THE TIGERS & GAMECOCKS WILL SQUARE OFF IN THE PALMETTO STATE CLASH FOR THE 110TH TIME.

Meeting of Strong Offense vs. Strong Defense

This will be a matchup of one of the nation's top offenses against one of the nation's top defenses. Clemson enters this game fourth in the nation in scoring (44.6), sixth in total offense (535.6), and ninth in passing offense (332.0). The Tigers lead the ACC in all three categories as well.

South Carolina is 13th in the nation in both total defense (310.8) and scoring defense (17.5). Clemson is averaging over 300 yards and 30 points in the first half alone. South Carolina is also eighth in the nation in sacks per game and is tied for 19th in tackles for loss per game.

Individually, there will be some outstanding offensive and defensive stars on the field. Clemson is led on offense by Tajh Boyd, who is second in the nation in passing efficiency (172.7). He only trails Aaron Murray (Georgia).

Boyd is coming off one of the greatest performances in ACC history. He completed 30-44 passes for 426 yards

and five touchdowns against N.C. State last weekend. He also rushed for 103 yards and three touchdowns, giving him an ACC-record eight total touchdowns. He had 529 yards of total offense, breaking the Tiger record of 517 that had been held by Woodrow Dantzler at N.C. State in 2001.

DeAndre Hopkins is eighth in the nation in receiving yards per game (106.5) and is second in touchdown receptions (15). He became Clemson's career leader in receiving yards last weekend and has 2,786 yards. He can tie the ACC record for consecutive games with a touchdown catch. He has caught at least one in eight straight games. The record is nine, set by Herman Moore (Virginia) in 1990.

The Gamecocks counter with defensive end Jadeveon Clowney, who is tied for 18th in the nation in sacks per game and seventh in tackles for loss per game. He sat out last weekend's contest against Wofford, but should be back in action tonight in Death Valley.

when Clemson was #8 in both polls and South Carolina was #12. The Gamecocks won that contest 20-7.

Tigers & Gamecocks Both Ranked in Top 15

This is the 11th time Clemson has faced a top-25 Gamecock team and third year in a row. It is also the first time Clemson has faced three top-25 Gamecock teams in a row.

South Carolina was ranked #18 by AP and #17 by USA Today entering the 2010 game at Clemson. Last year, both teams were ranked in the top 20, as South Carolina was #13 by AP and #14 by USA Today, while Clemson was #18 and #17, respectively. Both squads are ranked in the top 25 again entering this year's game. The Tigers are #9 by USA Today and #12 by AP, while South Carolina is #12 by USA Today and #13 by AP.

This will be the sixth time both schools enter the game ranked in the top 25 of at least one of the polls. South Carolina has a 3-2 lead in those previous five matchups.

This is the second time in history that both teams enter the game ranked in the top 15. The other time was 1987 on the road

Tigers & Gamecocks Have 19 Combined Wins

This will be the biggest game in the history of the Clemson vs. South Carolina rivalry when it comes to combined victories entering the game. The two schools have combined for 19 victories entering the regular-season finale, more than any other meeting in the history of the event. Tonight's game is the 110th all-time meeting between the two programs.

Clemson is 10-1 and South Carolina is 9-2 entering the contest. It is actually the second straight year that record has been broken. Last year, both schools were 9-2 entering the game for a total of 18 wins.

Both teams also combined for 16 wins in the 1981, 1984, and 1987 contests.

Combined Wins Record Will Be Broken

The Tigers and Gamecocks have already combined for 19 wins this year. With someone gaining a victory tonight, that means this will be just the second time Clemson and South Carolina have combined for at least 20 wins in a year. The previous time was last year, when Clemson won 10 games and South Carolina won 11 games.

Streaks on the Line

Clemson has won seven games in a row, all by at least 14 points. That is the longest active streak of its kind in the nation and a school record for consecutive wins by at least 14 points.

Nationally, Clemson's seven-game winning streak is the fifth-longest active streak. Notre Dame and Ohio State have both won 11 games in a row, followed by Northern Illinois and Kent State, who have won 10 games in a row.

In terms of its conference winning streak, Clemson has won seven ACC games in a row, tied for third-most in the nation. Northern Illinois has won 15 straight MAC games, followed by Utah State with 10 in a row. Clemson, Kent State, and Ohio State have all won seven straight conference games.

The Tigers have won 13 games in a row in Death Valley, the third-longest active home winning streak in the nation. Northern Illinois has won 21 straight games at home, followed by Michigan with 14. Clemson is third with 13,

while Georgia and South Carolina have each won 11 home games in a row.

Efficient Signal-Callers on Display

Two of the top quarterbacks in the nation in terms of passing efficiency will go head-to-head in Memorial Stadium tonight. Clemson quarterback Tajh Boyd is second in the nation in passing efficiency. The native of Hampton, VA has completed 240-353 passes for 3,367 yards and 33 touchdowns. He has tied his own Clemson record for touchdown passes in a season, so one touchdown pass tonight would break the record.

Boyd is averaging 9.54 yards per pass attempt this year, which is on a Clemson record pace and the second-best figure in the nation. Aaron Murray (Georgia) is averaging a national-best 9.85 yards per attempt.

Shaw has had a strong year and is 16th in the nation in passing efficiency. He is 136-202 passing for 1,732 yards and 15 touchdowns against seven interceptions. He was 20-21 passing against Missouri earlier this season to establish a South Carolina single-game mark for completion percentage (95.2). He has completed 67.3 percent of his pass attempts and has a pass efficiency rating of 156.9. He passed for a career-high 356 yards in South Carolina's win over Tennessee on October 27.

Clemson Has Record-Setting Offense

Clemson's offense has already recorded a number of school records this year and is getting close to many others. The Tigers set the single-season scoring record last weekend and now has 491 points for the season, 21 more than last year's team had in 14 games. The Tigers have scored 63 touchdowns for the year, five more than last year's record-setting total of 55.

Last weekend, Clemson scored 62 points in the 62-48 win over N.C. State, the most points by a Tiger team since scoring 70 in a 70-14 win over Central Michigan in 2007. It was also the most points by Clemson in an ACC game since the Tigers scored 82 points in an 82-24 win over Wake Forest in 1981.

Clemson has been especially effective in the second quarter with 191 points, most in Tiger history in one quarter. There are six FBS schools who have not scored 191 points for the entire season, nevermind just one quarter.

Hall Third in Tiger History in Takeaways

Graduate safety Rashard Hall enters his final home game with 14 career interceptions and three career recovered fumbles for 17 total takeaways. He had his 14th career interception and team-leading fourth of the year in the win over N.C. State last weekend.

Hall is fifth in school history in interceptions, but he is third in career takeaways. Only Terry Kinard (19) and Michael Hamlin (18) are ahead of Hall in career takeaways. Hall has also been one of Clemson's top tacklers the last four years. He has 65 tackles this year and 282 for his career. He will make his 39th career start tonight.

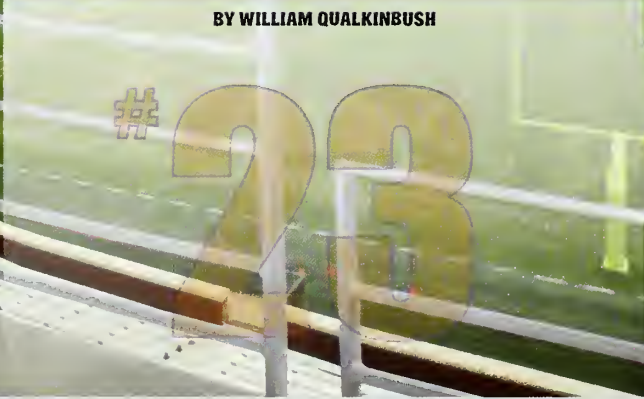

On February 1, 2012, the Clemson football program signed a nationally-acclaimed recruiting class to help move the Tigers into a bright future. But the feeling within the football program was that the most important recruiting haul of the offseason came on January 10, when running back Andre Ellington announced that

he would return to school for his senior season.

Ellington was considered an intriguing prospect at the conclusion of last season, but he came back to Tigertown to complete a series of goals he keeps to himself. Whatever they are, they drive him each day he competes as his Clemson career comes to a close.

The Tigers' leading rusher in 2012 entered school in 2008 as a lean freshman from Moncks Corner, SC. Ellington was a highly-touted recruit, but he found himself slotted behind fellow rookie Jamie Harper on a depth chart that also included future NFL players James Davis and C.J. Spiller.

Instead of whining and griping about his predicament, Ellington did what many

players in today's game fail to understand. He took a red-shirt season, developed in the weightroom, and honed his craft. For a player who chose the Tigers over Florida, Georgia, Kentucky, Maryland, North Carolina, South Carolina, and Tennessee, this was no small feat.

Ellington understood his role as part of a backup duo with Harper, and he began the 2009 season with that in mind. For the year, he averaged 7.2 yards per carry as a replacement for Spiller, particularly when Spiller spent time out of games due to injury. The current Buffalo Bill made a significant impact on Ellington's Clemson career, and the two still speak on occasion.

"He was a guy who I actually studied a lot," said Ellington of Spiller. "In the end, he told me that he learned a lot from me. I was kind of shocked by that. Our running styles are basically the same. He does a lot of things that I do in between the tackles."

In his first career start against Florida State in 2009, Ellington rushed for 54 yards on just six carries and scored one of his four touchdowns on the season. He also totaled 11 receptions out of the backfield that season.

As a sophomore in 2010, Ellington started six games and gained 686 rushing yards despite playing a total of three snaps in the final five contests of the season. Four times during the 2009 campaign, he rushed for more than 100 yards. In the opener against North Texas, Ellington gained 122 yards on only 12 carries.

In a road game against eventual National Champion Auburn, Ellington was a workhorse, as he ran the football 22 times for 140 yards and a score against the SEC Tigers. He also gained a season-high 166 yards on 20 carries against Georgia Tech and scored on an 87-yard kickoff return against Maryland, the only special teams score of his career.

Prior to the 2011 season, Chad Morris joined the Clemson football staff as the offensive coordinator, and Ellington said he immediately saw his game improve. He also credited Morris, one of the most esteemed assistant coaches in the country, with helping attract Tony Elliott, his current position coach, back to Clemson.

"He's a guy who's going to create the best opportunity for players to be successful," said Ellington of the Tigers' offensive coordinator. "Having Coach Morris led us to getting Coach Elliott. He's a guy who teaches you the game, not just how to do it, but what you're learning while you're doing it."

Heading into the 2011 season, Ellington's issues with injuries were cited by fans and pundits as one of Clemson's major question marks. Much of the offseason was spent preparing his body for more of a grind.

As the top back on the depth chart, Ellington flourished during his junior season. He almost doubled his carries from the previous year and rushed for 1,178 yards while averaging 5.3 yards per carry.

During the season, Ellington still dealt with nagging injuries, but he played through them, missing only one contest. He surpassed the 100-yard mark five times, including a breakout 212-yard performance in a ferocious come-from-behind win at Maryland.

The 5'10" running back played his best in key situations. In the final two games of the season, in the ACC Championship game against #3 Virginia Tech and the Orange Bowl against #22 West Virginia, he

combined for 241 yards on 30 carries and two touchdowns.

Then, it was decision time. There were plenty of factors beckoning Ellington to take a chance and enter the NFL draft, but just like his role model (Spiller) had done two seasons prior, he made a decision to stay and finish the race he had started in 2008.

"I got a chance to talk with Coach (Dabo) Swinney," recalled Ellington. "We developed a great understanding on things I can improve on for the next level. Getting that degree was the main thing I wanted to focus on. If I had left this year and not come back, I wouldn't have been able to get that."

It was worth Ellington's while to return to Tigertown. He has proven to scouts that he can remain generally healthy for an entire season while carrying the load in Morris' offense.

Ellington is well on his way to another 1,000-yard season and has showcased his improved receiving ability and pass-blocking ability to any scouts who might have questioned those aspects of his game a year ago.

Earlier this season, Ellington set a new career rushing-yardage high in a nation-



ally-televised contest against SEC foe Auburn, as he gained 228 yards, the most in Clemson history against an SEC opponent. Two of his top-four rushing games in an illustrious career have come against Auburn, as he has combined for 414 rushing yards and two scores in three meetings.

One of the driving forces behind his decision to return was a desire to finish his career and be proud of what he had accomplished, both individually and with his teammates. The Berkeley High School product has seen a ton of changes during his five-year stint at Clemson, and he wanted to make absolutely sure the program was at its peak when he stepped aside.

"In past years, a lot of things didn't go quite the way we wanted them to," said #23. "This year, we're on the right foot and we're doing great things. Like we always say, we're knocking down a lot of walls."

Now, Ellington prepares to run down the Hill for the final time. It means more to him than most because his cousin, Bruce, a two-sport athlete at South Carolina who also wears #23 on the gridiron, will be standing across the field on the opposing sideline tonight. For Andre, it is fitting to close things out in Death Valley competing against his cousin.

"When we were kids, it would just be the two of us in the yard playing football... me against him," said Andre. "When we would have other cousins out there, he was on the opposite team and I would go against him. When we're in the gym playing basketball, I'm playing against him."

When the dust settles on the 2012 season, with a host of accolades under his belt, Ellington will get to work preparing for the NFL draft. Chances are, he will be glad he waited an extra year.

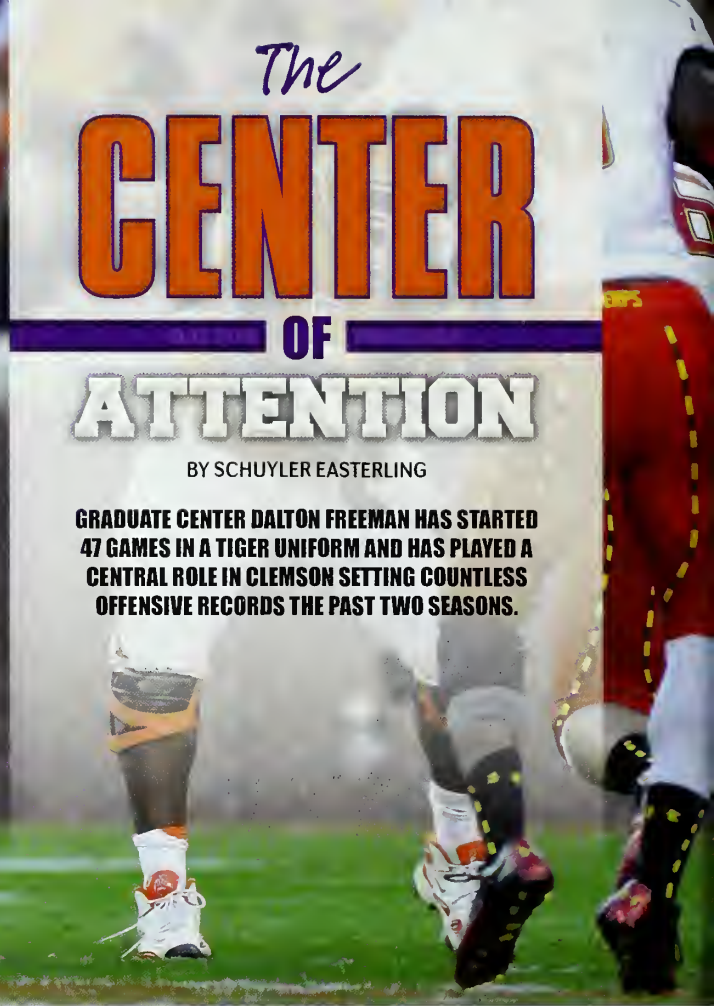

The CENTER OF ATTENTION

GRADUATE CENTER DALTON FREEMAN HAS STARTED 47 GAMES IN A TIGER UNIFORM AND HAS PLAYED A CENTRAL ROLE IN CLEMSON SETTING COUNTLESS OFFENSIVE RECORDS THE PAST TWO SEASONS.



In the heart of the South Carolina Midlands, just down the road from Columbia, rests the tiny town of Pelion, SC with a population of 685. Like so many small towns in South Carolina, football is a passion and a source of pride for this community nestled among pine thickets and surrounding farms. But for folks in Pelion, nothing has made them more proud than witnessing the gridiron success of native son and Clemson graduate Dalton Freeman.

Standing 6'5" and weighing in at 285 pounds, the center sports an imposing figure on the gridiron. Blessed with natural size, Freeman was also blessed with a natural affinity and skill for the game, aided by his family's outstanding football legacy.

"I don't ever remember football not being a part of my life," said a smiling Freeman. "It all started with my grandfather. He played football for North Carolina, left to join the military, and then finished up playing football at Appalachian State.

"My dad followed in his footsteps and played football at Wake Forest (1978-82), and is now the head coach at Pelion High School. My brother continued the family tradition and played football at Newberry.

"Football has been such a part of our family. I grew up around the game and wanted to be a part of it more than anything. As soon as I could walk, I was out there on the field with my dad at practice, and on every Friday night helping him out as a ballboy. It felt like forever, but once I hit the seventh grade, I was able to suit up for the first time and play some ball."

From the beginning of his football career in junior high school, it was apparent

that Freeman had inherited his family's athleticism and football savvy. Once arriving on the high school scene and under the tutelage of his father, Freeman blossomed into a prized recruit.

With his powerful frame and superb footwork, he was a natural offensive and defensive lineman, dominating the opposition in quick order. As his high school career continued, college coaches around the country took notice.

As a senior, Freeman graded 92 percent as an offensive lineman and recorded 67

knockdowns and 37 pancake blocks. Freeman was rated the #13 offensive guard in the country by [Scout.com](#), the #16 offensive guard by [ESPN.com](#), and the #13 offensive guard by [Rivals.com](#).

Garnering additional achievements, Freeman was a finalist for Mr. Football in South Carolina, represented the Palmetto State in the Shrine Bowl, and was named a high school All-American at offensive tackle. Nearly three hours away in the Upstate of South Carolina, Clemson made no secrets how much the Tigers would love

to have Freeman wearing the Orange & White.

"When it came time for the recruiting process, I was very blessed to receive about 30 different offers," recalled Freeman. "I decided to make the most out of the experience and took a ton of visits across the country. But when I got to Clemson, one thing stood out to me about the university...the people.

"The people at Clemson blew me away. The atmosphere was unlike any place I had ever visited. It got to the point where

Upon the conclusion of this year’s bowl game, the Freeman era of Clemson football will come to a close, the final chapter in a career that has made him one of the most lauded centers in Tiger history. With hopes of playing in the NFL, he is determined to accomplish his dream when his career as a Tiger ends.

“Whatever happens in my future, I know God will open the doors and I will choose which one to go in,” he smiled. “I’m thankful to have this opportunity. My family always believed and supported me, even when I didn’t believe in myself.

“It’s hard to believe a little ole’ boy like me could come from Pelion, SC to a place like Clemson and be successful and have an opportunity to make it at the next level. I give God all the honor and glory for that.”

Regardless of Freeman’s future, he has undoubtedly left his mark on Clemson, just as Clemson has left its mark on him. He will leave the school having played more snaps than any other Tiger in history, regardless of position, and will have tied the mark for starts (49).

“I was very blessed to have been given the opportunity to red-shirt as a freshman and then be able to graduate from Clemson in three-and-a-half years with a degree in communication studies,” said #55.

“I’m going to graduate again this December with my second degree in sociology. I’ve tried to make the most of my time here at Clemson. I realize that some day, the air in that football is going to eventually run out. After that happens, that ball will be nothing but a flat, and I’ll have to do more than just play football.

“It all starts with academics, and that’s part of the reason I chose Clemson. This university is one of the premier institutions in the country, and I’m very blessed to have had the opportunity to receive two degrees from this special place. I take pride knowing I will forever be a Tiger.”

And for the Clemson faithful who have spent the past five years watching Dalton Freeman grow as a man and a player, that feeling of pride is mutual.

every school had a nice stadium and had cool uniforms, but what it boiled down to for me was the people at Clemson.

“I realized that it was the people here that were going to make me happiest. The quality of men on our staff is what separates Clemson from any other place.”

He arrived on the Clemson campus in the fall of 2008 and began his career as a Tiger. In his first season, he red-shirted and bided his time for a chance to shine for the Clemson faithful. In 2009, Freeman made history and became the first freshman center to start for Clemson over the course of a season since 1943, when the depletion of upperclassmen due to World War II forced Clemson to start freshman reserves.

“My first start is one of my favorite memories,” beamed Freeman. “I got my first start against Wake Forest. It was ironic since my dad played football at Wake Forest and everyone was making a big deal about it. I was a red-shirt freshman and no one was sure how I would do out there.

“I wound up playing pretty well and won the starting job. I’ve been blessed to start every game of my career since that game (47 in a row entering tonight’s contest against South Carolina). That start against the Demon Deacons was a landmark moment in my life.”

The Clemson coaching staff was amazed at the high level of play exhibited by the young center, and they have not given the reins of the offense up to another center these past four years.

Freeman finished 2009 being named a first-team freshman All-American according to CollegeFootballNews.com and was named Clemson’s Offensive Co-Rookie-of-the-Year along with Kyle Parker by the coaching staff.

In 2010, Freeman continued to impress, notching 58 knockdown blocks in 811 snaps (second-most on the team) and allowed just two sacks all season.

Last season, Freeman’s decision making and powerful blocking helped propel Clemson towards winning its first ACC Championship in 20 years. Following the 2011 season, he was named an honorable mention All-American by SI.com, a First-Team All-ACC selection, and was one of six finalists for the Rimington Trophy, which is awarded to the top center in the nation. Not just outstanding on the field, Freeman has been an Academic All-ACC selection the past three seasons as well.

This year, Freeman is continuing his model of consistency for the Tigers, quietly orchestrating one of the most explosive offenses in school history with dreams of

leading Clemson to another BCS appearance and one of the best seasons in program history. The Tigers are on a record pace in terms of scoring, touchdowns, total offense, and passing offense.

When asked what he has been most proud of during his time anchoring the offensive line, Freeman did not hesitate.

“The tradition at Clemson is unlike any other, and I’ve been proud to be a part of that.

“When I first got to Clemson, we were on the verge of changing the culture of this program. Since Coach (Dabo) Swinney has taken over and during my four years here, we have done a really good job changing this program from the inside out.

“We’re winning at home, we’re finding ways to win on the road, and we’re becoming a much more consistent program. I think a lot of that has to do with Coach Swinney and his leadership, as well as the type of players he has been able to recruit. The best thing about Clemson is that we’re becoming one of the top football programs in the country, both academically and athletically.”

Inspiration can come in many forms, especially in the realm of sports. For those who have seen the movie, *Rudy*, about the Notre Dame football walk-on of the 1970s who faced adversity due to his size, you can see the payoff that hard work and dedication can have. While Rudy Ruettiger, the player who was the inspiration behind the movie, did not attend Clemson, the Tigers have their own inspirational rendition of that story.

Sam Van Gieson is a walk-on long snapper from Greenville, SC who stands 5'9" and weighs 185 pounds. He played for the Riverside High School Warriors and had a dream to play college football.

Coming from a long line of Clemson alumni, Van Gieson had attended Tiger football games since he was three. After applying to a few smaller schools and getting an offer from Newberry to play football, Van Gieson ultimately decided to pursue his dream to play at Clemson as a walk-on.

Van Gieson arrived at Clemson in the fall of 2008, but suffered a heartbreak when he did not make the team. He decided he would no longer pursue a spot on the Clemson roster.

"After I didn't make it the first time, I was very, very distraught, because this has been my dream my whole life...to play for Clemson," stated Van Gieson.

However, he received some encouragement in the spring from a player and friend on that team, J.K. Jay, who convinced Van Gieson to give it another shot.

Van Gieson said that Jay told him, "The long snappers on the team were struggling and there was really only one." He

said, 'I should come back out and try out again.' So I did."

Van Gieson received more encouragement from someone he had met almost 10 years prior, Ruettiger, the actual player who inspired the movie. After finding Ruettiger's foundation online, Van Gieson emailed the inspirational player.

"I poured my heart out," admitted Van Gieson. "I was looking for a little feedback. I got an email back the next day telling me to stick with it. He knew a guy just like me who was a long snapper, walked on, and is in the NFL right now, still long snapping for about 15 years."

That spring in 2009, Van Gieson took a few snaps on Bowman Field before he proceeded to the Tigers' practice.

"I walked out there and asked the special team's coach, Coach (André) Powell, who is now at Maryland, if they needed

some snappers. He said, 'hang around until the end of practice.'

"I snapped some balls for him and he said, 'you're in.'"

Van Gieson had made the team and was excited to share the news.

"Whenever I made it in the spring, I sent him (Ruettiger) another email, letting him know I made it and thanked him for all of his kind words. He actually got that long snapper to email me and give me some words of encouragement to go back out. It was awesome for someone to do that who I met only one time, 10 years ago."

Van Gieson, through his dedication and hard work, has kept his spot on the team every year in spite of the high turnover rate of walk-ons.

"You can have 105 players at camp and 115 on the roster, and I was never in that 105 and I was always hanging by a thread.

Then finally coming in this year, Coach (Dabo) Swinney said, 'you're in...can't wait to have you back. We'll see you in August.'"

While Van Gieson graduated from Clemson with a degree in marketing last May and intends to pursue a career in sales, he has lived out his dream of playing Division I football for the university he has loved since childhood. Earlier this year in the second game against Ball State, he appeared in a game to do his specialty. He executed a flawless snap on an extra point.

But the biggest moment for Van Gieson was seeing his name printed for the first time on the back of his jersey for his first Spring Game with the team.

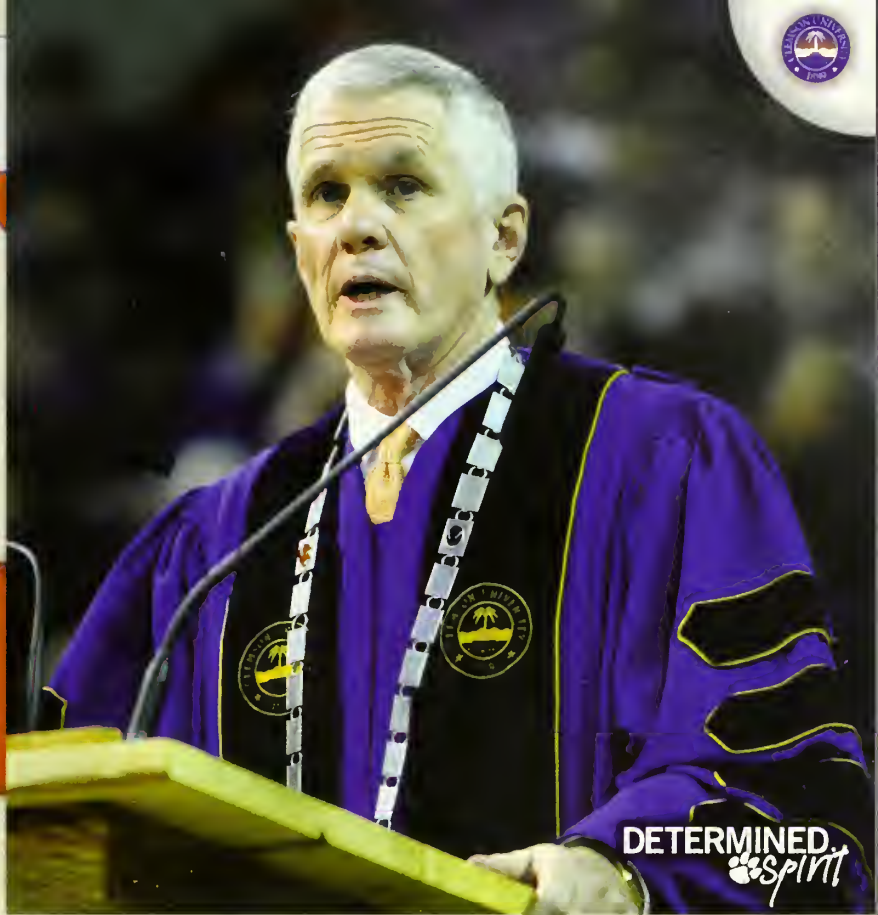

Jim Barker has worn a lot of hats in his almost five decades as a member of the Clemson family - student, athlete, alumnus, teacher, dean, parent, fan, and president. On reflection, he thinks "student" is the most important.

"I often tell people I learned everything from plumbing to poetry in architecture school, and I use every bit of that knowledge as president of Clemson University."

A 1970 Clemson graduate, Barker was named president in 1999 with a mandate from the Board of Trustees to lead Clemson into the top ranks of American universities.

At his inaugural address in April of 2000, he said, "I am convinced that there is no university in America stronger than Clemson when we are 'One Clemson.' A united Clemson is unstoppable."

During the "One Clemson" decade that followed, the university harnessed the competitive, determined spirit of the Clemson family to transform itself from a respected state institution into one of the nation's finest public universities.

Clemson climbed from the third tier to a top-25 ranking among public universities in the 2012 **U.S. News & World Report** guide to colleges, and has been recognized for value, affordability, and return on investment by **Kiplinger's** and **Bloomberg/BusinessWeek** magazines.

Ninety-two percent of seniors would choose Clemson again according to the National Survey of Student Engagement. Clemson also ranks among the top public universities in the percentage of alumni who make gifts to their school, another indication of quality and alumni satisfaction.

Clemson continues to attract top students and faculty. It is the top choice of Palmetto Fellows, the state's best students. A record-setting 18,502 undergraduate applications were received for the 2012 fall semester, and freshman enrollment in the Calhoun Honors College is up 16 percent.

The university provides an unmatched educational experience - intellectual development - for students and research-driven economic development for the state of South Carolina.

Last year's news highlights also include the following:

- Dedication ceremonies were held for the Larry Penley Golf Clubhouse, the Class of 1956 Academic Success Center, and the Lee Hall expansion and renovation. Work will be completed this year on a new Life Sciences building.
- The Will to Lead capital campaign, which raised \$608 million by the original completion date of June 30, 2012, has been extended, with a new goal of \$1 billion. Three families made gifts of at least \$5 million each to name the Glenn Department of Civil Engineering, and to build the Watt Family Innovation Center on campus and the Zucker Family Graduate Education Center near the wind turbine drivetrain test facility currently under construction in North Charleston, SC. These gifts support students, faculty, and facilities, including new athletic facilities.

Barker is a leading voice in higher education for South Carolina and the nation. He served on the NCAA Division I Board of Directors for four years, including three as chairman, and chairs the Working Group, rewriting the rulebook for NCAA athletics. He also delivered keynote addresses at the national Campus Development Summit and the South Carolina AIA conference in April of 2012.

For his leadership, Barker has received the Order of the Palmetto, South Carolina's highest civilian honor, and The Cliff's Business Person-of-the-Year Award from **Greenville Magazine**. He has also been awarded honorary doctorates from the Medical University of South Carolina, South Carolina State University, and Mars Hill College.

A native of Kingsport, TN, Barker received his bachelor of arts degree from Clemson in 1970 and his master of architecture & urban design degree in 1973 from Washington University (Saint Louis, MO), which also recognized him with its Distinguished Alumnus Award. He is a Fellow of the American Institute of Architects and the Institute for Urban Design.

As Clemson's President, Barker remains committed to the classroom. Each spring, he is part of a team that teaches an undergraduate course exploring "a sense of place" in architecture, literature, and history.

In his spare time, what there is of it, he maintains the daily fitness regimen of a life-long athlete and enjoys playing with his grandchildren. He is widely acclaimed for his pen-and-ink drawings of campus buildings and his watercolor paintings.

Barker and his wife, Marcia, have two sons, Britt and Jacob, a daughter-in-law, Rita Bolt Barker, and two granddaughters, Madeline and Eliza.

ATHLETIC DIRECTOR



The 2011-12 academic year was a rewarding time for Clemson Athletic Director Terry Don Phillips, who announced in August that the 2012-13 academic year will be his last at Clemson.

One of his goals when he came to Clemson was to help the school's football program return to championship form. That goal became a reality when the Tiger football program under Dabo Swinney, who he had hired in December of 2008, led the Tigers to their first league title in 20 years with a resounding 38-10 win over #3 Virginia Tech in Charlotte, NC.

The program defeated a school-record four top-25 teams along the way, including two wins over future Hall of Fame Coach Frank Beamer's Hokies. That 38-10 victory in Charlotte gave the Tigers a 10-win season for the first time in 21 years.

It was also a successful season off the field. From an academic standpoint, Clemson's APR score of 983 was #7 among FBS schools, and Clemson was the only BCS school to win a conference title and finish in the top 10 in the nation in APR. Sixteen of Clemson's 19 sports had APR scores of 970 or better and those 19 sports had a collective GPA of 2.99, the highest on record.

Overall, six sports finished in the top 25 of their respective sports, there were three ACC Championships celebrated, and four wins over top-ranked teams. A defending National Champion, was defeated in two different sports on Clemson's home turf as well.

The Tigers have competed at a high level since Phillips came to Clemson from Oklahoma State in the summer of 2002. In his first year, the Tigers won the National Championship in golf, just the fourth team national title in school history.

From 2008-09 and 2010-11, Clemson and Florida State were the only schools in the nation to go to a bowl game, the NCAA Men's Basketball Tournament, and the NCAA Baseball Tournament each season.

One of the reasons for Clemson's level of success as a total sports program has been Phillips' emphasis on improving facilities. In 2009, the football staff moved into the WestZone at Memorial Stadium. It was a day that brought a smile to everyone associated with the program, but especially Phillips, who had been working toward that day before he arrived in 2002.

Phillips' vision for the WestZone was to create a top-of-the-line facility for the football program, but at the same time have a positive effect on the total sports program. The facility at Memorial Stadium now creates more office space, new locker rooms, and training room and strength training facilities for the Olympic sports programs.

Every sport has realized a facilities enhancement since he came to Clemson and the construction has not stopped. The Tiger football program will enjoy a new indoor facility by the end of this year. The

baseball program will soon break ground on a new locker room and player lounge facility, and the basketball programs are expected to break ground on a new facility within the next 18 months.

The Clemson men's golf program opened the Penley Building last fall and the women's golf program, which will begin play in 2013, will have a new facility at the Walker Course.

Phillips has been recognized for these accomplishments in recent years. He was named one of the 100 Most Influential Sports Educators in America in 2008 by The Institute for International Sport at the University of Rhode Island.

Phillips was also recognized nationally for his performance at Clemson in 2006 when he was honored by NACDA (National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics) as the 2005-06 Athletic Director-of-the-Year for the FBS Southeast Region. He was one of just four FBS athletic directors honored at the annual convention in New Orleans, LA.

Excellence in academics has been a lifelong pursuit. He has an undergraduate degree from Arkansas (1970), a master's degree from Virginia Tech (1974), a doctorate degree from Virginia Tech (1978), and a law degree from the University of Arkansas School of Law (1996). He is a member of the Arkansas Bar, South Carolina Bar, American Bar Association, and Sports Lawyers Association.

Phillips maintains a classroom presence by teaching a sports law section in Clemson's accountancy & legal studies department. In addition, he is past chair of the NCAA Division I Infractions Appeals Committee and continues to serve the committee as requested.

Prior to coming to Clemson, he served as athletic director at Oklahoma State. Football was transformed from a perennial losing status to very competitive, enjoying a return to bowl games after several years

and establishing a winning record against rival Oklahoma. For this, he received the National Football Foundation Oklahoma Chapter Outstanding Contribution to Amateur Football Award in 2002.

Before leading the Cowboys, he was a senior associate athletic director at Arkansas (1988-94). He also served as athletic director at Liberty (1980,81) and Louisiana-Lafayette (1983-88). He was an assistant athletic director at Missouri (1981-83) and

began his administrative career as an assistant athletic director at Florida (1979).

Phillips began his career in college athletics coaching football. He started as a graduate assistant at Arkansas in 1970 and 1971. He moved on to Virginia Tech as an assistant coach (1971-78) before joining the ranks of athletic administration. At Virginia Tech, he served on coaching staffs that included future Clemson Head Coaches Charley Pell and Danny Ford.

Winning has been on Phillips' resumé since his playing days at Arkansas. He lettered on three Frank Broyles teams, where he and his brother, Loyd, an Outland Trophy winner, were starting defensive tackles, the first brother combination to start together under Broyles. Arkansas had a 27-5 record in the three years, played in two Sugar Bowl games, and he played in the memorable 1969 national title game against Texas, a contest that continues to be featured on **ESPN Classic**.

In 2010, he joined Loyd in the University of Arkansas Hall of Honor.

Phillips has two children, John Dennis and Sarah-Jane, and three stepchildren, Meagan (Clemson graduate and former Tiger Band member), Marshall, and Madison. His wife, Tricia, is a graduate of the University of Missouri School of Journalism and earlier enjoyed a career in athletics and development. She is currently active in the Clemson and Seneca communities.

3-5 marked a tough stretch, as Clemson hosted #19 Auburn, who entered with a national-best 17-game winning streak, and #11 Florida State along with a road game at #10 Virginia Tech. The Tigers were victorious in all three contests by scores of 38-24, 35-30, and 23-3, respectively, marking the first time in history that an ACC team won three consecutive games over top-25 ranked (AP) teams.

For his efforts, he was named Bobby Dodd National Coach-of-the-Year in 2011 to become the first Tiger head coach to win a national coach-of-the-year award since 1981, when Danny Ford directed Clemson to the national title.

Swinney, who was also one of five finalists for the Eddie Robinson National Coach-of-the-Year award, one of 10 finalists for the Bear Bryant National Coach-of-the-Year award, one of 10 finalists for the Liberty Mutual Coach-of-the-Year award, and received the Regional AFCA Coach-of-the-Year award in 2011, led the Tigers to their first Orange Bowl berth since 1981.

The 2010 season included wins over bowl teams Georgia Tech, Maryland, and N.C. State. The Wolfpack were ranked #23 in the nation and were leading the ACC in scoring. But the Clemson defense held N.C. State to just one touchdown and 13 points. The team excelled defensively in 2010 and was 13th in the nation in scoring defense and in the top 25 in both total defense and passing defense.

C.J. Spiller was a unanimous first-team All-American in Swinney's first year, and defensive end Da'Quan Bowers duplicated the feat on the defensive side of the ball. Bowers won the 2010 Bronko Nagurski Award as the nation's top defensive player, and he received the Ted Hendricks Award as the country's top defensive end. He was also a finalist for the Bednarik Award and Lombardi Award. He led the nation in

At 42, Dabo Swinney is the youngest head coach in the ACC and one of the youngest in the country. However, his resumé is already stuffed with many significant accomplishments on a school, ACC, and national level.

First, his mere appointment to the position was significant. In October of 2008, he was named Clemson interim head coach, replacing Tommy Bowden, who had been his position coach as a player at Alabama and was Clemson's head coach since 1999. He led the Tigers to a 4-2 record over the remainder of the 2008 regular season, including a victory over Steve Spurrier's South Carolina Gamecocks in the regular-season finale. That strong finish led to a Gator Bowl bid against Nebraska.

On December 1, 2008, the interim tag was removed from the title and he was

named the program's head coach. At the time, there had been 28 interim head coaches at the FBS level since 1970 and those coaches had combined for a record of 26-86-2. Only one of those 28 interim coaches posted a winning record, and that was Swinney. When he was hired as the head coach, Swinney became just the second interim coach to be elevated to the head coach position at the same school during that time period.

In four years (three full seasons) as head coach, he has directed the Tigers to a 29-19 overall record (.604) and a 19-10 mark (.655) in ACC regular-season games. He has also led the Tigers to the ACC Championship game twice, won one ACC title, and has been named national coach-of-the-year.

In addition to leading the program to four bowl games on the field in his young career, his players have also excelled in the classroom. In his career as a head coach, his players have an APR score of 991, fifth-best among active FBS coaches.

His 2011 squad, which ended the season ranked #22 in the nation, captured Clemson's first ACC title since 1991 when it defeated #3 Virginia Tech 38-10 in the ACC Championship game in Charlotte,

NC. It tied for the highest-ranked team the Tigers defeated in history and was the most points scored by an ACC team against Virginia Tech since it joined the league in 2004. The victory, the Tigers' second over the Hokies in 2011, gave Clemson its first 10-win season since 1990. The Tigers' four wins over top-25 ranked teams established a school record as well.

The Tigers jumped out to an 8-0 record and a #6 national ranking after being unranked in the preseason. Games

sacks (15.5) and tied for the national lead in tackles for loss (26).

In 2009, Swinney's first full year as head coach, he led the Tigers to their first championship of the ACC's Atlantic Division. The Tigers came just six points short of winning their first ACC title in 18 years. Swinney was named ACC Coach-of-the-Year by **Sporting News** and was a finalist for the Liberty Mutual Coach-of-the-Year award.

Swinney accumulated nine wins, second-most among all FBS coaches in their first full year. The nine wins tied for fourth-most in ACC history for a first-year head coach. He also led the Tigers to their first bowl win since 2005 in the 21-13 victory over Kentucky in the Music City Bowl.

Swinney's first season included a six-game winning streak at midseason, a streak that saw the Tigers score at least 34 points in every game, a first in school history. During that stretch, the Tigers defeated #8 Miami (FL) on the road. The 40-37 overtime victory tied for the highest-ranked team Clemson has defeated on the road in school history.

Swinney became Clemson's interim head coach on October 13, 2008 when Tommy Bowden stepped down. Then on December 1, 2008, the "interim" tag was removed, as he took over on a full-time basis as the Tigers' 25th head coach. He had been Clemson's assistant head coach for two years and was in charge of the wide receivers since 2003.

Swinney took over a 3-3 team and led it to a Gator Bowl bid against Nebraska. He guided Clemson to a 4-1 record over the last five games of the regular season, with the only loss at #24 Florida State. That 4-1 record to end the regular season tied for the best mark in the ACC for that time period. Four of his six regular-season opponents were later bowl participants.

The 1993 Alabama graduate joined the Clemson staff prior to the 2003 season. In

his first nine years as an assistant or head coach, the Tigers have finished in the top 25 of the polls five times and totaled 15 wins over top-25 teams.

Swinney coached his wide receiver position to a level of consistency that had not been seen previously at Clemson. He had a wideout finish first or second in the ACC in catches in five of his six years as an assistant coach. In his first year, he had three of the top-10 receivers in the ACC, a first in Tiger history. He has coached a First or Second-Team All-ACC wideout in eight of his nine seasons at Clemson, also an unprecedented feat at Clemson.

The Alabama native has a reputation as one of the top recruiters in the nation. In 2006, he was listed as the #5 recruiter in the nation by **Rivals.com**. It marked the second straight year that he was lauded by the website as a top-25 national recruiter. He signed 38 players in his five recruiting seasons as an assistant coach and was a major reason Clemson's 2008 recruiting class was rated #2 in the nation by **ESPN.com** when he signed 11 players. He was named one of the top-25 recruiters in the nation by **Rivals.com** in 2007 as well.

Swinney received a commerce & business administration degree from Alabama in 1993 after lettering three times (1990-92). A walk-on who went on to earn a scholarship, Swinney was a wide receiver on Alabama's 1992 National Championship team. He was also named Academic All-SEC along with being an SEC Scholar-Athlete Honor Roll member in 1990 and 1992.

After his playing career, Swinney served as a graduate assistant from 1993-95 at Alabama, where he coached in the 1994 Gator Bowl and 1995 Citrus Bowl. In December of 1995, he received a master's degree in business administration from Alabama.

He became a full-time assistant coach at Alabama in February of 1996 under Head Coach Gene Stallings (now in the

Hall of Fame) and coached a total of five seasons there on a full-time basis.

During his time at Alabama, Swinney was a part of six teams with at least 10 wins, five top-10 finishes, one national title (1992), three SEC Championships (1989,92,99), and five SEC Western Divi-

sion titles (1992,93,94,96,99) as a player and coach.

From April of 2001 through February of 2003, Swinney was in private business in Alabama. He married the former Kathleen Bassett in 1994. They have three sons, Will (14), Drew (12), and Clay (9).

Although this is his 16th year with the football program, he has been involved with the Clemson athletic department for 30 years. From 1983-97, he was the winningest women's tennis coach in school history.

In those 15 years, Johnston guided his squads to five consecutive ACC titles (1983-87), 12 top-25 finishes, and six NCAA Tournaments. He was ACC Coach-of-the-Year for the fourth time and Southeast Region Coach-of-the-Year for the second time in 1993. Seven players he coached at Clemson were named to the ACC 50-Year Anniversary team in 2002.

Johnston had a 254-160 Clemson record and 263-167 career mark. His best season at Clemson was his rookie year when the team had a 30-5 record and finished #7 in the polls. He coached former Lady Tiger Gigi Fernandez, who was inducted into the Clemson Hall of Fame in 2005.

Johnston played for Clemson on the hardwood and earned his degree in administrative management in 1979. He then served as the assistant men's tennis coach in 1980.

Johnston is a native of Summerville, SC. He is married to the former Sophie Woorons. He has a daughter, Kiera (22), and a son, Noah (5). A second daughter, Caylynn, passed away in 2008.



JEFF DAVIS

Jeff Davis is in his fourth year as assistant athletic director for player relations & external affairs within the Clemson football program. During the previous five years, he served as an assistant athletic director for fundraising, where he helped raise funds for the WestZone Club at Memorial Stadium. He also served as the primary spokesman for Clemson University's Call Me Mister Program and served as director from 1999-03.

Davis was an All-America linebacker from 1978-81 who captained the Tigers during their 1981 National Championship run. "The Judge" registered a then-Tiger-record 175 tackles in 1981. That same season, he became just the third defensive player in ACC history to be named league MVP. Davis had 14 tackles as Clemson topped Nebraska 22-15 in the 1982 Orange Bowl.

In 1995, he became the fourth member of the Clemson Ring of Honor, then he was named to Clemson's Centennial Team in 1996. In 2002, he was named to the ACC's 50-Year Anniversary team.

In 2007, he was inducted into the National Football Foundation College Football Hall of Fame. A fifth-round draft pick by Tampa Bay in 1982, he played six seasons in the NFL. Davis later graduated from Clemson in 1984.

Davis, an ordained pastor, lives in Clemson with his wife, Joni, and their six children.

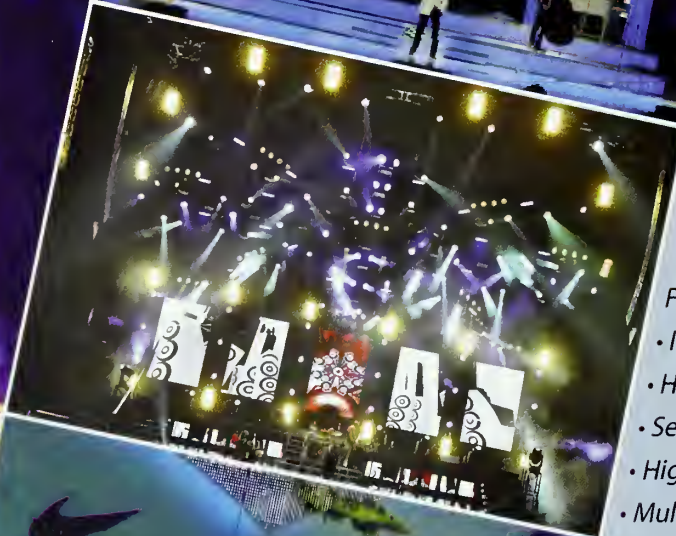
He is married to the former Kim Teel. The couple has a son, Andru Christopher, and a daughter, Lauryn Louise.

Public Address System

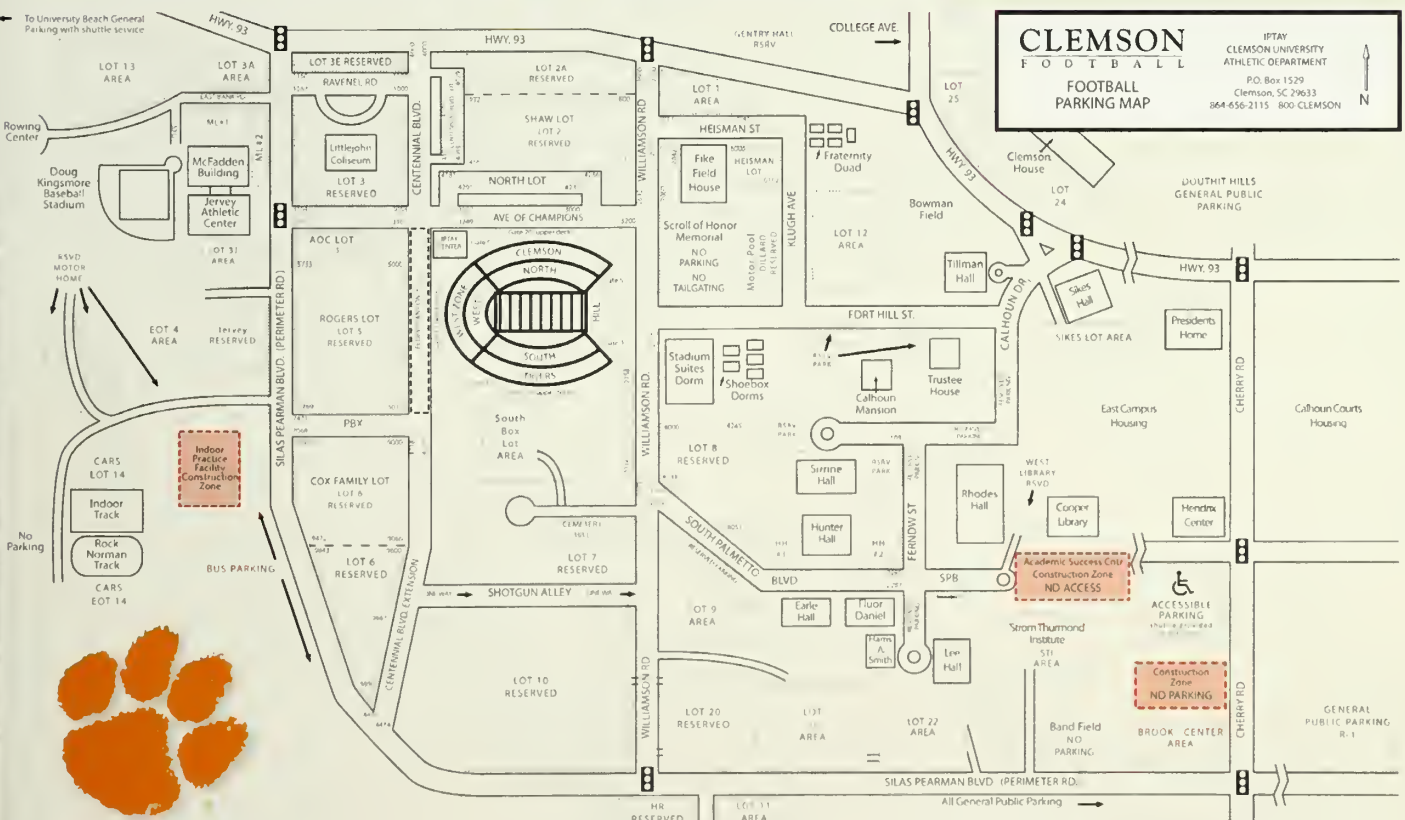
The public address system is intended for spectators' information. Do not request its use to make social contacts.

Clemson's Memorial Stadium has been held in high esteem for many years. Whether it be players from the 1940s and 1950s, opposing players from the 1970s and 1980s, or even professional players in the 1990s, the ambiance of this special setting is what college football is all about. And in 2012, BleacherReport.com rated Memorial Stadium as the best stadium in the country.

The storied edifice added to its legend when the first meeting of father and son coaches (Bowden Bowl) took place before a record crowd of 86,092 fans in 1999. Clemson has been in the top 20 in the nation in average attendance 31 straight years. A crowd has exceeded 80,000 fans 60 times since 1983. In 2011, Clemson was 17th in the nation in average home attendance.

The legend was further enhanced in 2011 when the Tigers had a perfect 7-0 record at home and recorded victories over defending National Champion Auburn and #11 Florida State on consecutive weekends. Defending National Champions are 0-3 all-time at Memorial Stadium.

The facility's mystique is derived from its many traditions, which date to its opening in 1942, the legendary games and players, and Clemson's corresponding rate of success. The Tigers have won 263 games in 70 years and have won over 72 percent of the contests (263-99-7).

The stadium has definitely been good to the Tigers, but it was constructed against the advice of at least one coach. Before Head Coach Jess Neely left for Rice after the 1939 season, he gave Clemson a message.

"Don't ever let them talk you into building a big stadium," he said. "Put about 10,000 seats behind the YMCA. That's all you'll ever need."

Instead of following Neely's advice, however, Clemson officials decided to build the new stadium in a valley on the western part of campus. The place took some clearing, as there were many trees, but luckily there were no hedges.

The crews went to work, clearing, cutting, pouring, and forming. On September 19, 1942, Memorial Stadium opened with Clemson defeating Presbyterian College 32-13. Those 20,000 seats installed for the opener would soon grow.

Howard said that on the day of the stadium's first game, "the gates were hung at 1:00 and we played at 2:00." But that would be all of the construction for awhile. Then in 1958, 18,000 sideline seats were added, and in 1960, 5,658 west endzone seats were added in response to increasing attendance. With the large east endzone ("Green Grass"

section), this expansion increased capacity to 53,000.

Later, upper decks were added to each side of Memorial Stadium as crowds swelled - the first in 1978 and the second in 1983. It increased capacity to over 80,000, which makes it one of the nation's largest on-campus stadiums. In 2006, the West Zone was added, an area that contains locker rooms and a luxury club level that holds over 1,000 seats.

Through the years, Memorial Stadium has become known as "Death Valley." It was tagged by the late Presbyterian College Coach Lonnie McMillian in the late 1940s. After bringing his teams to Clemson for years and getting whipped, he said the place was like "Death Valley." A few years later, the name stuck.

In 1974, the playing surface was named Frank Howard Field for the legendary coach, because of his long service and dedication to Clemson University.

Luckily, it wasn't built behind the YMCA.

THE HILL

What has been described as “the most exciting 25 seconds in college football” from a color and pageantry standpoint actually started out as a matter-of-fact entrance, mainly because of necessity. The first 20,000 seats in Memorial Stadium were built and ready for use before the 1942 season, less than a year after Pearl Harbor was bombed and the United States was drawn into World War II. The shortest entry into Memorial Stadium was a short walk down Williamson Road from Fike Fieldhouse’s dressing rooms to a gate at the top of the Hill, located behind the east endzone. There were no dressing facilities inside the west endzone of Memorial Stadium...there was only a giant clock, where the hands turned, and a scoreboard that was operated by hand.

The team would dress in Fike Fieldhouse, walk down Williamson Road, come in the gate underneath where the scoreboard now stands, and jog down the Hill for its warmup exercises. There was no fanfare, no cannon shot fired, no Tiger Paw flag, no “Tiger Rag” played...just the team making its entrance and lining up to do the side-straddle hop. That is pretty much the way things went for the next 25 years.

Either in 1964 or 1965, S.C. Jones, a member of the class of 1919, made a trip to California. He stopped at a spot in Death Valley, CA and picked up a white flint rock. He presented it to Head Coach Frank Howard as being from Death Valley, California to Death Valley, South Carolina.

The rock laid on the floor in Howard’s office in Fike Fieldhouse for years. One day, he was cleaning up his office and told Gene Willimon, who was executive secretary of IPTAY, to “take this rock and throw it over the fence or out in the ditch...do something with it, but get it out of my office!”

Willimon did not think that was the way a rock should be treated. After all, it had been brought 2,200 miles by a very sincere Tiger fan.

By the mid-1960s, Memorial Stadium was living up to its moniker (“Death Valley”) because of the number of Tiger wins that had been recorded there. Actually, the name was first used by Lonnie McMillian, head coach at Presbyterian College during the 1940s.

McMillian and the other Blue Hose coaches before him used to open each season by playing at Clemson. Seldom scoring (24 shutouts in 39 games) and with only three wins and four ties to show for it, his teams were getting “killed” by the Tigers regularly. In 1948, McMillian made the comment to the press that he was taking his team to play Clemson in “Death Valley.”

An occasional reference to Memorial Stadium by that name could be heard for the next four years, but when Howard started calling it “Death Valley” during the 1950s, the name took off like wildfire. Clemson celebrated its 70th year in the “Valley” in the 2011 season with a perfect 7-0 home record.

But getting back to Howard’s Rock.

The Rock was mounted on a pedestal at the top of the Hill on the east side of the stadium. It was unveiled on September 24, 1966 when Clemson played Virginia. The Tigers were down 18 points with 17 minutes left and came back to win 40-35 on a 75-yard pass from Jimmy Addison to Jacky Jackson in the fourth quarter. That was quite a debut for the Rock.

The team members started rubbing the Rock prior to running down the Hill on September 23, 1967, a day when Clemson defeated Wake Forest by a score of 23-6.

Prior to running down the Hill that day, Howard told his players, “If you’re going to give me 110 percent, you can rub that Rock. If you’re not, keep your filthy hands off it.”

Howard told of the incident during the following day on his television show, and the story became legend.

When Hootie Ingram succeeded Howard as head coach prior to the 1970 campaign, Ingram decided that the team would make its final entrance on the field out of the dressing room in the west endzone. In all home games during the 1970 and 1971 seasons and the first four games of 1972 when the Tigers did not run down the Hill, their combined record was 6-9.

The team decided it wanted to come down the Hill once prior to the South Carolina contest during the 1972 season. The result, in a cold, freezing rain, was a 7-6 victory when Jimmy Williamson knocked down a two-point conversion attempt, which preserved the narrow win.

The Tigers have made the entrance for every home game since 1942, except for the years mentioned above and the first game of 1973 (353 times entering 2012).

After final warmups, the team gathers back in its dressing room under the west endzone stands for its final game instructions. Approximately 10 minutes prior to kickoff, the team boards three buses, rides around behind the north stands to the east endzone, and disembarks to the top of the Hill behind Howard’s Rock.

At the appointed time, the cannon booms, and led by a giant Tiger Paw flag, the band forms two lines for the team to run between and strikes up “Tiger Rag”...the frenzy starts in all sincerity and usually lasts for three hours.

It is a tradition that has inspired Clemson players for many years.

MEMORIAL STADIUM'S FRONT DOOR

The everyday activities for the football program moved to Memorial Stadium on July 1, 2009. Tiger coaches moved into new offices in the West-Zone of Memorial Stadium that day. A month later, the team made the locker room in Death Valley its full-time facility.

Additionally, a new equipment facility, athletic training facility, strength training facility, and training table ("The Paw") opened with all the modern conveniences of an NFL franchise's facility.

The new facility is 150,000 square feet, which adds almost 60,000 square feet to previous facilities in the Jervey Athletic Center. It includes a two-floor strength training facility that is 14,000 square feet, among the largest dedicated solely for football in the nation.

"Our program's motto since I became head coach is 'All-In,'" said Head Coach Dabo Swinney. "This facility shows any Clemson football player, recruit, or supporter that our University is 'All-In' with this program. The facility is among the best in the nation and allows our student-athletes to develop and become the best they can be."

The equipment room was expanded to include, among other items, new offices and a new laundry room that encompasses approximately 6,000 square feet of space. The football staff offices and meeting rooms are composed of approximately 4,000 square feet of existing space and more than 18,000 square feet of new space.

The facility includes offices for the head coach, assistant coaches, and support staff along with position meeting rooms and a 150-seat auditorium with a sloped floor and theater seating.

The training room, located on the north side of the home team's locker room, was expanded to include a hydrotherapy room, new offices, and examination rooms. The training room occupies about 6,200 square feet of space as well.

The level-three concourse was expanded with the addition of the football offices. This space, the roof of the new football offices, is utilized for gameday marketing activities and to provide fans additional space to gather inside the stadium.

In 2012, 8,000 square feet of enclosed space was added on second level, which houses "The Paw."

Former Clemson running back James Davis, the 2005 ACC Rookie-of-the-Year, stated that one of the biggest contributing factors in deciding on Clemson was the University's commitment to upgrading facilities. "Does Clemson want to be a championship program?" asked Davis when he was considering Clemson. "The WestZone (initiative) showed me that it does!"

Building success requires building for success. While the WestZone is located in Memorial Stadium, the completed project provides resources for Clemson's total sports program, permitting all Tiger teams and athletes to compete with the nation's best.

Moving all football operations to the WestZone has opened up space in the Jervey and McFadden buildings for the other 18 intercollegiate sports to improve their facilities for recruiting and have more office, training, conditioning, and sports medicine space. This has greatly enhanced the overall performance, both on and off the field, for all 19 sports.

A look to Clemson's athletic history shows the importance infrastructure enhancements have on the football program. The following chart summarizes the relationship.

STRENGTH & CONDITIONING

A significant aspect of Phase II of the WestZone project at Memorial Stadium was the construction of a new strength training facility on the first floor that is adjacent to the Clemson locker room and the Frank Howard Field playing surface.

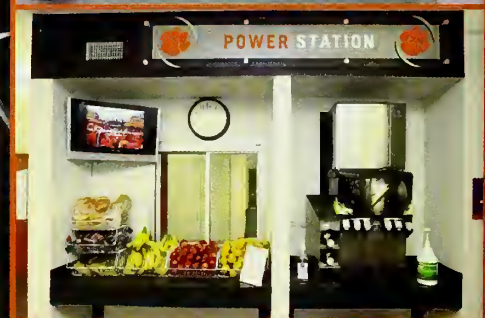
For the first time, there is a strength training facility exclusively for the development of the Clemson football team. Director of Football Strength & Conditioning Joey Batson, who is in his 16th season at Clemson, makes sure that all Tiger gridgers are ready to compete against the top teams in the nation. In his first 15 years in Tigertown, Clemson has played in 13 bowl games and he has coached 22 strength All-Americans on the gridiron.

It is the fourth major facilities construction since Batson joined the Tiger football program, an example of his desire to keep Clemson at the forefront of strength training.

The new facility has the best in all strength training equipment, not to mention the existence of a new sound system and nine new flat-screen televisions that give Tiger football players a pleasant atmosphere to accomplish the most strenuous work.

The strength training facility actually has two floors. The first has all the free-weight equipment, including a dumbbell area, and the second has cardio-equipment.

Batson has a staff of four assistants working full-time with the football squad. Joining Batson are veteran Strength Coaches Larry Greenlee and Paul Hogan along with Assistants Brandon Mahon and Chris Shatley. In 2012, Greenlee was named a Master Strength Coach.

Joey Batson is in his 27th year as a strength & conditioning coach at the collegiate level and 16th year as director of football strength & conditioning at Clemson. Batson, who played a big role in Clemson winning the ACC title for the first time in 20 years in 2011, has served as a head strength & conditioning coach 23 of his 27 years.

Batson was named master strength & conditioning coach by the Collegiate Strength & Conditioning Coaches Association (CSCCA) in 2009. This honor is the highest given in the strength & conditioning profession.

Batson has had a strong impact on the Clemson program since he became director in 1997. He has had much to do with the success of the football program, helping the Tigers to 13 bowl games and six top-25 final rankings. While at Clemson, he has worked for three head football coaches and has had a tremendous impact throughout the state at many notable high school programs.

Not only does Batson bring professional experience to the position at Clemson, he brings experience as a football player at the collegiate level. The Travelers Rest, SC native was a tight end at The Citadel in 1979 before transferring to Newberry, where he was a two-year letterman and team co-captain during his senior season.

Batson earned his bachelor of arts degree in physical education from Newberry in 1985 and his master's degree in education from Clemson in 1988.

Batson is married to the former Susan Malone of Greenville, SC. The couple has two sons, Michael and Benjamin.

As an original member of the NCAA CHAMPS/Life Skills Program, we provide opportunities and services to address the changing needs and skills of student-athletes during college and after graduation. Clemson's commitment to provide its student-athletes with the best facilities is evident in many ways. 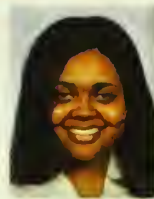

Academic Commitment

Clemson student-athletes posted a school-record 2.99 GPA for the 2012 spring semester according to data released by the Office of Institutional Research & Planning. Clemson's 15 athletic programs had 228 student-athletes named to the academic honor roll, including 111 on the Dean's List and 43 on the President's List (4.0 GPA).

Seven programs posted at least a 3.0 GPA and four others were at 2.93 or better. It was the first time that 11 of the 15 programs had a GPA of at least 2.93.

The football program had a 2.61 GPA, just below the record of 2.63 set in the spring of 2008. Thirty-four team members were named to the academic honor roll, including AP First-Team All-American Sammy Watkins. The freshman walkout became the first Tiger to earn AP First-Team All-America honors and be on the academic honor roll in the same year since David Treadwell in 1987-88.

Stephane Anthony, Xavier Brewer, Jaron Brown, Dalton Freeman, Rashard Hall, and Dawson Zimmerman were other 2011 starters named to the academic honor roll. Zimmerman, who received the Weaver-James-Corrigan Award, had a 4.0 GPA and was inducted into the Phi Beta Kappa Honor Society.

The women's swimming program had a 3.62 GPA for the spring semester, a team best and the second best on record for any Clemson athletic team. Twenty-four team members had at least a 3.0 GPA, including 17 on the Dean's List. Two (Kerry McLaughlin, Maddie Tarantolo) were inducted into the Phi Beta Kappa Honor Society.

The men's golf team had a 3.23 GPA, its highest on record. The Tigers had eight members on the academic honor roll, the most since the spring of 2003. Other athletic programs that posted a 3.0 GPA or better during the spring semester were rowing, men's soccer, women's soccer, men's tennis, and women's track & field.

Sixty-one student-athletes graduated from Clemson in May of 2012, including 12

members of Clemson's 2011 ACC Championship football team. Eighteen of the 20 seniors on that team already have their degrees.

APR Scores

All 19 of Clemson's programs scored above the 925 APR threshold and 16 were above 970 according to data released by the NCAA.

The men's golf team had the highest among the 19 programs with a perfect 1,000 score, the sixth time in the last eight years the program has had a perfect score under Head Coach Larry Penley.

The football team had a 983 APR score, the seventh-best score in the nation among FBS schools. It was the second-best mark in the nation among schools who finished the 2011 season in the AP poll. Only Boise State was better among the ranked schools with a 989 mark.

The NCAA released data that was coach-specific for the four-year period. Dabo Swinney had a 991 score, fifth best in the nation among active coaches and far above the national average of 948. It was also best in the ACC.

Clemson's women's soccer (992), volleyball (989), men's tennis (988), women's cross country (985), and baseball (980) teams also scored at 980 or better.

Athletic Commitment

Clemson won three ACC Championships in the 2011-12 academic year, one in football and two in women's track & field.

The football team broke a 20-year drought with its conference championship after defeating #3 Virginia Tech in the ACC Championship Game. The team finished ranked in the top 25 and had a school-record four wins over top-25 teams.

The women's track & field program swept the ACC indoor and outdoor championships for the third straight year, giving the program six consecutive team titles.

Six programs finished the 2011-12 season with a top-25 ranking. The high-

est ranked team to end the season was women's track & field, which finished in a tie for fourth at the NCAA Outdoor Championships. The other sports that finished their respective seasons in the top 25 were football, men's golf, rowing, women's tennis, and women's indoor track & field.

Three Clemson student-athletes, Seth Broster (swimming), Alyssa Kulik (track), and Kim Ruck (track), were recipients of NCAA postgraduate scholarships. The Tiger athletic program had never previously had three award winners in the same academic year.

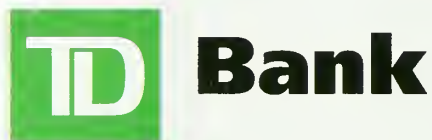

Are You a Booster?

The NCAA definition of a "representative of athletics interest" generally encompasses most individuals who regularly attend Clemson sporting events (reminder - once a representative, always a representative). Specifically, a booster or "representative of athletics interests" is any individual, independent agency, corporate entity, or other organization that is presently or has ever:

- Participated in promoting the institution's athletic program (such as buying season tickets to sporting events).
- Assisted in providing benefits (such as summer employment) to enrolled student-athletes.
- Assisted or been requested by the department of athletics staff to assist in the recruitment of prospective student-athletes.
- Attended Clemson University.
- Contributed to the department of athletics or IPTAY.
- Participated in or been a member of IPTAY.
- Been otherwise involved in the Clemson University athletics program.

Ask Before You Act

Prospective student-athletes may...

- Identify outstanding potential student-athletes in your area and forward information, such as newspaper articles, to the coach of that sport at Clemson.
- Continue to establish friendships with friends and neighbors, even those with prospect-aged children. However, contact with those individuals for recruiting purposes is still prohibited.
- Attend, on your own initiative, events such as games and banquets where prospective student-athletes are present as long as you do not contact the prospect(s) or their family for recruiting purposes.
- Answer a call from a prospective student-athlete (you may not initiate the call) regarding only Clemson University in general, but not about Tiger athletics. Please promptly inform compliance services or the coach should this situation arise.
- Make donations to a high school if it is located in your community, the donation is not made at the request of Clemson or Clemson coaches, and the funds are distributed through established channels and not directed towards a specific student-athlete.

Current student-athletes may...

- Continue to come out and support student-athletes at Clemson athletic events.
- Provide summer employment to student-athletes, but only if you contact Clemson's office of compliance services (compliance-L@clemson.edu) first and the student-athlete is compensated for work actually performed at a rate commensurate with the going rate in the locality for similar services.

What Every Booster Should Know

- **Extra Benefit** - Any special arrangement by a Clemson employee, booster (IPTAY member), or alum to provide a prospective or enrolled student-athlete or their families/friends with a benefit not permitted by NCAA legislation. Examples of prohibited

- Arranging employment for family and friends of the student-athlete.
- Free or reduced housing agreements.
- Gifts of money, awards, food/drinks, or other tangible items.
- Loans of money or automobiles.
- Professional services without charge or at a discount.
- Promises of employment or loans following college graduation.
- Providing transportation for the student-athlete or their friends and family.
- Use of ATM, credit, or other types of gift cards.

- **Institutional Control** - A central principle of the NCAA by-laws. Institutional control requires that Clemson University conducts its intercollegiate athletics program in compliance with NCAA rules and regulations. This includes booster activities.

- **Prospective Student-Athlete** - A student, regardless of their athletic ability, who has started classes for the ninth grade or any student enrolled at another two or four-year institution.

- **Recruiting** - Any solicitation of a prospect or a prospect's family by Clemson's coaches or representatives of athletic interest for the purposes of securing the prospective student-athlete's ultimate enrollment and participation in athletics at Clemson. Only designated Clemson athletics department staff members may recruit.

- **Student-Athlete** - A student whose enrollment was solicited by a Clemson athletic department staff member or other representative of athletics interest with a goal of the student's ultimate participation in Clemson's athletics program. Student-athletes are not just those who were recruited or receive athletic scholarships, they are also those who participate in intercollegiate athletics.

Activities That Will Harm Prospective Student-Athletes You may not...

- Contact (including phone calls, texts, email) or interact with a prospective student-athlete or family members for the purpose of persuading them to attend Clemson.

- Contact coaches, teachers, guidance counselors, or other school administrators in order to gain information on prospective student-athletes.
- Make contact with a prospective student-athlete or the prospect's family during official or unofficial visits.
- Provide any other extra benefits to a prospective student-athlete, family, friends, or their coaches.
- Provide prospective student-athletes or their family and friends with transportation or financial assistance.

Activities That Will Harm Current Student-Athletes You may not...

- Generally provide benefits that are not available to other members of the Clemson student body.
- Provide extra benefits to student-athletes or their family and friends. Examples of prohibited benefits include (but not limited to):
 - Gifts of money, awards, food/drinks, occasional meals, or other tangible items.
 - Free or reduced housing agreements.
 - Loans of money or automobiles.
 - Providing transportation for the student-athlete or their family and friends.
 - Professional services without charge or at a discount.
 - Promises of employment or loans following college graduation.
- Sending student-athletes items to be autographed and returned or using autographed items to raise funds for high schools.
- Use of ATM, credit, or other types of gift cards.
- Use the name/image of a current student-athlete to advertise, recommend, or promote products/services.

Consequences

Violations of these NCAA, ACC, and University policies can result in severe penalties, including:

- **Disassociation** - Clemson University may permanently disassociate itself with an athletic booster. You could lose the privilege of purchasing season tickets, the privilege of being an IPTAY member, or any other Clemson athletic-related benefit deemed appropriate.
- **Harm to the Enrolled Student-Athlete** - Violations can also result in the enrolled student-athlete or entire team being unable to compete for Clemson University.

Massey is a resident of Seneca, SC, where she lives with her husband, Barry, daughter, Hannah, and two dogs.

Tiger Band enjoys one of the finest band staffs in the country and unparalleled support from the athletic department and administration. In fact, Athletic Director Terry Don Phillips, President Jim Barker, and even Head Coach Dabo Swinney (pictured below) have all made it an annual tradition to speak with the band early in the season. Let's meet the 2012 Tiger Band staff.

Dr. Mark Spede is not only the director of Tiger Band, but he has the title "Director of Bands," because he oversees all aspects of the band program. He also conducts the Symphonic Band, the top auditioned band at Clemson. He is the recipient of the Clemson University 2009 Dean's Award for Excellence in Teaching (College of Architecture, Arts, & Humanities) and three Clemson University Board of Trustees Awards for Faculty Excellence (2008,09,12).

Spede has served the College Band Directors National Association (CBDNA) in a number of capacities, currently as president of the Southern division, encompassing 11 states. Spede previously served on the faculties at Texas and Florida as assistant director of bands. At Florida, he also taught percussion.

Spede earned a bachelor of music degree from Michigan, a master of music from Ball State, and a doctor of musical arts from Texas. He also arranges most of the music that Tiger Band plays.

Timothy Hurlburt is Assistant Director of Bands at Clemson, where his duties include Assistant Director of Tiger Band, Director of the Jazz Ensemble, Director of the Basketball Pep Band, and Conductor of the Concert Band. Before arriving at Clemson in 2008, Hurlburt spent three years teaching music in Port Huron, MI.

Hurlburt works as a clinician for both concert bands and marching bands at every educational level, from middle school to college. He has written several arrangements for athletic bands and concert bands in Michigan, Texas, and South Carolina, and he continues to write arrangements and marching band drill for high school and college marching bands across the country.

Hurlburt earned his bachelor of arts degree in music education from Michigan State in 2003 and his master of music degree in conducting from Texas State in 2008. He also writes all of the drill (visual formations) for Tiger Band.

Dr. Paul Buyer is Director of Percussion, Director of Music, and Professor of Music at Clemson, and he oversees the drumline for Tiger Band. He is the author of *Working Toward Excellence: Eight Values for Achiev-*

ing Uncommon Success in Work & Life, published by Morgan James Publishing (2012), and *Marching Bonds & Drumlines: Secrets of Success from the Best of the Best*, published by Meredith Music Publications (2009).

Buyer is a contributing author to the second edition of *Teaching Percussion*, by Gary Cook, and his articles have appeared in **American Music Teacher**, **Teaching Music**, and **Percussive Notes**. He earned his doctor of musical arts and master of music degrees from Arizona and his bachelor of science degree from Ball State.

Lance Curry is the Drumline Instructor for Tiger Band. He received a degree in secondary education - mathematics from Clemson and a master's degree in instructional technology from Georgia. Since graduating from Clemson, he has been teaching mathematics at Easley (SC) High School for the last seven years. While at Clemson, Curry was a member of the Clemson University Concert Band, Symphonic Band, Percussion Ensemble, Steel Band, and Tiger Band.

Terry Kent, a graduate of Furman, is the Color Guard Instructor (flags, rifles, sabers) for Tiger Band and has been the band director at Hillcrest (SC) Middle School for over 20 years. Kent has worked for Marching Auxiliaries for 25 years as summer camp staff, traveling and teaching weekly camps for rifles, flags, majorettes, drum majors, and dancers. There, he has served as an instructor, division head, and clinic director. Currently, he trains new staff and choreographs some of the routines that are taught at summer camps all across the country.

Patrick Mainieri has served as the Marching and Visual Instructor for Tiger Band since 2010. When not working with Tiger Band, Mainieri serves as Director of Bands at Gettys Middle School in Easley. The Gettys Middle School Band currently serves 275 students participating in three

concert bands, a festival band, jazz band, pep band, and leadership team.

The Gettys Middle School band program has received the South Carolina Band Director's Association (SCBDA) Outstanding Performance Award each year since his arrival. Mainieri received his bachelor of music degree in music education from Furman in 2006 and his master of arts degree in school administration with a concentration in secondary school leadership from Furman in 2012.

Hazel Cartee has been the instructor for the Tiger Band Twirlers for 19 seasons. She is co-owner of the Upstate Dance Studio. She has taught baton twirling and dance to thousands of girls over the past 30 years. Many have gone on to perform at major universities across the country and have won national awards. Cartee earned her degree in early childhood & elementary education from Anderson (SC).

Amy Demers-Lee is the instructor for the Tiger Dancers. She was a majorette at Georgia and won the USA and National College Halftime Show Team Championship, the National Collegiate Majorette

THOMAS BRITTLE

THERE'S NOTHING BRITTLE ABOUT THE FIFTH-YEAR SENIOR, WHO BURST ONTO THE SCENE AS ONE OF THE TEAM'S TOP OFFENSIVE & DEFENSIVE PLAYERS IN 2012.

In sports, it is often said that "speed kills, but strength punishes." That may be the case, but fifth-year senior outfielder Thomas Brittle has done his best to punish Tiger opponents with his speed.

The Cross, SC native transferred to Clemson after two seasons at College of Charleston, where he amassed just 77 at-bats in 76 games (15 starts). He also accumulated 31 runs and 16 stolen bases.

"After my sophomore year at College of Charleston, I wasn't comfortable where I was, so I decided to transfer," explained Brittle. "At the end of the year, I was looking at Clemson and Coastal Carolina to choose between. I played summer ball and was in contact with both schools' coaches.

"As the summer went on, I realized that I didn't want to go to Coastal Carolina. I felt like even if baseball didn't work out, Clemson was the place for me to go. I applied and was accepted."

After talking with the Clemson coaches, Brittle secured a tryout and participated with the team in the fall.

"I got to play a little in the fall, but broke my hand," he recalled. "Coach (Jack) Leggett told me, though, that he saw enough from me in the fall to keep me around, so everything worked out."

Brittle was forced to sit out the 2011 season due to NCAA transfer rules. Then in 2012, Brittle had a breakout season, starting 56 games of the team's 63 games in centerfield.

He finished the year with a .298 batting average, second-highest on the team, and had a 22-game hitting streak that tied for the eighth-longest streak in Clemson history.

In addition, his speed was evident throughout the 2012 season, as he totaled eight triples and 15 stolen bases, both team bests and career highs for the 5'8" speedster.

His eight triples tied for fifth-most in a season in school history and were the most by a Tiger since 1995. The triple total tied for the ACC lead and tied for 10th in the nation as well.

"I exceeded my own expectations last year," admitted Brittle, who was a Second-

Team All-ACC selection and an All-ACC Academic team member. "I think a lot of it had to do with the hitters around me with Richie (Shaffer) and Steve (Wilkerson).

"I was in a good spot between them so that opposing pitchers didn't want to put extra people on base for Richie to come up if Steve got on. If no one was on base, they didn't want to give me a 'free pass,' so I got a lot of good pitches to hit. I was lucky enough to find some holes in big situations and had a good run in the middle of the year."

The lefty even got the opportunity to face his former team on May 5 and delivered in a big way. With the Tigers trailing 3-2 in the 11th inning, Brittle stepped to the plate with two outs and Brad Felder on third base. He lined a single to left field to tie the score and extend his hitting streak to 19 games at the time.

"That is my favorite moment," said Brittle, who had earlier hit walkoff singles to beat both #17 N.C. State and Charleston Southern over a five-day span in April. "After I got the hit to tie the score, we won on the next pitch.

"I had a little chip on my shoulder for that game, because I wanted to show-out and I ended up getting a big hit."

Despite his success and a 22-game hitting streak, Brittle looks to improve his consistency at the plate in 2013.

"The biggest thing that I was disappointed with last year was my consistency at the plate," said #4. "I started the year really hot and then cooled off.

"I'm trying to be more consistent so I'm not as much of an up-and-down hitter as I was last year. That way, the coaches will know more of what to expect game-in and game-out from me at the plate."

Brittle exhibited his value to the team in the field as well. He made many diving catches to save hits and runs, and he also had a team-high nine outfield assists.

Brittle will be one of just four returning starters in the field for the Tigers in 2013. However, he is hopeful of another trip to Omaha for the Clemson program.

"I think this year we have a good mix of old guys and new guys. We should be able to gel and can hopefully get to Omaha and go out on a good note."

They say that blood is thicker than water. However, for Clemson senior rower Heather Cummings, blood, or in this case family, and water are quite intertwined.

The Virginia Beach, VA native came to Clemson in 2010, following in the footsteps of her older sister, Brittany, who was an All-America rower at Clemson from 2007-10.

Although the two were extremely competitive and each participated in several sports in high school, Brittany encouraged her younger sister to add rowing to her endeavors.

"I played basketball, soccer, and volleyball, so I had always played a lot of sports, and my sister rowed all four years in high school," said Heather.

"You should try rowing," said the elder Cummings to her younger sister. "So I tried it and realized it was something I really loved."

Keeping with family tradition, the younger Cummings followed in her older sister's footsteps to Clemson. As a Tiger, Cummings has left her mark on the rowing program the past three years.

In her sophomore campaign, Cummings rowed the three-seat for the first Varsity 8 that finished second at the ACC Championships and was named ACC Crew-of-the-Year. Cummings was also named second-team All-South Region and was an All-ACC Academic team member.

Her most noteworthy accomplishment, however, was captured during her junior season. The health science major was named All-ACC Academic, first-team All-South Region, and an All-ACC selection.

Cummings was also a CRCA Second-Team All-American. With this recognition, Cummings and her sister, Brittany, became the first pair of sisters at Clemson to be named rowing All-Americans.

"I had no clue that we were the only sister-pair to be named All-Americans," admitted Cummings. "It was one of my goals to be as good as her. When the coach came to me and told me, I burst into tears and started calling her."

In preparation for her final season as a Tiger, Cummings trained with a different family...her teammates.

"We were in and out of the boathouse all summer long, training and getting ready for the spring season. We have worked really hard this fall.

"As a team, we have gotten so much better than we have been in the past year. Everyone is making dramatic increases in their performance."

Even though family is what brought her to Clemson, she found a larger family when she arrived in Tigertown.

"The Clemson Family is like none other," she said. "When people come to this school, they're amazed at the support and how close people are. The girls on the team are actually like my family.

"If I have a problem, I go to them. You work out together, you have ups and downs together, and you know people are there for you, no matter what. They have your back."

As Cummings looks toward her senior season, she accomplished almost everything that

her sister, Brittany, was able to accomplish at Clemson with one exception...an ACC Championship.

Brittany won an ACC Individual Boat title as a member of the Varsity 8+ in 2009. Heather will look to join her sister as an ACC Rowing Champion in 2013.

Cummings is focused on continuing to improve and has high hopes for this team.

"This season, personally, I want to break seven (minutes) on my 'erg.' Last year, I was 7:00.3, so I want to beat that in my 2K test.

"As a team, we want to make it to the NCAAs and be one of the top-10 teams."

Despite all of her success on the water, she has aspirations away from rowing once her Tiger career has come to an end.

"After graduation, I plan to go to graduate school and get my degree in surgical technology, and then pursue a job as a surgical assistant."

No matter what Cummings does after her career at Clemson has ended, she will be remembered, along with her sister, for all her accolades and accomplishments in the boat. With any luck, she will be able to add to that list of accomplishments in 2013 in her final season as a Tiger.

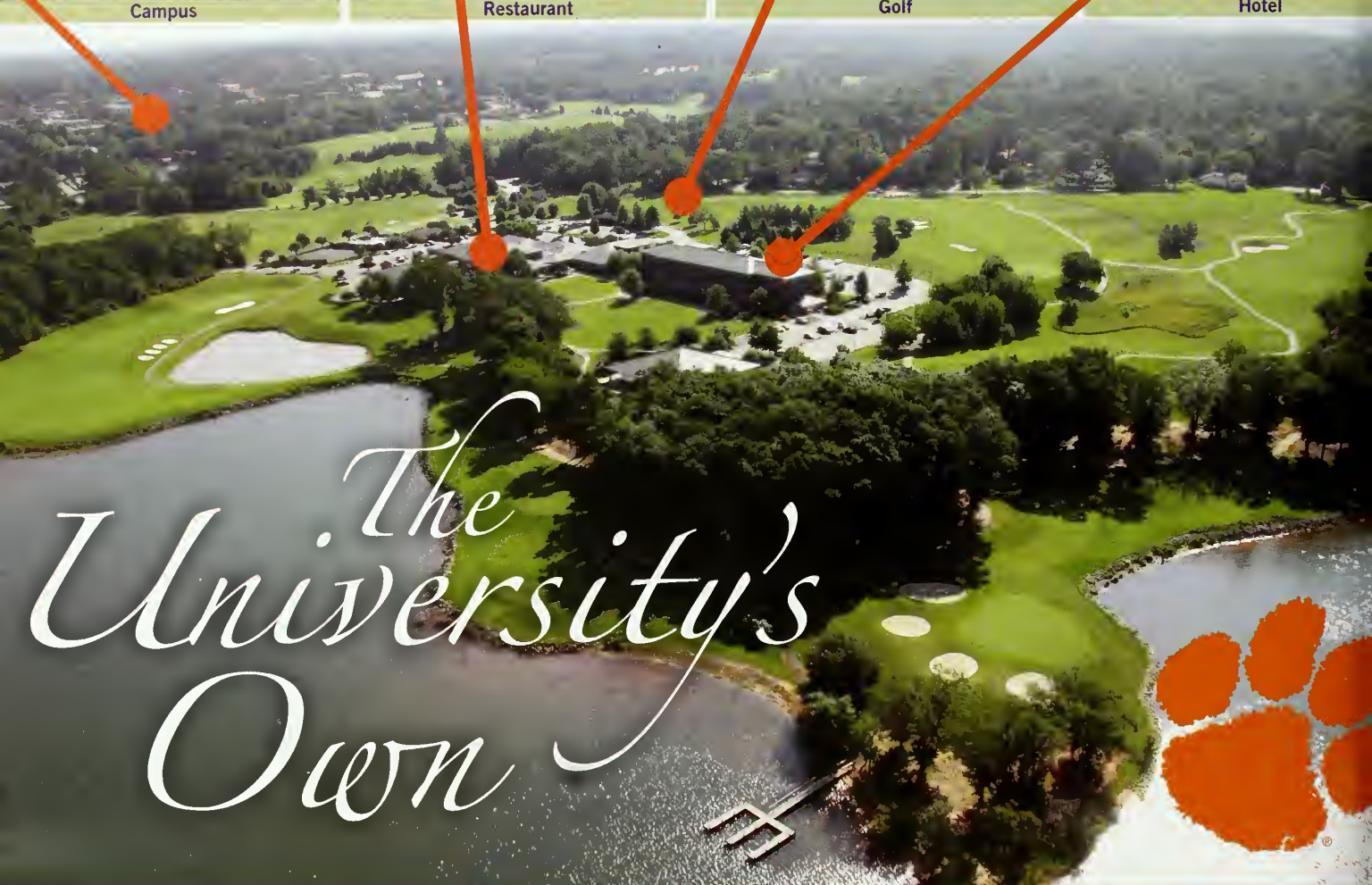

70 YEARS OF Memories

CLEMSON CELEBRATED 70 YEARS IN MEMORIAL STADIUM ON SEPTEMBER 19, 2012. THIS IS A GOOD TIME TO REVIEW SOME OF THE TOP GAMES, PERFORMANCES, AND PLAYS IN THOSE 70 SEASONS. TODAY IS THE LAST INSTALLMENT IN THE SERIES.

GREATEST SENIOR DAY PERFORMANCES IN MEMORIAL STADIUM HISTORY

TERRY SMITH Virginia, 1993

While he only had two receptions on his Senior Day in 1993, it was a memorable game for the late Terry Smith against Virginia. On this day, he became Clemson's career leader in receiving yards, and he did so on a 73-yard touchdown reception that was the key play of the game in Clemson's 23-14 victory.

It was a huge play for Smith, as he went past all-time great Perry Tuttle, who was on hand for the game and congratulated him in the locker room after the game. It was also a huge play for the Tigers, who upset the #18 Cavaliers, a key victory on the way to a final top-25 ranking for the Tigers.

Smith finished his career with 2,681 receiving yards, fifth-most in school history. It is a bit ironic that we talk about this game just a week after his nephew, DeAndre Hopkins, became Clemson's leader in this receiving category.

FRED CONE Furman, 1950

Fred Cone closed out his Ring of Honor career in a 57-2 win over Furman. Head Coach Frank Howard's favorite player of all-time gained 145 yards on 19 carries, caught a 39-yard pass to set up a score, scored two touchdowns, and even kicked an extra point.

It was an easy but an important win for the Tigers, who improved to 7-0-1. Clemson moved to #11 in the AP poll with the victory and kept its hopes alive for an unbeaten season and an Orange Bowl bid.

A 41-0 win at Auburn the following week clinched the Orange Bowl bid, a top-10 national finish, and a second undefeated season in three years with Cone running the ball.

BRANDON STREETER Duke, 1999

With all the recent strong passing performances by Tiger quarterbacks, it might surprise you that the top Senior Day performance by a Tiger senior in terms of passing yards still belongs to Brandon Streeter.

The 1999 season was a difficult one in terms of health for Streeter, as he suffered

multiple injuries during the course of the season. He had taken the Tigers to victory in relief during the previous week at Wake Forest, a game he was not supposed to be able to play, and was back on the field for the Duke game in his final home appearance.

That day, he conducted Head Coach Tommy Bowden's offense with precise passes over the middle and completed 22-30 passes for 279 yards and two touchdowns. His final touchdown pass in Death Valley was an 18-yard strike to Brian Wofford, his close friend and classmate who was tragically killed in an auto accident this past summer.

WOODROW DANTZLER Duke, 2001

Woodrow Dantzler became the first player in Division I history to rush for 1,000 yards and pass for 2,000 yards in one season on his Senior Day against Duke in 2001. This was not supposed to be his Senior Day game, but the events of 9/11 postponed the game with Duke on September 15 and moved it to the end of the season on December 1.

Dantzler finished this game with 135 rushing yards and 243 passing yards in just three quarters of play, a typical performance for Dantzler during his last two seasons.

He went over the 1,000-yard rushing mark with an 18-yard jaunt with just under six minutes left in the third quarter, much to the delight of the crowd who was well aware of the accomplishment. Overall, Dantzler set eight Tiger records on this day in which he accounted for five touchdowns (four passing, one rushing) in this 59-31 Clemson victory.

CHARLIE WHITEHURST Florida State, 2005

Charlie Whitehurst, #2 on the Clemson career list for wins by a starting quarterback, had a memorable final day in Memorial Stadium, as he led the Tigers to a 35-14 victory over #17 Florida State, a team that would go on to win the ACC Championship.

Whitehurst completed 21-32 passes for 269 yards and three touchdowns, including two in the third quarter when Clemson went on a 21-0 run. His favorite target was

junior Chansi Stuckey, who had 11 receptions for 156 yards and two touchdowns.

Whitehurst would go on to lead Clemson to wins over South Carolina, his fourth as a starting quarterback, and Colorado in the Champs Sports Bowl to finish with 25 career victories.

RODNEY WILLIAMS
South Carolina, 1988

Rodney Williams' 31st career victory as Clemson's starting quarterback might have been his most satisfying, as the Tigers defeated rival South Carolina for the first time since 1985 with a 29-10 victory.

Williams completed 13-26 passes for 192 yards and also gained 38 yards on five carries. He scored Clemson's final touchdown in the fourth quarter to put the game out of reach. His 192 passing yards and 230 yards of total offense were season highs for Williams, who remains Clemson's career leader in victories by a starting quarterback with 32.

Williams, a native of Columbia, had been heckled by Gamecock fans the previous year in South Carolina's 20-7 victory at Williams-Brice Stadium. But this time when Clemson fans chanted his name, "Rodney, Rodney," it was recited in an entirely different cadence with an entirely different meaning.

WILLIE ANDERSON
South Carolina, 1974

This is not only the top performance by a Tiger defensive lineman in the history of Death Valley, it is one of the top performances by a Clemson lineman in any game.

Anderson made his Senior Day a special one with 21 tackles in Clemson's 39-21 victory over South Carolina. There have been 16 games in Clemson history, home or away, in which a Tiger has had at least 20 tackles, but this is the only 20-tackle



game by a defensive lineman. Anderson was named **Sports Illustrated** National Defensive Player-of-the-Week for his performance.

PERRY TUTTLE
Maryland, 1981

All-American Perry Tuttle had a wonderful Death Valley sendoff with 10 receptions for 151 yards in Clemson's 21-7 victory over Maryland on this chilly Saturday afternoon. He had two touchdown catches from Homer Jordan, one in the first quarter and one in the second quarter.

Tuttle's 10 receptions tied a career high, and his 151 yards were the second-most of his career. It was just the fifth game in Clemson history in which a Tiger receiver had 10 catches in a game.

The performance happened on a big stage, because the victory made Clemson 10-0 for the season and maintained the Tigers' #2 national ranking. The victory also clinched the ACC Championship.

It was a special day for Tuttle, because he also became Clemson's career reception leader, passing former teammate and mentor Jerry Butler.

KEVIN MACK
Maryland, 1983

The Tiger record for rushing yards on a Senior Day by a senior is still held by Kevin Mack. The native of Kings Mountain, NC, who played his high school football for current Clemson Associate Head Coach Dan Brooks, had 186 yards on 30 carries and three scores in the Tigers' 52-27 win.

Mack scored on runs of six yards and one yard in the first half when Clemson took a 28-7 lead. He scored his third touchdown in dramatic fashion in the fourth quarter. On his final carry in Memorial Stadium, he sprinted 42 yards for a touchdown with only one shoe. During the run, he lost a shoe, but it never slowed him down.

The Tigers finished with 350 yards on 68 carries, so Mack had more than half the team's real estate.

WILLIE UNDERWOOD
South Carolina, 1980

1

This might be the most important individual performance in Clemson history. The Tigers had a 5-5 record entering the final game of the 1980 season and were coming off a 34-7 loss at Maryland, the worst setback of Danny Ford's 11-year head-coaching career at Clemson.

Led by eventual Heisman Trophy winner George Rogers, South Carolina was 8-2, including a win at Michigan, and was ranked #14 in the nation.

Underwood was playing in his 47th career game for the Tigers, and the starting defensive back had never hauled in an interception. However, Underwood saved the best for his Senior Day, as he had two interceptions for 101 yards, still one of only two 100-yard interception return games by a Tiger in history.

Underwood had a 64-yard return that set up Clemson's first touchdown, then returned his other interception 37 yards to paydirt in the fourth quarter to clinch Clemson's 27-6 victory. Underwood also added 17 tackles from his safety position and was named **Sports Illustrated** National Defensive Player-of-the-Week.

The victory propelled Clemson to the 1981 National Championship the following season. Underwood was not on that squad, but many Tiger fans give him a lot of credit for jumpstarting that 1981 season. I bet he still gets a Christmas card from Ford.

INDOOR PRACTICE FACILITY

Keeping Tiger Football Atop Its Game

**OPENING IN
DECEMBER!**





When fans envision an indoor practice facility like the one that is currently being completed for the Clemson football team, certain stereotypes come to mind. Common perceptions are largely simplistic in nature, and the idea that a facility that is solely for game preparation, out of the gaze of on-lookers, carries a large amount of importance seems crazy.

But the facility was never about football alone. In fact, as the \$10 million structure sees its construction enter the latter phases, its design will serve to unify the athletic department, while providing Tiger football with a cutting-edge structure that helps complete a nationally-relevant program.

On its face, the facility does exactly what it purports to do...provide a place for Head Coach Dabo Swinney to take his football team in case of inclement weather without disrupting a schedule of events that is packed full on a daily basis. It equips the Tigers with a lavish place to prepare for opponents in a game-like atmosphere, as early as December, when the team will be getting ready for a bowl game.

"This will make a huge impact," explained Swinney. "We will never miss a day again. This will be great for our offseason program and our recruiting. It's another step toward being and providing the absolute best for our players."

The building houses an 80,000-square-foot practice area that includes a full foot-

ball field. The field is surrounded by ample sideline space to provide a comfortable environment. In order to simulate a game-day experience, there is a fully-functional, game-ready scoreboard inside the facility along with four play-clocks and a video-board equal to the size of the new video-boards in the Northwest and Southwest corners of Memorial Stadium that will rest above the west endzone.

High above the fields, on the second story of the nearly 70' structure, is a long coaches platform so that practice can be viewed from above. In addition, by way of a short corridor, the platform extends to the back side of the building, so that any drills taking place outside on the other two practice fields can be properly seen from inside the building.

The facility has some amenities that make it an attractive piece of the Tiger football program's recruiting strategy. Visitors are greeted by a formal entry to the building that includes a guest area. This portion of the facility will be used to entertain recruits, their families, and any visitors. There is also an overlook onto the indoor practice field above the guest area on the second floor.

According to Robert Ricketts, associate athletic director for facilities & grounds, the aspects of the new indoor practice structure that seem like extra add-ons are actually essential to constructing a complex that is competitive with Clemson's peer institutions and football programs.

"We have some bells and whistles in this particular venue that should put us ahead of the curve initially," said Ricketts. "I'm sure others will see what we've done and try to do similar things in the future."

Ricketts commented that one of the goals of facility upgrades is to supplement existing structures and provide a sense of unity across the different sports in the athletic department, as well as the variety of wings across the university. He said the surroundings of the football practice area were heavily weighed into discussions, related to the layout and dimensions of the indoor facility.

"If you look in our immediate area, we have an extremely large building...the indoor track," said Ricketts. "It was important not that we mirror (the indoor track), but that they had some similarities in design."

Unity and efficiency were both driving forces behind some of the usages of additional space within the new indoor football practice facility. Since the men's and women's soccer teams practice on fields adjacent to the football team, there are several rooms within the building that will be available to other athletic teams to use.

The indoor facility, which includes more than 5,000 square feet of support, will contain a small strength & conditioning area and a training room. The plan is for men's and women's soccer to use these spaces, along with the football team. In addition, planners included space for both Tiger soccer programs to store equipment alongside football. This will give this segment of the Clemson athletic complex a centralized location for equipment and training.

"From a student-athlete-safety standpoint, having a training room right next to the practice fields in a contact sport is a positive move," said Ricketts. "Also, having some facilities that will serve the men's and women's soccer programs is a real boost."

Today, the facility is almost complete. In fact, many of the finishing touches will come after the conclusion of today's game, when the threat of football parking and consistent foot traffic subsides. Among these yet-to-be-completed items are plans to add a walkway leading up to the front of the building, one of the final pieces to a puzzle that has been in the university's plans for several years.

"There will be some items that we'll deal with considerably after the season, like landscaping," said Ricketts. "We want to make sure we have all the traffic out of here before we put the finishing touches on the pathway to the building."

Much like the massive video-board and the training table, the indoor practice facility has become key in the arms race of major college football. Ricketts said there is now somewhat of a checklist of things a program needs to fulfill its maximum potential, and an indoor facility is squarely on the list.

The idea that upgrades for men's and women's soccer and men's and women's track & field accompanied this particular enhancement made a project that seems too simple to the average fan into a complex structure capable of assisting in the day-to-day operations of several of Clemson's athletic programs.

For example, the synthetic turf installed in the Indoor track for the football program a few years ago will remain and will continue to be an asset to the track & field program. Furthermore, the track & field program will no longer have to share its facility with the football program.

As far as the football program is concerned, the Tigers have performed at a high level this season. The effort and achievement of the 2012 team embody the look of the program to outsiders, as facility upgrades centered in the WestZone and continued through the indoor practice facility give the program a first-class façade to present to fans, alumni, and prospective Tigers.

As construction closes on the new practice facility, a new wave of opportunity has opened to display the pride and passion of Clemson football to the world in a unique way that those associated with the program can be proud to call their own.

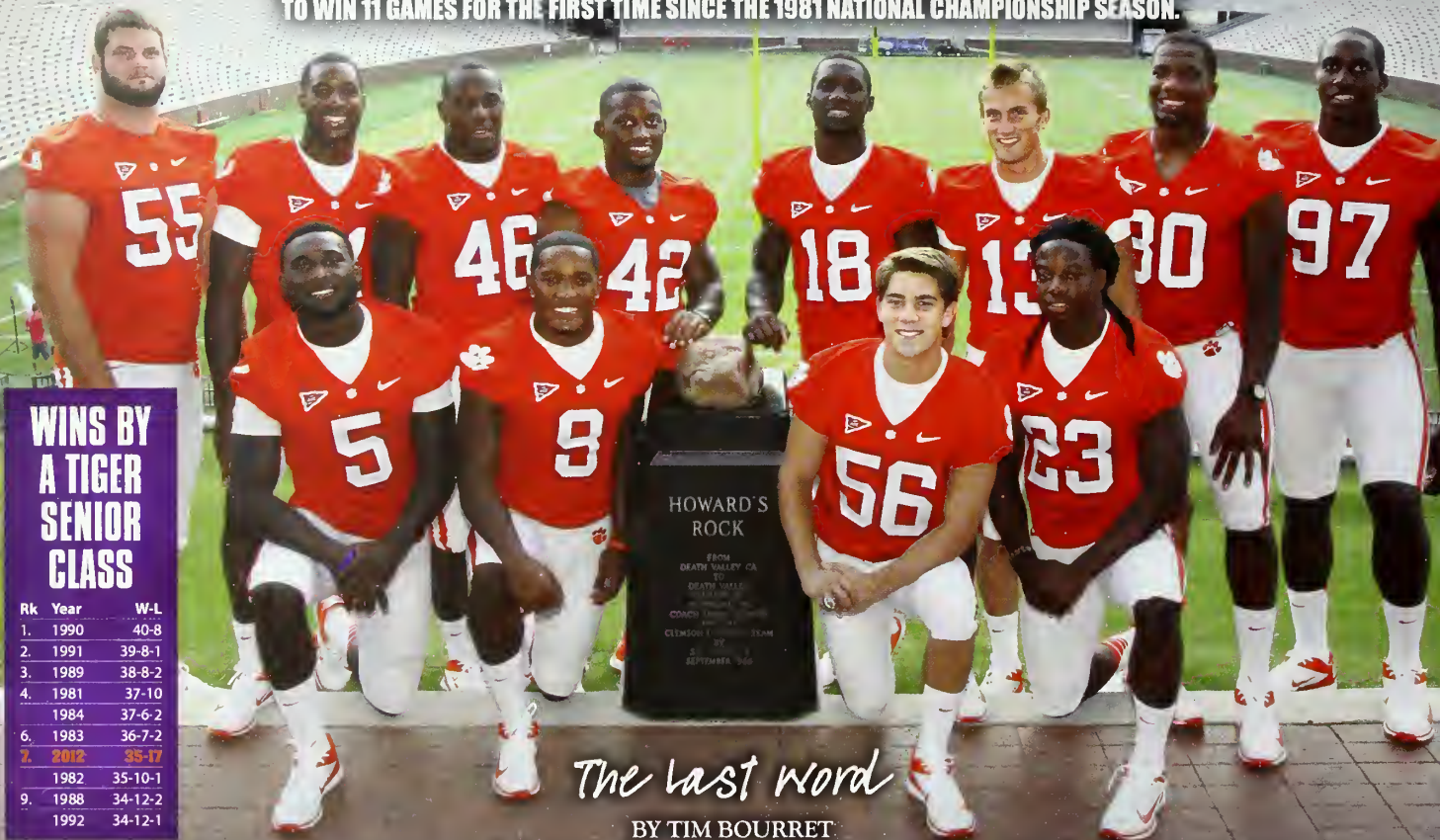

The #35 is special today on this Senior Day...at least for me personally and for the dozen of Clemson seniors who will suit up for the last time in this cathedral of college football.

It is my 35th Senior Day, as I saw my first one in 1978 when Ring of Honor legends Steve Fuller and Jerry Butler as well as future NFL stars Joe Bostic and Dwight Clark played in Memorial Stadium for the last time. Clemson completed a 10-1 regu-

lar season with a 41-23 victory over South Carolina that November 25 afternoon.

For the current Clemson senior class, the #35 is also significant, as it has 35 wins over the last four years. This senior class will also attempt to duplicate the accomplishments of that 1978 senior group by closing a regular season with just one loss by defeating the same longtime rival.

Unlike that 1978 senior class, this group is small in numbers. There are just 12 seniors in the class, the smallest Clemson senior class since 1985. However, many have significant accomplishments.

Dalton Freeman has played more snaps than any other Tiger and has been a Rimington Trophy finalist. Andre Ellington is fourth in Tiger history in rushing, while Rashard Hall is third in school history in takeaways. Jonathan Meeks is fifth in interception return yards as well.

Every one of the 12 seniors has been a big contributor to Clemson's 10-1 record and a top-10 national ranking entering tonight's game. How often do you see such a young team (only 25 juniors and seniors) have such an outstanding season?

The 10 victories, all but one achieved by at least two touchdowns, are the product of excellent coaching, but also the result of outstanding leadership on the part of this year's seniors.

This small group grew with Head Coach Dabo Swinney, who was in his first full season (2008) guiding the program

when many of the current seniors were red-shirting. They have changed the program's image with its own fans and with fans nationally, giving this program an intangible benefit that could last for a long time.

"When I became the head coach on a full-time basis, I told the team in our first meeting that we needed to change the culture," said Swinney. "We needed to gain in confidence, creating a culture whereby we expect to win. We needed to start that process by being a dominant team at home."

Entering today's game, the Tigers have won 13 straight home games, the most consecutive home wins on "any patch of grass" on campus. Overall, this senior class has a record of 24-3 at home, the best four-year run since the seniors of 1991.

In ACC play, this class is 23-9 in the regular season, won the ACC Atlantic Division title three of four years, and captured the 2011 ACC Championship. The 23-win total is a school record as well.

Swinney also stated that the program needed to become more consistent. There are many examples of consistency throughout the careers of today's seniors. Clemson is on a run of 26 straight polls in

which it has been ranked in the top 25 in the nation, something only seven other programs nationally can say. It is also the third-longest streak in school history.

A more simple example of consistency is the wins and losses. This is the first time since the 1987-90 era that Clemson has had back-to-back seasons with at least 10 wins. This is also the first time since 1990 that Clemson has won at least nine games in an even-numbered season. That may sound like a strange stat, but it shows how the program is on the rise.

Years from now, we may look back on the 12 players from the 2012 senior class as one of the most significant classes in Clemson history. In fact, they may be up there with that senior class 35 years ago.

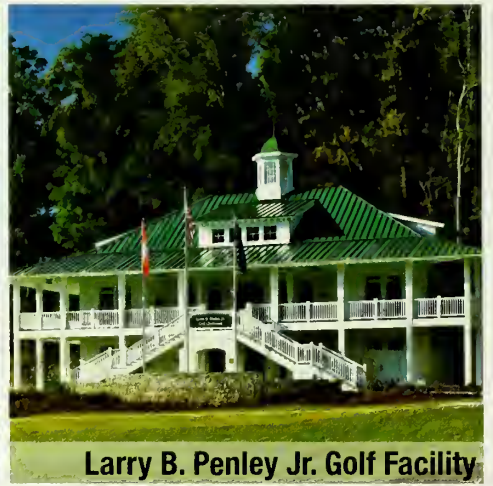
