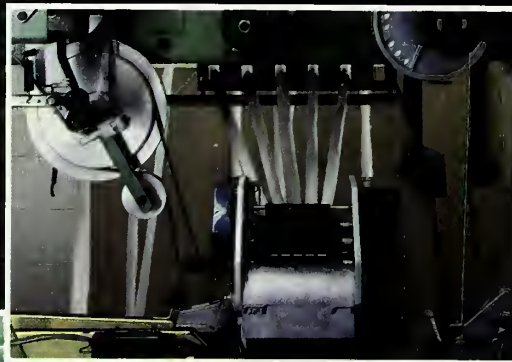

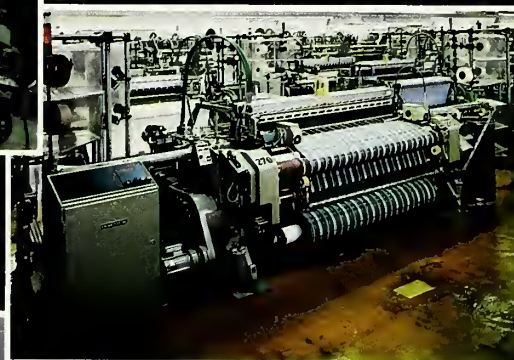

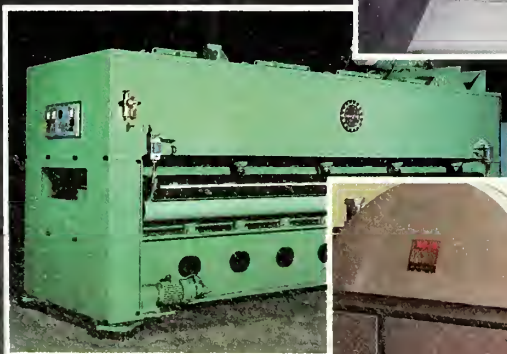

ACC Title Chase Starts Here

Clemson's drive towards its 10th outright title begins Saturday when the Tigers play host to Georgia Tech in the first ACC encounter of the year. Clemson is the defending champion and owns more ACC titles than any other school. (Clemson also tied for the title in 1965 giving Clemson 11 ACC championships overall.) The Tigers also have the highest winning percentage in league games in the 34-year history of the conference, so it is little wonder Clemson is again the preseason pick of just about every poll.

Getting off to a good start is important in league play. A look at the past standings tells us that Clemson's 5-1-1 mark last year marked the first time since 1979 that anyone won the title with a loss and the first time since 1965 that anyone won the league championship with two blemishes on its record. Clemson has never won an ACC title after it has lost the first game of the conference season.

Tailbacks with Quick Start

The Clemson tailback duo of Wesley McFadden and Terry Allen have combined for 581 yards so far this season in three games, nearly 200 yards per contest. The duo also has scored six touchdowns and averages 6.2 yards per carry. This is the most yards gained by the top two tailbacks after the first three games since Danny Ford has been the coach at Clemson. The figure for the tailback position actually is 661 yards because Joe Henderson also has played at tailback and has 80 yards rushing in 15 attempts.

This is no small accomplishment when you consider the fact that Clemson currently has five tailbacks in the NFL (Kenny Flowers, Terrence Flagler, Steve Griffin, Kevin Mack and Cliff Austin) one in the CFL (Lester Brown) and another who used to play in the NFL (Chuck McSwain). For instance, in 1986 Kenny Flowers and Terrence Flagler, two of the top 31 picks in the NFL draft last spring, had just 379 yards at this time of the year. In 1985 Flowers and Stacy Driver had just 328 yards after three games.

In other words, no tailback combo under Danny Ford, or in Clemson history for that matter is even within 200 yards of the McFadden-Allen combination at this time of the season. Individually, McFadden's 341 yards rushing after three games is the most for the first three games of the season by a Clemson running back under Ford.

Linemen All-Americans

Clemson has never had a first-team All-

American on both sides of the line of scrimmage in the same season, but this year could change all that. With Clemson's 3-0 start, just the second of its kind under Danny Ford, a rushing offense that ranks in the top 10 in the nation and a total defense that is the best in the land, there is a very good chance that John Phillips and Michael Dean Perry could establish another Clemson first.

Phillips is the king of the knockdown block at Clemson. He has 34 knockdowns in just three games, including 18 at Virginia Tech on September 12 that set a Clemson single game record. Phillips is a major reason Clemson has rushed for over 200 yards in 22 of the last 23 games and has allowed just three quarterback sacks in the last 18 games, including none this year.

Perry is fourth in ACC history in quarterback sacks with 22.5 and he needs just three to become the league's all-time leader. Brother William Perry has the ACC record with 25. Michael Dean had seven tackles last week against Georgia and one tackle for loss, giving him eight stops behind the line of scrimmage in three games. The native of Aiken, SC has 45 tackles for loss for his career, third in ACC

history behind William Perry and William Fuller of North Carolina.

Treadwell Mr. Clutch

Has Clemson ever gotten more out of a walk-on player than David Treadwell. Fred Cone and Windy Windham come to mind, a pair of Southern Conference first-team choices who were stars under Frank Howard. Recently, Steve Ryan, now a college coach at VMI, is the last walk-on to receive All-ACC honors. Ryan led the conference in interceptions in 1978.

Treadwell beat Georgia for the second straight year when he booted a 21-yard field goal with two seconds left last Saturday. That was the fifth time Treadwell has made a kick inside the last three minutes of a game to either win a game or tie a game. Overall he is 7-7 inside the last eight minutes of the game in the field goal department.

And, each one has been a very big field goal. The two boots to beat Georgia go without saying. A field goal tied the South Carolina game last year, Clemson's top rival. Another with 10 seconds left tied Maryland last year, giving Clemson the ACC title. He also won the season opener

at Virginia Tech in 1985, which allowed Clemson to keep from a losing season.

Treadwell is one of the top student-athlete stories at Clemson in recent years. The native of Jacksonville, FL has a 3.1 GPA in electrical engineering and it is this course of study that influenced his decision to come to Clemson. Treadwell did not play high school football, he was a soccer player. When he did not get a soccer scholarship offer at a school with a strong engineering school, he decided to make his decision solely on academics. He picked Clemson because of its academic reputation and his father convinced him to try kicking a football while he was at Clemson.

After a year of red-shirting and a year of sitting on the bench behind current Tampa Bay Buc Donald Igwebuike, Treadwell has moved into the top three in every placekicking category at Clemson. He has 10 field goals in just 12 attempts this year and is in the top three in the nation in field goals with 3.3 per game. He has 39 field goals in his career, second only to Obed Ariri, who had an NCAA best 63 when he graduated. Last Saturday he booted four field goals, tying Ariri's single game record for total field goals.

Georgia Tech Update

Clemson will be facing Bobby Ross once again, but he will be wearing different colors on the sidelines. Ross was one of the winningest coaches in ACC history during his career at Maryland, and now he is attempting to bring his winning ways to Georgia Tech.

Over the last six years Clemson or Maryland have won the ACC title and he is the main reason the Terps have been so outstanding this decade. His teams averaged 28 points per game in his five-year stay (1982-86) at Maryland.

Rick Strom is the leader of the Georgia Tech offense from the quarterback position. The 6-3 signal caller has completed 34 of 62 passes for 543 yards and four touchdowns. This includes an 11-18 performance against The Citadel in the season opener when he threw for a Tech record 317 yards. He completed 23 of 44 for 226 yards against North Carolina last week.

Riccardo Ingram has been the leader of the defense. The two-sport star at Georgia Tech, who was named the ACC's outstanding all-around athlete last year, has 20 tackles in 1987 to lead the team. He also led the club last year and hit well over .400 with nearly 100 RBIs in baseball. He joined Clemson's John Phillips on the **Playboy** All-America team this past fall.

Defense Record Setting

The Clemson defense continues to be among the national leaders in the three ma-

ior categories, passing, rushing and total defense. Although Clemson gave up 157 yards rushing against Georgia, the Tigers still allow just 1.8 yards per rush and 63 yards per game. In passing defense, Clemson opponents have completed just 40.5 percent of their passes for 3.3 yards per attempt. That yards per attempt total would set a Clemson record if the season ended today.

A couple of players deserve a pat on the back after last week's performance, both are natives of Georgia. Norman Haynes has had a dozen tackles or more in two games in his career, both have come against Georgia. Do you think the fact that he is a native of Athens, GA has anything to do with it? Haynes had a dozen stops in last Saturday's game and had 14 in the contest in Athens last season.

Gene Beasley was Clemson's defensive player of the game as he had 12 tackles,

including 11 first hits, the most first hits in a game by a Tiger since 1984. He also had two tackles for loss and they both came on big plays. The native of Atlanta, GA busted up a Georgia fake field goal try to tackle the enemy for an eight-yard loss, then nailed Georgia quarterback James Jackson in the endzone for a safety to bring Clemson to within two points. He had a lot of help from fellow defensive back James Lott and linebacker Vince Taylor.

Tony Stephens

OK, let's set the stage for Clemson nose guard Tony Stephens: Clemson's overpowering defense is on the field doing its thing, and the opposing offense faces an any-down, a million to go situation — an obvious passing down if ever there was one. What do you say we line up with Tony down in the trenches and see if we can get the sack.

Here's how Stephens sees it:

In the huddle —

"In an obvious passing situation, we call 'Off,' which means it's a free rush so I can go either left or right."

At the line of scrimmage —

"I line up to the strong side of the center, and the first thing I do is get a jump on the ball and try to beat the center."

At the first contact —

"I try to make him overcommit to me on the strong side, then I just take his body and wipe it that way. Then I just come back to the weak side."

At the second contact —

"Now it's just me and the defensive tackle — either Shave-O (Raymond Chavous) or Dean (Michael Dean Perry) — to go against two offensive linemen. What we have is a one-on-one blocking situation. If that guard picks me up, then Shave-O or Michael Dean can usually beat his man. And if I don't get picked up, then I'm free. We get support from each other. What I do depends on what they do, and what they do depends on what I do."

In the offensive backfield —

"You've got to get that sack because it's the best thing that can happen for a defensive lineman. Everybody sees it. The first thing you want to do is just get your hands on the quarterback, or at least disturb his pattern and make him run out of the pocket. You just want to disturb whatever they're trying to do."

In the quarterback's face —

"That's where you want to be."

For the quarterback, all this can take only a couple of seconds. All he sees is a mass of orange and perhaps the blur of a huge number-65 rushing at him. Then ... meet Tony Stephens.

Last year, six-foot, four-inch Tony Stephens emerged from obscurity to become Clemson's starting nose guard. With 5.0 speed in the 40-yard dash and a 31-inch vertical leap, amazing numbers for a 300-pound man who bench presses 450 pounds, Tony has all the tools to be a great

football player. But he was surprised at the success he had last year.

He recalls, "I had a pretty good spring practice the year before, but I never thought I'd be starting. I thought maybe I'd get a little playing time at the most. But as it worked out, the puzzle finally came together."

It sure did, to the delight of defensive line coach Tom Harper. Harper says, "Tony's a rage-to-riches story — the American dream. He didn't play at all for two years. He even got shifted to the offensive line for a season. Then he came back last year with blood in his eye, and he just wanted to play. And he's doing great this year."

The gossip last season was that Tony, soft-spoken and rather scholarly looking in his glasses, just plain beat out senior nose guard Brian Raber, but Stephens' recollection offers a variation on that theme. Commenting on the help he received from Raber in learning the position, Tony says, "We just wanted to have the best possible nose guard at all times, and as it worked out it was just like three people (Stephens, Raber, and Mark Drag) playing one position. That's just the way we had it set up."

In fact, Stephens would have given up the starting role to Raber had the elder

player so desired. "It wasn't like 'I'm beating you out, Raber,'" Stephens recalls, "because he had the opportunity to start every game if he wanted to. He just didn't want to. He was the leader among us three, and he could have started every game. I asked him every week if he wanted to start, and he didn't want to, even the last game against South Carolina. He just felt comfortable with the rotation the way it was."

That's really not a surprising story when you consider the tight relationship that the defensive linemen have with each other. "I believe it's a real bond with the defensive line," Tony says. "All of us live pretty close to each other in the dorm. We're pretty much with each other every hour of the day. We just have this togetherness that we're able to carry onto the field with us."

Nevertheless, it was clear last year that Stephens was one serious individual when it came to football. "I think it was a total commitment," he says. "I got to a point in my life where I had to say, 'This is it.' I had to make a choice whether I wanted to play football or get a job after I got my degree. I wasn't really taking it as seriously as I should have. I had to take that one last opportunity to see if it was going to happen."

And does he think it's happening now? "I think it is," he says, "but you've got to make that commitment."

Coach Harper has nothing but praise for his pupil, saying, "He's a favorite of mine, so I'm going to be prejudiced. But he's my Mean Joe Greene — he's always got time to help the other guys and pat them on the behind and say, 'Nice job.' I think he's got the qualities to have a chance to play in the NFL when the time comes."

Stephens, who after this semester will lack only a 10-week internship to earn a degree in resource management, is wary of talking too much about a professional career. "I think if I play the way I'm capable of playing this year those things will fall into place. Everyone would like to make it in the NFL, but not everyone gets to. I don't think it's a false dream to want to, but at the same time I try to be realistic about it."

Whichever way Tony ends up going, for the present, the quarterbacks on Clemson's schedule had best be realistic about the man lining up opposite their centers. He's gotten serious about his football and is planning on meeting some of those signal callers face-to-face, chest-to-chest, and back-to-turf.

Miles Aldridge

The first thing you notice about Clemson linebacker coach Miles Aldridge is his voice: rough and raspy — like Clint Eastwood's in Heartbreak Ridge, except louder and more quickly paced.

It's the determination of Aldridge you notice next. "My goal is to be a coach at a school that has a chance to win the national championship."

"He's very intense," Tom Harper, defensive coordinator, said. "He wants to get it done correctly — a perfectionist."

"On the field, he's hard-nosed," linebacker Vince Taylor said. "He's going to get out of you all he can and work you hard. Off the field, he's a good guy."

Aldridge is a tough, determined coach who has some basic beliefs about football and coaching. "I believe football is a tough game. You've got to be tough mentally and physically to play," he said. "It's my responsibility to not only teach football, but what it takes to win, be it football, business, or getting a degree."

He's in his third year of coaching at Clemson after moving steadily through the coaching ranks. "Every opportunity has been a little bit better," he said. "I've just tried to improve."

"I came to coach at Clemson for a chance to win the national championship. If that's the best I ever do, that's okay."

With coaches Tom Harper and Bill Oliver, both of whom have coached professionally, Tommy West, and Aldridge, Clemson is considered to have an excellent veteran defensive staff. Aldridge considers

this one of the greatest pluses of coaching at Clemson. "It's exciting to come to work," Aldridge said. "Everyday you learn something. It's not drudgery. There's so much experience, so much knowledge. You can accomplish so much with these people working together."

"It makes me a better coach by being around these guys."

Aldridge has not had an easy task the last couple of seasons because he has had a young group of linebackers to work with. That is why his "English Teacher" approach is important. "Miles did a fine job with our linebackers last year and his work was one of the reasons we were ranked in the top 25 in the nation in scoring and total defense," said Danny Ford.

This year the job might be even more difficult because six new linebackers are on the roster and only one player, Duane Walker, is a senior. "This season will be a challenge, but it is still one of the rewarding aspects of this profession," said Aldridge. "I can now watch these young players' progress from start to finish, on the field and off, and that is a rewarding aspect of the job."

Aldridge has coached every position on the defense, which he says is a great asset. "I've done a little of all of it which gives me the broad view of the defense," he said. "I can understand defensive back or line problems, not just linebacker problems."

Aldridge says his defensive coaching philosophy is basic. "I like to teach football a lot like an English teacher teaches

English," he said. "I believe in teaching the fundamentals — things like body positions."

"Teaching people how to play as a team is a highly organized speciality. You've got to fit all pieces together to make a good team."

After playing football and basketball at A.C. Flora High School in Columbia, Aldridge went to Gardner Webb College in North Carolina. "I started as a 165 lb. quarterback," he said with a laugh. "I was a 220 lb. linebacker by the end."

He then moved into coaching, starting at the high school level. After one-year stints at Chase and Newberry High Schools, he moved to East Tennessee State, Wichita State, Tulsa, Mississippi, and Duke before coming to Clemson. "Coaching came very easy to me," he said. "I liked high school coaching, but I knew I wanted to be a college coach."

In addition to coaching linebackers at Clemson, Aldridge recruits in South Carolina, Philadelphia, and New Jersey. "I enjoy recruiting young men that have the physical ability to play football and the mental ability to go to college," he said. "It's a lot of fun finding a guy, recruiting him, and then watching him become successful."

Aldridge says he concentrates more on team goals than individual ambition. "My goal is not individual," he said. "I have goals, but they're not centered in on being this or that."

"If we win, I have a better chance. If we lose I won't be an assistant at Clemson. First things first. I know if I want to achieve more goals, the best thing to do is for us to win 12 games."

"My philosophy is 'if somebody has got to win, it might as well be us.' Somebody is going to win the national championship. There's no reason it can't be Clemson."

Teaching: Still Number One

The more things change, the more they stay the same. At Clemson there are some things that (we hope) will never change: Clemson orange. Tillman Hall. Tigerama.

And one more very important thing. No matter how much the university grows, teaching will remain its most important role.

As a land grant institution, Clemson emphasizes the three areas of research, public service and teaching. On the brink of the 21st century, research efforts are unquestionably important. And public service programs serve all the citizens of South Carolina. But, over and above these missions, when a student enters Clemson, he or she should be able to count on receiving an excellent education. And great teaching doesn't happen without great teachers.

Every former Clemson student probably recalls a teacher whose personal style and commitment added a special dimension to the word "education." Maybe it was John Lane in English, Doug Bradbury in engineering, or one of the many others who are remembered with affection and appreciation. Their legacies remain long after graduation.

Administration and faculty are committed to the challenge of attracting and keeping outstanding teachers. In addition to the Master Teacher award and alumni professorships, the Faculty Senate last year recommended annual awards of \$3,000 to outstanding faculty in each college to enhance scholarly activity related to teaching.

Not all great teaching occurs in the classroom. The awards for excellence in student journalism won by the Tiger staff, national and regional recognition for the Clemson Players, and a nationwide "widget" competition won by Clemson electrical and computer engineering students illustrate the value of learning environments outside the traditional lecture hall.

The College of Architecture tried a new approach to teaching this past spring. During "Spring Week," students and faculty pursued independent study outside their usual areas. "Designer" birdhouses, hot-air ballooning and construction of an authentic Plains Indian tepee (with the assistance of a Comanche chief's descendants) were just a few of the projects. According to Dean James F. Barker, this was more than fun-and-games. "The goal was to give students and faculty a new perspective, to look at the education process and concentrate on learning to think rather than simply learning facts," he said.

Last year when the Carnegie Foundation's Report on the Status of Undergraduate Education found a nationwide lack of balance between teaching and research, Clemson reacted promptly.

The Faculty Senate and the Office of the Vice Provost for Undergraduate Studies formed committees to review Clemson's status in each area addressed by the report, including teaching, and a day-long faculty workshop explored the teaching/research balance specifically.

President Lennon made it clear when he announced the Second Century program. "Clemson has a long and proud tradition of undergraduate education," he said, "of preparing young people for the world in which they will live and work. This commitment to teaching is basic, firm and unshakable."

President Lennon

On September 6, 1986, Clemson University formally inaugurated Dr. Max Lennon as the university's seventh president. The governor of South Carolina, the Honorable Richard W. Riley, spoke of a "quest for academic excellence which has never been more important than today," at the inauguration. He called Dr. Lennon, "the leader for the future of all South Carolina."

During his short time as president, Dr. Lennon has accomplished much, including the school's "Second Century Plan." This project, drawn up with help from faculty and state business leaders, emphasized research in agriculture, engineering, basic science, marketing, management, textiles and the quality of life; all these areas and several more were just a portion of a proposal to endure economic growth within the state.

It is the by-product of Lennon's overall attitude that Clemson is here to help its students to become successful and in general make the state a better place to live.

Dr. Lennon is a native of Columbus County, NC and earned his bachelor's degree in animal science from N.C. State in 1962. He also earned a doctorate in animal science from the same institution in 1970.

He had been at Ohio State for two years prior to his move to Clemson. He served as executive dean for agriculture, home economics and natural resources. Lennon was also on the Ohio State Faculty Senate and was co-chairman of the Governor's commission on agriculture.

Previously, he had served as dean of the college of Agriculture and director of the Agricultural Experiment Station at the University of Missouri and as associate dean and director of research in the College of Agricultural Sciences at Texas Tech University.

Lennon, who has also served as an assistant professor at Texas Tech and Missouri, spent two years with the International Agri-business firm Central Soya of Illinois. He also has participated in many national and international conferences concerning new technologies in agriculture.

The 46-year-old Lennon was chosen from about 200 candidates for the presidency at Clemson.

Lennon commented on his philosophies and goals for Clemson in his opening press conference. "I am extremely delighted to be chosen as the leader of this great institution. We're at an extremely important time in our lives, not because of circumstances but because of where we are in history. We

need land-grant institutions in a way that is almost unique ... so we can continue to be competitive in a world market.

"We at Clemson University must make our own priorities to lead us into the 21st century. We must begin by making ourselves visible in the state, then we must focus on the global perspective of the university and what we can accomplish in that arena."

Board of Trustees President Louis P. Batson declared that the long selection process had discovered a man who knows what he wants. "Max Lennon is a good planner, a deep thinker, and a man ready for the challenge. He is restless without being impatient."

Lennon said the early part of his administration will consist of familiarizing himself more closely with Clemson's programs. "It would be presumptuous of me to come in here with a set of priorities," he said. "In the academic community you build on the strengths of the institution, and my first business has been learning about those strengths. I'll be calling for help from the students, faculty, administrators, alumni and the rest of the Clemson family to make sure our priorities are in order."

Lennon is active in many councils and commissions, including the American Society for the Advancement of Science; the National Association of State Universities and Land Grant Colleges and the National Dropout Prevention Fund.

Lennon began his teaching career at N.C. State in 1966 when he served as a graduate assistant professor. In 1970 he moved to Lubbock, TX, where he served as an assistant professor of animal science at Texas Tech University. He remained at the Texas institution as an assistant dean and associate dean in the College of Agriculture until 1980. On the first day of this decade he became the chairperson in the department of animal husbandry at the University of Missouri. He served as Dean of the College of Agriculture at Missouri until 1983, when he moved to Ohio State as vice president for agricultural administration.

Lennon is married to Ruth Carter Lennon and they have two children, Daniel Ray (24) and Robin (22).

Bobby Robinson

A successful athletic program is usually the result of many factors, the most important being a well qualified leader heading up the entire program. At Clemson, continued success in all facets of athletics is evidence of the quality of leadership that has been found over the past few years under Athletic Director Bobby Robinson.

Last year was Robinson's most successful since taking over at the helm in March of 1985. In fact, it was one of the most successful years in the history of Clemson athletics.

Both major revenue sports, football and men's basketball were involved in post-season play in 1986-87, as were baseball and 12 other teams. In other words, out of 18 sports offered at Clemson, 15 were involved in some sort of post-season play.

In football, the Tigers finished the season ranked 17th in the AP poll and took a trip to Jacksonville, FL, where they defeated Stanford in the Gator Bowl.

The 1986-87 basketball squad became the most successful in school history as they finished the season ranked 13th and advanced to the NCAAs for just the second time in the school's history.

The Clemson baseball team ended its season with a number-10 ranking and also traveled to the NCAA baseball tournament. The golf and tennis teams also received bids to the NCAAs, making Clemson one of just five schools to have these three spring teams participating in NCAA post-season play.

The success of the three major sports (football, basketball, and baseball) made Clemson one of only two universities (UCLA was the other) to have all three ranked in the top 20 in the final polls.

Robinson's continued success is a result of his great commitment to being the best — in competition, in academics and in facilities. Last season is evidence of the program moving towards the best in competition, but Clemson athletics is also taking strides towards being the best in the two other areas.

In academics, Clemson student-athletes had an outstanding year. Over 65 athletes had 3.0 or better grade point ratios either semester, with the football team having three players named to the Academic All-ACC team. Six students were named to various academic All-America teams, the most ever for one season.

In the area of facilities, Robinson has also enjoyed success. Renovations over the past few years have included the Strength Training Center, one of the finest in the country; Tiger Field, home of the Clemson baseball team; and the West End Zone locker room complex in Memorial Stadium. New facilities include a new activities room in Death Valley, an indoor tennis facility, and new permanent soccer stadium on Riggs Field. In addition to all of this, a continuing maintenance program for all facilities and practice areas has been established.



From a university perspective, Robinson envisions the athletic department as being one of 49 departments on campus, equal to English, accounting, and the others. "We believe the athletic department is a viable, important part of the mission of Clemson University," says Robinson, "as athletic competition provides a common bond for students, faculty, staff, and friends."

Under Robinson, the athletic department has continued support of the university. Band uniforms and travel, the educational enhancement fund (coordinated with the Athletic Council) are some of the areas that have been developed.

Robinson was born in Columbia, SC and attended A.C. Flora High School. During his high school career, he was a point-guard for the basketball team and a third baseman in baseball. He also played golf competitively, and was a scratch golfer at one time. Robinson did not play any high school sports as a senior because of a heat stroke suffered in the summer of 1963. He graduated from A.C. Flora in 1964 and then enrolled in Furman University

Robinson was graduated from Furman with a B.S. degree in business and political science in 1968. He was the president of the Sigma Alpha Epsilon fraternity chapter at Furman. After he was graduated from Furman, Robinson worked in his family's laundry and dry-cleaning business for two years.

Robinson came to Clemson in 1970, not in athletics, but in the housing office. After three years, he moved across campus to serve as an administrative assistant in the athletic department. "I started at Clemson in the housing office, but I came to Clemson with the intention of working in athletics," said Robinson. "No opening existed at the time, so I had to wait until there was one."

After serving the athletic department in various capacities, he became business manager in 1975. Two years later he was named assistant athletic director and in 1980 he became associate AD. He held that title for four years, and his area of responsibility moved to primarily football and basketball.

While serving his administrative duties, Robinson found time to coach the Clemson golf team between 1975 and 1983. During his time as the head coach, Clemson won its first ACC title in golf and three times the Tigers participated in the NCAA tournament. In 1983, his final season as the head coach, he guided Clemson to a number-five finish. Clarence Rose was one of three All-Americans to play for the Tigers during his tenure and he is now a successful member of the pro tour.

With Robinson's qualifications, it is easy to see why the Clemson athletic program enjoys continued success - he has done it all. He has been an administrator at all levels, he has worked in other areas in the university, he has been a head coach, and he has handled the budgetary aspects needed to run a \$12 million program.

Robinson has confidence in his staff, his coaches, his athletes, and the facilities at Clemson University. "We have a solid base to work from, but if we are not moving forward, we are losing ground. We will work within university guidelines and expand our horizons. We want to be as good as we can as a vital part of the university and the state of South Carolina."

Danny Ford

One need only look at the history of the Gator Bowl to understand the degree of success Danny Ford has had in college football. He is the only man to serve as a head coach, assistant coach and a player in the history of that Florida-based bowl game, and he is one of the few head coaches to win there twice.

Overall he has had 19 winning regular seasons in his 20-year affiliation with the game, and his teams have won nearly 73 percent of the time. How has he done it? "When you go to a Clemson practice you sense almost a buddy-buddy relationship between the head coach and players," said CBS Commentator and former Notre Dame Head Coach Ara Parseghian during a recent broadcast. "He has the respect of his players and his players enjoy playing for him. He is a disciple of Bear Bryant."

Communication with his players past and present has always been a strength for Danny Ford. This past spring when the 1981 National Championship team was honored at Clemson over 50 of his former players from that team came back to campus. Certainly testimony to the camaraderie of that team, but also a testimony to Ford, who has built Clemson into one of the top programs in America over the last 10 seasons.

Probably the most significant accomplishment on Ford's resume is the 1981 National Championship. His youthful accomplishments compare favorably to Mozart in terms of reaching goals at an early age. A look at past national champions indicates that the current Clemson mentor is the youngest coach in the history of the college game to win the Associated Press National Championship.

Ford took Clemson to the national title in 1981 at the age of 33 and now is the winningest coach in the history of the Atlantic Coast Conference on a percentage basis. Additionally, Ford is already seventh in total wins among ACC coaches.

And, the success has come against top competition. Ford has already gained more wins over AP top 20 teams and top 10 teams than any other Clemson coach in history and is the only coach in ACC history (eight years experience) to have a winning record against top 20 teams (top 20 when playing against Clemson).

Clemson fans are certainly happy Ford entered the profession because he has brought a solid program to among the finest in the nation. Now in his ninth full season at Clemson, his record of 66-23-4 (.731) is the sixth best winning percentage in college football among active coaches. Additionally, Clemson has the 8th best winning percentage in the nation over the last 10 years.

Between 1981 and 1984 Clemson had a 37-6-2 ledger, the fourth best winning percentage in America. The class of '84 was the third winningest in ACC history in terms of winning percentage, and no ACC class in the 34-year history of the league ever won more games in a four-year period.

In 1978 he was offensive coordinator for the 11-1 team that won the Gator Bowl over Ohio State, 17-15. The Gadsden, AL native was more than just the offensive coordinator in that game, however, as he had become the head coach of the Tigers on December 10 after Charley Pell had already left to go to Florida. The 30-year-old Ford made quite a celebrated beginning to his head coaching career with that victory over the Woody Hayes-coached Buckeyes. The nationally televised Clemson victory helped put the Tigers on the national football map and it began Clemson's climb to among the elite of college football.

In 1979, Ford's first full season as a head coach, he proved the victory in the Gator Bowl was no fluke as he took a team that had lost six players to the pros to an 8-4 record and another bowl game. Included in the eight triumphs in 1979 were a win at Notre Dame and a triumph over Georgia on the way to a Peach Bowl confrontation with Baylor.

Two years later Ford became the youngest coach in the history of the game to win the National Championship. Ford surprised the college football world by taking the unranked Tigers to three wins over top 10 teams and a perfect 12-0 record. Clemson handed Herschel Walker the only regular-season loss of his Georgia career, downed North Carolina in Chapel Hill in the

only showdown of top 10 teams in ACC history, then defeated former National Champion Nebraska in the Orange Bowl.

That obviously is the highmark of Ford's brief, but eventful career at Clemson as he was named national Coach-of-the-Year by UPI, the College Football Writers of America, the Walter Camp Foundation, the Football Coaches of America, and WTBS Television.

Despite the loss of many excellent players off the National Championship team, Ford led Clemson to the ACC title in 1982 and a 9-1-1 record. The 1983 team also followed with a 9-1-1 record, giving Clemson a 30-2-2 ledger between 1981 and 1983, the best record in college football.

In 1984 Clemson continued many successful streaks, as Ford ran a record home unbeaten stretch to 25 games, and an ACC winning streak to 20 games. Ford gained his 50th win at Clemson with a victory over N.C. State in Raleigh. It was just Ford's 65th game in Tigertown, a record for an ACC coach for swiftness in reaching that victory plateau.

Over the last two years he has taken Clemson to two bowls and has been the head coach in a bowl five times overall. Clemson has continued its streak of consecutive winning regular seasons to 10, an all-time ACC record. It is no coincidence that the streak began when Ford first arrived, 1977. Last year Clemson finished 17th in the final AP poll, won the ACC championship and the Gator Bowl.

A review of Ford's football past should help us understand why he has been so successful as a head coach. Another in a long line of former Bear Bryant players that has gone on to greatness in coaching, Ford played for the Bear between 1967 and 1969. He was Kenny Stabler's sophomore tight end as a starter in 1967, played that position in 1968 and moved to offensive tackle in 1969. Ford started all three years, was all-conference in 1969 and played on three teams that went to bowl games. In 1969 he was also a member of the All-SEC academic team, and served as the captain of the Alabama team.

After Pat Dye's coaxing, Ford remained at Alabama as a graduate assistant for the 1970 and 1971 seasons. He had already earned his B.S. degree in industrial arts and earned his master's degree in special education in 1971. Ford became a full-time aide for Bryant in 1972 and 1973. The Tide went to four bowl games while Ford was an assistant coach.

Clemson's current head man then accepted a position as an assistant coach under Jimmy Sharpe at Virginia Tech. He remained in Blacksburg for three seasons (1974-76) before coming to Clemson as offensive line coach in 1977. And, just 23 games later he was named head coach of the Tigers at the age of 30, the youngest active division I coach in the country. Nearly 40 years after hiring 31-year-old Alabama graduate Frank Howard, Clemson had hired 30-year-old Alabama graduate Danny Ford.

Football Staff

Miles Aldridge joined the Tiger coaching staff in June of 1985. A native of Kansas City, MO, Aldridge coaches the inside linebackers. He is responsible for recruiting in South Carolina, Florida, southern New Jersey, and the Philadelphia area. A 1971 graduate of Gardner-Webb College, he is in his 17th year of coaching. Aldridge began his collegiate coaching career at East Tennessee State; after that, he moved to Wichita State, Tulsa, and then Mississippi. Before arriving at Clemson, he served as linebacker coach at Duke for two seasons.

Wayne Bolt joined the Clemson staff on March 10, 1986 from Auburn. His responsibilities include coaching the tight ends and the kickoff return teams. Bolt's first season as a Tiger coach was a successful one as he coached an All-ACC tight end (Jim Riggs), and his kickoff return team led the nation in return yardage. Bolt has no recruiting responsibilities but he is director of the football dorm. He earned his bachelor's degree in Health and Physical Education at East Carolina in 1979. After working as a graduate assistant coach at East Carolina, he took the job as offensive line coach at the University of Wyoming.

Jack Crowe joined the Clemson staff on February 24, 1986, as the Tiger quarterback coach. He came to Clemson from Auburn, where he served as offensive coordinator under Pat Dye and coached Heisman Trophy winner Bo Jackson. He has also served in the offensive coordinator position at Wyoming and North Alabama and was both an assistant and head coach at Livingston University. Crowe received his undergraduate degree in chemistry from Alabama-Birmingham in 1970, and completed his master's degree in education from Livingston in 1973. The Fairfield, AL, native is responsible for recruiting in the Georgia, Virginia and Alabama areas this year.

Bill D'Andrea is one of the newest additions to the Clemson coaching staff, as he returned to the staff in 1986 from Southern Mississippi. Prior to that he was a graduate assistant coach at East Carolina, a full-time assistant at the University of Virginia, Massanutten Military Academy, Catawba College, and was a graduate assistant coach at Clemson. D'Andrea received his bachelor's degree from Indiana State in 1973, and completed his master's degree in 1975. He lacks only a few semester hours from receiving a second master's degree. He coaches the offensive tackles and recruits for the Tigers in North Carolina, Virginia Beach and northern New Jersey.

Tom Harper became Clemson's assistant head coach in February, 1981. Having served as defensive coordinator at North Carolina and Iowa State, his most recent stint in that same position was at Virginia Tech. He was also Wake Forest's head coach in 1972. Harper graduated from the University of Kentucky with his bachelor's degree in 1955 and received his master's degree from there in 1958. He is responsible for recruiting in South Carolina and New York. Six of the Clemson players he has coached have played pro football, including two who were NFL starters last year (William Perry and Jeff Bryant).

Larry Van Der Heyden has coached Clemson's offensive line for the past eight years, and he has coached an All-America guard three of the last four years. He recruits in South Carolina, North Carolina and western Pennsylvania. Van Der Heyden joined the Tiger coaching staff in January 1979, as he came from Memphis State where he was offensive coordinator for three years. He also served stints at Iowa State, Drake, Indiana State, East Carolina, and Virginia. He earned his B.A. and master's degree at Iowa State and lettered three years in football and baseball.

Woody McCorvey is in his fifth year of coaching Clemson receivers. For three years he was the Tigers' tight end coach, and for two of those seasons he coached the All-ACC tight end. He is in his second season as a wide receiver coach. He recruits in North Carolina and Florida. McCorvey came to Clemson from Alabama A&M where he was offensive coordinator for four years. The 1972 Alabama State graduate lettered four years in football at the school before earning his physical education degree. He then received a master's degree in health, leisure, and sports from the University of West Florida in 1977.

Bill Oliver is in his second season at Clemson as the defensive secondary coach. He also recruits for the Tigers in Florida, Alabama and Georgia. A native of Livingston, AL, he began his collegiate coaching career as defensive secondary coach at Auburn, and five years later was hired by the late Paul "Bear" Bryant to fill the same position at Alabama. His most recent stint, however, was with the Memphis Showboats of the United States Football League, where he served as senior defensive coordinator and secondary coach. Oliver was a member of the 1961 undefeated National Championship Alabama team, and he received his bachelor's degree in 1962.

Chuck Reedy has coached Clemson's running backs for the last nine years. He also has a heavy recruiting schedule covering South Carolina, Georgia, Florida, and the New York-Long Island areas. The St. Augustine, FL, native earned two letters in football from Appalachian State, where he was a 1971 graduate in health and physical education. He came to Clemson from Kentucky on July 5, 1978. Reedy is the main reason Clemson has signed the top player in Jacksonville five of the past six years. Every running back with the exception of one who has started under Reedy at Clemson has been drafted by the Pros or has signed a free agent contract. This list includes Kevin Mack, 1985's AFC offensive rookie-of-the-year.

Tommy West is in his sixth season coaching the Clemson defensive and bandit ends. He is also in charge of recruiting for the Tigers in Florida and Georgia. Prior to coming to Clemson, West coached at Appalachian State until July of 1982. The Gainesville, GA, native earned his B.S. degree in health education from the University of Tennessee in 1975 after lettering three years in football and baseball. A fine all-around athlete, West was drafted out of high school by baseball's Chicago Cubs.

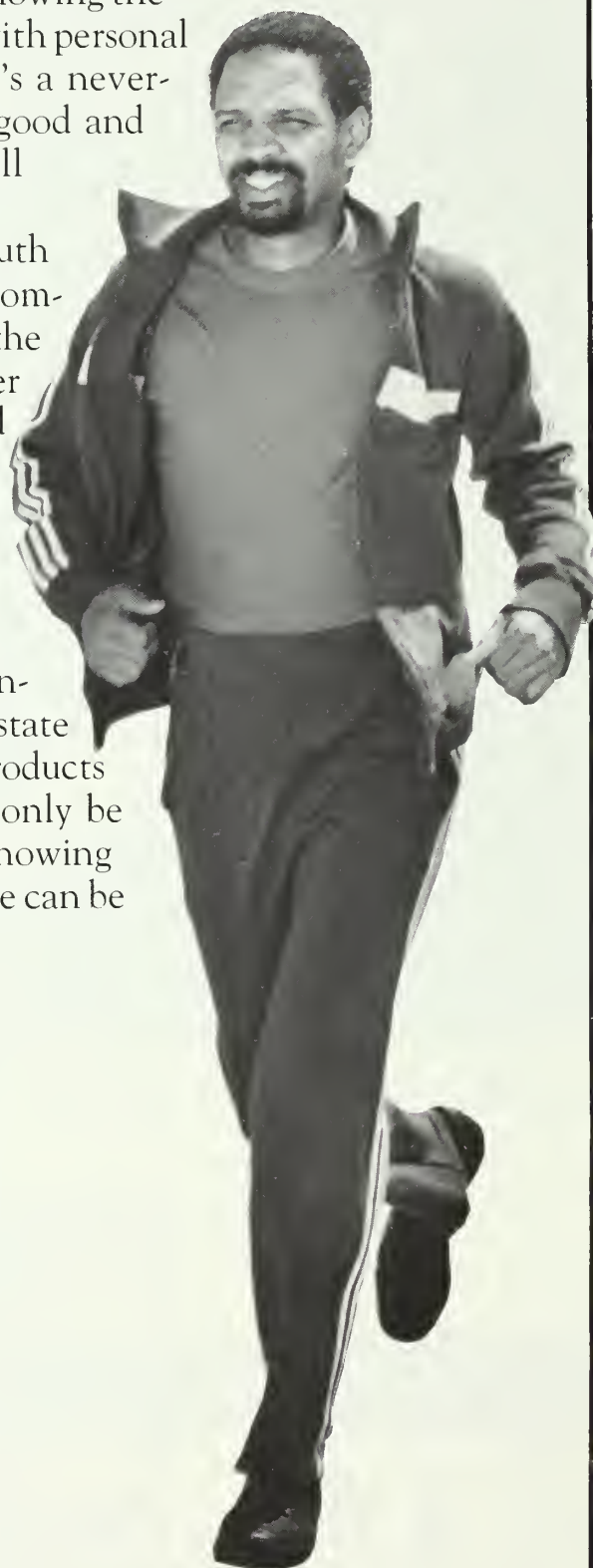

On a hot muggy 1934 August day within the town of Clemson, Dr. Rupert H. Fike wrote a letter to Clemson football coach Jess Neely which began, "Coach last night we had a little meeting at our house and organized the IPTAY Club (I Pay Ter. a Year)."

Since that day in 1934, IPTAY has revamped its name to I Pay Thirty a Year. From the early days when memberships were often paid in eggs and fresh vegetables, IPTAY has annually been one of the top organizations of its kind in America. Today, over 20,000 active members support IPTAY annually, and it is this scholarship fund-raising organization that is a prime reason for Clemson's ranking among the nation's elite in football and all sports. Clemson recently completed its most successful year ever athletically as 10 teams finished in the Top 20 of their respective final polls, and seven teams won conference championships.

IPTAY's first and foremost goal is to annually insure the financing of a quality education for nearly 400 student-athletes, trainers, and managers. Countless numbers of success stories begin with the receipt of an IPTAY scholarship, and through the generous support of IPTAY members, Clemson University has been able to award the maximum number of scholarships allowed by the NCAA in Clemson's 18 men's and women's varsity sports. For the over 3,000 students who have been awarded IPTAY scholarships, and for those who are still to come, without a doubt IPTAY works for them.

Because of IPTAY's commitment to excellence both in the classroom and on the playing field, the ability to expand programs has enabled IPTAY to directly benefit the entire university family. In the fall of 1984, the IPTAY Athletic Academic Endowment Scholarship Fund was created to award financial support to students whose performance in the classroom warranted distinction.

The concept that supports the endowment is based on money donated by matching gift companies, as well as monies generated by television appearances and scholarship awards in such contests. What results from this endowment is one of the largest unrestricted scholarships in the

history of Clemson. Perhaps the most exciting feature of the fund is its potential. As the years go on, the growth of the program will only be equalled by IPTAY's desire to work for Clemson.

Other contributions made possible to Clemson University through IPTAY include several capital improvement projects which have helped to give the university the best facilities in the nation.

Some of the current projects that are sponsored by IPTAY include an indoor tennis facility, as well as permanent soccer stadium. The indoor facility features four indoor courts, as well as permanent seating, and will be available for faculty, students, and staff when not in use by the varsity tennis teams. The soccer stadium will provide a home for the 1984 National Champions.

The Tiger Band sported new uniforms last fall. The uniforms, as well as all expenses for band travel, are sponsored by IPTAY. This commitment, of well over \$200,000, allows the Tiger Band to strut its stuff in style, both home and away.

Although the success of IPTAY's programs and the financial management of its Board of Directors have enabled IPTAY to assist in other concerns of the university, the primary concern of IPTAY is in educating young people and in servicing

the needs of its membership.

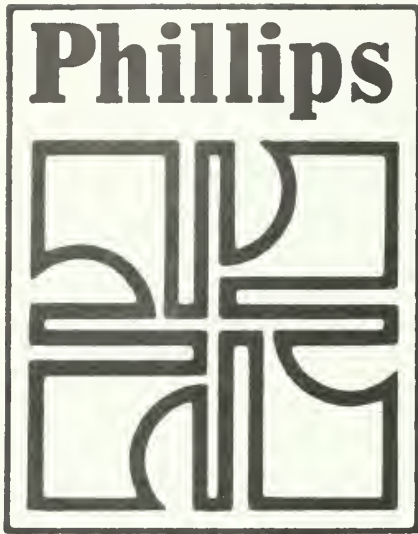
IPTAY sponsors one of the most progressive tutorial programs in the country, and at any time, any athlete is able to supplement his education through the use of tutors, or the impressive study hall program. A highly-trained academic advising staff helps the student-athletes prepare for a future, and to shape their tomorrow by studying today. Through these efforts, nearly a fourth of Clemson's student-athletes were on the honor roll in the spring semester of 1987.

Working for IPTAY members is one of the major goals of the IPTAY Board and the internal staff. Each IPTAY member receives personal service to their account, and is constantly kept abreast of the programs of Clemson through the IPTAY office. Every member receives thirty-five issues of the **Orange and White** each year. As the official publication of IPTAY, the **Orange and White** is exclusively distributed to IPTAY members, and features indepth coverage of Clemson athletics.

IPTAY is a part of Clemson in many ways. Through its various programs and contributions, the 20,000 members of IPTAY spread their support of Clemson throughout the entire university family.

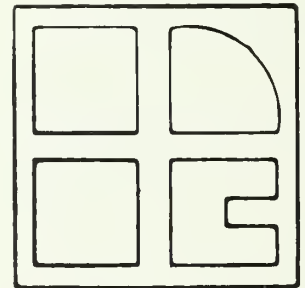

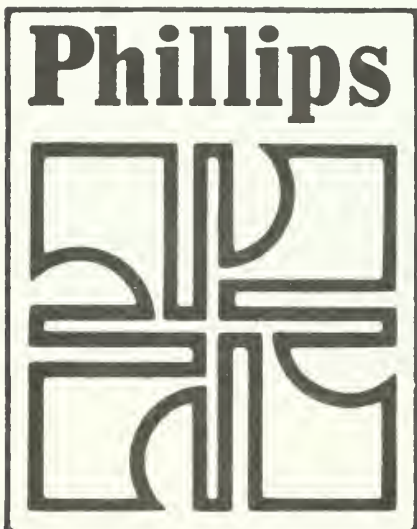

Clemson Coaches

In many ways 1986-87 was Clemson's most successful athletic year ever. The Tigers tied the ACC record for league championships in an academic year with seven (football, women's cross country, women's tennis, men's tennis, men's indoor track, women's swimming and golf) and this tied the mark held by North Carolina in 1980-81 and Maryland, 1964-65. Clemson's previous school mark was six in 1981-82.

Additionally, Clemson had 10 teams finish in the top 20 in the various national polls and an 11th was in the top 20 at one time or another. The most top 20 teams Clemson had previously in final polls over the course of an academic year was nine, established twice (1981-82 and 1982-83).

Clemson was successful in the major sports of football, basketball, and baseball and was one of only two schools in the nation to rank in the top 20 in football, basketball, and baseball in the final polls. UCLA was the only other institution to achieve this level of excellence in the three major sports and it is the first time Clemson has done it.

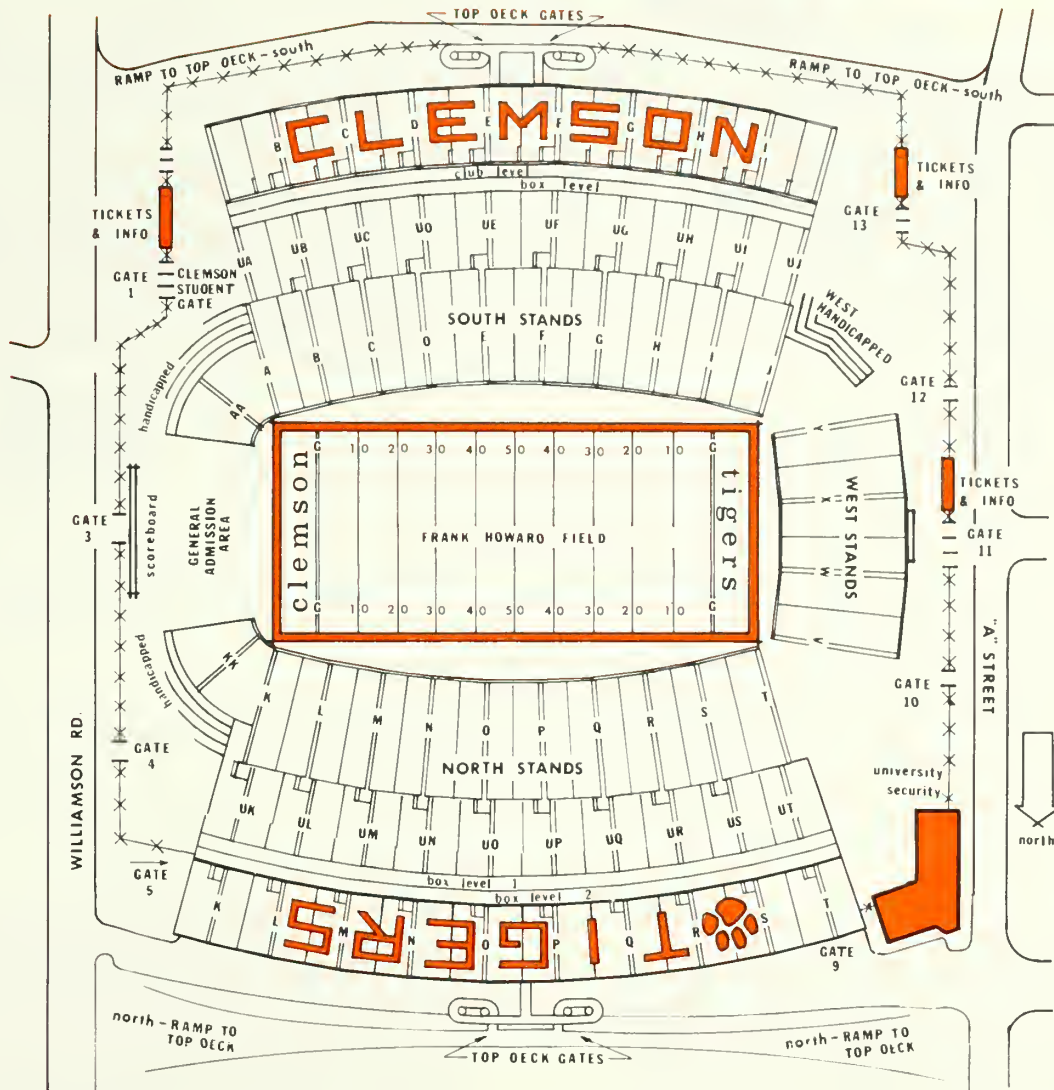

Stadium Information



SEASON TICKET HOLDERS/OTHER VISITORS: Season ticket holders and other visitors to the stadium are requested to enter Gates 1, 5, 9, 11, or 13. Persons with top deck tickets must enter the stadium via the ramps which are located behind the North and South stands. Ramp entrances are adjacent to Gates 1 and 13 on South side and Gates 5 and 9 on North side.

HANDICAPPED: Special entrances have been provided at Gates 1, 5 and 13 for the handicapped.

WILL CALL: Should you have tickets at the will call window, you will find them at Gate 13.

Gates 4, 6, and 8 are closed prior to the games and are opened for exit purposes only.

PASS OUT CHECKS: Pass out checks will be available at Gates 1, 5, 7, 9, 11, 13, and

the top decks. Any person leaving the stadium other than with a team pass must have a pass out check, as well as admittance stub to be readmitted to the stadium.

EMERGENCIES: First aid stations are located: South Side — Under Section J; South Top Deck — Under Section E; North Side — Under Section T; North Top Deck — Under Section K. Trained nurses are on hand during the game. Should a doctor be needed, ask any usher, who knows the seat locations of doctors. Ambulances are located at Gates 1, 5, 8, and 13.

TELEPHONE: Pay telephones are located at the stadium ticket offices at Gates 1, 5, 9, 13, and top decks.

PUBLIC ADDRESS SYSTEM: The public address system is intended primarily for spectators' information concerning the game. Please do not request the use of the public address system to make social contacts.

RESTROOMS: Ladies' and men's restrooms are located between the stands and can be reached by exit from any portal.

LOST & FOUND: If any article is lost or found, please report same to Gate 1 or Gate 10 information booth.

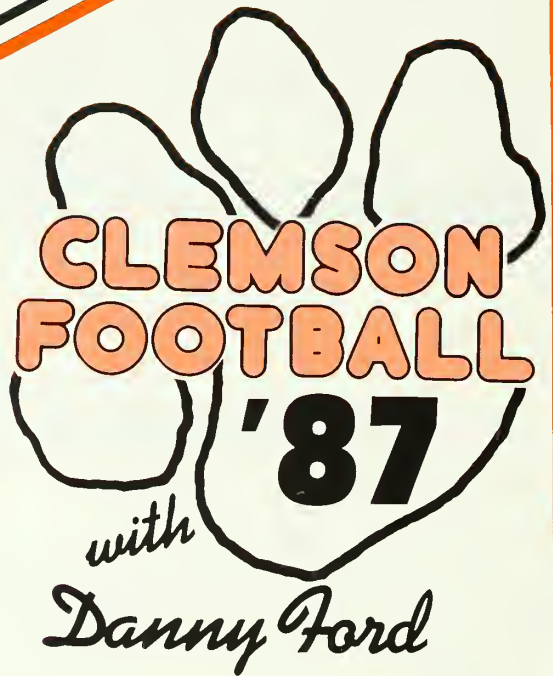
CONCESSION STANDS: Concession stands are located beneath all stands and can be reached by exit from any portal.

EMERGENCY CALLS: Emergency calls are received in the Security Booth. The emergency number is 656-2999.

NOTE: The following items are prohibited in Memorial Stadium — umbrellas, folding chairs, chaise lounges, food and beverage containers of any type, alcoholic beverages, thermos jugs, and ice chests.

Emergency Services

The Clemson University Athletic Department provides the following for your safety and emergency medical needs:

1. Advanced cardiac life-support stations in four locations. (North stands, Upper North deck, South stands, Upper South deck). These units are staffed with skill-care nurses, physicians, cardiologists, internists, paramedics, and EMTs.
2. Mobile units of EMTs and paramedics are strategically located throughout the entire stadium.
3. Ambulances with life-support equipment are available in North stand and South Stand areas and have prearranged routes for evacuation to local hospitals.

Learn to recognize these personnel and facilities.

WHAT TO DO IF EMERGENCIES ARISE

Please step back and give the organized stadium EMS personnel room to work. Well-intentioned attempts to help by untrained persons interfere with the efficiency of the EMS system. If you have basic or advanced training in specific life-support methods, make your qualifications known and offer your help. Untrained personnel can be frequently more harmful than helpful.

MEDICAL ADVICE FOR FANS

If you have a pre-existing medical or health problem, please check with your personal physician and obtain his advice before attending games. Many emergencies occurring at the stadium do so because of prior existing conditions. Use common sense in dressing, eating, drinking and physical exertion. Be certain that you have identification on you as to the diagnosis and what medications you are currently taking.

Be aware of warning signs of heart attacks: chest pain, chest tightness, shortness of breath, sweating, palpitations, fainting, nausea and vomiting.

Recognize that our most common serious medical problems at football games are heart attacks and allergic reactions to insect stings. Be aware that insect stings will always be very frequent at outdoor sporting events and should always be treated with immediate ice until advice can be obtained. If you have ever had a reaction to a bee or other insect sting, check with your personal physician as to whether you should carry a kit.

Offensive Line

They are a rare breed. They come from all walks of life. They come from all parts of the world (or at least the United States). To the human eye, they are calm, cool and collected. It seems as if nothing could ruffle that smooth exterior. But, get them on a football field and they transform. They become vicious, determined to maul anything that comes near the precious treasure that it is their job to protect.

They are Clemson's offensive line. The treasure they seek to guard is whoever is carrying the football. Over the past two-and-a-half seasons, they have guarded their treasure well. Going into the Georgia Tech game, Clemson quarterbacks had only been sacked three times in the previous 18 games.

But, quarterbacks are not the only people who have benefitted from the offensive line's viciousness. Last season, the Tiger offense rushed for 3,245 yards, making them only the second 3,000-yard team in Clemson history. They rushed for 268 yards more than the 1981 National Championship team.

Many skeptics argue that the reason the offensive line was so successful in 1986 was the tailbacks. True, having Terrence Flagler, Kenny Flowers and Steve Griffin in your backfield is a definite plus. This

season, Flowers and Griffin are wearing Atlanta Falcons uniforms, while Flagler is a San Francisco 49er. The tailback situation was a big questionmark coming into 1987. Would the offensive line be as confident as they had been when they could turn around and see that Flagler, Flowers or Griffin were about to carry the ball? Would they be as successful with a rookie tailback?

"When those three were playing, I never even turned around," said Ty Granger, an offensive tackle from Easley, SC. "I knew if we opened a hole, they could run through it. But during the spring and pre-fall practices, I think the new tailbacks have proven they can do the same thing. I don't think I'll be turning around much this year either."

If Granger has been turning around, it has been to congratulate the tailback. Against Virginia Tech, that position rushed for 294 yards, the third highest tailback total for a Clemson team coached by Danny Ford.

The fullback position has also been extremely successful. The combination of Tracy Johnson and Chris Lancaster rushed for 737 yards and 10 touchdowns last season. The position has been in such good hands that they are sometimes taken

for granted, but their success is also dependent on the success of the offensive line.

All of these accomplishments come from a group that has only one senior, John Phillips. Last season, the line was the youngest at Clemson in 41 years, with no senior on the first team offensive line and only one on the second team. But instead of being a hindrance, their youth was a positive aspect.

"They were like sponges," said offensive line coach Larry Van Der Heyden. "They didn't know anything and they soaked everything up. They realized they were young and had to really concentrate and work together. They were eager to learn."

Playing on the offensive line is not a glorious position. On every play, they hit and they hit hard. If a lineman makes a block for the ball carrier, he does not hear his name called over the public address system. The fans don't yell his name unless he jumps offside or is caught holding. It is definitely a gutsy position and it would seem as if the rewards were few.

"You have to be a special person to play on the offensive line," said Van Der Heyden, who should know since he himself played the offensive line at Iowa State. "It's drudgery. You work on perfecting your skill over and over and no one ever sees you improving other than yourself and your coach.

"An offensive lineman has to have a great deal of pride in himself and even more self discipline. They have to learn to get their satisfaction from knowing the entire offensive team did well."

Sometimes there are exceptions to the rule that offensive linemen do not get much publicity. Last season, guard John Phillips became the first Clemson underclassman offensive lineman to become an All-American since 1977 when he was selected to UPI's first team. He was a second-team All-American according to the **Football News** and **Sporting News** and was an honorable mention on the AP's list. He was voted first-team All-ACC by the ACC Sportswriters and was awarded the Jacobs Blocking Trophy for the State of South Carolina. This year he was a preseason pick by **Street & Smith**, **Sporting News** and **Playboy**.

As the only senior on the line, Phillips has been the unofficial spokesman for the group. His attitude tends to reflect that of the other members of his unit. "It is not an

emotional position," he said. "Playing defense is emotional. Defensive players have to be fired up and let themselves be aggressive. We have to be aggressive too, but our position requires **controlled** aggression. It's hard when the defense is going crazy and the fans are screaming, but we have to remain calm and controlled or we'll forget assignments. Probably the hardest thing we have to do is learn to control our emotions."

Although most of the players on Clemson's offensive line seem to be implacable off the football field, there is one thing that aggravates them: the myth of the big, dumb offensive lineman. True, most of the players are big, but dumb? Coach Van Der Heyden assures that this is merely a myth.

"You can't be a dummy and play on the offensive line," Van Der Heyden said. "There are so many things that can happen so quickly in that position. If the defense shifts right before the ball is snapped, they have to be able to respond instantaneously. It takes a great deal of concentration and hours of learning."

"Playing our position is like taking a class," said guard Pat Williams. "It requires concentration and study. We take notes, we take tests and we receive grades. It is not too different from school."

The notes are taken during the daily team meetings, when the team studies their gameplan for the following week. The test is just that, a test. Every Thursday during lunch, Coach Van Der Heyden and Coach Bill D'Andrea, who coaches the offensive tackles, administer a test to their players.

The players are tested on all of their blocking assignments, how to block against various blitzes and stunts. After the test,

the two coaches grade them and that afternoon, the unit goes into the gym at Jervey Athletic Center and goes over their mistakes.

"It's a ritual with us," said Van Der Heyden. "We walk through our mistakes and then we sit down and talk about them. The first law of learning is repetition so if they continue to be tested on it, they will continue to improve."

And of course, the grade comes after the games, when the coaches review the game film to see what mistakes were made. Over the course of the year, the offensive linemen continue to make winning grades.

There are many things that make the Clemson offensive line a special group. One person who knows firsthand about the players who make up this vital part of the team is tight end Danny Pearman. Although technically he is not a member of the offensive line, as a tight end he is often called on to perform many of the same blocking functions.

Pearman knows the players first hand and is probably a better judge of what kind of people they are than anybody. Pearman is also irrepressibly straightforward, so to see the offensive line through his eyes is probably a true picture. In fact, the picture is so true that Pearman didn't want his name used. Sorry Danny. Your stories were too good not to put your name on them.

"They are basically sloppy-type people," Pearman said with a smile. "They are big and strong, totally laid back. Because they're so big, they always tell each other fat jokes. They are always together, on and off the field."

Pearman went on to give a brief description of all of the players.

"Ty Granger is also known as 'Grady' because he's like an old man. He bruises real easily and he loves to fish. He is just your basic good fella.

"John Phillips is the only one out of the group that really gets the recognition he deserves so you don't have to say as much about him. The only thing we pick on him about is his head. It's not too big, but the guys do call him 'Bucket' every once in a while. He thinks he can play golf, but he needs to stick to Putt-Putt.

"Hank, John's brother, is just a good ole mountain boy. He's countryer than John. He loves to hunt and fish and little things make him happy. Give him some country music and a pick-up and he's fine.

"Jeff Bak seems like he should be playing somewhere on the West Coast. He looks like he should be on a surfboard, not on the football field. He thinks he can hunt and fish, but he should stick to golf. He's

pretty good at that. He also looks a little like Fred Flintstone, but that's not important.

"Frank Deluliis is pretty quiet but he's a good guy. Give him some Italian food and a nice laid back atmosphere and he'll never cause any trouble.

"Nunamacher, or Nuny, is not very outspoken, but he's one of the nicest guys you ever wanted to meet. He also enjoys the outdoors. We kid him about being a bear. I guess he's like a Gentle Ben or something.

"Eric Harmon is the rookie of the bunch but he plays with maturity. He probably is one of the best athletes of the bunch. He's a hard worker and very persistent. In a year or so there will be more to tease him about.

"Pat Williams is another hard worker. He has been hurt a lot, but he believes in a hard day's work. If he can't practice full strength, he doesn't feel like he should practice. The only thing we tease Pat about is his head when he shaves it. It's pretty funny.

"Finally, there's Pat McKenny. Pat is another laid back fella. He enjoys working on cars, cleaning them, waxing them, whatever you can do to them. He's from Florida but he fits in just fine."

But all teasing aside, Pearman also knows the kind of job the offensive linemen do. "They are probably the most disciplined group on the field. They work from the time they run out to practice until it's time to run off. They don't get the recognition they deserve. They are the unsung heroes of our football team. Everybody works hard, but the difference is that these guys work **hard together**. That's what makes them so special."

Her many community volunteer positions have included chairmanship of the City of Clemson Heart Fund campaign for two years and service on the Board of Direc-

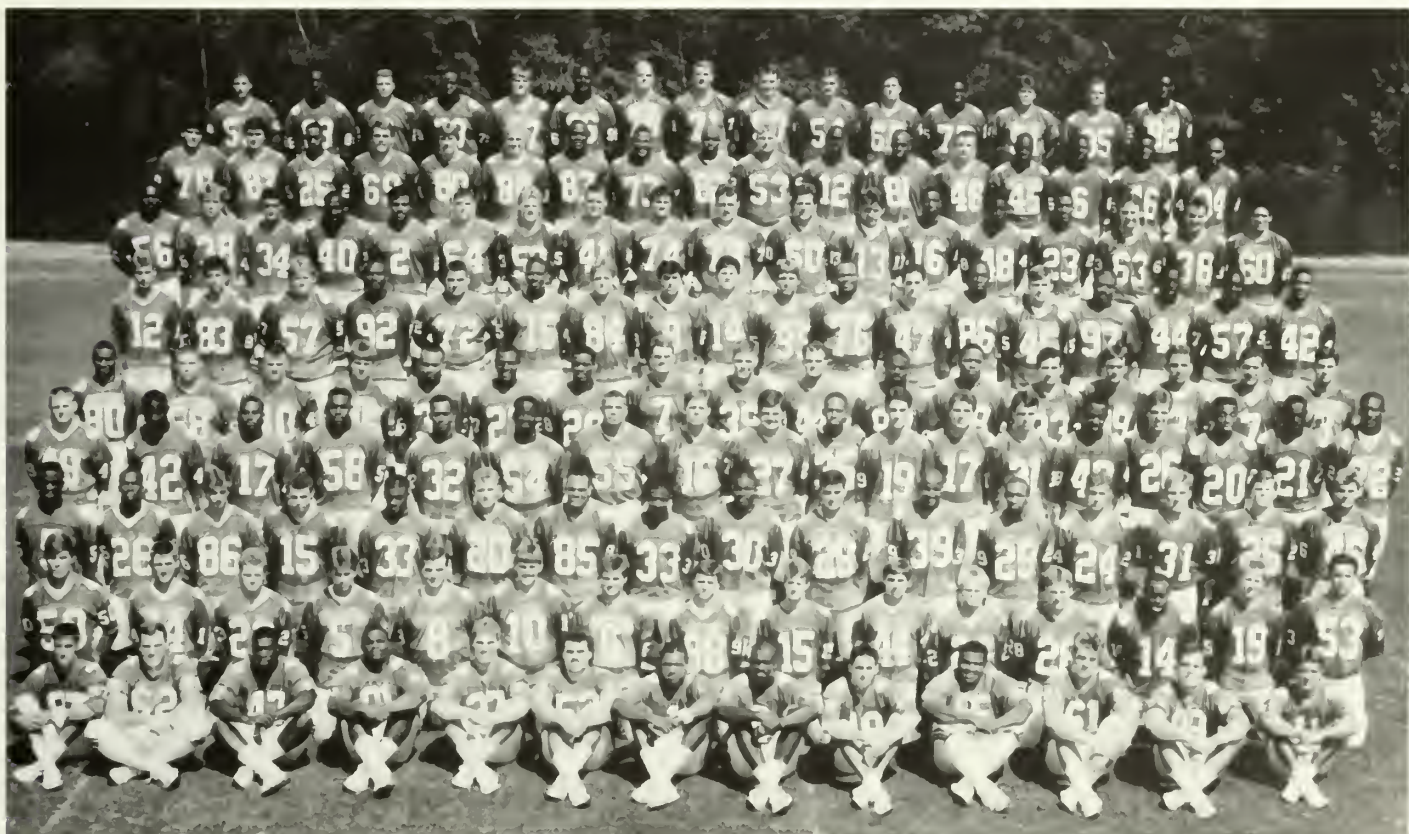
tors of the Pickens County Humane Society.

Let us sing praises to Auburn Coach Pat Dye and wish him luck today against Tennessee. Sorry Volunteers, but Dye has really helped Clemson.

When Clemson's Danny Ford finished playing football, it was then Alabama assistant Pat Dye who convinced him to go into coaching. Ford moved through the coaching ranks before becoming Clemson's head coach in 1978. Dye's Clemson connection doesn't end there. For Clemson tight end coach Wayne Bolt, Dye has been his coach and then helped him get started in the profession.

Bolt played for Dye four years at East Carolina and was an assistant coach for Dye for seven years. It has been a close relationship throughout. "My early background is through Coach Dye," Bolt said.

The Bolt-Dye connection was finally broken in 1986 when Bolt came to Clemson to coach tight ends and be the dorm director. "I was with Coach Dye the whole time until now," Bolt said. "It's good to get away and learn from other people."

In his first year at Clemson, Bolt was able to keep an amazing streak going: every tight end that has started for him has gone on to play professionally. Clemson's Jim Riggs was selected by the Cincinnati Bengals in the spring, becoming Bolt's fourth starter to make it to the pros.

"It was fun to coach all those kids," Bolt said. "They'll do anything you ask them to do. They make it happen."

Bolt's players, however, say his coaching has a great deal to do with it. "He's a great coach," said Jerome Williams, a Tiger tight end. "He's so good at the techniques. He just knows what he's doing."

Clemson doesn't throw the football much to the tight ends, but Bolt says his players don't get down. "Our long-range goal at Clemson is to run the football, so we take

great pride in our blocking," he said. "We just try to get better every day. If you don't, you go backwards."

Bolt's expertise isn't limited to just tight ends. Last year, for the first time, he was in charge of the kickoff return team. Under Bolt's direction, the Tiger kickoff return team was the best in the nation and set a school record for kickoff return average. "We didn't do anything real fancy," Bolt said. "The kids just did a great job of executing."

Bolt was an outstanding offensive guard at East Carolina. Playing for Dye, Bolt was the 1974 East Carolina Freshman of the Year, all-conference his junior season, and All-American and co-captain of the Pirates his senior season.

He then worked two years for Dye as a graduate assistant at East Carolina. After coaching for Wyoming a year, he moved with the head man to Auburn for five years as tight end coach.

Over the last five seasons he has been a part of many successful teams. In fact he has been to a bowl game as an assistant coach five years in a row, the top streak on the team along with Jack Crowe concerning consecutive bowl seasons for a current Clemson assistant coach. His knowledge of the game and of blocking techniques is one reason Auburn and Clemson have had such dynamic rushing attacks in recent seasons.

In 1986 Bolt came to Clemson. He says he enjoys his job as football dorm director at Mauldin Hall, which houses about 150 people, including all scholarship football players and some walk-ons. "It's a good job because you're around all the kids all

the time, not just the kids you coach," he said. "You have all kinds of personalities, rich and poor, black and white. I enjoy working with them and dealing with their problems. You try to treat them all the same, but each one is different."

"Coach Bolt will listen and help you out if he can," said Williams, a sophomore. "You can always go to him with a problem."

Bolt has helped Williams immensely in the blocking area. Last season the then freshman scored a 95 percent as a blocker in the win at Georgia, the highest blocking grade by a starting Clemson tight end in recent memory. And, that is saying something considering Clemson has had the All-ACC tight end three of the last four seasons.

Coaching at Clemson has strengthened Bolt. "I broadened myself coming to Clemson and coaching for Coach Ford," he said. "We have such a close and veteran working staff. You learn something every day. When you're surrounded with good people, you're going to learn something."

"Football is not a real complicated sport. If you block, tackle, and play hard, you win. A kid has to know what to do and how to do it. If he works hard, he'll be successful."

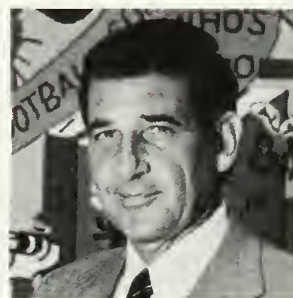
With coaches like Bolt, success seems certain to continue for the Tigers.

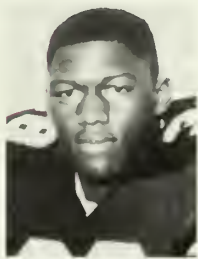

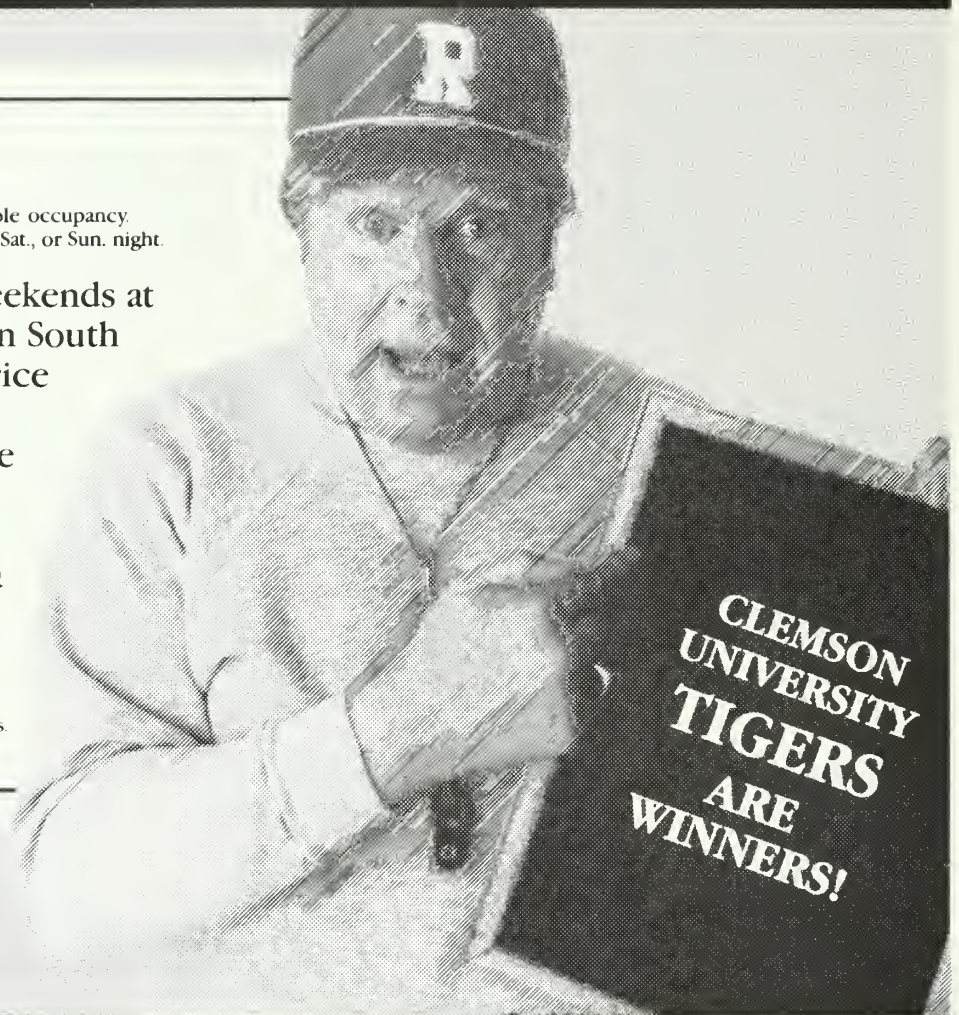

CLEMSON EXTENSION: Tackling South Carolina's Most Pressing Problems

Helmets and shoulder pads are not a part of its equipment, but the Clemson University Extension Service has suited up to do some serious tackling.

Extension has launched a four-year plan to take on more than 1,800 problems identified by South Carolinians as their most pressing concerns.

Twenty teams of Extension agents, specialists and administrators from a mixture of academic backgrounds have been formed to design and implement programs to address topics ranging from deteriorating water quality to teen pregnancy.

Last year, more than 1,000 people on 62 Extension committees drew up a list of 1,803 problems needing attention. A statewide series of meetings to review plans for solving these problems attracted thousands of citizens.

"Pinpointing the problems and formulating plans to deal with them have been true grass-roots efforts involving more than 5,000 South Carolinians," says B.K. Webb, Clemson Extension director.

The teams and the work they will oversee during the next four years are the result of a planning and marketing process begun in 1985. In early 1986, Extension units and county offices surveyed the communities in which they work, gathering information on demographics, economics, government, technology, and natural resources.

This information already has been useful in Extension's ongoing programs and has been loaned to other governmental agen-

cies, says Elwyn Deal, assistant Extension director for agriculture and natural resources.

Next, problem-identification committees were formed. Some of these groups listed as many as 60 major concerns in specific areas or fields.

The problems then were summarized and listed by priority. The resulting documents stimulated so much interest that some newspapers published entire county reports, Deal says.

As work on plans to correct the problems began, Extension was developing a new reporting system to track progress in each area. Each

county Extension staff's plan of work for the next four years is based on needs identified in that county.

The 20 oversight teams will monitor educational programs and evaluate progress during this four-year period. The teams will meet quarterly and will have the flexibility to respond to changing needs of the state.

"Throughout this long process people have expressed genuine interest in this opportunity to tell us of their concerns," says Extension Director Webb. "They have been very responsive to what we were doing."

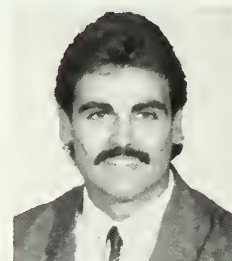

One Last Ride For Howard

For anybody who has followed the Clemson-Georgia Tech series over the years, it is no secret that Clemson victories have been scarce against the Yellow Jackets. In the schools' 51 meetings, all but six of which have occurred in Atlanta, Clemson has earned only 13 victories, such a small number that nearly each one has proved memorable.

One standout victory was the Tigers' 1969 win, a 21-10 verdict in Frank Howard's final campaign at the Clemson helm. The victory broke a streak of 10 straight Clemson losses against the Yellow Jackets and was Howard's first win over Tech since 1945.

In spite of his lack of success against Georgia Tech, Coach Howard has fond memories of the series, saying, "That was one school I always liked to play. It's the only school other than Clemson that I might have liked to work for. They had a coach way back then named Bill Alexander, one of the finest people I've ever known in my whole life."

The Tigers, of course, had played Tech a number of times before Coach Howard took the head position on the sidelines, but the Legend's first try against the Jackets, in 1943, marked the resumption of the series after a six-year layoff. He recalls, "We went down to play them with the understanding that we would get to play them every year. Back in those days we needed money at Clemson. We didn't have a large stadium or anything like that, and we had very few home games. So any time we wanted to make money, we had to go out and work for it, and Georgia Tech was a good place to go."

There were close games and blowouts, but Clemson couldn't seem to come out of Atlanta with a win. Coach Howard kept at it, though. "I was just so glad to play them," he says, "that I would've gone to Oklahoma or Austin, TX, or the Fiji Islands. That's just how much I thought of them."

Despite that respectful sentiment, the situation must have been growing rather frustrating for Howard and the Tigers by 1969. That year the Tigers headed for Atlanta to face a 2-0 Tech team reputed for its intensity, speed, and perseverance. Pre-game newspaper accounts consistently referred to Tech's proficiency at overcoming

the mistakes that were by-products of the team's tremendous speed.

The Tigers were 1-1 entering the game. Clemson had started the season with a 21-14 win over Virginia, but the following 30-0 loss to seventh-ranked Georgia had the Tiger coaching staff looking for an effective formula to bolster the team's ground attack.

To this end, Coach Howard and his assistants decided to move junior Ray Yauger from fullback, his position for the season's first two games, to tailback, where he had set a Clemson sophomore rushing record the previous season. As a result of that move, erstwhile tailback Ricky Gilstrap returned to quarterback to share duties with Tommy Kendrick, and senior Rick Medlin became the starting fullback.

Things looked good for Clemson when, on the game's first play from scrimmage, Yauger bolted through the middle for a 35-yard gain. But the game soon took on an all too familiar tone as Tech managed to forge a 10-0 halftime lead.

An intermission pep talk from assistant coaches Whitey Jordan and Art Baker, however, brought the Tigers out of the locker room fired up for the second half. Tech received the kickoff, and on the first play from scrimmage Clemson linebacker Larry Hefner crushed dangerous Tech quarterback Charlie Dudish for a two-yard loss on an option play. Dudish had to leave the game with a broken wrist, and it was all Clemson and Ray Yauger the rest of the way.

Yauger scored all three Clemson touchdowns in the second half and ended up with 146 yard rushing on 23 carries. In an enthusiastic half of football, the Tigers became 21-10 victors and ended a 24-year jinx for the Baron, Coach Frank Howard, in what turned out to be his final season as head coach.

Following the game, Coach Howard had to take a little time to clear up his misty eyes before relating to the press how good he felt to finally get a win at Grant Field. Today he still says, "Naturally, if you win you feel good, but winning against Georgia Tech felt especially good."

Today the jinx is a thing of the past. As Howard says, "Now if they want to draw a crowd, they have to come to Death Valley and play in front of 80,000." And that should be enough to jinx anybody.

The tradition-rich soccer program at Clemson has seen 11 ACC championships and seven final four finishes, including a National Championship in 1984. It has produced 16 All-Americans, 120 All-ACC first and second-team choices, and 11 ACC Players of the Year. The Tigers have even been ranked in the final top 20 polls each of the last 15 years. Coach I.M. Ibrahim, now in his 21st year, has been the only coach Clemson has had and has done just about everything in soccer at Clemson.

In 1987, however, Ibrahim was supposed to endure something he has not seen in decades ... a rebuilding year. This rarity in the soccer program is due to the graduation of such Tiger greats as Gary Conner, Eric Eichmann, and Dick Landgren.

The National Championship is not a realistic goal for 1987, as it has been many times in the last 15 seasons. However, those dreams are replaced by a new era in Tiger soccer, an era that is full of optimism based on an outstanding recruiting year. "I don't mind saying the word rebuilding," Ibrahim says. "The loss of the seniors will have a very long lasting effect on our program. We don't have anyone on hand who can fill such big shoes; therefore, we must develop our 13 or 14 freshmen to emerge a couple of years down the road."

The Tigers have fielded a team with a unique blend of youth and experience this year. Of the 24 players, six are seniors, while no juniors are found on the depth chart. Ibrahim's optimism rests upon the shoulders of these seniors that include All-ACC candidates Paul Carollo, Paul Rutenis, and Academic All-American Jamey Rootes. The Tigers top gun, however, will be senior striker Bruce Murray.

As important as the seniors may be, there are two other factors that will be equally important. First, the progress of the freshman crop and second, the downfall of last year's squad, injuries.

Clemson has a 6-1 record heading into tomorrow's ACC match with defending National Champion Duke, a record far from one for a rebuilding team. Clemson's only loss has been a one-goal defeat at North Carolina. The Duke match will have a major bearing on Clemson's NCAA bid and ACC title hopes and an overflow crowd of 6,500 is expected in Clemson's new soccer stadium.

Goalkeeper

Nowhere were injuries more prevalent in 1986 than at the keeper position. Starter Chris Dudley, who returns for his senior campaign, has been hampered by injuries throughout his collegiate career. He started 11 games last year and had a team-leading 38 saves and two shutouts. In 1987 he recorded shutouts in each of his first three contests.

Kevin Taylor is a sophomore who started four games in net during the 1986 season and gave up just three goals. Again, injuries plagued his freshman season as knee surgery forced him to miss seven games.

Backfield

Gone are Bill Fortner and second-team All-ACC defender Bernard Gray from the 1986 backfield. But, Coach Ibrahim has the luxury of two veteran defenders who are back for their senior seasons. Paul Rutenis, All-ACC choice and captain for 1987, returns to hold down a defensive slot. Rutenis is a four-year starter and one of only two current Tigers that started in the National Championship victory over Indiana in 1984. Rutenis is one of the more offensive defenders Clemson has had in recent years and has over 30 career points.

The other veteran defender is Paul Carollo. A starter in all 20 contests in 1986, Carollo is a strong candidate for conference and regional awards.

The sweeper position has been manned by Andres Alos, a freshman from Hialeah, Florida. Alos is a converted midfielder who has outstanding heading ability. His development will be vital

to the Tiger defense. Joe Hummel has been the starter at the other back position.

Midfield

Of the 11 midfielders listed on the 1987 roster, only three are returnees and only one was a starter last year. Jamey Rootes has returned to his right wing position. Rootes, an All-ACC candidate, was one of only two Tigers to start in all 20 games and had five goals and seven assists. He was Clemson's third leading scorer as of this week and his consistent play and leadership will be a key to Clemson's success this season.

A host of newcomers have held the two middle positions. They include Thomas Najjar, a Parade All-American from Dunwoody, Georgia. Ibrahim says, "Najjar could be the next Eric Eichmann." Irishman Derek McArdle was one of the best performers on the Irish Youth International Team and is another newcomer who is listed as a starter heading into fall practice.

Edo Boonstoppel is a native of Holland who could play the midfield or striker. He played in the World University games for Holland this past summer. The left wing position will be rounded out by another talented freshman, Richard Richmond of Decatur, Georgia and Joey Feinburg, who can also play on defense.

Dave Veghte and John Meek are two sophomores who gained valuable experience in 1986. Veghte started six games and contributed a goal and two assists. Meek matched Veghte's output in his four starting assignments and had the game winning goal against College of Charleston this year.

Striker

When Gary Conner and Eric Eichmann graduated they left behind huge shoes to be filled. The duo accounted for 265 points, including 99 goals in their marvelous careers. The striker positions are surprisingly not that bad off, however, despite losing two of the top seven point producers in school history.

Moving up from the midfield will be senior Bruce Murray. Murray is Clemson's hope for the equivalent of football's Heisman Trophy, the Hermann Award. He has enjoyed a very successful career at Clemson and his fourth year as a starter has been equally outstanding. Murray has gone over 100 career points and is one of the top scorers in the ACC. He had a hat-trick in the season opener against UNC-Asheville.

Clemson lost its leading returning goal scorer in the preseason when David Fortner went out with a knee injury. This opened up a slot for Pearse Tormey at a striker position and he has responded well. Tormey was Clemson's second leading scorer heading into this week's play and gives Clemson some solid offensive punch for the future.

And, speaking of the future, Clemson has run up a 6-1 ledger with a starting lineup that includes seven freshmen and sophomores. Clemson might not be rebuilding ... reloading is the proper adjective.

John Heisman

John Heisman was one of the greatest coaches in football history and he is honored by the awarding of the most famous trophy in the country in New York City, each December to the nation's top college player. One of the least known facts at Clemson is that Heisman coached here from 1900-1903. During those four years, he made Clemson one of the football powerhouses in the South, established a reputation as one of the top coaches in the country, and laid the foundation at Clemson for a total athletic program that stands strong today.

Heisman took Clemson from mediocrity to athletic dominance. His four teams compiled a 19-3-2 record and outscored their opponents 731-92. He was an innovator and a master strategist. W.W. Riggs, a Clemson professor who was a leading figure in athletics in the South, was one of his greatest admirers. "As a coach there is no other like Heisman," Riggs said in 1904. "Given an equal chance, equal material, and equal time for practice, I believe he can defeat any team coached by anyone else."

In his first year at Clemson, Heisman led the Tigers to a 6-0 season, one of only three perfect

seasons in Clemson history. That 1900 team gave up only two touchdowns all season and was called "the strongest team in the South" by the *Atlanta Journal*.

His next three teams continued that success. Opponents didn't look forward to playing the Tigers. Scores like 35-0 were common under Heisman. In 1901 the Tigers defeated Guilford 122-0, the most points ever scored by a Clemson football team.

Heisman came to Clemson from Auburn. Riggs, who was in charge of Auburn's football program in 1895 and was an engineering professor, hired Heisman to coach the War Eagles. A few years later, Riggs, who had moved to Clemson, enticed Heisman to come to Clemson to coach football, baseball, and track, for \$1,800 annually. He was only 30 when he became Clemson's head coach, which invites comparisons to Danny Ford, who was also only 30 when he became the Tiger mentor.

Creativity was what made Heisman a great coach. To the Tigers' repertoire, he constantly added new plays and formations, which no team had ever used before. Heisman reportedly in-

vented the lateral, used often now in plays like the option, and pushed many years for the legalization of the forward pass, which finally was approved in 1906.

"What the few great painters and great musicians are to their professions, Heisman is to football," Riggs once said. "By comparison, the work of every other coach I have known seems crude and amateurish."

Heisman was the best coach Heisman knew too. "At Clemson we have a style of football play radically different from anything on earth," Heisman wrote in the 1903 *Oconean*, the Clemson yearbook. "Its notoriety and the fear and admiration of it has spread throughout the length and breadth of the entire Southern world of football." Of course, all of this was true.

Heisman was a demanding coach. He held practice daily at 5:15 a.m. on Bowman Field in 1903, using a white ball so the players could practice in the darkness. "If I had time for practice," Heisman said, "I could really teach my men football." One of the first things he would tell all new players was, "better to have died a small boy than to fumble this football."

He rarely substituted in games and expected every man to play the entire game unless injured. Taking only a few substitutes on away games, Heisman was known to play the student manager if manpower was short. It was said that Clemson head cheerleader "Doc" Ezell spent more time on the field than he did leading cheers.

Heisman believed a coach had to be tough. "A coach should be masterful and commanding, even dictatorial," he said. "He has no time to say 'please,' or 'mister,' and he must be occasionally severe, arbitrary, and something of a czar."

Riggs said Heisman carried out those beliefs. "Upon the field he is supremely, though kindly, despotic," Riggs said. "He makes every minute of practice count."

Heisman's Clemson players believed in their coach. "No one dares question his authority of his superior knowledge," Riggs said, "and the firm belief in his infallibility is one of the strongholds he has upon his players."

Although Heisman socially distanced himself from his players throughout his career, he was held in great esteem by his players. "Mr. Heisman's pupils are never familiar with him, and yet every boy with whom he comes in contact is his devoted friend," Riggs said. "Every player feels that if he fails to do his best when the play comes that he is disappointing in a personal way a friend who has labored for him and his interests."

While it was said that Heisman was obsessed with winning, he would not tolerate players who thought football was more important than academics. "Night after night he admonishes his players to keep up with their studies and other college work," Riggs said. "He insists that while a student has time for football and studies,

he has time for nothing else besides. No loafing, no idle talking, no fighting of old battles, but when football is over, then to books and other duties."

Heisman didn't believe in intimacies, but he was popular with students and faculty while at Clemson. Riggs, who served as Clemson's president from 1910-1924, said that he had "no closer personal or athletic friend than Heisman."

However, Heisman was not always popular with opponents. After an opposing team accused Clemson of playing dirty football, Heisman responded angrily in a letter to an Atlanta newspaper.

"I wish only that the whole world would come, if but a single day, to Clemson and watch our daily practice," he said. "I feel sure that nowhere in this country is the order and the decorum that prevails on our field equaled. Nowhere are such rules of order and morality and sober conduct laid down and enforced."

Heisman's fans said his teams were just aggressive and superior to the competition. Riggs said Heisman, "allows no profanity and no rough play upon the practice field, and I have known him to send from the field in disgrace even the captain of the team because the latter could not hold his tongue or his temper."

Heisman moved Clemson forward in more than just football. He also was an outstanding baseball coach. His 1903 Clemson baseball team lost only one game and was declared the champion of the South.

There are several stories about Heisman's time at Clemson. Playing football at Furman one day, Heisman got his offense to use a tree that stood in the field as a "blocker." Against Georgia Tech in 1902, Heisman sent a group of Clemson cadets, posing as the football team, to Atlanta. Tech boosters gave the Clemson men a night on the town, and Tech men became extremely confident of victory. Heisman showed up with

the real team the next day, however, and rolled over Tech, 44-5.

All of Heisman's football teams pounded their opponents. Probably his best squad at Clemson and Clemson's best team for many years was the 1903 team. The Tigers opened the season with a 29-0 victory over Georgia in Athens. They then traveled to Atlanta to play Georgia Tech and committed the great paradoxical sin an athletic squad can commit. The Tigers played so well, they lost their coach. Clemson destroyed Tech 73-0, set a record for rushing offense (615 yards) that still stands today, and embarrassed Tech so much that the school stole Heisman away a month later.

Grantland Rice, one of the most famous sportswriters ever and a 22-year-old sports editor of the Atlanta *Journal* at the time, wrote about the Tech massacre in his florid prose in the next day's paper.

"Battered, bruised, and beaten by elephantine rushes stem to stern and fairly pulverized with the galvanic shock of 11 athletes merged into one, Tech was literally wiped off the Southern football map by Clemson.

"... Heisman's system of attack, so ably carried out by his agile cohorts, was the very acme of gridiron mechanism and the highest perfection of football art. For it was not an 11 that Tech was forced to tackle, but a machine ... The offense — compact, swift, and powerful in every detail. The defense — ready everywhere for every attack, sturdy, well sustained, and aggressive."

The Tigers concluded the season with what could be considered the Tigers' first bowl game. In a specially arranged contest in Montgomery, Ala. on Thanksgiving Day, Clemson and Cumberland College tied, 11-11, in the championship of the South. That day, one day after Tech's deadline for its offer had expired, Heisman accepted the institute's offer of \$2,250

per year (which was considered a large sum at the time) plus 30 percent of net receipts to coach its athletic teams. Heisman had also married a woman from Atlanta in 1903 which also might have figured into the move.

Heisman coached at Tech for 16 years, winning the national championship in 1917. Over one stretch under Heisman, Tech had a 33-game unbeaten streak. He moved on to Pennsylvania and Rice, where he finished out his coaching career. He then became director of the New York Downtown Athletic Club, which honored him by the giving of the Heisman Trophy in 1935. He died in 1936.

After Heisman left Clemson, the Tigers meandered between good and poor. In the late 1920's Coach Josh Cody took Clemson back to football and athletic prominence, where the Tigers have stayed ever since.

There are only a few glimpses of Heisman's Clemson years left. Heisman's football and baseball coaching contracts both signed by him, are in the University library. There is also a program from the college's 1903 field day at which Heisman was the starter and legendary Clemson professors Riggs and D.W. Daniel were the judges. Except for a couple pieces of correspondence, there are no other concrete remains of Heisman's Clemson years.

However, the Heisman athletic legacy at Clemson lives on. Under Heisman, Clemson first reached excellence in athletics, starting a tradition that Clemson has maintained and been proud of ever since.

In 1903, Heisman wrote about college athletes and Clemson's strong tradition in sports. What he wrote then, still aptly fits the Clemson athletic program today.

"All colleges should have fixed athletic traditions and should be loyal to them as to the institution itself. The complete unity and harmony of athletic opinion and sentiment existing at Clemson is due in no small part to her glorious athletic record."

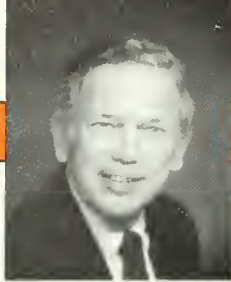

The Last Word

Clemson and Georgia Tech are playing football for the 52nd time today, but this is only the fourth time of the series that the Yellow Jackets have paid a visit to Death Valley.

Seems a little one sided, and it is. But it was mostly of Clemson's choosing because the Tigers didn't have crowds of 80,000 back then. Georgia Tech did not either, but then Jacket head coach (and athletic director) Bobby Dodd gave Clemson its first \$100,000 guarantee.

And Tiger head coach Frank Howard (and athletic director) knew what it took to run a first class athletic operation. And he was determined to have such a program.

Howard was once quoted as saying: "I can take a pretty good licking for a hundred thousand." If one looks at some of those Georgia Tech scores, he did exactly that.

Clemson defeated the Yellow Jackets only two out of 14 times under Howard, but he used to refer to the Georgia Tech journey to Atlanta as Clemson's "bowl trip" because all of the wives made the trip and they got to do a lot of shopping. On occasion a few of them were known to go shopping instead of going to the game.

Finally, Howard and Dodd got together (after Clemson had raised its seating capacity to 43,000) and agreed that the Yellow Jackets would come to Clemson for the first time in 1974. The two ADs had also decided, but nothing had been signed, that the two teams would play back at Clemson in 1978.

Dodd retired from active coaching in 1966, but had continued as athletic director at the Atlanta school. By the time the Yellow Jackets made

it across Lake Hartwell, Pepper Rodgers was head coach.

Clemson was playing six home games in 1974 for only the third time in history and the Yellow Jackets were to lead off the home slate after the Tigers had led off with heavy road losses to Texas A&M and N.C. State.

Clemson was to win all six home games that season in Red Parker's third year as Tiger head coach. Georgia Tech and Georgia each took four-point losses from the Tigers before Maryland laid it on Parker's forces, 41-0, at College Park. Duke was also a four-point loser in a visit to the valley.

The Tigers ended the season with home victories over North Carolina (54-32), Virginia (28-9) and South Carolina (39-21) for a 7-4 year.

But that Georgia Tech victory might have come before the most hyped crowd at Clemson up to that time. Having lost 14 of the last 15 games to the Yellow Jackets in Atlanta, Tiger fans figured it was time to pass out some of the same medicine they had been receiving in Atlanta all of these years. Things were bitter for the Tigers for awhile, even though they put the first points on the board.

A 75-yard drive that started with 3:50 left in the first quarter came to a successful conclusion on the second play of the second period on a 12-yard pass from Mark Fellers to Bennie Cunningham.

The Yellow Jackets came right back in the next series and got a field goal, then intercepted Fellers in Clemson's next possession and turned that into a touchdown for a 10-7 halftime lead.

Clemson got the ball after halftime and made a first down in two plays, but a Fellers' pitchout was intercepted by Eddie Porter, who scampered 19 yards to put the Jackets up, 17-7, and things were beginning to look bleak for the Tigers.

After three passes by Fellers fell incomplete and Mitch Tyner punted, Clemson recovered a fumble at the Tech 40. It took nine plays, but Ken Callicutt bulled over from the one to bring the Tigers to within three and there were still 8:28 left in the third quarter.

Tech only got three plays before punting and Bob Burgess put the Yellow Jackets in a hole when his 51-yard field goal attempt went dead at the three with two seconds left in the third period. And Tiger fans sensed that something good might happen.

Clemson forced a punt and went in business again at the Jacket 46 with 13:33 left in the game.

A drive that lasted over five minutes ended successfully as Mike O'Cain passed to Cunningham four yards for his second TD reception and a 21-17 Clemson lead. Clemson held again and used up five and a half minutes before Danny Rhino blocked a Tyner punt, giving Tech possession at the Clemson 41. However, Dennis Smith intercepted a Rudy Allen aerial with 1:04 left. But, the Jackets had timeouts left, forcing another Clemson punt.

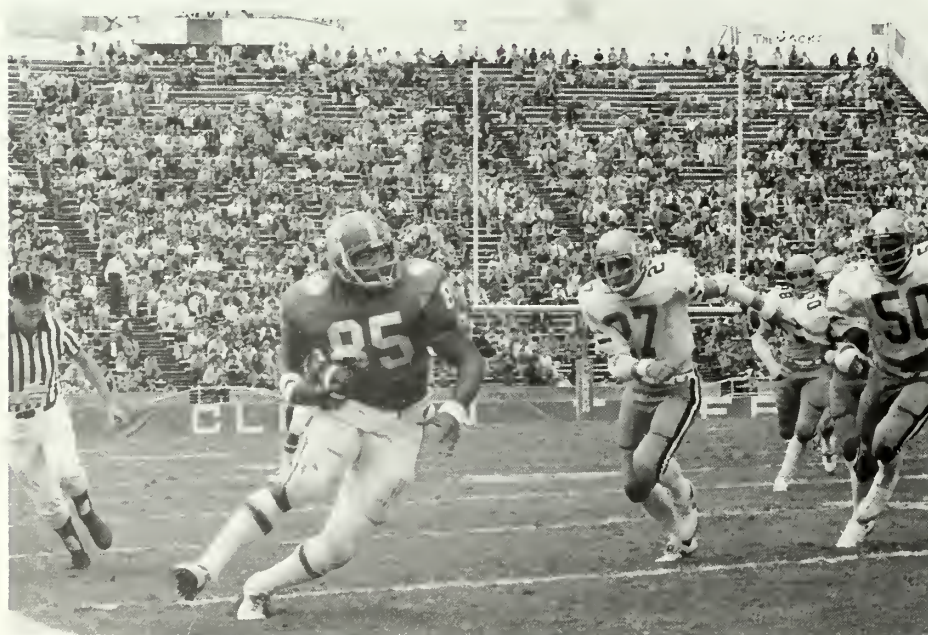
Clemson was charged with a 43-yard pass interference by Smith, but on the game's last play from the Clemson 34, Smith covered on an incomplete Allen pass, giving Clemson the four-point win and ole Death Valley had never seen such a celebration.

After the loss, Rodgers found out contracts had been signed for the next three games in Atlanta, but nothing for the return to Clemson in 1978, so he refused to agree on the return trip and so the series was interrupted after a Clemson win, a loss and a tie in the next three games.

Soon after negotiations broke off, and both schools had filled some dates which had been penciled in to play each other through 1986, the Yellow Jackets were admitted to the Atlantic Coast Conference. But it took until 1983 before the two teams got back on each other's schedule.

Sometimes, words are better than contracts. This seems to be the case here. But instead of playing for the 26th consecutive season, this is the fifth game since the series was resumed. Each team has won a pair since becoming ACC stable mates. Long live the series!!

And may Howard and Dodd both be around when the two teams play in 2000. They played against each other, they coached against each other and both learned a long time ago that handshakes are worth much more than signatures when each has a common goal.
