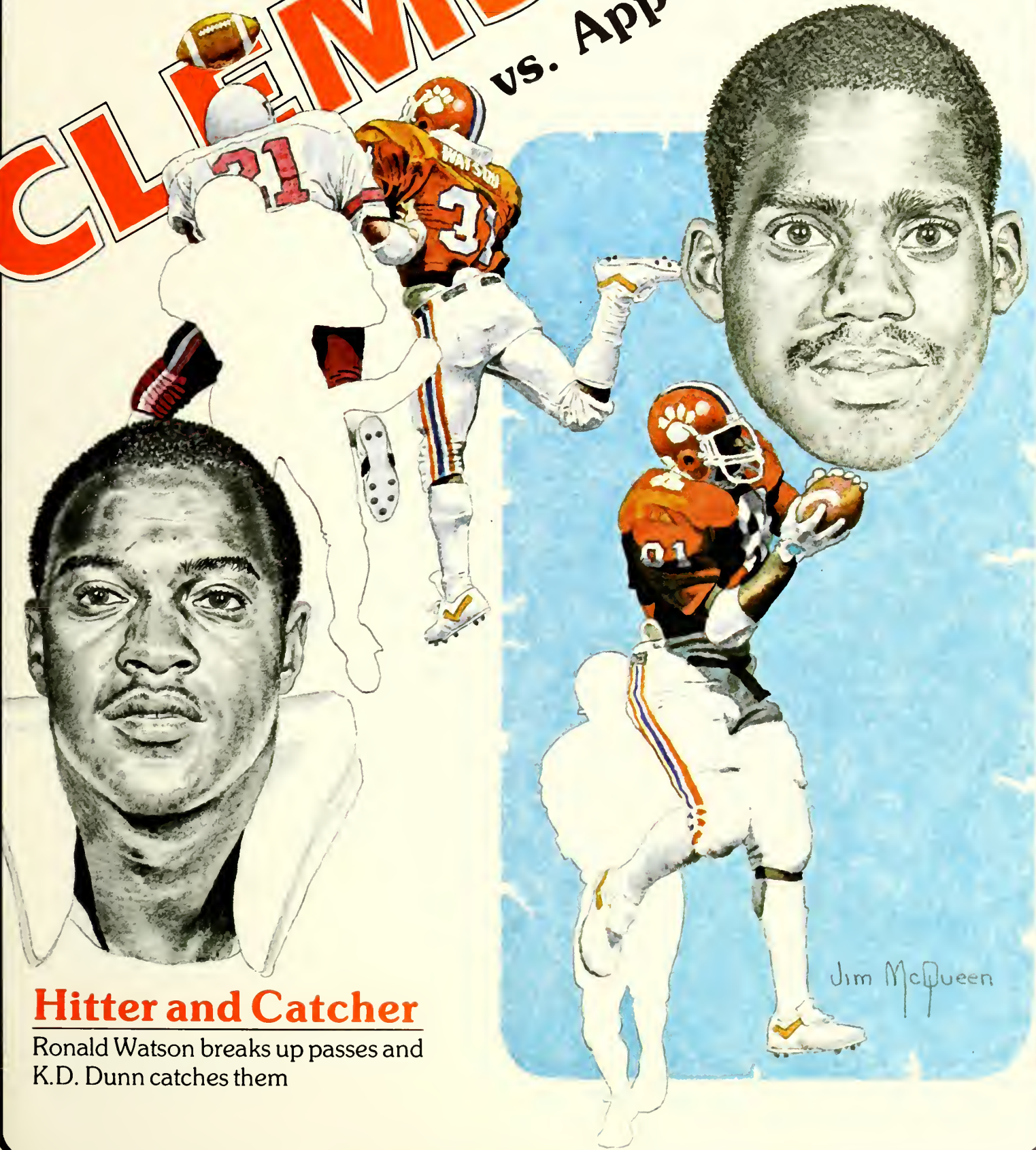

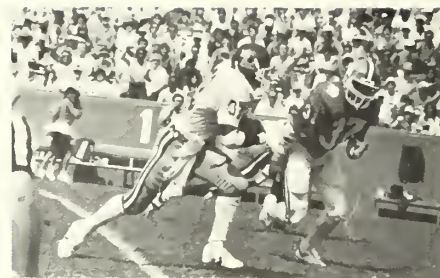

Today's Game

Today's season opener between Clemson and Appalachian State would bore members of the CIA or KGB. There just aren't any secrets, no mysteries to solve and no spys to apprehend. You see, a look at the histories of the assistant coaches involved in this contest reveals many aides who have worked at both schools. The respective scouting reports by the Tiger and Mountaineer staffs must be voluminous.

No less than four coaches in this game have been either players or coaches for both Appalachian State and Clemson. They have considerable knowledge about both school's systems and personnel so there wasn't much of a need to guard the gates prior to practice this week.

Clemson has three assistants with ties to the Mountaineers. Les Herrin was an assistant coach

at Appalachian State in 1980 and Tommy West was in Boone as an assistant in 1980 and 1981. Present Clemson running backs coach Chuck Reedy does not have much of a working knowledge of the current situation with the happy Apps, but he was a member of the Mountaineer football team as a defensive end (at 190 pounds?) in 1969 and 1970 and he graduated from the school in 1971.

In the other camp, Rick Whitt, now secondary coach with Appalachian State, was a Clemson assistant between 1980 and 1983. He probably has the best idea of the personnel of both clubs because he just left the Clemson program last spring and was significantly involved in the defensive area of the Tiger success in the last three years as the coach of the bandits and strong safeties.

Whitt certainly is the man in charge of the Mountaineer gameplan and he has a lot to write

about. The Tigers have been ranked in the Top 10 in every preseason poll and some have the Tigers ranked number-one.

Why all the fuss about Clemson in the preseason this year? The return of nine starters on offense and 15 overall is the major reason. Danny Ford has a player with starting experience in all 11 of the offensive positions and they have been major contributors to Clemson's 30-2-2 record over the last three years.

Mike Eppley is an All-America candidate at quarterback who is one of the best all-around athletes in the nation. He finished second to Michael Jordan in the ACC Athlete-of-the-Year balloting this year and he was third in 1982-83. In 1983 Mike was third in the nation in passing, the highest efficiency rating by a Clemson quarterback in history.

Eppley has plenty of running backs to hand off to when he is not passing. Stacey Driver is the leading returning rusher from last year with 774 yards, while Kenny Flowers had 557 as a reserve tailback. This year the quick and strong Flowers is at fullback and hopefully will run to the same stats Kevin Mack (862 yards) had last season. The offensive line is one of the deepest areas of the team as six seniors return, four of whom should be starters, including Reid Ingle, Andy Cheatham, Dale Swing and Joe Ellis.

The wide receivers got off to a bad start the first day of practice. Terrance Roulhac and Ray Williams, two of Clemson's top three receivers in 1983, had leg or ankle problems on the opening day of practice (August 9), but both should be ready for the opener. Williams, also a starter on the Clemson baseball team, led the team with 19 receptions last year, while Roulhac had 15 to finish third. In between the two was All-ACC tight end K.D. Dunn with 17 receptions and a team high five touchdowns.

Defensively Rick Whitt will warn his Appalachian coaches about Clemson's second-team middle guard on the final 1983 depth chart. William Perry might have been the first consensus All-American who did not start a majority of his team's games. He started only four, but that really didn't matter as the consensus All-American Perry split time with departed senior William Devane almost equally. Perry needs only 13 tackles for loss to become Clemson's all-time leader in that category and has accomplished more playing half the time than most college gridders do in a complete four-year career.

Perry is the grandfather of the Clemson defensive line and must tutor the youngsters on Tom



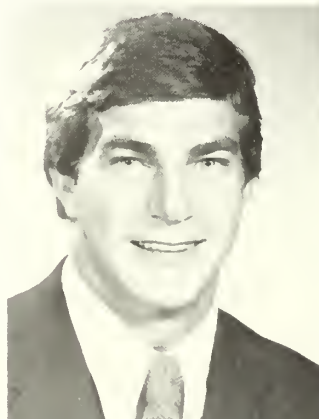

Harper's defense. He must replace four starters from a year ago, including five players who signed some type of pro contract. Terence Mack is returning starter at the important bandit end position, a spot listed as a line position but his job is to generally create havoc for the opposition.

Clemson's linebacker slots are solid with three players splitting time at the two positions. Henry Walls, honorable mention All-American as a freshman, Eldridge Milton, who grew up wrestling aligators near his home in Georgia, and Keith Williams, a red-shirted sophomore from North Carolina, all see plenty of time under Les Herrin.

The secondary must find a strong safety to replace Tim Childers and Jeff Suttle, the players who held down the position for four seasons. Kenny Danforth is an early favorite although Richard Donaldson will be challenging for the slot right up until gametime. Ronald Watson, Ty Davis and Reggie Pleasant are three seniors in the secondary with plenty of experience. All are good hitters.

Last year Clemson opponents threw more than they ran and chances are that will be the situation in 1984. Those three seniors will have their work cut out all year and it will be the case in today's opener. Randy Joyce, the prodigal son of the Appalachian State team, will quarterback the Mountaineers this afternoon.

Clemson coaches were not that worried about defending an experienced quarterback when they met for their summer scouting meetings on the Sparky Woods coached team. No one with a start under their belts was on the roster and that brought smiles to the faces of the Clemson coaches when they thought of the 75,000 Clemson fans that would be waiting in Death Valley for a rookie quarterback.

Joyce was a fifth-year senior who was supposed to graduate at the end of summer school. But, at the end of July he decided to come back to school and play his final year of football at Appalachian State. The real world can wait six more months. Joyce started all of 1981 and 1983 for Appalachian State and red-shirted the 1982 season with an injury. He is ranked in the top five in just about everything at Appalachian State and has a 54 percent career completion figure. In 1981 he was 27-52 against Virginia Tech, so he enjoys filling the air with footballs. We are sure Joyce has viewed Doug Flutie films to boost his confidence against Clemson.

John Settle is another name to follow when viewing the Southern Conference school. He was the league's Freshman-of-the-Year in 1983 as he led the team in rushing, receiving and kickoff returns. He rushed for 613 yards and found time to catch 37 passes out of the backfield, more receptions than all the Clemson running backs had collectively last season. Ed Boyd is one of the finest offensive linemen in the Southern Conference and he was all-league last year at a guard position. He is a three year starter from Charlotte, NC.

Woods' top defensive player came to the mountains of Boone all the way from Rochester, NY. Cedric Felton had 128 stops as a sophomore linebacker last season. A 200-pounder, who has

a lot of spunk and will accept anything to help the team, he played as a noseguard in 1982.

Chris Patton was a second-team All-Southern selection at defensive end last year and finished third on the club in tackles. A native of Gainesville, GA, Patton is a senior who has made 11 sacks over his career and has returned an interception for a touchdown.

While Clemson is a heavy favorite in today's game for many reasons (Clemson has not lost to a Southern Conference school since 1952, and has not lost a game at home or a day-game since

1980), it will be interesting from a coaching standpoint. Appalachian State Coach Sparky Woods is in his first game as head coach and the 30-year-old is the youngest Division I or I-AA coach in the nation. There is a lot of pressure on him with such a large crowd and facing a Top five team. Danny Ford knows what that is like, he was the youngest coach in the nation when he took on nationally-ranked Ohio State in the Gator Bowl when he coached his first game in 1978.

Ford can feel for Woods, but he does not wish him quite as much success as he had in his opener.

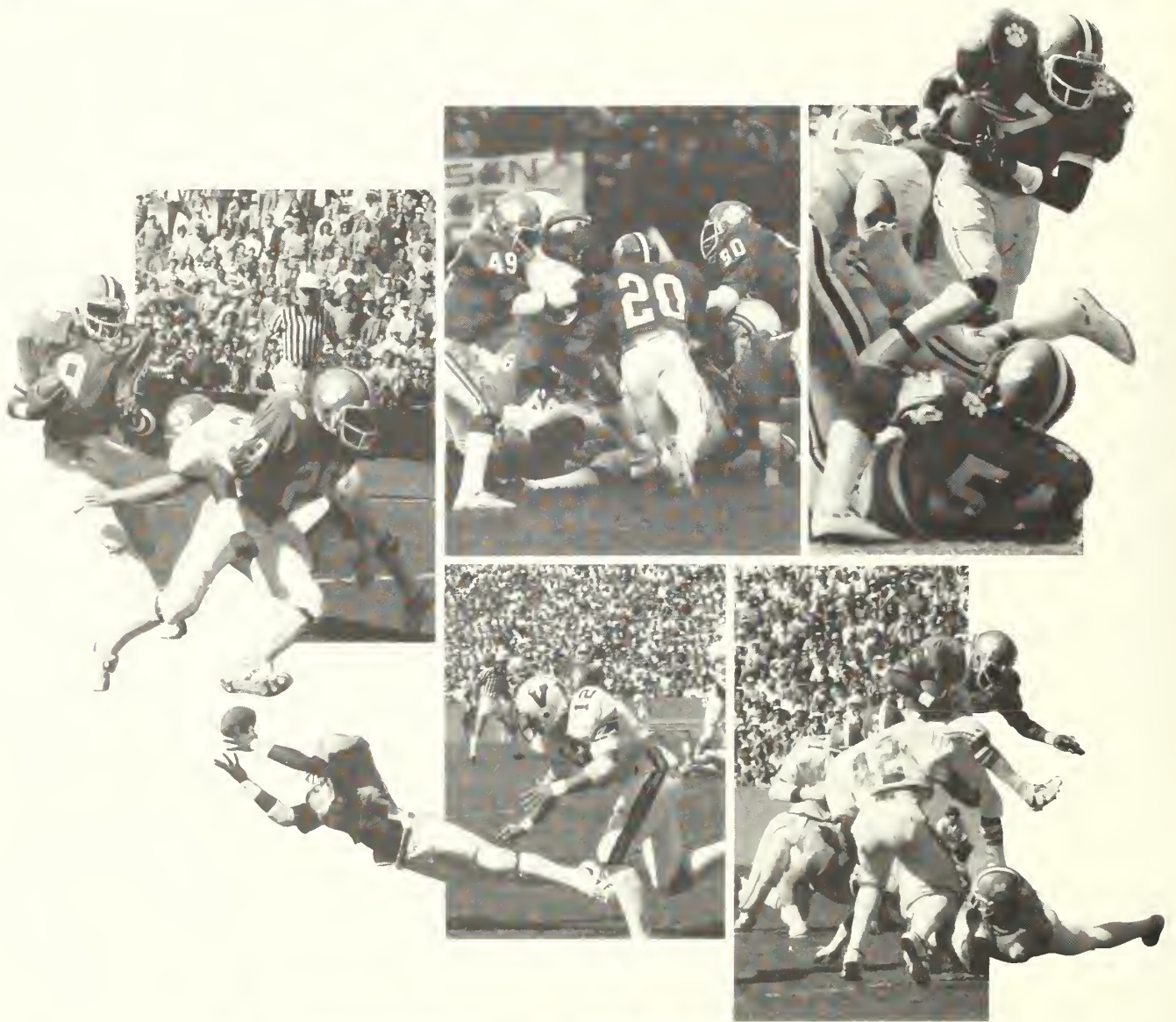

K.D. Means T.D.

It may be the CBS tandem of Pat Summerall and John Madden, or the duo of Dick Enberg and Merlin Olsen, or even the Monday night gathering of Frank Gifford, Howard Cosell and Dandy Don Meredith. It does not matter. They all use the same vernacular when it comes to the tight end.

"And the pass is complete to the 'big tight end' Russ Francis". "White fires another picture perfect touchdown strike to the 'big

tight end' Billy Joe Dupree". "And, it's a 29-yard gainer for the 'big tight end' Bennie Cunningham, the nine-year veteran out of Clemson".

When sports people speak of tight ends the words 'the big' are synonymous with the position. Tradition adheres to this rule as the better tight ends in the country are usually in the 6-2 to 6-6 range and weigh in the neighborhood of 240-260 pounds. Clemson's starting tight end, K.D. Dunn, who stands 6-3 and weighs 230 pounds, is a 'strong tight end', but more so, he is a quick tight end.

In the 40-yard timings last spring, Dunn sprinted the distance in a mere 4.55 seconds. The fleet-footed Decatur, GA, native's time was the fastest one among all the linemen and as fast as many of the running backs. His cat-like quickness has dictated that the offense incorporate more pass plays to be directed to his area.

The Tigers' offensive coordinator Nelson Stokley conveyed this sentiment. "The tight end position has always been an important one, because the opponent is capable of doubling up on our wide receivers. When that happens it leaves the tight end free to pop out for the ball. But, during the two or three years prior to Dunn's arrival we really didn't have a bonafide tight end, thus we didn't utilize the spot to its fullest capacity. Now that we have a tight end that can run like Dunn and catch the ball as well as he does, we are able to use the tight end position to make something big happen."

Dunn made big things happen in 1983, as he led all Atlantic Coast Conference tight ends in touchdown receptions with five. In all, Dunn snared 17 Eppley aerials for 236 yards last season, the most receptions by a Tiger tight end since 1975, when Bennie Cunningham led the team in receptions and was an All-American. During one interval of the season, Dunn had a streak of four straight games in which he caught a touchdown pass, and that streak is the longest span of catching a touchdown pass in Clemson history.

"I didn't know that I had set that touchdown catching record until just then," remarked Dunn. "I'm very excited and happy about the whole thing. It is a real plus for me, but it also gives me another goal to strive for this season."

Tight end coach Woody McCorvey, in his second year at Clemson, has instilled in Dunn the need to set goals. McCorvey believes that once you are on the top you must continue to set goals and constantly improve. "Last season K.D. proved to our opponents that he was capable of getting the job done evidenced by the fact that he was our second leading pass catcher among all receivers. But, he won't be able to let up this year, he needs to go out and pick up where he left off. I'll be expecting a great deal from him because of the outstanding season he had last year," remarked McCorvey.

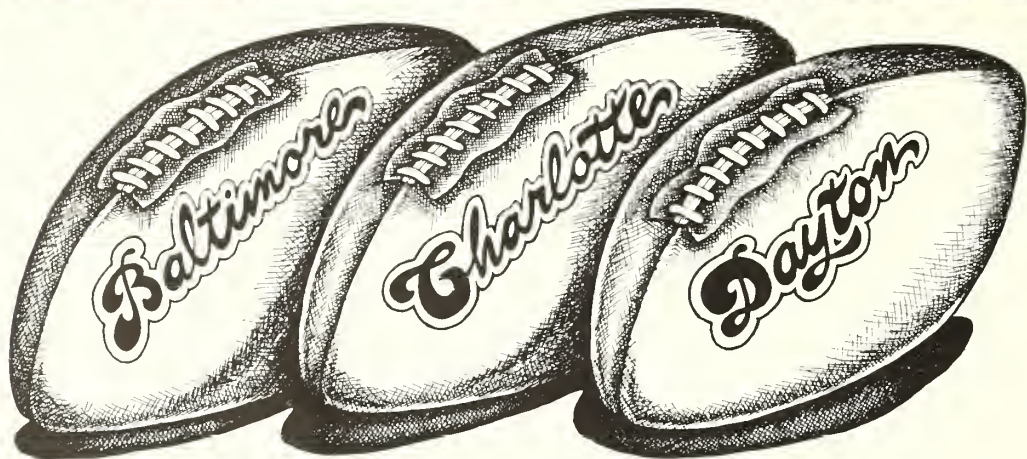
McCorvey continued, "Last season was my first year here and when I originally observed K.D. he had a tendency to 'fight the football'. But, he learned to harness that energy spent on fighting to catch the ball and direct that energy towards tucking the ball away and picking his way through the defenders. At first glance K.D. has the appearance of being lackadaisical, but he's definitely not that. He is so fluid in his motions that they appear almost effortless."

Dunn, an industrial education major, would be an excellent cost accountant, because he is so efficient, no motions are ever wasted. He definitely doesn't waste time away from football either. Dunn is an active member of the Omega Psi Phi Fraternity on campus.

Dunn explained, "I really enjoy being in the fraternity. It provides me an excellent outlet from football. We do many projects to serve the community. During Thanksgiving we sponsor a basket drive for underprivileged families, and we also sponsor a big-brother program. My little brother is Nathan Jackson, a student at Morris Elementary here in Clemson. Every once in a while the fraternity will go over to the school and visit our 'little brothers'. We even take them to some Clemson basketball games. All in all it is a very rewarding experience."

While he is not overly huge as pro tight ends go, he is a 'big tight end' on the Clemson team because of his contributions and impact on the offense. Dick Enberg might be calling K.D. the big wide receiver in 1985 because of his speed, but whatever level of pro football he is involved in, K.D.'s little brothers will be watching.

Poll Potpourri

"Who's number-one!"

That's the phrase that motivates all college athletes, whether they shed sweat as a volleyball setter, a soccer striker or a basketball center. Every sport, college or pro, honors a champion through a championship playoff or tournament, with one exception, college football.

Not coincidentally, college football carries as much national attention as any division of a sport, and it is the means by which we answer the question cited in the first line of this article that sits at the crux of this matter. The champion of college football is determined by, in essence, opinion.

The poll, an American institution of national data that determines the rate of success of actors, actresses, and presidential candidates, also makes or breaks the college football teams and at season's end the team with the highest rating is declared National Champion. It's been that way since 1936 when Alan Gould, an Associated Press editor, started this popularity contest for football teams. Many have tried to change the system, and start a playoff format but none have succeeded in the 115 years of college football.

The AP poll is the Phil Niekro of college football polls and it has the highest level of credibility. That level is about to leap forward at a swift rate, thanks to the work of Lowell R. Greunke.

A librarian in Oklahoma, Greunke labored for years in microfilm and found every weekly Associated Press poll back to its inception on October 19, 1936 when Minnesota was the first number-one team. Greunke's efforts will give AP writers, publicists and national magazine authors

an unlimited amount of facts about the history of ratings and make the AP ranking the Xerox of college football polls.

"College Football has become America's most popular spectator sport," said Greunke, who will forever have a soft spot in the hearts of college sports information directors. "Football fans everywhere engage in heated discussions in bars, at work, at the supper table and elsewhere. The focal point is this: Just who is the best college team in the country? Depending on where the discussion takes place, you might receive 20 different answers ... every school has its staunch supporters who are willing to fight anyone who doubts that their team deserves the number-one ranking."

This is the year of Trivial Pursuit and fans of this game who follow the college grid sport must buy one of these books. Not only does it contain every weekly poll in history with a complete summary of points and first place votes, it contains countless tables concerning consecutive times ranked, consecutive times rated number-one and all-time weekly ranking (see page 65 for Clemson's rankings) for every school.

For example, did you know:

- A) Clemson has been ranked 132 times since the first poll in 1936.
- B) Clemson has been ranked 37 times since Danny Ford became head coach.
- C) The Tigers have been ranked in the final Top 20 poll 12 times.
- D) Clemson was first ranked in an AP poll on November 13, 1939.
- E) The Tigers have been ranked in the Top 20 preseason poll eight times.



Everyone wants to be National Champion.

Herschel Nissenson, AP's national sports editor for college football, is pleased with the publishing of this book. "This book should further enhance our poll," said Nissenson who has been responsible for the poll since 1969. "We like to think of our poll as the most prestigious and the most widely accepted and this book will help us in that area. We will be able to generate so many more facts to enhance our national stories on the poll and college teams."

One of Nissenson's duties is to manage the poll that is viewed with great anxiety when it is released every Monday evening or Tuesday morning. There are 60 sportscasters and sportswriters from around the nation who vote weekly. The poll is truly national as each state gets 1/2 a vote for every Division I-A school in the state. Thus, in South Carolina, one writer votes in the poll because there are two Division I teams, Clemson and South Carolina. There are 57 local writers who are involved, and ABC television, *Sports Illustrated* and *USA-Today* get one vote each to make the total 60.

Nissenson's tabulation is not as difficult as it may seem. He does not have to chase down every vote every week. "Starting Sunday evening local AP correspondents get their area man's vote and he sends it to me in New York on an in-house message system," said Nissenson. "I really just spend Monday afternoon working on the poll. Ninety-nine percent of the polls come in on the message system so I don't do much phone calling."

Nissenson has been doing the poll for 15 years and feels it is a major contributor to the interest of college football. "As long as we don't have a playoff system, and it appears that will be the case in light of the recent NCAA convention, the poll will be the accepted measure of excellence in college football. It certainly creates interest. But, even if we go to a playoff system the polls won't die because they will be used to determine who gets into the playoffs. There won't be automatic qualifiers from conferences because the playoff can't possibly have a great number of teams."

Polls certainly create enthusiasm. Clemson has been ranked in the Top 10 in every preseason poll this year, a first for the Clemson football program. Fan interest is at an all-time high as the Clemson ticket office has sold more season tickets than ever before.

The polls in magazines, newspapers and television networks created great mid-summer interest and they have given Clemson fans reason for optimism. But, most of them know the poll that really counts is the final AP poll in January. That's the one poll Danny Ford pays attention to.

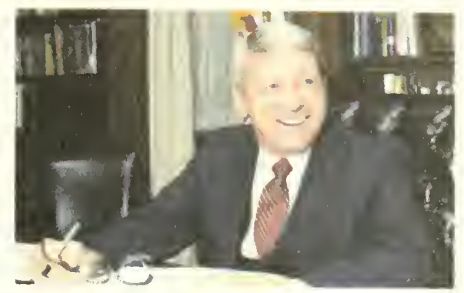

President Bill Atchley



Clemson President Bill L. Atchley has an impressive list of credentials and accomplishments. He is also known as a very down-to-earth, plain-spoken individualist. In one of his frequent banquet introductions, he was recently described this way: "This man is an aggressive administrator, a supersalesman, an innovative educator, and a talker of good plain common sense."

Since coming here in 1979, Bill Atchley has steered Clemson on a steady course toward becoming one of the Southeast's preeminent universities. Under his leadership Clemson is also making great strides in developing practical science and technology and adapting it for the good of all South Carolina. But in talking about what has been done at Clemson in the past five years, Bill Atchley always puts the emphasis on "we", not "me." And here is some of what Clemson has accomplished during the Atchley tenure:

- launched strategic planning to develop "centers of excellence," academic programs where Clemson will aim for a national reputation.
- obtained a \$1 million Center for VLSI Reliability Research, making Clemson the nation's headquarters for reliability research on "very large scale integrated circuits," a key component of the so-called "supercomputers" of the future.
- established the \$1 million Abney Chair of Free Enterprise in the College of Commerce and Industry.
- established the Engineering Center for Automated Manufacturing Technology to study robotics and other automation technology.
- established the S.C. Energy Research and Development Center.
- established the Energy and Resource Development Institute, which investigates the management and development of energy resources in the entire Southeast.
- joined with the S.C. Research Authority to create a 210-acre research park near campus to attract high technology industries.
- unveiled plans for The Strom Thurmond Center, a \$25 million complex that will contain a performing arts building, a continuing education center, and an institute of government and public affairs.
- launched a multi-year, multi-million-dollar project called "Challenge to Greatness" to raise funds to bolster academic programs and enhance the University's total educational experience.

Also during this period the 15,000-seat upper deck project for the north stands in Memorial Stadium got the nod, and despite four years of one of the nation's worst recessions, Clemson University with Bill Atchley at the helm has raised \$18.3



million in private funds for academic programs and boosted the assets of the Clemson Foundation from \$3.4 million to \$10.3 million.

A Missouri native, Bill Atchley has an ideal background to lead Clemson - a unique blend of education and experience. He holds B.S. and M.S. degrees in civil engineering from the University of Missouri and an engineering doctorate from Texas A&M. He spent 23 extremely successful years as a college professor, administrator, and engineering dean at the University of Missouri and at West Virginia University before coming to Clemson in 1979. He still owns and oversees operation of a productive 500-acre farm near his birthplace in southern Missouri.

Clemson's president is well-known for his work in the energy field. He was chairman of the Governor's Commission on Energy, Economy and Environment in West Virginia and has served as science and energy advisor to five governors in three states. He holds national-level appointments on the Committee on Fossil Fuels of the U.S. Department of Energy and on the board of directors of the Great Plains Coal Gasification Project, which has federal loan guarantees of \$1 billion. At WVU he directed a group that brought a \$24

million "fluidized bed" research facility to that campus, and he led a West Virginia business team whose efforts resulted in the selection of the Morgantown area for a \$700 million coal conversion plant. He also managed to find time to serve as budget officer for a \$63 million Personal Rapid Transit System.

From 1966 to 1975 at the University of Missouri-Rolla, Bill Atchley was the coordinator and liaison between the engineering school and inner-city projects in St. Louis. He also developed the program for the school's doctor of engineering degree, and he designed its professional development degree.

President Atchley has received many honors stemming from his work in engineering and higher education. He is in Who's Who in Engineering Education and is a member of the Academy of Sciences and Outstanding Educators of America. His publications show him to be a leader in assessing society's needs and determining how education can best help the nation and the world.

At one time or another he has been a town alderman, a Rotarian, Chamber of Commerce director, Lions Club member, and local council director for the Boy Scouts of America. He has been chairman of the American Society of Engineering Education in the Midwest, chairman of the Council of Presidents for all public colleges and universities in South Carolina, and is on the board of directors of the American Federal Savings Bank. He is the only college president in America serving on the prestigious U.S. International Sports Committee, whose members include three professional sports commissioners, the president of the American Baseball League and U.S. Olympic Committee, and the publisher of *Time* magazine.

An active sports enthusiast, Bill Atchley has a superior knowledge of athletics. His expertise is especially proficient in baseball. Before his college days and a stint in the Army, he spent two years as a professional baseball pitcher for the former New York Giants organization. He is one educator who understands intimately the concept of the student-athlete. He himself was an athlete who attended college on an athletic scholarship, yet he recognizes that the role of a university is to build character and to increase knowledge and intellectual abilities in students.

President Atchley and his wife, the former Pat Limbaugh, have three children. Julie is a 26-year-old graduate of Southeast Missouri University and is a special education teacher in the St. Louis school system. Pam, 22, was graduated from Clemson with a degree in engineering last May, while David, 18, is a freshman at Wofford College.

Athletic Director Bill McLellan



No major university that stresses academic achievement by student-athletes as Clemson does has had a more dynamic, aggressive and forceful impact on the Atlantic Coast Conference and on national intercollegiate athletics in the last 14 years.

That success, across-the-board, in all sports and in the development of funding for a self-sustaining athletic program, parallels the administration of Bill McLellan as athletic director at Clemson University. Working his way up through the ranks after joining the Tiger athletic staff in May 1958, McLellan took on the task of running the whole show in February 1971. Since then the sports information people have not had the luxury of consistently using file photos or existing text

material to depict the Clemson athletic complex. At Jervy Athletic Center nothing is more consistent than change.

Brick and mortar, additions to facilities, aesthetic improvements, innovative funding techniques, new ideas and fulfilled dreams have kept writers and cameramen busy chronicling the astigmatic success and growth of Clemson athletics.

In 1971, as McLellan charted a course for athletic excellence, IPTAY was providing \$400,000 annually for scholarships. Today it is reaching \$5 million a year for athletic and academic enrichment. As Executive Director of IPTAY, McLellan insists that his fund raisers maintain an endowment to assure that all commitments to Clemson

athletes who wear the orange and white are met.

He has blended private support, gate receipts and consortium with state banks to make Clemson Memorial Stadium the showplace for a national football champion. Soccer, baseball, tennis, swimming, track, and wrestling all have facilities that others seek to emulate. In Littlejohn Coliseum, NCAA and NIT banners proudly proclaim that excellence in the two major revenue sports, football and basketball, can coexist. In all, Clemson competes in 17 NCAA Division I programs – 11 men's and 6 women's – and conference titles, as well as national ranking are growing consistently in number. Record crowds watch the Tigers in action personally and millions more see the excitement of paw power on regional and national television.

Bill McLellan's theory for success is simple ... "the Clemson family." He asserts that those who care for this Institution – alumni, friends, business and industry – can accomplish any task, meet any goal so long as they pull together in the best interest of Clemson University.

The pace he sets belie his 52 years, but his wife, Ann, will attest to his busy schedule that allows few opportunities for an afternoon on the lake, a family gathering or a quiet evening at home. But there's not a closer "Clemson family" than Bill and Ann Rogers McLellan, daughter Susy, a Winthrop alumna, Cliff and Bill, Clemson grads and Arch Anna, now a senior at Winthrop.

A native of Hamer, SC and a Dillon football recruit of Frank Howard, McLellan earned two football letters at Clemson and was on the 1952 Gator Bowl team. He earned his bachelors degree in 1954 and added a masters in agricultural economics in 1956. In June 1982 the Clemson University Alumni Association recognized him with the highest honor it can bestow – the Clemson Alumni Distinguished Service Award. Bill McLellan, an AD's AD who sees the forest and the trees at the same times.

Head Coach Danny Ford



What do Oklahoma's Barry Switzer, Penn State's Joe Paterno, Nebraska's Tom Osborne, Clemson's Danny Ford and Michigan's Bo Schembechler all have in common? Sure, they're all head football coaches in Division I colleges, but there is one other thing that puts these men above the other 98 head coaches in Division I-A schools.

When it comes to winning football games, they are the nation's five best, and it seems only fitting that Clemson's own Danny Ford would be ranked fourth on that list. After just six years as Clemson's head coach, Ford has a .793 winning percentage.

Ford and the Tigers have also won 91.2 percent of their games over the past three seasons, the best three-year record in the nation and the best three-year record in Clemson history.

And the achievements continue. The Tigers have totally dominated the ACC, winning their last 19 games against conference foes. Only Nebraska can claim three straight seasons of undefeated play against its conference teams.

It's no wonder to Clemson fans that Ford has been ranked as one of the nation's best coaches. The 36-year-old Gadsden, AL, native came to Clemson in January, 1977, as

assistant head coach and offensive line coach under the then head coach Charley Pell. Then December 10, 1978, Pell relinquished the head coaching duties of the 1978 Gator Bowl to Ford, and since that time the Tigers have compiled a 45-11-2 record.

But Ford did not discover his winning attitude at Clemson; he brought it with him. Including his years as a player at Alabama under the late Bear Bryant, he has been associated with college football for the last 18 years. Fourteen of those clubs have had winning records and 11 have gone to bowl games. Additionally, the 18 teams have had a record of 124-47-3, a .720 winning percentage.

Ford came to Clemson and promptly led the Tigers to their first ever national championship in 1981 – the pinnacle in college football. He was deservedly named national Coach of the Year by United Press International, Station WTBS in Atlanta, Pigskin Club of Washington, American Football Coaches Association, Washington Touchdown Club, Columbus (Ohio) Touchdown Club, Atlanta Touchdown Club and Football Writers Association of America. He was also the youngest coach (33) ever to take a team to the National Championship.

Since that time the Tigers have posted a winning percentage of .912, losing only two games in three years. Crowds filled Death Valley so often to watch Clemson defeat teams during the last six years that the stadium has been enlarged twice and is now the nation's tenth largest stadium and South Carolina's largest, seating 78,915.

With this list of accomplishments, it is easy to see that the Clemson University Board of Trustees was right when announcing that Ford should take the reigns of head coach six years ago. The Board's Student Affairs Committee considered only one name for the job and after two meetings between Ford and the committee on the morning of December 5, 1978, it was the unanimous opinion of the committee that Ford should be named as Clemson's 21st head coach. Nearly 40 years after hiring 31-year-old Frank Howard, Clemson had hired a gifted 30-year-old Alabama graduate to lead the Tiger forces on the gridiron.

Ford began his association with college football in 1967 when he started for Bear Bryant as Ken Stabler's sophomore tight end. He played three years for Bryant (including three wins against Clemson) and was an All-Southeastern Conference choice, All-SEC academic selection and team captain during his senior season.

After receiving his B.S. degree in industrial arts in 1970, Ford remained at Alabama as a graduate assistant for the 1970 and 1971 seasons. Upon earning a master's degree in special education in 1971, he was made a full-time assistant under Bryant for the 1972 and 1973 seasons. The Tide went to four more post-season games while Ford was on the staff.

Ford then accepted a position as an assistant coach on Jimmy Sharp's staff at Virginia Tech. He remained in Blacksburg for three seasons (1974-1976), before he came to Clemson under Charley Pell, who had just been named the Tigers' head coach. Pell and Ford had served together on the VPI staff for two seasons.

And only 23 games later, Ford became head coach of the Tigers at age 30, the youngest Division I head coach in the nation, and went on to prove that age has nothing to do with experience or winning.

Assistant Coaches



Don Denning is in his fourth season with the Clemson staff. The deep secondary coach and north Georgia recruiter joined the Tigers on July 1, 1981. He has previously served Western Carolina as defensive coordinator and assistant athletic director, Memphis State as assistant head coach, and Delta State University as head coach. Denning graduated from Presbyterian College in 1960 and received a master's degree from Western Carolina in 1969.



Tom Harper, the Tigers' assistant head coach, came to Clemson from Virginia Tech's coaching staff on Feb. 2, 1981. The native of Piqua, OH served as the defensive coordinator for Virginia Tech, North Carolina, Iowa State and Wake Forest, where he was head coach in 1972. Harper graduated from the University of Kentucky in 1955 and received his master's degree at the same school in 1958. Eight of his former players have signed pro contracts in the last three years.



Les Herrin has coached the Tiger linebackers for the past three years. He is also responsible for recruiting the lower part of South Carolina. He joined the staff on Feb. 9, 1981 from Appalachian State where he was defensive coordinator. The 1971 Western Carolina graduate captained the Catamounts in 1970 and was named the team's MVP in 1971.



Lawson Holland was a reserve quarterback for the Tigers from 1970-73, which makes him the only current coach who played Clemson football. In his seventh year, Holland is in charge of receivers and recruiting Virginia, Washington, D.C., and central North Carolina. The Mooresville, N.C., native earned his B.A. in secondary education from Clemson in 1975.



Woody McCorvey is the newest member of the Tiger coaching staff, he is in his second year of coaching the tight ends. He came to Clemson from Alabama A&M where he was the defensive coordinator for four years. The 1972 Alabama State graduate lettered four years in football at the school before earning his physical education degree. He then received a masters degree in health, leisure and sports from the University of West Florida in 1977.



Chuck Reedy has coached Clemson's running backs for the last six years. The St. Augustine, FL., native also recruits for the Tigers in southeast South Carolina, south Georgia and Florida. He earned two letters in football from Appalachian State where he graduated in 1971 with a degree in health and physical education. He came to Clemson from Kentucky on July 5, 1978.



Nelson Stokley has been the Tigers' offensive coordinator for the past four years. He came to Clemson on January 18, 1980 after serving as offensive coordinator for Virginia Tech. The 1968 graduate of LSU was the school's starting quarterback from 1965-67 and then served the fine southern institution as an assistant coach from 1968-75.

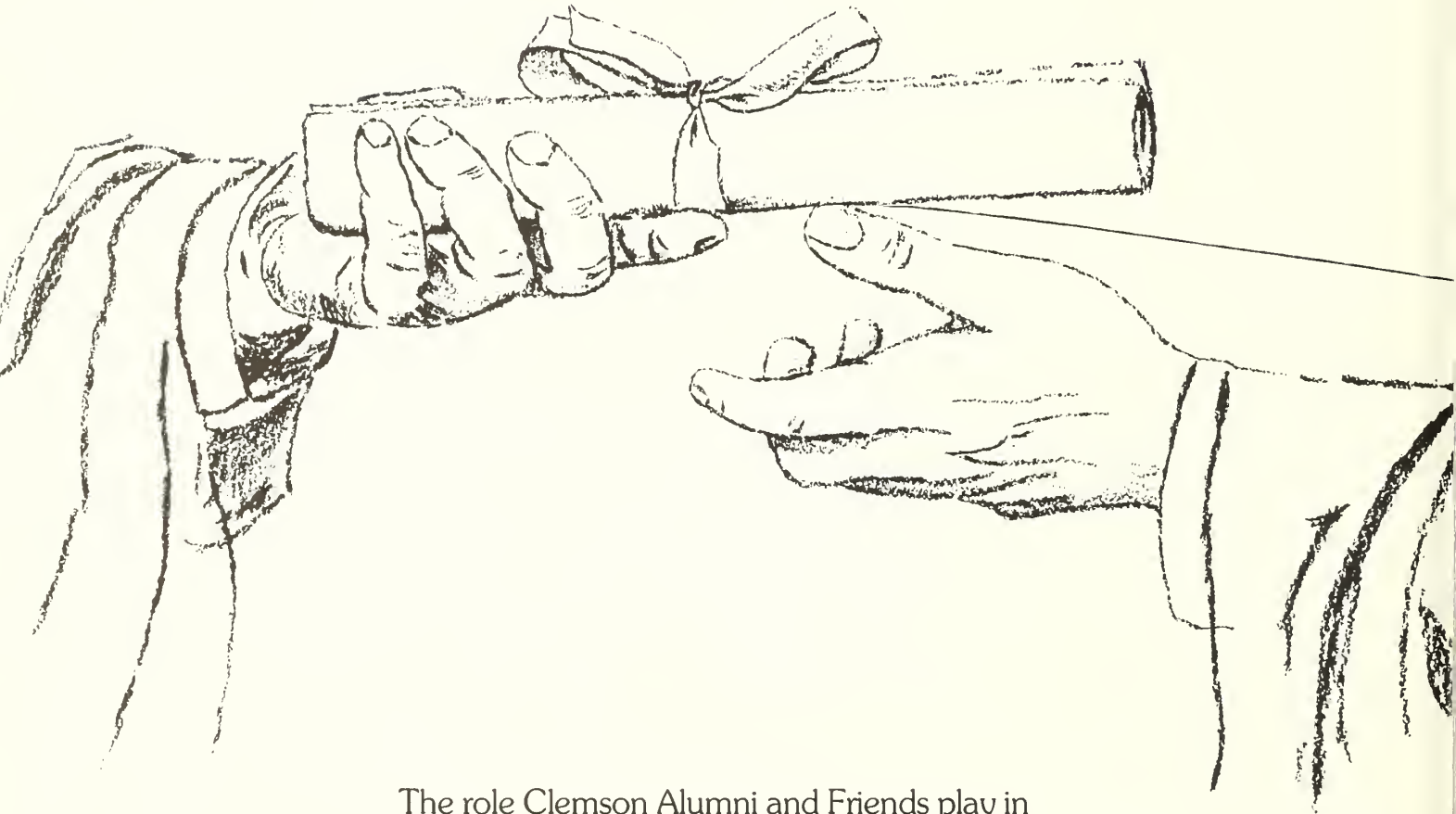


Larry Van Der Heyden has coached some fine offensive linemen during his five years at Clemson and is a major reason why the Tigers' ground game has been so successful. The offensive line coach joined the staff on January 5, 1979 from Memphis State where he was offensive coordinator for three years. The Gainesville, GA, native earned his B.S. degree in health education from the University of Tennessee in 1975 after lettering three years in football and baseball for the Volunteers. IPTAY has begun the second 50 years of a long and successful journey. From a very modest beginning in 1934 with only 162 members, this athletic scholarship fund-raising group has grown into 20,000 loyal Tiger supporters. IPTAY is recognized as the "Number-One" group of its kind in America. But what is behind the success of IPTAY?

The reason is people — people who are committed to a successful program at Clemson University, both on and off the field. Professors, athletes, administrators, managers, trainers, alumni, and friends all play a part in this success. The results which have been produced are something we can all be proud of in this search for excellence at Clemson University.

The on-going search for excellence in the academic area at Clemson University has resulted in the awarding of the Fulbright Scholarship for graduates to study overseas to 5 of 6 Clemson applicants. In addition, a Guggenheim Scholarship was awarded to another Clemson graduate. Of the 320 valedictorians in South Carolina high schools, over 120 were accepted to Clemson University. Specific areas of improvement include installing lights on Riggs Field; building a new baseball facility, with lights to be added in 1985; funding Tiger Band travel; funding the annual Sport and Society Symposium; donating over \$200,000 to the President's Fund; and developing the East Beach area enjoyed by all Clemson students.

The attitude of Clemson people, especially those associated with IPTAY, is that "success is a journey, not a destination." The search for excel-

lence continues at Clemson and, thanks to the continued support of 20,000 IPTAY supporters, the excellence in athletics will continue. As IPTAY begins the second 50 years of service to Clemson, one may wonder what the future holds. According to Joe Turner, Executive Secretary of IPTAY, "the love, sincerity, and support of the Clemson people give a unique quality to Clemson. It is for this reason the success the Tigers now enjoy will continue."

After 22 consecutive years of record-breaking support, there is no doubt that Clemson will remain "NUMBER ONE."

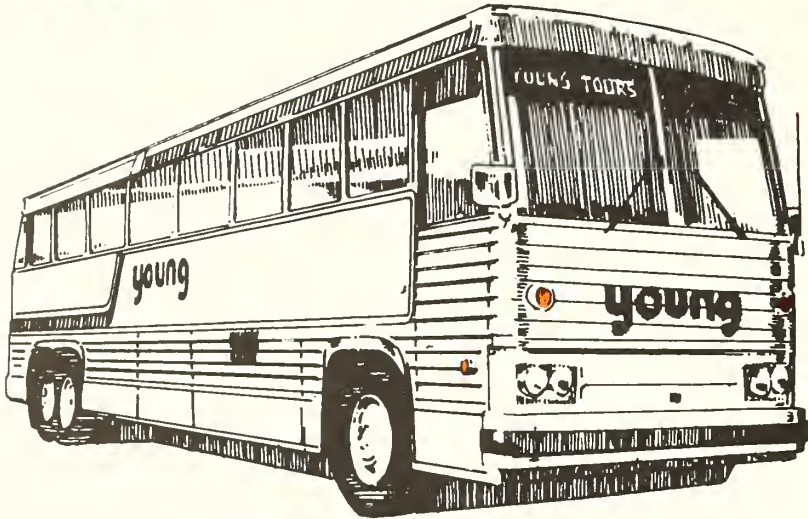

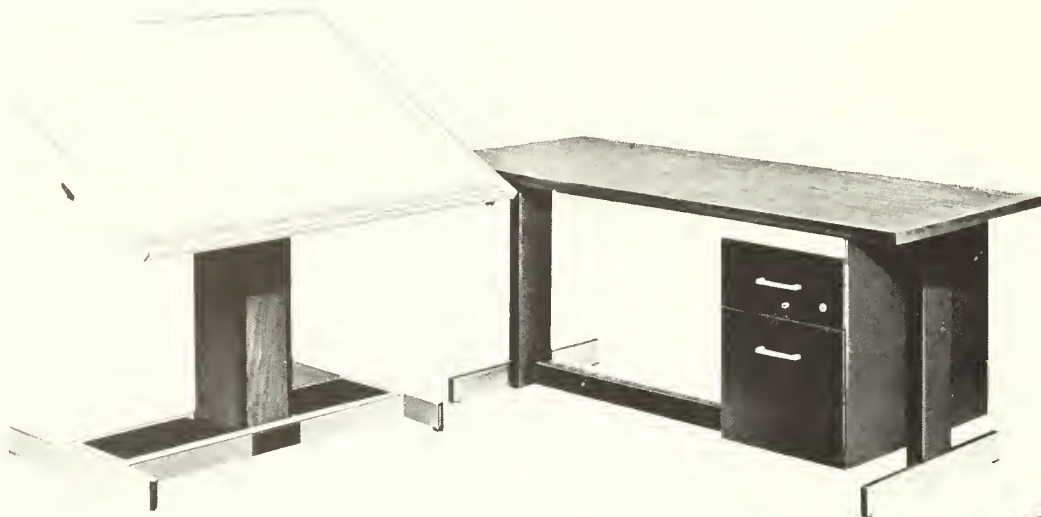

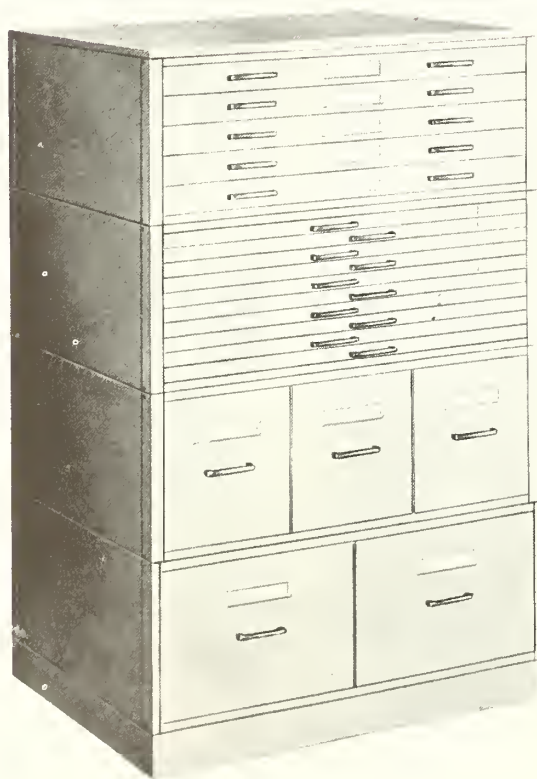

For the fifth time in the last six years the Clemson all-around sports program has been ranked in the top 10 in the nation. The survey, conducted by the Knoxville Journal, takes into account national rankings in selected sports. Women's sports are not included in this poll, which has been in existence since 1971.

This poll is a good index of the rise of Clemson athletics over the years. The Tigers were first ranked in the survey in 1975-76 with a number-20 finish. In the 1978-79 poll, Clemson climbed to fourth, and in 1979-80 gained a number-three ranking, the school's highest ever. Three years ago Clemson was fourth and in 1981-82 the Tigers picked up the number-five rating.

Last year five Clemson sports were top 20 teams, headed by the cross country team's number-four rating. The ranking was the highest recorded by the Tiger harriers, and Coach Stan Narewski was rewarded with National Co-Coach-of-the-Year honors. The Clemson football and soccer teams were 11th in final polls, which gave Clemson the lead in the poll after the fall. But tennis and golf were Clemson's only top 20 teams thereafter.

Lady Tiger teams also had a good year. The women's cross country team was seventh nationally, while the women's tennis team was 15th in the final poll.

Clemson Visitors Center Offers Front Door to Campus



For visitors to Clemson University, the new Visitors Center offers recreational information, travel and entertainment directions and, most importantly, an introduction to the state's land-grant university, all in an atmosphere of orange carpet hospitality. For those who are considering investing the next few years of their lives in the university, the center, with its audio-visual displays, guided tours and numerous services, is a priceless source of information and orientation.

Located in historic Tillman Hall, at the gateway to the university, the center is the first stop for tourists as well as prospective students and their families. It provides information on everything from university programs and student life to recreational activities, travel directions and shopping.

"The university has needed a focal point for visitor information services for a long time," says John Allen, director of Clemson's visitor programs.

The Visitors Center has met that need. Since opening in June, the center has served more than 1,300 people from 33 states and seven foreign countries. And each person has gotten his full share of Clemson hospitality.

"Every visitor represents a new opportunity to let people know about the university and what it means to South Carolina and this region," Allen says.

Staffing the center are Janis Moore, manager, and Joy Skelton, assistant manager. Both know the Clemson area well.

The Moore family lived in Clemson for five years during the 1960s when Janis' father was head of the civil engineering de-

partment. After graduating from Clemson in 1967, Janis earned a master's of English from the University of Virginia in 1970. Last fall she left a teaching career in Virginia to become manager of the Visitors Center.

Joy Skelton graduated from Clemson in 1981 with a bachelor's degree in political science. After graduation, she served in positions with the Registrar's Office and the IPTAY Office before becoming the Visitors Center's assistant manager.

Campus tours conducted by the professional staff and the student University Guide Service branch out from the new center to explore Clemson's numerous landmarks, such as Fort Hill, home of John C. Calhoun and university founder Thomas Green Clemson.

Visitors also can see Hanover House, the 18th century home of French Huguenot Paul de St. Julien. Originally constructed in Berkeley County in 1716, the house was rebuilt on the Clemson campus in 1941.

Tours also include Memorial Stadium, the largest college football facility east of the Mississippi. And for visitors who would rather relax in the grass and enjoy the scenery, the horticulture gardens feature 70 acres of ornamental azaleas, camellias, wildflowers and natural wonders along numerous foot trails.

Self-guided audio-cassette tours are provided by the Visitors Center and specialized group tours of the university, Calhoun Mansion and Hanover House are available upon request.

"We want the center to be the front door to the campus," says Allen. "And we want it known that our door is always open."

Ronald Watson

TKO Watson – the name may sound unfamiliar to even the most dedicated Tiger football fans, but there’s a few Clemson players who will probably never forget the force that goes behind it.

Not long ago, during the spring of 1983 Tiger free safety Ronald Watson made what boxers call a technical knockout – he hit his opponents with such a blow that they were unable to continue to fight or to stand. “During that spring, I was playing and knocked a few guys out during practice,” Ronald said, in explaining why he’s considered the hardest hitter on the team.

“People tell me I’m the hardest hitter, but I don’t know,” he said. “I just go out and do my best at stopping that ball.” And fortunately for Clemson, his best just happens to be what the team needs.

For his efforts throughout last year’s 9-1-1 season, Ronald was named an honorable mention All-American by *Football News* after making 78 tackles during the year. “I would like to reach 90 or more this year,” he said. “Most importantly, though, I would like to lead the team in tackles.”

Ronald was also named ACC defensive Back-of-the-Week after making nine tackles and breaking up a pass in Clemson’s 16-3 victory over the North Carolina Tar Heels. He considered the selection “nice” but refused to let it boost his ego. “I thought it was real nice to read in the newspaper that I had been chosen as defensive Back-of-the-Week, but you can’t let yourself get caught up in seeing your name in the newspaper. That will only cause problems,” he said. “Guys only see problems when they start thinking, ‘Oh, I played well last week, I don’t need to prove myself and try hard now.’ All that newspaper business is something to look back on later in life with pride, but it has to keep its place right now.”

That’s only a small piece of the attitude Ronald has acquired over the last three years. His highest goal will be reached this year, he said, if Clemson wins all 11 of its games. But that’s still not all of the goals that Ronald has set for this season.

“I would really like to get six interceptions this year,” he said.

But why six? “I could say a higher number, and of course I’ll make as many as I possibly can, but I don’t like to set goals too high because I don’t want to get lost in trying to reach goals and not in just playing the best football that I can play.”

Ronald’s “best football” placed him second on the club in passes broken up in 1983 and the leader among the returning players. The senior from Jefferson, GA, had a season high nine tackles, four times in 1983 to tie his career-high, and had a career-high seven individual hits against South Carolina.

“I just go out and do exactly what the coaches tell me to do,” he said. “I have a lot of respect for all the coaches here at Clemson and don’t doubt anything that they tell me to

do.”

Ronald has had that attitude since he started participating in athletics when he was in fourth grade. The all-state running back on coach Jim Stoudmire’s Jefferson High School team rushed for over 3,000 yards and was credited with over 300 tackles, a mark which was second best in the school’s history. He also captained the basketball team his senior year, is a record holder on his school’s track team and earned 12 letters as a prepster, four each in football, basketball and track. “I had a lot of respect for my high school coaches,” he said. “I still go back and visit them just like family now.”

He came to Clemson and played strong safety his freshman year. Then he moved to the cornerback position for the 1982 season, but was sidelined with a knee injury after five games. He came back for the final three games at cornerback, and then switched to free safety during the spring of 1983. “Rod McSwain was playing at free safety and didn’t like it, so the coach asked me if I was interested, and I told him yes,” Ronald said. “Now I love playing the position.”

Ronald might just seem to have found his place in football at free safety and his experience in the different secondary positions has padded his ability and attitude to make him one of the most aggressive secondary players in the South and a solid pro prospect.

All the changing of positions and all the adversity he has undergone during his three years at Clemson have given Ronald a new appreciation for the sport of football. “We have had a lot to go through but when you love something as much as I love Clemson, the consequences just don’t matter,” he said. “It means as much for me to play before 80,000 people in Death Valley as it would mean to play against anybody in any bowl.

“And it’s not just winning and who you win against; it’s contributing to the team; it’s the sense of pride in playing; it’s feeling important and needed,” he said. “You’ve always got to give something if you want something in return.”

Rising Above

The organizers called it "Rising Above". The *Greenville News* said it was, "a big lift for Clemson University". The *New York Times* labeled it "higher education". And even coach Danny Ford was impressed with the sight. Yet these witnesses weren't blowing hot air about the football game; as a matter of fact, they weren't even referring to the game.

Not that the game wasn't praiseworthy. Clemson demolished seventh-ranked Maryland 52-27 to pick up its 19th consecutive ACC win and third straight conference crown - officially or unofficially. As it turned out, an

otherwise memorable performance in the stadium was overshadowed (literally) by what occurred prior to kickoff.

Exactly three minutes prior to kickoff on November 12, 1984 over 80,000 students, fans, and supporters of Clemson University released a world-record 363,729 balloons into the sky in a project known as "Rising Above". It was a magnificent accomplishment, symbolic of the spirit that binds Tiger followers everywhere. The event itself was spectacular, but the story surrounding the occasion is every bit as interesting.

It began as the brainchild of Keith Stansell, then a senior from Greenville and director of student services in the student government.

Mark Wilson, a senior from Greer and now the Student Body President, was chosen as the project coordinator and immediately began researching and planning the massive extravaganza.

On August 30, just over two months before the actual occasion, Wilson and former Student Body President David Stalnaker announced the undertaking by saying that it would be "the biggest party in the history of the world". As it turned out, they didn't realize how big it really would be. They believed that the current world's record was 208,477, a feat accomplished by the Sands Hotel in Las Vegas on January 1, 1982. The hotel was celebrating its re-opening after a devastating fire. Ironically, it was on that date that Clemson clinched its national championship by beating Nebraska in the Orange Bowl.

Assuming their information to be correct, Wilson and Stalnaker proposed the release of 250,000 balloons. They planned to carry out the project using 1500 student volunteers, a seemingly large number but yet only half of the total that eventually participated. Although these plans would change many times, the organizers were confident they would succeed.

After checking with the *Guinness Book of World Records*, it was discovered that the record of the Sands Hotel had already been broken. Only two months earlier, on July 4, a total of 300,424 balloons had been released in Itasca, IL. Rather than give up, Wilson, Stalnaker, and IPTAY President Joe Turner decided to continue with the endeavor. IPTAY sent letters to its members requesting that they each donate \$5 to the history-making event. The response was overwhelming, as Tiger fans from throughout the South sent contributions totaling about \$30,000. Not only did this pay for the project, but \$5,000 was left over and donated to the university library.

As enthusiasm was starting to peak, word leaked out of Gainesville, FL, that the University of Florida would release 345,000 balloons on December 2 before their annual skirmish with Florida State. If the Gators (most notorious in Tigertown for plundering former head coach Charley Pell) were successful, the Clemson feat would never make



the record books. Rather than risk obscurity, Wilson and his group planned a surprise for the Gators.

"We decided to make new plans and that called for the secret release of an additional 50,000 balloons," said Wilson. "Only a few people close to the project knew of the change, so when details of the release were made available last March, many people were astonished to see exactly how many balloons had been involved."

The University of Florida never carried out their record-breaking attempt. According to Wilson, "the organizers in Florida simply ran out of time in their preparations. One did say, however, that the group was planning the project this season."

As the big day approached, preparations were going smoothly. Edward Leonard, a junior from Greer, spent hours showing student leaders the most efficient way to inflate the balloons. Elliott, Davis & Company, a local accounting firm, was called in to verify the number of balloons on hand. Excitement was running wild on the campus, and all indications pointed towards success. Contacted the day before the big event, Wilson said, "I haven't slept much, but in the end, it will all be worth it".

It was cold on the morning of the game, but that did not stop over 3,000 enthusiastic student volunteers from converging upon the stadium as early as 6:30 AM. Not only did the number of workers exceed expectations, but it represented half of the university's on-campus population. As the sun began to rise, the students converted 250 miles of string, 195 balloon fillers, and 400 helium tanks into the now-famous world-record release of 363,729 balloons. Although the event itself lasted about a minute, it was the result of hard work and time-consuming preparations. The fruits of this labor can be found in the current edition of the *Guinness Book of World Records* and from the personal accounts of the 80,615 fans who witnessed it.

The event received extensive media coverage, a favorable aspect because it casted the Clemson family into a positive spotlight. The Associated Press, United Press International, South Carolina Network, Raycom Network, local television and radio stations all reported the episode. Even the national media came to Tigertown for the occasion. The "Good News" program on WTBS-TV, Ted Turner's cablevision network, ran a segment on the release. And, yes, the *New York Times* even got the story.

"We really had no idea how much coverage this project would get," said Tim Bourret, associate sports information director at Clemson. "The morning of the game we called CBS and ABC and they both seemed interested in the details and both mentioned

the event on their scoreboard shows. We knew we had something so we called the wire services and a host of other media and they jumped on it. It's too bad the game was not on television, the networks would have had a field day with it."

Everyone knows that what goes up must come down, but where do 363,729 balloons come down? Less than a week after the event, the IPTAY office began receiving letters from fans who had found—or seen—balloons. A few isolated souvenirs found their way to places such as Spartanburg and Newberry, but most seemed to end up much further from Clemson. Most of the reports came from within 40 miles of each other, covering small North Carolina towns such as Maxton, White Oak, and Pembroke.

Boyd Byrd, his son Danny, and a friend were working near Gibson, NC when they spotted several hundred of the balloons still held together in a bundle. They tied their discovery to the back of their truck and drove home as fast as they could with such a load—10 miles an hour. The balloons completely covered up a swing set in their back yard, and the local paper ran a picture of the family covered up to their necks in bright orange balloons (see top of opposite page). Byrd estimated that 4,000 of the helium-filled mementos fell into his area.

Fulton Stokes is one of only two, "locally

prominent" Clemson graduates in White Oak, NC, so it was appropriate that he find a bundle of balloons in his yard. Actually, it wasn't fate, a neighbor tied them to his mailbox. Stokes, a teacher at Tar Heel High School (he didn't name it, he only works there) will long remember that day as most of his neighbors are North Carolina and N.C. State alumni. The Stokes story is significant because, as far as the sports information office can determine, the 300-mile journey is the longest made by any of the balloons.

A young girl from Spartanburg probably has the most interesting story. Prior to the release, Frances McGaha wrote her daughter Ashley's name on several of the balloons. She included her address and telephone number and asked for the finder to contact her. The next day, a Maxton, NC, man called to say that he had found the balloons about four hours after they had been released. It made a story that the McGaha family will probably never forget.

Whether or not it was the biggest party in the history of the world is immaterial. What the project did prove is that 80,615 Clemson loyalists could rise together as one unified group. With this sort of backing and support, Clemson can look forward to even better days, not only on the playing fields and in the classrooms, but in whatever goals the university strives to accomplish.

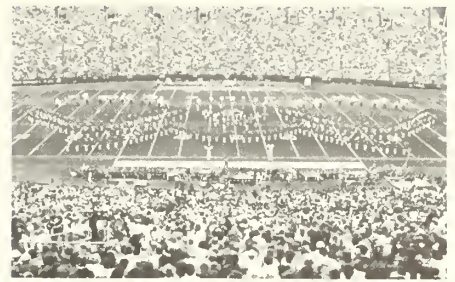

Computerized Marching

Marshaling 276 musicians, flags and twirlers into their respective spots requires the authority of a Parris Island drill sergeant and the precision of an engineer.

One false step, one wrong turn can transform a band leader's dream into a nightmare and make even the grandest Sousa marchers look like a Rorschach test.

That's why the Clemson University band relies on a computer to create and refine its formations.

In this high-tech age when computers can balance our budgets and tell us when our cars need oil, it seemed logical that the band switch to a computer to whittle away hours of calculations, not to mention the reams of paper used to chart one formation, assistant

band director Rick Goodstein said.

"Charting 276 individual moves from one formation to another throughout an eight-minute halftime show used to take anywhere from 40 to 60 hours to complete by hand," Goodstein said.

"But with the computer, the screen shows a grid just like a football field. All we have to do is type in the kind of formation we want — a star, for example — the number of students, and how far apart we want them to be. The computer tells us within 1/100 of an inch where each student should be on the field."

And that's not all.

The computer also will plot out each student's individual steps in the formation, allowing him to familiarize himself with his

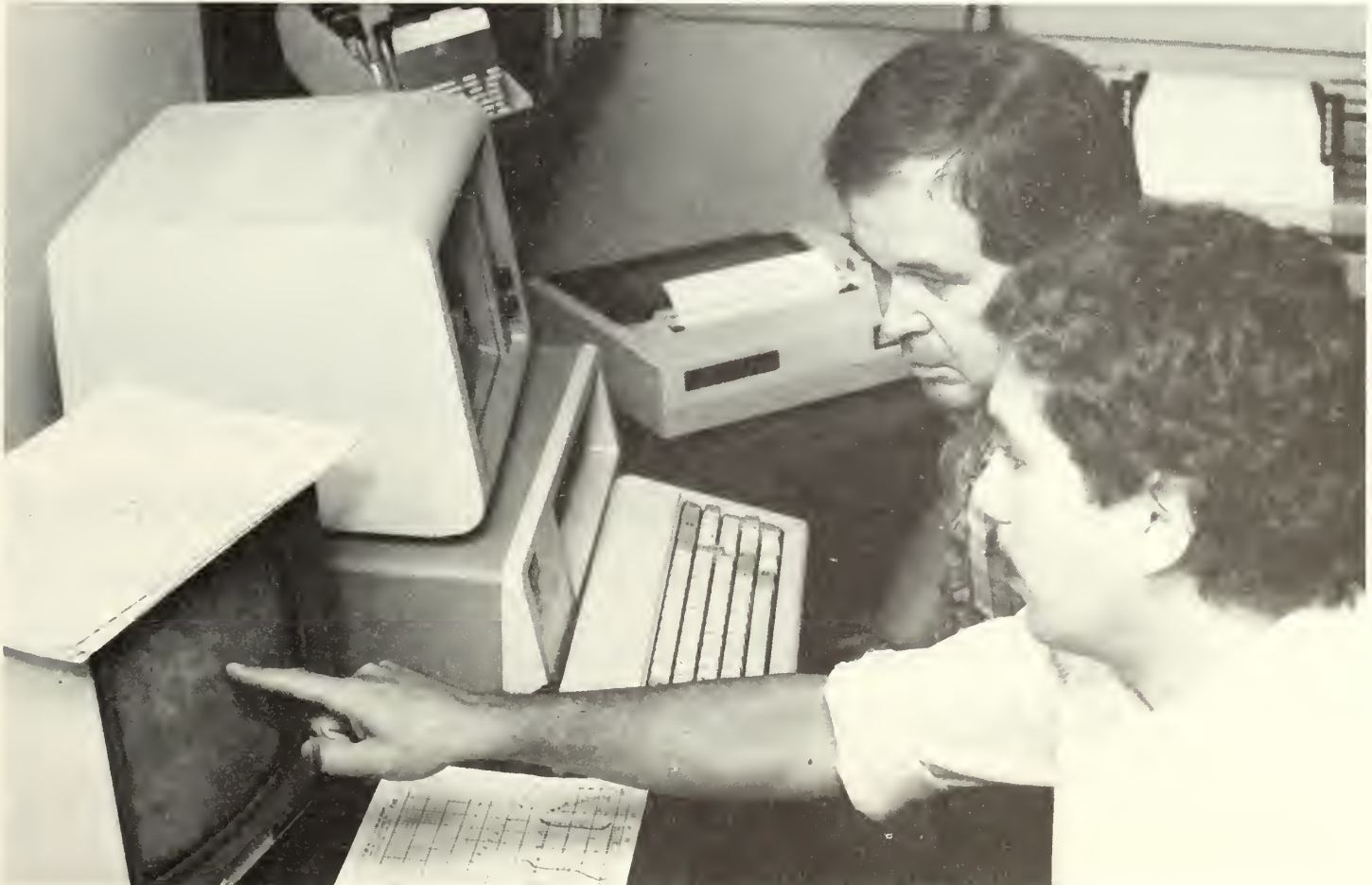
own role.

The computer program also allows the band director to design his own formation and, through the use of a digitizer, convert the shape from a visual image to computer language. This gives the band director the flexibility to move the shape and still know the precise placement of the band members within a matter of seconds.

Although other school bands in the country have adapted the computer to this use, Goodstein and Band Director Bruce Cook believe Clemson's band is the only one in the Atlantic Coast Conference to use it.

Goodstein and Cook give the system high marks.

"It's more state of the art, and it really alleviates the tedium," Goodstein said.

IPTAY Honoree

"I don't really consider myself that different from other athletes," said the nation's only Division I athlete to start in both football and basketball in each of the last two academic years. "I've just grown accustomed to working hard and making time for both my studies and athletics. My parents always stressed both and that's why I always strive at being the best at whatever I'm involved in."

Those words come from Mike Eppley, the first Clemson athlete in history to be a district Academic All-American selection in two sports. These words best describe why you can add another award to his ever expanding list of achievements and honors – The 1983-84 IPTAY Athlete-of-the-Year.

A bonafide 1984 All-American football candidate, Eppley's accomplishments have been well chronicled over the past four years and are included in a box accompanying this story. His achievements are well known even to those fans who aren't fanatical about statistics and records.

The mention of his name brings a smile to the thousands of avid fans who have been a part of his career. For Mike Eppley has brought more recognition and credit to Clemson University in his short stay in Tigertown than most people can do in a 30-year tenure.

Thus Richard Michael Eppley, Jr., becomes the fifth Clemson athlete so honored since the award was initiated in 1980 by former Executive Secretary of IPTAY Gene Willimon. The award recognizes the athlete who displays character, leadership and academic progress while at Clemson. Nominees are submitted by all the head coaches of Clemson's teams and the recipient is selected by the Clemson IPTAY Club Directors. Previous award winners read like a Who's Who in collegiate athletics and includes wrestler Noel Loban (bronze medalist in 1984 Olympics), Hans Koeleman (track/cross country), Barbara Kennedy (professional basketball player in Italy) and Terry Kinard (New York Giants professional football player).

Anything but one-dimensional, Eppley is a one-of-a-kind athlete. Clemson has reaped rewards far and beyond what is typically measured on the playing surface, because the attention and dividends a student-athlete such as Eppley has attracted for Clemson can't be adequately measured in dollars and cents; statistics and records and his personality, drive and determination can't be bottled and held for the next batch of recruits, even though this is what every coach, administrator, professor and alumnus would desire.

Eppley was a relative unknown, unheard of reserve who burst upon the scene with a bang during the 1982 football campaign. Making his first collegiate start on the gridiron in the fourth game of the season against Kentucky, he promptly connected on 9-13 passes for 95 yards. The rest is history and much remains to be recorded as Eppley enters his final campaign poised for another record-breaking year.

Recently a writer urged that his uniform numbers be retired. As much as anything this final gesture could serve as a tribute and a fitting reminder to the Mike Eppley standard of excellence which has made us all extremely proud. For all the athletes who follow, it will be a tough act to duplicate, but certainly a notable challenge.

An administrative management major, Eppley plans to graduate in December of 1984 and attend graduate school the following semester. And how does he hope to be remembered? "I hope people remember that I had more things on my mind than athletics, that I was here for an education and that I prided myself on working hard, earning what I got, and not having anything given to me."

Emergency Services



The Clemson University Athletic Department provides the following for your safety and emergency medical needs:

1. Advanced cardiac life-support stations in four locations. (North stands, Upper North deck, South stands, Upper South deck.) These units are staffed with skill-care nurses, physicians, cardiologists, internists, paramedics, and EMTs.
2. Mobile units of EMTs and paramedics are strategically located throughout the entire stadium.
3. Ambulances with life-support equipment are available in North stand and South stand areas and have prearranged routes for evacuation to local hospitals.

Learn to recognize these personnel and facilities.

Announcements will inform you of special hazards – heat, bees, etc.

WHAT TO DO IF EMERGENCIES ARISE

Please step back and give the organized stadium EMS personnel room to work. Well-intentioned attempts to help by untrained persons interferes with the efficiency of the EMS system. If you have basic or advanced training in specific life-support methods, make your qualifications known and offer your help. Untrained personnel can be frequently more harmful than helpful.

MEDICAL ADVICE FOR FANS


If you have a pre-existing medical or health problem, please check with your personal physician and obtain his advice before attending games. Many emergencies occurring at the stadium do so because of prior existing conditions. Use common sense in dressing, eating, drinking and in physical exertion. Be certain if you have any pre-existing medical conditions that you have identification on you as to the diagnosis and what medications you are currently taking.


Be aware of early warning signs of heart attacks: chest pain, chest tightness, shortness of breath, sweating, palpitations, fainting, nausea and vomiting.

Recognize that our most common serious medical problem at football games are heart attacks and allergic reactions to insect stings. Be aware that insect stings will continue to always be very frequent at outdoor sporting events and should always be treated with immediate ice until advice can be obtained. If you have ever had a reaction to bee or other insect sting, check with your personal physician as to whether you should carry a kit.

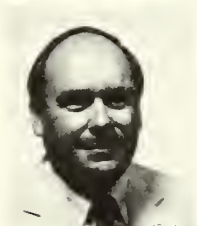

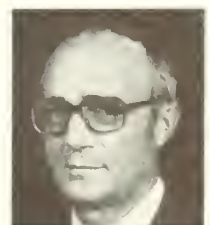

Tigers In The Crowd

Wayne Norris Evansville, IN

Norris, 33, is the new volleyball coach at Clemson. For the past three years, the 1974 East Carolina graduate has served as a Clemson women's swimming coach and as recruiter for both the men's and women's teams. Before coming to Clemson in August of 1981, he was quite successful as the aquatics director and swim coach for the city of Evansville, IN, where his



team won both the indoor and outdoor state championships. While at East Carolina, Norris was All Southern Conference for four years and a two-time outstanding swimmer for the Pirates before earning his degree in physical education.

Linda Rutter Harrisburg, PA

Rutter, 20, is in her junior season with the Tiger women's swim team as a distance freestyle and individual medley swimmer. Along with making All-ACC, she qualified for the United States Olympic team trials and competed in the NCAA championships in Lincoln, NE in 1983. At the Alabama Invitational last year, she set three new school records with times of



1:51.42 in the 200 meter freestyle, 4:52.61 in the 500 meter freestyle, and 10:00.35 in the 1000 meter freestyle. She should go down as Clemson's top female swimmer in history by the time she graduates.

Tina Krebs Holbaek, Denmark

Krebs, 21, is one of the strongest runners on the women's track and cross country teams. The three-sport All-American set a new record for the 800 meter run at last year's ACC Championships with a time of 2:02.81. She broke her old record of 2:06.00, set at the 1982 ACC outdoor meet. Now in her junior season at Clemson, the seven-time Danish National Cham-



pion was also a semifinalist at the World Championships in the summer of 1983. An injury prevented her from competing in the Olympics this past August.



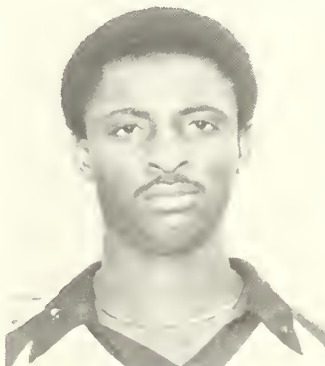
Martin Flynn Longford, Ireland

Flynn, 19, a Clemson cross country runner, entered this University in January 1982. He suffered an ankle injury during the 1983 indoor season which lingered into the outdoor season. Despite the hindrance of injury, Flynn managed to make the All-ACC team in 1983 and place ninth that same year at the ACC cross country championships with a time of 32:08.7. The junior administrative management major has personal bests of 3:53.4 in the 1500 meter run and 14:26.0 in the 5000 meter run.



Jim McCollum Valley Stream, NY

McCollum, 21, senior slugger for the Clemson baseball team, had the highest slugging average on the team with a .596 last year. He went into the 1984 season with 20 homers, needing only eight more to set a new Clemson record. He ended the season with a total of 31 homers, breaking the record of 27 set by Craig White in 1969, 1970, 1971, and 1973. The 215-pound catcher, majoring in Recreation and Parks Administration, was eighteenth in ACC batting in 1983. Last year, he was third on the team in runs scored with a total of 53, and he should finish his Clemson career ranked in the top 10 in nearly every offensive category.

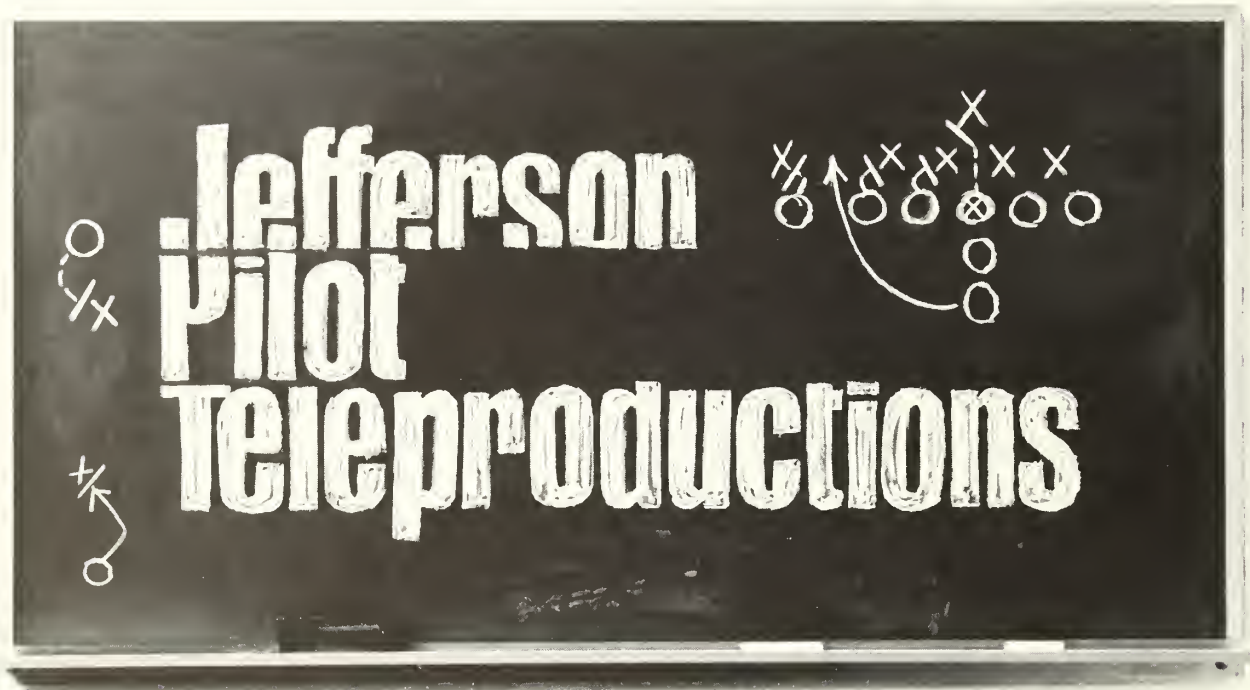


Adubarie Otorubio Lagos, Nigeria

Otorubio, 22, a senior soccer star, is a returning All-American. He came to Clemson in January of 1981 and made All-ACC that same year. In 1982, he again made All-ACC, receiving more votes (88) than any other player that year. He was an All-American that year. Otorubio, a civil engineering major, is one of the finest defensive players in soccer today. Of the 35 games he has played in his three-year career, he has missed starting in only one. The 1983 ACC Player-of-the-Year was also a second-team All-America, and has a chance to be Clemson's first three-time All-American. He was a prime reason Clemson allowed only eight goals last year.

I've been married to the former Margaret Lunn of Florence for 34 years. We have two sons. Mike finished Clemson in 1975 with a degree in administrative management, and is married with one son. Greg finished Clemson in 1978 with a degree in Recreation and Parks Administration and is single.

I came to work with Sonoco Products Company immediately after graduation and have been there for 34 years. My entire career has been in the General Engineering Department and I am now the Managing Engineer for this department. All of my career with Sonoco has been in Hartsville except for 1½ years in Connecticut in the early 1950's.

What is your history of interest in Clemson and IPTAY?

I started following Clemson's athletic teams when I was in the 5th or 6th Grade. This interest increased when an older brother enrolled at Clemson and our family started visiting the campus. Also, he started taking me to the Big Thursday game with South Carolina during State Fair week in Columbia. I don't think I ever considered going to another school. My interest in IPTAY apparently started about the time I graduated in 1950. My record indicates that I have been a member of IPTAY for 35 years which is one year before I graduated from Clemson, so maybe I joined before I graduated. I don't really remember when I first joined.

What makes IPTAY so successful?

In my mind, without a doubt, it's the people in IPTAY. Now, if you ask me what gives them this love of school, dedication, pride, unity, and all the other things that make them want to be so supportive ... I can't answer – but it's there. Not only is it there in the general membership of IPTAY people, but it is also there in the IPTAY Representatives from each county in South Carolina and from the neighboring states. This feeling of wanting to be involved from so many people gives IPTAY such a broad base of support that I believe is the primary reason for our success.

What are your duties as President of IPTAY?

My duties include presiding at meetings of the IPTAY Board of Directors, appointing committees as needed, attending various committee meetings as needed, representing and reporting on IPTAY at Trustees meetings, Alumni National Council meetings, and Clemson Foundation meetings. I also preside over the annual meeting of IPTAY members held the morning of the Orange-White Spring Game at Clemson and the Statewide IPTAY Representatives meeting held in Columbia each January.

How involved do you get in IPTAY's activities and how much is delegated to Joe Turner?

Joe Turner and Len Gough and their staff handle all of the day-to-day activities of IPTAY and this is a varied and extensive task when you consider that we are serving over 20,000 members. Most of the IPTAY Directors' activities involve policy and direction of IPTAY. However, Joe and I maintain frequent contacts with the various IPTAY committee chairmen and other IPTAY Directors concerning any item that has a bearing on IPTAY. There is really no phase of IPTAY's activities in which either Joe and/or Len hasn't been closely involved.

What is IPTAY's biggest problem?

IPTAY has been very successful for a number of years. This success has brought growth in interest and growth in membership. As often happens, this growth can also bring problems,

especially in the area of ticket availability and parking space availability. This year we have sold 56,000 season tickets and, even with the recent stadium expansion, we are nearly at our limit of season tickets that can be sold. This increase in ticket sales also means additional strain on parking facilities. Being able to continue to offer tickets and parking to our more recent members, who are mostly coming from recent graduating classes, is a problem that will require a lot of study and attention in order for us to continue to meet our demands. These are problems that are caused by positive things, but they are still problems nevertheless.

What is IPTAY's role at Clemson and how is this role perceived by those outside the athletic department such as student, faculty, and administration?

I think IPTAY's role continues to be what it always has been, and that is a fund-raising organization whose total income is pledged by its contributors for athletic scholarships and other athletic needs of the University. Generally speaking, I think that the other areas of the University see IPTAY's role in about the same light I do. At least, this is the impression that I get from the non-IPTAY functions I attend at Clemson.

What has IPTAY done for Clemson?

Of course the primary asset is to provide funds for all athletic scholarships. This includes maintaining a reserve fund so that all can be funded for at least four years of scholarship. In addition to the scholarships, the most obvious and largest contribution from IPTAY is its participation in the recent stadium expansion. Also, we have underwritten such things as new band uniforms, band travel to away football games, renovating and upgrading the strength room in Jervey Athletic Center, renovation and lighting of the soccer field, lighting of the tennis courts, renovation and permanent seating at the baseball field, and installation of lights for the baseball field which is just getting started. IPTAY also funds the annual Sport and Society Symposium and assisted in development of the East Beach area that is enjoyed by all Clemson students. These are a few of the items that IPTAY has funded at Clemson.



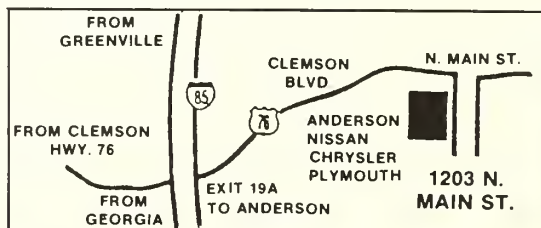

Sports Program

The overall sports program at Clemson has continued to reach new heights of success in the last decade and the '83-'84 season was no exception. The Clemson program finished eighth in the 1984 Knoxville Journal All-Sports Poll, the fifth time in the last six years Clemson had a Top 10 finish.

The football team capped off another highly successful season with a 9-1-1 mark as Danny Ford continued to build his program into a national powerhouse. An added highlight to the season was the team's 11th place finish in the final AP football poll, which marked the third consecutive year that the Tigers have completed their season in the top 11. The Georgia Bulldogs and Nebraska Cornhuskers are the only other two teams in the country than can make that claim. Over the last three years Clemson has accumulated a 30-2-2 mark for a 91.2 winning percentage.

But football was not the only sport in which the Tigers were successful. Six other teams finished in the Top 20 in the nation in their respective sports' final polls. The men's cross country team finished fourth while the women's team was seventh. Both of these rankings were the highest ratings ever attained at season's end by either squad. The soccer team finished 11th, making it the eleventh time in twelve years that the soccer team has finished in the Top 20.

The men's tennis team concluded another successful season and finished 10th, which marked the fifth consecutive year that the tennis team finished in the Top 10. The women's tennis squad finished 15th, which makes the seventh time in the team's nine-year existence that they finished in the Top 20. The golf team made its third straight NCAA tournament appearance and finished 19th.

On the individual level, the Clemson program continued to excel, as 13 athletes re-

ceived All-America status in '83-'84. Additionally, 56 athletes reaped All-ACC honors.

Three Clemson athletes were MVPs or individual champions of the Atlantic Coast Conference, and three others were chosen for national awards. Freshman sensation and NCAA tournament finalist Lawson Duncan took National Rookie-of-the-Year honors in men's tennis, while his teammate, Rick Rudeen, was awarded the National Sportsmanship (Osuna) Trophy.

Jamie Swanner, a member of the 1984 Olympic team, was recognized in soccer as the National Goalkeeper-of-the-Year. Jane Forman and Adubarie Otorubio won ACC most valuable player honors in women's tennis and soccer, respectively. Hans Koeleman has finished in the Top 10 for two years in a row in the NCAA cross country championships and is the only Tiger ever to win the district championships. Stan Narewski was named National Co-Coach-of-the-Year in cross country.

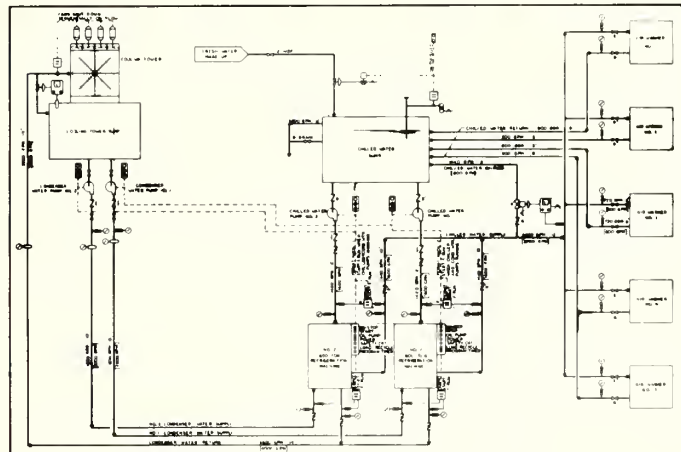
