CLEMSON FACES THE TERRIERS FOR THE FIRST TIME IN 10 YEARS

Tigers vs. Terriers Series Recap

Clemson holds a 10-3 advantage in the series with Wofford. That includes a 38-14 win over the Terriers on September 8, 2001, three days before the 9/11 attacks. Today on Military Appreciation Day, the two schools will play the day before the 10-year anniversary of that tragic event.

Wofford's last win in the series took place in 1933, a 14-13 win in Spartanburg. Wofford also won consecutive games by shutout in 1925 and 1926.

The two teams first met in 1896, the first year of Clemson football. The Tigers won that game 16-0 in Spartanburg in what was just the third game in school history. Clemson won the second meeting 21-0 in 1900 in the second game of John Heisman's coaching career at Clemson.

The Tigers also shut out Wofford 26-0 in 1940 in the second game of the head coaching career of Frank Howard. When the teams met in 2001, it was the second game of Tommy Bowden's third year. In 2011, it is the second game of Dabo Swinney's third full season.

Clemson defeated Wofford 45-10 in 1981, the season-opener of Clemson's National Championship season. Wofford led 3-0 at the end of the first quarter and finished with 293 yards of total offense, including 201 rushing yards. Only Nebraska would have more rushing yards against Clemson that year.

In the last meeting between the two teams in 2001, Woodrow Dantzler completed 21-30 passes for 207 yards and two touchdowns. J.J. McKelvey caught eight passes for 73 yards and two scores, as Clemson held a 24-14 lead at halftime. Dantzler added 55 yards on 13 carries.

Chad Carson led the defense with 18 tackles and Bryant McNeal had four tackles for loss, including two sacks. Eric Meekins had a 29-yard fumble return to give Clemson the lead for good in the second quarter.

A Closer Look at Wofford

Defending Southern Conference Champion Wofford enters today's game with a 1-0 record after a 35-28 victory over Presbyterian College. Last year, the Terriers were 10-3 and reached the quarterfinals of the FCS playoffs.

Jeff Ashley had two touchdown receptions and Eric Breitenstein added 107 rushing yards and a touchdown on 19 carries. It was the 11th-career 100-yard rushing game for Breitenstein, who is the preseason SoCon Player-of-the-Year. Mitch Allen was 7-14 passing for 138 yards and added 31 rushing yards and a touchdown.

Wofford had 534 yards of total offense, including 352 rushing, in another potent performance. That was not a surprise, because the Terriers led the FCS in rushing last year with nearly 300 yards per game. Alvin Scioneaux led the team with 10 tackles, including two sacks.

Mike Ayers, the winningest coach in school history, is in his 24th year at the helm and has a 155-107-1 record. He is in his 27th year as a college head coach and has a 165-128-2 record that includes three years as East Tennessee's head coach.

Second is Best

Clemson had a strong second half in all phases of the game in its 43-19 victory over Troy last Saturday. The Tigers trailed the Trojans 16-13 at halftime, but the second half was a different story. The Tigers were improved in all phases of the game. The Clemson defense did not give up a touchdown and allowed just three points in the final 30 minutes.

The offense also made a great improvement. The Tigers scored 30 points and gained 347 yards in the second half. Clemson completed 15-19 passes for 206 yards and two scores. The Tigers averaged 8.9 yards per play, including a 7.1-yard rushing average in the second half.

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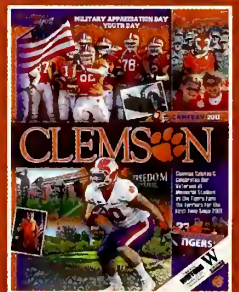

Military Appreciation Day, as presented by the United States Marine Corps Officers Program, is celebrated today during the Clemson vs. Wofford game. The Clemson University Athletic Department will recognize and honor our fallen soldiers, veterans, and current military personnel serving in our armed forces during pregame and halftime ceremonies.



Veterans and current soldiers can participate in a parade to the stadium through the Clemson campus. The parade lineup is at 2:15 PM outside of Holmes and McCabe dormitories on Fort Hill Street. The parade will begin at 2:30 PM and will end at the tunnel of Littlejohn Coliseum.

Today's colors are presented by the United States Marine Corps Color Guard from Paris Island, SC. At the conclusion of the national anthem prior to kickoff, four F-16 fighter jets from the 169th Fighter Wing of the South Carolina Air National Guard located at the McEntire Joint National Guard Base in Eastover, SC will do a flyover of Memorial Stadium.

The South Carolina National Guard designed the coin used in the game coin toss. The commemorative coin honors all the soldiers killed in the wars in Afghanistan and Iraq.

All veterans and current soldiers from both schools are invited to participate in halftime ceremonies by gathering in the west endzone with five minutes remaining in the second quarter by using portals W and X.

Halftime ceremonies will feature the parade of veterans and current soldiers onto the field. The Citadel's Summerall Guard will perform a seven-minute silent drill march to honor the men of Clemson Agricultural College who performed in the Senior Platoon from 1930-60. Following the Summerall Guard's performance, Tiger Band will play the military hymns of the five service branches.

Tiger fans have the opportunity to take part by purchasing this year's Military Appreciation Day t-shirt. A portion of the proceeds from the sale of the shirt will go towards the Army and Air Force ROTC programs at Clemson University. The t-shirts are on sale for \$15.95 at ClemsonTigers.com along with local stores.



It started on the first drive when Sammy Watkins caught a 33-yard touchdown pass from Tajh Boyd on the second play of the game. Watkins scored with 14:34 left in the first quarter, meaning he scored just 26 seconds into his career. That is the earliest a freshman has scored into his career in Tiger history. The previous record took place when Terry Allen scored at the 8:53 mark of the first quarter against Western Carolina in 1987.

Watkins went on to catch seven passes for 81 yards, the most receptions and most receiving yards by a Tiger in his first game in history. Terrance Roulhac (1983) and Roscoe Crosby (2001) both had 64 receiving yards in their first game. Aaron Kelly had four catches in his first game in 2005 for the previous reception mark.

In the second half, freshman Mike Bellamy raced 75 yards for a touchdown on his first career carry. That was the longest run by a Tiger in his first run from scrimmage. The previous record was a 72-yard run by Craig Crawford against Wake Forest in 1981.

Martavis Bryant added a 54-yard catch on his first career reception in the fourth quarter. Clemson first-year freshmen had 298 all-purpose yards in the game as well.

Red-shirt freshman D.J. Howard was the third Tiger freshman to score a touchdown.

Boyd Rebounds in Starting Debut

Tajh Boyd had quite a debut as the Tigers' starting quarterback. The Hampton, VA native threw for 264 yards and three scores in the 43-19 victory over Troy. He started out 3-9 passing and finished 20-30, meaning he was an efficient 17 of his last 21. Included in that stretch was a streak when he completed 13 straight passes.

Clemson trailed 16-13 at halftime, as Boyd was just 6-12 for 65 yards, but he did not lose his confidence. He threw a 54-yard scoring pass to Dwayne Allen to give Clemson a 20-16 lead with 7:01 left in the third quarter, then competed 9-9 passes for 69 yards on the next drive, including a seven-yard scoring pass to Jaron Brown. That put Clemson up 26-16 with 30 seconds left in the third quarter.

Boyd's day would have to be considered the second-best first start for a Tiger signal-caller in history. The honor of the best goes to Charlie Whitehurst, who is now with the Seattle Seahawks. Whitehurst completed 34-52 passes for 420 yards and four touchdowns in his first start, a game at Duke in 2002. His 420 passing yards is a Clemson record for any game and the 34 completions are the most by a Tiger in a Clemson win.

Boyd's stats were very impressive when you look at what he had done prior to this year. Boyd had just 33 completions all of last year, then had 20 against Troy. He had 329 passing yards last year and had 264 against Troy.

Catanzaro's Career Day

Chandler Catanzaro got off to a good start in his sophomore year when he booted three field goals of at least 45 yards against Troy. He made field goals of 46, 46, and 45 yards in three attempts to help the Tigers to the 43-19 win.

The Greenville, SC native joined Mark Buchholz as the two Tigers in history to make three field goals of at least 45 yards in one game. Buchholz made kicks of 48, 52, and 46 yards in a 44-10 victory over Wake Forest in Death Valley on November 10, 2007.

Catanzaro finished the 2010 season strong, as he made six of his last seven field-goal attempts. That means he has made nine of his last 10 attempts.

The original walk-on has been especially effective from long range. He has now made 9-12 field goals outside of 40 yards in his career, one of the top percentages in school history.

One of the great ironies of his performance last Saturday was that he missed an extra point for the first time in his career in the game that he tied the school record for field goals made of 45 yards or more. He made his first two to give him 36 straight made extra points, then missed his third attempt of the game. He then made his next two to finish the game with 13 points.

They were always the dependable guys, on and off the field. They led me to a great Bible study, which has really helped me grow in my faith. I know wherever their NFL careers take them, they will continue to lead."

As if football and ROTC are not enough, Cloy worked hard in the classroom before earning his park & protected area management degree in May. He is a three-time ACC Academic Honor Roll member along with being a two-time selection to the All-ACC Academic team.

"I have enjoyed the people the most... the professors, the fans, and the students," said Cloy when asked about his Clemson experience. "I will also miss football and the University when I am gone. Everyone knows when they come to Clemson, it is a special place. There is no place like it."

As much as Cloy loves Clemson, it is surprising to find out that he is the first Clemson graduate in his family. Most of his family members attended Southern Mississippi. Cloy is the son of Michael and Debbie Cloy and has an older sister, Melanie. His father, Colonel Cloy, is the former Chief of Staff for the United States Army Cadet Command.

He also knows his four years in his beloved college town have prepared him well for his upcoming endeavors in the Army. The challenges of the classroom and the gridiron have served him well, but the challenge will go to another level when he begins his career

in the Army.

Cloy has been groomed for a military career all his life, and those who have been around him know he will be up to the challenge.

Just ask his coaches, his teammates, his teachers, or his classmates.



Luckily for Clemson, he was successfully recruited by Offensive Line Coach Brad Scott. However, Cloy chose Clemson for more than just football.

An equally-important factor in choosing a college was the ROTC (Reserve Officers' Training Corps) program. At Virginia Tech, for example, one cannot participate in ROTC if he is on the football team.

"ROTC is traditionally four years and one summer," explained Cloy. "But, I took a less traditional path. Last summer, I went to the Leader's Training Course, which supplements the first two years. I really enjoyed ROTC at Clemson. The ROTC program prepares students for the transition into the military world."

During his time at Clemson, he has participated in physical training with ROTC while also lifting weights with the football squad.

Cloy arrived in Tigertown for the 2007 season. Like many offensive linemen, he red-shirted that first year. The following season in 2008, he was second on the team in knockdown blocks (53) and was fourth among offensive linemen in terms of film grade (72.2) as a red-shirt freshman.

He also set a school record for snaps by a freshman offensive lineman (660), including 53 in the Gator Bowl against Nebraska's tough defensive line that included Ndamukong Suh, now an NFL All-Pro.

His 2009 season proved to be just as successful with 52 knockdown blocks as he played in 13 of the 14 games. He helped the Tigers to nine victories, the ACC Atlantic Division title, and a final top-25 ranking. The only game he missed was the bowl contest against Kentucky after he suffered a broken leg versus Georgia Tech in the 2009 ACC Championship game.

In 2010, he had another solid season with 31 knockdown blocks in 356 snaps over 12 games. For the second straight year, he was named to the All-ACC Aca-

ademic team. He entered his final year with 136 career knockdown blocks, second-most among active Tigers.

Clemson is expecting big things from the offensive line this season, especially with new playmakers on Cloy's side of the ball that include a new quarterback and some young skill-position players. However, Cloy knows his unit, led by first-year Assistant Coach Robbie Caldwell, is up to the task.

"It all starts with the offensive line and we have a veteran group who is filled with team leaders," stated Cloy.

One of the reasons for Cloy's success in all areas has been his willingness to learn from veteran players who preceded him, in particular Thomas Austin and Michael Palmer, two former Tigers who were All-ACC Academic members now in the NFL.

When many senior college students are asked about their future plans as they hit September of that final year, a lot of them respond, "I have no idea where I will be a year from now." But that is not the case for Mason Cloy. The graduate offensive lineman will follow in the footsteps of his grandfather, uncle, and father in joining the United States Army.

Cloy grew up the military way with more than one hometown. However, South Carolina has been his home state for close to a decade, as he attended Spring Valley High School in Columbia prior to enrolling at Clemson.

At Spring Valley High, Jimmy Noonan coached and developed him into a successful college recruit. In addition to Noonan, Cloy's offensive line coach, Mike Armstrong, also played a large part in his development as an offensive lineman.

As a senior, Cloy was an all-state pick, was chosen as the team captain for the Max Emfinger All-American Bowl Classic East team, was selected by the South Carolina Coaches Association as the Lowerstate AAAA Offensive Lineman-of-the-Year, was a Carolina Panther Community Captain Award recipient, and was a Wendy's High School Heisman Award recipient. He also had 57 knockdowns as a senior and established a school record with 175 career knockdowns. As a tight end, he added 16 catches for 251 yards and three touchdowns in his career.

Cloy was well on his way to becoming an asset to whichever school he would choose. He was rated by Scout.com as the #9 center in the nation and #11 overall prospect in South Carolina. He was also rated as the #10 center in the nation and #15 prospect in the state by Rivals.com.

In addition to the Tigers, Cloy considered Georgia Tech, Kentucky, Louisville, North Carolina, N.C. State, South Carolina, Vanderbilt, Virginia, and Virginia Tech.

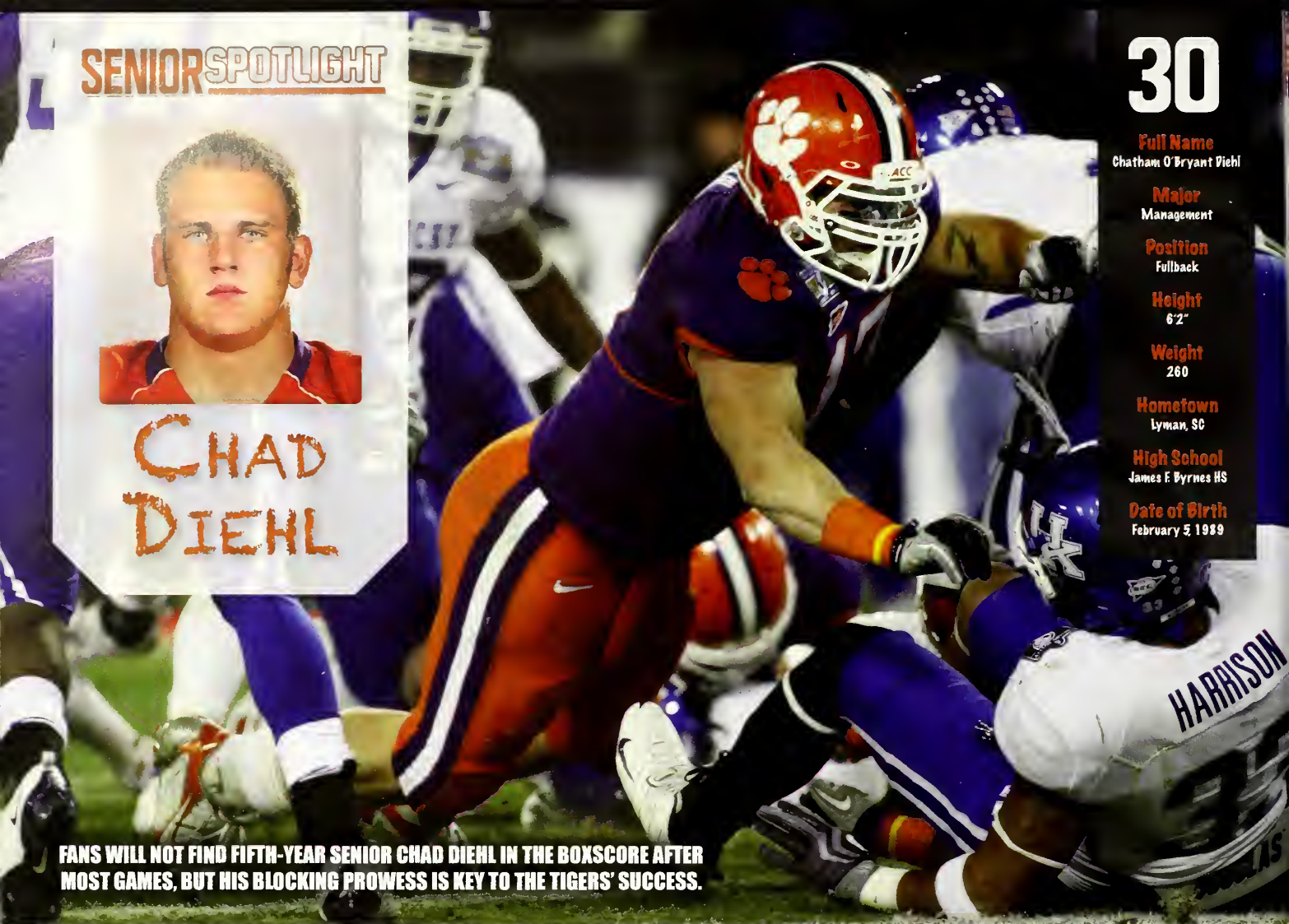

He did not grow up dreaming about college football. He did not bleed orange from birth or aspire to be a Tiger football player. He is not a product of generations of Clemson graduates. When Chad Diehl was a child, he played baseball and only visited Clemson occasionally with a friend.

That was then.

Today, Diehl is rated by CBSports.com as the #1 fullback in the nation for the 2012 NFL draft and is one of the leaders of the Tiger football team.

Now he has a child of his own and is proud that he will soon be an alumnus of Clemson. It may not have been love from the start, but Diehl now knows what is so special about "these hills."

"I did not really grow up a fan of any college team, although I did come to several games with my childhood friend, Josh Buchannon, and his dad, J.E., who were both really involved in my life as a child," said Diehl. "I was really into baseball at that age and did not even dream about playing college football while at the games, which is kind of weird."

"I really started routinely coming to games in my sophomore year of high school with Willy Korn, who was already committed to Clemson. Before I was offered by Clemson, two of my other teammates were committed to Clemson. With Clemson being so close to my hometown and with teammates and best friends committed, why not Clemson?"

When you look at Clemson's statistics for the past three years, you will not see his name as a leading rusher. However, you will see the names of James Davis, C.J. Spiller, Andre Ellington, and Jamie Harper. Ask any of these Tigers, "Who led the way?" and they will be quick to tell you it was Diehl, all of his 6'2", 260-pound frame and his canny ability to block.

With so much promise for his freshman season in 2007, things did not begin so well. Diehl broke his leg on a kickoff return during the Furman game, only the third game of the year. He was granted a medical red-shirt and spent the rest of the season rehabilitating his leg back into shape. Since returning, Diehl has proven to be one of the most valuable players on

the Tiger offense with his blocking prowess.

After making four starts as a red-shirt freshman in 2008, he was the lead blocker on countless runs by former Tiger All-American C.J. Spiller, and those blocks contributed to his sixth-place finish in the Heisman Trophy race in 2009. The Tigers won the ACC Atlantic Division title that year, and they defeated Florida State and Miami (FL) in the same season for the first time. Clemson also finished in the top 25 of both polls.

The season ended in Nashville, TN at the Music City Bowl against Kentucky, a big victory for the Tigers. But most importantly, it was a big game for Diehl, as he earned attention from the ESPN announcers for his blocks. The season overall proved to be a successful one, with film grades consistently in the 80s.

The 2010 season was a typical year for Diehl, as he had only two rushes for four yards and seven catches for 13 more yards. But, he had more memorable blocks. He actually had more knockdown blocks (34) than yards, but his blocking is worth more than statistics to the coaching staff and his teammates. At the end of the year, he received the Dedication Award among offensive players for his hard work in the weightroom.

Diehl has played 44 career games, and this year should become Clemson's career leader in that category. If he plays in his 54th game, he will establish that mark.

The Lyman, SC native attended James F. Byrnes High School, a well-known powerhouse for football. There, he played offensive guard, linebacker, and fullback. As a junior, he registered 141 tackles and 12 tackles for loss. Then as a senior, he totaled 111 tackles, 19 tackles for loss, seven sacks, and four caused fumbles.

Upon graduation, Diehl was rated as the #18 fullback in the nation by **College Football News** and the #19 fullback by

Scout.com. He was also the #27 player in South Carolina according to **SuperPrep** and the #21 player by **Rivals.com**. Diehl was the MVP of the North-South High School All-Star game as well.

Upon graduation from Clemson this year, Diehl will receive his management degree. But, that is not what he plans on pursuing, at least not at first.

"I plan on training after the season and continuing my football career, but only if that is God's will for me and part of the

plan that he has in store for my life. I will continue to love my beautiful wife, Candace, and our precious

daughter, Peyton, regardless of what I do. I will be there for them for the rest of my life. I also plan on being dependable for both

of my parents (Ken, Denise), who are not in the best conditions of health."

Diehl told **TigerNet.com** writer David Hood recently in an interview that having the responsibilities of a wife and daughter have changed him, and for the better. "It definitely does," admitted Diehl. "Having a wife and then a newborn daughter, you really start to think about the future. You have to make sure that even when you are out here, you are at full speed and focus on the little things scouts look for."

But for now, he is focusing on his last season as a Tiger, because he knows it will come and go quickly. When asked what he would miss the most about Tigertown, his answer was, you guessed it...football.

"The best part of playing football is all of the relationships you develop with your teammates and coaches," stated Diehl. "Going through what you go through as a football player - the hard work and difficult schedule you have to deal with - the teammates become your brothers who you have to lean on and hold up at times to get through it all."

Three people in particular have been a strong hold for Diehl's football career, including Mike Srock and Bobby Bentley, both from James F. Byrnes High School, and Clemson Director of Strength & Conditioning Joey Batson.

"I give a lot of credit to these coaches for making me the player I am today," added Diehl. "Coach Bentley taught me what winning is all about."

Despite not growing up as a Clemson fan, Diehl came to Tigertown four years ago and has made quite an impact on the football program. During his time here, he has become a husband and now a father, and he will soon graduate.

He certainly now knows what is so special about "these hills."

Marion Hobby is in his first year on Dabo Swinney's staff, but he is no stranger to Clemson football. In 2005, he helped coach the Tigers in an outstanding season on a team and defensive-unit basis. Not only did Clemson have an 8-4 record and top-25 final ranking, the Tigers finished 11th in the nation in scoring defense.

Part of the reason for that success were the defensive ends, who included a budding Gaines Adams, who had a breakout junior year with 10 sacks and 56 tackles, and Philip Merling, who has gone on to play in the NFL with the Miami Dolphins.

After a brief coaching tour with the New Orleans Saints and then at Duke, Hobby returned to Tigertown to coach under Swinney and Defensive Coordinator Kevin Steele. Hobby is familiar with Swinney, who he coached beside when the two worked under Tommy Bowden in 2005.

Hobby is excited to be a part of Clemson's coaching staff again. "I like what's in place under Coach Swinney," said Hobby. "He has the right people on his staff to work with the players and make them better. There's a great tempo in the program and a true effort to keep the right things in place."

Hobby has been away just over five years, but he has seen the amount of change that has occurred at Clemson. "When I was here in 2005, the West Endzone was a vision, plans on paper. Now it is a reality and it's a great facility. You can see the positive effect it's had on our program."

With his return to Clemson comes the opportunity for Hobby to move forward and focus on what's ahead. Returning to Clemson a season after standout Da'Quan Bowers left for the NFL means that Hobby has some new players with potential to teach. He does have to fill the void of the first-team All-American, but he has some outstanding veterans returning in Andre Branch and Malliciah Goodman.

"I look forward to coaching these players," added Hobby. "They are talented

athletes who have had an impact on some outstanding defenses the last couple of years. We also have some young players who I am interested in helping reach their full potential."

Hobby reached his full potential as a football player at Tennessee and in the NFL. He was a four-year letterman in Knoxville during the 1980s, served as team captain, won an SEC Championship, and won three bowl games, including a Cotton Bowl victory. Most recently, Hobby was named to Tennessee's 100-Year Anniversary team.

His football career continued when he was selected in the third round of the 1990 NFL draft by the Minnesota Vikings. He later played three years for the New England Patriots.

Hobby's coaching career began in 1995 when he took a job at Tennessee-Martin coaching defensive tackles. From there, he went on to serve on the staff at Louisiana-Lafayette for two years. In 1998, he took a job as a strength & conditioning coach at Tennessee, a year his alma mater won the national title.

Since his work with the Volunteer program, Hobby has coached at Mississippi, Clemson, New Orleans (Saints), and most recently Duke. Hobby's time in Durham included work as the defensive line coach, assistant head coach, and defensive coordinator.

His brief tenure at Duke marked the second time Hobby coached under David Cutcliffe, as the two had worked together at Mississippi. In his first year with the Rebels, Hobby helped the defense finish fourth in the nation against the run. He also coached the Rebels to four bowl victories, all against Big 12 teams.

His time in the NFL with New Orleans was especially educational and gives him a unique perspective when it comes to helping a young man in his goals for football after Clemson.

"Marion has considerable experience at both the major college and NFL level,"

said Swinney. "His NFL experience with a successful team in New Orleans tells a Clemson prospect and current player that he knows what it takes to reach the next level."

His success continued at Duke for a second coaching tour with Cutcliffe. In his first season with the Blue Devils in 2008, Hobby's defense held three of its opponents under 10 points, a first for the program since the 1976 season.

A husband and father of three, Hobby is not the only new member of the Clemson family. His wife, Constance, and their three daughters, Maria, Mariah, and Camille,

have all had to re-adjust to being back in Clemson.

"We're excited to be back," added Hobby. "We had established friends here already. We have been very welcomed by people in the Clemson community."

When Hobby last coached in Clemson, the Tigers had just claimed a bowl victory over Colorado and were ranked #21 in the final **Associated Press** poll. Now with his return, he has the chance to coach the Tigers to even greater success.

As Hobby puts it, "It's not about what's been done, it's about the future and what's ahead."

Jim Barker has worn almost every hat possible in his almost five decades as a member of the Clemson family - student, athlete, alumnus, teacher, dean, parent, fan, and president. On reflection, he thinks "student" is the most important.

"I often tell people I learned everything from plumbing to poetry in architecture school, and I use every bit of that knowledge as president of Clemson University," said Barker.

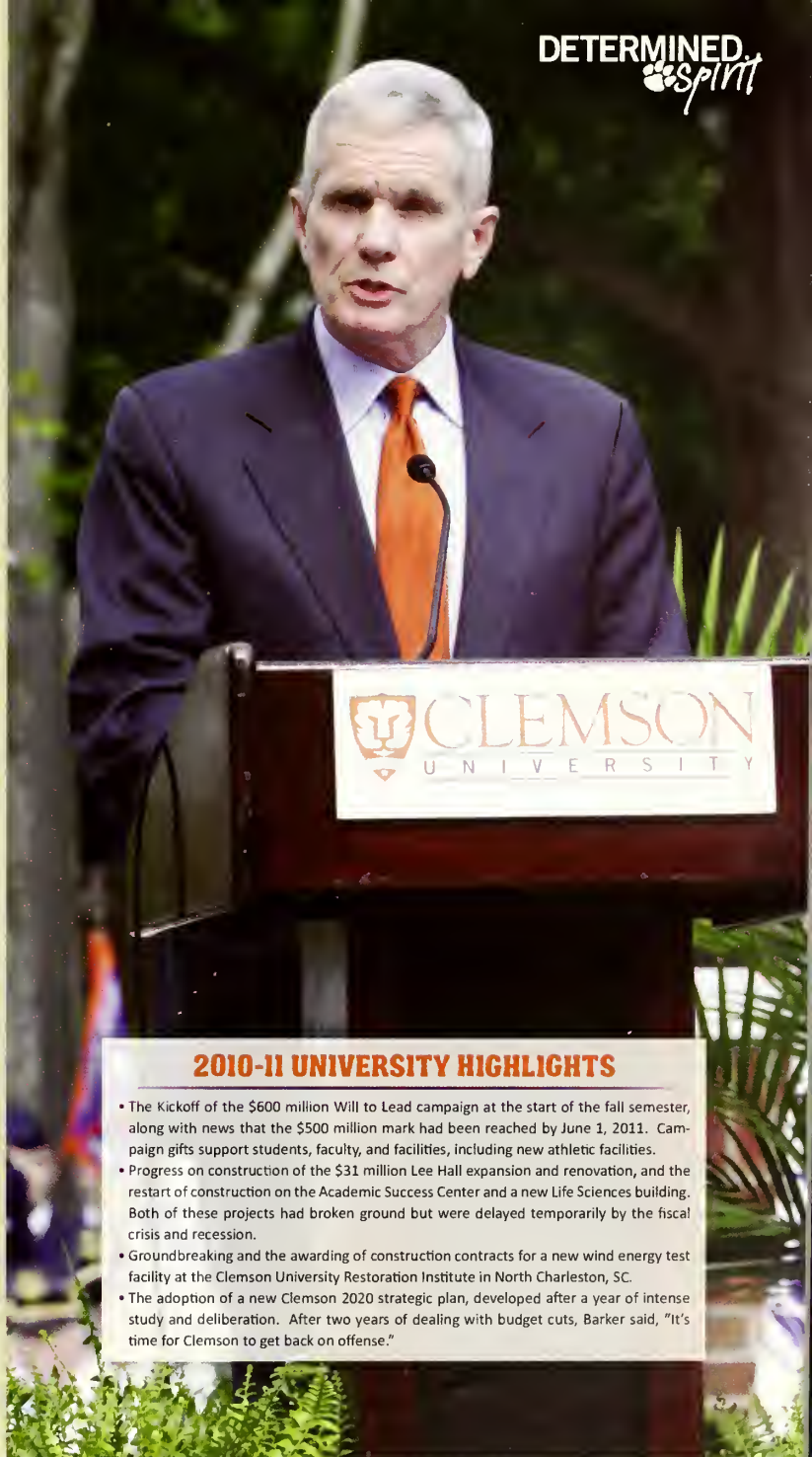
A 1970 Clemson graduate, Barker was named president in 1999 with a mandate from the Board of Trustees to lead Clemson into the top ranks of American universities. At his inaugural address in April of 2000, he said, "I am convinced that there is no university in America stronger than Clemson when we are 'One Clemson.' A united Clemson is unstoppable."

During the "One Clemson" decade that followed, the university harnessed the competitive, determined spirit of the Clemson family to transform itself from a respected state institution into one of the nation's finest public universities.

Clemson climbed from the third tier to a top-25 ranking among public universities in the 2011 **U.S. News & World Report** guide to colleges, and it has been recognized for value, affordability, and return on investment by **Kiplinger's** and **Bloomberg/Businessweek** magazines. Ninety-two percent of seniors would choose Clemson again according to the National Survey of Student Engagement. Also, Clemson is third among all public universities in the percentage of alumni who make gifts to their school. That is another indication of quality and alumni satisfaction.

Clemson continues to attract top students and faculty. It is the #1 choice of Palmetto Fellows, the state's best students. A record-setting 16,867 undergraduate and 6,082 graduate school applications were received for the fall of 2010, and just over 50 percent of the freshman class graduated in the top-10 percent of their high school classes.

The University provides an unmatched educational experience - intellectual development - for students and research-

driven economic development for the state of South Carolina.

Barker is a leading voice in higher education for South Carolina and the nation. He served on the NCAA Division I Board of Directors for four years, three of which as chair. He also delivered a keynote address at the Society for College & University Planning conference in Charleston, SC in October of 2010.

For his leadership, Barker has received the Order of the Palmetto, South Carolina's highest civilian honor, and The Cliff's Business Person-of-the-Year Award from **Greenville Magazine**. He has also been awarded honorary doctorates from the Medical University of South Carolina, South Carolina State University, and Mars Hill College.

A native of Kingsport, TN, Barker received his bachelor of arts degree from Clemson University in 1970 and his master

of architecture & urban design degree in 1973 from Washington University in Saint Louis, MO, which also recognized him with its Distinguished Alumnus Award. He is also a Fellow of the American Institute of Architects and the Institute for Urban Design.

As Clemson's President, Barker remains committed to the classroom. Each spring, he is a part of a team that teaches an undergraduate course exploring "a sense of place" in architecture, literature, and history.

In his spare time, he maintains the daily fitness regimen of a life-long athlete and enjoys playing with his granddaughters. He is widely acclaimed for his pen-and-ink drawings of campus buildings and his watercolor paintings.

Barker and his wife, Marcia, have two sons, Britt and Jacob, a daughter-in-law, Rita Bolt Barker, and two grandchildren.

When the Clemson baseball squad played host to the 2011 NCAA Tournament, it meant the Tiger sports program had accomplished something only one other program had done nationally. It marked the third consecutive year Clemson had been to a bowl game, the NCAA Men's Basketball Tournament, and the NCAA Baseball Tournament. Only Florida State has equaled that accomplishment.

Reaching a high level of success in the high-profile sports is a credit to the administrative acumen of Clemson Athletic Director Dr. Terry Don Phillips. Now in his 10th year at Clemson, Phillips has enhanced the Tiger program on many levels.

The 2010-11 season marked the fourth straight year the men's basketball program reached the NCAA Tournament, a first in the 100-year history of that program. The Tiger football team has been bowl eligible each of Phillips' nine previous years and has had four top-25 final rankings. The baseball program has been to the NCAA Tournament eight of his nine years and has been to the College World Series twice.

In addition to the success of the high-profile sports in 2010-11, the women's track & field program won the ACC title both indoor and outdoor, the second straight year they accomplished that feat, and finished in the top 20 at both national meets. The men and the women both finished in the top 25 at the indoor meet.

The rowing program had its third straight top-15 finish and the women's tennis team made its ninth straight NCAA Tournament appearance. Overall, seven teams finished in the top 25 in the nation.

In his nine years at Clemson, it has had 53 teams finish the season in the top 25, including the golf team that won

the 2003 national title. Five different women's sports have captured ACC titles during his tenure. Only Virginia has had a wider variety of women's sports win league titles.

The 2010-11 academic year was also a year of great accomplishment on an individual basis. Track athletes Patricia Mamona (triple jump), Miller Moss (heptathlon), and Brianna Rollins (60m hurdles) won national titles. Golfer Corbin Mills won the United States Public Links National Championship. Women's tennis players Josipa Bek and Keri Wong reached the finals of the NCAA Doubles Championship, a first in Clemson's storied program. Defensive end Da'Quan Bowers won the Bronko Nagurski Award as the top defensive player in college football.

One of the reasons for Clemson's level of success as a total sports program has been his emphasis on improving facilities. On June 30, 2009, the football staff moved into the WestZone at Memorial Stadium. It was a day that brought a smile to everyone associated with the program, but especially Phillips, who had been working toward that day before he arrived in 2002.

Phillips' vision for the WestZone was to create a top-of-the-line facility for the football program, but at the same time have a positive effect on the total sports program.

The facility at Memorial Stadium now creates more office space, new locker rooms, and training room and strength training facilities for the Olympic sports programs.

In the 2011 spring semester, nearly 50 percent of student-athletes were on the academic honor roll and seven of the 15 programs had team GPAs of at least 3.0.

All 19 Clemson teams posted APR scores of at least 945 and 13 of the 19 were over 975. The football program had a 977 APR score for the 2009-10 data, a cohort of four years that ends with the student-athletes who were on the team for the 2009-10 academic year. Clemson was 11th out of all FBS programs in terms of APR score.

Phillips has been recognized for these accomplishments in recent years. He was named as one of the 100 Most Influential Sports Educators in America in 2008 by The Institute for International Sport at the University of Rhode Island.

Phillips was also recognized nationally for his performance at Clemson in 2006 when he was honored by NACDA (National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics) as the 2005-06 GeneralSports Turf Systems Athletic Director-of-the-Year for the FBS Southeast Region. He was one of just four FBS athletic directors honored at the annual convention in New Orleans, LA.

Excellence in academics has been a lifelong pursuit. He has an undergraduate degree from Arkansas (1970), a master's degree from Virginia Tech (1974), a doctorate degree from Virginia Tech (1978), and a law degree from the University of Arkansas School of Law (1996). He is a member of the Arkansas Bar, South Carolina Bar, American Bar Association, and Sports Lawyers Association.

Phillips maintains a classroom presence by teaching a sports law section in Clem-

son's accountancy & legal studies department. In addition, he is past chair of the NCAA Division I Infractions Appeals Committee and continues to serve the committee as requested.

Prior to coming to Clemson, he served as athletic director at Oklahoma State. Football was transformed from a perennial losing status to very competitive, enjoying a return to bowl games after several years and establishing a winning record against in-state rival Oklahoma. For this, he received the National Football Foundation Oklahoma Chapter Outstanding Contribution to Amateur Football Award in 2002.

Before leading the Cowboys, he was a senior associate athletic director at Arkansas (1988-94). He also served as athletic director at Liberty (1980,81) and Louisiana-Lafayette (1983-88). He was an assistant athletic director at Missouri (1981-83) and began his administrative career as an assistant athletic director at Florida (1979).

Phillips began his career in college athletics coaching football. He started as a graduate assistant at Arkansas in 1970 and 1971. He moved on to Virginia Tech as an assistant coach (1971-78) before joining the ranks of athletic administration. At Virginia Tech, he served on coaching staffs that included future Clemson Head Coaches Charley Pell and Danny Ford.

Winning has been on Phillips' resumé since his playing days at Arkansas. He lettered on three Frank Broyles teams, where he and his brother, Loyd, an Outland Trophy winner, were starting defensive tackles, the first brother combination to start together under Broyles. Arkansas had a 27-5 record in the three years, played in two Sugar Bowl games, and he played in the memorable 1969 National Championship game against Texas, a contest that continues to be featured on **ESPN Classic**.

In 2010, he joined Loyd in the University of Arkansas Hall of Honor.

Phillips has two children, John Dennis and Sarah-Jane, and three stepchildren, Meagan (a Clemson graduate and former member of Tiger Band), Marshall, and Madison. His wife, Tricia, is a graduate of the University of Missouri School of Journalism and earlier enjoyed a career in athletics and development. She is currently active in the Clemson and Seneca communities.





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DABO SWINNEY

At 41, Dabo Swinney is the youngest head coach in the ACC and one of the youngest in the country. However, his resumé is already stuffed with many significant accomplishments on a school, ACC, and national level.

First, his mere appointment to the position was significant. In October of 2008, he was named Clemson interim head coach, replacing Tommy Bowden, who had been his position coach as a player at Alabama and been Clemson's head coach since 1999. He led the Tigers to a 4-2 record over the remainder of the regular season, including a victory over Steve Spurrier's South Carolina Gamecocks in the regular-season finale. That strong finish led to a Gator Bowl bid against Nebraska.

On December 1, 2008, the interim tag was removed from the title and he was named the program's head coach. At the time, there had been 28 interim head coaches at the FBS level since 1970 and those coaches had combined for a record of 26-86-2. Only one of those 28 interim coaches posted a winning record, and that was Swinney. When he was hired as the head coach, Swinney became just the second interim coach to be elevated to the head coach position at the same school during that time period.

In addition to leading the program to three bowl games on the field in his career, his players have also excelled in the classroom. As a head coach, his players have an APR score of 988, best among active FBS coaches.

Clemson had to replace three First-Team All-ACC position players on offense in 2010, as Jacoby Ford, Michael Palmer, and C.J. Spiller moved on to the NFL. It was the first year since 1956 that Clemson had to replace three First-Team All-ACC skill position players in the same year. All three

players performed well in the NFL in 2010, further showing their talent level.

The 2010 season included wins over bowl teams Georgia Tech, Maryland, and N.C. State. The Wolfpack were ranked #23 in the nation and were leading the ACC in

scoring. But the Clemson defense held N.C. State to just one touchdown and 13 points. The team excelled defensively in 2010 and was 13th in the nation in scoring defense and in the top 25 in both total defense and pass defense.

Spiller was a unanimous first-team All-American in Swinney's first year, and defensive end Da'Quan Bowers duplicated the feat on the defensive side of the ball. Bowers won the 2010 Bronko Nagurski Award as the nation's top defensive player, and he received the Ted Hendricks Award as the top defensive end. He was also a finalist for the Bednarik Award and Lombardi Award. He led the nation in sacks (15.5) and was tied for the national lead in tackles for loss (26).

Bowers was one of four First-Team All-ACC players in 2010, as he joined Jarvis Jenkins (DT) and DeAndre McDaniel (S) on defense and Chris Hairston (OT) on offense. Clemson and Maryland tied for the most First-Team All-ACC selections.

In 2009, his first full year as head coach, he led the Tigers to their first championship of the ACC Atlantic Division. The Tigers came just six points short of winning their first ACC title in 18 years. Swinney was named ACC Coach-of-the-Year by **Sporting News** and was a finalist for the Liberty Mutual Coach-of-the-Year award.

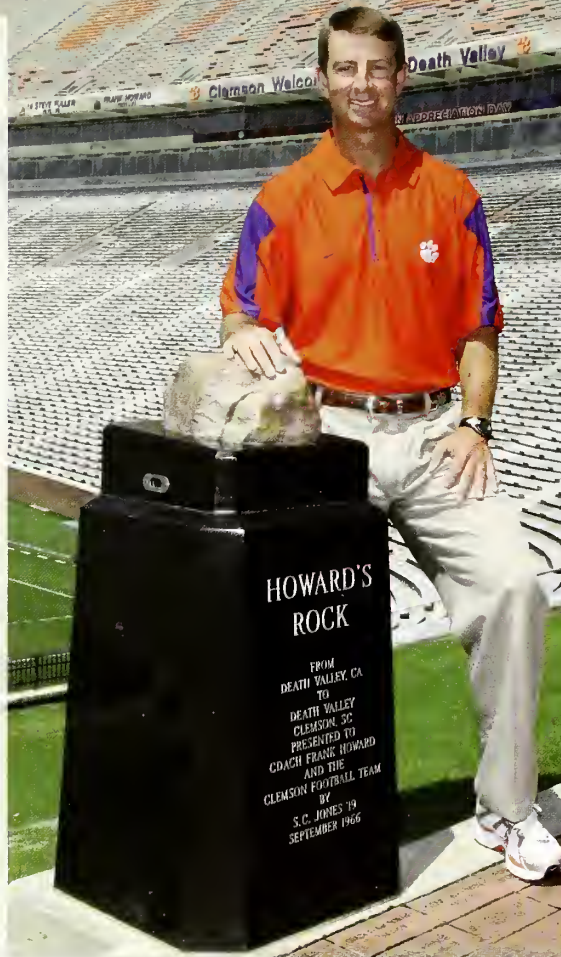

the best mark in the ACC for that time period. Four of his six regular-season opponents were later bowl participants.

The 1993 Alabama graduate joined the Clemson staff prior to the 2003 season. In his eight years as an assistant or head coach, the Tigers have finished in the top 25 of the final polls four times and totaled 11 wins over top-25 teams, including victories over Florida State (4), Miami (FL) (2), and Tennessee (1), during his tenure in Tigertown.

Swinney coached his wide receiver position to a level of consistency that had not been seen previously at Clemson. He had a wideout finish first or second in the ACC in catches five of the last six years. In his first year, he had three of the top-10 receivers in the ACC, a first in Tiger history. He has coached a First or Second-Team All-ACC wideout (Derrick Hamilton, Airese Currie, Chansi Stuckey, Aaron Kelly, Ford) in seven of his eight seasons at Clemson, again an unprecedented feat at Clemson.

The Alabama native has a reputation as one of the top recruiters in the nation. In 2006, he was listed as the #5 recruiter in the nation by Rivals.com. It marked the second straight year that he was lauded by the website as a top-25 national recruiter. He signed 38 players in his five recruiting seasons as an assistant coach and was a major reason Clemson's 2008 recruiting class was rated #2 in the nation according to ESPN.com when he signed 11 players. He was named one of the top-25 recruiters in the nation by Rivals.com in 2007 as well.

Swinney received a commerce & business administration degree from Alabama in 1993 after lettering three times (1990-92). A walk-on who went on to earn a scholarship, Swinney was a wideout on Alabama's 1992 National Championship team. He was also named Academic All-SEC along with being an SEC Scholar-Athlete Honor Roll member in 1990 and 1992.

Along with his appearance in the 1993 Sugar Bowl, his Alabama teams played in

the 1990 Sugar Bowl, 1991 Fiesta Bowl, and 1991 Blockbuster Bowl. Both Sugar Bowl appearances came after winning the SEC Championship game.

After his playing career, Swinney served as a graduate assistant from 1993-95 at Alabama, where he coached in the 1994 Gator Bowl and 1995 Citrus Bowl. In December of 1995, he received his master's degree in business administration from Alabama.

He became a full-time assistant coach at Alabama in February of 1996 under Head Coach Gene Stallings (now in the Hall of Fame) and coached a total of five seasons there on a full-time basis. He was assigned to coach the Crimson Tide's wide

receivers and tight ends in 1996, a season that saw Alabama win the SEC Western Division title and make an Outback Bowl appearance. The following year, he solely coached the tight ends under Head Coach Mike DuBose.

In 1998, he coached Alabama's wide receivers, a position he held for three seasons. At the end of the 1999 campaign, Swinney coached the Crimson Tide in the 2000 Orange Bowl after winning the SEC Championship game. Wide receiver Freddie Milons was the game MVP.

During his time at Alabama, Swinney was a part of six teams with at least 10 wins, five top-10 finishes, one national title (1992), three SEC Championships

(1989,92,99), and five SEC Western Division titles (1992,93,94,96,99) as a player and coach. He has coached the #2 receiver at Alabama (Milons) along with the #1 (Kelly) and #2 (Hamilton) receivers in Tiger history.

As an assistant coach, he had 20 former players either drafted or sign free-agent contracts with NFL teams. The list includes Hamilton, Currie, Kevin Youngblood, Stuckey, and Milons, an All-American at Alabama.

From April of 2001 through February of 2003, Swinney was in private business in Alabama. He married the former Kathleen Bassett in 1994. They have three sons, Will (13), Drew (11), and Clay (8).

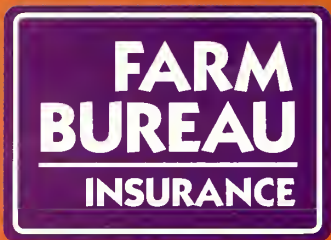

Woody McCorvey returned to Clemson after 20 years to become Associate Athletic Director for Football Administration on Dabo Swinney's first staff in 2009. He was Swinney's position coach during his playing days at Alabama and served as wide receivers and tight ends coach on Danny Ford's Tiger staff from 1983-89.

McCorvey serves as the primary liaison between Swinney and the athletic and IPTAY administration. He also oversees the management of the football administrative offices.

His return had a positive effect on the program in 2009 when Clemson won the ACC Atlantic Division for the first time and finished the season in the top 25 of the AP poll.

He supervises the football budget and works with the staff at Vickery Hall to oversee the team's academic progress. Clemson had six players named to the Academic All-ACC team in 2010 and Clemson's APR score in 2011 was 11th-best among Division I programs. He also makes speaking engagements and represents the football staff at various meetings and functions.

McCorvey worked seven seasons at Clemson between 1983-89. With McCorvey coaching the tight ends from 1983-85 and the wide receivers from 1986-89, Clemson posted a 60-19-3 record and won three ACC titles. During that time, the Tigers were invited to the 1985 Independence Bowl, the 1986 and 1989 Gator Bowls, and the 1988 and 1989 Citrus Bowls. Clemson posted a 10-2 record in each of his last three seasons on Ford.

Among the players he recruited were future Pro Bowlers Donnell Woolford and Chester McGlockton. McGlockton was inducted into the state of South Carolina Hall of Fame in 2011. McCorvey also coached future NFL players Keith Jennings and K.D. Dunn.

McCorvey coached at the Division I level for 26 years and went to a bowl game 17 of those seasons. Overall, he had 36 years of experience as a football coach. He coached or signed 36 players who went on to a professional football career as well.

From 1990-08, he coached in the SEC every year, including each of the last five at Mississippi State, where he served as assistant head coach and offensive coordinator in addition to coaching the quarterbacks. He was a big reason the Bulldogs won eight games, including wins over Auburn, Alabama, and Mississippi, in 2007. He also coached running back Anthony Dixon, who was a sixth-round draft pick by the 49ers in 2010, and Kyle Love, a free-agent signee.

McCorvey coached at Tennessee for five years (1999-03). With him heading the running game, the Volunteers had a 46-14 record. He helped guide Tennessee to the 2000 Fiesta Bowl, 2001 Cotton Bowl, 2002 Citrus Bowl, and 2002 and 2003 Peach Bowls. Tennessee won three consecutive New Year's Day Bowl games from 2000-02.

Prior to joining the staff at Tennessee, McCorvey worked one season at South Carolina, where he served as the wide receivers coach in 1998 under former Tiger Assistant Coach Brad Scott.

McCorvey took the South Carolina job following an eight-year stay at Alabama from 1990-97. He served seven seasons as its wide receivers coach and the 1996 campaign as offensive coordinator. He was the assistant head coach in 1997 as well.

Alabama had five top-25 final rankings in his tenure in Tuscaloosa, including three seasons in the top five. The Crimson Tide won the 1992 national title with McCorvey serving as wide receivers coach and Swinney as one of his student-athletes. That season culminated with a 34-13 win over heavily-favored Miami (FL) in the Sugar Bowl. Current Clemson Assistant Coach Danny Pearman was also on that staff.

From 1990-96, Alabama had a 70-16-1 record and played in six bowl games. With McCorvey at the controls of the 1996 offense, Alabama was 10-3, including a win over Michigan in the Outback Bowl.

From 1979-82, he served as an assistant coach at Alabama A&M and helped that program to the #6 rushing offense in Division II in 1981 after finishing 11th in the nation in scoring offense in 1980. McCorvey began his collegiate coaching career at North Carolina Central in 1978.

McCorvey began his coaching career with a six-year stint (1972-77) at J.M. Tate Senior High School in Florida. A quarterback at Alabama State from 1968-71, McCorvey earned his bachelor's degree from Alabama State in 1972 and a master's degree from West Florida in 1977.

In 2010, McCorvey was inducted into the Atmore (AL) Hall of Fame. The Atmore, AL native is married to the former Ann Brown. The couple has a son, Marlon.



BRAD SCOTT

Assistant AD

Brad Scott is in his 13th year with the Clemson program, but his first in athletic administration. The assistant athletic director moved into administration in March of 2011 after 12 seasons as an assistant coach under Tommy Bowden and Dabo Swinney from 1999-10. His 12-year tenure, which included him working with the offensive line, is tied for the ninth-longest for a Clemson football assistant coach in the program's history.

Scott works primarily with the football program in various administrative duties, but he has department-wide responsibilities when it comes to serving as a liaison between Clemson and high schools in securing documents needed to gain admission.

Clemson had great success on the gridiron during Scott's tenure as an assistant coach. The Tigers recorded seven of the top-nine yards-per-play seasons in school history, six of the top-eight seasons in total offense, each of the top-five touchdown teams, and each of the top-nine passing yardage teams during his 12-year career.

From 2001-03, Scott served as offensive coordinator, and in that time, Clemson had two of the top-four total offense figures in school history. The 2003 offense set a passing yardage record (3,687) that still stands today. That top-25 team that beat #3 Florida State and #6 Tennessee at the end of the 2003 season averaged 432.0 yards per game, still the second-best mark in school history.

Clemson was bowl eligible all 12 years Scott was on staff and the Tigers played in 11 bowl games. The Tigers had five top-25 seasons, including 2009 when Clemson won the ACC Atlantic Division. He coached 15 First or Second-Team All-ACC players, including five who earned All-America honors.

Scott served under Bobby Bowden at Florida State from 1983-93. He was the program's offensive coordinator from 1990-93. In 1993, Florida State won its first national title and Seminole quarterback Charlie Ward became the school's first Heisman Trophy winner.

He also gained recognition as an outstanding recruiter during his career. Florida State had the #1 class in the nation multiple times as the recruiting coordinator, and he was named one of the top-25 recruiters in the nation by two recruiting services in 2010 when he signed two five-star recruits from the state of Florida.

Scott is a 1979 graduate of South Florida and earned a master's degree from Florida State in 1984. He was born on September 30, 1954 in Arcadia, FL and is married to Daryle. The couple has two sons (Jeff, John). Jeff is an assistant coach and the recruiting coordinator on the football staff.

Andy Johnston is in his 15th year with the Tiger football program and currently serves as associate athletic director for football operations. His responsibilities include managing the program's day-to-day operations. From 1983-97, he was the winningest women's tennis coach in school history.

In 15 years, Johnston guided his squads to five consecutive ACC titles (1983-87), 12 top-25 finishes, and six NCAA Tourneys. He was ACC Coach-of-the-Year for the fourth time and Southeast Region Coach-of-the-Year for the second time in 1993. Seven players he coached at Clemson were named to the ACC 50-Year Anniversary team in 2002.

Johnston had a 254-160 Clemson record and 263-167 career mark. He was the coach at Furman in 1982 before coming to Clemson. His best season at Clemson was his rookie year when the team had a 30-5 record and finished #7 in the polls. That team won all nine flights of the ACC Tournament, the only tennis team in Tiger history to do that. He coached former Lady Tiger Gigi Fernandez, who was inducted into the Clemson Hall of Fame in 2005.

Johnston played for Clemson on the hardcourt and earned his degree in administrative management in 1979. He then served as the assistant men's tennis coach in 1980.

Jeff Davis is in his third year as assistant athletic director for player relations & external affairs within the Clemson football program. During the previous five years, he served as an assistant athletic director for fundraising, where he helped raise funds for the WestZone Club at Memorial Stadium. He also served as the primary spokesman for Clemson University's Call Me Mister Program and served as director from 1999-03.

Davis was an All-America linebacker from 1978-81 who captained the Tigers during their 1981 national title run. "The Judge" registered a then-Tiger-record 175 tackles in 1981. That same season, he became just the third defensive player in ACC history to be named league MVP. Davis had 14 tackles as Clemson topped Nebraska 22-15 in the 1982 Orange Bowl to claim its first national title.

In 1995, he became the fourth member of the Clemson Ring of Honor, then he was named to Clemson's Centennial Team in 1996. In 2002, he was named to the ACC's 50-Year Anniversary team.

In 2007, he was accorded the highest honor attainable for a college player when he was inducted into the National Football Foundation College Football Hall of Fame. Davis has made a name for himself outside of the Clemson community. A fifth-round draft pick by Tampa Bay in 1982, he played six seasons in the NFL. During his time as a professional, he also completed his remaining coursework and graduated from Clemson in 1984.

In 1999, he returned to Clemson as field director of Call Me Mister. It seeks to recruit, train, certify, and secure employment for African-American males as elementary teachers in the state's public schools. In 2001, he was awarded \$100,000 for the program from Oprah Winfrey's "Angel Network."

Davis is the president of Goal Line Stand, which supports young people as adults as they seek to remain committed to values that shape and govern their lives. The ordained pastor lives in Clemson with his wife, Joni, and their six children.

Director of Equipment

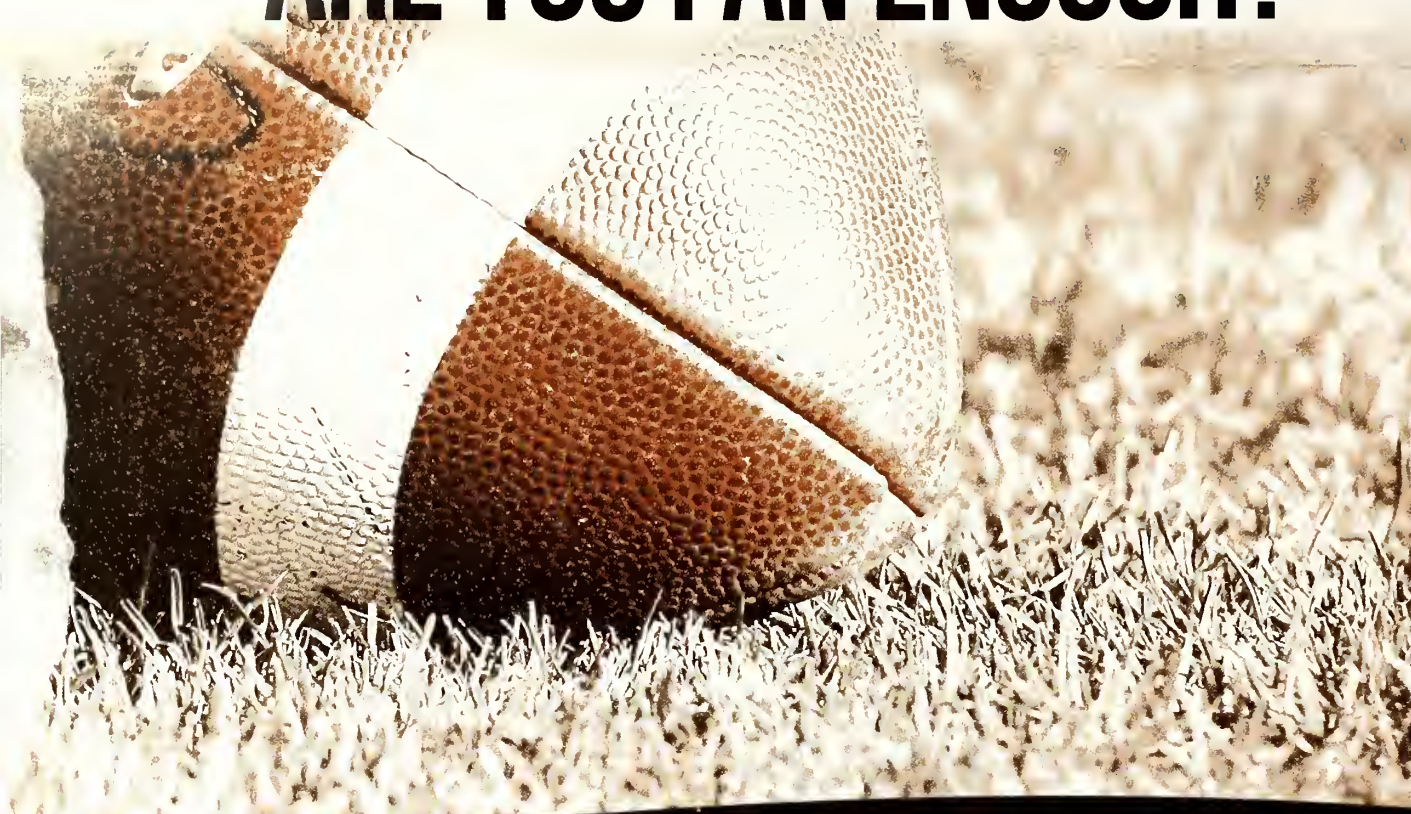

Concession stands are located beneath all stands inside Memorial Stadium and can be reached from any portal.

Digital Ticketing

All tickets are barcoded and scanned upon entry into the stadium.

Emergencies

First Aid stations are located on the South side under Section J, North side under Section T, North Top Deck under Section K, and South Top Deck under Section E. Trained nurses are on hand. If a doctor is needed, ask any usher. For emergencies, call 911.

Handicapped

Entrances are at Gates 1, 5, and 13 for the handicapped.

Lost & Found

Please report any item to the Gate 11 information booth.

Notice

Solicitation for any purpose is prohibited at an athletic contest in Memorial Stadium. Memorial Stadium is also a smoke-free facility. Smoking is prohibited inside the gates.

Passouts

Passouts are allowed, but fans must go through the same level of security screening as they did upon entering.

Prohibited Items

Alcoholic beverages, artificial noisemakers, backpacks, banners, chairbacks with arms, flags, food/drink containers, home video cameras, large bags, laser devices, umbrellas, weapons of any kind.

The public address system is intended for spectators' information. Do not request its use to make social contacts.

Season Ticketholders & Other Visitors

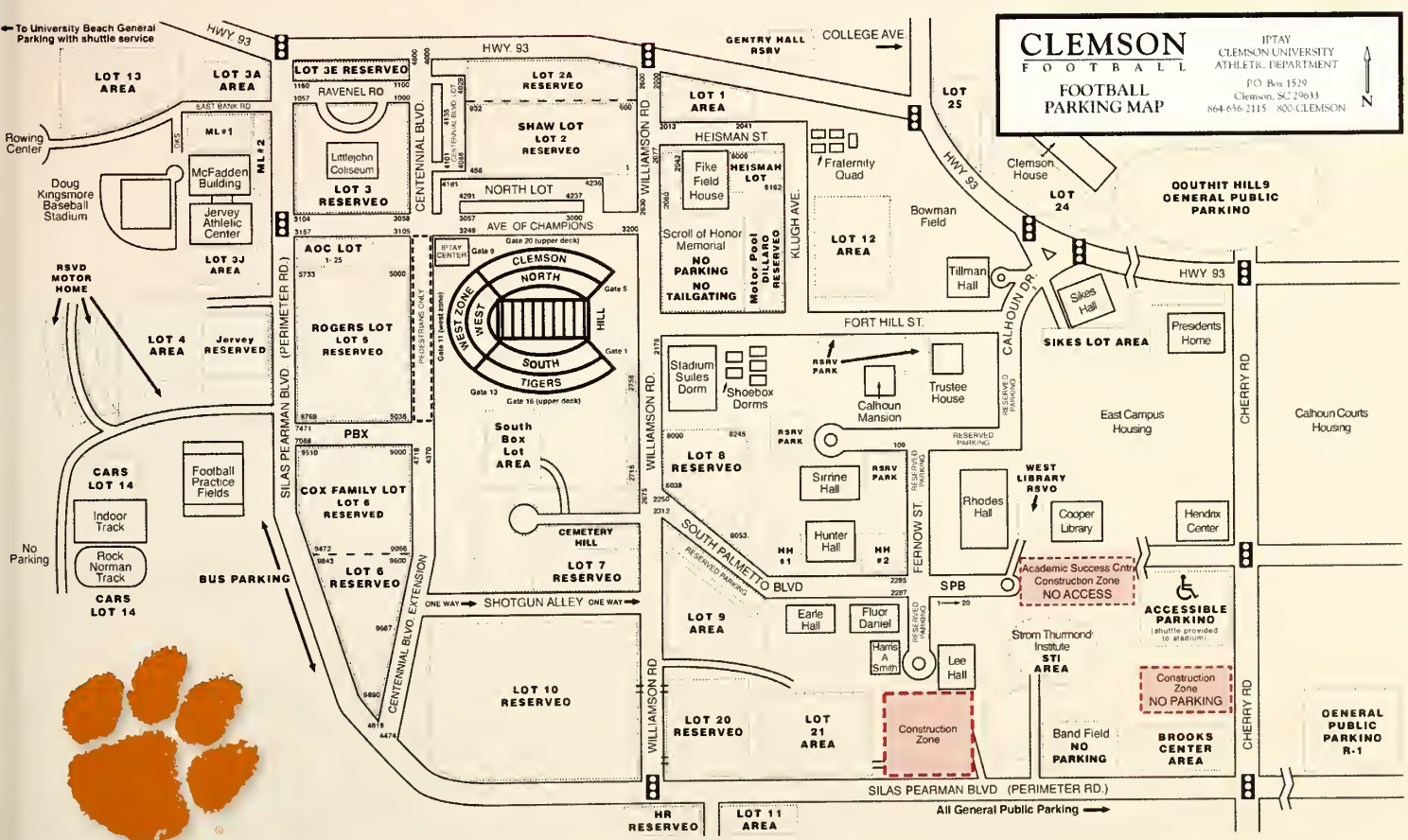
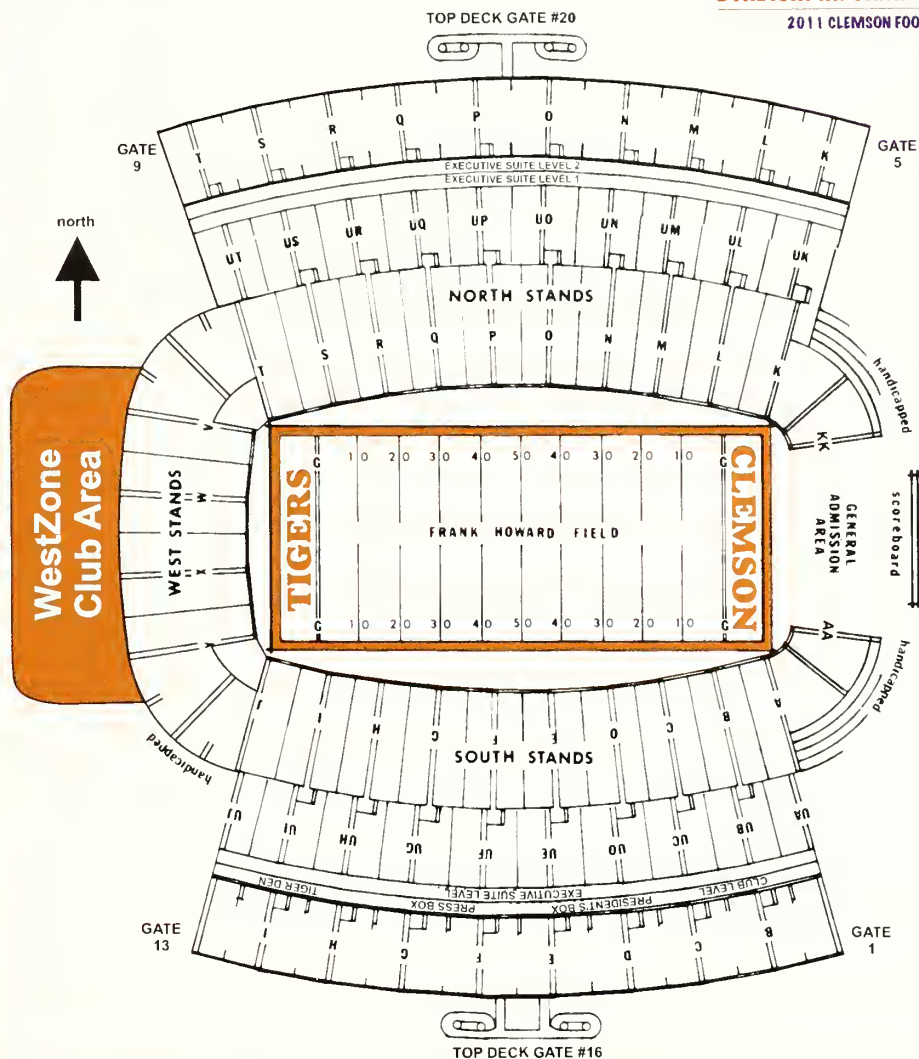

MEMORIAL STADIUM

**FROM "THE MOST EXCITING 25 SECONDS IN COLLEGE FOOTBALL,"
TO 85,000 SCREAMING TIGER FANS, DEATH VALLEY HAS GIVEN
CLEMSON ONE OF THE BEST HOME-FIELD ADVANTAGES IN THE ACC.**

Clemson's Memorial Stadium has been held in high esteem for many years. Whether it be players from the 1940s and 1950s, opposing players from the 1970s and 1980s, or even professional players in the 1990s, the ambience of this special setting is what college football is all about.

The storied edifice added to its legend when the first meeting of father and son head coaches (Bowden Bowl I) took place before a sellout crowd of more than 86,000 fans in 1999. Clemson has been in the top 20 in the nation in average attendance 30 straight seasons. A crowd has exceeded 80,000 fans 57 times since the 1983 season. In 2010, Clemson was 18th in the nation in average home attendance.

The facility's mystique is derived from its many traditions, which date to its opening in 1942, the legendary games and players, and Clemson's corresponding rate of success. Clemson has won 256 games in 69 years there and has won nearly 72 percent of the contests (256-99-7).

The stadium has definitely been good to the Tigers, but it was constructed against the advice of at least one coach. Just before Head Coach Jess Neely left for Rice after the 1939 season, he gave Clemson a message.

"Don't ever let them talk you into building a big stadium," he said. "Put about 10,000 seats behind the YMCA. That's all you'll ever need."

Instead of following Neely's advice, however, Clemson officials decided to build the new stadium in a valley on the western part of campus. The place took some clearing, as there were many trees, but luckily there were no hedges.

The crews went to work, clearing, cutting, pouring, and forming. Finally on September 19, 1942, Memorial Stadium opened with Clemson defeating Presbyterian College 32-13. Those 20,000 seats installed for the opener would soon grow.

When the original part of the stadium was built in the early 1940s, much of the work was done by scholarship athletes, including many

football players. The first staking out of the stadium was done by two members of the football team, A.N. Cameron and Hugh Webb. Webb returned to Clemson years later to be an architecture professor and Cameron went on to become a civil engineer in Louisiana.

The construction of the stadium did not proceed without problems. One afternoon during the clearing of the land, a young player proudly announced that he was not allergic to poison oak. He then proceeded to attack the poison oak with a swing blade, throwing the plants to and fro. The next day, the boy was swollen twice his size and was hospitalized.

There are many other stories about the stadium, including one that Frank Howard put a chew of tobacco in each corner as the concrete poured.

Howard said that the seeding of the grass caused a few problems. "About 40 people and I laid sod on the field," he said. "After three weeks on July 15, we had only gotten halfway through."

"I told them that it had taken us three weeks to get that far and I would give them three more weeks' pay for however long it took. I also told them we would have 50 gallons of ice cream when we got through. After that, it took them three days to do the rest of the field. Then we sat down in the middle of the field and ate up that whole 50 gallons."

Howard said that on the day of the first game in the stadium, "the gates were hung at 1:00 and we played at 2:00." But that would be all of the construction for awhile. Then in 1958, 18,000 sideline seats were added, and in 1960, 5,658 west endzone seats were added in response to increasing attendance. With the large east endzone ("Green Grass" section), this expansion increased capacity to 53,000.

Later, upper decks were added to each side of Memorial Stadium as crowds swelled - the first in 1978 and the second in 1983. It increased capacity to over 80,000, which makes it one of the nation's largest on-campus stadiums. In 2006, the WestZone was added, an area that

contains locker rooms and a luxury club level that holds over 1,000 seats.

The effect that inflation has had can be dramatically seen in the differences in stadium construction. The original part of Memorial Stadium was built at a cost of only \$125,000, or \$6.25 per seat. The stadium's newest upper deck was finished in 1983 at a cost of \$13.5 million, or \$866 per seat.

Through the years, Memorial Stadium has become known as "Death Valley." It was tagged by the late Presbyterian College Coach Lonnie McMillian in the late 1940s. After bringing his teams to Clemson for years and getting whipped, he said the place was like "Death Valley" A few years later, the name stuck.

In 1974, the playing surface was named Frank Howard Field for the legendary coach, because of his long service and dedication to Clemson University.

Luckily, it wasn't built behind the YMCA.

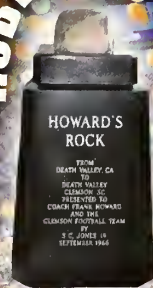

HOWARD'S ROCK

**"THE MOST EXCITING 25 SECONDS

RUNNING DOWN THE HILL



What has been described as "the most exciting 25 seconds in college football" from a color and pageantry standpoint actually started out as a matter-of-fact entrance, mainly because of necessity.

The first 20,000 seats in Memorial Stadium were built and ready for use before the 1942 season, less than a year after Pearl Harbor was bombed and the United States was drawn into World War II.

The shortest entry into Memorial Stadium was a short walk down Williamson Road from Fike Fieldhouse's dressing rooms to a gate at the top of the Hill, which is located behind the east endzone. There were no dressing facilities inside the west endzone of Memorial Stadium...there was only a giant clock, where the hands turned, and a scoreboard that was operated by hand.

The team would dress at Fike Fieldhouse, walk down Williamson Road, come in the gate underneath where the scoreboard now stands, and jog down the Hill for its warmup exercises. There was no fanfare, no cannon shot fired, no Tiger Paw flag, no "Tiger Rag" played...just the team making its entrance and lining up to do the side-straddle hop. That is pretty much the way things went for the next 25 years.

Either in 1964 or 1965, S.C. Jones, a member of the class of 1919, made a trip to California. He stopped at a spot in Death Valley, CA and picked up a white flint rock. He presented it to Head Coach Frank Howard as being from Death Valley, California to Death Valley, South Carolina.

The rock laid on the floor in Howard's office in Fike Fieldhouse for years. One day, he was cleaning up his office and told Gene Willimon, who was executive secretary of IPTAY, to "take this rock and throw it over the fence or out in the ditch...do something with it, but get it out of my office!"

Willimon did not think that was the way a rock should be treated. After all, it had been brought 2,200 miles by a very sincere Tiger fan.

By the mid-1960s, Memorial Stadium was living up to its moniker ("Death Valley") because of the number of Tiger wins that had been recorded there. Actually, the name was first used by Lonnie McMillian, head coach at Presbyterian College during the 1940s.

McMillian and the other Blue Hose coaches before him used to open each season by playing at Clemson. Seldom scoring (24 shutouts in 39 games) and with only three wins and four ties to show for it, his teams were getting "killed" by the Tigers regularly. In 1948, McMillian made the comment to the press that he was taking his team to play Clemson in "Death Valley."

An occasional reference to Memorial Stadium by that name could be heard for the next four years, but when Howard started calling it "Death Valley" in the 1950s, the name took off like wildfire. Clemson celebrated its 69th year in the "Valley" in 2010.

But getting back to Howard's Rock.

The Rock was mounted on a pedestal at the top of the Hill on the east side of the stadium. It was unveiled on September 24, 1966 when Clemson played Virginia. The Tigers were down 18 points with 17 minutes left and came back to win 40-35 on a 75-yard pass from Jimmy Addison to Jacky Jackson in the fourth quarter. That was quite a debut for the Rock.

The team members started rubbing the Rock prior to running down the Hill on September 23, 1967, a day when Clemson defeated Wake Forest by a score of 23-6.

Prior to running down the Hill that day, Howard told his players, "If you're going to give me 110 percent, you can rub that Rock. If you're not, keep your filthy hands off it."

Howard told of the incident during the following day on his television show, and the story became legend.

When Hootie Ingram succeeded Howard as head coach prior to the 1970 campaign, Ingram decided that the team would make its final entrance on the field out of the dressing room in the west endzone. In all home games during the 1970 and 1971 seasons and the first four games of 1972 when the Tigers did not run down the Hill, their combined record was 6-9.

The team decided it wanted to come down the Hill once prior to the South Carolina contest during the 1972 season. The result, in a cold, freezing rain, was a 7-6 victory when Jimmy Williamson knocked down a two-point conversion attempt, which preserved the narrow win.

The Tigers have made the entrance for every home game since 1942, except for the years mentioned above (347 times entering the 2011 season).

After final warmups, the team gathers back in its dressing room under the west endzone stands for its final game instructions. Approximately 10 minutes prior to kickoff, the team boards three buses, rides around behind the north stands to the east endzone, and disembarks to the top of the Hill behind Howard's Rock.

At the appointed time, the cannon booms, and led by a giant Tiger Paw flag, the band forms two lines for the team to run between and strikes up "Tiger Rag"...the frenzy starts in all sincerity and usually lasts for three hours.

It is a tradition that has inspired Clemson players for many years.

The everyday activities for the football program moved to Memorial Stadium on July 1, 2009. Tiger coaches moved into new offices in the WestZone of Memorial Stadium that day. A month later, the team made the locker room in Death Valley its full-time facility.

Additionally, a new equipment facility, athletic training facility, and strength training facility opened with all the modern conveniences of an NFL franchise's facility.

The new facility is 142,000 square feet, which adds over 50,000 square feet to previous facilities in the Jervey Athletic Center. It includes a two-floor strength training facility that is 14,000 square feet, among the largest dedicated solely for football in the nation.

"Our program's motto since I became head coach is 'All-In,'" said Head Coach Dabo Swinney. "This facility shows any Clemson football player, recruit, or supporter that our University is 'All-In' with this program. The facility is among the best in the nation and allows our student-athletes to develop and become the best they can be."

The equipment room has been expanded to include, among other items, new offices and a new laundry room that encompasses approximately 6,000 square feet of space. The football staff offices and meeting rooms are composed of approximately 4,000 square feet of existing space and more than 18,000 square feet of new space.

The facility includes offices for the head coach, assistant coaches, and support staff along with position meeting rooms and a 150-seat auditorium with a sloped floor and theater seating.

The training room, located on the north side of the home team's locker room, is expanded to include a new hydrotherapy room, new

offices, and examination rooms. The training room occupies about 6,200 square feet of space as well.

The level-three concourse has been expanded with the addition of the football offices. This space, the roof of the new football offices, is utilized for gameday marketing activities and to provide fans additional space to gather inside the stadium.

In 2011, Phase III of the WestZone project was completed, which added 8,000 square feet of enclosed space on the north side of the second level.

Clemson is committed to building a model sports program - one that propels our University into achieving and maintaining national athletic rankings that rival our competitors. The WestZone project is a major step forward in building a total sports program.

In order to be a consistent contender at the highest level of competition, Clemson must recruit the best student-athletes in the country - student-athletes who can compete both academically in the classroom and athletically on the field. The nation's best recruits are impressed by superior facilities, top coaches, and a strong sense of excitement along with school spirit. The student-athletes desire an environment in which they will have a positive, nurturing experience. It is no coincidence that the quality of recruiting classes has improved dramatically since the WestZone project began in 2004.

Coaching is the most critical component of such an environment. An outstanding coach can sometimes transform meager resources into a good program, but the greatest success comes when top-quality coaching combined with top-quality facilities allows that coach to recruit successfully on a consistent and continuing basis.

Former Clemson running back James Davis, the 2005 ACC Rookie-of-the-Year and now with the Washington Redskins, stated that one of the biggest contributing factors in deciding on Clemson was the University's commitment to upgrading facilities. "Does Clemson want to be a championship program?" asked Davis when he was considering Clemson. "The WestZone (initiative) showed me that it does!"

Building success requires building for success. While the WestZone is located in Memorial Stadium, the completed project provides resources for Clemson's total sports program, permitting all Tiger teams and athletes to compete with the nation's best. Moving all football operations to the WestZone has opened up space in the Jervey and McFadden buildings for the other 18 sports to improve their facilities for recruiting and have more office, training, conditioning, and sports medicine space. This will greatly enhance the overall performance, both on and off the field, for all 19 sports.

A look to Clemson's athletic history shows the importance infrastructure enhancements have on the football program. The following chart summarizes the relationship.

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STRENGTH & CONDITIONING



A significant aspect of Phase II of the WestZone project at Memorial Stadium was the construction of a new strength training facility on the first floor that is adjacent to the Clemson locker room and the Frank Howard Field playing surface.

For the first time, there is a strength training facility exclusively for the development of the Clemson football team. Director of Strength & Conditioning Joey Batson, who is in his 15th season at Clemson, makes sure that all Tiger gridders are ready to compete against the top teams in the nation. In his first 14 years in Tigertown, Clemson has played in 12 bowl games and he has coached 20 strength All-Americans on the gridiron.

It is the fourth major facilities construction since Batson joined the Tiger football program, an example of his desire to keep Clemson at the forefront of strength training.

The new facility has the best in all strength training equipment, not to mention the existence of a new sound system and nine new flat-screen televisions that give Tiger football players a pleasant atmosphere to accomplish the most strenuous work.

The strength training facility actually has two floors. The first has all the free-weight equipment, including a dumbbell area, and the second has cardio-equipment.

Batson has a staff of eight assistants working with the football team. Joining Batson are veteran Strength Coaches David Abernethy and Larry Greenlee along with Graduate Assistants Josh Milner and Adam Smotherman. Five more assistants deal in player development year-round. Those assistants include former Tigers La'Donte Harris, Bobby Hutchinson, Brian Mance, and Damonte McKenzie along with Brandon McCombs.

Since its inception in 1991, the Student-Athlete Enrichment Programs have provided Clemson student-athletes a continued commitment to excellence. Our approach is to address the total student-athlete, and we are committed to coaching our student-athletes to success in the academic, personal growth, career, and community service arenas.

As an original member of the NCAA CHAMPS/Life Skills Program, we provide opportunities and services to address the changing needs and skills of student-athletes during college and after graduation. This program was selected for the FBS Athletic Director's Association "Program of Excellence" Award, a lifetime award recognizing CHAMPS/Life Skills excellence.

Clemson's commitment to provide its student-athletes with the best facilities is evident in many ways. From the soaring upper decks of Memorial Stadium and the beautiful WestZone, to the "New Littlejohn Coliseum," to the state-of-the-art strength training facility, young men and women from all of Clemson's intercollegiate varsity sports have the best in facilities for both training and competition.

The Student-Athlete Enrichment Programs are housed in Vickery Hall, located in the center of campus. The \$3-million structure is as impressive aesthetically as other athletic facilities. But the importance of Vickery Hall to our student-athletes is not found in the structure itself, but in the many programs that the building houses.

Vickery Hall opened in 1991 and was the first facility in the country constructed solely to provide academic support to student-athletes. The two-story, 27,000 square-foot building is open all day and into the evening hours to accommodate student-athletes' extended schedules.

Vickery Hall programs are dedicated to providing a holistic, educational experience by inspiring an environment of respect, integrity, and excellence. Through these services,

Vickery Hall guides and encourages each individual to reach his or her full potential as a student, athlete, and citizen.

Vickery Hall was recently certified (as one of only 19 programs in the country to date) by the National Association of Academic Advisors for Athletics. The tutoring program was certified (as one of only three athletic tutoring programs in the nation) by the College Reading & Learning Association.

Academic Commitment

Ten of Clemson's 19 sports programs had their highest Academic Progress Report (APR) scores on record, including the football team along with the men's and women's basketball teams, according to statistics released by the NCAA in 2011. All 19 programs posted scores of at least

945 and 13 of the 19 were over 975. The APR measures classroom performance of student-athletes for every Division I program. Teams scoring below the 925 cutline can face penalties.

Head Football Coach Dabo Swinney has the highest career APR score (988) among active FBS coaches. Over 90 percent of his seniors that have stayed to the end of their careers have graduated.

In the 2011 spring semester, seven of the 15 programs had team GPAs of at least 3.0 and the overall GPA was 2.90. A total of 227 of its 441 student-athletes were named to the academic honor roll, including 94 on the Dean's List.

The programs that posted a 3.0 GPA or better were the women's swimming & diving (3.59), women's track & field

(3.22), women's soccer (3.22), volleyball (3.14), men's soccer (3.06), rowing (3.03), and women's tennis (3.03) teams.

The number of sports programs with a 3.0 GPA or better is a testament to the impact Vickery Hall and its staff has had on the program's academic performance. Clemson had just five total programs with at least a 3.0 GPA for the eight semesters prior to the facility's opening in 1991. Now there are seven different programs in one semester.

The football team compiled a 2.45 GPA in the spring semester and 26 of the team members had at least a 3.0 GPA. Ten Tigers, including Dalton Freeman and Malliciah Goodman, made the Dean's List, while five Tigers, including Mason Cloy and Dawson Zimmerman, made the President's List. Clemson had six players named to the 2010 Academic All-ACC team, second only to Duke. The list includes Cloy, Freeman, Rashard Hall, and Zimmerman.

Athletic Commitment

Clemson was one of only 10 schools in the nation to be selected to a bowl game, the NCAA Men's Basketball Tournament, and the NCAA Baseball Tourney in 2010-11.

Clemson joined Florida State as the only schools in the nation to advance to a bowl game along with the NCAA Tournament for baseball and men's basketball in three consecutive seasons. It was the 10th year that Clemson went to a bowl game, the NCAA Men's Basketball Tournament, and the NCAA Baseball Tournament in the same academic year.

Seven programs finished the 2010-11 season with a top-25 national ranking. The highest-ranked team to end the season was women's outdoor track & field, which finished #7 at the NCAA Championships. The other sports that finished their respective seasons in the top 25 were women's indoor track & field (#11), women's tennis (#14), rowing (#15), baseball (#16), men's indoor track & field (#22), and men's swimming & diving (#25).

The team of Josipa Bek and Keri Wong advanced to the championship match of the NCAA Tennis Doubles Tournament. The Tiger tandem knocked off two of the top-three national seeds and won a school-record 34 matches together during their historic season, which culminated with the runner-up finish.

Clemson's women's track & field program earned its second consecutive sweep of the ACC women's track & field championships (indoor and outdoor) with a 69.5-point margin of victory in the outdoor meet at Durham, NC in April.

Miller Moss won the NCAA Championship in the heptathlon, the first multi-event title in school history. Brianna Rollins won the indoor national championship in the 60m hurdles with a Clemson-record time of 7.96. Patricia Mamon defended her national championship in the triple jump, becoming only the second female in Clemson history to win more than one individual national championship.

Da'Quan Bowers was one of the most decorated athletes at Clemson in many years, as he was a unanimous first-team All-American, just the fourth player so honored in school history. The junior also won the Bronko Nagurski Award as the top all-around defensive player in the nation as chosen by the Football Writers Association along with the Ted Hendricks Award as the top defensive end in the country.

This brief NCAA rules education is aimed at outlining basic rules to help potential students-athletes, parents, and boosters better understand the regulations. Clemson is committed to recruiting and conducting our athletic program with the highest level of integrity. If you have questions about NCAA rules, contact Clemson's compliance services at (864) 656-1580, our website (ClemsonTigers.com), or via email at compliance-L@clemson.edu.

Are You a Booster?

The NCAA definition of a "representative of athletics interest" generally encompasses most individuals who regularly attend Clemson sporting events (reminder - once a representative, always a representative). Specifically, a booster or "representative of athletics interests" is any individual, independent agency, corporate entity, or other organization that is presently or has ever:

- Participated in promoting the institution's athletic program (such as buying season tickets to sporting events).
- Assisted in providing benefits (such as summer employment) to enrolled student-athletes.
- Assisted or been requested by the department of athletics staff to assist in the recruitment of prospective student-athletes.
- Attended Clemson University.
- Contributed to the department of athletics or IPTAY.
- Participated in or been a member of IPTAY.
- Been otherwise involved in the Clemson University athletics program.

Ask Before You Act

Prospective student-athletes may...

- Identify outstanding potential student-athletes in your area and forward information, such as newspaper articles, to the coach of that sport at Clemson.
- Continue to establish friendships with friends and neighbors, even those with prospect-aged children. However, contact for recruiting purposes is still prohibited.
- Attend, on your own initiative, events such as games and banquets where prospective student-athletes are present as long as you do not contact the prospect(s) or their family for recruiting purposes.
- Answer a call from a prospective student-athlete (you may not initiate the call) regarding only Clemson University in general, but not about Tiger athletics. Please promptly inform compliance services or the coach should this situation arise.
- Make donations to a high school if it is located in your community, the donation is not made at the request of Clemson or Clemson coaches, and the funds are distributed through established channels and not directed towards a specific student-athlete.

Current student-athletes may...

- Continue to come out and support student-athletes at Clemson athletic events.
- Provide summer employment to student-athletes, but only if you contact Clemson's office of compliance services

(compliance-L@clemson.edu) first and the student-athlete is compensated for work actually performed at a rate commensurate with the going rate in the locality for similar services.

What Every Booster Should Know

- **Extra Benefit** - Any special arrangement by a Clemson employee, booster (IPTAY member), or alum to provide a prospective or enrolled student-athlete or their families and friends with a benefit not permitted by NCAA legislation. Examples of prohibited benefits include (but not limited to):
 - Arranging employment for family and friends of the student-athlete.
 - Free or reduced housing agreements.
 - Gifts of money, awards, food/drinks, or other tangible items.
 - Loans of money or automobiles.
 - Professional services without charge or at a discount.
 - Promises of employment or loans following college graduation.
 - Providing transportation for the student-athlete or their friends and family.
 - Use of ATM, credit, or other types of gift cards.
- **Institutional Control** - A central principle of the NCAA by-laws. Institutional control requires that Clemson University conducts its intercollegiate athletics program in compliance with NCAA rules and regulations. This includes booster activities.
- **Prospective Student-Athlete** - A student, regardless of their athletic ability, who has started classes for the ninth grade or any student enrolled at another two or four-year institution.
- **Recruiting** - Any solicitation of a prospect or a prospect's family by Clemson's coaches or representatives of athletic interest for the purposes of securing the prospective student-athlete's ultimate enrollment and participation in athletics at Clemson. Only designated Clemson athletics department staff members may recruit.
- **Student-Athlete** - A student whose enrollment was solicited by a member of the Clemson athletic department

staff or other representative of athletics interest with a goal of the student's ultimate participation in Clemson's intercollegiate athletics program. Student-athletes are not just those who were recruited or receive athletic scholarships, they are also those who participate in intercollegiate athletics.

Activities That Will Harm Prospective Student-Athletes You may not...

- Contact (including phone calls, texts, and email) or interact with a prospective student-athlete or their family for the purpose of persuading them to attend Clemson.
- Contact coaches, guidance counselors, or other school administrators in order to gain information on prospective student-athletes.
- Make contact with a prospective student-athlete or the prospect's family during official or unofficial visits.
- Provide any other extra benefits to prospective student-athlete, family, friends, or their coaches.
- Provide prospective student-athletes or their family and friends with transportation or financial assistance.

Activities That Will Harm Current Student-Athletes You may not...

- Generally provide benefits that are not available to other members of the Clemson student body.
- Provide extra benefits to student-athletes or their family and friends. Examples of prohibited benefits include (but not limited to):
 - Gifts of money, awards, food/drinks, or other tangible items.
 - Free or reduced housing agreements.
 - Loans of money or automobiles.
 - Occasional meals.
 - Professional services without charge or at a discount.
 - Promises of employment or loans following college graduation.
 - Providing transportation for the student-athlete or their friends and family.
 - Sending student-athletes items to be autographed and returned or using autographed items to raise funds for high schools.
 - Use of ATM, credit, or other types of gift cards.
 - Use the name or image of a current student-athlete to advertise, recommend, or promote products or services.

Consequences

Violations of these NCAA, ACC, and University policies can result in severe penalties, including:

- **Disassociation** - Clemson University may permanently disassociate itself with an athletic booster. You could lose the privilege of purchasing season tickets, the privilege of being an IPTAY member, or any other Clemson athletic-related benefit deemed appropriate.
- **Harm to the Enrolled Student-Athlete** - Violations can also result in the enrolled student-athlete or entire team being unable to compete for Clemson University.

The Clemson Tiger Sports Network supplies fans with a full day of broadcast each football Saturday. Each broadcast day has three programs, "Tiger Tailgate Show," "Game Day Broadcast," and "Fifth Quarter Show."

A Tiger tradition since the 1970s, the "Tiger Tailgate Show" is a two-hour entertainment and interactive program.

It is produced on the lawn of Littlejohn Coliseum at the corner closest to Memorial Stadium.

The program begins three hours prior to kickoff on gameday. Roy Philpott, David Stein, Dory Kidd, and Ben Milstead host the show. It is a popular gathering place. Interviews with former players, games, display items, and other exciting action are all a part of the show.

The game broadcast is anchored by Pete Yanity. The sports director at WSPA-TV (Ch. 7) in Spartanburg, SC took over in 2003 after the passing of Jim Phillips, who had been the longtime Voice of the Tigers since 1968. Yanity has been a part of the broadcast team since 2001 as the host of the pregame, halftime, and postgame shows, and as the sideline reporter during games.

Yanity has been the sports director at WSPA the last 21 years. He has also been a sideline analyst

for 15 years on Carolina Panther preseason games and has play-by-play experience with CSS, covering various college events, including Tiger football and baseball games. Yanity is also the voice of Tiger men's basketball and the host of the Dabo Swinney and Brad Brownell Television Shows.

Joining Yanity in the booth is former Tiger offensive lineman Will Merritt, who played for the Tigers from 1998-01. He was a starting offensive guard during the 2000 and 2001 seasons when he was named Second-Team All-ACC.

Merritt worked on the Clemson radio network pregame and postgame shows during the 2002 season. He also

provided color commentary on the television tape-delay broadcasts of selected 2002 games. In 2003, he became the color analyst of the gameday broadcasts.

Patrick Sapp completes the broadcast team as the sideline commentator. The former Tiger quarterback and linebacker (1992-95) is in his fifth season as sideline commentator. As a player, he passed for 2,278 yards in three seasons under center. During his senior campaign, he moved to linebacker, where he totaled 53 tackles and a team-high 5.5 sacks prior to being selected in the second round of the NFL draft by the San Diego Chargers. Sapp is currently a development officer for the Clemson Alumni Association.

As has been the case in the past, the gameday broadcast begins with the Dabo Swinney Pregame Show. Swinney meets with Sports Information Director Tim Bourret to provide Tiger fans with the latest lineup and strategy information. Yanity and Merritt also provide a last-minute scene-setter that includes the latest lineup and weather information.

After the game, fans can tune in to the "Fifth Quarter Show." Interviews with Swinney and Coordinators Chad Morris and Kevin Steele are included. An added feature includes

locker room interviews with Clemson's top players that day. A rundown of stats and audio highlights are also provided.

The network also produces the Dabo Swinney Television Show, a recap of the previous contest's highlights. Yanity serves as the host of this program that gives fans insight into coaches' decisions from the previous game and takes an up-close look at your favorite players.

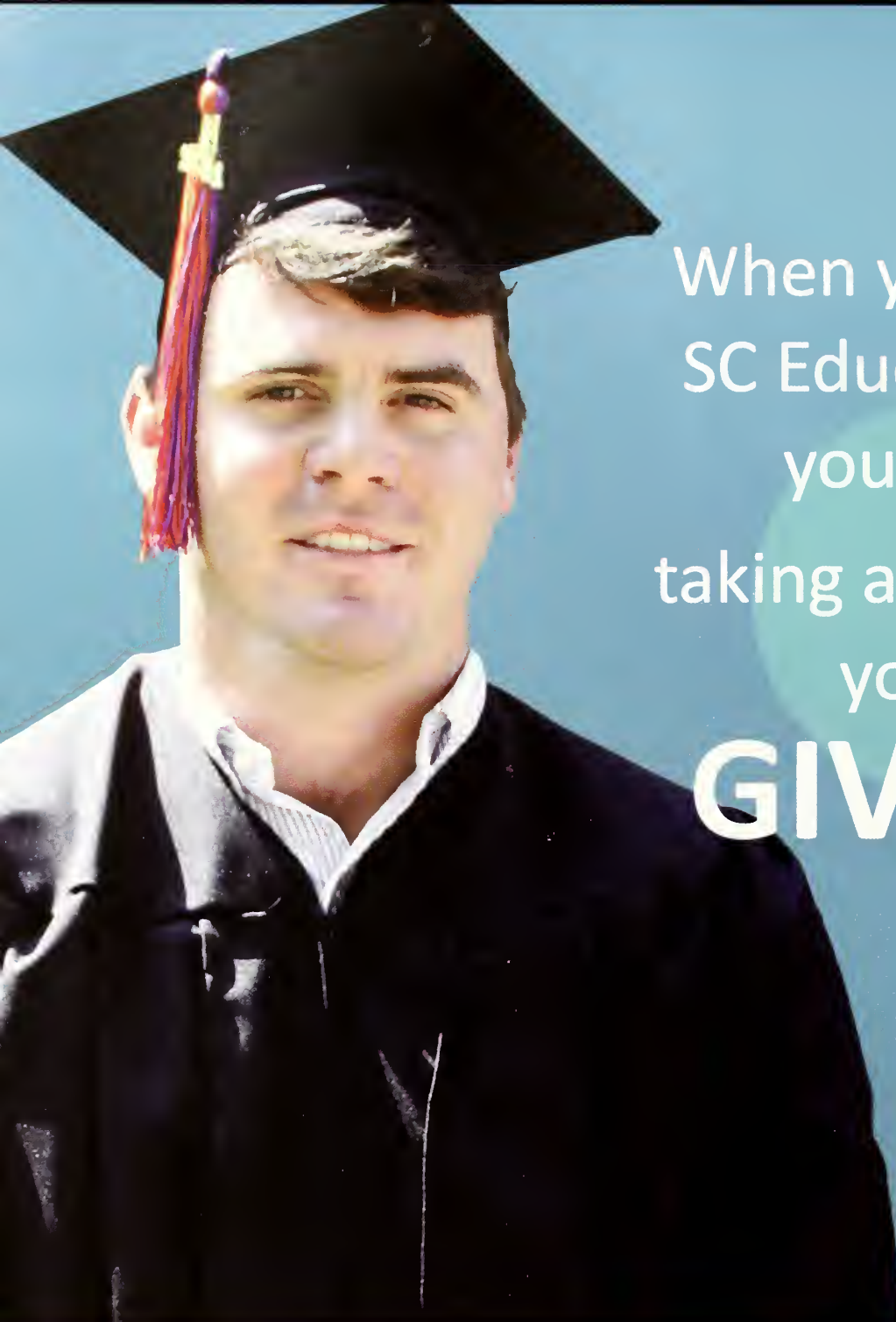

SPENCER ADAMS

THE JUNIOR TRACK STANDOUT IS USING HIS NATURAL ABILITY AND MULTI-SPORT EXPERIENCE TO HURDLE THE COMPETITION.



The first time Spencer Adams set foot on a track, he was a seventh grader at Mint Hill Middle School. He and his cousin, Josh Hunter, joined an AAU program to have fun, but he considered quitting the sport as quickly as he picked it up.

"I tried to quit, but my mom made me keep running," said Adams, a red-shirt junior on the track & field team.

It turned out to be a great decision by Linda Adams. By the time he was in the eighth grade, Adams was already a standout hurdler before moving on to the next level. As a junior at David W. Butler High School in Charlotte, he caught the attention of recruiters nationwide when he broke the North Carolina high school record in the 300m hurdles and defeated current Nike professional Johnny Dutch. Adams still regards that day in Greensboro, NC on May 19, 2007 as one of his fondest memories.

"That particular race was probably my favorite," he said. "That is definitely one of my high points so far in my track career."

His senior track season was one for the ages. Facing some of the nation's best prep athletes, Adams stood above the rest after winning national championships in the 60m hurdles, 110m hurdles, and 400m hurdles. His prowess, not only in track, but also as a safety on the football field, only added to the attention he received during the recruiting process.

Adams signed to compete in both sports at Clemson in February of 2008 as part of a heralded football recruiting class. He red-shirted his freshman season on the gridiron and then suffered a setback late in the fall when he tore an ACL during a scrimmage. Adams sat out the 2009 track season to rehabilitate his knee.

It was a tough time for Adams, who was accustomed to moving back and forth from one sport to the other.

"More than anything, it was a mental setback," stated Adams, whose biggest role model is former teammate and 2011 NCAA heptathlon champion Miller Moss. "But, I still say tearing my ACL was one of the best things to happen to me from that standpoint. Now, I don't let little 'nicks' and bruises affect how I perform on the track."

When he finally did return to the track for the first time in a year and a half, the results were solid. He qualified for the NCAA Indoor Championships in his first season and was an All-American after being the only freshman to advance to the national final in the 60m hurdles. He went

on to make it to the outdoor nationals a few months after earning All-ACC accolades in both hurdle events.

Adams was not fully satisfied with any aspect of his freshman season on the track. Though he was the only freshman to compete at the national indoor final, he fell short of his own lofty expectations.

"Eighth place was not where I wanted to be," admitted Adams. "It was tough coming out after football, because you have to learn the timing and precision necessary to execute in the hurdles. It isn't like straight-ahead sprinting."



Adams experienced a pivotal turning point in his athletic career this past March. After making it to his third straight NCAA Championship meet, he fell short of advancing to the final in the 60m hurdles. At that point, he made a decision to end his football career to focus solely on track. It was one of the toughest decisions he has ever had to make.

"It came down to where I was in my football career versus where I was in track," said Adams. "I needed to focus on one sport so I could put 100 percent of my heart into it. I always went back and forth (between sports), and that was tough."

With his mind focused on track, he began to gradually make changes to his technique in the spring. Most hurdlers approach the first hurdle with eight steps, but Director of Track & Field Lawrence Johnson believed Adams could benefit by doing it in seven. Only elite hurdlers use the seven-step approach, which requires a great deal of strength and explosiveness out of the blocks.

"Coach Johnson thought I had the strength due to playing football, and that instilled a lot of confidence in me," added Adams. "I hated it in the beginning, but I kept working at it and my times suddenly started to drop as the season progressed."

Adams was the ACC's runner-up in the 110m hurdles in April and followed with his fourth straight NCAA appearance in June. He was a second-team All-American after finishing 10th, but he earned a spot at the USA Track & Field Championships in Eugene, OR. There, he ran the fastest time of his life at 13.48 (second-best in Clemson history) in a 13th-place effort that came against a bevy of professional athletes.

With two years of eligibility left, Adams believes he has a legitimate shot at winning an ACC Championship in 2012 and perhaps making a run at a national title as well.

Not bad for a guy who once considered giving up the sport.

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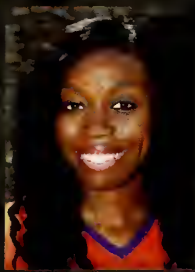

THE TWO-TIME ALL-ACC MIDDLE HITTER IS MAKING A NAME FOR HERSELF WITH HER ALL-AMERICA TALENT AND NIGERIAN ROOTS.



Sandra Adeleye is already a household name in the volleyball world. It's time for everyone else to take notice. Now in her third season with the Tigers, Adeleye has evolved into one of the most-feared volleyball players in the ACC, routinely pulling off spectacular athletic feats. She received All-ACC honors in each of her first two seasons and was named East Region Freshman-of-the-Year in 2009.

What is most impressive about the star, however, is how her Nigerian descent has shaped her personality to one of humility, intelligence, and respect.

The youngest of three daughters of Tokes and Margarret Adeleye, she was born in Atlanta, GA, where her parents settled after meeting through mutual friends.

Both of her parents hail from Lagos, Nigeria. Her mother attended Eastern Washington and went on to become a nurse, while her father graduated from Rutgers and became a pharmacist.

Originally immigrating to the United States because of new opportunities, the family moved to the Houston, TX area when Sandra was five in order to be closer to her father's sister, who had settled in the area with her husband and four children. The remainder of the parents' families still live in Africa. Adeleye's upbringing is a direct result of the types of lessons that her grandparents impressed upon her parents.

"We always joke around that Nigerian parents have no tolerance," said Sandra. "For Nigerian parents, my mom is not very strict, but I think she's strict for an American parent. She just wouldn't stand for fits.

"Her father taught her that it doesn't matter who you are talking to. You treat them with respect, and my parents taught us how to have a general respect for everyone. I would have never been allowed to think I was a 'bigshot'."

Her parents' African heritage has helped mold her into a person who loves the game of volleyball, but it was a high school coach who Sandra now credits as aiding most in her development.

"I give a lot of credit to my high school coach, Karen Paxton," explained Adeleye. "I transferred from a private school and started at Katy High School in 10th grade. She did a lot to build my confidence and change my mindset as far as what I think I can do. When I'm in situations where I think I can't do something, I think about what she would say. She really tested me athletically and mentally."

For Adeleye, volleyball has become her life and she has really blossomed in Tigertown. She earned MVP honors of the Big Orange Bash to start the 2011 season and yet insists that there is more she can do to improve herself every day. She openly acknowledges the challenges of college volleyball, but remains true to how she was raised... showing respect to everyone.

"Volleyball is everything to me," admitted Adeleye. "It consumes by life and I love it. Some days it's very tough, because I've been up all night studying, but I realize I'm very lucky and a lot of people would do anything to be here to do what we are here to do. It's important to remember that I have this great opportunity here to do what I love."

Upon graduation in two years, Adeleye hopes to visit Nigeria and her extended family for the first time. Many of them have made trips to the United States, but she has not been able to cross the Atlantic Ocean yet.

Before she returns to the place that has been such an important influence on her life from afar, Adeleye has a few goals a little closer to home.

"I would definitely like to win an ACC Championship and graduate with honors. As long as I can see some improvement, especially in blocking, I think I'll be okay. When you get too focused on the numbers, it becomes more about 'you'."

Do not take her humility for weakness. On the court, she is unstoppable at times. One instance pops into her mind as being the moment it "clicked" for her.

"It was the Miami (FL) match my freshman year when we were down 2-0 and came back to win on the road. It was the last point of the fifth game, and I had just started playing again and was struggling as far as confidence.

"I looked at Lia (Proctor) and we were said 'We're going to get this block.' And I got it on (Lane) Carico, which was great."

Adeleye posted 18 kills, hit .424, and had seven total blocks in the match.

Adeleye does not do what she does for recognition and is a true team player, keeping an even composure on the court. Although it would be justified to give her the ball every time, she is not in it for personal glory.

"I don't care where the ball goes as long as we score, and I won't complain," added Adeleye. "As long as we win, I don't care about stats. But if we lose, I look at stats to see what I could have done differently."

It is usually not much, but Adeleye continues to improve every day and appears headed to finish among the greats in Clemson history.

Her family - Clemson, American, and African - should all be very proud.

SINCE BEING A KEY COG ON CLEMSON'S OFFENSIVE LINE IN THE EARLY 1980s, INCLUDING THE 1981 NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIP SQUAD, JAMES FARR HAS KEPT A CLOSE EYE ON THE PROGRAM FOR THE PAST 30 YEARS.

James Farr, a three-year starter on the Tiger offensive line, was the anchor on a unit that helped lead Clemson to its best record over a three-year span in history. Farr and his fellow senior class of 1983 went a combined 30-2-2 between 1981-83, including two ACC Championships and the 1981 national title following a 22-15 win over Nebraska in the 1982 Orange Bowl.

Farr garnered both All-ACC and All-America honors in 1983, a season in which the Tigers went 9-1-1. The 1983 team averaged 250.2 yards per game on the ground, which is seventh-best in Clemson history for a season. The 1983 senior class went 19-0-1 in its final 20 games at Death Valley and left Tigertown with a perfect 4-0 record against rival South Carolina. However, it is what his class accomplished as sophomores that still lights up the memories of Tiger fans 30 years later.

Most Clemson fans are quite familiar with the story. The Tigers entered the 1980 South Carolina game with a 5-5 mark, and many predicted an easy victory for the nationally-ranked Gamecocks. It was the first day the Tigers wore the now-famous orange pants and Clemson cruised to a 27-6 win. Many believe it set the stage for the 1981 season.

The 1981 National Championship team is well-known for its stifling defense, and rightfully so. However, the offense of the 1981 team ranks among the best in school history as well. Farr and his offensive teammates finished in the top 10 in Tiger history in plays per game (75.8), yards

per game (391.5), carries per game (58.8), rushing yards (2,977), touchdowns (43), and scoring margin per game (+19.4). Clemson also tallied 12 touchdowns in one game in its 82-24 win over Wake Forest on Halloween.

Clemson defeated three top-10 teams in 1981. To the Thomson, GA native, it was the first of these wins that sticks out.

"Being from Georgia, obviously I was going to hear about the Georgia game when I went home every year," recalled Farr. "It was big for us as a team to beat them in 1981. We lost a close game (20-16) in 1980, and we really felt like we should have beaten them that year. That game was always a hard-fought battle, and 1981 was no different.

"I laughed the other day, because I saw a video from that game. It seemed like every formation we got in was two tight ends, and then we would run between the tackles. Today, you watch games and there are receivers running around everywhere. The game certainly has changed."

Clemson defeated #4 Georgia 13-3 that day, the Bulldogs' only regular-season loss of the Herschel Walker era (1980-82).

Later in the season, #2 Clemson traveled to #8 North Carolina. It was the first meeting between two top-10 teams in ACC history.

"The UNC game was a really hard-fought battle," said Farr. "I remember it was like being on pins and needles



the whole game. Both teams were really good and went at each other the whole day. It was a very good football game, and fortunately we won it 10-8."

The Tigers finished the regular season with an 11-0 record, were ranked #1 nationally, and had a date with #4 Nebraska in the Orange Bowl. It is the aftermath of Clemson's 22-15 win over the Cornhuskers that Farr remembers the most.

"After that game, it really felt like everything we worked for had paid off. Looking back on my four years at Clemson and that season specifically, I think about the work ethic we learned under Coach (Danny) Ford. He drove us to be successful on the field, but he also drove us to be successful when we left Clemson. He drove us to be the best we could be."

Farr on the influence of former Head Coach Danny Ford.

Still an avid follower of the Tigers, Farr currently lives in Cartersville, GA and owns his own business. He still makes frequent trips to Clemson and says fellow offensive lineman Tony Berryhill, Andy Cheatham, and Reid Ingle are former teammates who he stays in contact with.

"I wish I could see more of my teammates," admitted Farr. "It is tough once everyone leaves and scatters out. I am looking forward to our reunion later this season."

Clemson's game against North Carolina on October 22 has been designated as National Championship Reunion Day at Death Valley. Farr, along with many of his 1981 teammates, will be there...30 years later.



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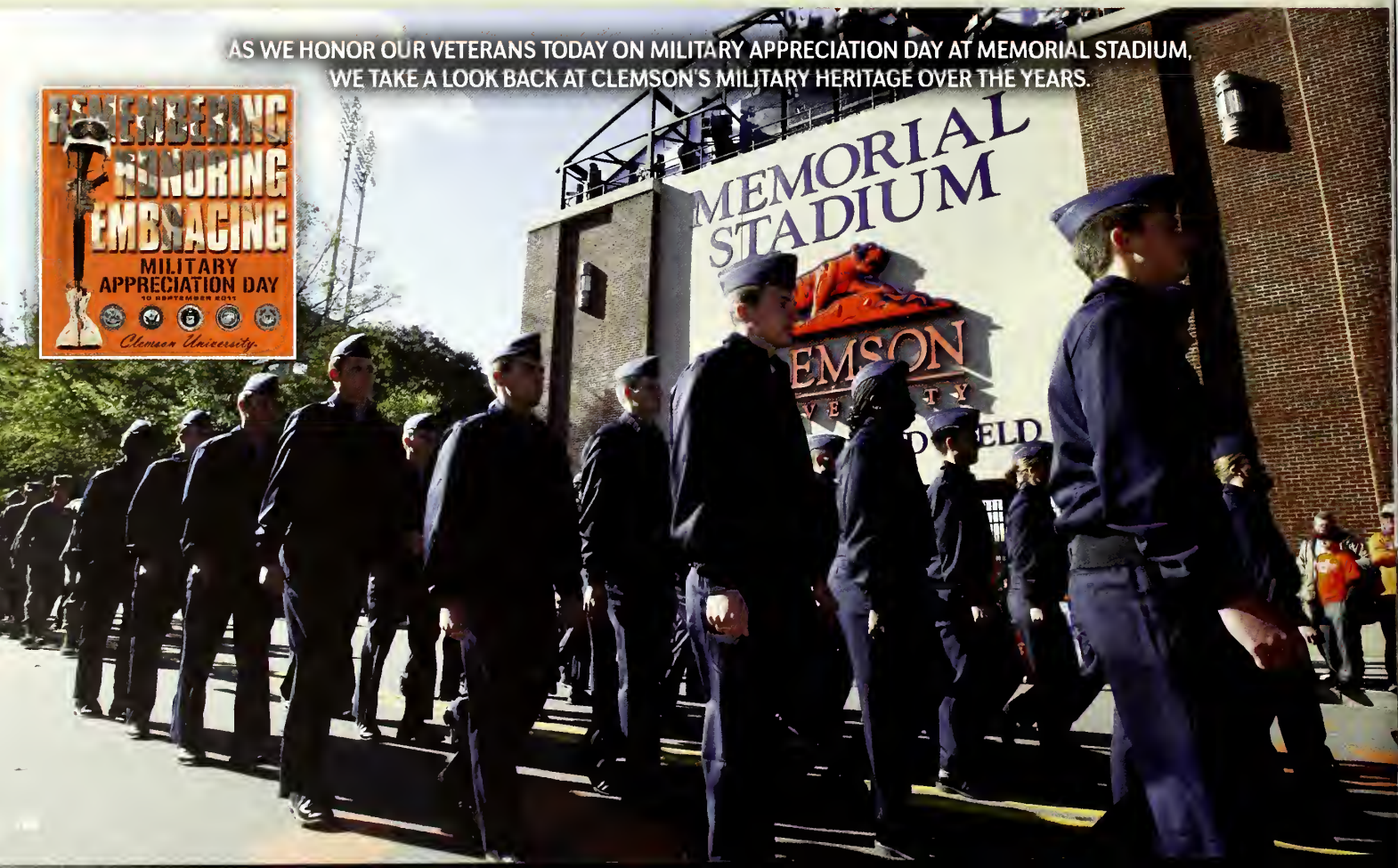
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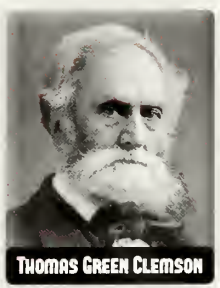

AS WE HONOR OUR VETERANS TODAY ON MILITARY APPRECIATION DAY AT MEMORIAL STADIUM, WE TAKE A LOOK BACK AT CLEMSON'S MILITARY HERITAGE OVER THE YEARS.



Military heritage? You are sitting in it. This is Memorial Stadium. Since it was dedicated in 1942, this stadium commemorates all of Clemson's sons (to this moment, no daughters) who have given their lives in the defense of their country. You are surrounded by it.



THOMAS GREEN CLEMSON

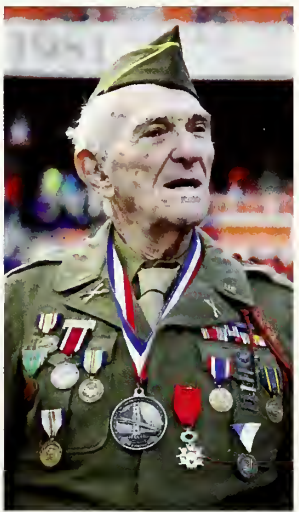
To the east and at the crest of the Hill stands Fort Hill House. Married there were Thomas Green Clemson and Anna Maria Calhoun. Although a revolution (successful) in France may not count, Tom Clemson, or "Giraffe" as he was called by his classmates at the Royal School of Mines (Paris), fought for "liberty" in the French Revolution of 1830.

He later served in the Trans-Mississippi Company in the Civil War. Born in the house was his son, who also was in the Confederate Army. Years later, Mr. Clemson, a widower and a father whose four children had already died, asked three people (two of whom were friends of his) to spend a day with him at Fort Hill to help him decide how best to create the school that Mrs. Clemson and he wanted for the people of South Carolina. Two of those men were also veterans...one, Daniel Keating Norris, had been wounded at the age of 19 and the other, Richard Wright Simpson, was taken ill by camp disease.

Their plan, called The Will, which was written by the veteran-lawyer Simpson, called for seven life trustees. Mr. Clemson, with Simpson's help, chose the initial seven. Five of those men were veterans. Eventually, the South Carolina Legislature chose six more trustees. Several of those were veterans.

Part of their business was to choose the new faculty. The man they chose for president, Henry Aubrey Strode, enlisted at the age of 16 and fought at Gettysburg. Chemistry professor Mark Bernard Hardin had been in the artillery and English literature professor Charles Manning Furman served in the infantry.

The first 442 students (it was the second-largest institution in South Carolina, with Claflin College being the largest) dressed in their West Point gray-wool uniforms on the seventh day of July (note the season of the year and the mode of dress). For the next 71 years, the sons of "dear old Clemson" drilled in the sun and snow while they learned trigonometry, calculus, chemistry, and history from their warrior teachers. When the nation called, the

sons of Clemson went. Seven (at least) went to the Spanish American War, and they all came back.

When President Woodrow Wilson asked Congress to declare war on the Second German Empire in 1917, a senior moved that the senior class present itself to the President as "ready for duty." Although instructed to await orders, half were gone by graduation, leaving their parents to receive their diplomas granted by the faculty with permission of the trustees. A total of 698 (at least) served and 27 died. Two received the Congressional Medal of Honor. One died in Nicaragua in inter-war military action there.

When President Franklin Delano Roosevelt declared war on the Germans, Japanese, Italians, and their allies in 1941, one Clemson alumnus had already died, shot down over the English Channel fighting for "God, King, & Country" during the German "blitz" of Britain. In all, 376 of Clemson's sons died in that war out of the 5,000 who served around the world. One received the Congressional Medal of Honor.

Not included in that total were the faculty, some 105 out of about 300, who also answered their nation's call. Some were in defense-related research in Britain, Massachusetts, Washington, D.C., and other places. Others were in language schools preparing for occupation. But others were on front lines, some wounded and some captured.

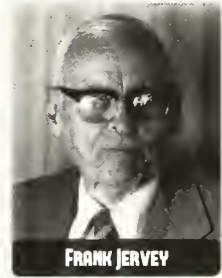
When peace came, they (or many of them) returned to their classrooms. Many have died now and some are buried in the cemetery that lies just to the south of this me-

morial. Think of them as you tailgate. Many others have joined their mothers, fathers, and children in old cemeteries such as Old Stone Church. Remember them as you rush by on Highway 76 on the way home from the game.

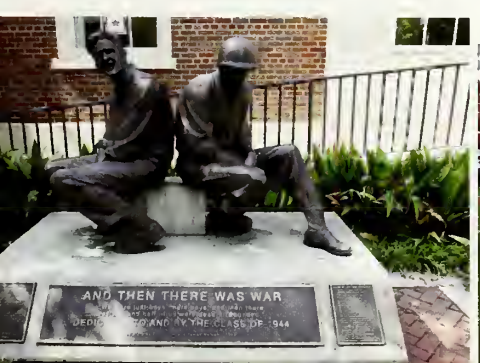
But the enemies of "liberty" could not be restrained. The Korean conflict erupted and 18 died. During the Cuban Missile crisis, another son of Clemson died, the only American death. Then Vietnam claimed the lives of 29 more. I can still see two of them, one industrious with his nose in his book and the other infectiously friendly, now both dead. The Cold War called 23 away forever. And this latest series of conflicts, mainly in the Persian Gulf, still three more.

To the west stands Jervey Athletic Center. It honors one of Clemson's greats, Frank Jervey, who was nearly left for dead in France in World War I. And next to it, the McFadden Building calls to mind a two-time All-American who served in World War II.

So many of the names of Clemson, the streets, the dormitories, and the classroom buildings (especially the classroom buildings) remember those who sacrificed or who willingly offered their lives for liberty, for freedom, and for us. Give thanks and remember.

During his invocation at the dedication for the Scroll of Honor Memorial in April of 2010, retired Col. Ben Skardon, a survivor of the Bataan Death March and one of Clemson University's great war heroes, spoke of "the brave and fateful dead who lived and served and died so that we might live and serve."

Since that dedication ceremony, the Scroll of Honor Memorial has successfully preserved the memories of those "brave and fateful dead." Once a new phase of construction is finished, the living servants who Skardon referred to will also have a place devoted to developing, identifying, and reflecting on their service.

After a five-year investment in time and resources into the Scroll of Honor Memorial, the Clemson Corps is beginning to see its best-laid plans come together. A major expansion is now taking place that will bring the project full-circle and create a venue whose purpose is to reflect on the past and look ahead to the future.

The addition of a Memorial Park to the Scroll of Honor will extend its boundaries to the edge of Fike Recreation Center. The Memorial Park is designed to be a place where Tigers from all walks of life can congregate in solitude in honor of service in all of its various forms.

"The new addition is really about service in any aspect...service as a doctor, service in agriculture, service in business," said Col. Lance Young. "What we want is for

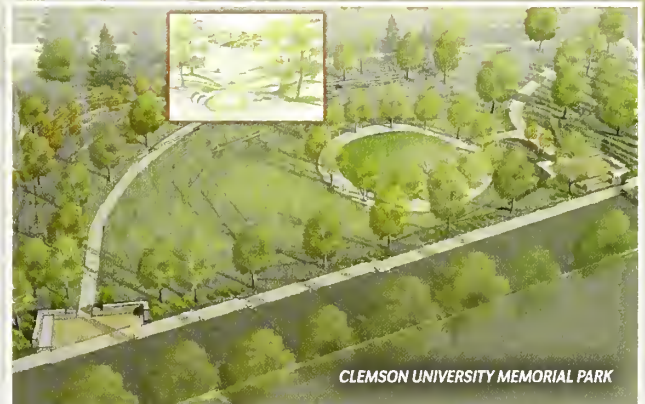
students, alumni, and friends of Clemson to be able to reflect on what they have given back to. It's based around the Scroll of Honor as the focal point."

Construction on the expansion of the Scroll of Honor Memorial has been going on since July and will continue until early next year, when the entire area between Stadium Suites and Fike Recreation Center will become a place to revere Clemson's rich military history, as well as to think about those who continue to fight to protect America's sovereignty.

Last fall, the Scroll of Honor Memorial became an important part of the Clemson gameday experience. Fans and alumni poured into the memorial, either on purpose or out of curiosity, and many left with a deeper appreciation for Clemson's military background and how many lives (479 at last count) have been given throughout history so that safety could be realized by their families.

With the new addition on the site, the purpose of the park expands along with its land area. It will now become a more multi-focused part of Clemson's campus.

When complete, the existing portions of the venue - namely, the Scroll of Honor Memorial and the immediate surrounding areas - will remain virtually untouched. A

walkway will be added that will traverse the entire length of the park, culminating in a reflection point that overlooks the Scroll.

These plans have been in the works for quite some time, but Skardon's words gave the project a focus that has not wavered. The Clemson Corps' commitment to preserve the richness of Clemson University's military background has driven it to spearhead its newest expansion effort with the goal of impacting Clemson people, young and old.

"This is also an area where you can think about the future," added Col. Young. "You can think about the individuals who gave the ultimate sacrifice, and they did it in such a way that many people cannot do it. But, everyone can serve in some way, whether it's helping the school or helping others."

The Clemson Corps has been out in front on this project and has received assistance from a variety of on-campus groups in the development of this newest stage. The Memorial Park committee has also included representatives of the Campus Planning Office, the Development Office, and the sculptors who helped design the Scroll of Honor.

The ultimate goal of the expanded project is to challenge visitors to the park and to stimulate an attitude of service within society, and specifically within the Clemson community. This focus is perhaps the main reason why Military Appreciation Day is celebrated.

As Clemson prepares to honor its current and past heroes during today's game, a reminder of those souls and the sacrifices made across time sits just across Williamson Road.

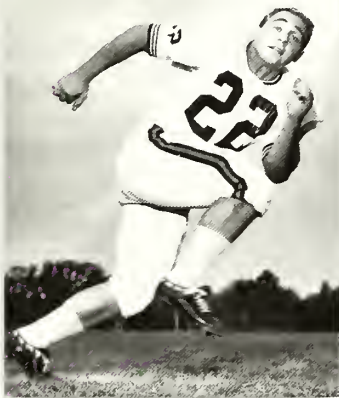
Shad Bryant's 779 Career Punt Return Yards

Clemson's oldest individual record is held by Shad Bryant, a contemporary of Banks McFadden who had 779 punt return yards from 1937-39. Bryant had 779 yards on 65 punt returns in those three years, good for a 12.0-yard average. That is the best punt return yard average among players with at least 50 punt returns. He had just one punt return for a score in his career, so he did not have a lot of big returns to help his average. He was a model of consistency, and combined with McFadden's punting average of over 43 yards a boot, you can see Clemson had a great net punting advantage over its opponents in the late 1930s.



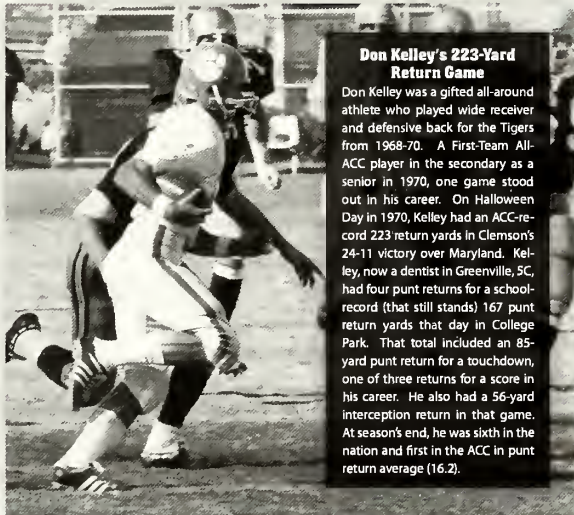
Don King's Freshman Game Rushing Record

One of the more unusual Clemson records is Don King's freshman single-game rushing record. In a game played in The Bronx, NY just a few blocks from Yankee Stadium, King rushed for 234 yards on 33 carries, including over 200 yards in the first half. With all the great young running backs Clemson has had since this November 8, 1952 game, King's figure still stands. King was at the tailback position as a substitute for the injured Billy Hair, the star of the 1952 team. He was healthy the next week, so King went back to a reserve quarterback role. He then played quarterback the following year and never returned to the tailback position. Just as odd, Clemson and Fordham tied (12-12) that afternoon.



Richie Luzzi's 108-Yard Return

This is the only single play on my list. On September 28, 1968 in Athens, GA, the Bulldogs were leading Clemson 16-0 in the second quarter and Vince Dooley's team lined up for a field-goal attempt of 47 yards. Head Coach Frank Howard did not believe Georgia's placekicker could make it from that distance. Instead of putting on a strong rush at the line of scrimmage, he sent 5'8" Richie Luzzi back to the endzone to return a potential short kick. Howard was right, as the kick was short. Luzzi took the ball eight yards deep in the endzone and started up the field. He zigged and zagged his way down the field and concluded his run by skidding on his knees in the endzone for a touchdown, the longest play in Tiger history.



Don Kelley's 223-Yard Return Game

Don Kelley was a gifted all-around athlete who played wide receiver and defensive back for the Tigers from 1968-70. A First-Team All-ACC player in the secondary as a senior in 1970, one game stood out in his career. On Halloween Day in 1970, Kelley had an ACC-record 223 return yards in Clemson's 24-11 victory over Maryland. Kelley, now a dentist in Greenville, SC, had four punt returns for a school-record (that still stands) 167 punt return yards that day in College Park. That total included an 85-yard punt return for a touchdown, one of three returns for a score in his career. He also had a 56-yard interception return in that game. At season's end, he was sixth in the nation and first in the ACC in punt return average (16.2).

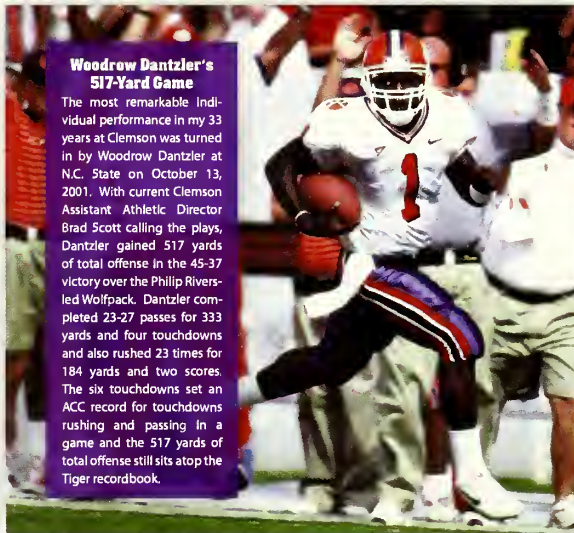
Keith Adams' 35 TFLs & 16 Sacks

Clemson has had many big defensive players who have recorded impressive statistics, but Keith Adams, all 5'11" of him, holds the school record for sacks and tackles for loss in a game and season. Nicknamed "Termites," Adams had 35 tackles for loss and 16 sacks in 1999. His 35 tackles for loss are eight more than any other total in school history. De'Quan Bowers got close to his sack record with 15.5 last year, but Adams' name still heads the list. He had six tackles for loss and four sacks against Duke in 1999 in his top game of the year.



Charlie Whitehurst's 4-0 Record Against South Carolina

While this is as much a team award as anything, Charlie Whitehurst is the only quarterback in the history of the Clemson vs. South Carolina series with a perfect 4-0 mark as the starter. He led Clemson to victory at home in 2002 and 2004 and at South Carolina in 2003 and 2005. In the 2003 contest, he threw four touchdown passes in Clemson's 63-17 victory, among the most pleasant experiences for Tiger fans in history. For his career, Whitehurst completed 77-118 passes for 912 yards and four touchdowns against the Gamecocks.



Woodrow Dantzler's 517-Yard Game

The most remarkable individual performance in my 33 years at Clemson was turned in by Woodrow Dantzler at N.C. State on October 13, 2001. With current Clemson Assistant Athletic Director Brad Scott calling the plays, Dantzler gained 517 yards of total offense in the 45-37 victory over the Philip Rivers-led Wolfpack. Dantzler completed 23-27 passes for 333 yards and four touchdowns and also rushed 23 times for 184 yards and two scores. The six touchdowns set an ACC record for touchdowns rushing and passing in a game and the 517 yards of total offense still sits atop the Tiger recordbook.



C.J. Spiller's 21 Touchdowns of 50+ Yards

C.J. Spiller is the most explosive player in Clemson history and this record gives the best example. The 2009 ACC Player-of-the-Year had 21 touchdowns of 50 yards or more in his career, while the second-highest total is just nine (by his classmate Jacoby Ford). Few records in Tiger history have been more than twice as many as the second-place figure. Spiller finished his career with eight kick returns for touchdowns, including an NCAA-record seven on kickoff returns. He had nine plays of 80 yards or more in his career and had touchdown plays of at least 50 yards four different ways (rush, reception, punt return, kickoff return).

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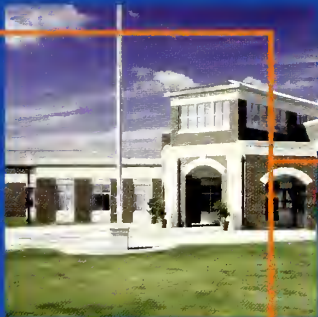
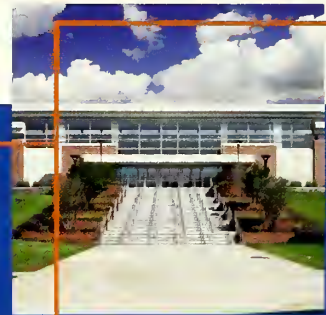
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
