

## TODAY'S GAME

ACC ATLANTIC DIVISION TITLE UP FOR GRABS ON SENIOR DAY IN DEATH VALLEY

## **Game Should Decide ACC Atlantic Division**

Today's game between Clemson and Wake Forest should decide the 2011 ACC Atlantic Division title. Clemson will be looking for its second ACC Atlantic Division title and ACC Championship game appearance in the last three years. Wake Forest last played in the title game in 2006 when it won the ACC Championship.

A Tiger win today would clinch the division title, while Wake Forest would still have some work to do even with a win over Clemson, but Wake Forest would own the tie-breaker over Clemson if both teams finish in a two-way tie in the league standings. The Atlantic Division winner will face the Coastal Division winner at Bank of America Stadium in Charlotte, NC on December 3 at 8:00 PM.

Clemson has not won an ACC Championship since 1991, when a defense led by future NFL players Brentson Buckner, Levon Kirkland, and Chester McGlockton led the nation in rushing defense. The Tigers were 9-1-1 in the regular season that year and had a 6-0-1 ACC record, good enough for the league championship.

The Tigers have more ACC Championships (13) than any other school. Clemson also won the Southern Conference title in 1940 and 1948 along with the SIAA Championship in 1900 and 1902, giving the program 17 conference titles. John Heisman coached Clemson to the SIAA titles.

Clemson cannot clinch an ACC Championship by defeating Wake Forest, but it can clinch the division title and advance to the ACC Championship game. Six times previously, the Tigers have celebrated an ACC Championship or a division title with a win at Clemson. Below is the list.

## Clemson vs. Wake Forest Series

Clemson has a 58-17-1 advantage in the series against Wake Forest, including a 34-7 lead in games at Clemson. The Tigers have won four of the last five meetings and seven of the last 10. Clemson has won five in a row and 23 of

the last 25 against the Demon Deacons at Memorial Stadium. The only Demon Deacon wins in Tigertown since 1961 came in 1993 (20-16) and 1998 (29-19). Clemson has won the last two games in Death Valley by a combined score of 82-13.

Head Coach Dabo Swinney is 2-0 against Wake Forest, a 38-3 win in 2009 and a 30-10 victory last year in Winston-Salem.

## **Wake Forest Overview**

Wake Forest enters today's game with a 4-2 ACC record, one of the surprise teams of the ACC. With one more win, Jim Grobe's Demon Deacons will be going to a bowl game for the fourth time in the last six years. Wake Forest made just five bowl appearances in its first 100 years.

Wake Forest has outstanding players on both sides of the ball. Tanner Price has averaged 239.3 yards per game through the air, much of it to receiver Chris Givens, who has averaged an ACC-best 109.4 receiving yards per game. He is second to Clemson's Sammy Watkins in receptions per game and is tied for second in the league in touchdown catches (8).

## On the Cover

On the cover of today's program are three seniors, Daniel Andrews (#41), Coty Sensabaugh (#15), and Drew Traylor (#82), who will play their last game in Death Valley against the Demon Deacons on Senior Day.





The Demon Deacon defense will challenge Clemson's potent offense behind the play of Merrill Noel, Cyhl Quarles, and Nikita Whitlock. Noel has 16 passes defensed and will challenge the ACC record of 23 before the season is over. Quarles is 11th in the ACC in tackles per game (7.9) and Whitlock is tied for second in the ACC in tackles for loss (12).

Jimmy Newman, who is 15-17 on field-goal attempts, is a semifinalist for the Lou Groza Award along with Clemson's Chandler Catanzaro. Newman is also third in the ACC in scoring.

## **Seeking a Perfect Home Season**

Clemson will be looking to complete a perfect season at home with a victory over Wake Forest. Dabo Swinney's Tigers have already beaten six foes at Memorial Stadium this year by a combined score of 246-152, or an average score of 41-25. Clemson has scored at least 35 points in every home game and has averaged 493.5 yards per game at home. The Tigers have scored 31 touchdowns in those games and have had at least one rushing touchdown and at least one passing touchdown in every home contest.

If Clemson gains victory today, it would be the first perfect home season for the Tigers since 1990, when they were 6-0. Clemson was 6-0-1 at home in 1991, the last time the Tigers won the ACC Championship, but a tie with Virginia kept if from a perfect home slate.

A win today would also make this just the second time Clemson has won seven home games in a season. Clemson was 7-1 at home in 1987. However, a victory would give the Tigers their first 7-0 home record in history.

Given a minimum of five games, the Tigers have had a perfect home record six times - 1958 (5-0), 1960 (5-0), 1974 (6-0), 1978 (6-0), 1981 (6-0), and 1990 (6-0).

Overall, Clemson has a 338-123-15 record (.726) at home in its 115-year history, including a 262-99-7 mark (.721) at Memorial Stadium.

## Branch's 8.5 Sacks

Defensive end Andre Branch leads the ACC in sacks per game. He has registered 8.5 sacks in nine games, good for 0.94 per contest, a figure that is tied for sixth-most in the nation. Branch also leads the conference in tackles for loss with 12.5.

Branch is second on the team in tackles with 57. He is just one tackle behind linebacker Jonathan Willard. Branch is attempting to become the first defensive lineman to lead Clemson in tackles over a season since 1984, when William Perry led the team with 100 tackles. Perry is the only Tiger defensive lineman on record to lead the squad in tackles.

## **Rare Score for Thomas**

Offensive lineman Brandon Thomas had the rare opportunity to score a touchdown at Georgia Tech on October 29. Thomas recovered a fumble in the endzone to give


him his first score as a Tiger. In fact, he became the first Clemson offensive lineman to score a touchdown since 1966. That year, Harry Olszewski grabbed a fumble in midair and raced 12 yards for a touchdown in a 35-10 win over South Carolina.

## **Watkins Continues to Set Records**

While today is Senior Day at Clemson, a freshman has established the most records this year. Sammy Watkins has already racked up 13 Clemson freshman records, and he is on the verge of setting some overall season marks regardless of class. He even has a career record in his pocket just nine games into his career.

At Georgia Tech on October 29, Watkins had nine receptions for 153 yards, his third game with at least 150 receiving yards. Believe it or not, the Fort Myers, FL native already owns the Clemson career record for receiving games of at least 150 yards. Perry Tuttle and Aaron Kelly, two of Clemson's all-time greats, had the previous record with two apiece.

Watkins needs two touchdown receptions to break Kelly's single-season record of 11 in 2007. Watkins is also just 112 receiving yards short of Rod Gardner's record of 1,084 yards in 1999. Just 28 receiving yards will make Watkins the fourth Tiger in history to reach 1,000 receiving yards in a season.

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




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ith an open field next to your house, you are likely to grow up playing in it every day. For the Sensabaugh family, the sport of choice was football. Coty Sensabaugh grew up in Kingsport, TN playing football with his family and friends every afternoon after school. He enjoyed playing football so much that he knew he would continue to do so as he grew.

After playing organized football from the time he was five, Sensabaugh flourished on the gridiron at Dobyns-Bennett High School and was named all-state as a wide receiver and conference defensive player-of-the-year. He finished his senior season with 48 receptions for 915 yards and 14 touchdowns on offense along with four interceptions on defense.

Sensabaugh was also selected to play in the Tennessee-Kentucky All-Star game. It was not only on the football field where Sensabaugh excelled. He also led his basketball team deep into the playoffs his junior and senior years and was selected to the East-West All-Star game following his senior season on the hardwood. He played on the same AAU team as former Clemson sharpshooting guard Terrence Oglesby and was a member of the track team as well, participating in sprint and relay events.

Clemson was the only Division I football offer Sensabaugh received.

"I enjoyed my visit here and I wanted to prove everyone wrong who thought I could not play at this level," said Sensabaugh. "My family has always been there for me and I wanted to make them proud."

When Sensabaugh arrived on campus for the 2007 season, he red-shirted. He worked hard to prepare his body for the collegiate level and studied the game.

Sensabaugh has not had to look far for a role model on the field, as Gerald Sensabaugh of the Dallas Cowboys is his cousin. They often talk to discuss the game and most of all encourage each other to be the best players they can be.

In 2008, Sensabaugh made an impact as a reserve defensive back and a special teams starter. After sitting on the bench in the season-opener against Alabama, he appeared in the final 12 games, including nine on defense. He recorded his first interception in a victory over Duke in Death Valley, a game that saw him play a season-high 21 snaps at cornerback.

In 2009, Sensabaugh made the play that he considers his most memorable in a Tiger uniform. In the 40-24 victory over Florida State, he intercepted current Minnesota Viking starter Christian Ponder.

"It was an amazing feeling to intercept that pass and help my team win the game," he explained. "My family was at the game, so they were able to experience that moment with me."

That victory played a key role in the Tigers winning the ACC Atlantic Division for the first time in school history. That season saw Sensabaugh appear in 10 games on defense for a Tiger point-prevention unit that finished in the top 25 in the nation in many statistical categories.

The 2010 season saw Sensabuagh start in the secondary for the first time. He started three games and appeared in all 13 for the Tiger defense. He made an immediate impact, intercepting a pass in the season-opening win over North Texas. Sensabaugh had his most well-rounded game in a victory over #23 NC State in Death Valley, as he recorded three tackles, a tackle for loss, and a pass breakup of a Russell Wilson pass on the Wolfpack's final play of the game to secure the Tigers' one-point victory.

With the drafting of Marcus Gilchrist and Byron Maxwell into the NFL, it was known that Sensabaugh would be one of the players the defense relied on in 2011. He has stepped up to the plate and has been a factor in virtually every game. En-

tering today's game against Wake Forest, Sensabaugh has 29 tackles, one tackle for loss, and a team-tying-high six pass breakups in 608 snaps, 101 snaps more than the next-closest Tiger on defense.

Sensabaugh has one interception on the season, and it could not have occurred at a better time. With #19 Auburn in the red zone late in the game trying to mount a comeback, Sensabuagh made a diving interception over his shoulder to secure the victory. The win snapped Auburn's 17-game winning streak, the longest in the

nation at the time, and helped Clemson to its first victory of the season over a ranked team.

As the 2011 season continues today, it would not be shocking to see Sensabaugh in on a big play to help the Tigers to victory, something

he has had a knack of being a part of during his time as a Tiger. comes to a close, he is thankful for the time he has spent with his teammates at such a great University.

"Words cannot describe what this season has been like," he said. "It has been a blessing to watch this team come together. It will be sad when it comes to an end."



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


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onsistency is the key to success in any sport, and football is no different. One Clemson senior who has been nothing but consistent throughout his time as a Tiger is linebacker Daniel Andrews.

Coming out of high school, the Jacksonville, FL native was rated as the #107 safety in the nation by Scout.com and the #64 overall prospect in Florida by SuperPrep. During his senior season, he recorded 59 tackles, three tackles for loss, a sack, and interception. Despite having offers from Florida State and Miami (FL), Andrews chose to attend Clemson.

"I chose to come to Clemson because it was a great fit," said Andrews. "The first time I came to a game, which was against Wake Forest, I knew this was the place for me. I loved the tradition and how it is one big family. Coach (Dabo) Swinney, who recruited me, is very strong in his faith, and that was a big deciding factor for me and my family. It was something that not very many other schools had."

In addition, Jamie Harper, one of Andrew's high school teammates at Trinity Christian Academy, also chose to attend Clemson. This gave the two an opportunity to continue not only their friendship,

but their time as teammates.

"It was good to come in to Clemson rooming with someone who I pretty much had already lived with since I was 10," explained Andrews. "We knew that we wanted to go to college together, because we had played together since we were kids. After we both talked to some other schools, it was a very obvious decision that we wanted to play at

Andrews entered Clemson in 2008 and was able to get on the field as a first-year freshman. He played 25 snaps and recorded five tackles as one of only four firstyear freshmen to earn a letter on defense

In 2009, Andrews recorded five tackles again in 14 games, including a season-high three tackles in a win at N.C. State where he played a career-high 16 snaps. The Tigers captured the ACC Atlantic Division title that year.

As a junior, Andrews totaled five tackles for the third straight season. However, he suffered a torn ACL against Georgia Tech on October 23 and missed the remainder of the year. He said that missing time for the injury helped him mature.

"I believe that all things happen for a reason, and it helped me realize that football is only temporary," said Andrews. "It allowed me to mature and get my priorities straight in my life. It also helped me appreciate the game that I play and love. Having to watch my teammates play every week was tough, but it was a good motivation to get back and keep rehabbing."

So far this season, Andrews has played in every game, including 17 snaps on defense, and has recorded three tackles, giving 18 tackles for his career. Throughout his career, Andrews has been a significant contributor on special teams and has embraced the role

"I take the perspective that every time we step on the field, we have the opportunity to change the game, whether it's pinning the opposing team inside its 20 or creating good field position for our offense by getting a

big return.

"I believe that it all starts with us. We are the unit that starts the game and

starts the second half, so it's important that we go out there with great energy to get everyone going. If we come out there excited to do our job, it will automatically carry over to the rest of the team."

For his life after college, Andrews plans to use the skills he has learned on the grid-

"I would like to pursue some type of career in medical sales. I believe that I have the personality and work ethic that I have learned while playing at Clemson to be successful in medical sales. It's a competitive field, and that is something that is in my blood."

So far in his time at Clemson, Andrews'

favorite moment as a Tiger was running down the Hill for the first time.

"After my father passed

away my senior year in high school to pancreatic cancer, it would always get me down to think that he would never see me play as a college athlete. After running down the Hill for the first time, I knew he was sitting up there watching me with the best seat in the Valley.

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rior to his head coaching position at Clemson, Dabo Swinney was an assistant coach who was known for his ability to recruit players from all over the country. Now as head coach of the Tigers, Swinney has the opportunity to lead many of the players he recruited. Alabama native Drew Traylor is one of them.

When asked about his head coach, Traylor admitted, "I'm always pulling for the good ole boy from 'Bama. Being a Birmingham native, I had plenty to talk to coach about from the very first time we met."

In fact, it was the Alabama connection with Swinney that sold Traylor on playing football in Tigertown.

In the fall of 2006, Traylor was a senior defensive end at Mountain Brook High School looking to further his football career. Traylor, who started playing football in sixth grade, lettered in both football and baseball for the Spartans. He even pitched a no-hitter as a senior and was an all-state selection on the diamond.

"With the recognition of my success and the attention of recruitment came the

realization that my days of football could continue in college." said Traylor, who started at defensive end in the

Alabama North-South All-Star game. "All of the pieces fell together. Looking back, it's like a dream."

At the time, he was being pursued by Clemson, Duke, Kentucky, Northwestern, Purdue, South Carolina, and Vanderbilt. After meeting Swinney, sharing a bond over Alabama heritage, and seeing Clemson's campus, Traylor knew where he belonged.

Traylor, whose great grandfather played football at Clemson in the 1920s, red-shirted in his first year. In 2008, only halfway through his second season, he found himself playing for the young Alabama native who had recruited him.

"I'm proud of the success he's found as head coach since that 2008 season," explained Traylor. "With Coach Swinney, we are a single unit, true to our motto, 'One Team, One Dream, When the new players come in, they're automatically welcomed. There's no division among recruitment classes. We all appreciate each other and what we contribute to the team."

Although recruited as a defensive end, Traylor found his spot at Clemson playing tight end. In his time as Tiger, Traylor has been a part of some big triumphs. In 2010, he helped Clemson in victories over Maryland, Georgia Tech, and N.C. State, three of the season's biggest victories

Now in his senior year, Traylor has continued to contribute to the Tigers' success.

Traylor's leadership abilities were amplified when starting tight end Dwayne Allen was hurt early in the season. Looking to the depth of their roster to compensate for Allen's injury, the Tigers found continued success and reliability in Traylor.

However, the 6'5", 250-pound tight end is more impressed with the work of his teammates than his own contributions to

Traylor sees something truly special in his teammates and the program that Swinnev has developed.

Traylor wants to leave Clemson knowing that there's a successful program in



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
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## ENIOR VETERAN RESERVE



im Barker has worn almost every hat possible in his almost five decades as a member of the Clemson family - student, athlete, alumnus, teacher, dean, parent, fan, and president. On reflection, he thinks "student" is the most important.

"I often tell people I learned everything from plumbing to poetry in architecture school, and I use every bit of that knowledge as president of Clemson University," said Barker.

A 1970 Clemson graduate, Barker was named president in 1999 with a mandate from the Board of Trustees to lead Clemson into the top ranks of American universities. At his inaugural address in April of 2000, he said, "I am convinced that there is no university in America stronger than Clemson when we are 'One Clemson.' A united Clemson is unstoppable."

During the "One Clemson" decade that followed, the university harnessed the competitive, determined spirit of the Clemson family to transform itself from a respected state institution into one of the nation's finest public universities.

Clemson climbed from the third tier to a top-25 ranking among public universities in the 2011 U.S. News & World Report guide to colleges, and it has been recognized for value, affordability, and return on investment by Kiplinger's and Bloomberg/Businessweek magazines. Ninetytwo percent of seniors would choose Clemson again according to the National Survey of Student Engagement. Also, Clemson is third among all public universities in the percentage of alumni who make gifts to their school. That is another indication of quality and alumni satisfaction.


A native of Kingsport, TN, Barker received his bachelor of arts degree from Clemson University in 1970 and his master



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hen the Clemson baseball squad played host to the 2011 NCAA Tournament, it meant the Tiger sports program had accomplished something only one other program had done nationally. It marked the third consecutive year Clemson had been to a bowl game, the NCAA Men's Basketball Tournament, and the NCAA Baseball Tournament. Only Florida State has equaled that accomplish-

Reaching a high level of success in the high-profile sports is a credit to the administrative acumen of Clemson Athletic Director Dr. Terry Don Phillips. Now in his 10th year at Clemson, Phillips has enhanced the Tiger program on many levels.

The 2010-11 season marked the fourth straight year the men's basketball program reached the NCAA Tournament, a first in the 100-year history of that program. The Tiger football team has been bowl eligible each of Phillips' nine previous years and has had four top-25 final rankings. The baseball program has been to the NCAA Tournament eight of his nine years and has been to the College World Series twice.

In addition to the success of the highprofile sports in 2010-11, the women's track & field program won the ACC title both indoor and outdoor, the second

straight year they accomplished that feat, and finished in the top 20 at both national meets. The men and the women both finished in the top 25 at the indoor meet

The rowing program had its third straight top-15 finish and the women's tennis team made its ninth straight NCAA Tournament appearance. Overall, seven teams finished in the top 25 in the nation.

In his nine years at Clemson, it has had 53 teams finish the season in the top 25, including the golf team that won

the 2003 national title. Five different women's sports have captured ACC titles during his tenure. Only Virginia has had a wider variety of women's sports win league titles.

The 2010-11 academic year was also a year of great accomplishment on an individual basis. Track athletes Patricia Mamona (triple jump), Miller Moss (heptathlon), and Brianna Rollins (60m hurdles) won national titles. Golfer Corbin Mills won the United States Public Links National Championship. Women's tennis players Josipa Bek and Keri Wong reached the finals of the NCAA Doubles Championship, a first in Clemson's storied program. Defensive end Da'Ouan Bowers won the Bronko Nagurski Award as the top defensive player in college football.

One of the reasons for Clemson's level of success as a total sports program has been his emphasis on improving facilities. On June 30, 2009, the football staff moved into the WestZone at Memorial Stadium. It was a day that brought a smile to everyone associated with the program, but especially Phillips, who had been working toward that day before he arrived in 2002.

Phillips' vision for the WestZone was to create a top-of-the-line facility for the football program, but at the same time have a positive effect on the total sports program.

The facility at Memorial Stadium now creates more office space, new locker rooms, and training room and strength training facilities for the Olympic sports programs.

In the 2011 spring semester, nearly 50 percent of student-athletes were on the academic honor roll and seven of the 15 programs had team GPAs of at least 3.0.

All 19 Clemson teams posted APR scores of at least 945 and 13 of the 19 were over 975. The football program had a 977 APR score for the 2009-10 data, a cohort of four years that ends with the student-athletes who were on the team for the 2009-10 academic year. Clemson was 11th out of all FBS programs in terms of APR score.

Phillips has been recognized for these accomplishments in recent years. He was named as one of the 100 Most Influential Sports Educators in America in 2008 by The Institute for International Sport at the University of Rhode Island.

Phillips was also recognized nationally for his performance at Clemson in 2006 when he was honored by NACDA (National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics) as the 2005-06 GeneralSports Turf Systems Athletic Director-of-the-Year for the FBS Southeast Region. He was one of just four FBS athletic directors honored at the annual convention in New Orleans, LA.

Excellence in academics has been a lifelong pursuit. He has an undergraduate degree from Arkansas (1970), a master's degree from Virginia Tech (1974), a doctorate degree from Virginia Tech (1978), and a law degree from the University of Arkansas School of Law (1996). He is a member of the Arkansas Bar, South Carolina Bar, American Bar Association, and Sports Law-

Phillips maintains a classroom presence by teaching a sports law section in Clemson's accountancy & legal studies department. In addition, he is past chair of the NCAA Division I Infractions Appeals Committee and continues to serve the committee as requested.

Prior to coming to Clemson, he served as athletic director at Oklahoma State. Football was transformed from a perennial losing status to very competitive, enjoying a return to bowl games after several years and establishing a winning record against in-state rival Oklahoma. For this, he received the National Football Foundation Oklahoma Chapter Outstanding Contribution to Amateur Football Award in 2002.

Before leading the Cowboys, he was a senior associate athletic director at Arkansas (1988-94). He also served as athletic director at Liberty (1980,81) and Louisiana-Lafayette (1983-88). He was an assistant athletic director at Missouri (1981-83) and began his administrative career as an assistant athletic director at Florida (1979).

Phillips began his career in college athletics coaching football. He started as a graduate assistant at Arkansas in 1970 and 1971. He moved on to Virginia Tech as an assistant coach (1971-78) before joining the ranks of athletic administration. At Virginia Tech, he served on coaching staffs that included future Clemson Head Coaches Charley Pell and Danny Ford.

Winning has been on Phillips' resumé since his playing days at Arkansas. He lettered on three Frank Broyles teams, where he and his brother, Lovd, an Outland Trophy winner, were starting defensive tackles, the first brother combination to start together under Broyles. Arkansas had a 27-5 record in the three years, played in two Sugar Bowl games, and he played in the memorable 1969 National Championship game against Texas, a contest that

> continues to be featured on ESPN Classic.

In 2010, he joined Loyd in the University of Arkansas Hall of Honor.

Phillips has two children, John Dennis and Sarah-Jane, and three stepchildren, Meagan (a Clemson graduate and former member of Tiger Band), Marshall, and Madison. His wife, Tricia, is a graduate of the University of Missouri School of Journalism and earlier enjoyed a career in athletics and development. She is currently active in the Clemson and Seneca communities.

t 41, Dabo Swinney is the youngest head coach in the ACC and one of the youngest in the country. However, his resumé is already stuffed with many significant accomplishments on a school, ACC, and national level.

First, his mere appointment to the position was significant. In October of 2008, he was named Clemson interim head coach, replacing Tommy Bowden, who had been his position coach as a player at Alabama and been Clemson's head coach since 1999. He led the Tigers to a 4-2 record over the remainder of the regular season, including a victory over Steve Spurrier's South Carolina Gamecocks in the regularseason finale. That strong finish led to a Gator Bowl bid against Nebraska.

On December 1, 2008, the interim tag was removed from the title and he was named the program's head coach. At the time, there had been 28 interim head coaches at the FBS level since 1970 and those coaches had combined for a record of 26-86-2. Only one of those 28 interim coaches posted a winning record, and that was Swinney. When he was hired as the head coach, Swinney became just the second interim coach to be elevated to the head coach position at the same school during that time period.

In addition to leading the program to three bowl games on the field in his career, his players have also excelled in the classroom. As a head coach, his players have an APR score of 988, best among active FBS coaches.

Clemson had to replace three First-Team All-ACC position players on offense in 2010, as Jacoby Ford, Michael Palmer, and C.J. Spiller moved on to the NFL. It was the first year since 1956 that Clemson had to replace three First-Team All-ACC skill position players in the same year. All three

players performed well in the NFL in 2010,

scoring. But the Clemson defense held N.C. State to just one touchdown and 13 points. The team excelled defensively in 2010 and was 13th in the nation in scoring defense and in the top 25 in both total defense and pass defense.

American in Swinney's first year, and defensive end Da'Quan Bowers duplicated the feat on the defensive side of the ball. Bowers won the 2010 Bronko Nagurski Award as the nation's top defensive player, and he received the Ted Hendricks Award as the top defensive end. He was also a finalist for the Bednarik Award and Lombardi Award. He led the nation in sacks (15.5) and was tied for the national lead in tackles for loss (26).

Bowers was one of four First-Team All-ACC players in 2010, as he joined Jarvis Jenkins (DT) and DeAndre McDaniel (S) on defense and Chris Hairston (OT) on offense. Clemson and Maryland tied for the most First-Team All-ACC selections.

In 2009, his first full year as head coach, he led the Tigers to their first championship of the ACC Atlantic Division. The Tigers came just six points short of winning their first ACC title in 18 years. Swinney was named ACC Coach-of-the-Year by Sporting News and was a finalist for the Liberty Mutual Coach-of-the-Year award.

road in school history. Swinney became Clemson's interim head coach on October 13, 2008 when Tommy Bowden stepped down. Then on December 1, 2008, the "interim" tag was removed, as he took over on a full-time basis as the Tigers' 25th head coach. He had been Clemson's assistant head coach for two years and had been in charge of the wide receivers since 2003.

Swinney took over a 3-3 team and led it to a Gator Bowl bid against Nebraska. He guided Clemson to a 4-1 record over the last five games of the regular season, with the only loss at #24 Florida State. That 4-1 record to end the regular season tied for





the best mark in the ACC for that time period. Four of his six regular-season opponents were later bowl participants.

The 1993 Alabama graduate joined the Clemson staff prior to the 2003 season. In his eight years as an assistant or head coach, the Tigers have finished in the top 25 of the final polls four times and totaled 11 wins over top-25 teams, including victories over Florida State (4), Miami (FL) (2), and Tennessee (1), during his tenure in Tigertown.

Swinney coached his wide receiver position to a level of consistency that had not been seen previously at Clemson. He had a wideout finish first or second in the ACC in catches five of the last six years. In his first year, he had three of the top-10 receivers in the ACC, a first in Tiger history. He has coached a First or Second-Team All-ACC wideout (Derrick Hamilton, Airese Currie, Chansi Stuckey, Aaron Kelly, Ford) in seven of his eight seasons at Clemson, also an unprecedented feat at Clemson.

The Alabama native has a reputation as one of the top recruiters in the nation. In 2006, he was listed as the #5 recruiter in the nation by <u>Rivals.com</u>. It marked the second straight year that he was lauded by the website as a top-25 national recruiter. He signed 38 players in his five recruiting seasons as an assistant coach and was a major reason Clemson's 2008 recruiting class was rated #2 in the nation according to <u>ESPN.com</u> when he signed 11 players. He was named one of the top-25 recruiters in the nation by <u>Rivals.com</u> in 2007 as well.

Swinney received a commerce & business administration degree from Alabama in 1993 after lettering three times (1990-92). A walk-on who went on to earn a scholarship, Swinney was a wideout on Alabama's 1992 National Championship team. He was also named Academic All-SEC along with being an SEC Scholar-Athlete Honor Roll member in 1990 and 1992.

Along with his appearance in the 1993 Sugar Bowl, his Alabama teams played in

the 1990 Sugar Bowl, 1991 Fiesta Bowl, and 1991 Blockbuster Bowl. Both Sugar Bowl appearances came after winning the SEC Championship game.

After his playing career, Swinney served as a graduate assistant from 1993-95 at Alabama, where he coached in the 1994 Gator Bowl and 1995 Citrus Bowl. In December of 1995, he received his master's degree in business administration from Alabama.

He became a full-time assistant coach at Alabama in February of 1996 under Head Coach Gene Stallings (now in the Hall of Fame) and coached a total of five seasons there on a full-time basis. He was assigned to coach the Crimson Tide's wide

receivers and tight ends in 1996, a season that saw Alabama win the SEC Western Division title and make an Outback Bowl appearance. The following year, he solely coached the tight ends under Head Coach Mike DuBose.

In 1998, he coached Alabama's wide receivers, a position he held for three seasons. At the end of the 1999 campaign, Swinney coached the Crimson Tide in the 2000 Orange Bowl after winning the SEC Championship game. Wide receiver Freddie Milons was the game MVP.

During his time at Alabama, Swinney was a part of six teams with at least 10 wins, five top-10 finishes, one national title (1992), three SEC Championships

(1989,92,99), and five SEC Western Division titles (1992,93,94,96,99) as a player and coach. He has coached the #2 receiver at Alabama (Milons) along with the #1 (Kelly) and #2 (Hamilton) receivers in Tiger history.

As an assistant coach, he had 20 former players either drafted or sign free-agent contracts with NFL teams. The list includes Hamilton, Currie, Kevin Youngblood, Stuckey, and Milons, an All-American at Alabama.

From April of 2001 through February of 2003, Swinney was in private business in Alabama. He married the former Kathleen Bassett in 1994. They have three sons, Will (13), Drew (11), and Clay (8).

Woody McCorvey returned to Clemson after 20 years to become Associate Athletic Director for Football Administration on Dabo Swinney's first staff in 2009. He was Swinney's position coach during his playing days at Alabama and served as wide receivers and tight ends coach on Danny Ford's Tiger staff from 1983-89.

McCorvey serves as the primary liaison between Swinney and the athletic and IPTAY administration. He also oversees the management of the football administrative offices

His return had a positive effect on the program in 2009 when Clemson won the ACC Atlantic Division for the first time and finished the season in the top 25 of the AP poll.

He supervises the football budget and works with the staff at Vickery Hall to oversee the team's academic progress. Clemson had six players named to the Academic All-ACC team in 2010 and Clemson's APR score in 2011 was 11th-best among Division I programs. He also makes speaking engagements and represents the football staff at various meetings and functions.

McCorvey worked seven seasons at Clemson between 1983-89. With McCorvey coaching the tight ends from 1983-85 and the wide receivers from 1986-89, Clemson posted a 60-19-3 record and won three ACC titles. During that time, the Tigers were invited to the 1985 independence Bowl, the 1986 and 1989 Gator Bowls, and the 1988 and 1989 Citrus Bowls. Clemson posted a 10-2 record in each of his last three seasons under Ford.

Among the players he recruited were future Pro Bowlers Donnell Woolford and Chester McGlockton. McGlockton was inducted into the state of South Carolina Hall of Fame in 2011. McCorvey also coached future NFL players Keith Jennings and K.D. Dunn.

McCorvey coached at the Division I level for 26 years and went to a bowl game 17 of those seasons. Overall, he had 36 years of experience as a football coach. He coached or signed 36 players who went on to a professional football career as well.

From 1990-08, he coached in the SEC every year, including each of the last five at Mississippi State, where he served as assistant head coach and offensive coordinator in addition to coaching the quarterbacks. He was a big reason the Bulldogs won eight games. including wins over Auburn, Alabama, and Mississippi, in 2007. He also coached running back Anthony Dixon, who was a sixth-round draft pick by the 49ers in 2010, and Kyle Love, a free-agent signee.

McCorvey coached at Tennessee for five years (1999-03). With him heading the running game, the Volunteers had a 46-14 record. He helped guide Tennessee to the 2000 Fiesta Bowl, 2001 Cotton Bowl, 2002 Citrus Bowl, and 2002 and 2003 Peach Bowls. Tennessee won three consecutive New Year's Day Bowl games from 2000-02.

Prior to joining the staff at Tennessee, McCorvey worked one season at South Carolina, where he served as the wide receivers coach in 1998 under former Tiger Assistant Coach Brad Scott.

McCorvey took the South Carolina job following an eight-year stay at Alabama from 1990-97. He served seven seasons as its wide receivers coach and the 1996 campaign as offensive coordinator. He was the assistant head coach in 1997 as well.

Alabama had five top-2S final rankings in his tenure in Tuscaloosa, including three seasons in the top five. The Crimson Tide won the 1992 national title with McCorvey serving as wide receivers coach and Swinney as one of his student-athletes. That season culminated with a 34-13 win over heavily-favored Miami (FL) in the Sugar Bowl. Current Clemson Assistant Coach Danny Pearman was also on that staff.

From 1990-96, Alabama had a 70-16-1 record and played in six bowl games. With McCorvey at the controls of the 1996 offense, Alabama was 10-3, including a win over Michigan in the Outback Bowl.

From 1979-82, he served as an assistant coach at Alabama A&M and helped that program to the #6 rushing offense in Division II in 1981 after finishing 11th in the nation in scoring offense in 1980. McCorvey began his collegiate coaching career at North Carolina

McCorvey began his coaching career with a six-year stint (1972-77) at J.M. Tate Senior High School in Florida. A quarterback at Alabama State from 1968-71, McCorvey earned his bachelor's degree from Alabama State in 1972 and a master's degree from West Florida

In 2010, McCorvey was inducted into the Atmore (AL) Hall of Fame. The Atmore, AL native is married to the former Ann Brown. The couple has a son, Marlon

Brad Scott is in his 13th year with the Clemson program, but his first in athletic administration. The assistant athletic director moved into administration in March of 2011 after 12 seasons as an assistant coach under Tommy Bowden and Dabo Swinney from 1999-10. His 12-year tenure, which included him working with the offensive line, is tied for the ninth-longest for a Clemson football assistant coach in the program's history.

Scott works primarily with the football program in various administrative duties, but he has department-wide responsibilities when it comes to serving as a liaison between Clemson and high schools in securing documents needed to gain admission.

Clemson had great success on the gridiron during Scott's tenure as an assistant coach. The Tigers recorded seven of the top-nine yards-per-play seasons in school history, six of the top-eight seasons in total offense, each of the top-five touchdown teams, and each of the top-nine passing yardage teams during his 12-year career.

From 2001-03, Scott served as offensive coordinator, and in that time, Clemson had two of the top-four total offense figures in school history. The 2003 offense set a passing yardage record (3,687) that still stands today. That top-2S team that beat #3 Florida State and #6 Tennessee at the end of the 2003 season averaged 432.0 yards per game, still the second-best mark in school history.

Clemson was bowl eligible all 12 years Scott was on staff and the Tigers played in 11 bowl games. The Tigers had five top-25 seasons, including 2009 when Clemson won the ACC Atlantic Division. He coached 1S First or Second-Team All-ACC players, including five who earned All-America honors.

Scott served under Bobby Bowden at Florida State from 1983-93. He was the program's offensive coordinator from 1990-93. In 1993, Florida State won its first national title and Seminole quarterback Charlie Ward became the school's first Heisman Trophy winner. He also gained recognition as an outstanding recruiter during

his career. Florida State had the #1 class in the nation multiple times as the recruiting coordinator, and he was named one of the top-2S recruiters in the nation by two recruiting services in 2010 when he signed two five-star recruits from the state of Florida.

Scott is a 1979 graduate of South Florida and earned a master's degree from Florida State in 1984. He was born on September 30. 1954 in Arcadia, FL and is married to Darvle. The couple has two sons (Jeff, John). Jeff is an assistant coach and the recruiting coordinator on the football staff.

Andy Johnston is in his 15th year with the Tiger football program and currently serves as associate athletic director for football operations. His responsibilities include managing the program's day-to-day operations. Although this is his 15th year with the football program, he has been involved with the Clemson athletic department for 29 years. From 1983-97, he was the winningest women's tennis coach in school history.

In 15 years, Johnston guided his squads to five consecutive ACC titles (1983-87), 12 top-25 finishes, and six NCAA Tourneys. He was ACC Coach-of-the-Year for the fourth time and Southeast Region Coachof-the-Year for the second time in 1993. Seven players he coached at Clemson were named to the ACC 50-Year Anniversary team in 2002.

Johnston hada 254-160 Clemson record and 263-167 career mark. He was the coach at Furman in 1982 before coming to Clemson. His best season at Clemson was his rookie year when the team had a 30-5 record and finished #7 in the polls. That team won all nine flights of the ACC Tournament, the only tennis team in Tiger history to do that. He coached former Lady Tiger Gigi Fernandez, who was inducted into the Clemson Hall of Fame in 2005.

Johnston played for Clemson on the hardcourt and earned his degree in administrative management in 1979. He then served as the assistant men's tennis coach in 1980.

Johnston is a native of Summerville, SC. He is married to the former Sophie Woorons. He has a daughter, Kiera (21), and a son. Noah (4). A second daughter, Caylynn, passed away in 2008.



Assistant AD Player Relations & External Affairs

Jeff Davis is in his third year as assistant athletic director for player relations & external affairs within the Clemson football program. During the previous five years, he served as an assistant athletic director for fundraising, where he helped raise funds for the WestZone Club at Memorial Stadium. He also served as the primary spokesman for Clemson University's Call Me Mister Program and served as director from 1999-03

Davis was an All-America linebacker from 1978-81 who captained the Tigers during their 1981 national title run. "The Judge" registered a then-Tiger-record 175 tackles in 1981. That same season, he became just the third defensive player in ACC history to be named league MVP. Davis had 14 tackles as Clemson topped Nebraska 22-15 in the 1982 Orange Bowl to claim its first national title.

In 1995, he became the fourth member of the Clemson Ring of Honor, then he was named to Clemson's Centennial Team in 1996. In 2002, he was named to the ACC's 50-Year Anniversary team.

In 2007, he was accorded the highest honor attainable for a college player when he was inducted into the National Football Foundation College Football Hall of Fame. Davis has made a name for himself outside of the Clemson community. A fifth-round draft pick by Tampa Bay in 1982, he played six seasons in the NFL. During his time as a professional, he also completed his remaining coursework and graduated from Clemson in 1984.

In 1999, he returned to Clemson as field director of Call Me Mister. It seeks to recruit, train, certify, and secure employment for African-American males as elementary teachers in the state's public schools. In 2001, he was awarded \$100,000 for the program from Oprah Winfrey's "Angel Network."

Davis is the president of Goal Line Stand, which supports young people as adults as they seek to remain committed to values that shape and govern their lives. The ordained pastor lives in Clemson with his wife, Joni, and their six children.





Clemson's Memorial Stadium has been held in high esteem for many years. Whether it be players from the 1940s and 1950s, opposing players from the 1970s and 1980s, or even professional players in the 1990s, the ambiance of this special setting is what college football is

The storied edifice added to its legend when the first meeting of father and son head coaches (Bowden Bowl I) took place before a sellout crowd of more than 86,000 fans in 1999. Clemson has been in the top 20 in the nation in average attendance 30 straight seasons. A crowd has exceeded 80,000 fans 57 times since the 1983 season. 2010. Clemson was 18th in the nation in average home attendance.

The facility's mystique is derived from its many traditions, which date to its opening in 1942, the legendary games and players, and Clemson's corresponding rate of success. Clemson has won 256 game in 69 years there and has won nearly 72 percent of the contests (256 game). 7)

The stadium has definitely been good to the Tigers, but it was constructed against the advice of at least one coach. Just before Head Coach Jess Neely left for Rice after the 1939 season, he gave Clemson a message.

"Don't ever let them talk you into building a big stadium," he said.
"Put about 10,000 seats behind the YMCA. That's all you'll ever need."
Instead of following Neely's advice, however, Clemson officials
decided to build the new stadium in a valley on the western part of
campus. The place took some clearing, as there were many trees, but
luckily there were no hedges.

The crews went to work, clearing, cutting, pouring, and forming. Finally on September 19, 1942, Memorial Stadium opened with Clemson defeating Presbyterian College 32-13. Those 20,000 seats installed for the opener would soon grow.

When the original part of the stadium was built in the early 1940s much of the work was done by scholarship athletes, including many

football players. The first staking out of the stadium was done by two members of the football team, A.N. Cameron and Hugh Webb. Webb returned to Clemson years later to be an architecture professor and Cameron went on to become a civil engineer in Louisiana.

The construction of the stadium did not proceed without problems. One afternoon during the clearing of the land, a young player proudly announced that he was not allergic to poison oak. He then proceeded to attack the poison oak with a swing blade, throwing the plants to and fro. The next day, the boy was swollen twice his size and was hospitalized.

There are many other stories about the stadium, including one that Frank Howard put a chew of tobacco in each corner as the concrete poured.

Howard said that the seeding of the grass caused a few problems. "About 40 people and I laid sod on the field," he said. "After three weeks on July 15, we had only gotten halfway through.





I told them that it had taken us three weeks to get that far and uld give them three more weeks' pay for however long it took. I also told them we would have 50 gallons of ice cream when we got through. After that, it took them three days to do the rest of the field Then we sat down in the middle of the field and ate up that whole 50

Howard said that on the day of the first game in the stadium, "the gates were hung at 1:00 and we played at 2:00." But that would be all of the construction for awhile. Then in 1958, 18,000 sideline seats were added, and in 1960, 5,658 west endzone seats were added in response to increasing attendance. With the large east endzone ("Green Grass' section), this expansion increased capacity to 53,000.

Later, upper decks were added to each side of Memorial Stadium as wds swelled - the first in 1978 and the second in 1983. It increased capacity to over 80,000, which makes it one of the nation's largest on-campus stadiums. In 2006, the WestZone was added, an area that

The effect that inflation has had can be dramatically seen in the differences in stadium construction. The original part of Memorial m was built at a cost of only \$125,000, or \$6.25 per seat. The stadium's newest upper deck was finished in 1983 at a cost of \$13.5

Through the years, Memorial Stadium has become known as "Death ." It was tagged by the late Presbyterian College Coach Lonnie McMillian in the late 1940s. After bringing his teams to Clemson for years and getting whipped, he said the place was like "Death Valley." ew years later, the name stuck.

In 1974, the playing surface was named Frank Howard Field for the legendary coach, because of his long service and dedication to





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FOR SEVERAL FOOTBALL SEASONS, CONSTRUCTION HAS DOMINATED THE LANDSCAPE ON THE WEST SIDE OF MEMORIAL STADIUM. AS TIME PASSED, ATHLETIC OFFICIALS INSISTED THAT WESTZONE WOULD BE ONE OF THE FINEST FOOTBALL FACILITIES IN THE COUNTRY. NOW THAT PHASE III OF THE WESTZONE INITIATIVE IS FINISHED, TIGER FANS CAN SEE FIRST-HAND THAT THOSE ASSURANCES WERE ACCURATE.







The everyday activities for the football program moved to Memorial Stadium on July 1. 2009. Tiger coaches moved into new offices in the WestZone of Memorial Stadium that day. A month later, the team made the locker room in Death Valley its full-time facility. Additionally, a new equipment facility, a highest ctraining facility, and strength training facility opened with all the modern conveniences of an NFL franchise's facility.

The new facility is 142,000 square feet, which adds over 50,000 square feet to previous facilities in the Jervey Athletic Center. It includes a two-floor strength training facility that is 14,000 square feet, among the largest dedicated solely for football in the nation.

"Our programs motto since I became head coach is All-In," said Head Coach Dabo Swinney. This facility shows any Common football player, recruit, or supporter that our University is 'All-In' with this program. The facility is among the best in the nation and allows our student-athletes to develop and become the best they can be."

our student athletes to develop and become the best they can be."

The equipment room has been expanded to include, among other items, new offices and a new laundry room that encompasses approximately 6,000 square feet of space. The football staff offices and meeting rooms are composed of approximately 4,000 square feet of existing space and more than 18,000 square feet of new space.

The facility includes offices for the head coach, assistant coaches, and support staff along with position meeting rooms and a 150-seat ım with a sloped floor and theater seating.

The training room, located on the north side of the home team's locker room, is expanded to include a new hydrotherapy room, new tion rooms. The training room occupies about

offices, and examination rooms. The training room occupies about 6200 square feet of space as well.

The level-three concourse has been expanded with the addition of the football offices. This space, the roof of the new football offices, is utilized for gameday marketing activities and to provide fans additional space to gather inside the stadium.

In 2011, Phase III of the WestZone project was completed, which added 8000 square feet of enclosed space on the north side of the

added 8,000 square feet of enclosed space on the florth side of the second level.

Clemson is committed to building a model sports program - one that propels our University into achieving and maintaining national athletic rankings that rival our competitors. The WestZone project is a major step forward in building a total sports program.


In order to be a consistent contender at the highest level of competition, Clemson must recruit the best student athletes in the country-student athletes who can compete both academically intellectassroom and athletically on the field. The nation's best recruits are impressed by superior facilities, top coaches, and a strong sense of excitement along with school spirit. The student-athletes desire an environment in which they will have a positive, nurturing experience. It is no coincidence that the quality of recruiting classes has improved dramatically since the WestZone project began in 2004.

Coaching is the most critical component of such an environment. An outstanding coach can sometimes transform meager resources into a good program, but the greatest success comes when top quality coaching combined with top-quality facilities allows that coach to recruit successfully on a consistent and continuing basis.

Former Clemson running back James Davis, the 2005 ACC Rookie of the Year and now with the Washington Redskins, stated that one of the biggest contributing factors in deciding on Clemson was the University's commitment to upgrading facilities. "Does Clemson want to be a championship program?" asked Davis when he was considering Clemson. "The WestZone (initiative) showed me that it does!" Building success requires building for success. While the WestZone is located in Memorial Stadium, the completed project provides resources for Clemson's total sports program, permitting all Tiger teams and athletes to compete with the nation's best. Moving all football operations to the WestZone has opened up space in the Jervey and McFadden buildings for the other 18 sports to improve their facilities for recruiting and have more office, training, conditioning. facilities for recruiting and have more office, training, conditioning and sports medicine space. This will greatly enhance the overall performance, both on and off the field, for all 19 sports.

A look to Clemson's athletic history shows the importance in-frastructure enhancements have on the football program. The following chart summarizes the relationship.

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

Batson was named master strength & conditioning coach by the Collegiate Strength & Conditioning Coaches Association (CSCCA) in 2009. This honor is the highest given in the strength & conditioning profession. He was also presented with a blue MSCC jacket in 2009.

Batson has had a strong impact on the Clemson program since he became director in 1997, helping the Tigers to 12 bowl games and five top-25 final rankings. While at Clemson, he has worked for three head football coaches and has had a tremendous impact throughout the state at many notable high school programs.

An example of his respect level in the profession is demonstrated by the number of former assistants who are now assistants and/or directors at other universities, including leagues such as the ACC and SEC, along with several high-profile high school programs in the state.

Batson is married to the former Susan Malone of Greenville, 50 The couple has two sons, Michael and Benjamin.







ince its inception in 1991, the Student-Athlete Enrichment Programs have provided Clemson studentathletes a continued commitment to excellence. Our approach is to address the total student-athlete, and we are committed to coaching our student-athletes to success in the academic, personal growth, career, and community service arenas.

As an original member of the NCAA CHAMPS/Life Skills Program, we provide opportunities and services to address the changing needs and skills of student-athletes during college and after graduation. This program was selected for the FBS Athletic Director's Association "Program of Excellence" Award, a lifetime award recognizing CHAMPS/Life

Clemson's commitment to provide its student-athletes with the best facilities is evident in many ways. From the soaring upper decks of Memorial Stadium and the beautiful WestZone, to the "New Littlejohn Coliseum," to the state-ofthe-art strength training facility, young men and women from all of Clemson's intercollegiate varsity sports have the best in facilities for both training and competition.

The Student-Athlete Enrichment Programs are housed in Vickery Hall, located in the center of campus. The \$3-million structure is as impressive aesthetically as other athletic facilities. But the importance of Vickery Hall to our studentathletes is not found in the structure itself, but in the many programs that the building houses.

Vickery Hall opened in 1991 and was the first facility in the country constructed solely to provide academic support to student-athletes. The two-story, 27,000 square-foot building is open all day and into the evening hours to accommodate student-athletes' extended schedules.

Vickery Hall programs are dedicated to providing a holistic, educational experience by inspiring an environment of respect, integrity, and excellence. Through these services, Vickery Hall guides and encourages each individual to reach his or her full potential as a student, athlete, and citizen.

Vickery Hall was recently certified (as one of only 19 programs in the country to date) by the National Association of Academic Advisors for Athletics. The tutoring program was certified (as one of only three athletic tutoring programs in the nation) by the College Reading & Learning Association.

#### **Academic Commitment**

Ten of Clemson's 19 sports programs had their highest Academic Progress Report (APR) scores on record, including the football team along with the men's and women's basketball teams, according to statistics released by the NCAA in 2011. All 19 programs posted scores of at least

945 and 13 of the 19 were over 975. The APR measures classroom performance of student-athletes for every Division I program. Teams scoring below the 925 cutline can face penalties.

Head Football Coach Dabo Swinney has the highest career APR score (988) among active FBS coaches. Over 90 percent of his seniors that have stayed to the end of their careers have graduated.

In the 2011 spring semester, seven of the 15 programs had team GPAs of at least 3.0 and the overall GPA was 2.90. A total of 227 of its 441 student-athletes were named to the academic honor roll, including 94 on the Dean's List.

The programs that posted a 3.0 GPA or better were the women's swimming & diving (3.59), women's track & field

(3.22), women's soccer (3.22), volleyball (3.14), men's soccer (3.06), rowing (3.03), and women's tennis (3.03) teams.

The number of sports programs with a 3.0 GPA or better is a testament to the impact Vickery Hall and its staff has had on the program's academic performance. Clemson had just five total programs with at least a 3.0 GPA for the eight semesters prior to the facility's opening in 1991. Now there are seven different programs in one semester.

The football team compiled a 2.45 GPA in the spring semester and 26 of the team members had at least a 3.0 GPA. Ten Tigers, including Dalton Freeman and Malliciah Goodman, made the Dean's List, while five Tigers, including Mason Cloy and Dawson Zimmerman, made the President's List. Clemson had six players named to the 2010 Academic All-ACC team, second only to Duke. The list includes Cloy, Freeman, Rashard Hall, and Zimmerman.

#### **Athletic Commitment**

Clemson was one of only 10 schools in the nation to be selected to a bowl game, the NCAA Men's Basketball Tournament, and the NCAA Baseball Tourney in 2010-11. Clemson joined Florida State as the only schools in the nation to advance to a bowl game along with the NCAA Tournament for baseball and men's basketball in three consecutive seasons. It was the 10th year that Clemson went to a bowl game, the NCAA Men's Basketball Tournament, and the NCAA Baseball Tournament in the same academic year.


Seven programs finished the 2010-11 season with a top-25 national ranking. The highest-ranked team to end the season was women's outdoor track & field, which finished #7 at the NCAA Championships. The other sports that finished their respective seasons in the top 25 were women's indoor track & field (#11), women's tennis (#14), rowing (#15), baseball (#16), men's indoor track & field (#22), and men's swimming & diving (#25).

The team of Josipa Bek and Keri Wong advanced to the championship match of the NCAA Tennis Doubles Tournament. The Tiger tandem knocked off two of the top-three national seeds and won a school-record 34 matches together during their historic season, which culminated with the runner-up finish.

Clemson's women's track & field program earned its second consecutive sweep of the ACC women's track & field championships (indoor and outdoor) with a 69.5-point margin of victory in the outdoor meet at Durham, NC in April.

Miller Moss won the NCAA Championship in the heptathlon, the first multi-event title in school history. Brianna Rollins won the indoor national championship in the 60m hurdles with a Clemson-record time of 7.96. Patricia Mamona defended her national championship in the triple jump, becoming only the second female in Clemson history to win more than one individual national championship.

Da'Quan Bowers was one of the most decorated athletes at Clemson in many years, as he was a unanimous first-team All-American, just the fourth player so honored in school history. The junior also won the Bronko Nagurski Award as the top all-around defensive player in the nation as chosen by the Football Writers Association along with the Ted Hendricks Award as the top defensive end in the

The NCAA definition of a "representative of athletics interest" generally encompasses most individuals who regularly attend Clemson sporting events (reminder once a representative, always a representative). Specifically, a booster or "representative of athletics interests" is any individual, independent agency, corporate entity, or other organization that is presently or has ever:

- · Participated in promoting the institution's athletic program (such as buying season tickets to sporting events).
- · Assisted in providing benefits (such as summer employment) to enrolled student-athletes.
- · Assisted or been requested by the department of athletics staff to assist in the recruitment of prospective student-athletes.
- · Attended Clemson University.
- · Contributed to the department of athletics or IPTAY.
- · Participated in or been a member of IPTAY.
- · Been otherwise involved in the Clemson University athletics program.

- · Identify outstanding potential student-athletes in your area and forward information, such as newspaper articles, to the coach of that sport at Clemson.
- · Continue to establish friendships with friends and neighbors, even those with prospect-aged children. However, contact for recruiting purposes is still prohibited.
- Attend, on your own initiative, events such as games and banquets where prospective student-athletes are present as long as you do not contact the prospect(s) or their family for recruiting purposes.
- Answer a call from a prospective student-athlete (you may not initiate the call) regarding only Clemson University in general, but not about Tiger athletics. Please promptly inform compliance services or the coach should this situation arise.
- · Make donations to a high school if it is located in your community, the donation is not made at the request of Clemson or Clemson coaches, and the funds are distributed through established channels and not directed towards a specific student-athlete.

#### Current student-athletes may...

- · Continue to come out and support student-athletes at Clemson athletic events.
- · Provide summer employment to student-athletes, but only if you contact Clemson's office of compliance servic-

#### **What Every Booster Should Know**

- Extra Benefit Any special arrangement by a Clemson employee, booster (IPTAY member), or alum to provide a prospective or enrolled student-athlete or their families and friends with a benefit not permitted by NCAA legislation. Examples of prohibited benefits include (but not limited to)
  - · Arranging employment for family and friends of the student-athlete.
  - · Free or reduced housing agreements.
  - · Gifts of money, awards, food/drinks, or other tangible
  - · Loans of money or automobiles.
  - Professional services without charge or at a discount.
  - · Promises of employment or loans following college
  - · Providing transportation for the student-athlete or their friends and family.
  - · Use of ATM, credit, or other types of gift cards.
- · Institutional Control A central principle of the NCAA by-laws. Institutional control requires that Clemson University conducts its intercollegiate athletics program in compliance with NCAA rules and regulations. This includes booster activities.
- Prospective Student-Athlete A student, regardless of their athletic ability, who has started classes for the ninth grade or any student enrolled at another two or four-year institution.
- Recruiting Any solicitation of a prospect or a prospect's family by Clemson's coaches or representatives of athletic interest for the purposes of securing the prospective student-athlete's ultimate enrollment and participation in athletics at Clemson. Only designated Clemson athletics department staff members may recruit.
- Student-Athlete A student whose enrollment was solicited by a member of the Clemson athletic department

staff or other representative of athletics interest with a goal of the student's ultimate participation in Clemson's intercollegiate athletics program. Student-athletes are not just those who were recruited or receive athletic scholarships, they are also those who participate in intercollegiate athletics.

#### **Activities That Will Harm Prospective Student-Athletes** You may not...

- · Contact (including phone calls, texts, and email) or interact with a prospective student-athlete or their family for the purpose of persuading them to attend Clemson.
- · Contact coaches, guidance counselors, or other school administrators in order to gain information on prospective student-athletes.
- Make contact with a prospective student-athlete or the prospect's family during official or unofficial visits.
- · Provide any other extra benefits to prospective studentathlete, family, friends, or their coaches.
- Provide prospective student-athletes or their family and friends with transportation or financial assistance.

#### **Activities That Will Harm Current Student-Athletes** You may not ...

- · Generally provide benefits that are not available to other members of the Clemson student body.
- · Provide extra benefits to student-athletes or their family and friends. Examples of prohibited benefits include (but not limited to):
  - · Gifts of money, awards, food/drinks, or other tangible
  - Free or reduced housing agreements.
  - Loans of money or automobiles.
  - Occasional meals.
  - · Professional services without charge or at a discount.
  - Promises of employment or loans following college graduation.
  - · Providing transportation for the student-athlete or their friends and family.
  - Sending student-athletes items to be autographed and returned or using autographed items to raise funds for high schools.
  - · Use of ATM, credit, or other types of gift cards.
  - Use the name or image of a current student-athlete to advertise, recommend, or promote products or

#### Consequences

Violations of these NCAA, ACC, and University policies can result in severe penalties, including:

- · Disassociation Clemson University may permanently disassociate itself with an athletic booster. You could lose the privilege of purchasing season tickets, the privilege of being an IPTAY member, or any other Clemson athletic-related benefit deemed appropriate.
- · Harm to the Enrolled Student-Athlete Violations can also result in the enrolled student-athlete or entire team being unable to compete for Clemson University.

It is produced on the lawn of Littlejohn Coliseum at the corner closest to Memorial Stadium.

The program begins three hours prior to kickoff on gameday. Roy Philpott, David Stein, Dory Kidd, and Ben Milstead host the show. It is a popular gathering place. Interviews with former players, games, display items, and other exciting action are all a part of the show.

The game broadcast is anchored by Pete Yanity. The sports director at WSPA-TV (Ch. 7) in Spartanburg, SC took over in 2003 after the passing of Jim Phillips, who had been the longtime Voice of the Tigers since 1968. Yanity has been a part of the broadcast team since 2001 as the host of the pregame, halftime, and postgame shows, and as the sideline reporter during games.

Yanity has been the sports director at WSPA the last 21 years. He has also been a sideline analyst

for 15 years on Carolina Panther preseason games and has play-by-play experience with **CS5**, covering various college events, including Tiger football and baseball games. Yanity is also the voice of Tiger men's basketball and the host of the Dabo Swinney and Brad Brownell Television Shows.

Joining Yanity in the booth is former Tiger offensive lineman Will Merritt, who played for the Tigers from 1998-01. He was a starting offensive guard during the 2000 and 2001 seasons when he was named Second-Team All-ACC.

Merritt worked on the Clemson radio network pregame and postgame shows during the 2002 season. He also

provided color commentary on the television tape-delay broadcasts of selected 2002 games. In 2003, he became the color analyst of the gameday broadcasts.

Patrick Sapp completes the broadcast team as the sideline commentator. The former Tiger quarterback and linebacker (1992-95) is in his fifth season as sideline com-

mentator. As a player, he passed for 2,278 yards in three seasons under center. During his senior campaign, he moved to linebacker, where he totaled 53 tackles and a team-high 5.5 sacks prior to being selected in the second round of the NFL draft by the San Diego Chargers. 5app is currently a development officer for the Clemson Alumni Association.

As has been the case in the past, the gameday broadcast begins with the Dabo Swinney Pregame Show. Swinney meets with Sports Information Director Tim Bourret to provide Tiger fans with the latest lineup and strategy information. Yanity and Merritt also provide a last-minute scene-setter that includes the latest lineup and weather information.

After the game, fans can tune in to the "Fifth Quarter Show." Interviews with Swinney and Coordinators Chad Morris and Kevin Steele are included. An added feature includes

locker room interviews with Clemson's top players that day. A rundown of stats and audio highlights are also provided.

The network also produces the Dabo Swinney Television Show, a recap of the previous contest's highlights. Yanity serves as the host of this program that gives fans insight into coaches' decisions from the previous game and takes an up-close look at your favorite players.





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City of Smiles, City with Styles





ooperstown, NY is the home of the National Baseball Hall of Fame, home of tradition and baseball history. It is also the home of Clemson senior utility player Phil Pohl.

"We moved to Cooperstown from California when I was 10 years old," recalled Pohl. "To me, that was the coolest thing ever. It's such an awesome town with so much baseball history. It was also somewhat of a culture shock. We went from a place where we could play baseball 10 out of 12 months to a place where you can only play baseball about four months out of 12.

"But, I loved being in a town where it was baseball all the time. The summers were especially amazing with all the tourists coming in. There's a great baseball vibe in the town."

Pohl fed off that baseball vibe growing up. In high school, he was a four-time baseball letterman, a four-time member of the Center State All-Star team, and a four-time team MVP. He was the state Class C Player-of-the-Year as a junior and was named Louisville Slugger and Gatorade Player-of-the-Year as a senior. Pohl was drafted out of high school in the 44th round (#1313 overall) by the Tampa Bay Rays, but instead he chose education over an immediate professional career.

"I was only 17 when I graduated high school," said Pohl. "My mom was a school teacher and we really valued education as a family. My parents told me it was ultimately my decision, but they wanted me to get an education. I knew I had a great opportunity to go play at one of the best baseball schools in the country.

"Being 17, I felt I wasn't ready for professional baseball yet, so I decided to come to Clemson. I really liked the coaching staff that was here, Coach (Jack) Leggett especially. He really sold me on the program."

Since coming to Clemson, Pohl has become one of the most respected players on the team for his hard work and dedication on the field and in the classroom. As a freshman, Pohl served as the primary backup catcher and saw action in 40 games (20 starts). He totaled nine runs, four doubles, one homer, three RBIs, a .341 on-base percentage, and only allowed one passed ball.

Pohl was also the catcher for the entire game against South Carolina-Upstate when five Tigers combined to pitch a no-hitter. Clemson's first since 1984.

As a sophomore in 2010, he played 35 games (17 starts). He hit .212 with 12 runs, seven doubles, one triple, one homer, and 19 RBIs. Most of his sophomore success came with the bases loaded, where he was 4-for-6 with a grand slam, two doubles, 14 RBIs, and two hit-by-pitches.

In his third year (2011) as a Tiger, Pohl emerged as one of the most consistent hitters on the team. He raised his batting average over 100 points (from .212 as a sophomore to .333 as a junior) and had 43 runs, a team-high 22 doubles, four homers, 33 RBIs, and a .391 on-base percentage. The co-captain also became Clemson's first Academic All-American since 1995 and was the co-winner of the Tiger Baseball Award, given to the team's best leader.

"My first two years here, I was a roller-coaster hitter," he admitted. "I had a lot of inconsistencies. I worked

hard both of those seasons and summers. Coach (Bradley) LeCroy coming in was a big help. A lot of it is maturity, growing up and understanding program. Mv first two years, I was in a little over my head, trying to do too much too quickly, but experience really helped my hitting last year.

"I've always been taught that hard work pays off. But, Coach (Leggett) said that in the first two years, I was working too much and not necessarily working on the right things. Coming into my junior year, I told myself I was going to take baseball back to its roots and back to the fun side of playing. As soon as I started to loosen up a little and started to enjoy baseball like I used to, things started coming a little more consistently."

Pohl hopes to bring that consistency and leadership to this year's team so that the Tigers can make another trip to the College World Series.

"I want to be able to bring experience to the team and help the young guys move along quicker than I did. I see a lot of youth, but I also see a lot of talent in our freshmen and sophomores this year. I think we have the capability to do a lot of great things. I'm going to try to do everything I can to help our team out, both on the field and off. This is my last shot at Omaha and I'd love to bring the first title back to Clemson, a school that deserves it."





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enior year for any student provides a lot of "lasts"...last year of school, last exam week, last football game, etc. For Becca Brown, senior year is a last chance to leave an impression on the Clemson rowing program.

"The senior class as a whole is very motivated this year, because it's senior year," said Brown. "It's our last time. We have to get it right. There's no room for error, because this is our last chance and we really have to go after it.

"We're pushing with every workout. We're pushing in the boat and out of the boat. We're really stepping it up one level higher than we did last year, just because it's our last chance!

This season, Brown and the Tigers look to improve on last year's second-place finish at the ACC Championships and a 15th-place overall NCAA finish

"I'm really excited about this season, because I can see a definite drive and motivation in everyone to improve on last year," she explained. "Everyone is working really hard in the weightroom, so physically we're a lot more fit than

we were last year. The depth of the team is also looking good and we really have a lot of potential."

Last year, Brown spent most of the year in the six seat for the First Varsity 8 that finished second at the ACC Championships and was named ACC Crew-of-the-Year. The First Varsity 8 also beat #12 Michigan, #7 Ohio State, and #17 UCLA during the season and finished 15th at the NCAA Championships.

Brown was named Capital One Second-Team Academic All-District III and is a two-time, Second-Team All-South Region selection. She looks to accomplish all of those things and more this season

"I've gotten a lot stronger since last year," said the Greenville, SC native. "I was here all summer, working in the weightroom, and my overall physical fitness has gotten a lot better. Rowing on both sides over the summer helped me with my technique. It's my senior year. That alone supplies a lot more motivation to work hard every day."

Brown was named one of the captains of last year's team based on her leadership ability and consistency. She will bring that leadership back to the team this year and hopes to set a good example for the underclassmen.

"This senior class has always had upperclassmen to look up to and respect," she said. "We're starting to realize now that we are those upperclassmen this year. We are the rowers who the rest of the team looks to."

In a sport where individual performances are hard to measure, Brown said that the key to improving and accomplishing goals is how you interact with others.

"You have to work well with other people to make your boat do well in races. A weak boat that rows together can beat a strong boat that's separated. Rowing is about how you pick it up together and how you work as a team.

"Every boat has good practices and bad practices. What makes a good boat is how you react to the bad practices. A boat that doesn't have great chemistry might have a bad practice and just move on. A boat that has good chemistry will sit down and talk about how to fix a bad practice. It's all about how you react to your problems."

The 2010-11 Tigers finished second at the ACC Championships behind Virginia, a program that has won 10 of the 11 conference titles. The Tigers captured the title over the Cavaliers in 2009. Bringing the trophy back to Clemson is one of the team's major goals for 2011-12.

"ACC Championships are always in the back of our minds," said Brown. "We want to go out and beat Virginia and get that trophy back. Going to nationals and having a top-10 finish in any boat and also as a team is another major goal.

"As a program, we want to consistently be in the top 10. We want to be one of those teams that the rowing world expects to always compete."

This is the 2011-12 class' last chance to bring a championship back to Tigertown, whether an ACC title or a national title. When asked what her personal goals are for her senior year, Brown could not decide which was more important.

"We won an ACC Championship my freshman year, and I would love to do that again," stated Brown. "But, finishing in the top 10 at NCAAs is a major goal for me, because that will be my last race. That would be the finisher, the last thing I did. If I had to choose, that would be most important. But ideally, we would be able to win an ACC Championship and have a top-10 national finish.

This is our last chance. This is our last opportunity to bring a title back to Clemson. This is the last time we can leave a mark on this program."

THE WINSTON-SALEM, NC NATIVE HAD SOME OF HIS BEST CAREER GAMES AGAINST THE DEMON DEACONS. INCLUDING HIS EFFORT IN 1981 THAT PROPELLED THE TIGERS TO THE NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIP AND HIS APPEARANCE ON THE COVER OF SPORTS ILLUSTRATED.

he most iconic image of Clemson's 1981 National Championship is the picture of All-America wide receiver Perry Tuttle adorning the front cover of the first Sports Illustrated issue after Clemson's 22-15 victory over Nebraska in the Orange Bowl.

When a reunion was held for the 1981 National Champions three weeks ago, each player was presented with a coin marking that season. The image on the back of the coin was the same picture of Tuttle from the Sports Illustrated cover.

Thirty years later, and despite the adoption of a more sophisticated passing game in the last 15 years, Tuttle is still third in school history in receiving yards (2,534), third in receiving touchdowns (17), and fifth in receptions (150).

Tuttle came to Clemson from Winston-Salem, NC, the home of today's opponent, the Wake Forest Demon Deacons. Many of the receptions, yardage, and touchdowns Tuttle scored came against the team from his hometown.

In fact, a look to his career stats shows that he had at least one touchdown reception in each of his four seasons against Wake Forest, the only Tiger in history to catch a touchdown pass against the same school four years in a

He had 10 receptions at Wake Forest in 1980 for his career high and totaled a career-high 161 receiving yards against the Demon Deacons in 1981 as a senior. He finished his career with 23 receptions for 394 yards and five touchdowns against the Demon Deacons, his career-high totals against an opponent.

"People used to think I didn't like Wake Forest and I just got fired up to play them," said Tuttle. "But, that wasn't the case at all. I like Wake Forest and their players. I had great games against them, because I had so many friends and family members in the stands. During my freshmen year, it seemed like my entire high school team and coaching staff came to that game in Winston-Salem."

Tuttle responded with his first career touchdown on a 42-yard reception from Steve Fuller.

ON OCTOBER 22, PERRY TUTTLE AND MANY OTHER MEMBERS OF THE 1981 NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIP TEAM RETURNED TO CLEMSON TO CELEBRATE THE 30-YEAR ANNIVERSARY OF THE LANDMARK SEASON

"I remember it like it was vesterday. It was an underneath route and Steve Fuller put the pass right in my hands. It was my favorite pattern, because it put me in the open field. I made a few moves and went to the endzone."

Clemson defeated the Demon Deacons 51-6 that day on the way to an 11-1 record and a #6 final ranking.

The following year, Tuttle had four catches for 52 yards, including a 10-yard touchdown reception from Billy Lott. It was actually an upset victory for the Tigers, as Wake Forest came into that game ranked #14 in the nation and had already defeated Auburn and Georgia.

Jeff Davis, Tuttle's roommate, scored on a 17-yard interception return, as it would be the only game in four years that Tuttle and Davis scored a touchdown in the same game.

As a junior, Tuttle had a career-high 10 catches for 124 yards against Wake Forest, including a 22-yard touchdown reception from Homer Jordan, a score that put Clemson ahead 33-7 in the fourth quarter. Wake Forest made an incredible comeback and cut the margin to 35-33 before the Tigers earned the narrow victory.

The 1981 Wake Forest game on Halloween was another outstanding day for Tuttle, as he had seven catches for 161 yards and two scores. He hauled in a 75-yard touchdown catch from Jordan and a 25-yard scoring pass from Mike Gasque, giving Tuttle five touchdowns from four different quarterbacks in his career against Wake Forest.

Clemson has not had a scoring day like it since, as the Tigers won 82-24

"We hit on everything that day," said Tuttle. "They never stopped us on offense.

In fact, he was right. Clemson was 12-12 on third down and did not punt.

When looking back on his career against the Demon Deacons, Tuttle had one conclusion.

"I felt so comfortable playing against them, because I had so many people close to me in the stands. I wanted to

them, the people who had raised me and my high school friends."

His ties with the De-

mon Deacons continue today. Next Saturday, three hours prior to the Wake Forest vs. Maryland game in Winston-Salem, Tuttle will speak on the Wake Forest campus in a faith-based presentation.



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
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It has been quite a year and a few days for Jonathan Byrd. It started with an incredible hole-in-one to win a PGA Tour event in Las Vegas and concludes today with his induction into the Clemson Ring of Honor. It doesn't get much better than that.

On October 21, 2010, Byrd was struggling to make the top 125 on the PGA Tour money list and earn his PGA Tour card for the 2011 season. On October 24, 2010, he made the shot heard around the golf world when he made a hole-in-one on the fourth playoff hole in near darkness to win the Justin Timberlake Shriners Hospital for Children Open. It marked the first time in the history of the PGA Tour that a player won a tournament with a hole-in-one, nevermind it being in a playoff. That victory clinched Byrd's PGA Tour card for 2011 and 2012.

So how did Byrd start his 2011 season? All he did was win the Hyundai Tournament of Champions in Hawaii with a 24-under-par score in another playoff. Although the events were two months apart, that gave Byrd wins in consecutive tournaments, and both were in playoffs.

By the end of the 2011 PGA Tour season, he had won a personal-best \$2,938,920 and finished #22 on the money list, the second-best finish by any former Clemson golfer in a season and the best among former Tigers in 2011. He made 17 cuts in 26 events, including the first-place finish at the Hyundai Tournament of Champions and second-place finish at the Wells Fargo Championship in Charlotte.

He actually tied former Tiger teammate Lucas Glover at the end of regulation, but lost in a playoff in what must be considered the greatest day of publicity for Clemson golf in history.

The year ended with a phone call from yours truly that informed him that he had been elected to the Clemson Ring of Honor.

"This is a great honor," said Byrd. "To be in the same class as Frank Howard, Banks McFadden, Jeff Davis, Barbara Kennedy...that is very meaningful. I am humbled. This has great meaning to me, because Clemson has been such a big part of my life.

"I can't thank everyone in the Clemson Family enough, especially Coach (Larry) Penley, who has had such a positive impact on my life."

Byrd enrolled at Clemson on a golf scholarship in the fall of 1996, and it did not take him long to have an im-

fall of 1996, and it did not take him long to have an im-

pact on the program. A starter from just about day one, he helped elevate it to a consistent top-10 program. It is not a surprise that Clemson putting four straight top-10 finishes together coincided with Byrd's four years in Tigertown.

"We finished in the top 10 all four years he was at Clemson, including a third-place finish in 1997 and second-place finish in 1998," said Penley. "He won the Puerto Rico Classic in the first tournament of the spring of his freshman year. That was huge for us and huge for the program going forward."

Clemson finished third in the nation at the NCAAs that 1997 spring, as fellow Ring of Honor inductee Charles Warren won the NCAA Championship. Byrd was named First-Team All-ACC as a freshman and would go on to become the first Tiger golfer to be named First-Team All-ACC all four years of his career.

The next season, Clemson improved to second in the nation, losing by just three shots to UNLV at the NCAA Championships at New Mexico State. Byrd was named honorable mention All-American that year.

In 1998-99, Byrd's junior season, he took over more of a leadership role after Warren graduated. Byrd earned first-team All-America honors with a 72.10 stroke average and seven top-10 finishes. He shot in the 60s 10 times. He was also honored as a second-team Academic All-American by CoSIDA and became the first Tiger to earn Academic All-America honors on the course (first team) and in the classroom (second team) in the same year.

In 1999-00, he led the Tigers to a third ACC Championship in four years by shooting a 67 in the final round at the Old North State Club. He finished fourth overall and was named First-Team All-ACC, honorable mention All-American, and Academic All-American. Clemson then closed the year with a fourth straight top-10 team finish.


"We made a significant move forward nationally when he was at Clemson, finishing in the top 10 every year," stated Penley. "He set a high standard of excellence on and off the course, because he was a two-time Academic All-American in the years he was an All-American on the course. He and Kyle Young, who was in school at the same time, are the only Clemson athletes to do that twice. That says something."

There are many reasons Byrd had such an outstanding career at Clemson on the course and in the classroom, but his biggest asset was his family support system. First, there was his brother, Jordan, now the associate head coach under Penley at Clemson. Jordan was three years ahead of Jonathan as a college golfer at Furman, as he was a trailblazer as to the proper way to do things on the course and in the classroom.

Then there were his parents, Jim and Jo Byrd. They were very supportive, for starters. I personally walked a lot of holes with Mr. and Mrs. Byrd, and there could not be two finer parents. Jim was a college athlete himself as a football player at North Carolina in the early 1960s.

If you want to know where the Tiger standout gets his mental toughness, just remember this story. At the opening kickoff of the 1965 North Carolina vs. Notre Dame game in South Bend, Byrd's father suffered a broken nose after he was tackled. However, he got bandaged up and played the rest of the game with that broken nose.

Now, Byrd continues that success professionally thanks to the support of his wife, Amanda, and their two children, Jackson and Caroline.



Amanda provided more than the normal support for Byrd when he won his first PGA Tour event in 2002, a big reason he was named PGA Tour Rookie-of-the-Year. It was just a few weeks before the couple was scheduled to be married, and Byrd was playing in the Buick Challenge in Callaway Gardens, GA. While playing the seventh hole in the first round, Byrd hit an errant tee shot.

"It headed for the left trees and just happened to hit me on the shoulder, taking my breath away," said Amanda. "The ball seemed to get a better bounce towards the fairway and he made a birdie on that hole, which led him to his first PGA Tour win."

Byrd has gone on to win five PGA Tour events, all with incredible low scores. He has won the five events with an average score of 22-under par. Just 10 years into his career, he has already won nearly \$15 million.

Byrd's victory total, more than any other former Tiger on the PGA Tour, is no surprise to Penley, who continues to benefit from his former player's success.

"Jonathan's induction into the Clemson Ring of Honor is well deserved and shows how much he has meant to this program over the years, not just the time when he played. We still use the same practice drills in the shortgame area and putting that he used when he played here. Many of his accomplishments have yet to be duplicated when it comes to on the course and in the classroom.

"And, the way he handles himself today on the PGA Tour, he is the consummate professional and is someone our current players look up to. Our players aspire to be like him as an all-around student-athlete. He is the standard."



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


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Hill-Whitson, who was known as Susan Hill as a student-athlete at Clemson, dominated the ACC as a tennis player from 1977-81, winning four conference crowns and being named an All-American three different times. Thirty years later, she is still the only four-time conference MVP in the history of ACC women's tennis.

An extraordinary talent, Hill is also an extraordinary Clemson person who has never shied away from her pas-

sion for the university that extended its hand to her when few around the country would. In fact, she was the first woman to receive a full athletic scholarship to Clemson

Getting the offer of a full ride to school as a female athlete was nearly unheard of nationwide. It took awhile for it to become commonplace, mostly due to the accolades bestowed upon student-athletes like Hill. Because of the groundbreaking nature of the decision, it was made after careful consideration of all factors involved for an innovative tennis coach at a school nestled away in the foothills of South Carolina.

"(Former Clemson Women's Tennis) Coach Mary King had seen me play a couple of years beforehand," recalled Hill. "She had tried to keep in contact a little bit. At that time, I was very excited to be able to play tennis in college, especially with a full scholarship. That was a big deal to my family and a big deal to me.

The scholarship was one reason Hill chose Clemson. But from the beginning, she felt something special about the school that has developed into a lifelong bond. In fact, one of the things Hill said she was most proud of was helping other young women find a way to campus by way of athletics

"I fell in love with Clemson," she said. "That was one of the best decisions I've ever made in my life. To be the first woman scholarship athlete was an honor. Hopefully, that helped pave the way for future women at Clemson. I feel very fortunate that I came around at just the right time"

Her relationship with her alma mater has extended to her family. Her husband, John, is

rently attending the school

"We live in Georgia, but as the children were growing up, we made lots of visits to Clemson," stated Hill. "So they grew up loving it, because both my husband and I graduated from there."

Hill enjoys a rarified air in the realm of Clemson women's tennis. The mantra that "records are meant to be broken" does not apply to her. During her career, she won 86 percent of her matches and 82 percent of her sets, both of which are still school records after more than three decades. During her sophomore and junior seasons, she had a combined record of 63-6. Perhaps her greatest accomplishment, however, was

winning back-to-back-to-back conference championships at #1 singles. It was a goal that developed over time due to her initial run of success as a freshman.

"I really didn't know what to expect," said the Tennessee native of her first season. "I just went along and enjoyed it. I made it a goal to win it the second year, and then after the second year, I made it a goal to win it all four

Those four titles might be her most memorable aspect for Tiger fans and tennis historians, but Hill's proudest moment as a collegiate athlete was winning the 1979 ACC doubles title with her sister, Carolyn. The memories she gathered during the run have lasted through the years, and she is grateful for the opportunity to provide her sister with an unforgettable experience.

"That was very special," explained Hill. "Carolyn and I had played in juniors before we came to Clemson, so we knew each other's playing styles and knew each other on the court really well. She didn't play in the lineup in singles, but she and I together made a pretty decent doubles team. I'm so pleased that I can look back and see that we won a conference title. That's very meaningful to me."

After her career was over, Hill had every opportunity to pursue a professional career. But, she knew her life was supposed to lead her elsewhere, so she decided to take on a whole different set of challenges.

"I decided to go that way with life," admitted Hill. "Right after college, I got married, so I was entering a new phase of life. That's what I wanted to do. Then, of course, we had these five great children. I have no regrets. It wasn't something that I had planned to do."

It did not take long for her accolades to be recognized by the university to which she gave so much. She was inducted into the Clemson Athletic Hall of Fame in 1986 (the first female athlete so honored) and was named to the ACC

> 50-Year Anniversary team in 2002. Now with her induction into the Clemson Ring of Honor, she has finally reached the pinnacle as a recognized student-athlete alumnus of Clemson.

> Hill still likes to stay in touch with the current program from afar. Her interactions with the current players and coaches are limited, but she is glad to see that despite the changes in the modern game, there is still high-level tennis being played in Tigertown.


> "I keep tabs on them on the Clemson website." said Hill. "I have met Coach (Nancy) Harris and I have been over to a match. I keep track of how they're doing, and they have done great. Since she's been coaching there, she has really done a great job. She has a great program."

> Hill's enshrinement into such an exclusive fraternity cements the notion that she will forever be remembered among the legends of Clemson athletics. But Hill said she would like to be remembered more for how she played and whom she was than for what she did.

> "For the few people who may have seen me play, I hope they remember that I went out and tried my best in every match," she said. "I put a lot of emphasis on sportsmanship. Hopefully they can say I won and lost with the same grace. I hope they know that I realize how fortunate I was to play at Clemson. I feel so fortunate to have been able to go there and to have been a part of a tennis program that set the standard for future programs."

> Now among all the firsts on Hill's resumé, there is another. She is now the first tennis player in Clemson's history to be inducted into the Ring of Honor.





## 2011 SENI&R CLASS

NINETEEN TIGERS WILL PLAY THEIR FINAL HOME GAME IN DEATH VALLEY TODAY WITH A CHANCE TO CAPTURE THEIR SECOND ACC ATLANTIC DIVISION CHAMPIONSHIP IN THE LAST THREE SEASONS.

oday is Senior Day at Clemson, but in many ways, it doesn't feel like it. First of all, it is too early...too early on the calendar and too early when it comes to what is on the table for this team. It just doesn't feel like we are anywhere near the end of the season

Today's game on November 12 is the earliest Senior Day since 2005, when Charlie Whitehurst and his classmates defeated eventual ACC Champion Florida State by a score of 35-14. Only the seniors of 1999 have had a Senior Day earlier on the calendar during the last 15 years.

This year's senior class has seen a lot in the last four years. They endured a coaching change in 2008 that led to extreme changes in the program during the middle of their freshman season. However, behind the leadership of Head Coach Dabo Swinney and the help of some freshmen, the Tigers rebounded and reached the Gator Bowl.

The 2009 season was dramatic, including a six-game winning streak that led to the program's first ACC Atlantic Division Championship and then a bowl victory

There was disappointment in suffering five losses by six points or less in 2010. And there has been the opposite feeling this year with an 8-1 record. The 2011 seniors can repeat what the 2009 seniors of C.J. Spiller and Jacoby Ford did...win the ACC Atlantic Division on Senior Day

So, we are at the final home game with the ACC Atlantic Division crown on the line, but it isn't even the last ACC game, the South Carolina game is two games away with a possible ACC title game to follow, then a bowl game.

The Tigers and this senior class should feel good about what they have accomplished. There were victories in the first eight games of this year, the first time that has happened since 2000 and just the fourth time it has been accomplished in 115 years of Clemson history.

At the start of the streak were five straight wins against teams that were some kind of conference champion in 2010. Three of those wins came against #19 Auburn, #11 Florida State, and #10 Virginia Tech on consecutive Saturdays. It marked the first time an ACC team defeated three straight opponents who entered the game ranked in the top 25 of both polls

The offense has established records left and right. The Tigers have averaged 38 points and 473 yards per game on offense, both on pace to become all-time Clemson records. There were consecutive wins in which the Tigers scored at least 56 points against ACC foes, the first time the program has done that and the first time any ACC team has done that since 1992.


Clemson also showed it could beat a top-10 team on the road with its defense. The point-prevention unit held the Hokies to three points in the 23-3 win, the first time Virginia Tech failed to score a touchdown at home since 1995. Senior Andre Branch had four sacks and six tackles for loss to tie Clemson single-game records in each category.

While the accomplishments for this team in general and the senior class in particular are considerable, there is still much to be accomplished. Heading into today's game, this team can still:

- · 8ecome the first Clemson team to start 9-1 since 1987 and for just the seventh time in school history.
- Post a perfect home record for the first time since 1990 and become just the second team to win seven home games in
- · Win seven ACC games for the first time since 1983 and just the second time in history.
- · Win a second ACC Atlantic Division title in three years.
- Win the ACC Championship for the first time since 1991 and play in Clemson's first 8CS bowl game since 1981.
- · Win a 8CS bowl game for the first time since 1981.
- Win 10 games for the first time since 1990.
- · Post the first top-10 season in the polls since 1990.
- · Set the school record for wins in a season with 13. The record is 12 by the 1981 team.

It is all on the table, and with the leadership of the 19 seniors playing in Death Valley for the last time today, this team has the character to pull it off.

Congratulations to the Tigers and the 2011 seniors for a job well done so far, but their overall legacy will be determined long past today's game.



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
