office of the Registry of Deeds for Cornwallis now (1885) and for many years kept by the Hon. Samuel Chipman, an old and greatly respected inhabitant of Cornwallis, whose memory goes back to the time of David Eaton and his family, with all of whom he was on terms of personal friendship, are recorded various purchases of land made by our ancestor. These lots of land are numbered and described and bear dates respectively, as follows:

The first deed of land given by David Eaton after his removal to Nova Scotia, bears date 7 September, 1765. It is the thirty-fourth deed recorded in the township, and reads as follows:

"This indenture made at Cornwallis, in the County of King's County, in the Province of Nova Scotia, Acadia, between Devid Euton of Cornwallis aforesaid, yceman, of the one part, and John Burbridge of the same place, Esquire, and William Best of Halifax, in the County of Halifax and Province aforesaid, master mason, of the other part, witnesseth that the said David Eaton for and in considertion of the sum of twenty pounds eurrent money of the said province, to him in hand paid by the said John Burbridge and William Best, the receipt whereof he

h hereby acknowledge, he, the said David Eaton (having obtained leave under scal of the province, bearing date the seventh day of May in the year of our Lord one thousand seven hundred and sixty-five), hath granted, bargained and sold, alioned and confirmed and by these presents doth grant, bargain and sell, alion and confirm unto the said John Burbridge and William Best, their heirs and assigns, forever, all that piece of ground or lot of dike land containing six acres (little more or less), lying and being in the dike commonly known as the Bowing dike, in the said township of Cornwallis, and recorded on the Proprietors' Record for the said township by dike lot letter I, number 42, as the same was laid out to the said David Eaton.

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Witness where f he the said David Eaton hath hereunto set his hand and seal at Cornwallis aforesaid, this seventh day of September, in the fifth year of the reign of our sovereign lord George the Third, by grace of God of Great Britain, France and Ireland, king, defender of the faith, and so forth, in the year of our Lord one thousand seven hundred and sixty-five."

That David Eaton was from the beginning a man of thrift and enterprise is very clear. His father, James, had evidently acquired considerable property, otherwise his children's portion could not have been so large, and his eldest son David must have begun life under less favorable conditions.

Standing very near where the first house belonging to our ancestor stood, on Canard street, is now a pretty cottage owned and occupied by Edwin Dickey, Esq., from which one has a fine view of the broad, fertile diked lands, once owned by the Acadian French, and afterward, in part, by David Eaton. Almost as far as the eye can reach, the rich upland and meadow, dotted with comfortable farm houses of the best sort, with lawns and flower gardens about them, or waving with tall grass for the mower, and the sheltered hillsides where richly laden fruit orchards perfume the June and the October air, were the property of our ancestor. From him these rich possessions were transferred little by little to his sons. His own immediate farm, with the house upen it (the first house had been burned and he had built again), passed into the hands of his son David, who soon built another house near the old one. Adjoining the homestend, to the eastward, where now Leander Eaton's fine house stands, was until a few years ago the house owned by his eldest son Stephen. This property was the first separated from the original lands of our ancestor, and the house which we all remember well, was next oldest to the original house built and occupied by him. David's house was bought after his death by David Dickey, Esq., and torn down about 36 years ago.

The property transferred to Stephen and now owned by Leander,⁸ son of Ward, has been in the family almost but not quite continuously from the beginning.

About two miles and a half farther east is the homestead of Elisha, David's third son. It is now owned and occupied by Leverett Eugene in the 9th generation, son of Levi, son of James, son of Elisha,⁶ and has been in the family continuously.

Adjoining the farm of Stephen was that of Timothy, afterward for many years the property of Dr. Charles Cotnam Hamilton.

James' farm lay next to Elisha's and has been until lately owned by the family of the late David Rupert Eaton, son of David, son of Elisha⁸

John at first went to sea, then settled on a farm in what is known as the "Smith Woods," near Canning, but moved afterward to the place in Upper Canard, where his son Ward lived and died, and which is now owned by James Stanley Eaton, Ward's youngest son.

Sarah married Abel Strong and lived at Brooklyn St. or Shadow St. Cornwallis. Susannah married Capt. Harry Cox and lived below Canning. Prudence married John Wells and lived in Canning.

Deborah married John Manning and lived in Falmouth, Hants Co. Both the husbands of Deborah and Prudence were for many years members of the Provincial legislature.

Deborah (White) Eaton Senr., died 20 May, 1790.

David died 17 July, 1803.

There is an old cemetery—one of the two oldest in Cornwallis, near what is known as Hamilton's corner, or "Jaw-bone" corner, as its original name was, where David and Deborah Eaton are buried, and likewise their children, Susannah, who died in 1761; Stephen, who died in 1838, and his wife Elizabeth; Elijah, who died in 1761; James, who died in the Spring of 1813, and his first wife Nancy, and Amos, who died in 1784. The first wife of Timothy, (Huldah) and the first wife of John (Tabitha) are likewise buried here. For many years this cemetery was unfenced, and if there ever were tombstones erected at the earliest graves, they have long ago tumbled down and been removed. One large monument should, therefore, at no distant date, be erected to these honored members of the fifth and sixth generations of the Eatons of Neva Scotia, by their loyal descendants; and this old cemetery where they sleep, now carefully fenced and guarded, is tho proper place for it.

Of the remaining members of the imme liate family of David and Deborah, Elisha, who died in 1827, and his wife, Irene; Timothy, who died in 1834, and his second wife, Sarah; Sarah, who died in 1827, and her husband, Abel Strong; and Prudence, who died in 1842, and her husband, John Wells, are buried in the cemetery at Upper Canard, in front of the Baptist Church.

Elijah, who died in 1816, and his wife, Elizabeth, lie in an old burial place in Medford or Lower Pereau; David, who died in 1830, and his wife, Eunice, sleep in the Upper Canard Cometery; Susannah, who died in 1841, and her husband, Harry Cox, lie in the burying ground of the Congregational Church below Canning; Deborah, who died in 1829, and her husband, John Manning, are buried in Falmouth, Hants Co.; and John and his second wife, Abigail, in the burying ground of the Congregational Church below Canning. There are tombstones at the graves of Elisha and Irene, John and Tabitha, Sarah and Abel Strong, Susannah and Harry Cox, Deborah and John Manning, Prudence and John Wells; and it is earnestly hoped that tablets or other fitting memorials may soon be placed in the churches or cemeteries, to the memory of the other members of the family whose graves now unmarked must otherwise, in time, be forgotten.

The earliest settlers in Cornwallis were principally Congregationalists, although there were a few church people among them, and the first church to be established was the Congregational "Church at Horton and Cornwallis." It is said that the earliest church building erected was that which stood at Chipman's Corner, nearly on the site of the old French Church. But it is certain that the meeting house at Hamilton's Corner was erected very soon after the re-settlement of Acadia. The first minister of this church was Rev. Benaiah Phelps, who remained in charge of the church until the time of the Revolutionary war, when he returned to New England. The parish to which he ministered comprised the the townships of Horton and Cornwallis, and he alternated between the two, traveling from the North to the South mountains in his ministrations. The preserved records of the church whose meeting place in Cornwallis was at Hamilton's Corner, do not extend back of the year 1819, when the Rev. John Pineo was pastor, so that we have no means of knowing how many of the family of David and Deborah Eaton were communicants of the church. In May of that year, however, both Deborah and Elijah were admitted to membership, and on the 14th May, 1820, John was baptized by Elder Pinco. On the 19th of October, 1778, a Baptist Church was formed in Cornwallis, with ten members, but there were no Eatons among them, nor have the Eatons ever been very numerous on its membership roll. This church was, at first, an open communion church, but it adopted in a short time close communion principles, and has always been a prosperous and wealthy church. To it much of the Eaton influence has been given, although there are among the descendants of David and Deborah, representatives of almost all the leading denominations, Episcopalians, Unitarians, Congregationalists, Methodists, and Baptists of various sorts. Many of them have been very prominent in religious and educational matters, and have occupied positions of trust and responsibility.

Of David Eaton himself, or of his wife, there is no portrait nor likeness of any kind in existence, nor indeed so far as is known of either of his sons or daughers. Nova Scotia was, a century ago, a remote region, and while many persons had abundant means, and many inherited refined instincts and traditions, life was primitive, and lacked the accessories of art and the culture of polite society. It was to them a new country as New England had been to their ancestors a hundred years before, and there was little time for anything except the cultivation of the soil, and the bare details of living.

David Eaton is said to have been a man of genial character, good form and features, ("some called him a handsome man,") and of unusual physical strength. Of his wife, Deborah, there are few traditions preserved, but those in existence lead to the belief that she was of a kindly, motherly nature, hospitable and cheerful and possessed of much native refinement.

Of the few heir-looms in the family not the least interesting is the ring which Deborah White wore when she was married, and which descended to her daughter Susannah (Mrs. Harry Cox) and is now worn by *her* grand daughter Paulina (Starr), Mrs. Leander Eaton.⁸ There is no one living who remembers David Eaton, personally, except the Hon. Samuel Chipman, (now, 1885, in his 95th year.)

Until recently, most persons have supposed that David Eaton married only once, but a search among the earliest records of the Episcopal parish of St. John's, in Cornwallis, has revealed the fact that on the 23rd December, 1790, seven months after the death of his first wife Deborah, he was married by the Rev. John Wiswell, Rector, to Alice Willoughby, probably widow of Dr. Samuel Willoughby. If so, her maiden name was English and she was married to Dr. Willoughby 28th August, 1760. How long she lived or when she died is not known, but it is certain that Mr. Eaton was a widower during the last years of his life. By whom he was cared for is not known, for his three youngest daughters married within four years of their mother's death, Susannah, who is thought to have been his favorite, last of all.

At the time of the burning of his house, probably not long after his wife's death, he had, so it has been currently reported, a heavy box of coin on which, when it was removed from the burning house, he bade his daughter Susannah sit, in order to secure it as the bottom was in danger of coming out. Another tradition has it that be had laid up in bottles for his children about five hundred pounds in gold. But when he came to die none of this money was found, nor did it ever come into the hands of his descendants. Whatever foundation there may be for this story, it is certain that David Eaton died possessed of an enormous estate, which he bequeathed to his children, his will, which is very long and carefully made, bearing date only nine days before his death. He was a man of importance in the affairs of the community and in every sense a pioneer in the early settlement and subsequent refinement of the sunny Province of Acadia,

Will and Testament of David Eaton, late of Cornwallis .- No. 60.

"In the name of God, Amen. I, David Eaton, of Cornwallis, Kings County, and Province of Nova Scotia, yeoman, do make and declare this my last will and testament, in manner following: "First, I bequeath my soul into the hands of Almighty God, hoping and believing a remission of my sins, by the merits and prediation of Jesus Christ, and my body I commit to the earth to be buried at the discretion of my executor hereafter named; and my worldiy estate I give and devise as follows:

First. I give and devise to my son Stephen Eaton, all that, my Messnage and Tenement, with the appurtenances, on which he now lives in said Cornwallis; also the privilege of a Lane from the north-west corner of said messuage to the brook for the purpose of watering his cattle, on condition that he will be at the sole expense of fencing said Lane; and a part of a Tract of Dyke Land, adjoining the said messuage, bounded as follows: To run from the South-west corner of the said messuage, southerly, to the centre of the Angle formed by the old running dyke; from thence by the running dyke, easterly, to the road, and from thence by the road to the South-east corner of said messinage; also one-seventh part in quantity and quality of a Tract of Land on the mountain fadjoining hands I lately sold William Baxter / containing about six hundred acres, more or less, and one-seventh part in quantity and quality of a Tract of Land adjoining the lands of Thaddeus Harris, containing about three hundred acres, more or less. To Have and to hold, all and every said message lands, thements and hereditaments, with the appurtenances, to him, the said Stephen Eaton, all my message and temement with the appurtenances, on which he now lives, in Cornwallis aforesaid ; also one-seventh part in quantity and quality of a Tract of Land, adjoining the lands of Thaddeus Harris containing about three durations, all my message and tenement with the appurtenances, on which he now lives, in Cornwallis aforesaid ; also one-seventh part in quantity and quality of a Tract (adjoining the lands of Thaddeus Harris, containing about three hundred acres, more or less. To have and to hold all and every said message, lands, tenements and hereditaments with the appurtenances, on which he now lives, in Cornwallis aforesaid ; also one-seventh part in quantity and quality of a Tract of Land, adjoining the lands of Thaddeus Harris, containing about three hundred acres, more or less. To have and to hold all and every said message, lands, tenements and hereditaments with the appurtenances, to him, the said Elisha Eaton, his heirs and assigns forevre.

Also, I give and devise to my son Timothy Eaton, all that, my messuage and tenement with the appurtenances, on which he now lives, in Cornwallis aforesaid; also a lot of a nursh, which I bought of Ezekkel Huntington, and lays outside of the dyke lands said Timothy bought of John Nisbet; also one-seventh part of a Tract of Land on the mountain (adjoining lands I lately sold William Baxter) in quantity and quality, containing about six hundred acres, more or less; also one-seventh part, in quantity and quality, of a Tract of Land adjoining the lands of Thaddeus Harris, containing about three hundred acres, more or less.

Also, I give and devise to my son Elijah Eaton, Four acres of Dyke land on the Bowing Dyke, viz.: two acres I had from John Anderson, and two acres adjoining it, so as to make it square; also one-seventh part, in quantity and quality, of a Tract of Land on the mountain (adjoining the hand I tately sold William Baxter) containing about six hundred acres, more or less; also one-seventh part in quantity and quality, of a Tract of Land adjoining lands of Thaddeus Harris, containing about three hundred acres, more or less. To have and to hold all and every said messtages, lands, theneneuts and hereditaments with the appurtenances, to him, the said Elijah Eaton, his heirs and assigns forever. Also, I give and bequeath unto my said son, Elijah Eaton, the sum of two hundred pounds (£200) to be paid him by my son David Eaton in stock, three months after my decease, or in cash nine month after my deccase, at the option of the said Elijah Eaton.

Also, 1 give and devise to my son, David Eaton, all that, my messuage and tenement, with appurtenances, on which I now dwell, viz : All the upland from Canard Dyke to Habitant, except sixty acres, on the North side thereof, which, with appurtenances, will bereafter be bequeathed to my son John Eaton ; also all my Dyke I and adjoining said messuage, except the East part thereof which is already devised to my son Stephen Eaton ; also a Tract of Dyke Land in the Bowing Dyke, lying on the East side of a Creek called Dewey's Creek, containing about nine acres, more or less, six acres of which is called the Post Lot, and three acres the Newcomb Lot ; also one-seventh part in quantity and quality of a Tract on the mountain (adjoining lands I lately sold Wilham Baxter) containing about six hundred acres, more or less, ilso one seventh part in quantity and quality of a Tract of Land adjoining lands owned by Thaddeus Harris, containing about three hundred acres, more or less. To have and to hold all and every the said messuage, lands, tenements, hereditaments, with the appurtenances (subject nevertheless to, and charged and chargeable with several legacies as by this will bequeatheth, amounting to the sum of Three Hundred Pounds) to him, the said David Eaton, his heirs and assigns forever.

And I give and bequeath unto my said son David Eaton, all my cattle, horses, sheep and hogs, and all the farming utensils that may remain undisposed of at the time of my death, on messuage and tonement where I now dwell. Also, I give and devise to my son James Eaton, all that, my measuage and tensment, with the appartenances, on which he now lives, in Cornwallis aforesaid, containing about fifty acres, more or less 1 also a lot of land adjoining the suid measuage, called the Chase Lot, containing about fifty acres, more or less 1 also a lot of Dyke land in the Bowing Dyke, the original draft of Amos Sheffield, containing six acres, more or less. To have and to hold all and every the said measuage, land., tenements and hereditaments, with the appurtenances, to him, the said James Eaton, his heirs and assigns forever. I also give and devise to my said son, James Eaton, one-seventh part in quality and quantity of a Tract on the mountain (adjoining lands I lately sold William Baxter) containing about six hundred acres, more or less 1 also one-seventh part of a Tract, in quantity and quality, adjoining lands owned by Thaddens Harris, containing about three hundred acres, more or less. To have and to hold the said lands, tenements and hereditaments, with the appurtenances, to him, the said James Eaton, his heirs and assigns forever.

Also, I give and devise to my son, John Eaton, the North end of the messuage and tenement on which I now dwell, at present under lease to Jonathan Parker, to advance the full breadth thereof so far South as to make sixty acres i also four Dyke lots in the Habitant Dyke, being all the land I own there, containing about thirteen acres, more or less; also a part of a Matsh lot, being the original draft of Stephen Barnaby, viz., three acres, the said lot adjoining marsh land of Benoni Sweet ; also one-seventh part in quantity and quality of a Tract of Land on the mountain (adjoining land I lately sold William Baxter); Also one-seventh part in quantity and quality of a Tract of Land adjoining lands owned by Thaddeus Harris, containing about three hundred acres, more or less. To have and to hold all and every the said messuage, lands, tenements and hereditaments, with the appurtenances, to him, the said James Eaton, his heirs and assigns forever.

Also, as the word "Inheritances" has been omitted in the lands, etc., devised in this Will, to my son Timothy Eaton it was my intention, and is my will, that he shall have and hold all and every the said messange, lands, tenements and hereditaments, with the appartenances, to him, the said Timothy Eaton, his heirs and assigns forever.

Also, I give and bequea'h to my daughter Sarah Strong, wife of Abel Strong, the sum of Forty Pounds.

Also, I give and bequeath to my daughter Susannah Cox, the wife of Henry Cox, the sum of Forty Pounds.

Also. I give and bequeath to my daughter Deborah Manning, the wife of John Manning, the sum of Forty Pounds.

Also, I give and bequeath to Prudence Wells, the wife of John Wells, the sum Forty Ponuds. To be paid unto them respectively by my sen David Eaton, in stock three months after my decease, or in cash nine months after my decease, at the option of my said daughters.

Also, I give and devise unto my son Elisha Eaton, ten acres of Marsh land at west end of my tract of Sait Marsh on Canard River, To have and to hold the said appurtenances thereto, to him, the said Elisha Eaton, his heirs and assigns forever.

It is my will that instead of the three acres of Marsh given to my son John Eaton, on the West end adjoining Benoni Sweet, he shall have it off the cast end, I therefore revoke the former device, and hereby give and device to my said son John Eaton, three acres off the East end of the said Tract of Sait Marsh. To have and to hold, to him, the said John Eaton, his heirs and assigns forever.

Also, the remainder of my Real Estate, supp-sing it only Dyke Land on the Bowing Dyke, and sedge bed on the Canaud River, but be it wheresever and whatsoever it may be, I give and devise to my sons, Stephen, Elisha, Timothy, Elijah, David, James and John, to be divided equally in quantity and quality amongst them as soon after my decease as it can be done conveniently; each of them to have and to hold their several proportions, to them, my said sons, their heirs and assigns forever. And, I do hereby ordain and appoint my trusty friend, William Campbell, of said Cornwallis, Esquire, executor of this my last will and testament. In witness whereof, I have hereunto set my hand and seal at Cornwallis, July 8th, 1803.

Signed, declared, and published as and for his last Will and Testament in the presence of us, who subscribe our names as witnesses in the Testator's Presence, and at his request.

In a codicil dated 9 July, 1803, he gives to each of his daughters forty pounds more.

About 1790 Daniel Eaton, a young physician, son of Timothy,⁴ brother of David, and of Abigail (Massey), born in Haverhill 18th, April, 1769; came to Nova Scotia to visit his uncle, and instead of returning to Massachusetts removed to Onslow, Colchester County, Nova Scotia, married Mrs. Esther Cater, widow of William Cater, youthful, attractive and with comfortable means, and founded a small family, now principally in Colchester County, of which Cyrus Eaton, now for the second time Mayor of Truro, a successful merchant, is a leading representative. After Dr. Eaton's death, his widow married again Captain Simon Kollock, a retired officer in the British army.

A full record of the family of Dr. Daniel Eaton will be given in its proper place in the complete genealogy.

Some years after this, probably between 1794 and 1797, David's youngest son, John, visited Haverhill, and after his return named his eldest son, born 28 Nov., 1797, Ward, after a cousin Ward—brother to Daniel, M. D., and son of Timothy.⁵ Ward, of Haverhill, was born 25th May, 1775, lived in Haverhill, and is reported to have shown his cousin John much attention on this, probably the first and only visit, ever made by any of the Nova Scotia Eatons, in the sixth generation, to the home of their New England ancestors.

A few only of the Nova Scotia Eatons have gained great distinction. They have generally been people of intelligence and worth, often of refinement, and excellent social position, but the larger part of them have been farmers, and few have ever become rich. Some, however, as will appear in the following record, have been successful business men, some are making their mark in the several learned professions, and some have been respectable tradesmen. Few families in Nova Scotia can lay claim to greater respectability and usefulness, and few are so widely scattered.

FIFTH GENERATION.

DAVID EATON, the Ancestor of the Nova Scotia Eatons, was born in Haverhill, Mass., 1st April, 1729. His father was James, and his mother Rachel (Ayer) Eaton, whose family consisted of nine children, David, Timothy, Sarah, Rachel, James, Susannah, Nathaniel, Ebenezer, and Enoch. He was in the fifth generation from John and Anne of Haverhill, the originators of this branch of the Eaton family in America : the direct descent being David, 5 James, 4 Jonathan, 8 Thomas,² John.¹ He removed to Tolland, Connecticut, probably in the Summer or Autumn of 1751, and the 10th October of that year married Deborah White of Coventry, an adjoining town, a daughter of Thomas White and Sarah (Miller), and a great great grand-daughter of Elder John White, of Cambridge, Mass., and of Hartford, Connecticut. In the Spring or early Summer (probably) of 1761, between the births of his sixth and seventh children, he removed with many other Connecticut people to Nova Scotia, that colony having been depopulated by the expulsion of the French in 1755,

After accumulating a large and valuable property, which he divided among his children on their several marriages, he died in Cornwallis, on what is now known as Canard Street, 17th July, 1803. His wife. Deborah, who was born 19th May, 1732, died 20th May, 1790. Both are buried in the old burying ground near Hamilton's corner, a few rods from their home, while they lived, but as yet no stone or monument marks their resting place.

He married (2nd) 23rd December, 1790, (Rev. John Wiswell, Rector, officiating) Alice (English) Willoughby, widow of Dr. Samuel Willoughby.

He was a farmer, owned the next farm to the eastward of his father's, which Leander Eaton has long owned and occupied, now one of the richest and finest properties in the county, and died 20th April, 1838. His wife died 28th March, 1841.

They are buried in the old burying ground near Hamilton's Corner, where the Congregational Meeting House stood, but no stones have ever been erected.

Of these daughters Zeviah was married 30th September, 1802, by Rev. Wm. Twining, Rector of St. John's Church, to Marchant Rand, whose son Thomas afterward married Eliza Irene Barnaby, daughter of Worden Barnaby, and Lydia (Eaton) daughter of Elisha⁶. Rebecca was married 11th November, 1802, by Rev. William Twining, Rector of St. John's Church, to Alphaeus Harris, whose son Thomas married for his second wife Mary Eliza Eaton, daughter of Woodworth⁶, son of Jacob⁷, son of Stephen⁶. Rebecca died September, 1827.

Nancy married, 15th June, 1815, Richard Smith; then William Rand, by whom she had a son and a daughter. Then a Mr. Wood. She was married first by Rev. Robert Norris, Rector.

ELISHA, born 8th January, 1757, married 31st May, 1779, Irene Bliss, daughter of Nathaniel and Eunice (Fish) Bliss. He was a farmer, and lived and died in the old house, which, with the farm, has been owned and occupied by his descendants ever since. It is where James,⁷ son of Elisha, reared his large family, and it has passed, since his death, 5th February, 1884, to his grandson Leverett Eugene,⁹ son of Levi.⁸ He died 9th March, 1827. She died 2nd June, 1826. Brenton Hakiburton, son of James, Barrister-at-Law, writes, in 1884 : "The old house, as nearly as I can learn, was built upwards of 102 years ago. It appears that my father's father Elisha, moved into it after he was married, and probably after his eldest son Dan, was born. (He was born 2nd March, 1780). The old structure is of wood—gambrel roof —one story and a half high, I chimney, small porch in front and one at the cast end, a low, miserable head-knocking and dark cellar.

In front of the house is the River Canard, celebrated in old times for the wild ducks which frequented it, and grandfather Elisha is said to have shot partridges from his bed room window. Those were days for sportsmen. In the rear, to the northward of the old house, is the River Habitant, in which I myself have seen 40,000 shad caught in one tide in the seine set across the channel. It is said there was in those times a magnificent hard wood forest on the South side of the main road. A century ago, when the old house was built, the country bore many traces of the long occupancy of the French, and forests still abounded where the Mie-Mac Indians had their small encampments. In those days the tide as it flowed from Minas Basin to the "Grand Dyke" was specked with wild fowl that had little need to fear the sportsman's gun, The old house itself-the oldest Eaton dwelling in Cornwallis except possibly the house where Uncle Ward lived and died, has seen more than a hundred years. Two generations have been born in and have gone forth from it. Grandfather Elisha and grandmother Irene had ten children, and my father, their youngest child, had ten. Now it has passed into the occupancy of my brother Levi's son, Leverett' Eugene, and will, no doubt, behold another generation go forth to people the earth.

"The homestead, as bought by my father, included the land lying between Charles F. Eaton's place on the West and the old Fitch place on the East—in other words it included George Dickey's, Henry A. Eaton's, and the place my father latterly held."

Irene Bliss was born in Connecticut, 4th January, 1761. (See Bliss family genealogy.) Her father, Nathaniel, was born at Lebanon, Conn., 5th August, 1736, removed to Nova Scotia "about 1760" with hisfamily, and his brother Elijah, and both he and Elijah died "about 1778 of small pox." His wife was Eunice Fish. They were originally Congregationalists, but united in the formation of the first Baptistehurch in Cornwallis in the Autumn of 1778.

His children were Eunice, who married a Mr. Beech, Irene, Lydia,who married a Mr. Weaver, Nathaniel born April, 1763; died 1854. Mary married Patrick McInernay 10th September, 1795, (Rev. Robert Norris officiating) and James, who never married. Nathaniel, Senr., was descended in the 5th generation from Thomas Bliss, who came from Belstone parish, Devonshire, England, in company with his brother George, and was followed afterward by his nephew Thomas. The Blissfamily were highly educated, and refined people. They were freeholders, and Puritans, and belonged to the same class in England as Cromwell, Hampton and others, "of whom England has reason to be proud forever." A sister, Elizabeth, of these brothers, was the wife of Sir John Calcliffe, of Belstone. The wife of Thomas Bliss was Margaret, to whom he was married in England, and from them are descended not only Nathaniel Bliss and his daughter Irene, but in the fifth generation the Honorable Jonathan Bliss of New Brunswick, whose public career was long and honorable, for he was successively Attorney General, Chief Justice, and President of Her Majesty's Council for that Province. His father was Captain Luke, and his mother Mercy (Ely) Bliss of Springfield, Mass. And in the 6th generation, his son, the Honorable William Blowers Bliss, Judge of the Supreme Court of Nova Scotia, who married a daughter of Chief Justice S. S. Blowers, and was the father of Mary, (Bliss) wife of the Episcopal Bishop of Nova Scotia ; and of the wife of Bishop Kelly of Newfound-Of this family there are two sons clergymen of the Church of land. England. In the 5th generation was also the Honourable Daniel Bliss of Fredericton, New Brunswick, a loyalist, Chief Judge of the Court of Common Pleas, his son, Judge John Murray Bliss, and his daughter

Hannah, mother of the late Sir Lemuel Allan Wilmot, Governor of New Brunswick.

"It is a remarkable fact," says the author of the Bliss family genealogy, " and without a parallel in history, that three members of one family (Chief Justice Bliss, Judge John Murray Bliss, and Judge Upham, brother-in-law to Hon. Daniel Bliss) sat on the judicial bench at the same time." Judge John Murray Bliss married his cousin, a daughter of Judge Upham.

Elisha and Irene (Bliss) Eaton are buried in the cemetery at Upper Canard, and their graves are marked by two substantial brown stones, whose carefully cut inscriptions, which record simply their names and .ages, and the dates of their deaths, are as fresh as ever :----

Sacred to the memory of ELISHA EATON. Died March 9, 1827, In his 71st year.

Sacred to the memory of IRENE, CONSORT OF ELISHA EATON, Died June 2, 1826, In her 66th year.

(Eliza Irene Barnaby became the wife of Thomas Rand, son of Marchant and Zeviah (Eaton) daughter of Stephen.⁶ George Eaton was for many years prothonotary at Kentville.)

Eunice Deborah married 13th May, 1819, her cousin Ward Eaton,⁷ son of John⁶ and Tabitha (Rand). See Ward.⁷

TIMOTHY, born 27th August, 1758, married 25th October, 1781 Huldah Woodworth, daughter of Thomas and Zeviah Woodworth, and sister of Elizabeth, wife of Stephen.⁶ He was a farmer and owned the property, afterward for many years in the possession of Dr. Charles Cottnam Hamilton, which then adjoined on the east, his brother Stephen's farm. Huldah died 14th Judy, 1807, and he was married 17th December, 1807, by Rev. Robert Norris. Rector of St. John's Church, to Sarah (Rand) Beckwith, a widow, daughter of Caleb and Mary-Rand, a sister of Elizabeth (Rand) wife of Elijah.⁶ (See Rand familygenealogy.) He died July 1834. By his first wife he had

She died in 1828.

Alice was married to Levi Wells, 14th May, 1807, by Rev. Robert Norris, Rector of St. John's Church, and had no children. She died in 1809 or 10.

Olive married 23rd November, 1807, Joseph Rockwell, and had eleven children, Huldah, (who married Isaac Reid); Alice Wells, Sophia, (who married her cousin, James Bragg); Ruth Ann, Mary Lavinia, Gideon Eaton, George Washington, Amanda, Olivia, Wilhelmina, Timothy, Maria. She died 7th October, 1867.

Sarah S. was married 24th January, 1816, to James Bragg, by Rev. Robert Norris, Rector. Had six children, Sarah Alice, James, William, Louisa, Rosina, Abigail. She died 3rd June, 1831.

Sophia married 23rd January, 1823, William Henry Getchell, and had no children. She died 15th January, 1883. They were married by Rev. Robert Norris, Rector.

Abel Strong, son of Stephen and Elizabeth Strong. They were married by the Reverend John Wiswell, Rector of St. John's Church. She died 12th July, 1827. He died 9th July, 1844, in his 83rd year. (See Strong family genealogy.) They are buried in the Upper Canard.



Cemetery, and their graves are marked by neat marble slabs. They lived in that part of Cornwallis known as Billtown and their descendants are numerous, and comprise many respectable and well-to-do people. Perhaps the best known of their children was Dencon Abel Strong, a prominent Baptist.

Cynthia or Huldah (?) married 21st November, 1816, Stephen Loomer.

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ELIJAH, born 16th October, 1763, married 2nd May, 1785, Elizabeth Rand, daughter of Caleb and Mary Rand, born in 1766, sister of Sarah, 2nd wife of Timothy⁶. They were married by Rev. John Wiswell, Rector of St. John's Church. Elijah was a farmer and sailor. He settled at Bass Creek, now known as Medford on Minas Basin, where some of his descendants have always lived. He died about 1816. His wife died 15th October, 1852. They are buried in a small burying ground at Medford, but there are no tombstones.

She married, 2nd, a Kilcup; 3rd, a Green; 4th, a Morris.

Deborah married Noah Rockwell, son of Joseph and Lydia, 12th January, 1814, and had 10 children who lived to grow up.

Prudence was married by the Rev. Robert Norris to John Starr, son of Joseph, 7th October, 1818, (See Starr family genealogy) and had 4 children, 3 of whom grew up. (Her daughter married Arthur Cox.)

Elizabeth married Charles Calkins, 27th November, 1817, and had children.

Charlotte married 26th June, 1817, Joseph Farrin, and had 5 children who grew up.

Rebecca married Hugh McAlmond, and had 4 children who grew up.

Melinda married, 1st, George Bennett; 2nd, William Bishop, and had children by both husbands.

Mary Ann married Jeremiah Tupper, 20th September, 1826, and had 4 daughters who grew up.

Alice Jane married 5th May, 1829, John Sanford of Medford, and has had 5 children, 3 daughters and 2 sons, and is still living (July 11, 1884) with her unmarried daughter, Prudence, in the homestead at Medford, the last of her family.

DAVID, born 13th July, 1765, married 17th January, 1788, Eunice Wells, daughter of Judah and Ann Wells, and sister of John Wells, husband of Prudence.⁶ He was a farmer, and after his father's death owned the land his father had retained, and occupied the house in which his latter years had been spent. They were married by Rev. John Wiswell, Rector of St. John's Church. He died in 1830. His wife died in December, 1850.

Of these daughters, Emily married John Rockwell. son of Asa C. and Ruth Rockwell, 22nd November, 1812, and had children, some of whom are well known. Eunice was married (first) 12th March. 1823, by Rev. Robert Norris, to James Cogswell, son of Mason and Lydia, by whom she had one son, John Leander Cogswell, a druggist in Halifax and Kentville.

(Second.) Ebenezer Kinsman.

Ann married 24th January, 1821, Benjamin Ells, son of Jedediah Ells and brother of Robert and William Ells, who married daughters of John⁶ and Tabitha (Rand).

Asenath married Gurdon Rand 28th November, 1827,

Prudence married James Sivright and moved to Illinois where some of her descendants live. Her children were David S., Susan H., Eunice Ann, George M., Alexander C., Wentworth Eaton, James L., William M. George is a merchant in Sycamore, Illinois, and David lives in McLeod County, Minnesota.

Eliza married Benjamin Ells after her sister Ann's death.

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JAMES, born 14th August, 1767, married (first) Naney Manning, daughter of John Manning of Falmouth, Hants County, sister of John Manning, husband of Deborah.⁶ He was a farmer and owned a farm beside his brother Elisha's, to the Westward, which is now in the possession of the family of the late David Rupert Eaton⁸ of the well known firm of D. R. and C. F. Eaton. They were married probably in the early summer of 1793. James died in May, 1813. Naney died probably in December, 1798, and he married in June 1799, Lucy Farnsworth, who surviving him, married for her second husband, 24th November, 1814, John Sanford, and had children by him—Weighty, Manning, Henry, James.

Eunice, born 16th January, 1820; Enoch, born 3rd March, 1822; Nancy, 1st April, 1824; Daniel, 3rd April, 1825; Ruth, born 20th July, 1828; James Edward, 30th August, 1831; Harriet, 21st August, 1834; Fanny, born 26th August, 1838. Nancy married, 11th January, 1821, Henry Hall, of Granville, Annapolis Co., and had 8 children: Edward, Lucy Ann, Stephen, Watson Grey, Moses, Caroline, Hannah, John. She died 7th September, 1879.

Harriet married, 15th Juno, 1829, Aaron Hardy, of Granville, and had 2 children, Ruth and Prudence.

SUSANNAH, born 24th June, 1769, married 19th December, 1793, Harry Cox, sea captain and captain in the Militia. They lived about two miles below Canning, Kings County, where some of their descendants still live. They were people of large means and of excellent social position. They were married by Rev. William Twining. She died 17th January, 1841. He died 22nd June, 1838. They are buried in the burying ground of the old Congregational Church, below Canning, and their graves are marked by substantial marble slabs.

Sacred to the memory of HENRY Cox. died June 22nd, 1838, In the 70th year of his age. Sacred to the memory of SUSANNAII, HIS WIFE. who died January 17th, 1841, In her 73rd ycar.

Judah was a sea captain, and was once for 18 days without food on the "Water Witch," a wrecked vessel of which he was captain.

Garland married, Ist. Eliza Kezia Pineo, daughter of George of Canning; 2nd, Mrs. James Coffill. He had 5 children, and two sonswere Baptist ministers; one, Rev. E. O. Cox, a graduate of Acadia College, and of the Newton Theological Seminary, is: pastor of Trinity Baptist Church, Brooklyn, New York. The other was Rev. George-Davenport Cox in Nova Scotia, now deceased.

Her daughter, Paulina, married, Ist May, 1815, Charles Starr, and had 4 daughters and 3 sons, one of whom, Judge Charles Starr, is a lawyer in Illinois, another, Joseph Henry a lawyer in California. One son, Christopher, married Mary Jane Eaton⁸, daughter of James⁷, son of Elisha⁶. A daughter is Mrs. Captain Gilliatt of Cornwallis.

Susannah married, 26th June; 1822, Samuel Starr, brother of Charles, and half brother of John. Their son, John Edward, married Martha Eaton⁸, daughter of Ward^{τ}; and their daughter Paulina married Leander Eaton⁸, son of Ward^{τ}. The Starrs nie one of the most intelligent and refined families in Nova Scotia.

Mrs. Paulina Eaton says, "My grandmother, Aunt Susie Cox, as she was called, was beloved by every one, and she and her husband always. moved in the first society in the county. I believe I was her favorite grandchild, and Istill wear a ring she gave me, which her mother, Deborah, (White) wore when she was married. I, too, wore it when I was married."

Note.—This ring, which I hope may be carefully preserved, is, sofar as I know, the only thing belonging to either David or Deborah (White) Eaton, which has come down to the present generation. Most of their belongings were; I suppose, consumed in the fire which destroyed the first house.

DEBORAH, born 6th January, 1771, married 17th May, 1792, John Manning of Falmouth, Hants County, son of John and brother of Nancy, first wife of James.⁶ John Manning was for many years a member of the Provincial Legislature and was a brother of Rev.

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Edward Manning, a widely known and very influential minister of the Baptist Church in Nova Scotia. "Father Manning" and "Father Harding" were among the Pioneer Missionaries in New Brunswick and Nova Scotia, and their names were household words a generation ago. The Mannings have always been people of great respectability and strength of character, but none have occupied more prominent positions than John the husband of Deborah Eaton. They were married in Cornwallis by Rev. William Twining, Rector. She died 11th April, 1829. He died 5th November, 1858 aged 95 years.

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JOHN, born 29th May, 1773, married, 29th May, 179‡, Tabitha Rand, daughter of John and Catherine Rand, and cousin of the i1st wife of Elijah⁶, and the 2nd of Timothy⁶. They were married by the Rev. William Twining. John, in early life, followed the sea, or made occasional voyages; then he settled on a farm near what is still knowu as the "Smith Woods," on the road to Canning. Afterward, he removed to Upper Canard, and owned the place where his son Ward lived and died, and which has passed into the possession of James Stanler⁸, son of Ward. Tabitha died 26th October, 1807, and John married, 28th January, 1808, her sister Abigail Rand. He died 5th May, 1843; Abigail died 14th December, 1848, aged 70 years. John and Abigail are buried in the old burying ground of the Congregational Church below Canning, and there are stones to mark their graves.

Eunice married Charles Frederic Eaton⁸, son of David⁷, son of Elisha⁶.

Jane married, 16th January, 1828, John Russell Coffin, and had 8 children: David Henry, Abigail, Tabitha Jane, Henry Allen, Eunice Maria, Sophronia, Martha and Mary (twins). She is living, July, 1885.

Alice married, 23rd December, 1843, William Cox, son of Thomas and Elizabeth. They had 6 children: Bessie, William, Joseph, John, Abigail, Thomas. Thomas married Eunice Ann Eaton, daughter of Gurdon⁸, son of David⁷, son of David⁶.

Alice died 15th February, 1883.

Olive n'arried James Cox, cousin of Alice's husband. They had children : Martha, William, Mary, Edward, Maria.

Emma married 21st January, 1835, Garrard Beekman Oox, cousin of James and cousin of William. They were sons of three brothers. They had children: George Rufus, Leander, Lucy Jane, Naomi, Lucy. Garrard Beekman died 4th October, 1871, aged 68 years. She is living, July, 1885.

Mary married, 30th January, 1745, George D. Connors. Her children are, Drusilla, Louisn, Albert, George H., Mary E.

She is still living, July, 1885.

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PRUDENCE, born 13th October, 1774; married 31st October, 1793, John Wells, son of Judah and Ann Wells, and brother of Eunice, wife of David. They were married by the Rev. Wm. Twining, Rector of St. John's Church, Cornwallis, the banns having first been published.

John Wells was a merchant in Cornwallis, a magistrate for sixty years, and for twenty-two years represented the County in the Provincial Legislature. He was a man of great prominence and was familiarly known as "Squire Wells." The Wells' were one of the most influential of the Cornwallis families, and at present the High Sheriff of Kings County is Stephen Belcher, son of Mathilda (Wells), and grandson of John and Prudence.

His wife died 6th May, 1875, aged 78 years. They were married by Rev. Robert Norris, Rector of St. John's Church. His son Charles Frederick, writes :--"David Eaton was a man who had the esteem and confidence of the people of his time. He took an active part in military matters and held the commission of Captain in the Militia. When but a young man he was placed in charge of the building of an aboiteau across the Canard River, after several unsuccessful attempts had been made by others, and under his management was brought to a successful issue one of the greatest enterprises ever undertaken in this county, and which has added immensely to the wealth of the inhabitants. Through this undertaking several thousand acres of most valuable land were reclaimed from the sea." In the Christian Messenger of — November, 1847, was published an obituary notice of Mr.Eaton, from which we make some extracts. The article was written by the late Rev. A. S. Hunt :

"We have just witnessed a most solemn and impressive providence. On the afternoon of the 23rd inst., Mr. David Eaton, an esteemed and highly respected member of this community, was removed from earth without a moment's warning. He died of heart disease, with which he had been atllieted some years. His funeral took place on the 25th, and the attendance showed how greatly Mr. Eaton was respected, and here member of the congregation, and manifested as much interest in the welfare of the church as any member."

When Ward Eaton was 8 or 9 years old his father purchased the fine place in Upper Canard, Cornwallis, which at his death passed to this son and where in the low roofed cottage, with its narrow halls and doorways, its roomy, hospitable parlors, and quaint bedrooms, he and his honored wife reared their family of six children, and for many long years welcomed their friends from city and country. One of their grandchildren writes, "there was a chaim about that house that there never can be about any other." "The odor of rose leaves that came through the doors," was always a perfumed prophecy of the delightful hospitality one could never fail to meet there. Intellectual and cultured people loved to gather around their table, and more exquisitely prepared and served dinners than Grandmama's, I have never seen or It seems but yesterday since the prairie roses bloomed protasted. fusely on the outer walls, and the dear old garden was full of gay flowers, while within "Uncle Ward" and "Aunt Debby," as they were known far and wide, dispensed their refined hospitality. The Rev. Dr. Crawley, the Rev. Dr. Cramp, the Rev. Dr. Pryor, the Rev. A. S. Hunt, James DeMille, the novelist, the Rev. Dr. Sawyer, President of Acadia College, the late J. W. Nutting, Esq., and many other cultured and delightful men, were not unfrequent visitors, while all the older grandchildren and not seldom the city cousins revelled in the charm of Grandma's presence and Grandpa's good natured attention. It was a home to which guests were always welcomed freely, and where each one's visit was as delightful as the most delicate thoughtfulness could make it." This charming old cottage, now unoccupied, was originally built for Irene Bliss to go into as a bride, but her earliest matrimonial plans having failed, the house subsequently passed into the hands of John⁶, whose son Ward, in 1819, many years after brought Irene Bliss's daughter into it a bride.

The following widely copied poem by a grandson of Ward and Eunice Deborah Eaton, is commemorative of the old house and its surroundings :---

AT GRANDMOTHER'S.

Under the shade of the poplars still, Lilacs and locusts in elamps between, Roses over the window sill, Is the dear old house with its doors of green.

Never were seen such spotless floors Never such shining rows of tin, While the rose-leaf odors that came thro' the doors, Told of the peaceful life within.

Here is the room where the children slept, Grandmamma's children, tired with play, And the famous drawer where the cukes were kept, Shrewsbury cookles and caraway.

The gardon walks where children ran, Tosmell the flowers and learn their names, The children thought, since tho world began, Wore never such garden walks for games.

There were tulips and asters in regular lines, Sweet-Williams and marigolds on their stalks, Bachelor's buttons and sweet pea vines, And box that hordered the narrow waks. Pitre white lilies stood cornor-wise From sunflowers yellow and poppies red And the summer pinks looked up in surprise At the kingly hollyhoeks overhead.

Morning glories and larkspur stood Close to the neighborly daffodil ; Cabbage roses and sonther wood Roamed thro' the beds at their own sweet will.

Many a year has passed since then, Grandmana's house is empty and still Grandmana's babies have grown to men And the roses grow wild o'er the window sill.

Never again shall the children meet Under the poplars gray and tall, Never again shall the careless feet Dance thro' the rose-leaf scented hali.

Grandmama's welcome is heard no more And the children are scattered far and wide, And the world is a larger place than of yore But hallowed memories still abide.

And the children are better men to-day For the cakes and rose-leaves and garden walks, And grandmother's welcome so far away And the old sweet williams on their stalks.

Ward Eaton was a man of dignified presence, courteous manners and a generous heart. He was for many years a Justice of the Peace, and for a long period, until his death, Town Clerk. He was an excellent business man and was frequently called upon to settle arbitrations. When acting as Justice he invariably secured a settler ent of disputes before they came to trial, and he was thus often of great service to his neighbors and the community. In politics he was a strong conservative, and while he rarely said much, he would expend any amount of time or money in the advancement of party ends. He was a warm friend and advocate of such conservative leaders as the late Judge Johnstone who was for many years Attorncy-General, and died soon after his appointment to the Governorship of Nova Scotia. He acted occasionally as executor of the estates of his relatives, and in their satisfactory settlement he never spared any pains. He died at a ripe age, but before his vigor of mind or body had perceptibly declined.

Of Mrs. Ward Eaton, her nephew, the Reverend William Wentworth Eaton writes, and to those who knew her his tribute will not seem exaggerated: "I could write a volume about "Aunt Debby," your dear and honored Grandmother. Her heart was a deep fountain of sympathy, always sparkling, bubbling and running over in the presence of either joy or sorrow. If she had faults I never knew them." Not only her own relatives and friends, but the poor, were the constant objects of her thoughtfulness; and while far from blind to the faults or the crudeness of those about her, few words of censure ever passed her lips. During the latter years of his life her unmarried brother, John, was an inmate of her home, and no brother was ever more tenderly cared for than poor "Uncle John." There was one wound in her heart that never healed, and that was caused by the sudden death by drowning of her third son Rufus, in Boston harbor on the 4th November, 1851. She never got over that, and "poor Rufie's" name was always uttered with more than usual tenderness; and his daughter Grace, was exceptionally dear to her.

She was a member of the large and flourishing Baptist Church to which many of her kindred belong, the date of her baptism and reception being — December, 1839, the date also of the baptism of her daughter Isabel and her son Rufus.

HONORS FOR A NOVA SCOTIAN.

Yesterday was commencement day at Harvard college, and among the degrees conferred was that of Doctor of Philosophy upon Benjamin Rand, son of Ebenezer Rand, Revenue Collector at Canning, and grandson of the late Ward Eaton, of Canard, Kings County. Dr. Rand has had an exceptional career as a student. Graduating A. B. from Acadia at the age of 10, in 1875, he pursued his studies, after a trip to the Mediterranean, at Harvard where he was admitted to the degree of A. B. with honors in 1878. The three years following were spent partly at Newton Theological School and partly at Harvard as a post graduate where, in 1880, he received the degree, as speaker for commencement day. Additional honor was comferred upon Mr. Rand when in 1882 the president and fellows of Harvard elected him to the Walker fellowship which permitted him to travel and study abroad. He proceeded at once to Heidelberg where he studied under the celebrated philosopher Kuno Fischer. Before returning home he travelled much in Germany, Switzerland, Italy and France, and this year has won a distinction of which Harvard is very chary. Dr. Rand is the third man whom she has ever admitted to the degree of Ph. D. in the department of philosophy. His thesis presented for this degree was "Consciousness and Immortality." Dr. Rand has thus not only won for himself great distinction while very young, but he has qualified himself most thoroughly by an extensive and liberal course of study, for his life work in the profession of teaching.

Mr. Benjamin Rand, who received from Harvard on Wednesday the degree of Ph.D., is a graduate of the class of 1879, and is of the same family as Benjamin Rand of the class of 1808, one of the ablest lawyers of his time in Boston, who received from his alma mater in 1846 the degree of LL.D. The present Benjamin Rand has held the Walker fellowship for three years, and has studied in Heidelberg under Kuno Fischer. He is the third upon whom Harvard has conferred the degree of Ph.D. in the department of philosophy, the others being Francis Ellingwood Abbott and Professor G. Stanley Hall.

He is now a venerable man, genial and kindly in his nature, possessing strong literary tastes, and deeply interested in the progress of this genealogy which he has greatly aided. For some years he was conbected with the Chicago Journal of Commerce. He has lived for many years in Chicago, and his letter address is 70, State St., Chicago.

From a memorial pamphlet printed in Washington soon after Col. Eaton's death, I make the following extracts which will sufficiently show the esteem in which he was held, and the fidelity he manifested in the many resitions of trust to which he had been called :

ADDRESS BY FEV. J. E. RANKIN, WASHINGTON, D. C.

"Judging as man judges, the forty-seven years of his earthly life, now rounded by this sleep, do not seem to us, who knew him for what God had implanted in him, to have provided the precise niche for which these endowments so richly furnished him. While he lived such a noble and efficient life, and has left so pure a memory, and has done so much, it is no doubt true that he sometimes felt the presence within him of powers as yet unexercised; that he had a furnishing, by nature and by culture, for a wider and more influential sphere than he ever occupied. He had the kindling eye, the stirring tones, the magnetic action, the logical and imaginative processes of a man intended to address listening assemblies, and to vindicate truth and righteousness in debate, to plead the ferlorn cause of the oppressed, 1 think I shall be sustained in this statement, especially by those who knew him in the academy and in college, and perhaps by those who have known him in the Territorial Council, of which he has been a member from its organization. Borne away upon the current of public events from literary and professional pursuits into business life, with the mill-stone

of long-seated disease hanging about his neck, and dragging him down, that became impossible for which he seemed so especially endowed; of which his various gifts seemed to be so prophetic.

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Were I to enumerate his characteristics, I should set down first, his When he gave a friend his hand, he put his heart in it. truthfulness. When you looked into his glowing eye, you looked into the depths of soul. You saw that the *ends* which he had in view were noble, and soul. that he sought them directly and in no sinuous way. And if there was anything which he despised, and against which all the strength of his nature revolted, it was deceitfulness in purpose or in method. This truthfulness was in his very carriage, his style written or spoken; it was the very corner-stone of his character. He loved the sunlight of the truth, and walked in it, whoever else might skulk in shadowy places. And whatever he thought the truth, he defended with might and main. If there ever was a man who had chivalrous devotion to what he regarded right, it was our departed brother. No man ever spoke more burning words in advocacy of the cause of the poor and needy than did he.

Another characteristic of our friend was his fidelity. He never betrayed a trust; he never deserted a friend. Though all other men forsook you, yet would not he. He fastened himself to his friends with hooks of steel. If they were falsely charged, his voice was the first lifted up in their defence. He cast about to see what he could do by word, by correspondence, through the press, in any and every way, to stay the tide of detraction that threatened to overwhelm them. And this fidelity related to all responsibilities, secular and religious, which he was called upon to assume. He was fuithful in that which was committed to him. It was a sacred trust which he sacredly fulfilled. He wronged no man; he corrupted no man; he defrauded no man. This he has often said was his daily prayer to God around the family altar before he left home, that he might be faithful. He was faithful to the sanctuary; he was faithful to the Sabbath school; he was faithful to the prayer meeting; but he was no less faithful to the slightest secular trust committed to his keeping at the banking house, or in the Legislative Body. He wanted to be, he tried to be, faithful everywhere, to everybody.

Thave before me a note from or e of his Sabbath school class, received this morning; one paragraph of i^{-} reads as follows: "If we knew he was in the city and not confined to bis bed we watched the door for his entrance, and a glad smile went round the class when he appeared. Many times during the last two years of his life, our pleasure on greeting him was dampened by h \sim look of suffering; and when questioned he would reply, 'Yes, I and in great distress.' But as soon as the lesson commenced, which he dways taught from his Greek Testament when that portion of the Bu e was studied, he because so engaged that his pains were all forgotten. He loved best to teach the Gospels and Epistles; and he always came to his class thoroughly furnished for his work.

Until his life in Pittsburg, he lad never been a professed Christian

Industrious, upright, strictly temperate, with native nobleness of character, he had struggled manfully through his preparatory, collegiate, and professional studies-the pride and admiration of those who best knew him. He had married the woman of his young choice. Then death came and took away their first-born. It was the lowering of that little casket into the grave, that seemed to open the Kingdom of Heaven to him. From that time, he was ready to avow himself a Christian, dependent upon Christ alone for salvation. When the First Congregational Church was organized here, with his wife he united with it, throwing all the generous impulses of his nature into the enterprise. And he loved it to the last. It was to him as the apple of his eye. He was never tired of planning and consulting and contributing for its success. By the instinct of his being he was drawn to any institution that sought to embody and maintain the rights of man, Man's equality with man before his Maker, he would defend at all hazards. To defend this church; to plan it; to make it a permanent monument to this great principle, awakened all his native chivalry. He loved to represent it at the Conference of churches; he loved to propagate its principles Southward. Two things were central in his mind, and again and again alluded to in our meetings : That the eclored people were the only hope of the South ; that the stone which the builders had rejected had become the head-stone of the corner; and that the Pilgrim polity of church government was the grand hope of the colored people in the South; the far-seeing wisdom of which conceptions, perhaps, the future may more clearly indicate than the present.

Many of you are personally familiar with the more prominent events in our brother's history, and they have already appeared in the public prints; but I will briefly enumerate them. Born in 1824; titting for college at Yarmouth, Maine, with such men as our brother General Howard, for whom he cherished a lifelong devotion, and who fitly held his hand in death; graduating at Bowdoin College in 1851, he read law in Portland; taught in Louisville, Kentucky; was connected with the press in Pittsburg; came to Washington for a few weeks, as newspaper correspondent, in 1861; remained through the war as paymaster in the Army; was appointed actuary of the Freedman's Savings and Trust Company, and died eashier of the Second National Bank, which position he accepted last June. Having a large and active brain—aspiring in his nature, modestly sensible of his gifts—from his youth he wrought industriously and faithfully and triumphantly to do well his work in life. Everyone who knew him recognized in him—

> 'A contribution and a form, 'Whene od did seem to set his seal, 'To give the world assurance of a man.'

His very restless activity, the largeness of his heart and of his purpose, betrayed him into over-work. From his college-days, followed by dyspepsia, it at last triumphed over his will and energy and despite the skillful ministrations of his medical attendants and the kindest and most persistent of affectionate care, last Lord's day afternoon he fell asleep in Jesus.

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He knew that his hour had come. Until two days before his death, he had hoped to recover ; had talked of a journey to his native State. He had another journey before him. Still he, doubtless, had long felt the critical character of his condition, and had often thought the matter over in his own bosom. And when that morning, between 10 and 11, a Christian physician stooped over him with the question how he regarded his prospects of recovery, he replied: "Uutil the last two days I had expected to get up again; but I am now convinced I shall not." He was arked again, "If God saw fit to take him away soon, whether he felt perfectly satisfied with His will?" His answer came quick and firm, "I do?" He was then asked "If he felt that Jesus was his Saviour and portion forever." He replied, with the same direct simplicity, "Yes." Comforting words from the Bible and sacred hymns were spoken by Christian friends in his hearing, until he passed away.

And thus to him closed his brief, well-filled, active earthly life, and he stepped over the threshold of the Heavenly life and disappeared. We part with him to-day; but we shall meet him again. He sleeps in Jesus. He will be missed wherever he has been known. There will not only be a vacancy; but a vacancy not to be filled. Others may take some of the *places* which he has filled. But, in friendship, in social and public circles, in faithful service, few men can be what he has been."

Obituary-Colonel D. L. Eaton.

This well-known citizen of Washington departed this life yesterday at 3.30 o'clock p. m., at his residence, near Howard University. Among the friends around him was General O. O. Howard, a man whom he loved and honored with all the intensity of his nature, and who had been his associate in the academy and in college, and whose hand he held in death.

This event takes away from our citizens a man of the strictest integrity -a man who has held important business and public trusts, and whose reputation is with istíč ded, nter gret

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out a stain. He was nearked by a chivalrie devotion to his friends, an unswerving loyalty to what he believed to be right, and a generosity and enthusiasm which lent themselves to every worthy cause. Born in 1824, he graduated at Bowdoin College in 1851; read law with Shepley & Dana, in Portland Maine; taught in Louisville, Kentucky; was connected with the press in Pittsburg; came to Washington, as correspondent, in 1861; was appointed paymaster in the army, and so remained until Savings and Trust Company, at its principal office in this city, till last June, when Savings and trust company, at its principal once in this city, thi last sume, when he became cashier of the Second National Bank, which position he held at his death. In all these positions he proved himself a man without fear and without reproach, and his death makes a void not easily filled. From its inception, Colonel Eaton had been a member of the First Congregational Church, and its success has been largely due to his zeal and fidelity, and few of its members have been more ready to bear their share of its burdens and responsibilities than himself. He was also a member of the Territorial Council. We assure his family of the warmest sympathy in their

Colonel Eaton is dead. The colored people have sustained a great loss. He was true to them in sympathy and labor. Connected with the Freedman's Bank from its commencement, he did much to give it tone and efficiency. He was wise in the selection of his coadjutors, and sagacious in his business plans for the promotion of selection of his computers, and sugarious in his onsmess plans for the promotion of every interest affecting the Freedman's Saving Bank, which we regard as one of the best educational institutions among us. While it is true that the idea of such an institution was originated by J. W. Alvord, Esq., and seconded by Senator Summer, yet it required some such devoted agent as Colone'. Eaton to make it a success. In departing from us, he leaves in this institution a monument of which all who are connected with him may be justly proud .- New National Era.

D. RUPERT EATON.

Your many readers have heard with regret of the death of Mr. Eaton, senior member of the business firm of D. R & C. F. Eaton. His last illness was brief and his death unexpected. He had come on business to Cornwallis, his former place of residence, and there, on the morning of the 20th inst, he passed away from the cares and toils of this life to the rest above. He leaves a widow, six sons, and three daughters, and a large number of warmly attached relatives to mourn their loss in his death.

Mr. Eaton was baptized Dec. 12th, 1847, by the late Rev. A. S. Hunt, into the fellowship of the 1st Baptist Church, Canard, Cornwallis. His conversion was a thorough acceptance of Christ, both as Lord and Saviour. From Him he never withdrew his allegiance. Of his interest in Christ, and his final acceptance with God through him, he cherished no doubt ever after. As a Christian, Mr. Eaton was tender-hearted, true, and brave. A struggling soul

would find a ready audience with him during the busiest days of his intensely busy

life. He had a word of sympathy for the poor, and for those who had wandered from the ways of peace and virtue, and at all times. The gospel was ever acceptable to him, and his eye often revealed the tenderness of his emotions as he spoke of the grace of Christ to himself, a sinner, and commended him to others. He was true to his convictions, and brave enough to follow them. At several periods in his life he was strongly urged by friends to accept public positions open to him, but from the conviction that it was not best for him to do so, he declined them. He ever followed *his own* sense of duty.

His interest in the church of Christ was very deep and permanent. He sought her advancement, manifesting a generous and kindly spirit toward all that love our Lord Jesus Christ. His intercourse with those of his own denomination was brotherly in a remarkable degree He was modest in giving his opinious, but he held them with great tenacity. He was "a lover of good men." He was "given to hospitality."

As a business man Mr. Eaton was widely known. Left at the early age of nineteen, by the sudden death of his father, at the head of quite a large family, with a farm under a mortgage, he and his only brother, two years younger than himself, bravely set themselves to work to save the homestead for their mother and sister, and to secure for them a livelihood. And nobly they succeeded.

While still quite young Mr. Eaton entered upon mercantile life, and, in company with his brother, has built up a very extensive business. His energy, good judgment, industry and integrity have won for him a wide influence in business circles His death wrings from many hearts a sigh, and from many lips the expression, " What a loss?"

May his sudden removal from the busy scenes of his busy life lead us all to consider more seriously the matter of being in readiness for the coming of the Master.

IN MEMORIAM.

Once more the death Angel has written finis to a life's history, and we are left to chronicle that Wells Eaton, aged 59 years, 2 months and 4 days is no more. He died at his home in Post Township, Allamakee Co., Iowa, May 6th, 1881.

For years Mr. Exton was in poor health, and for a year or two past it had been evident to the loving ones of his household that he was liable to be taken from them at any time. His death has caused a general sadness throughout his large eircle of acquaintances. Mr. Eaton was born in Kings County, Nova Seotia, March 2nd,

1822. He was unlted in marriage to Miss Mary Wood, March 26th, 1845. Dur-ing the summer of the same year he removed with his young wife to Walworth. County, Wisconsin. He remained in this state until 1853. In Angust of this-year he settled in Post Township, Allamakee County, lowa, where he has since resided. He was the father of eleven children, nine of whom, with their mothers mourn their irreparable loss. In 1858 with his family and a few others, he gave his name as a member of the Church of the United Brethren in Christ, Here, rs elsewhere, he proved himself worthy of confidence. He was one of the Board of Trustees of Bethel Church at the time of its erection and held the position until his death. Starting upon the lower round of the ladder of life, by patient toil, close economy, and heroic perseverance, he was able to provide for the wants of a growing family and leave them a competence at the time of his death. He was possessed of a good mind and unclouded judgment. When administering the affairs of orphan children he has been known to carry a penny wrapped in a piece of paper that he might keep their f.mds from his own. This simple instance of his sempulous honesty, will serve as an index to his moral worth and christian integrity. His mauly virtues are enough to till a volume, while the few foibles of his life are completely obliterated in the sorrow attendant upon the loss of this noble husband, father, neighbor and friend. 

William Eaton was educated in the Common Schools, and in Horton Academy, developing a great fondness for mathematics, chemistry and the classics.

In May, 1840, when he was in his 17th year, he began teaching in Upper Canard, and continued in the same school for two years. In January, 1845, he took charge of the school in Lawrencetown, Annapolis County, and remained there a year and four months. He then taught one winter in Canard, and in May, 1847, became master of the Kentville Grammar School, which position he retained for seven years, until the Spring of 1854.

Soon after this he was appointed Commissioner of Schools, which position he has held continuously ever since, except during the term of his Inspectorship of Schools. In 1859 he was appointed a Commissioner in the Supreme Court of the Province, and in November, 1867, the Government, acting through the Council of Public Instruction, conferred on him the appointment of Inspector of Schools for the "County of King's. He remained in office until November, 1868, when a change of government caused his removal.

In 1870, he was created a Justice of the Peace, and this year (1885) for the fourth time, he is Secretary of the Provincial Agricultural and Industrial Exhibition.

The compiler of these records desires to recognize here his Father's valuable assistance in his genealogical work.

Of his mother, the compiler of this genealogy, must always speak with the deepest affection and reverence. She was the youngest child of Otho and Maria (Starr) Hamilton, and was born in the old homestead of her mother and grandmother, which in 1852-3 and 1862-3 came into the hands of her husband, William Eaton. The place had been known for many years as "The Royal Oak," but in these days with a new and larger house differently situated from the old, it is called " Elmwood." The old house, which was a pieturesque old storey and a half cottage, burned in 1882, had an interesting history which will be found in the forthcoming history of Kings County. Partly covered with creepers, shaded by the huge old oak that gave it its earliest name, and by two or three large willows, on the high hill reached by a flight of wooden steps, commanding a beautiful view of dykes and fields and groves it was always one of the chief points of interest in Kentville. The place had been owned first by Cyrus Peck, whose second wife was Mrs. Lydia (DeWolf) Starr, and when he died she retained it and afterward sold it to Otho Hamilton, her son-in-law.

Fond of society, and much admired, Mrs. Eaton was devoted to her home and her family, and her death, which eccurred on the 23rd of September, 1883, after only ten days illness, was to them a great sorrow. She sleeps in "The Oaks" Cemetery beside her little Emily, whose death made a wound in her tender heart that never healed.

[The Hamiltons are of Scottish descent, Henry, the father of Otho, having been born in Scotland in 1747 or 8. Otho was born 2nd May, 1784, and was married to Maria Starr, daughter of Samuel Starr and Lydia (DeWolf) 19th June. 1813. Their children were Susan, Minetta Bath, Henry Starr, Margaret Maria, Otho, Josephine Collius (married John Rufus Eaton⁸) and Anna Augusta Willenghby. Otho Hamilton. Senr., died 21st May, 1831; Maria (Starr) died 3rd January, 1872.]

Arthur Wentworth Hamilton, the compiler of these records, received his early classical and general training in the grammar schools of Kentville, from his father at home, and for a short time in the College and Academy at Wolfville. In the Autumn of 1873 he went to Boston, to take a course of study for the ministry. He was graduated at Newton Theological Seminary in 1876, and at Harvard University in 1880. He then became a candidate at Harvard for the degree of Doctor of Philosophy, from which, however, want of time soon compelled him to withdraw. On the 8th of June, 1884, he was admitted to Deacon's Order in the Protestant Episcopal Church by the Bishopof Indiana, having previously been in charge of the Church of the Holy Innocents, Indianapolis. Since that time he has resided in Stockbridge; Massachusetts, and in New York City preaching and writing. He was unde Priest by Assistant Bishop H C. Potter of New York, 22nd April, 1885, to which diocese he belongs.

During a large part of the past twelve years he has lived in Boston and Cambridge, preaching occasionally, writing for the press, and teaching private pupils. At present (July 1885) he is an assistant minister of St. Mark's Church, New York, Rev. Dr. Rylance, Rector. His address is either Kentville, Nova Scotia, er 2 and 3 Bible House, N. Y.

Frank Herbert had much the same training as his brother. In 1873 he completed a four years course of Study at Acadia College, Wolfville, and received the degree of Bachelor of Arts. He then became Principal of the Shelburne Academy, a positionhe filled most satisfactorily during one term from May until November, 1873. In November of the same year he went to Cambridge, and was graduated at Harvard University in 1875, having made for himself an excellent record. In August 1875 he was appointed teacher of Greek and Natural Science in Horton Academy Wolfville, N. S., where he remained until June 1877. In August 1877 he entered on a post-graduate course in philology in Harvard University, which he pursued for a year and then became principal of Amherst Academy, Amherst, N S., which position he held until November 1st, 1879, when he received an election to the professorship of mathematics and physics in the Provincial Norn al School at. Truro. Nova Scotia which he still holds. In 1883 he published a text book on practical mathematics, for the use of High Schools in Nova Scotia.

In 1876 he received the degree of A. M. from Acadia College, Wolfville, and during 1879 and 1880 was examiner in mathematics and physics in Halifax University.

Rufus William was fitted for College at Horton Academy in 1873-4 and 1875-6, and was matriculated at Acadia College in 1876. At the end of his freshman year he left college and in 1881 went to Boston and for a time was a student at Bryant and Stratton's Commercial' College, which he left for a clerkship in the steel and iron business From Boston he went to New York in 1882; and in February 1881 hereturned to Nova Scotia and began business for himself in Kentville.

Harry Havelock was fitted for college at Horton Academy in 1874-5 and 1875-6, and was matriculated at Acadia College in 1876. Hecompleted the freshman year and since then has taught in various places in Nova Scotia and the United States. The winter of 1880 was spent at the Normal School at Truro, where he was recognised as a teacher of much ability, and from which he received a Superior diploma. In 1881 he became a student of law in Sycamore, Illinois, and at this date (July 1885) he has nearly completed his preparations for the Illinois Bar.

JOHN RUFUS, born 3rd July, 1826; married 1st December, 1849, in Kentville, Josephine Collins Hamilton, fourth daughter of Otho and Muria (Starr) Hamilton, born 11th December, 1826; They were married by the Rev. John Storrs, Rector.

John Rufus was in business first in Kentville, Nova Scotia, and afterwards in Boston, Mass., where he was a member of the Ship-Chandlery and Commission firm of J. Rufus Eaton & Company. He was always a genial and generous man. His death was sudden and sad; he was drowned while rowing in Boston harbor, 4th November, 1961, and is buried in Garden Cemetery, Chelsea, Mass.

THE EATON FAMILY ASSOCIATION

Representing the descendants of the early settlers of that name in New England, was organized in Boston, 22nd July, 1882, for the purpose of compiling and preserving the records of the families of the name of EATON. The Association consists of about 200 members residing in all parts of the United States.

Where the Eatons came from in England has not yet been ascertained, but investigation is continually being made.

The complete Genealogy of the Haverhill Eatons, to which the Nova Scotia Eatons belong, is in course of preparation, the Rev. Dr. William Hadley Eaton having it in charge. When it is published it will include the present record, and it is hoped that many of the Nova Scotia Eatons will at once subscribe for it and thus learn about their kindred who remained in the United States.

Errors will, of course, be found in this boek, although the compiler has taken great pains to make it accurate. As a rule they are due to the imperfection of the records sent him. Wherever mistakes are found or blanks occur it is earnestly asked that each person will promptly correct or fill them in his own copy, and also notify the compiler.

It is likewise hoped that each family will henceforth carefully preserve all letters or other documents belonging to its members, and that in each a Family Register shall be faithfully kept.

It is proposed soon to erect a monument to the memory of David Eaton and the several members of his family whose unmarked graves are in the old cemetery near Hamilton's corner in Cornwallis. That this has never yet been done is a shame to the numerous loyal descendants of David and Delorah Eaton. It is heped that when a call is made for money for this worthy object there will be a very liberal response.

The manuscript of this Genealogy will be deposited in the New England Historical and Genealogical Society's Rooms in Beston, and it is earnestly requested that notices of all important events in the Nova Scotia Eaton Family be sent the author of this Genealogy, in eare of William Eaton, Esq., Kentville, N. S.

APPENDIX.

THE WILLOUGHBY FAMPLY.

There is no record preserved in the Eaton family, of the second marriage of David Eaton⁹, but it has been obtained from the parish register of St. John's Church, Cornwallis, where it is clearly set down as having occurred on the 23rd of December, 1790, the Reverend William Twining officiating.

Alice (English) Willoughby, when he married was the widow of Dr. Samuel Willoughby, to whom she was married by Isaac Desharrys, Esquire, the 28th August, 1760. The children of Dr. Samuel and Alice Willoughby, were


> Sanah, born 8th February, 1762. Samuel, born 6th October, 1763. Olive, born 5th February, 1765. Charlotte, born 30th June, 1767. Augustus, born 2nd February, 1771.

Augustus married 6th March, 1794, Elizabeth Sterr, sister of Samuel Starr, the compiler's great grandfather, and was the father of the late Samuel Augustus Willoughby, Esquire, of Brooklyn, N. Y.

Dr. Samuel Willoughby is mentioned in Mardoch's History of Nova Scotin, as having applied in 1761, for "another half right in the township of Cornwallis." He is called "a person of considerable substance." In 1761, he was elected to the Legislature, but in May, 1762, his seat was declared vacant, for non-attendance, and a writ was issued for a new election. In 1770, he again represented Cornwallis in the House of Assembly, and again from 1774 to 1776, when he was superseded by Mr. John Chipman. Scmetime between this date and December, 1790, he died, but when and where is not known, and the place of his burial is uncertain. Neither is there any record of Alice English Willoughby Eaton's death or place of burial.

Dr. Samuel Willoughby lived on the well-known "Gesner" place, near Kentville, now owned by Ralph Samuel Eaton⁹, Leander⁸, Ward⁷, John⁹.

The Willoughbys were church people and probably related to the Rev. Mr. Willoughby, about that time Rector of Windsor. The parish church at Cornwallis, contains the record of the baptisms of all the children of Augustus Willoughby.



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
