






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SILK-CULTURE CIRCULAR, No. S.

## U. S. Department of Agriculture,

Washington, L. G. Gasii 22. 1888.

In view of the growth of the industry of silk-culture in the United States, it has been thought advisable to establish stations for the purpose of experimenting in the veeling of raw silk.
