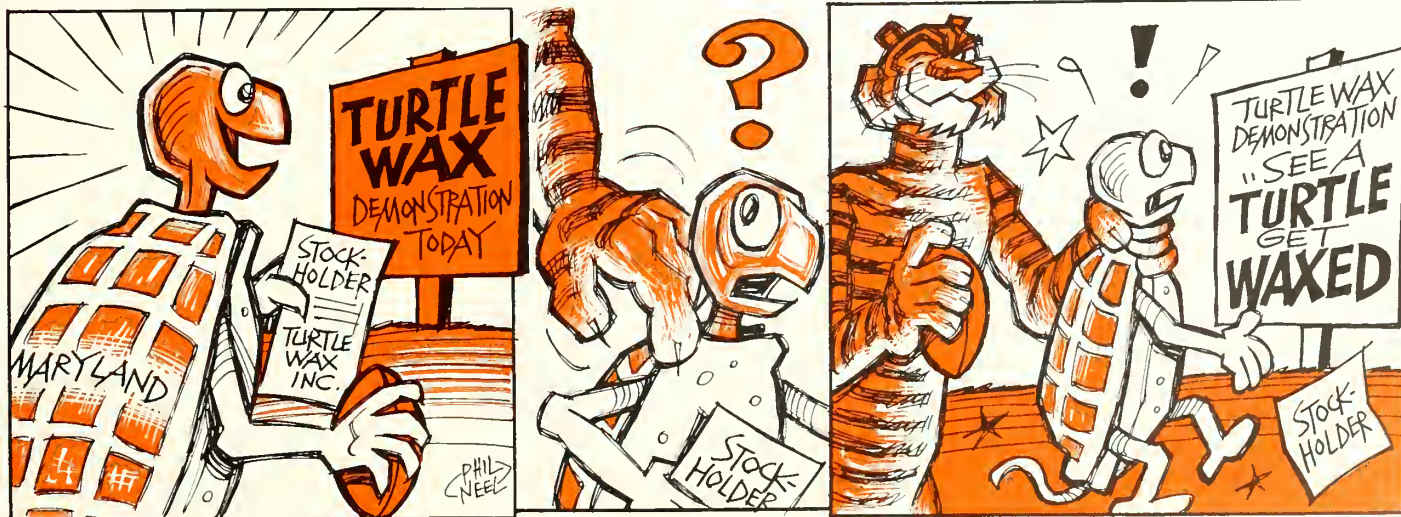

Seniors' Last Hurrah

Maryland's football team is like the stereotypical image that television has created about in-laws. They come around too often and irritate you to death. Maryland is one of two teams in the Atlantic Coast Conference which has the upper hand in the series record with Clemson and the Terrapins have won seven of the last 10 meetings. There is nothing that Danny Ford and his Tiger Police Force would like better than to give the Terrapin Bowl Express a speeding ticket.

Maryland coach Bobby Ross has twice brought a team into Death Valley, and both times, Ross' Citadel teams took Clemson to the wall before the Tigers escaped with 14-12 and 10-7 wins over the Bulldogs. In 1983, last year's ACC Coach of the Year comes in with a different breed of animal in the Top 20 ranked Terrapins. Clemson will have to play as well as it did against North Carolina to avoid being the eighth ingredient in Maryland's 1983 batch of turtle soup.

More than balloons will be filling the air over Memorial Stadium today as Maryland has had more than a passing fancy with football since Norman Julius Esiason, Jr. started at quarterback 30 games ago. Mr. Esiason is another of those quarterbacks, like Doug Flutie, Ben Bennett and Gary Schofield, who believe air superiority is the key to winning football games.

In his nearly three-year career, the 6-4, 200-pound quarterback who so loves the University of Maryland he put "Terp QB" on his automobile license plate, has thrown out the old record book and replaced it with one that more prominently mentions his name. Esiason holds the Maryland record for attempts, completions, yard passing, touchdown passes and touchdown responsibility, total plays, most yards passing and rushing, and amount of times bringing his team back to victory. The Blond Bomber brought Maryland from a 21-7 deficit last year against Clemson before finally falling 24-22 in Bobby Ross' only con-

terence loss in his 10-game career. Last week, Auburn coach Pat Dye went for a fourth-and-five because he said that the best defense against Esiason was to keep him on the bench.

This quarterback is also accurate, as he has completed 56 percent of his passes for nearly half a mile and he has only thrown interceptions six times this season. Last week, Esiason threw for 355 yards against Auburn to set one of his many single-game records and two of his better games have come against Clemson (167 yards in 1981 and 279 last year).

A little-known statistical category is nicknames, and this native of East Islip, NY who quarterbacks Maryland leads the country in this area, as Esiason has been called "Boomer" since before he was born.

Quarterbacks who throw constantly have to have a set or multiple sets of hands on the other end of these aerials in order to be successful, and Maryland has some good sets. Greg Hill, a junior from Seat Pleasant, MD, is Esiason's favorite catch partner as he has 435 yards on 21 receptions. Hill has some records of his own, as he holds the Maryland mark for touchdowns with 13, six of which have come this year. Maryland also has thrown to its backs, as the two fullbacks, Rick Badanjek and Dave D'Addio, have 41 receptions between them. D'Addio won't catch any today, however, he is out for the season with an injury. About the only people the Terrapins don't throw to are the chaingangs.

Maryland, contrary to popular opinion, does run the ball and they have a good deal of success doing it, too. Willie Joyner, a senior from Brooklyn, NY, leads the overlooked ground attack with 750 yards on 161 attempts. Badanjek and D'Addio have scored the most, however, as they have crossed the goal line seven and five times, respectively.

Maryland runs the wide-tackle-six on defense, which is very difficult to play against and looks like an awkward 4-3 alignment. Inside linebacker Eric Wilson is the leading tackler on the team with 153 stops, including 13 last week against Auburn. Wilson is a big

play man and he doesn't mind hitting you just on general principle. The conference leader in interceptions, Clarence Baldwin, anchors the Maryland Theft Corps. This Hyattsville, MD, native is seventh on the team in tackles and he has seven steals to his credit.

The nation's two longest extra point streaks will be on the line today as Maryland's Jess Atkinson and Clemson's Bob Paulling go foot-to-foot. Atkinson has 75 straight PATs while Paulling has been successful on his last 63 efforts (including bowl games). Paulling has more kicks this season, however, leading 28-24. Atkinson, only a junior, has an excellent shot at the national record next year, which is 124. In the field goal department, Paulling again has the edge as the St. Matthews, SC product is 14-16, while his Terrapin counterpart is 13-17.

O.K. Tigers. You can put your test papers away. The team has finally answered all of the questions. After weeks of having just about everybody wonder when this group would play good football, the world found out last week in Chapel Hill, NC. Both the Clemson offense and defense played all 60 minutes and even though North Carolina held the edge in statistics, the Tigers dominated every other phase of the game, including the major one — the final score. The Tigers were "offensive" enough to score 16 points and the Clemson stop-troops continually came up with the big play to keep the Tar Heels out of the endzone. North Carolina only had one long drive and that march led to the lone home team field goal.

While the North Carolina game was what will be filed under "Big Win — Total Team," the play of several individuals must be noted.

Senior defensive tackle James Robinson has not only upped his stock with the pro scouts, but he has also kept the Tiger faithful breathing with his big plays. Against Duke, this native of Charleston, SC, only had three tackles, but he knocked down two passes, including one that preserved the win. In the next two games, J.R. made 17 tackles and he had a key sack in both the N. C. State and Wake Forest contests. Before donning his sinister black cowboy hat after last week's satisfying win, Robinson made eight tackles of the bone-jarring variety, had a sack and another tackle for loss, recovered a fumble and broke up a key pass in UNC's last desperation drive.

The let's-light-up-the-scoreboard unit has also been generating excitement of its own the past few weeks. Quarterback Mike Eppley continues to be a model of efficiency, as he has not completed less than 50 percent of his passes since the very forgettable Boston College game on September 17. According to the NCAA, Eppley is sixth nationally in passing and the Clemson co-eds have him listed as the campus' number-one heart-throb. Eppley has discovered a new touchdown target in tight end K. D. Dunn, who has played a small forward of sorts and caught three six-pointers in the last four games, with all of the receptions coming on the baseline in the shadow of

the goalpost.

The tailback tandem of Kenny Flowers and Stacey Driver continues to impress a lot of people, especially opponents. Flowers, who was red-shirted last season, set the Clemson freshman rushing record last week with his 34 yards against North Carolina giving him 526 yards in 114 carries for the season, which breaks Ken Callicutt's mark of 505 yards set in 1973.

Driver, on the other hand, is proof positive Smurfs can play just as well as the Neanderthal-sized physique that is normally associated with football players. Driver, at 5-7, has started the last three games and has gained 289 of his 614 yards during that stretch. Driver gained 98 yards against the Tar Heels and he has picked up the nickname "Ricochet Rabbit" because of his pinball style of bouncing off would-be tacklers.

While the Clemson-Maryland showdown has been awaited with anticipation for most of the season, this game also will have a sentimental note to it, as it will be the last home game for all of the senior players, managers, and trainers. We would like to thank those people who will be running down the Hill for the last time today.

This senior class has compiled a record of 34-7-2, which (at .814) is the highest win percentage at Clemson since the class of '03 had a mark of .833. This group of seniors has also won 20 conference games, which ties the mark set by the players who were here from 1965 to 1968. A win today over the Terrapins would give this class the best Clemson conference record in history at 21-4.

The people who have made this one of the most memorable periods in Clemson football history are: WR Kendall Alley, CB Vandell Arrington, WR Fitzhugh Bethea, DT Ray "Disco" Brown, DE Roy Brown, RB Wilbur Bullard, SS Tim Childers, FS Billy Davis, MG William Devane, OG James Farr, OT Alex Hudson, FB Hunter Jenkins, CB Rod McSwain, FB Kevin Mack, PK Bob Paulling, DE Edgar Pickett, DT James Robinson, DT Jim Scott, SS Jeff Suttle, FS Guy Varn, and FB Braxton Williams.

Long are the hours and short is the recognition for the senior managers and trainers, and this group includes: Field Manager Eric Rivers (Spartanburg), Head Manager Jim Weldon (Florence), Jeff (J.R.) Wright (Charlotte, NC), Mark Abell (Greenwood), Bob Easley (Greenville), and graduate assistant Reno Wilson (Clinton).

The illustrious organization known as the Press Box Alumni Association will also be gaining strength, as two members of the stat crew are also in their last game. Special recognition goes to Johnny Jones, who has provided more than a few laughs for the press corps as the inside PA announcer during his tenure as a graduate assistant in the Sports Information Office, and finally, after attending 51 of the last 54 Clemson games, both at home and on the road, the writer of this verbose piece will miraculously graduate and start looking for a job. "LEADERSHIP, MATURITY — WILLIAM DEVANE"

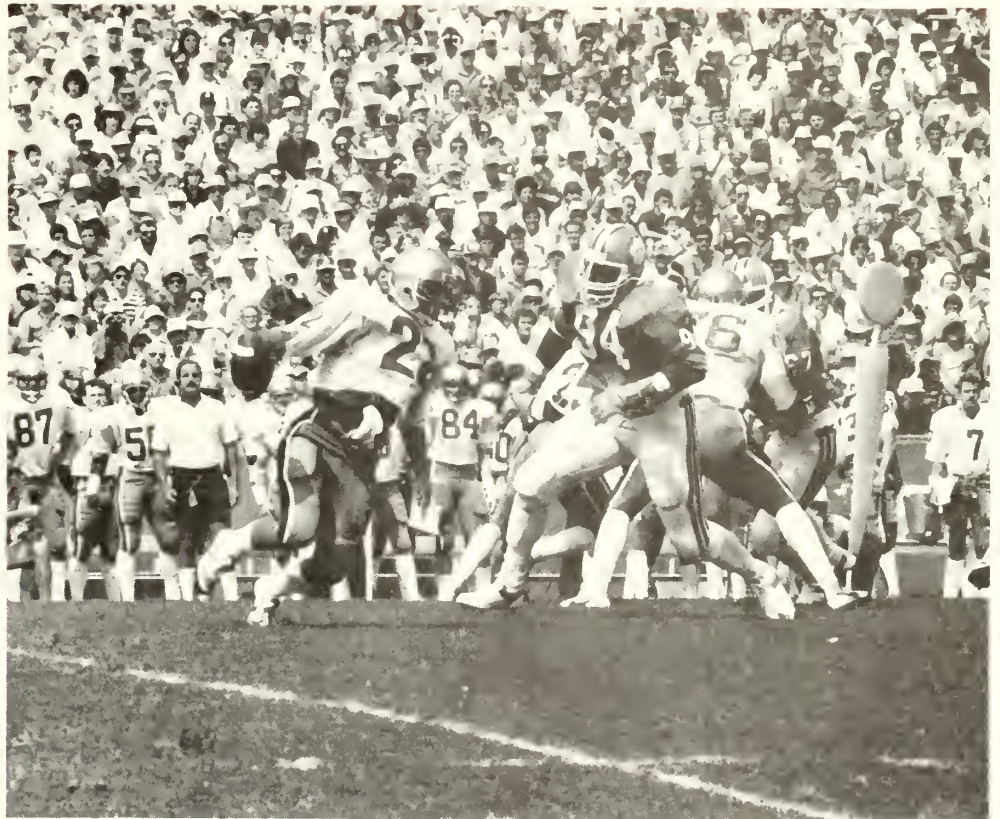
When Coaches discuss the success of their football team, they always speak of two important qualities — leadership and maturity. Tiger middle guard William Devane is a fine example of a player who possesses these characteristics.

The Tigers are very fortunate in that they have what many experts describe as the best middle guard tandem in collegiate football. But how do two players with so much talent get along? The senior speaks of his relationship with William Perry, "I think that we have a very good relationship both on and off the field. On the field we watch each other and try to detect the center's tendencies. We discuss what the center, as well as other linemen are doing and make suggestions as to how to beat a block or a double-team.

"Off of the field, we room together on road games and in Anderson before home games. I also enjoy visiting William, his wife and their daughter."

Another unique quality about the Jacksonville, NC senior is his unselfishness. He and Perry take turns starting or decide who will start for the upcoming game between themselves. "It began near the end of my sophomore year," said Devane. "We discussed it with Coach Harper and Coach Anderson. They had the confidence in us to let us decide between ourselves. Because it is my last home game in the Valley, I will start today."

It is ironic that the 6'2", 275 lb. middle guard had never heard of Clemson until the 1978 Gator Bowl. "The 1978 Gator Bowl

sparked interest itself," said Devo, a nickname given to Devane while competing in the Shrine Bowl his senior year in high school. "That game coupled with Clemson being in the ACC, and being recruited by Coach Anderson, got me very interested in Clemson. I came down for the Maryland Game in 1979 and fell in love with the place. While most of my friends went to North Carolina, I knew that Clemson was the place for me."

Not only is Devane interested in football, but he also is a student as well. When asked what his goals were after college football, Devane immediately answered, "To get my degree. I changed majors and lost some hours that have set me back because of the change, but I will graduate in another year.

"I also want to play professional football," said Devane with a smile. "I have been wanting to play pro football since I played in the midget league. Back then I loved the Vikings and the Redskins because they would meet each other in the playoffs to determine who would go on to play in the Super Bowl. I have talked with former teammates Jeff Davis and Johnny Rembert on the differences between pro and college football, and they have given me some pointers on what to expect."

The Jacksonville, NC senior, who has become a favorite of the press, speaks openly about this season. "This year the defense has been struggling, but the offense has played well. In the past, the opposite was true. The offense encourages us and really wants us to play well. They are really behind us."

As other Tiger players, Devane's eyes glow when talk of the National Championship team begins. "It has to be one of the biggest thrills of my life. The trip to Miami and the game is something that I will cherish for the rest of my life." That he should, because it was Devane who, not only caused, but recovered the fumble that set up the Tiger's first field goal. "Actually, I wasn't lined up on Dave Rimington (Nebraska's center) on that particular play. We were in our short-yardage defense and Perry was in the game also. We lined up inside the guards and when the ball was snapped, I shot the gap and got to the quarterback."

William Devane has had a fine career at Clemson, and Coach Tom Harper reflected on his middle guard's performance. "When William came to Clemson he worked very hard. He was a quiet individual in that he would listen and use the advice, not only from coaches, but also players to make himself better. When we discuss techniques and football it is not like coach talking to player, but coach talking to coach. It is Devane who has had a big influence on William Perry and helped him to become the player that Perry is today. These two are like a great race horse with a great jockey."

To sum up his comments, Harper concluded by saying, "When it comes to being a gentleman I don't think that you will find a nicer person when trying to fit the mold than William Devane. He will be an asset to society no matter what career he pursues."



Rising Above

Congratulations! If you are in attendance at today's Tiger-Terrapin contest then you are going to be treated to not only a spectacular football game, but you may also be part of the establishment of a new world's record.

The student body project coordinated by student government, and funded by alumni and friends through IPTAY will attempt to set a world record by releasing 310,000 orange balloons. If the project is successful, the feat will be noted in the Guinness Book of World Records.

Clemson University's '83 Rising Above project officially got off the ground during late August in a student government cabinet meeting according to Mark Wilson, a member of the President's Cabinet. Wilson, who serves as Research and Development Director, is in charge of the vast undertaking.

"The original idea was to release 80,000 balloons," stated Wilson. "Someone then mentioned the idea that releasing that many balloons might be a world's record. So, I was appointed to delve further into the matter."

Wilson continued, "I called the New York office of Guinness and found out that the record was set on January 1, 1982, at the Sands Hotel by their release of 208,477 balloons. It's kind of ironic, because the day the record was set was the same day that the Tigers won the national championship. Last July the record was broken again as 300,424 balloons were released in Itasca, IL."

After the decision was made to undertake the project the question of funding was raised.

The original proposal was conceived around the idea that sponsors would be utilized, but that idea fell through. So, the committee resorted to soliciting money through IPTAY.

On October 12, 1983, Mark Wilson and the project committee conducted a trial run by releasing 1,000 balloons to make final decisions whether or not they would follow up on the project. Joe Turner, the executive director of IPTAY, gave Wilson the go ahead and the wheels really starting turning then.

"I had to order all the supplies by that date, because you can't just call up your local balloon supplier and put in an order for 315,000 balloons a week before you need them," explained Wilson.

315,000 balloons were ordered from Jim Wauldron with the WinCraft Company in Winona, MI, but only 310,000 will float away today. The extra 5,000 were purchased to cover breakage that might occur in the process of blowing them up.

With that many balloons on hand, Wilson knew that it was going to require a great deal of manpower to get them blown up in the most efficient manner possible. So student government spent all last week going door-to-door recruiting all the students they could. They then divided the students into 25 groups of 10 members, with one crew leader for each group. The crews began early this morning at 7:00 a.m. blowing up the balloons on location at various points in the stadium. It was imperative that all work was completed by 11:00 a.m., when the fans were admitted into the stadium.

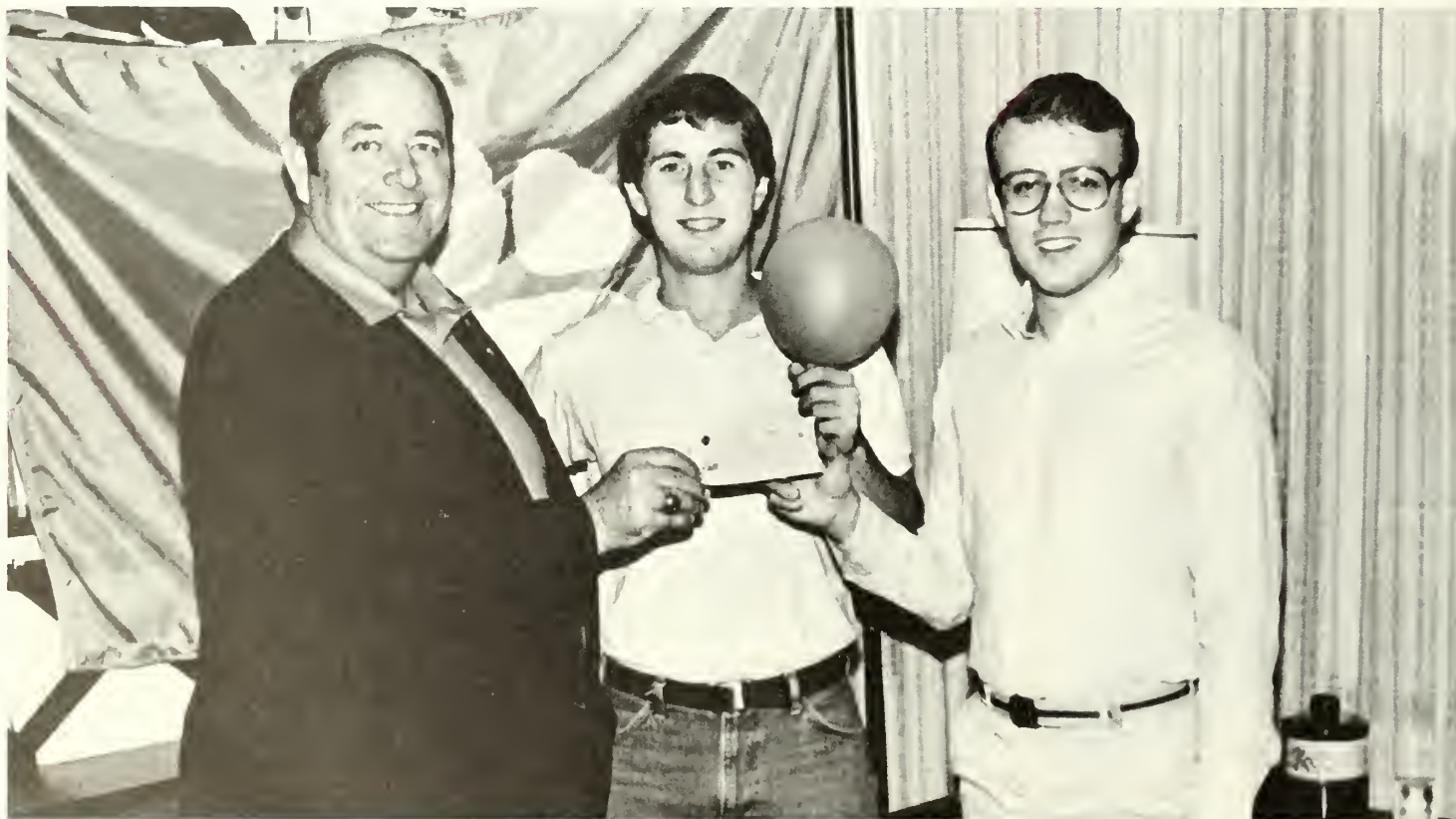
"We had to get the 425 cylinders of helium out of the stands before the crowd started coming in," said Wilson. "Taft Sessions and Steve Gibson of the Merrit-Holland Co. in Greenville, helped supply all the helium that we needed. And, getting that much helium was a modern day miracle in itself," Wilson remarked.

Another key to successfully pulling off this feat was to be able to blow up the balloons as fast as possible. This task was made easier through the use of the adapters that Jerry Stroud of the Palmetto Welding Supply Co. in Greenville supplied. This made it possible not to cut the valve on and off every time the members of the crews went to blow up a balloon.

To keep all of these balloons from drifting away before schedule, 250 miles of string was needed. And, when you come to think of it, if you jumped in your car right now and tied the string used today to the back of the auto, that piece of string would stretch from Clemson to Raleigh.

David Defratus with the ARA Food Service on campus was also very instrumental in the successful completion of the project. He supplied coffee, juice and doughnuts for all the workers this morning.

A few minutes before one o'clock today, when the Tiger Football team prepares to run down the hill, you will be witness to still another first at Clemson and really, an NCAA Football First.

Season Ticket

This season, for the first time, the ACC basketball fan will be able to watch almost every ACC game played. Thanks to an innovative and pioneering effort by the Atlantic Coast Conference, Raycom Sports, Jefferson-Pilot Teleproductions and ESPN, over 20 more games involving ACC teams will be made available to most of the region.

Recognizing that it is difficult to place additional games on broadcast television since TV stations are reluctant to disrupt their network programming for any more than the 38 games that are presently offered, Raycom Sports created a unique concept called ACC Season Ticket that has drawn national attention.

ACC basketball fans are known to have insatiable appetites when it comes

to watching their teams play on television. Each season, colleges and television stations are beset by ACC fans wanting to know why more games are not being telecast.

It is a plan that offers the fan an added bonus of games and does not affect in any way the 38 game regional TV package or the network (NBC, CBS) offering of games.

Here's how it works:

A cable TV viewer who receives ESPN contacts the local cable company and requests the ACC Season Ticket. If the local cable company is participating in the program (most of them are), then the cable company will sign-up the home for Season Ticket and will instruct the viewer on what needs to be done to receive the extra games.

The cost for the Season Ticket games will be determined by the local cable company. The price will probably be between \$50 and \$75, or less than \$3 per game. However, the games must be purchased as a complete package. The games will be available only on Season Ticket and will not be on broadcast TV.

The fan does not have to worry about missing an ACC game on broadcast TV

while watching another ACC game on Season Ticket. The schedule has been arranged so that games are never played at the same time.

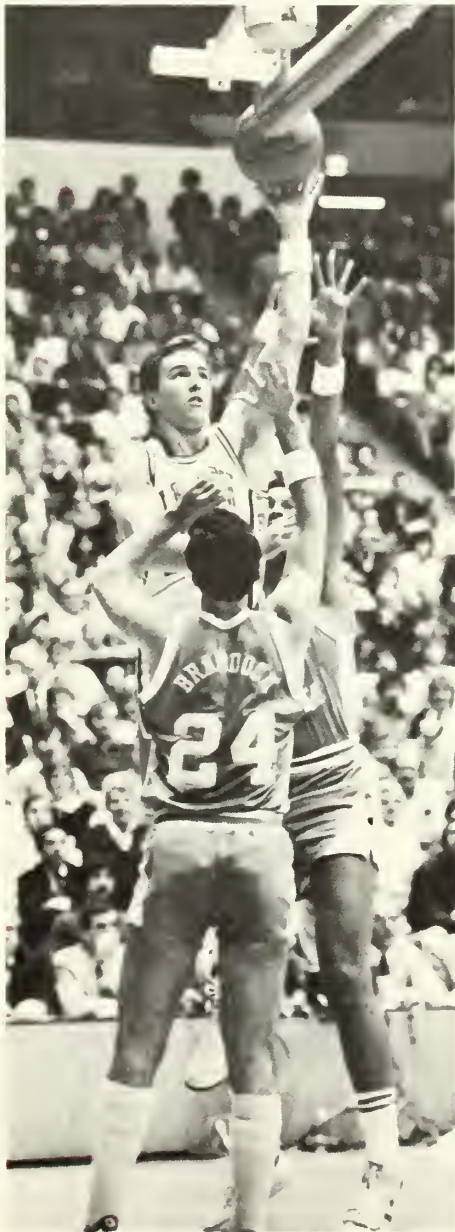
Last season, ESPN had to black-out all ACC games that were being carried by broadcast TV stations in the area. However, with the advent of Season Ticket, ESPN viewers will be able to watch ACC games that are exclusive to ESPN and will not have to contend with so many blacked-out games.

On most cable systems there will be a restriction on the number of viewers who can take advantage of Season Ticket during the first year. Due to a limited number of decoders that can be ordered, it has been necessary to allocate to each participating cable system a set number of decoders.

Bob James, Commissioner of the ACC says, "The league is excited about the concept as it will enable more fans to view the games and will result in increased revenue to the Conference schools."

The Season Ticket package includes 14 appearances by 1983 national top ten teams.

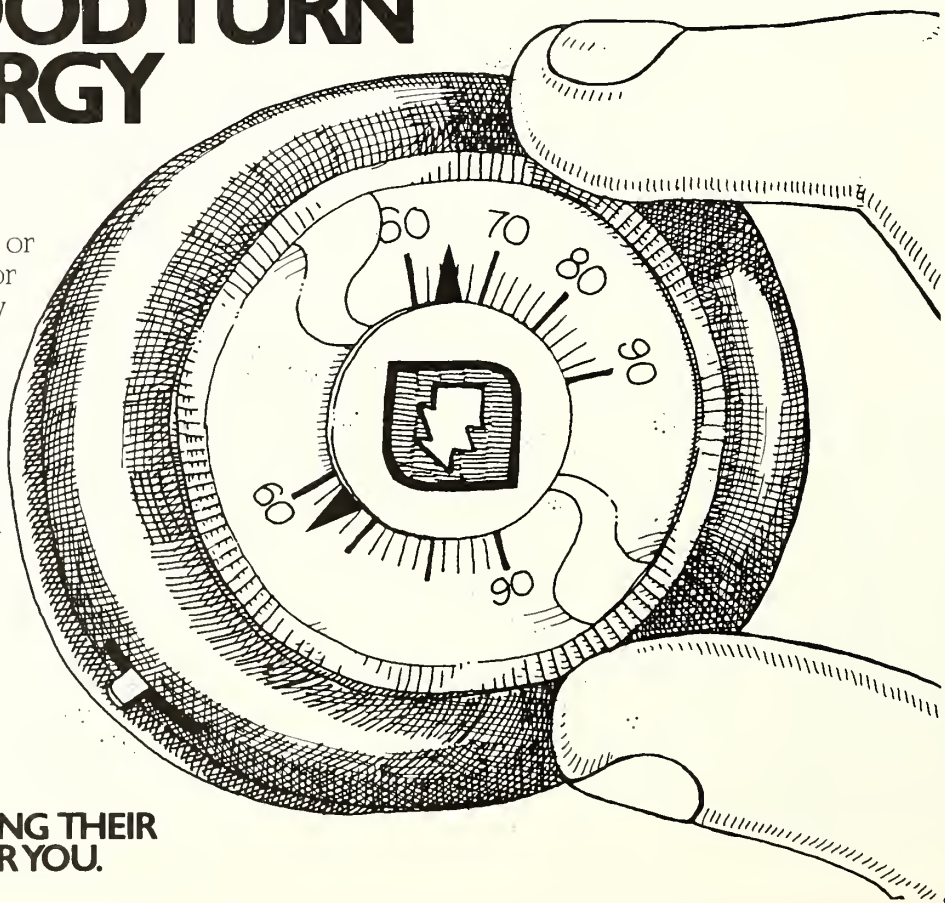

Head Coach Danny Ford

The names Bear Bryant, Amos Alonzo Stagg, Pop Warner, Woody Hayes and Jess Neely all have two things in common. If you are up on your football trivia you know that the five aforementioned men are the top five men in career coaching victories in the college ranks.

This well-known quintet also has another statistic in common. All five had worse records on a percentage basis against major college competition after four seasons than present Clemson Head Coach Danny Ford. We aren't saying Ford is a shoo-in for the Hall of Fame or 300 victories, but the fact does give testimony to the Clemson mentor's level of accomplishment in his first four full seasons as a head coach.

In his four seasons Ford has led Clemson to a 36-10-1 record, two ACC titles and most importantly the institution's first National Championship in any sport. That is a winning percentage of .776, a better winning percentage at a four-year mark than current nationally renowned coaches Vince Dooley, Bo Schembechler, Tom Osborne, Bobby Bowden, Fred Akers, Lou Holtz and Terry Donahue had at the four-year mark in their careers.

In 1982 Ford led Clemson to a 9-1-1 record and his Tigers are now 21-1-1 over the last two seasons. No school in America can claim a better mark. After the 1981 season he was deservedly named national Coach-of-the-Year by an assortment of media and organizations.

He was named National Coach-of-the-Year by United Press International, the American Football Coaches' Association, the Football Writers of America, and the Washington Touchdown Club, in addition to many other local football clubs.

The now 35-year-old Gadsden, Al native has been associated with more winning teams and programs than most coaches come in contact with in a lifetime. Including his years as a player at Alabama under Bear Bryant, Ford has been associated with college football for the last 16 years. Fifteen of those clubs have had winning records and 11 have gone to bowl games. Additionally, the 15 teams have had a record of 133-48-4, a .730 winning percentage.

Ford took over on December 10, 1978. That was a fine day in Clemson athletics because the University announced that Charley Pell had relinquished the head



coaching duties of the 1978 Gator Bowl to Ford. Nearly 40 years after hiring 31-year-old Frank Howard, Clemson had hired a gifted 30-year-old to lead the Tiger forces on the gridiron.

Ford conquered all kinds of adversity in leading the Tigers to a nationally televised 17-15 triumph over perennial power Ohio State in the Gator Bowl in his very first game as head coach. Few mentors in NCAA history have made such a celebrated and successful beginning.

With this list of accomplishments, it is little wonder that the Student Affairs Committee of the Clemson Board of Trustees only considered one name as Charley Pell's successor. Danny Ford not

only had the backing of Pell, but also from the members of the Clemson football team. He was then assistant head coach and offensive line coach for the Tigers. After two meetings between Ford and the committee on the morning of December 5, 1978, it was the unanimous opinion of the committee that Ford should be named Clemson's 21st head coach.

Ford began his association with college football in 1967 when he started for Bear Bryant at Alabama as Ken Stabler's sophomore tight end. He played three years for Bryant, (including three wins against Clemson) and was an All-Southeastern Conference choice, All-SEC academic selection and team captain during his senior season.

After receiving his B.S. degree in industrial arts in 1970, Ford remained at Alabama as a graduate assistant for the 1970 and 1971 seasons. Upon earning a master's degree in special education in 1971, he was made a full-time assistant under Bryant for the 1972 and 1973 seasons. The Tide went to four more post-season games while Ford was on Bryant's staff.

Clemson's current head man then accepted a position as an assistant coach on Jimmy Sharpe's staff at Virginia Tech. He remained in Blacksburg for three seasons (1974 to 1976), before he was beckoned to Clemson by Charley Pell, who had just been named the Tigers' head coach. Pell and Ford had served together on the VPI staff for two seasons.

And only 23 games later, Ford became head coach of the Tigers at age 30, the youngest Division I head coach in the country.

And three years later he became the youngest coach to lead a team to a national championship.

Athletic Director Bill McLellan

Statistics are not for losers when it comes to athletics. Batting averages, scoring averages and passing percentages are used to gauge an athlete's performance, and won-loss records document the abilities of coaches. If there is one statistic or rating system for athletic directors it must be the **Knoxville Journal's** National All-Sports Poll. It rates the all-around success of a program based on national standings in various sports.

If that poll is the statistical barometer for athletic directors, then Bill McLellan is one of the finest in his field. Under his leadership Clemson has finished in the top five in the nation in the prestigious poll four of the last five years, including a number-five ranking during the 1982-83 academic year. Additionally, Clemson has ranked in the top 36 in the nation every year since 1975-76.

"I believe in the total athletic program at Clemson," said McLellan, who is only the third man to own the title of athletic director at Clemson over the last 48 years. "Every sport is important in this department and we want to have a nationally ranked program in every sport. It is a daily challenge, but a rewarding one."

Highly regarded by his peers, McLellan is also held in respect by Clemson alumni and constituents. In the summer of 1982 he was named as a Distinguished Alumnus of Clemson University, one of the highest honors a Clemson alumnus can obtain.

The native of Hamer, SC, was elevated to his present position on February 4, 1971, but he has served Clemson in almost every capacity.

McLellan was a Tiger griddier in the early fifties, earning a letter in 1953 and 1954. He was also a member of the 1952 Gator Bowl team. He earned a BS degree in agronomy in 1954 and a master's in agricultural economics in 1956.

McLellan joined the athletic staff May 1, 1958 from Clemson's Department of Agricultural Economics and Seed Certification where he had spent one year as assistant agronomist and two years as assistant economist.

Although carrying the title of assistant business manager, McLellan was credited with handling the majority of the department's athletic business and oper-

ations long before his appointment into his present role. In 1966 he was named assistant athletic director and two years later was appointed associate athletic director.

During his 13 years as the top man, Clemson has improved its won-loss record by leaps and bounds in nearly every sport, but the growth and improvement in facilities has also improved at a meteoric rate. Clemson has the finest all-around athletic facilities in the South for its 17 intercollegiate sports and McLellan has been the architect of the improvement.

Just look at Clemson's Memorial Stadium. In the last six years alone the seating capacity has increased by over 70 percent with the addition of two upper decks.

The list of improvements for other sports is lengthy, but significant. During his tenure, 20 new tennis courts have been built, new lighting has been installed on a new soccer field, the baseball field has been made into a stadium, additional seating and further improvements have been made to Littlejohn Coliseum, a new swimming pool was built as an addition to a renovated Fike Fieldhouse, a modern, all-weather track was installed, five new football practice fields were added and a golf putting green and driving range were built.

McLellan has also worked tirelessly on further improvements for the University community. The athletic department has made a number of grants to academic programs. Some of the purchases include mini-computers in the College of Education, salary supplements in the math and English departments in addition to the College of Education, support travel for the Tiger Band, and a yearly contribution to the Clemson Sports Symposium, one of the finest of its kind in the nation. Additionally, matching gifts have been made from IPTAY to the special University fund.

The 51-year-old McLellan is also highly regarded for his expertise in television contracts. He has been a chairman of the ACC television committee and has been a chief negotiator in various television contracts. He is the major reason Clemson will have most of its football games seen on nationwide cable systems this season.

Putting something back into the University has a personal dimension for McLellan. "As one of seven children, that athletic scholarship made a lot of things possible for me, and I appreciate the opportunity to pay Clemson back. It's not an ego trip for me, but it is personal satisfaction which no one can ever take away."

SEASON TICKET HOLDERS/OTHER VISITORS:

Season ticket holders and other visitors to the stadium are requested to enter Gates 1, 5, 9, 11, or 13. TELEPHONES: Pay telephones are located at the stadium ticket offices at Gates 1, 5, 9, 13, and top decks.

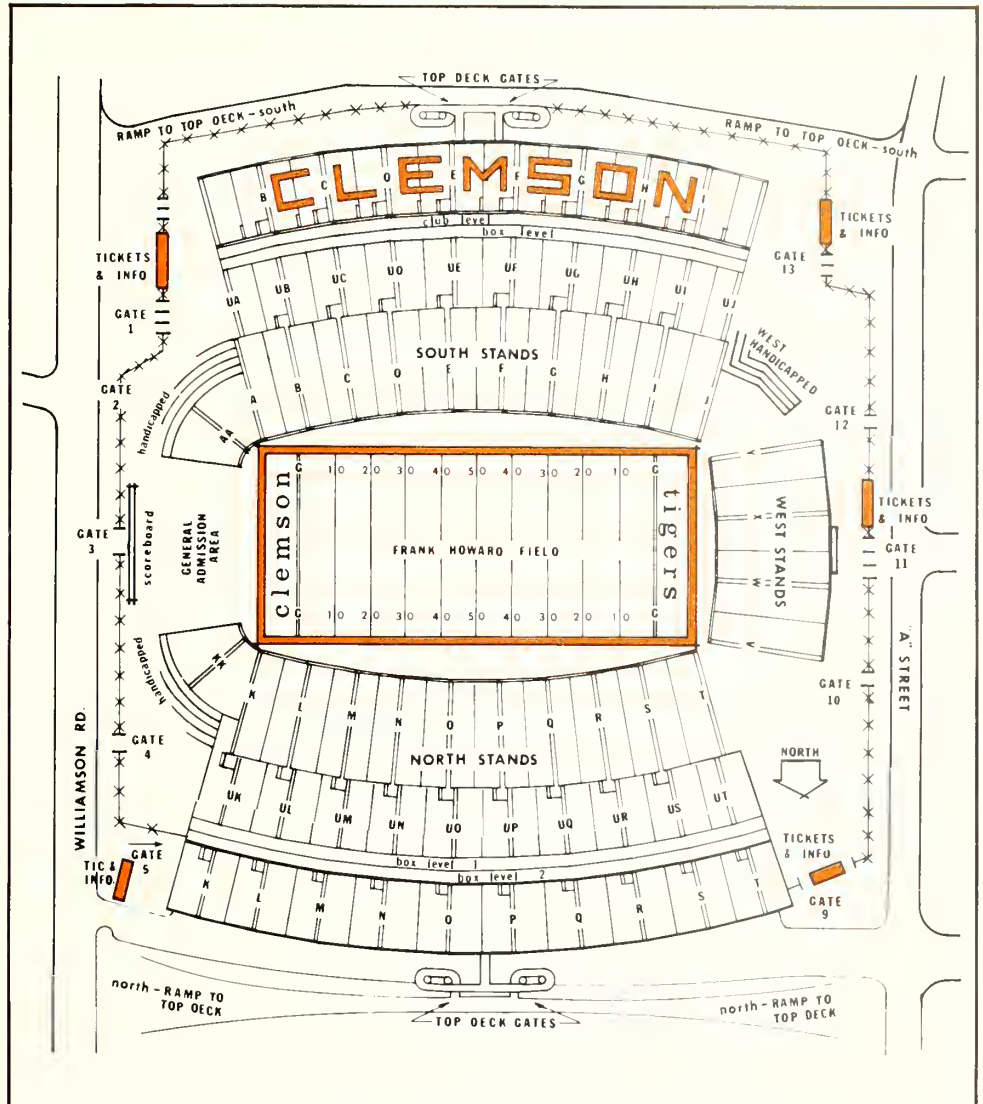

The Golden Anniversary of IPTAY

On July 1, 1983, IPTAY began its 50th year of service to Clemson University. From a modest beginning as a secret organization, IPTAY has grown into one of the largest athletic scholarship fundraising groups in America.

It was during the summer of 1934 that Dr. Rupert H. Fike, a physician from Atlanta, GA, had the idea to begin a secret organization, a "fraternity" of sorts, that would raise funds for athletic scholarships for Clemson. On August 20, he recruited eight other gentlemen to meet with him at his home in Atlanta.

Meeting with Dr. Fike were: George Suggs, Gene Cox, E. C. Hutchens, Bill Dukes, J. R. Pennell, George Klugh, Milton Berry, and Jack Mitchell. Together these men drafted the constitution, created the ritual, and developed the codes and symbols that only initiated IPTAY members knew.

Parts of the ritual included a pocket piece with symbols, a secret hand shake and unusual greetings. The different titles included IPTAY, which stood for Industry, Perseverance, Temperance, Assistance, Youthfulness or I Pay Ten A Year.

But IPTAY has not succeeded because of secret symbols and initiations. It was only a secret organization for four years. From its beginning with 162 charter members, IPTAY continued to grow until, in 1954, Dr. Fike realized a need for reorganization. A complete revamping of the club took place, and it was decided to have a Board of Directors composed of nine people. Three of these would be appointed by the Chairman of the Athletic Council, with the remaining six being elected to represent the six congressional districts.

In 1950, Gene Willimon had been hired as Executive Secretary and would be joined by three officers, a President, a Vice President and a Sec-

retary-Treasurer, that would be elected from and by the Board of Directors.

The first IPTAY Board of Directors was comprised of Calhoun Lemon, Vic Chapman, R. C. Edwards, Paul Quattlebaum, W. G. DesChamps, Harper Gault, Edgar Rosamond, and J. O. Freeman. The main objective of the directors was to create more interest in IPTAY and Clemson University. In 1958, IPTAY representatives were appointed for the first time. This group now numbers over 500 strong and donates untold volunteer hours promoting Clemson.

As the years passed, the numbers continued to grow. There were 5,200 members in 1954 which became 10,000 in 1959 and now number over 19,000 for the 1983 year. In 1936, Jess Neely said that the sky would be the limit if IPTAY could raise only \$10,000. Thanks to the leadership of people like Gene Willimon, George Bennett, and Joe Turner, IPTAY crossed \$1 million in 1977, \$2 million in 1979, \$3 million in 1981, \$4 million in 1982, and \$5 million for the 1983 fiscal year. With this type of support, it is no wonder that IPTAY has had 20 consecutive record breaking years.

But what is IPTAY? By constitutional definition, IPTAY is a non-profit, tax-exempt organization with the primary goal of providing scholarships for student athletes at Clemson University; it is self-supporting. But IPTAY is much more than numbers. IPTAY is 19,000 people who believe that Clemson deserves only the best, and, these people are willing to work unselfishly to make and keep Clemson number one. Athletic Director Bill McLellan believes, "Without a doubt, the unprecedented period of growth in Clemson Athletics would not have been possible without the support of IPTAY."

We are completing the first fifty years of a long journey. But where will IPTAY be fifty years down the road? "The key to Clemson's success has been and will continue to be people," according to Joe Turner, Executive Secretary of IPTAY. "If we have unlocked some unique qualities on Saturdays at Death Valley or in Littlejohn, it is because of the love and sincerity of the people who support the Tigers. It is this commitment that has taken Clemson through the first 50 years and will certainly keep Clemson "Number One" through the next fifty years."

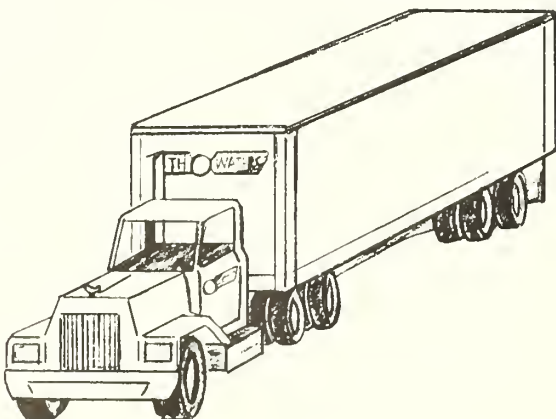

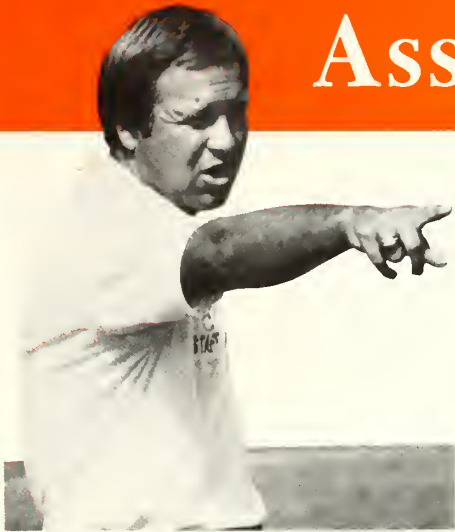

Don Denning is in his third season with the Clemson staff after joining the Tigers on July 1, 1981. The secondary coach has previously served stints at Western Carolina, Memphis State and Delta State. He is

a 1960 graduate of Presbyterian College. He has served as an assistant coach, head coach and assistant athletic director throughout his athletic career.



Tom Harper came to Clemson from Virginia Tech where he had served as defensive coordinator. The native of Piqua, OH, is now in his third season in that capacity at Clemson. Like Don Denning, Harper

has also served as a head coach in his career, as he was the top man at Wake Forest in 1972. Harper serves as assistant head coach at Clemson.



Les Herrin has been the director of Clemson's fine linebacking crew the last two seasons. He came to the Tigers from Appalachian State where he had served as the defensive coordinator. The 1971

Western Carolina graduate captained the Catawba team in 1970 and also was named most valuable player of the defense that same season.



Lawson Holland is the only current member of the staff who also played his college football at Clemson. The likeable receiver coach was a reserve quarterback for the Tigers between 1970 and 1973.

Now in his fifth season at Clemson, Holland, who works with the receivers, earned his B.A. in secondary education.



Woody McCorvey is the newest member of the Clemson coaching staff, as he climbed aboard just this past July. Clemson's new tight ends coach had been the offensive coordinator at Alabama A&M

University the last four seasons. The native of Grove Hill, AL was a four-year letterman at Alabama State as a quarterback. He earned his degree in physical education.



Chuck Reedy is one of the reasons Clemson's ground attack has been so outstanding the last few years, as he has served as the running backs coach. Now in his sixth season, Reedy joined the Clemson staff

from Kentucky in July of 1978. The 1971 Appalachian State graduate earned two letters on the gridiron during his playing days.



Nelson Stokley played collegiately at a fine southern institution and he now coaches in the college ranks in the same area of the country. The starting quarterback for the LSU Tigers between 1965 and 1967,

Stokley is now the offensive coordinator for the Clemson Tigers. He is now in his fourth season at Clemson after serving as an assistant at his alma mater and at Virginia Tech.



Larry Van Der Heyden is a transplanted midwesterner who is now in his fifth season on the Clemson staff. He has coached some fine offensive linemen in recent years and is one of the major reasons the Tiger ground game has been so successful. The native of Moline, IL played both football and baseball for three seasons at Iowa State.



Tommy West is in his second season on the Clemson coaching staff. Last year he worked with the defensive ends and had the pleasure of coaching players like Andy Headen, Joe Glenn and Edgar Pickett.

West was a fine player himself, lettering in the mid-seventies for the Volunteers of Tennessee.



Rick Whitt is in his fourth season working in the Clemson secondary. A 1976 graduate of Catawba, he also has had some experience with the Bandit ends, one of the most important positions on the Clemson

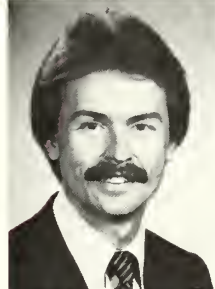

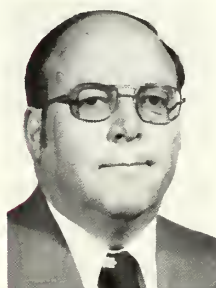

For the fourth time in the last five years the Clemson all-around sports program has been ranked in the top five in the nation. The survey, conducted by the Knoxville Journal, takes into account national rankings in selected sports. Women's sports are not included in this poll, which has been in existence since 1971.

This poll is a good index of the rise of Clemson athletics over the years. The Tigers were first ranked in the survey in 1975-76 with a number-20 finish. In the 1978-79 Clemson climbed to fourth, and in 1979-80 gained a number-three ranking, the school's highest ever. Two years ago Clemson was fourth and last year the Tigers picked up the number-five rating.

This past year Clemson scored in five of the 10 sports involved in the survey. The Clemson cross country, football and soccer teams all finished eighth in the country, while the men's tennis team was ninth. Bobby Robinson's golfers were fifth to record the highest team ranking in a men's sport.

The women also did well as the women's cross country team finished fifth, the women's indoor track team was 10th and the women's tennis team was rated seventh in the final polls.

CHARLESTON — Shrimpers on the East Coast and in the Gulf of Mexico are apparently taking to a device originally designed to save turtles, but which also can increase shrimp catch and save fuel.

The device, first labeled a turtle excluder device (TED), was developed in 1980 to reduce turtle drownings in shrimp nets, according to Jack Keener, a specialist with the Sea Grant Marine Extension Program of Clemson University.

Six species of sea turtles were placed on the endangered species list in the 1970s. Although estimates of the number of turtle deaths vary, Keener says there's no doubt many turtles drown in shrimp nets each year.

The TED is basically a cage made of steel rods. Two ovals about five feet long are connected by bars on the four corners, and bars running diagonally from the bottom of the front oval to the top of the rear oval.

It incorporates information fishermen provided on the jellyball shooter, a device they often use to expel jellyballs from their nets. It also features a webbing funnel, called an ac-

celerator. The TED, with accompanying floats, is sewn in the cod end of a shrimp net.

When in use, shrimp pass through the TED into the net while turtles and larger unwanted objects are discharged through a trap door in the net.

During testing, Keener says a variety of objects, including divers, were photographed passing through the device. Two hundred TEDs were built and distributed free to East Coast shrimpers on a first-come basis.

Prior to actual demonstrations, shrimpers from Nag's Head to Key West voiced negative reactions to the TEDs, says Keener. The reaction of several hundred shrimpers was much more favorable after the demonstrations.

"Shrimpers have been concerned about the plight of the sea turtles and are aware that if something isn't done, they may find themselves facing a ban on shrimping in certain areas, or possibly along the entire coast," says Keener. "Many had voluntarily cut their trawl times from two or three hours to 90 minutes to reduce turtle drownings."

The demonstrations focused attention on the problem and the fact that something con-

crete could be done that didn't require an unreasonable investment of time, effort or money, says Keener. On returning home, some shrimpers began devising their own turtle excluders.

Meanwhile, research by the National Marine Fisheries Service indicated the device also might improve trawling efficiency. Marine specialists studied the towing efficiency of nets equipped with TEDs compared to nets without them. Use of a TED can reduce net blockage which can measurably improve trawling efficiency.

In a short time the turtle excluder device (TED) became known as the trawling efficiency device (TED) and marine officials along the East Coast and the Gulf of Mexico began receiving inquiries about it.

The TED caught the eye of Trawlite, a New York firm which built a fiberglass prototype last year. Although the first model was flimsy, the company now sells a stronger model incorporating changes recommended by fishermen.

Shrimpers can build their own simple homemade TED and equip it with floats and line for around \$150, says Keener.

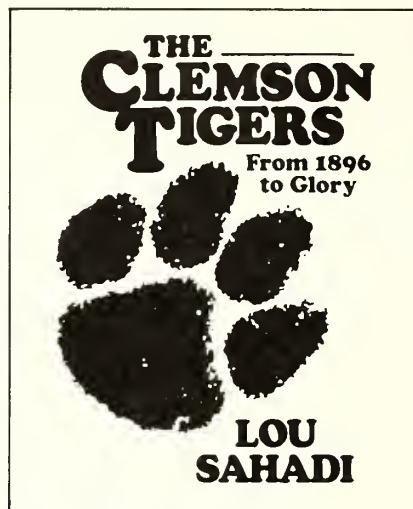

All-Time Clemson Team

Many great players have donned the Clemson uniform, so it is quite a task to select the top 22 players in Clemson history. But, we at the sports information office, along with the help of Dr. Harold S. Vigodsky, have asked the Tiger fans to vote for their top 22 players, using ballots that have been run in the programs for this 1983 season. There have been many Tiger greats over the years, but here is the team that was selected by you, the fans.

Jerry Butler was selected at one end spot. The Butler-Steve Fuller connection was one of the best in the country in the mid-seventies. Butler, a standout from Ware Shoals, SC, still holds the Clemson records for most passes caught in a season with 58, most yards gained in a single game with 163, and yards per reception (7-161 for an incredible 32.6 yards a catch) versus Georgia Tech in 1977. The All-American in 1978 will never be forgotten by Tiger fans. Who can ever forget his leaping and twisting catch in 1977 against South Carolina that won the game in the closing seconds 31-27?

Dwight Clark lettered at Clemson in the 1975-78 seasons. During this time he had

some key catches. One was in the 1977 season on the drive that defeated South Carolina that helped set up the famous Jerry Butler catch. Another one that is worth remembering is a 62-yard touchdown pass from Steve Fuller to Clark to help defeat the Maryland Terrapins for the ACC title in 1978. Clark is playing professionally for the San Francisco 49ers and has twice led the NFL in receiving.

Lou Cordileone earned a tackle spot on your team. Cordileone was an All-American in 1959 as well as an Academic All-American that same year. Also in 1959, he reaped All-ACC honors as well as being an Academic All-ACC member. Cordileone was a member of the 1959 Sugar and Bluebonnet Bowl teams, and was a first-round draft choice for the New York Giants.

Joe Bostic was selected at the other tackle position. The two-time All-ACC team member was also a two-time All-American. He is now playing with the St. Louis Cardinals and was chosen that team's top offensive lineman last year.

Jeff Bostic, Joe's brother, was selected at a guard slot. The 1979 All-ACC team member now plays with the world champion Washington Redskins in the position of center. He also played center during his Clemson career,

but earned more fame in 1978 at the guard spot for the 11-1 Tigers.

Harry Olszewski is the other guard on this All-Clemson team. Olszewski played during the 1965-67 campaigns. While here, he was a consensus All-American in 1967, and was named All-ACC for the 1966 and 1967 seasons. Also, Olszewski was named on the Silver Anniversary ACC team in 1977, honoring the top players who had participated in the conference during the first 25 years of the ACC.

Tony Berryhill was selected to play the important position of center on this team. Berryhill lettered in the 1979-81 seasons. The 1981 All-ACC performer was a starter on the 1981 National Champion football team, and was drafted by the Baltimore Colts in 1982.

Steve Fuller is the quarterback on this team of top Tigers. Fuller led the Tigers to two bowl appearances and earned many honors at Clemson. He was a third-team All-American his senior year and was on the academic All-American teams in 1977 and 1978. He was the quarterback on the 1977 and 1978 All-ACC teams, and was selected ACC Player-of-the-Year for two years consecutively, 1977 and 1978. He is still Clemson's leading career passer with 4,359 yards and is the Tigers' total offensive leader for an incredible 6,096 yards. Fuller finished sixth in the Heisman Trophy voting in 1978.

Banks McFadden is a member of the backfield on this team. McFadden, while at Clemson, was a consensus All-American in 1939 and was named the nation's most versatile athlete as he was an All-American in football, basketball, and track in 1939-40.

Cliff Austin is seventh on the all-time rushing list with 2,139 yards for a 5.06 average. He was chosen All-ACC in 1982 as he was the leading team rusher in 1981 and 1982 for the Tigers and helped them to a 21-1-1 record in these two seasons. He set the single game rushing record against Duke in 1982 with 260.

Buddy Gore was everyone's hero in his tenure at Clemson. He was named ACC Player-of-the-Year in 1967 and was an all-conference selection in 1967 and 1968. He is Clemson's leading career rusher with 2,571 yards for 4.29 yards per carry with 15 touchdowns.

Obed Ariri rounds out the offensive team for the all-time Tiger team. The Owerri, Nigeria native is Clemson's leading scorer with 288 points, and was a second-team All-American selection as well as an All-ACC team member his senior year. He is the NCAA's all-time field goal king with 60.

Clemson has always been known to have a hard-nosed defensive unit representing the Tigers, and the defensive team that was selected would be a coach's dream.

Andy Headen was selected at one defensive end. While at Clemson, he played this difficult position well. He garnered All-ACC honors in 1982. He was instrumental in Clemson's defeat of Nebraska in the 1982 Orange Bowl as he deflected Nebraska quarterback

Mark Mauer's desperation pass to preserve the win and the National Championship for Clemson. He is now playing with the New York Giants.

Jonathon Brooks is the other defensive end. Brooks earned All-ACC honors in 1977 and 1978. In these years he was a starter for the Gator Bowl teams that started the new era of football prowess for Clemson. He now plays for Philadelphia of the USFL.

Jim Stuckey holds down one of the tackle spots and deservedly so, as he had 314 tackles in his career, still a record for a down lineman. The walk-on from Cayce, SC, had 20 tackles for minus yards during the 1979 campaign, also a Clemson single season record. Stuckey was a terror for opposing quarterbacks, as he had 18 career sacks with 10 of those coming in his senior year.

Jeff Bryant is the other tackle on this All-Tiger team. His play in the 1981 National Championship year will not be forgotten, as he was the second leading tackler on the team with 80 tackles to his credit. One play for which he is remembered is his recovery of an attempted lateral with 57 seconds left to preserve the 10-8 win over North Carolina.

William Perry rounds out the front line. The 320-pound middle guard from Aiken, SC is still enjoying a great career at Clemson. Thus far, Perry is Clemson's first sophomore All-American in history. A third-team Associated Press All-American at middle guard last year, Perry also made honorable mention teams chosen by UPI and *The Football News*. In 1982 he was named All-ACC and All-State. He is the only active player on the team.

Jeff Davis is one of the linebackers on this team of Tiger stars. Davis holds the Clemson single game tackle record by having 24 stops in the 1980 North Carolina contest. Davis played a big part in the famous 1981 season as he had 175 tackles, 119 first hits, and four fumble recoveries. The 1981 consensus All-

American linebacker was also a 1981 All-ACC choice and named 1981 ACC Player-of-the-Year.

Bubba Brown was a two-time All-ACC choice at linebacker in the 1978 and 1979 seasons. He has an all-time record 515 tackles in his career to lead all Tiger tacklers in that important category.

Terry Kinard had a tremendous career at Clemson. He leads all Clemson defensive backs with 294 tackles, and 17 interceptions during his tenure at Clemson. Kinard was a 1982 consensus All-American as well as a 1981 and 1982 All-ACC performer. The Sumter, SC native was named CBS Defensive Player-of-the-Year for 1982 recognizing him to be the outstanding defensive player in the country.

Rex Varn is another member of the defensive backfield. Varn is remembered for his courageous play as he played with injuries and pain. For his heroics on the field, he was named a recipient of the 1978 Brian Piccolo Award, which is presented to the most courageous athlete in the ACC in memory of the late Wake Forest and Chicago Bear halfback. Varn also was a 1979 All-ACC performer and holds the Clemson mark for interception return yardage.

Eddie Geathers, a defensive back, was a member of the 1977, 1978, and 1979 bowl teams. He was an outstanding defensive back for the Tigers during his career and one of the team's fiercest hitters in the secondary.

Steve Ryan is the final member of the defensive backfield. Ryan was All-ACC in 1977 and 1978. This feat makes him well deserving of this honor. He led the ACC in interceptions in 1977 and still serves the Tigers as a graduate assistant coach.

David Sims is your punter in this collection of all-time Tiger greats. Sims holds the school's record for the best punting average for a season with 43.9 yards. This performance gained him a spot on the 1979 All-ACC team. He was injured his senior season in 1980 at the Georgia game and never returned, but he still holds many Clemson career records.

From October 28, 1896, when Clemson played its first game with Furman to the present 1983 season, many players have made great contributions so that the Tigers' roar may echo o'er the mountain heights.

J.R.'s "Death Valley Days"

James Robinson is one of the most senior seniors on the Clemson roster, as the 6-3, 275 pound defensive tackle is one of five players who are in their fifth year on the squad. Robinson has been a part of such big wins as Notre Dame in 1979 and South Carolina in 1980, and he has also played in games that have been low points, such as Duke in 1980 and Georgia in 1982. The Charleston, SC, native has also experienced major letdowns, such as sitting out the National Championship season with an injury and the elation of playing on a team which won the Atlantic Coast Conference championship. J.R., as he is known to just about everybody at Clemson, has had a career that sounds similar to a television drama, so here is how James Robinson views his tenure as #75 and #83 as seen through a page of *TV Guide*.

10:00 PM Friday — DALLAS [7]

"I used to always wear cowboy hats," said Robinson. "It was around 1980 when the 'Who Shot J.R.?' episode of 'Dallas' was the big thing, and Coach (Billy) Ware called me 'J.R.' at practice. I have been called that ever since."

Does the Clemson J.R. watch his namesake on Friday nights? Oh, yes. "The team goes to see a movie on Friday nights, and we usually don't get back until late, but I can usually catch the last 30 minutes or so of 'Dallas.'" I wouldn't say that I am like Larry Hagman's character on the field, but anything that is legal on the field I will do to get the job done."

10:30 AM FAMILY FEUD [13]

Robinson's "little" brother, Kenneth, plays for the "other" major college in South Carolina, and so, naturally, there is some rivalry in the Robinson household. "I think the rivalry is pretty good. It means that one of us will have braggin' rights for a year. Last year, I had the chance to talk junk all year, but we have to play them again shortly. I sure don't want to end my career losing to South Carolina."

Having sons playing football in cities two-and-a-half hours apart has made some long distance travel for Mr. and Mrs. Robinson. The folks will watch James play in the afternoon and then make the trek to Columbia for the evening half of the doubleheader. "The parents will probably be pulling for whichever team is on defense. They are just hoping both of us will be successful. I don't think it really matters to them (dramatic pause) I guess. I really don't know."

8:30 AM FATHER KNOWS BEST [4]

As one of the "old men" on the Tiger team, is Robinson looked to for guidance? "I think the younger guys look up to me a little. They know I have had some adversity in my time and I think they respect that. Sometimes they

will come up to me or Ray Brown because they know we were in the same situation — battling for a starting job, being homesick, or just needing someone to talk to. I try to give them some advice or try to steer them in the right direction, based on what I have learned by just being here.

"I kind of enjoy that role, and I think I would like to coach. I wouldn't want to be a college coach, though. I would like to coach high school and get to the youngsters and just sort of point them in the right direction and show them the way to stay out of trouble."

10:00 PM Thursday — HILL STREET BLUES [4]

Robinson was challenging for a starting berth after the 1980 season, but a serious knee injury in preseason practice sidelined him for the season. "I knew we had an experienced team coming back in 1981, and even if we had repeated the 6-5 year, I still would have been hurt by not playing. That was the first year since the playground that I was not actually out on the field.

"My teammates made it easy for me, though, because they still made me feel I was part of the team. Even though I was not playing, I was still able to get a lot of recognition and the rewards like a ring. I may not have contributed physically, but I think I did a lot toward boosting morale."

5:30 PM TO TELL THE TRUTH [7]

Robinson is one of those quiet players who rarely does anything flashy on the field, but

who makes his presence felt on every down. This season, however, people have sat up and paid a little closer attention to Robinson's adventures between the hashmarks. Against Boston College, Robinson tied his personal best of 10 tackles in a game and he was named ACC Defensive Player-of-the-Week. Five weeks later, though, Robinson may have had his most memorable game. Against Duke, Robinson only made three tackles, but he batted down two Ben Bennett passes and merely saved the game for the Tigers.

"Bennett had been throwing the ball through my outstretched hands or under my arms all day. On fourth down, I saw that the play was going to be a sprint-draw pass coming my way. Bennett tried to throw the ball quickly and I got parallel to him and just got my hands up and blocked the ball. I have had some momentum-changing plays in my career, like my freshman year when I recovered Baylor's blocked kick at the one, but that play at Duke was the first time I had ever had a really big play."

12:30 PM SEARCH FOR TOMORROW [13]

What does the future hold for the industrial education major? "I think I can play pro football, but whatever comes, I'll do my best and just not worry about anything else. If that doesn't pan out, I will have finished school and I can look for some opening in my major. I think I will have achieved my goals."

You can turn off the set, now. This story will have a happy ending for the home team.



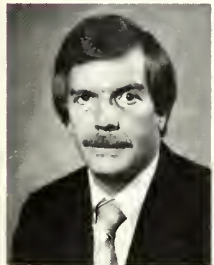

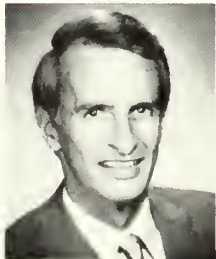

STADIUM EMERGENCY MEDICAL SERVICE

The Clemson University Athletic Department provides the following for your safety and emergency medical needs:

1. Advanced cardiac life-support stations in four locations. (North stands, Upper North deck, South stands, Upper South deck.) These units are staffed with skill-care nurses, physicians, cardiologists, internists, paramedics, and EMTs.
2. Mobile units of EMTs and paramedics are strategically located throughout the entire stadium.
3. Ambulances with life-support equipment are available in North stand and South stand areas and have prearranged routes for evacuation to local hospitals. Learn to recognize these personnel and facilities. Announcements will inform you of special hazards — heat, bees, etc.

WHAT TO DO IF EMERGENCIES ARISE

Please step back and give the organized stadium EMS personnel room to work. Well-intentioned attempts to help by untrained persons interferes with the efficiency of the EMS system. If you have basic or advanced training in specific life-support methods, make your qualifications known and offer your help. Untrained personnel can be frequently more harmful than helpful.

MEDICAL ADVICE FOR FANS

If you have a pre-existing medical or health problem, please check with your personal physician and obtain his advice before attending games. Many emergencies occurring

at the stadium do so because of prior existing conditions. Use common sense in dressing, eating, drinking and in physical exertion. Be certain if you have any pre-existing medical conditions that you have identification on you as to the diagnosis and what medications you are currently taking.

Be aware of early warning signs of heart attacks: chest pain, chest tightness, shortness of breath, sweating, palpitations, fainting, nausea and vomiting.

Recognize that our most common serious medical problem at football games are heart attacks and allergic reactions to insect stings. Be aware that insect stings will continue to always be very frequent at outdoor sporting events and should always be treated with immediate ice until advice can be obtained. If you have ever had a reaction to bee or other insect sting, check with your personal physician as to whether you should carry a kit.

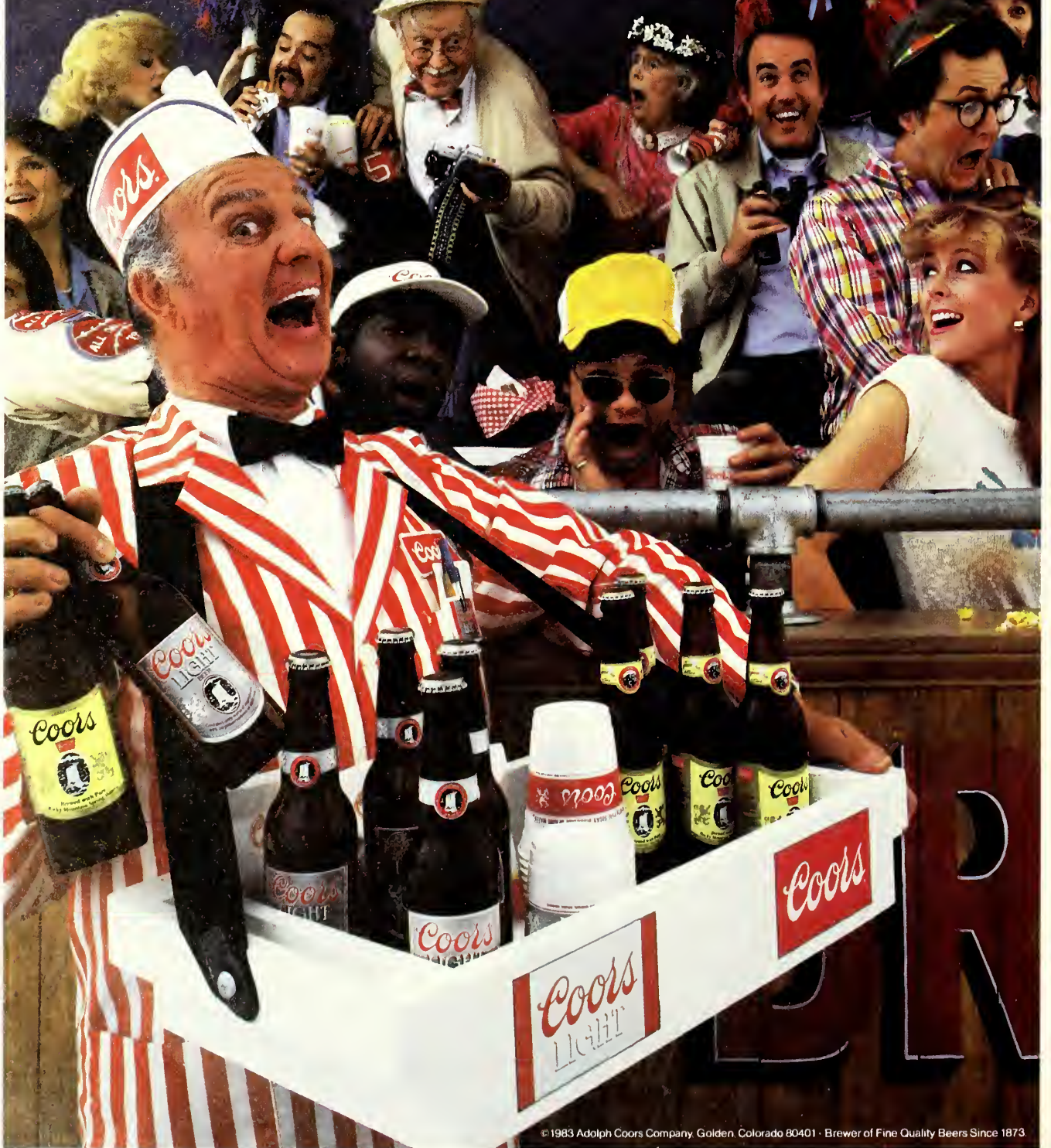

Senior Spotlights

Vandell Arrington is more than just a senior, he is a fifth-year senior. The cornerback from Norfolk, VA, is a reliable veteran of the secondary who has served as a starter and a reserve over the last two seasons. He has started twice this season and has 15 tackles and three pass deflections heading into today's game. He had his best game against N. C. State when he had four stops and a pass deflection. Arrington came to Clemson as a running back and actually appeared in three games and

had a couple of carries in 1979 as a freshman. He then red-shirted the 1980 season and moved to cornerback in the spring of 1981.



Fitzhugh Bethea is another second generation Clemson football player. His father played for the Tigers in the 1935-38 era and scored one touchdown against South Carolina in one of the Big Thursday games in Columbia. He was seeing some action early in this season when mononucleosis cut his season in half and he is just now getting back into shape. Last year he got into three games and caught one pass of four yards against Kentucky in the Homecoming game.



Wilbur Bullard will always be remembered for his one quarter super-human effort against North Carolina in 1980. Clemson trailed North Carolina 24-6 heading into the fourth quarter, then Bullard came into the game at tailback. Almost single-handedly he brought Clemson back into the game. He scored a touchdown on a dive over the line and had 44 yards in the quarter, as Clemson came up just short in a 24-19 North Carolina win. Ironically, that is the last time Clemson lost a game in Death

Valley. This year Bullard has served as a reserve tailback and blocking back on short-yardage situations. He has nine carries for 34 yards, a 3.8-yard average and has done an outstanding job of blocking on the short-yardage situations.

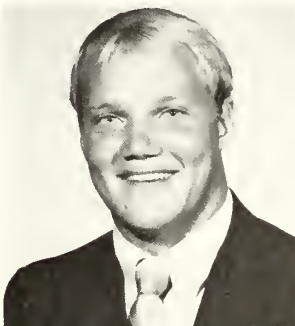


Alex Hudson is another of the fine fifth-year offensive players on the Clemson team. The Spartanburg, SC native has been a fine tackle for Clemson for five seasons, including the 1981 year when he red-shirted. Hudson is one of the strongest players on the team, as he has the second-best overall strength figure on the club and is one of five players on the team to bench-press over 400 pounds. He has appeared in every game as a backup tackle for Clemson this season and has even been

pressed into some duty as a tight end, an idea the Clemson coaching staff came up with in mid-season of this year. Hudson played in nine games in 1982 and has appeared in 27 for his career all total. His father, Billy, was a Clemson lineman in the fifties and had a fine pro career with San Diego and Boston of the AFL.



Hunter Jenkins is a junior college transfer from Lees McCrae Junior College in North Carolina. He is a hard-nosed worker who has played on the scout team as a bandit end the last two seasons. He has worked with the offense and defensive prep teams in his career with the scout team. He has also served with the fullbacks on offense as a JV player. The native of Conway, SC is an agricultural mechanics major at Clemson.



Guy Varn is one of the dedicated members of the suicide squad, or the special teams. The walk-on is the second member of his family to play football for Clemson, his brother Rex played with Clemson in the late seventies and was a selection of the Fan Poll for the All-Time Clemson team. Varn is also the grandson of Rex Enright, former coach at South Carolina. Varn has five tackles this season, mostly with the special teams and had three stops in eight games a year ago. Varn runs a 4.8 in the

40 and is one of the most dedicated players on the team.

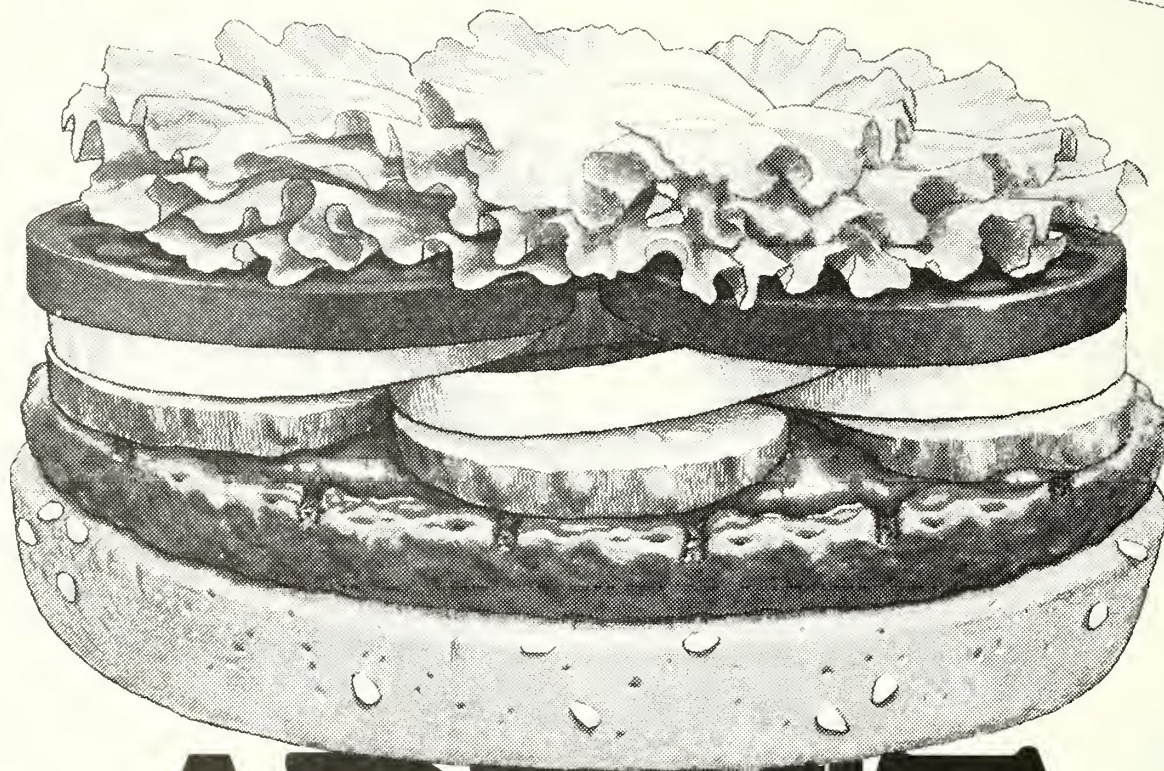


Braxton Williams has been one of the pleasant surprises for the Clemson football team this season. The junior college transfer is currently fifth on the team in rushing with 130 yards in 26 carries and he has appeared in all nine games this season. He had his finest outing at Duke when he had 44 yards on only five carries, including a 28-yard run, the longest of his career. His bull-dozing running style and fine blocking ability have caught the eye of many pro scouts. Williams was a reserve for

He had consecutive 1,000-yard seasons in high school and his first two years of junior college at Butler County Community College in Kansas. He is a native of Greensboro and runs a 4.6, another reason pro scouts are interested in his abilities.

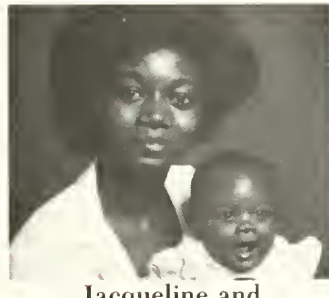

Academic Excellence

When the Clemson administrators size up a candidate for the Frank Johnstone Jervey scholarship they certainly do some thorough research. The results of their selections have been excellent the two times the award has been bestowed on an incoming high school athlete. Both selections, Steve Fuller (1975) and Mike Eppley (1980), have gone on to academic and athletic excellence after attending Clemson through the grant.

The Frank Johnstone Jervey Scholarship is awarded to an incoming student-athlete who has outstanding academic and athletic qualifications. It is named after Frank Johnstone Jervey, a past Clemson administrator, benefactor and general goodwill ambassador of Clemson. Eppley and Fuller are the only two recipients of the scholarship so far, as only a few athletes could even qualify for consideration.

One barometer of the selections can be to look at the Academic All-America teams in recent years. Steve Fuller was a two-time academic All-American during his Clemson career (1977 and 1978), and led Clemson to an 11-1 record on the gridiron his senior season. He is now playing professionally with the Los Angeles Rams. He graduated from Clemson with a 3.8 grade-point average and is the only Clemson athlete in history to receive an NCAA Top Five Award, meaning he was one of the top five senior student-athletes in the nation (all sports) in 1978-79.

Eppley is on a collision course with Fuller's accomplishments as a student-athlete. Recently, it was announced that Mike had been chosen to be on the ballot for the Academic All-America team in 1983, and that team will be announced in December. With a 3.5 grade-point average last semester and a 3.3 figure for his career, Mike is certainly a strong candidate for first-team honors. And, with his top 10 national ranking in passing efficiency on the field, he will get even more exposure for the award.

The native of Charlotte has been a member of the ACC Academic Honor Roll in basketball the past two seasons. If he can have a strong season on the court Eppley conceivably could become the first football-basketball Academic All-American in history. Now that would be something to hang your hat on.

Over the years, there has been a growing interest on the part of the nation's athletic administrators to recognize and reward those college students who truly represent the term "student-athlete" in every proper sense. There has been a growing awareness to recognize those individuals who have demonstrated excellence both on the field of competition and in the classroom. To be labeled an Academic All-America rightfully has come to represent the epitome of achievement for today's collegiate athlete.

The term Academic All-America was used first in 1954 when the College Sports Information Directors of America (CoSIDA) decided at its annual meeting in Chicago to establish a national program that would select worthy football players who had distinguished themselves in the classroom as well as on the field. As time went on, CoSIDA added similar programs in basketball and baseball.

"We are ecstatic about the continued growth and awareness of the Academic All-America program," said Howard Davis, sports information director at Massachusetts and immediate past president of CoSIDA. "We in CoSIDA long have recognized the selection of these teams as a top organizational project."

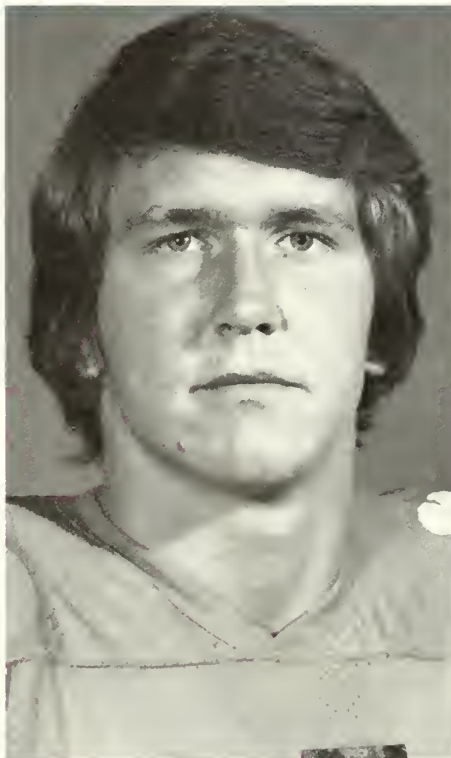
John Toner, president of the NCAA, which joined CoSIDA in 1980 in its effort to select and recognize outstanding student-athletes, echoed Davis' feelings.

"The student-athlete concept long has been in the forefront of this Association's reason for existence," said Toner. "The Association is pleased to provide the financial assistance

necessary to spotlight outstanding individuals who not only have demonstrated excellence in a sport but in the classroom as well."

As befits such an award, the selection process is demanding. CoSIDA has divided the nation into eight geographic districts. Each district has an Academic All-America coordinator who stays in touch with the sports information directors in the area. To be nominated for Academic All-America honors, a student-athlete must have at least a 3.20 grade-point average (on a 4.00 scale) during the previous academic year. Student-athletes must have been in residence at their current institution for at least one year and must be a starter or key reserve.

In many ways the Academic All-American has a bit more to be proud of than the regular All-American selected by the wire services. If a player like Mike Eppley can make the select team he has on-field accomplishments and off-field accomplishments to be proud of. This team honors the multi-dimensional person. Mike Eppley fits the bill.

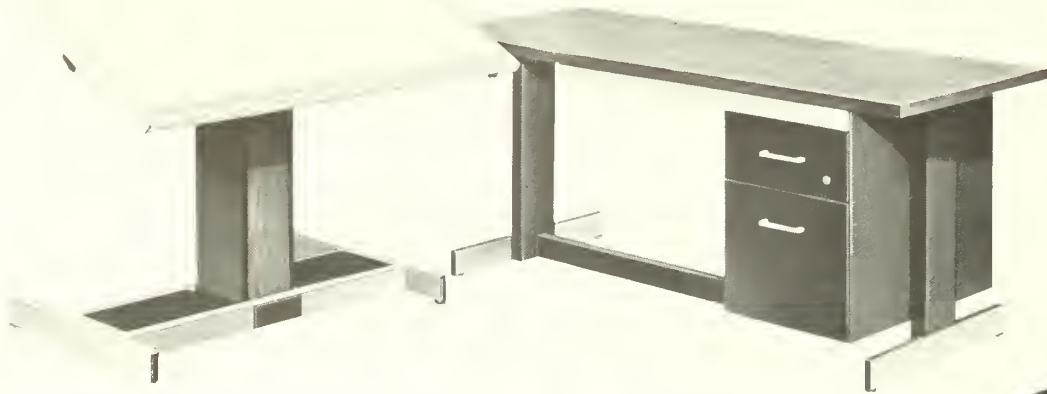
At last, game-day arrives, and the Bengal Babes meet at the Jervey Athletic Center at 9:00 a.m. A committee of Ben-

Today marks the final home appearance of the 1983 version of the Clemson Tigers, and Tiger Band celebrates this occasion with a review of its best performances of the season.

The Tiger Band will enter the field today to "Sock It To Em" and continue the program by spelling out TIGERS to the tune of "Tiger Rag." The pregame festivities include the presentation of the colors by the Air Force ROTC, as the Clemson University Chorus, under the direction of Willard Cottrell, joins Tiger Band in "America the Beautiful," "The Star-Spangled Banner," and the alma mater.

Tiger Band would like to pay tribute to longtime Tiger Band announcer, Nick Peck, as he dots the "i" during the pregame activities. The 1955 graduate of the University of North Carolina has served as the band announcer for the past 19 years. Peck became involved with the Tiger Band program over 20 years ago, when he and his wife served as chaperones for several of the away football contests.

John Butler, was director of bands at the time, and it was his suggestion that Peck serve as the announcer. Peck's job has grown over the years to include handling all the announcements for special events in addition to his duties in regards to the band. If you have ever attended a Clemson football game before, home or away, then you definitely are familiar with his voice, "Ladies and gentle-

men, it's the Clemson University Tiger Band!"

In addition to his responsibilities as Tiger Band announcer, Peck is also involved in various music association groups. He is the past president of both the National Association of School Music Dealers and the National Association of Music Merchants. Also, he is the President of the Pecknell Music Company of Charleston, Columbia, and Greenville. He is married to the former Jane Matthews, and they reside in Greenville. They have two children, Scott and Catherine. Scott is married and lives in Charleston, while Catherine makes her home in Greenville.

The pregame festivities continue to include a presentation by Clemson University Trustee Louis P. Batson of Greenville, as he presents President Atchley with two American flags commemorating Clemson veterans who served in past wars. Three Clemson graduates also will be on hand to represent the three services. Representing the Army is Retired Lt. General Harris W. Hollis, representing the Air Force is Major General Clifton E. Wright, Jr., and representing the Marine Corps is Retired Brigadier General Alvin S. Sanders. These men serve as a living reminder of all those men who lost their lives fighting for their country.

The Tiger Band then closes out the pregame show to a reprise of "Sock It To Em," and "Tiger Rag" as the team prepares to do battle against the Terrapins of Maryland.

The Clemson-Maryland game has been dedicated to recognize the service veterans of past wars, and to commemorate this occasion a 22-man drill team from Washington, D. C. will begin the halftime show. This drill team is the official ceremonial escort to the President of the United States. This squad is the oldest infantry regiment in the United States today. When they are not performing at official ceremonies such as the changing of the guards at Arlington National Cemetery's Tomb of the Unknown Soldier, they are responsible for maintaining the security of the nation's capitol. This official United States Army drill team, which was formed 26 years ago, will provide a 10-minute halftime show.

Tiger Band then takes the field to a review of the 1983 season with tunes popular from the band members. Tiger Band will enter the field to "Topaz," arranged by Jay Bocook. Tiger Band follows with the percussion feature "The Devil Went Down to Georgia," made popular by the Charlie Daniels Band. Tiger Band continues today's program with its concert feature, "Sambandrea Swing," written by Don Menza and arranged by John Edwards. The band concludes the halftime show with, "Here's That Rainy Day/A Brand New Day," arranged by John Higgins.

The Tiger Band will then exit Frank Howard field for the final time this season to a reprise of the song that shakes the Southland — "Tiger Rag," and prepares for another half of action.
