Homecoming is a gala affair at universities across the country this time of year. There are floats, queens, pageants and dances, and the football team plays an easy opponent so the fans can cap off the weekend by celebrating a rousing victory. This year the Clemson Homecoming Committee did another tremendous job with the color and pageantry, but Athletic Director Bill McLellan might not have held up his end of the bargin. Today's opponent for Clemson's Homecoming is far from a weak sister, in fact they are undefeated.

Virginia Tech's Gobblers are off to a 4-0 start, their best opening season rush since 1967 when they won their first seven contests. Bill Dooley's team has swept past Wake Forest, East Tennessee State, William & Mary and James Madison on consecutive Saturdays and would love to make the Tigers victory numberfive, the win-total Tech achieved all of last year.

One of the reasons for VPI's resurgence has been the steady play of junior quarterback Steve Casey. He has completed almost 55 percent of his passes this year for 341 yards and three scores. Those are fine statistics, but more importantly, Casey has been a leader on the field. He is the first quarterback in almost eight years to lead the Gobblers from that important position in consecutive years. The Towanda, PA native started four games his freshman year and all of the contests last season. Now a seasoned veteran, he leads the Gobblers with confidence.

Most successful teams combine experience and young aggressive talent, and VPI is certainly following that hypothesis. Aiding the experienced Casey, is sophomore tailback Cyrus Lawrence, a diminutive player with speed and power. His build (5-9, 199) makes him as easy to stop as a greased pig, no one can get a clean shot at him. So far this season he has averaged 142 yards a game on the ground, a figure that ranks him in the top 10 in the nation in rushing. He has averaged 5.1 yards per carry for his 113 attempts and has scored four TDs.

Virginia Tech's statistics for rushing resemble those of Southern California. The tailbacks do the majority of the rushing. Johnny Edmonds, Lawrence's replacement, has gained 149 yards in 29 carries and is the second leading rusher. Fullback Scott Dovel, a two-year letterman from Lynchburg, VA, is the top fullback with 112 yards in 27 attempts, but that is only seven rushes per game.

Last week Tiger fans got to see Western Carolina's exciting wide receiver Gerald Harp. Today, Clemson fans will be treated by another fine receiver in the opponent's uniform, Virginia Tech wingback Sidney Snell. The Blacksburg, VA native is ranked in the top 20 in the country in receiving with 16 catches for 228 yards and four touchdowns. He has caught at least one TD in every game but one this year, and in that contest he had a TD catch called back by a penalty. The 6-0 senior is also a threatening kickoff returner.

The Virginia Tech offense has been solid this year, and most expected it to be the strength of the Gobbler team. But, the defense was supposed to be weak, as Dooley had to replace all five of his 1979 front-five starters.

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
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But, much to Dooley's surprise, some rookies have come on in the front five to perform very consistently, and the result is a defense that has allowed only 166 yards per game. Junior college transfer Robert Brown and tackle Mike Kovac combined to sack Wake Forest guarterback Jay Venuto seven times in the Gobblers' 16-7 win on regional TV on September 6. Padro Phillips, a sophomore tackle, has made 31 stops this year to lead the front five, while¹⁰ linebacker Lewis Stuart is the leading tackler overall with 33 stops.

This young Gobbler defense will have to be at their best if they expect to prohibit the Tigers from penetrating their goal line. The Clemson ground game was in solid form against Western Carolina last week, as the Tigers gained 278 over the terrain.

It is little wonder that Clemson recruits heavily in the state of North Carolina, just look at the statistics for the Western Carolina game and for the season. Edgar Pickett, Chuck McSwain, Kevin Mack and Brendon Crite are all

from that state and the quartet combined for 266 yards rushing against the Catamounts. For the season, four of Clemson's top five rushers are from the Tar Heel state.

North Carolinians have also keyed the Clemson passing attack. Winston-Salem, NC native Perry Tuttle has been one of the top receivers in the country this year. Last week he was ranked in the national statistics for the first time in his career, as he was tied for sixth in the nation in receptions. So far this year the agile flanker has 16 receptions for 233 yards. He is already in the top eight in career receptions at Clemson and needs only four more to pass Bennie Cunningham, the star tight end of the Pittsburgh Steelers.

The Tiger defense has not been as stingy as last season, but they have not had a major breakdown. Clemson is yielding 236 yards per game, an outstanding figure, and has given up only two touchdowns. And one of those scores came at Georgia when the Bulldogs made a two-yard march for a score after a 98-yard inter-

ception return.

The Clemson defense lost the services of Eddie Geathers and Jeff Davis last week due to injuries, but both should be back for the VPI game. Both are pre-season all-conference choices and were on the way to great seasons. But senior linebacker Chuck Rose and cornerback Hollis Hall picked up where Davis and Geathers left off and were prime reasons Western Carolina had only one touchdown drive.

Rose, who served as a reserve for three years, is getting his chance to show what he can do. After three games he is the team's leading tackler with 33 stops. Last week he had 11 tackles and a blocked punt that led to a Clemson score. Hall had six tackles and broke up a pass.

All-America candidate Steve Durham has continued his steady play, as has fellow tackle Jeff Bryant. Both have made four sacks this year and are in the top five on the team in tackles. That twosome, plus sophomore middle guard James Robinson, give Clemson one of the biggest frontthree combinations in the country.

"It saw our students, our alumni and the college staff working together in the enjoyment of our many friends . . . It will be fine if the expression of the true Clemson spirit can become a Clemson tradition." The "it" that the late Clemson President R. F. Poole was talking about is Tigerama and it has become a Clemson tradition in every sense of the word.

"I got the idea for Tigerama while I was at the University of Florida," said Joe Sherman, retired director of the Clemson News Bureau and Director of Alumni Relations. "Florida had this big student talent show the night before Homecoming called 'Gator Growl', and when I came back to Clemson in 1956, I persuaded the Alumni Council to fund a show like it for the next year. I got Blue Key to sponsor and coordinate the show and things started rolling from there."

The first show was held on the night of November 8, 1957, and was an instant hit for the crowd of nearly 10,000 that attended. Featured on the first program were Mac McCahan, a fire eater; Dale Tinsly, whose specialty was juggling; and majorettes Phyllis O'Dell, Diane Austin (who was later crowned Miss Tigerama), and Carolyn Willis. Along with music from Stan Kenton and his Modern Jazz Orchestra, there were also skits at the first Tigerama. The Canterbury Club won the \$75 first prize for their skit called, "A Dining Hall Panorama". As a finale, the Pyro Display Company of Florida put on a large fireworks display.

"Those fireworks were the things that carried the show the first three years," said Sherman. "They were very expensive, but that was the real crowd pleaser.

"After about five years the show started paying for itself from gate revenues," Sherman added. "The price of tickets for the 1957 Tigerama was 49 cents, and somewhere through the years the price rose to its present price of 99 cents," Sherman continued. "The show price has been 99 cents for about 15 years. That is the highest admission will go, too, because the state would have to tax anything over a dollar and there would also be a stadium seat tax, too."

The 23rd annual Tigerama, which was held in the stadium last night, had many similarities to its 1957 counterpart, such as music, this time provided by Tiger Band instead of Stan Kenton, and skits, presented by various fraternities and sororities instead of clubs, the crowning of Miss Homecoming and a fireworks show. But the 1980 edition was far more spectacular than the first one.

The six, eight-minute skits presented were in planning and production for nearly six months. Blue Key chose the theme last spring and presented ideas to the various groups. Over the summer, the groups worked on the script, sound effects, lighting, and props for their skit. The groups auditioned before a judging panel, which picked the skits which were presented in the show. WSBF, the Clemson student radio station, then taped the audio portion of the skits so that the stadium public address system could be used during the show. WSBF also provided technical assistance during the festivities. The group with the best skit won a \$400 first prize, a \$325 increase over the first winner.

Tigerama 1980 was concluded for the crowd of over 35,000 with a spectacular fireworks show that cost nearly \$4000 to put on.

Another tradition that separates a Clemson Homecoming from almost every other school's is the building and showing of the elaborate displays that are on Bowman Field in front of Tillman Hall.

The modern version of float and display building by organizations is a year older than Tigerama, but this tradition can trace its roots back to the all-military days at Clemson.

"It started when a certain company decorated their hall for homecoming," recalls Joe Sherman. "Soon, another company decorated their hall and then the idea just kind of snowballed. The decorations went from the halls to the yard in front of the barracks (which were located where Johnstone Hall is now) down to Bowman Field."

In 1956, when the tradition was revived, the groups competing built floats that would be driven around the field at halftime of the football game. The winner of the competition would then get the honor of displaying their prize-winner on Bowman Field. The winning group also got free tickets to the Homecoming Ball.

"In about 1958 or 1959, the display competition was changed from floats to permanent displays," said Sherman, "and they have gotten more and more elaborate each year."

The displays that can be seen today cost anywhere from \$1000 to \$1500 to build and competition is very keen. Under the rules set up for the competition, no construction can begin before noon the Tuesday before the Homecoming game and all work must be finished and the site cleaned up by 7:00 AM the morning of the game.

Most groups began planning their display at the beginning of the summer and sketches and blueprints were finished when school started. The displays take three or four planners and a massive effort on the part of all the fraternity members in order to finish in four days, but most builders do not seem to mind all of the headaches, lack of sleep, and missed classes because all of the work is for keeping a tradition alive.

A Clemson Homecoming is really something unique that has to be seen to be believed. Where most schools have homecoming for the benefit of alumni and parents, a Clemson Homecoming involves everybody from faculty to freshmen all working to continue a tradition. The traditions of Tigerama and the display competition are two of the reasons that Clemson is really a special university.

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AN EQUAL OPPORTUNITY EMPLOYER

"I am like a leaf blown about by the wind, I never know where life's road will take me." Those are the comments of Clemson placekicker Obed Ariri when he was asked to comment about his personal life and future plans.

Ariri's journey to Clemson was quite different from the classic Tiger football player because the amiable kicker not only came to Clemson from another country, he didn't come to Tigertown on a football scholarship. It has been an unusual path to say the least, but an examination of the Owerri, Nigeria's athletic history tells many that his life is, and has been, following a wellcharted course.

As a young boy in Nigeria, Obed and his friends would play pickup soccer games in the streets. "We used oranges and apples for balls," recalled Ariri. "That was really very convenient because we just grabbed another off the tree when we kicked one up too badly," he added.

"I loved soccer. I could play the game all day and even go without eating so I could keep on playing. As a matter of fact I was so preoccupied with the game that I sometimes forgot to do my chores. My parents weren't pleased with that and they punished me for it."

In general, his parents discouraged Ariri from playing soccer because they feared it would take away too much time from his studies. "I was just stubborn enough and determined enough to keep on playing until it paid off, no matter what selfsacrifice I had to make," said Ariri, the second eldest in a family of four that boasts a doctor and an architect. Obed has certainly obeyed his parents' wishes as he already has an undergraduate degree from Clemson in industrial management and is working on his master's degree in business.

Ariri has always carried this determination in the classroom onto the field and the result has been an impressive list of athletic accomplishments. As a teenager at Holy Ghost Secondary School, Ariri was named captain of his team and was instrumental in guiding them to a state championship in 1973. From a field of 65 other soccer players he was chosen for his state's 18member all-star team. This squad competed against 19 other state teams and walked away with the championship. Later that year, his Nigerian team defeated a national team from Ghana.

Ariri's fine play for this all-star squad (known as the Nigerian Academicals All-Star Team), led to his selection to a division I team, the Vasco Da Gama P & T Club. He became very well known as a member of the P&T Club and the Nigerian National Team while he was attending a technical College, and it was his outstanding play with these teams that led to Clemson's interest in him.

"One day Coach Ibrahim (Clemson's soccer coach the last 13 years) wrote me a letter and expressed interest in me," said Ariri. "It seems he had heard of me from my friend Kenneth Ilodigwe, who was playing soccer at Clemson at the time.

"I thought it would be sort of interesting to come to the U. S. and play soccer." So, in 1976, blown by the wind or otherwise, Ariri packed his bags and headed for Tigertown. Little did he know that a college football career as well as a pro soccer career lay ahead.

During his first season with the Tigers Ariri drew more than a casual interest from soccer fans. The freshman striker scored 15 goals and finished third on the team in scoring on a club that went to the Final Four of the NCAA tournament. So exciting and exacting was this Nigerian's style of kicking that he even managed to turn a few heads in the Tiger football office.

In the spring of 1977 Ariri was contacted by Tiger football Coach Charley Pell concerning his interest in playing football. "I had never heard much about football before I came to the United States and my first contact with it occurred in 1976 when I watched my first Clemson game from the stands. It was unbelievable the next year when I found myself out on the field playing for Clemson."

"For someone who didn't know anything about the game before 1976, he certainly has had a big impact on our program," said Tiger Head Coach Danny Ford. "The kicking game is as important as any phase of the game of football and Obed has helped to make our kicking game one of the best in the nation for the last four years."


To say Ariri has made an impact is an understatement. Already Clemson's alltime leading scorer in football with 223 career points, he is within range of becoming the ACC's all-time kick-scoring leader and the league's number-two ranked scorer overall before he is finished. He is already the school's all-time leader in field goals, extra points and consecutive field goals made.

Last season was his most remarkable year as he played both soccer and football in the same season, a first in Clemson athletics. And, he not only played both sports, but he starred on both fields. While finishing in a tie for fifth in the country in field goals on the gridiron, he made allconference and scored the second most goals for Clemson's soccer team, a squad that advanced to the NCAA finals. Heading into this season Ariri ranked first in career football scoring and seventh in career goal scoring in soccer. He is the only athlete in Clemson history to rank in the top 10 in scoring in two different sports. Not bad for a guy who started his athletic career by kicking oranges in Nigeria!

Ariri's all-around athletic ability has caused a problem, which sport should he pursue professionally? Last winter he was drafted by the Chicago Sting of the NASL. So, when the spring winds began to blow, Ariri packed his bags and, appropriately enough, headed for the "Windy City."

Things weren't so easy for Ariri in the pros, though. The Sting played a completely different type of game from that which he had learned in Nigeria and at Clemson. "Iknew by the first of August that I was lonely for my second home and that I wanted to further my education and play football for Clemson," he offered.

So, on a hot day in mid-August, as Danny Ford was running his players through those gruelling three-a-days in Death Valley, the winds brought Obed Ariri back to Clemson, his second home, where he will continue to pursue his many avenues to success

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Danny Ford is beginning only his second full season at Clemson University as Head Football Coach, but he has achieved more than most coaches realize in a lifetime. The 32-year-old mentor has already guided clubs in two bowl games, won over 70 percent of his games, and claimed victories over renowned national powers Georgia, Ohio State and Notre Dame.

That is quite a list for someone who is still the NCAA's youngest coach (division I). But an examination of his accomplishments with some of the nation's outstanding programs tells college football fans that Clemson is led by one of America's brightest coaches.

Bear Bryant and Frank Howard are two of the legends that have helped mold the techniques and theories of Clemson's present coach. Ford played four years of football at Alabama and coached four more seasons under Bryant. The 1970 graduate of Alabama played for three consecutive bowl teams in Tuscaloosa; the 1968 Cotton Bowl, the 1968 Gator Bowl and the 1969 Liberty Bowl. He was an All-Southeastern Conference choice, All-SEC academic selection and team captain of the Crimson Tide his senior year.

After receiving his B.S. degree in industrial arts, Ford remained at Alabama as a graduate assistant for the 1970 and 1971 seasons. After earning a master's degree in special education in 1971, Ford was made a full-time assistant for the 1972 and 1973 seasons. The Tide went to four more postseason games while Ford was on Bryant's staff.

Clemson's new mentor then accepted a position of assistant coach on Jimmy Sharpe's staff at Virginia Tech. He remained in Blacksburg for three seasons (1974-75-76), before he was beckoned to Clemson by Charley Pell, who had just been named the Tigers' head coach. Pell and Ford had served together on the VPI staff for two seasons.

When Pell resigned as head football coach at Clemson for a similar position at Florida, the Student Affairs Committee of the Clemson Board of Trustees only considered one name as Pell's successor — Danny Ford. Ford not only had the backing of Pell, but also from members of the Clemson football team. He was then an assistant head coach and offensive line coach of the Tigers.

After two meetings between Ford and the committee on the morning of December 5, 1978, it was the unanimous opinion of the committee that Ford should be named Clemson's 21st head coach.

At a press conference on December 10, 1978, Pell relinquished the head coaching duties of the Gator Bowl to Ford. Nearly 40 years after hiring 31-year-old Frank Howard, Clemson had hired another gifted 31-year-old to lead the Tiger forces on the gridiron.

Ford conquered all kinds of adversity in leading the Tigers to a nationally televised 17-15 triumph over perennial national power Ohio State in the Gator Bowl in his very first game as head coach. Few coaches in NCAA history have made such a celebrated and successful beginning.

Last year, he took the Tigers to eight triumphs, a second-place finish in the ACC and non-conference wins over Georgia and Notre Dame. Clemson has scored 801 points and set countless records in the last three years and Ford is given much of the credit.

Danny Ford is faced with another young, inexperienced team as the new decade begins, but based on his track record, the Gadsden, Alabama native should lead the Tigers to more previously unattainable heights.

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

It began as one man's dream during the midst of post-Civil War Reconstruction.

Thomas Green Clemson, son-in-law of South Carolina statesman John C. Calhoun,

felt that the only way the state could be revived economically, politically and socially, was to provide for the education of its youth.

Following the death of his wife Anna Maria and all their children, Clemson set aside the bulk of his

plantation estate to establish a scientific institution. The South Carolina General Assembly accepted his bequest, and in 1893, Clemson College opened its doors to 446 students.

Last year Clemson University was home to 11,748 students in nine academic colleges. They chose from 76 undergraduate curricula and 54 graduate degree programs.

The stately Fort Hill mansion which dominated the Calhoun plantation a hundred years ago is now surrounded by 70 main campus buildings, three-fourths of them built since 1950. The 600-acre campus represents an investment of approximately \$168 million.

The campus property is surrounded by more than 20,000 acres of University farms and woodlands devoted to agricultural and forestry research. Another 10,000 acres throughout the state are devoted to Agricultural Experiment Station research and 4-H Club work.

Clemson students continue to demonstrate the kind of academic excellence Thomas Clemson would have expected. Incoming freshmen now boast average SAT scores hovering around 1,000, and more than two-thirds of them graduated in the top 20 percent of their high school classes.

The University also leads the way for continuing education in the state, with more than 20,000 South Carolinians sharpening their pencils for a Clemson workshop or seminar every year.

What began as one man's dream for the future, South Carolina has seen grow into a reality: an institution on the frontier of education, keeping a link with the traditions which have made it great.

Clemson athletics has made a meteoric rise to national prominence over the last four years and Athletic Director Bill McLellan and his tireless staff of coaches and administrators are the major reasons. Last year, the Tiger sports program recorded all kinds of firsts and records, highlighted by a number-three national ranking in the Knoxville Journal's All-Sports Poll.

McLellan is the man most responsible. He has put in countless hours to improve every phase of the athletic program in Tigertown. Under his direction Clemson has built one of the finest all-around athletic facilities in the nation. During his tenure the Tigers have christened the Frank Johnstone Jervey Athletic Center, possibly the most modern and complete complex under one roof, increased the permanent seating capacity of Clemson Memorial Stadium from 43,451 to 53,306, opened a beautiful swimming facility, which will be the site of the ACC meet this year, constructed a nine-lane all-weather track, and built a new soccer facility.

While he has erected an athletic

powerhouse on the varsity level, McLellan has also developed a solid intramural program for the student body which attracts thousands of participants every year. That's why Bill McLellan is recognized as a total athletic director.

Only the third man to own the title in the last 49 years, McLellan assumed his present position February 4, 1971 and since that date has directed Clemson to its greatest decade of athletic prominence. The last five years Clemson has ranked in the top 25 in the nation in the all-sports poll and has had more All-Americans than in any other five-year period in Clemson history.

An examination of McLellan's experience in athletics explains why Clemson has been so successful under his direction. A native of Hamer, SC, the 48-year-old McLellan was a two-time football letterman for the Tigers and a member of Clemson's 1952 Gator Bowl team. He received his B.S. degree from Clemson in 1954 and his M.S. two years later.

After joining the athletic staff in 1958 he spent more than a decade with the Tigers as an assistant football coach, Assistant Business Manager, Assistant Athletic Director, and Associate Athletic Director, before his appointment to his current position.

But McLellan will be the first man to say that many knowledgeable people are needed to run an efficient and successful athletic department. Assistant Athletic Director Bobby Robinson is the catalyst of McLellan's group of responsible aides.

Assistant to the Athletic Director Earle Ambrose; Joe Turner, Executive Director of Clemson's very successful IPTAY Club; and Sports Promotion Director Alison Dalton are major reasons Clemson's athletic administration is among the best in the country.

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

Gates 4, 6, 7, and 8 are closed prior to the games and are opened for exit purposes only.



Clemson's on top again. For the past four years, Clemson has been among the Top 20 in the nation in allaround sports programs. This year, the Tigers finished third behind such notable schools as UCLA and Southern Cal. Here is the story of a former Clemson Homecoming Queen, who has represented herself and Clemson University as well as any member of the Tiger family. Everyone connected with the University was proud of the Sumter, SC native on that exciting night in July.

But, to those that know her, it was not surprising that Shawn Weatherly has reached such great heights. She was a very active member of the student body on the campus her three years in Tigertown. Her freshman year she was crowned Homecoming Queen, an honor a freshman had not accomplished in years. Then, her sophomore year, she captured the Valentine's Day crown by winning Miss Clemson. Her junior year, her sorority, Delta Delta Delta, nominated her for the annual Miss Magnolia Pageant, part of Dixie Day festivities and again, she won.

A fine athlete, Weatherly competed in the Clemson womens' fencing team for two years. Her first year she compiled a 5-0 record and her second year she was 15-10. She worked at her athletic career at Clemson to keep herself in shape, but she still enjoys her extensive exercise program. "I still run three miles every day," she said, "through Central Park (when in New York) and I belong to a spa that's at the top of my apartment building. When I have time, I go up there and lift weights. I really miss Clemson terribly, even my daily routine of going to classes and working out.

Weatherly was sponsored in the Miss South Carolina-USA pageant by WANS radio of Anderson. She won the title of Miss South Carolina-USA

and went on to compete in Biloxi, MS, in May. She won that title there and the next month, she was on her way to Seoul, Korea to compete for the Miss Universe title. On July 7th, Weatherly walked away with the title of Miss Universe, as her scores easily outdistanced the entire field.

During the two pageants (Miss USA and Miss Universe) she won over \$100,000.00 in prizes, including two cars, two diamond watches, two mink coats, and two boats. Since winning, she has visited seven countries, met many presidents (including Jimmy Carter) and been presented with valuable gifts.

The doors have been opened for the Sumter, SC native, who now has opportunities she's never had before. Recently, she had an interview with the William Morris Agency, the most prestigious talent agency based in New York. She is being reviewed as a possible sports commentator. "That thrills me; I've wanted to be a sports commentator for some time."

Her stationary home (when she's not traveling) is in New York City. Her nightlife isn't what you would expect from the Big Apple. "I haven't been to Studio 54," she says, "they closed it down. And besides — it's not like the Bookstore (a Clemson bar), you just can't go out somewhere and meet your friends."

The small town girl still holds a special sentiment for her home. When she returned to Sumter July 30 for the first time since winning her title, her hometown beamed with pride. She flew into the tiny Sumter airport on a state plane to a cheering and anxious crowd. Her obvious joy could be read on her face the minute she stepped off the plane.

"I'm so glad to be home," she said. "I could kiss the ground!" Her sincerity overwhelmed the crowd that followed her to a reception held in her honor at the local exhibition center. Representatives of state and city government, as well as Clemson University were there to present her with gifts. None delighted her more than the orange blazer and Tiger hat given to her by Student Body President Oscar Lovelace on behalf of Clemson.

Her success is something that she has earned. Weatherly still has her quick-wit and dazzling smile and sparkling eyes, but most importantly she hasn't changed inside. Anne Stier, one of her close friends and former roommates at Clemson said recently, "Shawn hasn't changed a bit. If nothing else, she has become much more aware of the important things in her life. She knows her true friends and appreciates Sumter as

home. The main thing is her total sin-cerity. She is honestly appreciative of everything she's gotten."

Sincerity has always been important to her, whether it was the audience at the Miss Universe pageant or the crowded Sumter airport, she has been touched by it all. The Richmond, VA, native was all-district and all-metro and voted one of the top 25 players in Virginia his senior year. He was also the captain and most valuable lineman of his Tucker High School team. He earned four letters in football during his prep career. Ken, 22, is a sociology major.



JIM SPEROS is a hard working member of the Tigers' special teams. His persistence and determination has kept him in the defensive line picture for four years.

The Potomac, MD native began his career at linebacker in 1977, where he saw considerable action on the junior varsity team. He

was then switched to middle guard in the spring of 1978, a position he also played in the '79 campaign. He was moved to tackle this past spring.

Jim, a 6-2, 208-pounder, was an all-conference and all-metro selection his senior year at St. John's College High School. He earned three letters in football as a member of the top-ranked team in the Washington, DC area. The 21-year-old is an administrative management major.



RICK BASICH could also be known as Mr. Versatility. Coming to Clemson as a highly recruited running back, he was moved to the secondary his first season. In 1978, he was moved to the offense, where he rushed twice for 10 yards. Finally, in 1979, he was moved to his present posi-

tion at strong safety, where he now serves as Willie Underwood's backup.

The 6-1, 193-pounder sat out most of last season with a knee injury sustained in the second game against Maryland. He was granted another year of eligibility because of the injury.

The Delta, Ohio resident was an All-Ohio selection as a defensive back his senior year at Delta High School. He was coached by present Clemson Strength Coach George Dostal while he was a prepster. He earned three letters in football, basketball, and baseball. Rick, 22, is an administrative management major.

The 6-2, 200-pound Rose was a valuable member of the special teams last season. He saw action in every game with the suicide squad

and played linebacker in seven games last season. He finished the year with seven tackles, three in the opener against Furman. His biggest play last season, and possibly his career, took place against Notre Dame when he recovered a fumble which changed the momentum of that game.

The Atlanta, GA native had 10 tackles and a fumble recovery in 1978 as a reserve linebacker. He came to Clemson as a runningback, and rushed for 91 yards in three games for the junior varsity in 1977. Chuck, 21, is an administrative management major.

This year he began his new career as a starter with a 13-tackle effort against Rice. Only Jeff Davis made more tackles, so it must have led many Tiger fans to believe that Chuck Rose should have seen more action in the past. He will be counted on for many similar performances in 1980.

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



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

In the eyes of Head Coach Danny Ford, there are two ingredients that are essential to having a winning tradition on the football field. First of all, the coaching staff has to mold its present players into a solid team. Secondly, there has to be a reliable program to attract top flight recruits to play for the Tigers to preserve the winning tradition.

At Clemson, two coaches who have a lot to do with winning are Chuck Reedy and Billy Ware. Reedy is the assistant coach in charge of the young corp of offensive runningbacks. Ware, as the administrative assistant to Danny Ford, is the man in charge of organizing the recruiting program which enables the rest of the Clemson coaching staff to work with some of the finest young talent in America.

In the past two recruiting wars, Clemson has added a wealth of talent in the offensive backfield. Chuck Reedy has the job of preparing the young Tiger runningbacks to perform like seasoned veterans.

"This season, we've shown a lot of potential at fullback and tailback," says Reedy. "As the season progresses and hopefully over the next three or four seasons, Clemson should be very strong in the offensive backfield. Although right now, we are real young."

To say the Tigers are young in the backfield is without a doubt an understatement. Of the four players who have seen regular action, one is a freshman and the other three are sophomores. Coaching such a young group does alter Reedy's coaching approach.

"We have to start from scratch with the young players and drill them on the fundamentals," states Reedy. "The last two seasons, we had Marvin Sims and Lester Brown who both had a wealth of experience. However, now we have to build from the bottom up with Clemson's young players. I want to make sure they do everything right one step at a time. Hopefully, they will be complete players with the ability to run, block, and now catch passes, something we are going to do more of in the future."

Reedy, who came to Clemson from Kentucky in 1978, has a history of success in teaching young players. After completing his coaching career at Appalachian State, he moved to the high school coaching ranks where he compiled a 29-13 record in four seasons as a head coach. Furthermore, he was named Coach-of-the-Year in his conference in three of those seasons. The 31-year-old Reedy, who is married to the former Janet Dobson. uses that experience he gained in high school coaching to help young players to make the adjustment from high school to college easier.

"The runningbacks probably have the biggest adjustment of any player in their first year in college. In high school they are used to being the stars. In college, especially as freshmen, they usually don't play that much, let alone attain star status," reflects Reedy. "I try to mold them into our system as early as possible and help them understand that with hard work, they can play here."

Clemson's recruiting program has been responsible for giving Coach Reedy the outstanding group of young backs that hopefully will solidify Clemson's running game for the next few years. Billy Ware is now the man coordinating Clemson's recruiting efforts. Since football players do not just materialize in Tigertown, Ware is quick to point out that getting them to play here is a long process that begins well before a player signs a letter-ofintent.

"We start keeping track of players who show potential as sophomores and juniors in high school and put them on our mailing list," said Ware. "We also send out prospect cards to every coach on the East Coast for them to recommend their top players. After we get those cards back from the approximately 3,800 coaches, we send each recommended player a questionaire which is kept in our office."

Then the long process of narrowing the list down and going after the type of player who fits into the Clemson approach to football begins.

"We categorize the recruits into two different categories," says Ware, "those who are good enough to offer scholarships to and those we consider blue-chippers. But, we're not just looking for athletically gifted players. We are trying to bring in the kids who have good character," explains Ware. "To be a good team, we've got to have players who are team players and are able to get along with their teammates. Also, and Coach Ford stresses this, we want players who will try just as hard in the classroom as they do on the field. If they are good all-around individuals, they are going to be the type of teamplayer we want."

Ware, who was an outstanding linebacker on the two Clemson teams that won back to back ACC championships in 1966 and 1967, has served on the Clemson staff at two different times. He was a graduate assistant until 1972 when he left to take a job at Furman. After moving on to Tennessee-Martin for three years, Ware, who is married to the former Claudia Lightsey and has three children, returned to Clemson in 1978 to coach the defensive ends. He moved to his present position this past summer. Since he has moved to the administrative assistant job, he makes it a point to say that recruiting is a team effort.

"In college football today, the coaching is, for the most part, very even. A team is usually not going to be out-coached. Instead, the difference is that one team has out-recruited the other. The coaches spend a lot of hours on the road. I put in a lot of hours in organizing and administrating, and our secretaries spend an amazing amount of time helping us in every aspect of keeping in touch with the recruits. Our secretaries, June Roach, Elaine Swearingen, and Betty Moore are the best secretaries anyone could ask for."

Between Billy Ware's organization of the recruiting efforts and Chuck Reedy taking the young, talented runningbacks and acclimating them to the Clemson style of offense, the Tigers are going to be very strong in the offensive backfield for the next several years.

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

Clemson's number-three national ranking among major college athletic programs wouldn't be possible without the efforts of many talented and dedicated athletes. And, many of those athletes would not be at Clemson were it not for the efforts of dedicated volunteers — volunteers of IPTAY, the nation's number-one collegiate scholarship organization.


IPTAY (I Pay Thirty A Year) provided \$1,035,000 in athletic scholarships to 405 athletes in 19 varsity sports last year.

Dr. Rupert H. Fike developed the I Pay Ten A Year plan in 1934 to raise funds for athletic scholarships. Although IPTAY members now pay from \$30 to \$2000 annually, their donations are still used to fund these scholarships. IPTAY's first membership list included only 185 names, but under twenty years of Fike's leadership, and with the support of IPTAY volunteers, the organization enjoyed steady growth. In 1947 IPTAY added a full-time executive secretary to handle the administrative responsibilities created by the organization's continued growth.

"The campus-based staff helps implement and support the policy decisions made by IP-TAY's President and Board of Directors," says Executive Secretary Joe Turner. "We're fortunate to have a group of business leaders on the Board of Directors who give their time and pool their experience to make IPTAY a successful organization. These are the people who, over the years, have provided the leadership and experience which has made IPTAY number one."

Turner credits knowledgeable leadership for sixteen consecutive years of increased IPTAY contributions. "Reeves Gressette is a prime example. Under his direction, IPTAY membership jumped from 11,400 to 15,000. With this increase in membership, came record contributions of 2.7 million dollars in fiscal year '80.

"Just as the full-time staff would be ineffective without the President and Board of Directors," says Turner, "the Presi-

dent and Board of Directors would not be as effective without the support of over 500 IPTAY Representatives in South Carolina, North Carolina and Georgia. These volunteers make the one-to-one contacts that are essential to the success of any fund-raising program."

"But," Turner explains, "these volunteers do much more than raise money. Each year they coordinate the arrangements for more than sixty Clemson Club meetings across the three-state area. These meetings are a chance for Clemson people to get together and learn more about both the academic and athletic programs at the University."

This year, IPTAY Representatives will be working with a new IPTAY president, Charlie Bussey of Laurens. "Charlie is the president of Laurens Glass Company, and I think that speaks for itself in terms of business and leadership experience. He's also had fund-raising experience," says Turner. "Charlie served as one of the chairmen of the Robert C. Edwards Endowment drive which raised close to two million dollars, nearly doubling its goal.

"You can see why we're so confident that IPTAY will continue to enjoy tremendous success. We have strong leadership and dedicated workers. That's what has made IPTAY number one and that's what will keep IPTAY on top."



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
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
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
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
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


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

Tech started their second team. I do not know why because we had put 47 points on the board the week before against Tulane.

This was the year of the quickkick for Clemson. We used it frequently with a variation of plays from it. It worked for us, so we stayed with it.

We won the toss and elected to receive. We took the opening kickoff and drove 70 yards for our first score. Fullback Jim Reynolds scored from the one yardline. Bull Cagle kicked the extra point and we were in front 7-0 at the end of the first quarter.

We scored again in the second quarter on a fake reverse. I went to my right, got a good block from Footsie Woods and scored our second TD from 25 yards out. Cagle again kicked the extra point and we had a 14-0 lead at half-time.

Let me say at this point that this 1945 team was a good football team. We had good offense and good defense. When you don't give Tech but 7 points at Grant Field, you are playing the defense.

After the end of the first quarter Tech put their first team on the field and we were glad. We wanted to play against the best they had. On this particular day it didn't make any difference because this day in Grant Field belonged to the Tigers.

We knew they would come out passing in the second half because they had this reputation and they put a 60-70 yard drive on and scored, kicked the point and now it was 14-7 going into the fourth quarter.

It then came down to who was the better team. They kicked off and we put on a drive of about 75 yards. I scored from the one, we kicked the point, and it was now 21-7.


In the last few minutes of the

ball game, Tech was passing in every direction, but the score remained 21-7. I think we had about 220 yards running and kicked for about a 45-yard average. This was a tough and exciting football game. Coach Howard had put together a good Tiger team. We believed we could play with anybody.

This game has to be the most memorable for me because in those days you did not go into Grant Field and play Tech unless you were ready to play, and this day was all Tiger.

My only regret is that I was with these guys for only six games. I was in the service and was out on a 45-day furlough (ask Coach Howard for details). I played in 1943 with 33 inexperienced but dedicated freshmen and the going was tough. But the 1945 squad was made up of experienced and talented personnel. It could have easily been an 8-2 season, and we showed our potential that day in Atlanta.
