

CARROLL ROSENBLOOM, Chairman of the Board

Carroll Rosenbloom reached the culmination of his 18 distinguished years of ownership in the National Football League last January when the Baltimore Colts won their first Super Bowl championship, Under Rosenbloom's strong direction the Colts have won three World Championships; have the best record in the NFL since 1958, and were the top team in professional football during the 1960-70 decade



which includes the entire history of the old American Football League.

Another highlight of Rosenbloom's career was his role as a member of the executive committee of the NFL-AFL merger.

Rosenbloom, of course, changed the athletic history of Baltimore and Maryland in 1953 by bringing the Colts back into the NFL. After an unfortunate National Football League debut in 1950, the Baltimore franchise was dissolved. But three years later Rosenbloom acquired a club that had floundered in New York and Dallas and gave Baltimore fans the opportunity to establish themselves among the most devoted in professional football.

With Rosenbloom in command the Colts began an exciting era. A surprising total of 15,755 season tickets were purchased the first season and the figure grew until the present, frozen total of 50,246. On the field he built the legendary championship teams of 1958 and 1959 and a club that has had the best winning percentage in pro football since 1958.

His efforts have resulted in the Colts enjoying a national reputation as a "class organization".

Despite the press of other business, Rosenbloom is a familiar figure on the Colts' scene during football season. He visits training camp and many regular season practice sessions and seldom misses a pre-season or regular season home or away game.

Last March Rosenbloom turned over the presidency of the club to his 27-year old son Steve.

"You must have strength of ownership", said Carroll on his son's appointment. "One man must make the major decisions. I am now looking to Steve to make those decisions. I didn't want him to have to wait until I was gone to take over. I wanted this to be done now. The responsibility of running the Baltimore Colts is now Steve's".

COLTS' RADIO TEAM

Ted Moore and former defensive end Ordell Braase will comprise the Baltimore Colts radio announcing team for the second straight season. Moore, the radio voice of the Green Bay Packers for 12 years, will handle the play-by-play and Braase will be the analyst. The originating station for the Colts' 34-station network is WCBM in Baltimore.

STEVE ROSENBLOOM, President

Last March 18th, Steve Rosenbloom was named President of the Baltimore Colts. He replaced his father Carroll Rosenbloom, who turned over the operation of the Colts to Steve and became Chairman of the Board.

Steve, who has become one of professional football's new breed of young executives, served two years as Assistant to the President. The 27-year old graduate of George-



town University had a comprehensive grooming period for the presidency of the club. He has worked in nearly every phase of the Colts' operation.

As a youngster he helped Equipment Manager Fred Schubach in the Colts' locker room. Later, during his high school years, Steve had various duties which included assisting in the club's summer publicity office at training camp in Westminster, Md.

During his Georgetown days, Steve's responsibilities increased and he worked closely with the late Don Kellett, then General Manager of the Colts. When he graduated from Georgetown in 1966 Steve moved in the Colts' office on a full-time basis. He was the club's Business Manager in 1967 and 1968, arranging road trips, transportation schedules and hotel accommodations.

In his most recent position, Steve has also done extensive scouting of college football players for the player draft.

"I'm grateful for this opportunity," said Steve. "I am totally committed to giving the fans many more years of the winning tradition we have enjoyed."

Steve is very active in community services and charities. He is currently serving a three-year term as Director of the Maryland Chapter of the National Cystic Fibrosis Research Foundation.

This past May Steve was married to the former Renee Bauchat of Summit, N.J. They reside in Baltimore.

DON KLOSTERMAN, General Manager

Don Klosterman has been a winner everywhere he's worked in professional football and Baltimore is no exception. The Colts' General Manager assumed his duties in January 1970 and in his first season the club won the World Championship.

Klosterman was associated with the old American Football League since its inception in 1960 and came to the Colts from the Houston Oilers,



where he was the general manager. He previously was with the Kansas City Chiefs where he was credited with signing many of the stars who eventually led the club to the 1970 Super Bowl title.

KLOSTERMAN (Cont.)

The native of Los Angeles, Calif., was an outstanding quarterback at Loyola (Calif.), where he led the nation in passing and set NCAA records that stood for over 10 years. The University retired his jersey number (10) following his brilliant career. He was the No. 1 draft choice of the Cleveland Browns and also played with the old Dallas Texans, the Los Angeles Rams and the Calgary Stampeders of the Canadian Football League.

A serious skiing accident ended his playing career in 1957. It took eight operations and 18 months of recuperating before he was released from the hospital and, even then, doctors doubted that he would ever walk again. But it is difficult to detect signs of his accident now. He is an excellent swimmer and galfer.

Loyola recently named Don its Alumnus of the Year for 1970. He received the honor at commencement exercises last

Klosterman and his wife Clare have two children — Kurt (nine) and Katie (eight).

19TH STRAIGHT TRAINING CAMP AT WESTERN MARYLAND

For the 19th consecutive summer the Baltimore Colts will set up training camp at Western Maryland College in Westminster, Md. The rookies report to Westminster, which is 30 miles northwest of Baltimore, on July 11, followed by the veterans on July 14. Unlike the past two summers when the Colts spent some of their pre-season training in the West because of games scheduled there, the club will remain at Western Maryland until Sept. 3. In 1969 the Colts spent several weeks in San Luis Obispo, Calif., and last summer trained three weeks in Golden, Colo. Collowing the pre-season game with the Dallas Cowboys, the Colts will practice at McDonogh School in Baltimore until the major league baseball season is concluded and the club can move into Memorial Stadium.

THE COLTS' COACHING STAFF

DON McCAFFERTY, Head Coach

"The Easy Rider" is what Don McCafferty has been called. His low key, professional approach to coaching has resulted in a Super Bowl championship in the first head coaching assignment of his career.

McCafferty coaches according to his personality -- patient, intelligent, firm.

"I'm the patient type," McCafferty has said. "You learn that when you're teaching. I taught classes all



the time I was at Kent State. Coaching is teaching. Some people have the idea that playing football qualifies someone to coach. But there is more involved in coaching than experience as a player."

McCafferty, who at 6-foot-5 is the tallest coach in the NFL, is also innovative. Opponents began to accept that Baltimore would start every game with a new offensive wrinkle.

In the first New York Jets contest it was one running back and five receivers; against Green Bay it was a 54-yard halfback option pass play by Sam Havrilak, who had lined up as a wide receiver on the opposite side; against Buffalo, Ray Perkins lined up as a running back, and in the AFC Championship Game with Oakland, Roy Jefferson was the fullback in a tight T formation.

The Packers game brought his ideas their widest notice.

"It was a play I stole from my son's playbook at Dulaney (Md.) High School," he said. "I was looking through it one night and copied it down. It worked fine."

McCafferty was smiling. He was also serious because the story was true.

He was an assistant coach for 21 years prior to this head coaching opportunity. "In fact," McCafferty says, "I hadn't watched a game from the sidelines since I was a player. I was always the man in the press box. You know something? You can't see down here."

The 50-year old tactician is a disciple of the "Paul Brown System", a man for whom McCafferty played at Ohio State and a man he defeated 17-0 in their first confrontation --- the opening playoff game with Cincinnati last season.

McCafferty joined the Colts in 1969 as offensive end coach and scout, assuming the offensive backfield directorship in 1963 when Don Shula became head coach. McCafferty played end under Francis Schmidt and Brown at Ohio State and starred on Brown's 1942 National Champion Buckeyes. He also played in the 1944 and 1945 College All-Star Games in Chicago, one of the few men to play in the classic twice.

Mac additionally played for an Army team at Fort Bragg, N.C., and for the New York Giants in 1946.

After one year with the Cleveland (O.) Recreation Department, he served as an assistant coach at Kent State University for 10 years before joining Weeb Ewbank's staff in Baltimore.

Asked about his coaching methods, McCafferty said:

"I'll talk to the quarterback on the sidelines and suggest

things we might not be exploiting, but 99 percent of the time I won't be sending anybody out there to tell him what play to run."

Johnny Unitas' thoughts on McCafferty:

"Don has a great knowledge of football. He's a calm, collected individual. He doesn't shout and scream and this is what you need to do -- be able to look at football objectively without getting carried away emotionally. I think he's an excellent coach."

McCafferty and his wife June live in Timonium and have four children -- Jaclyn (22), Donald (17), Bill (15) and Lisa (8).

JOHN SANDUSKY, Defensive Line Coach

Hired as defensive line coach in 1959, John switched to offense in 1963 and played an important part in developing a front wall that ranked with pro football's best in 1969. He returned to defensive responsibilities last year. He was immediately credited with the improved play of the Colts' defensive line. "There's one reason for the way I'm playing", said Bubba Smith, "and that's John Sandusky." A standout tackle



on both offense and defense for seven seasons with the Green Bay Packers and the Cleveland Browns, John retired as an active player in 1956 and served two years as assistant coach at Villanova University where he had earlier earned All-American honors as a four year star. John also served overseas in the Army for three years during World War II. Sandusky was recently honored by Villanova for outstanding achievement as an alumnus. He and his wife Ruth reside in Baltimore with children Jack, Jim, Joe, Gerry and Ruth Ann.

DICK BIELSKI, Offensive End Coach

A Baltimore native who made it to the pros with his hometown team both as a player and coach, Dick starts his eighth season as tutor of the Colts' receivers. A former Patterson Park High star, Bielski spent nine years in the National Football League as a pass catcher and kicker after starring at fullback for the University of Maryland. The first-round draft choice of Philadelphia in 1955, Dick played for five years



with the Eagles, two with the Dallas Cowboys and two with Baltimore. As a pro, Bielski caught 107 passes for 1,305 yards and 12 touchdowns while kicking 58 extra points and 26 field goals. Dick and wife Jo live in Timonium with children Debby, Rickey, Randy and Jody.

BOB BOYD, Defensive Backfield Coach

After nine outstanding seasons as a defensive back with the Colts, Bob retired following the 1968 season to become defensive backfield coach. He had a big year in 1968, intercepting eight passes to boost his career total to 57 steals, more than any other active player and placing him third on the list of all-time interceptors. Joining the Colts as a tenth round draft choice from Oklahoma, where he starred as a



split T quarterback, Bob stepped immediately into a starting assignment in the secondary. In 1968 he was named All-Pro for the fourth time and played in his second Pro Bowl. As a coach, his players are responding with the same results. The Colts allowed five bombs (over 40 yards) all year and four of those came in the first two games. Bob and wife Wanda live in Cockeysville with their three children, Darin Leslie and Bradley Dean and new born son, Kyle.

HANK BULLOUGH, Linebacker Coach

Hank Bullough begins his second year with the Colts after an 11-year career as an assistant coach at Michigan State. Bullough's last role with the Spartans was as their defensive coordinator. The 37-year-old native of Scranton, Pa., was a linebacker and defensive tackle at Michigan State from 1952 to 1954. He played in the 1954 Rose Bowl and on the '55 College All Star team that defeated the Cleveland Browns.



Bullough also played offensive guard for the Green Bay Packers in 1955 and 1958 around two years of military service. He joined Duffy Daugherty's staff at Michigan State in 1959. Bullough and his wife Lou Ann have three children — Cheryl (eight), Shane (six) and Charles (three) — and live in Lutherville.

JOHN IDZIK, Offensive Backfield Coach

John Idzik is another Colt aide who contributed to a world championship in his first year on the staff. Idzik, 42, was an assistant coach with the Miami Dolphins since their inception five years ago prior to joining the Colts in 1970. He spent the 11 previous years as a college coach, three of them as the last head coach at the University of Detroit. A native of Philadelphia, Idzik played at the University of Maryland



under the late Jim Tatum and served as an assistant coach with the Terps from 1956 and 1959, Idzik is married to the former Joyce Hoppensteadt of Baltimore. They have three children—Cynthia (12), John (10) and Joyce (7)—and live in Glen Arm, Md.

BOB (RED) MILLER, Offensive Line Coach

Bob (Red) Miller joined the Colts' staff last March following a five-year stay as an assistant with the St. Louis Cardinals. Miller was named the most valuable player of his Western Illinois University football team three straight years as a guard. He coached at Astoria and Canton, Ill., High Schools while earning a Master's Degree. Miller returned to his alma mater to coach in 1957 before joining Lou Saban's



staff in Boston in 1960 then moved with Saban to the Buffalo Bills in 1962. He coached at Denver in 1964-65 and joined the Cardinals staff in 1966. Red and his wife Nancy have two children — Stephen (16) and Lana (13).

THE PERSONNEL DEPARTMENT

GEORGE YOUNG, Personnel Director

George Young, who was the Colts' offensive line coach this past season and established a brilliant coaching record at Calvert Hall and City College High Schools in Baltimore, is in his first year as Personnel Director. Young replaces Upton Bell, who has become the General Manager of the New England Patriots and for whom George worked as an assistant in personnel from 1968-70. Young's 15-year scholastic head



coaching career included six Maryland Scholastic Association championships (five at City College) and two Catholic crowns. He compiled a 60-11 record at City College and had a 6-3 log against traditional rival Baltimore Polytechnic. His first win over Poly was City's first in 10 years over the Engineers and he finished his career with four straight wins in the series. The former All-East and Little All-American lineman at Bucknell had a tryout and nearly made the 1952 Dallas Texans, a franchise which a year later became the Baltimore Colts. Young holds two

Master's Degrees — one from Johns Hopkins and one from Loyola College of Maryland. Young took over the Colts' offensive line after the third regular season game this past year and guided it into a cohesive unit which played a significant role in Baltimore's World Championship. George and his wife Kathryn live in Baltimore.

DICK SZYMANSKI, Personnel Assistant

Sizzy begins his third year in the scouting position after 13 seasons as a player. The 38-year-old Szymanski earned Pro Bowl honors three times as a center and spent several seasons as a standout line-backer during his Colt playing career. A No. 2 draft choice from Notre Dame in 1955, Dick now resides in Lutherville with his wife Patricia Ann and children Debra Ann and Michael Patrick.



FRED SCHUBACH, Personnel Assistant

Fred Schubach was elevated to full-time Personnel Assistant this past June. Jack Ashlock, Equipment Manager at Colorado School of Mines (where Colts trained August 1970), succeeds Schubach as the Colts' Equipment Manager. Of all the Colts' male employees, none has been on the job as long as Fred, who took over as equipment manager in 1953, after many years of working with his father who was with the



Philadelphia Eagles. Fred spent some time in baseball, too, playing in the Philadelphia Athletics' farm system as a catcher and later serving as batting practice and bullpen catcher for the A's. He served in the Army Medical Corps during the Korean War and was stationed at the Osaka Army Hospital. He is a tireless worker and master improvisor of equipment, uniforms and protective gear. Fred lives in Lutherville with his wife Hazel and two sons — Fred, Jr. and Richard.

MILT DAVIS, Personnel Assistant

Another former player entering his third year as a personnel assistant is former All-Pro defensive halfback Milt Davis. Milt intercepted 27 passes during four seasons as a regular for the Colts and twice tied for the NFL lead in that department. He will patrol the West Coast for the Colts while residing in Los Angeles with his wife Yvonne and children Allison, Brian and Hilary.



THE MEDICAL CORPS

ED BLOCK, Head Trainer

Dr. Edward Block, B.S., M.A., Ed.D., R.P.T., F.A.C.S.M., prefers to be known as "Ed Block of the Colts." Starting his 18th year as head trainer of the Colts, Ed brings more to his job than bandages and liniment — he's knowledgable in sciences as diverse as physics and endrocrinology and there's nobody more dedicated to the team. Previously a trainer and instructor in physical education at Washington University (St. Louis),



his alma mater, and coach, physical education and social studies teacher at a St. Louis high school, he spent five years in the Army, serving as a tank officer during World War II until he was wounded and later became chief of physical training and corrective exercises at Army convalescent hospitals in France and Germany. He later taught at Brooklyn College and did rehabilitation work at York hospitals.

OTHO DAVIS, Associate Trainer

Otho Davis, who the past five years was Head Athletic Trainer and Assistant Professor of Health and Physical Education at Duke University, was named Associate Trainer of the Colts in May. The 37-year old Davis had been at Duke since 1965 after serving as head trainer at Kent State University for eight years. In 1969, Davis was awarded a \$30,000 grant from the Cameron Athletic Corporation in



Houston, Tex., to perform a study on ankle and knee injuries of players using the swivel shoe. He was also awarded \$1,200 from the Mary Duke Biddle Foundation to do work on a movie in relation to a hand splint for contact sports. Davis, who has a Master's Degree from Kent State, is a native of Beaumont, Tex. The veteran of U.S. Army Medical Service is married to the former Joanne Kalbaugh of Cuyahoga Falls, O., and the father of four sons.

JOHN UNITAS PICKED MAN OF THE YEAR

Colts' quarterback Johnny Unitas was selected as the National Football League Man of the Year in 1970 by the nation's fans in a poll announced by the Pro Football Hall of Fame in Canton, Ohio.

Established by Vitalis, the award carried a \$25,000 scholarship fund in the name of Unitas for five youths living in Baltimore. The scholarships were administered by the National Merit Scholarship Corporation.

THE COLTS' MARCHING BAND

"Silver Anniversary Year"

The Colt Band was born with the All-American Conference Baltimore Colts in 1947. This group of musicians stayed together through years when Baltimore had no pro football franchise (1951-52). The all-volunteer organization numbering over 160 has performed at the 1958, 1959, 1964 and 1968 NFL Championship games. On Dec. 4, 1966, Theodore R. McKeldin; then Mayor of Baltimore, led the celebration of Baltimore Colts' Band Day in recognition of the fact that on that day the Band's first bass drum was presented to the National Professional Football Hall of Fame in Canton, O. Under the direction of Art Schmersal, the Band drills one night a week throughout the year and appears at parades and other events, including participation as the official band at The Preakness. The 1971 band staff consists of J. Richard Taylor, business manager; Sam Orofino, personnel director; David Cook, property manager; H. Erich Koch, librarian; J. Danny O'Toole, drill instructor; Richard Otto, drum major; Richard E. DiStefano, assistant director; Arthur Schmersal, director and John W. Ziemann, publicity director, Roberta Wertz, choreographer. This year the Band will celebrate its 25th season representing professional football in Baltimore.

THE COLTS' ASSOCIATES

Another organization born in 1947 is the Colts' Associates, a 25-member group of ever-active boosters who have aided players in obtaining homes and jobs and otherwise making their services available to the Colts' organization. Most notable among their endeavors have been the annual Family Day outing at training camp and Colt Nite, a benefit game at Memorial Stadium which has raised thousands of dollars for the Police Boys' Clubs of Baltimore. Serving as the Associates officers for 1970 are: Larry Beck, President; Art DeCarlo, Vice President; Jack Polhaus, Secretary-Treasurer.

BALTIMORE'S FAMED COLTS' CORRALS

One of the most copied and respected fan groups in the United States, the Colts' Corrals are the subject of numerous letters and phone calls to the Baltimore Colts' office each year from other league cities, asking questions such as: "How Could We Start Something Like That In Our City? How Did They DO IT?" Of course, they did it with great loyalty and organization.

Just as rabid now as they were when the very first unit was organized 14 years ago, the number of Colts Corrals has swelled to 21. These super fan clubs will stage their fifth Annual Convention in Ocean City, Maryland on September 17,18, and 19, 1971, with more than 1,000 members attending and they continue their other energetic activities like making road trips, honoring players and coaches, raising money for charity and otherwise promoting pro football in a wide area.

This year the Council of Colts Corrals is sponsoring an Oyster-Bull Roast in November with proceeds going to the Cystic-Fibrosis Foundation in Maryland, and also the 2nd Annual "Where are they now?" party to be held at the Friendship International Hotel with the proceeds again going to the Cystic-Fibrosis Foundation. There are at present over 2,000 members in the 21 Colts Corrals.

Donald L. Louey is the Chairman of the Council of Colts Corrals for 1971, and he is assisted by Harry Katz, Vice-Chairman and President of Colts Corral No. 15, James (Jake) Stitley, Treasurer, Hurst C. (Loudy) Loudenslager in his 8th year as Secretary, and Danny Vendetti as Sgt.-At-Arms. THE QUARTERBACK CLUB

The Quarterback Club of Baltimore meets the Monday evening following each Baltimore Colt home game for dinner and a film showing of the game. The club, founded in 1960, awards a \$2500 scholarship each season to Maryland's Scholar-Athlete of the Year. It also co-sponsors with the National Football Foundation, the annual Baltimore Scholar-Athlete Dinner. Officers of the Quarterback Club are: president — Roger Goss; vice president — Rich Colonell; treasurer — John Beatson; secretary — John McGeehan.

HISTORICAL HIGHLIGHTS

December 28, 1946 — All-America Football Conf. franchise to Baltimore.

September 7, 1947 — Colts won inaugural game, beating Brooklyn Dodgers, 16-7, in Baltimore Stadium.

December 12, 1948 — Colts, playing for Eastern Division title, lost, 28-17, to Buffalo Bills in game marked by near riot.

December 9, 1949 — All-America Conf. and National Football League came to "peace" agreement. Colts enter N.F.L. for 1950 season.

January 18, 1951 — Abraham Watner withdrew Baltimore franchise and was voted \$50,000 for Colt players by N.F.L. owners.

December 1, 1952 — Newspaper headlines screamed news that Colts would return to N.F.L. in 1953 with tormer players of detunct Dallas team, providing 15,000 season tickets were bought in seven-week period.

January 11, 1953 — Carroll Rosenbloom became 52 percent owner of new Colts. Other owners were William F. Hilgenberg, Zanvyl Krieger, Thomas Mullan, Sr., and R. Bruce Livie.

January 22, 1953 — Colts officially restored to N.F.L.

September 27, 1953 — Colts upset Chicago Bears, 13-9, in N.F.L. opener.

February 4, 1957 — Carroll Rosenbloom named president.

November 2, 1958 — Colts record sixth successive win in 56-0 rout of Packers. It was 1st shutout in team history and most one-sided win.

November 16, 1958 — Colts blank Bears first time in 149 games, 17-0.

November 30, 1958 — Colts clinch their first Western Conference title with 35-27 conquest of 49ers before second straight record home sellout crowd of 57,557.

December 28, 1958 — Colts defeat Giants, 23-17, to capture their first World Championship in the league's initial "sudden death" struggle.

December 12, 1959 — Colts overcome 10-0 deficit, scoring 24 points in 4th period, to stun Rams, 45-26, in Los Angeles and wrap up second Western Conference crown.

December 27, 1959 — Colts whip Giants, 31-16, to win their second straight World Championship.

December 11, 1960 — John Unitas' TD passing string is snapped by the Rams at 47 games—an N.F.L. record.

January 8, 1963 — Don Shula relieved Weeb Ewbank as the Colts' third head coach since 1953. Gino Marchetti and Bill Pellington later named Colts' first player-coaches.

December 15, 1963 — John Unitas concluded season during which he smashed eight Colts' records and an N.F.L. mark with 237 completions.

January 20, **1964** — Carroll Rosenbloom purshases remaining stock in Colts to become sole owner of the club.

November 22, 1964 — Colts beat Rams, 24-7, in Los Angeles for record 10th straight win to clinch third Western Conference title

December 13, 1964 — Raymond Berry catches NFL record 506th pass and Lenny Moore runs season's TD total to NFL mark of 20 vs. Redskins.

December 27, 1964 — Browns defeat Colts, 27-0, in Cleveland for NFL title.

December 26, 1965 — Packers edge Colts, 13-10, in "sudden death" playoff for Western Conference title. Tom Matte directs Colts from quarterback in absence of injured John Unitas and Gary Cuozzo.

January 9, 1966 — Colts crush Cowboys, 35-3, in Playoff Bowl in Miami as QB Matte stars.

June 8, 1966 — N.F.L. and A.F.L. announce merger for 1970.

January 9, 1967 — Colts beat Philadelphia Eagles, 20-14, for their second straight Playoff Bowl triumph.

January 23, 1967 — General Manager Joe Campanella and Head Coach Don Shula named vice- presidents.

March 17, 1967 — Publicity director Harry Hulmes named general manager following tragic death of Joe Campanella on February 15.

November 5, 1967 — Defeated World Champion Green Bay, 13-10, with two touchdowns in final minutes to snap five-game losing skein to Packers.

December 17, 1967 — Unbeaten in 13 games (11-0-2), Colts lost final game of season to Rams, 34-10, in Los Angeles.

December 8, 1968 — Colts win Coastal Division title when Chicago Bears beat Los Angeles Rams, 17-16, day after Colts had beaten Green Bay Packers, 16-3.

December 22, 1968 — A 24-14 victory over Minnnesota Vikings gives Colts Western Conference title.

December 29, 1968 — Colts average year's only loss by swamping the Cleveland Browns, 34-0, for National Football League championship, their first since back-to-back title of 1958 and 1959.

January 12, 1969 — Colts fall to American Football League New York Jets, 16-7, in World's Cohmpionship Game.

May 10, 1969 — In Pro Football realignment, Colts switch along with Cleveland Browns and Pittsburgh Steelers, to American Conference of National Football League, joining teams which made up American Football League.

January 6, 1970 — Don Klosterman named Colts' General Manager.

April 3, 1970 — Don McCafferty becomes Colts' Head Coach replacing Don Shula who quit to coach Miami Dolphinf.

September 20, 1970 — Colts open new era in AFC with 16-14 victory at San Diego.

December 13, 1970 — Colts clinch Eastern Division title with 20-14 win at Buffalo.

December 26, 1970 — Colts defeat Cincinnati 17-0 in first round of AFC Divisional Playoffs at Memorial Stadium.

January 3, 1971 — Colts win AFC Championship by defeating Oakland, 27-17, at Memorial Stadium. Baltimore becomes AFC's first representative in Super Bowl under NFL's new alignment.

January 17, 1971 — Colts win first Super Bowl, defeating Dallas, 16-13, on Jim O'Brien's 32-yard field goal with five seconds remaining.

March 1, 1971 — George Young named Personnel Director replacing Upton Bell who became General Manager of the New England Patriots.

March 18, 1971 — Steve Rosenbloom named President. Carroll Rosenbloom becomes Chairman of the Board.



1970 "They Played For Manhood"

When you talk about this past Baltimore Colts' season there is no where else to begin but at the end...when you talk about 1970 you have to start with 1971.

The Colts became world champions in a way no other National Football League team ever has. They did it by winning a crazy Super Bowl game over the Dallas Cowboys that moved Dick Young of the New York Daily News to write:

"The thing I can't quite decide is this: Have I just watched one of the greatest football games ever played, or the worst."

Ed Pope of the Miami Herald wrote:

"If you like Roman-candle offense, it wasn't your kind of game. If you like cutthroat football-- gut-wrenching, fumbling and intercepting and piling on and clipping and plain-out punching--it was.

"One point is not arguable: This was by far the most

competitive of Super Bowls.

"The Colts and Cowboys may not have looked like Super Bowl teams. But they were in super combat. They played like there was a new Super Bowl rule against scoring touchdowns but they smashed and clawed and tore each other like gang-fighters going for each other's jugulars instead of just the \$15,000 first prize.

"I have to think the money was secondary in this one, uncommon as that may be to professional football players.

"These guys were playing for manhood. That is why, out of all the debates about the total of skills shown in Super Bowl V, there never will be any about this game's grip on the hearts of real football men.

"Hi head it"

A critical field goal by Jim O'Brien opened the season in San Diego and another one ended it in Miami. The next few pages detail what happened in between.

THE 1970 COLTS - GAME BY GAME

Sept. 20, 1970

BALTIMORE 16, SAN DIEGO 14 - At San Diego Stadium, attendance 47,782. Jim O'Brien kicked three field goals in his first professional appearance including a final one in the last 56 seconds to give the Baltimore Colts an opening victory. Gary Garrison caught a pair of long TD passes from Charger quarterback, John Hadl. Baltimore defense otherwise dominated the game and Lance Alworth's record for consecutive games in which he had caught one or more passes ended at 96. Tom Matte injured his knee; Tom Mitchell his ankle.

Sept. 28,1970

KANSAS CITY 44, BALTIMORE 24 — At Memorial Stadium, attendance 53,911. Len Dawson threw four TD passes, including a pair to Frank Pitts, while Johnny Robinson made three interceptions and returned a fumble for a TD in decisive victory over Colts. Emmitt Thomas' two interceptions gave Kansas City total of five, most in two years. Earl Morrall contributed three TD passes for Colts and Eddie Hinton, second-year wide receiver, caught 11 passes for 190 yards, including a TD.

Oct. 4, 1970

BALTIMORE 14, BOSTON 6 -- At Harvard Stadium, attendance 38,235. John Unitas' late TD pass to Roy Jefferson enabled the Colts to subdue a stubborn Boston defense. Earlier, Earl Morrall had fired a TD to Ed Hinton for what proved his only reception of the day. Running back Jim Nance sustained an ankle injury and lke Lassiter, defensive end, received a knee injury. Morrall started game; Unitas releived in 2nd half.

Oct. 11,1970

BALTIMORE 24, HOUSTON 20 -- At Astrodome, attendance 48,050. The second of two touchdown passes thrown by Johnny Unitas to Roy Jefferson with 46 seconds remaining enabled the Colts to overcome the Oilers. The pass to Jefferson was into the end zone and it culminated an eighty-yard drive.

Oct. 18,1970

BALTIMORE 29, NEW YORK JETS 22 -- At Shea Stadium, attendance 63,301. Six interceptions, three by Jerry Logan, including one for a TD, enabled Baltimore to reverse the decision of Super Bowl III despite a top 397 yards passing effort by Joe Namath. The Colts' interceptions were one off their club mark. Johnny Unitas, making his first appearance in New York in a dozen years, moved the Colts into a quick 17-0 lead within six minutes and kept them in front the rest of the way. Namath's yardage included twelve receptions by rookie Ed Bell for 151 yards. Joe was 34 for 62.

Oct. 25, 1970

BALTIMORE 27, BOSTON 3 -- At Memorial Stadium, attendance 60,240. Johnny Unitas threw TD passes to Jack Maitland, Roy Jefferson and Jimmy Orr while the Colts defense smothered Jae

Kapp for a second victory over the Patriots. The Colts came up with 4 interceptions, to register a total of 10 in 2 successive games. The Patriots were held to 45 yords rushing. Tom Matte re-injured his knee on first play of game and missed the rest of

Nov. 1,1970

BALTIMORE 35, MIAMI 0 -- At Memorial Stadium, attendance 60,240. An 80-yard punt return by Ron Gardin and a 99-yard kickoff return by Jim Duncan shattered Miami's offense but the Dolphins' second-year runner, Mercury Morris, came up with a total of 302 yards on offense, to join a select group of nine others who had topped 300 in the pros. Morris' figures included 8 carries for 89 yards, three passes for 68 and six kickoffs for 145. Mike Curtis intercepted twice for the Colts.

Nov. 9, 1970

BALTIMORE 13, GREEN BAY 10 — At Milwaukee County Stadium, attendance 48,063. Colts marched 80 yards for lead touchdown, a 15-yard sprint by Jerry Hill, in the second period and rookie Jim O'Brien kicked a pair of third period field goals as rain fell throughout the game. Four interceptions by the Colts, giving them 17 in four consecutive games, highlighted Baltimore's sixth straight victory. Colts' streak of 12 straight periods without allowing a TD ended in fourth quarter.

Nov. 15, 1970

BALTIMORE 17, BUFFALO 17 - At Memorial Stadium, attendance 60,240. The Colts and Bills exchanged fourth-period field goals for the first fie these teams played in the 1970 season. Rookie passer Dennis Shaw connected with TD passes in the first half to provide the Bills with a 14-0 lead. Norm Bulaich's running in the second half established Baltimore's passing game. He finished up with 86 yards on 22 attempts.

Nov. 22, 1970

MIAMI 34, BALTIMORE 17 — At Orange Bowl attendance 67,699. Jake Scott's 77-yard TD return of a punt wiped out a 3-0 Baltimore edge and the Dolphins went on to a victory in which Bob Griese passed for two TDs and carried for another on a quarterback draw. John Unitas connected on short TD passes to Roy Jefferson and Tom Mitchell.

Nov. 29, 1970

BALTIMORE 21, CHICAGO 20 -- At Memorial Stadium, attendance 60,240. John Unitas brought the Colts back from a 17-0 deficit, throwing a 54-yard pass to John Mackey in the last four minutes for a Colts victory. Unitas, who completed 23 of 40, moved the Colts 76 yards in two plays late in the game. The Bears intercepted him five times capitalizing on four of these to score.

Dec. 6, 1970

BALTIMORE 29, PHILADELPHIA 10 -- At Memorial Stadium, attendance 60,240; up to 40 mph winds. Jerry Logan scored his fifth lifetime interception TD and Charlie Stukes set up another Colt TD with a 47-yard interception return as Baltimore won before its fiftieth successive sellout home crowd. Eddie Hinton also scored on an end-around. Sam Havrilak ran for 61 yards (11 carries) before he injured his hip in the opening minutes of the 2nd half.

Dec. 13, 1970

BALTIMORE 20, BUFFALO 14 -- At War Memorial Stadium, attendance 34,346, Baltimore won a snowy victory to clinch the Eastern Division AFC title despite an outstanding performance by Buffalo's rookie quarterback Dennis Shaw. Two interceptions by Charlie Stukes halted Buffalo drives after the Bills had held a 14-0 halftime edge. Roy Jefferson had his biggest day for the Colts with five receptions for 125 yards.

Dec. 19, 1970

BALTIMORE 35, NEW YORK JETS 20 — At Memorial Stadium, attendance 60,240. Entering the game late in the first quarter in place of John Unitas, Earl Morrall threw four TD passes in the Colts' repeat victory over the New York Jets. Morrall, who threw for 348 yards, tied for third-best single game yardage in the AFC for the year. He connected twice to Ed Hinton, and once to Jimmy Orr and Ray Perkins. Larry Grantham's interception for a Jets' TD in the second period was the third lifetime for the 11-year veteran linebacker.

AFC DIVISIONAL PLAYOFF -- Dec. 26, 1970

BALTIMORE 17, CINCINNATI 0 -- At Memorial Stadium, attendance 51,127. John Unitas connected with TD passes to Roy Jefferson and Ed Hinton in the first and fourth quarters and led the Colts into the AFC title game over the Cincinnati Bengals. The Baltimore defense came through on a cold, windy day and limited Cincinnati to 63 yards rushing and 76 yards passing. Norm Bulaich, Colts' rookie rusher, picked up 116 yards on 25 carries. Jim O'Brien, Colts' rookie kicker and leading scorer, connected with a 44-yard FG, missed one from the same distance, and had a 49-yard effort blocked. Cincinnati's lone scoring attempt, a 49-yard FG try by Horst Muhlmann, was blocked by Ray May. Mike Curtis, Colts' middle linebacker, made the game's only interception, picking off one of Virgil Carter's fourth-period passes, to set up an eventual final Colt score.

AMERICAN FOOTBALL CONFERENCE CHAMPIONSHIP GAME - JANUARY 3, 1971

BALTIMORE 27, OAKLAND 17 -- At Memorial Stadium, Baltimore, Maryland, attendance 56,368. Johnny Unitas' passing and play calling, and the running of rooke Norm Bulaich, powered the Baltimore Colts to their first American Football Conference Championship. Bulaich scored twice and Unitas picked up 245 yards on 11 completions, with his key one coming in the fourth quarter on a 68-yard touchdown reception by Ray Perkins out of a formation of four wide receivers. It was only the second time during the entire year the Colts had used the maneuver.

George Blanda became the oldest quarterback to perform in a title game when he replaced Oakland's injured Daryle Lamonica in the second period. The 43-year-old veteran threw touchdown passes to Fred Biletnikoff and Warren Wells, but was intercepted three times. Wells' five receptions were good for 108 of Blanda's 271 yards. Ed Hinton caught five for Baltimore for 115 yards, almost half of Unitas' total.

SUPER BOWL -- JAN. 17, 1971

BALTIMORE 16, DALLAS 13 -- At Orange Bowl, Miami, Fla., attendance 80,055.

Baltimore Colts' rookie Jim O'Brien climaxed one of the zaniest professional football games ever played by lofting a 32-yard field goal through the Orange Bowl uprights with five seconds left in regulation time to give the Colts a 16-13 Super Bowl triumph over Dallas.

The brutal defensive struggle resulted in 11 turnovers, which prevented a fluid, artistic performance but contributed to the drama and "anything might happen next" climate of the contest.

Dallas nearly put the game away early in the third period when, leading 13-6, the Cowboys recovered Jim Duncan's fumble on the second half kickoff and zipped to the Colts' two yard line in five plays. Duane Thomas, however, fumbled on the next play and Baltimore had life again.

Rick Volk provided the Colts with the opportunity to tie the game halfway through the fourth period when he intercepted on the Dallas 33 and returned it to the three. Tom Nowatzke punctured into the end zone and after O'Brien's PAT the score was 13-13.

Mike Curtis intercepted another Craig Morton pass on the Dallas 41 in the final minute and returned it to the 28. The Colts stopped the clock with nine seconds remaining and O'Brien trotted on the field to become a hero. Morton's desperation pass on the final play of the game was intercepted by Jerry Logan.

NORM BULAICH (36) 2 Yr. #1-70 Running Back 6-1, 218 Texas Christian

PRO: Was expected to be starting fullback but had to switch to halfback when Tom Matte was hurt . . . Bulaich had excellent rookie season as Baltimore's leading ground gainer -- 426 yards on 139 carries, three TDs (longest gain 15 yards) but didn't exhibit true value until playoffs when he punctured Cincinnati for 116 yards on 25 carries and Oakland for 71 yards on 22 carries . . . he scored two TDs



in AFC Championship Game against Raiders . . . other strong performances were 86 yards in first game with Buffalo; 69 against Green Bay and 58 in second game with Miami when he averaged 5.8 a carry . . . Norm had a history of muscle pulls in college (where he barely played 50 percent of his games) and his very first day in the Colts' Training Camp suffered one . . . he ran the ball twice in a rookie game against the Redskins -- the first time he bulled for 32 yards; the second time he pulled a muscle . . . but thanks to the medical genius of Head Trainer Ed Block and the Colt doctors Norm had no more muscle trouble and played in all but two games -- missing the second Patriots game (bruised knee) and Philadelphia (ribs) . . . "He anchors our front line," says McCafferty. "He's a great leader and knowsthe game.



Always does an excellent job on the middle linebacker." . . . Colts traded two players to New Orleans for Curry and a pair of draft choices in 1967 after the Saints had claimed him from Green Bay in the expansion draft . . . a 20th round draft pick by Green Bay in 1965 he saw some duty as a center for the Packers in 1966 . . . has played in four Super Bowls (two with Packers and two with Colts) and now has three World Championship rings . . . has never played in a losing Packer-Colt game in his career (five years) . . . injuries stopped his bid for a linebacking job with Baltimore in 1967 before he emerged as a star center in 1968 . . . "Reading psychology and novels -- fiction and non-fiction -appeal to me," says Curry. "I'm fascinated by human behavior." ... has a nightly, 15-minute television show in Atlanta, Ga., in the off-season ... "I lack meaness," Curry says.

COLLEGE: Starred at Georgia Tech . . . played in the Coaches' All-Star Game in Buffalo and for the College All-Stars against Cleveland in the summer of 1965.

PERSONAL: Born Oct. 21, 1942 in College Park, Ga., where he went to high school . . . he and his wife Carolyn have two children - Kristin (4) and William, Jr., born last October . . . 
MIKE CURTIS (32) 7 Yr. #1-65 Middle Linebacker 6-2, 232 Duke

PRO: Curtis simply had a super year in his first full season as a middle linebacker... his honors included Most Valuable Player of the 1971 Super Bowl game from the New York Chapter of the Professional Football Writers of America; outstanding defensive player in the AFC by the Kansas City 101 Club (101 of the top media people in America); selection to the Pro Bowl, and he missed making UPI's All-AFC



first team by one vote . . . his big play of the season was the interception in the final minute of the Super Bowl which set up Jim O'Brien's 32-yard, game-winning field goal . . . intercepted five passes during the regular season (a personal high) and added another against Cincinnati in the playoffs with his seventh coming in the Super Bowl . . . started every game . . . was AP Defensive Player of the Week after 35-0 battering of Miami on Nov. 1 . . . was an All-Pro outside linebacker in 1968 but was switched to middle in mid-season of 1969 . . . since that switch, Colts have won 19 of 24 regular or post-season games . . . he made second team All-NEA with just a half a season at the position in '69 . . . is a vicious hitter . . . Gino Marchetti says of Curtis: "Mike is going to be the greatest linebacker in the game. I've seen Curtis make plays that I thought were humanly impossible . . . Says Colts' defensive backfield coach Bobby Boyd: "Mike was the best outside linebacker I've ever seen, bar none." ... "Mike eats the panes right out of the bus windows on the way to practice," says retired Colt Billy Ray Smith. "He chews the face bars off his helmet." . . . Don McCafferty: "If we had 22 Mike Curtis', we could send them to the stadium and tell them to bring back a winner while we sat and watched the game on TV." ... Curtis himself is the author of one of the league's best lines --"I play football because it's the only place you can hit people and get away with it." . . . made 15 tackles in first Miami game. COLLEGE: A fullback and linebacker at Duke . . . All-Atlantic Coast Conference as a soph . . . led Blue Devils in rushing in 1964 (497 yards on 121 carries for 4.1 avg.).

PERSONAL: Born March 27, 1943 in Rockville, Md. . . . went to Richard Montgomery High School . . . works in real estate and bought a farm in Maryland for his parents . . . married Marty Boone (sister of Sam Ball's wife) in Henderson, Ky. . . . they reside in Columbia, Md.

injury in college) and was put on move list before opener as precautionary measure . . . activated on Oct. 11 and started crucial
Oct. 18 game at New York Jets for Rick Volk (injury) and played
well . . . started again following week against Patriots . . .
played on special teams until day of final regular season game
when he was put back on move list because of activation of
center Tom Goode . . . remained there through playoffs . . . had
knee surgery in February . . . finished season as No. 1 reserve

position . . . real Jim Duncan story for 1970, however, was his role as a cornerback . . . tried at corner for Charlie Stukes at mid-season but didn't become legitimate starter until 11th game of the season (Chicago) when he took over for Tom Maxwell, and played very effectively the rest of the season . . . intercepted two passes and returned them 66 yards . . . recovered Duane Thomas' fumble on Baltimore one-yard line in the Super Bowl after Duncan's fumble of the second half kickoff enabled Dallas to launch that threat.

ive player (running back and flanker) in college . . . returned a punt 69 yards for a touchdown in pre-season game at Denver . . returned another 43 yards to half yard line setting up TD against San Diego.

COLLEGE: Led Arizona in receiving as a junior . . . switched to tailback as a senior and led club in rushing . . . spent three years in Army before entering junior college prior to Arizona days . . . won Ernie Davis Award for inspiring play in coaches All-American Game in June 1970, Lubbock, Tex.

PERSONAL: Born Sept. 25, 1944 in Ansonia, Con. . . . Ron and his wife Cecilia live in Tucson, Ariz.

TOM GOODE (54) 10 Yr. Waivers--Dolphins

Center 6-3, 245 Mississippi State

PRO: Claimed on waivers from the Miami Dolphins on Dec. 3... was activated immediately; deactivated beforeEagles game and returned to active roster to stay before regular season finale with N. Y. Jets... played a lot against Jets and centered all long snaps in playoffs... snapped ball for O'Brien's Super Bowl field goal,... named Miami's best offensive lineman in 1966 and 1969 and made '69 AFL All-Star game



... played in every Dolphin game until this season ... was injured in pre-season and placed on move list ... drafted by Houston in second round in '61 and played in 112 straight games before injury in Miami this year ... was Miami's MVP in 1967 ... "He's the best at distance snaps I've ever seen," says McCafferty. COLLEGE: All-Southeastern Conference linebacker and center ... played in three all-star games ... has degree in business from Miss. Grant was inserted in starting lineup in '69 when Mike Curtis was moved into middle and Colts promptly won four of next five games . . . he intercepted two of Sonny Jurgensen's passes in first game he ever started . . . accomplished speaker . . . "I spend three to five hours at weight training five days a week during the off season," says Grant.

PRO: Will receive complete shot at quarter-back spot on roster this pre-season . . . is 3 for 3 as pro passer -- hit Roy Jefferson on 54-yard halfback pass on first play of game against Green Bay, tossed 28-yard completion to Jim O'Brien while concluding second win over Jets with three-play stint at QB and Super Bowl completion . . . McCafferty says: "He's got a strong arm; he's a leader; he's got poise under press-



ure -- there's no reason why he can't make our club as a quarterback."... displayed poise in Super Bowl when he kept his head after Dallas diagnosed flea-flicker play and found Eddie Hinton for 25-yard completion ... meanwhile, Havrilak made significant contributions to championship as a running back ... he gained 61 yards in 11 carries (5.5 average) in one half before a hip pointer sidelined him against the Eagles ... he started game for Norm Bulaich (injury) and ran sweep more effectively than any Colt did all season ... he totaled 159 yards on 54 carries, caught 14 passes for 141 yards (plus a clutch 25 yarder in the Super Bowl) and returned two kickofts for 36 yards ... recovered key Oakland fumble by Atkinson on Raider 45 and Baltimore scored a TD two plays later ... set up another critical touchdown against the Bears with a 27-yard pass reception that moved the Colts to the Chicago one-yard line ... caught two passes for 50

yards against the Pockers, including a big third down grab . . . "Before coming into professional football I had always been a quarterback," said Havrilak. "I still think like a quarterback, frequently calling the plays in my mind. I like running the ball, but I prefer quarterback." . . . worked for the Colts as a public speaker in the off season . . . another alert draft pick, he was selected on the eighth round . . . was also used as a wide receiver and defensive back his rookie season ('69).

TED HENDRICKS (83) 3 Yr. #2-69 Linebacker 6-7, 215 Miami (Fla.)



But we were wrong. Ted is tall and skinny but extremely strong. I said before this season started that he should be twice as good as he was in 1969 and he was pretty good in 1969. I was right. He had a tremendous



season." . . . Hendricks blocked a punt in a pre-season game against the Lions that set up the winning touchdown and was awarded the Most Valuable Trophy for the charity game in Raleigh, N.C. . . . returned an interception 31 yards against the Eogles . . . blocked a field goal attempt against Houston . . . nicknamed the "Mad Stork" and plays like one . . . loves to tackle high and take full advantage of the leverage his 6-7 frame provides . . "Ted gives you an extra dimension at linebacker," says linebacker coach Hank Bullough. "He's so effective on pass coverage because of his quickness and his height. He plays the blitz in superior manner. And he's strong against the sweep. I think he can be the best in the league." . . . defensive line coach John Sandusky adds: "In some of our defenses he's playing defensive end. Despite the fact he sometimes plays at about 212 to 215 he's not giving away a thing in strength."

COLLEGE: Three-time All-American at Miami, he was both a defensive end and tight end for the Hurricanes . . . the "Mad Stork" was first Miami sophomore to make All-American . . . named National Lineman of the Year by UPI in 1968 and won the Washington Touchdown Club's Knute Rockne Memorial Award as outstanding college lineman of 1968 . . . "Ted could be an All-American in just about any position on the ball club," said his college coach, Charlie Tate.

PERSONAL:Born Nov. 1, 1947 in Guatemala City, Guatemala . . . was high school All-American as an end at Hialeah (Fla.) High . . hobbies include hunting, fishing, water-skiing and solving mathematics problems . . . he and his wife Jane have son Mark (14).

. had his best game that Monday night, averaging 5.2 yards a carry (6 for 31) . . . had knee surgery in February . . . when free of injuries, Jerry is a seasoned veteran



who has had some clutch days for the Colts -- like his 121-yard day (90 rushing, 31 pass receiving) against the Rams in 1968 . . . "He's the finest blocking fullback in the league," says McCafferty . . . Jerry on his blocking: "When you're blocking for a passer the best thing you can do is make the initial contact with your head, right in the man's chest. If you hit with your head first you can then slide off to guide him with your shoulder and/or forearm. If you try to just throw a shoulder into the man you stand a good chance of missing." . . "Jerry Hill has developed an approach to football that is stripped of all but essentials -- as basic as a truck going downhill," says Steve Sabol of NFL films.

COLLEGE: Outstanding fullback at the University of Wyoming, where he gained 1,374 yards for a career average of 4.8 a carry... All-Skyline Conference.

PRO: Got to the quarterback twice in the Super Bowl, twice in the AFC title game against Oakland and once in the Cincinnati playoff... lost his starting job to rookie Billy Newsame for eight weeks starting with the first Patriot game (third week of the season . . . the last four weeks of that streak, however, Hilton played a lot in each game and eventually won his regular job back before the Chicago game and



kept it the rest of the year) . . . had his best season by far . . . "That kid, (Newsome) is going to drive me to the Pro Bowl," Hilton said at mid season and he almost did . . . "Hilton and Bubba (Smith) killed us today," said Paul Brown after Baltimore shutout his Bengals in the playoffs . . . became a starter four years ago then served as a swing man to make room for Bubba in 1967 . . . regained the job in '69 after Ordell Braase retired.

COLLEGE: Standout two-way end at Jackson State.



Roy caught five for 125 yards at Buffalo in division clinching game; five for 99 yards at Houston; three for 87 in the first Boston game and five for 83 yards against San Diego . . . he pulled out the Houston game by catching a 31-yard touchdown pass from Johnny Unitas with 46 seconds remaining and caught a 55-yarder from Unitas in the final two minutes to salt away the



"I don't have any one particular favorite pattern. I'd heard a lot about 'bump and run' as played in the old American Football League, but it doesn't seem to bother me. I'm as big as most cornerbacks, bigger than some, so bump and run isn't a big factor with me." — Roy Jefferson

rookie year of 1966 when he also led the league . . . in 1967 and '68, however, Lee slumped to 42.4 and 39.4 averages before regaining his form in '69 . . . he originally signed as a free agent with the Browns and come to the Colts in a trade after a season on Cleveland's band squad . . . led the AFC fourth and fifth weeks of the season and again 10th and 11th weeks before block dropped him to third . . . JOHN MACKEY (88) 9 Yr. #2-63 Tight End 6-2, 224 Syracuse

PRO: Voted the greatest tight end ever to play in the NFL . . . he was All-Pro three straight years (1966-68) and played in five Pro Bowls (1963-65, 67, 68) . . . knee problems have bothered John the past two seasons (he had major knee surgery the off season of 1970) but it didn't prevent him from catching 28 passes for 425 yards and three TDs, including perhaps the biggest play of the season, a 54-yard touchdown



pass from John Unitas with 3:47 left to defeat the Chicago Bears 21-20 . . . caught controversial tipped pass in Super Bowl for 75-yard touchdown that tied game 6-6 . . . pass from Unitas was deflected by Eddie Hinton, tipped by Dallas' Mel Renfro and sailed into Mackey's hands . . grabbed five passes for 87 yards against the Bears, three for 39 and a TD against Philadelphia and three for 54 and a TD against Buffalo (first game) . . . pulled hamstring in Cincinnati playoff and was bothered by it against Oakland . . . "The touchdown play against the Bears," said McCafferty, "was the single biggest play of our season. We had tied Buffalo and lost to Miami the two weeks prior to that game and fell behind 17-0 against Chicago." . . . McCafferty continues on Mackey: "He's the premier tight end in professional football. He's a great blocker and a threat to go all the way on any pass with his speed and tackle-breaking ability." . . . surpassed the 100-yard mark in receiving twice in 1968 -- 107 (seven catches) against Chicago and 105 (five catches) against St. Louis . . . "The only time a double team bothers me," says Mackey, "is when no one gets open. I don't care if I don't catch a pass just as long as I can take two men with me on my patterns."

COLLEGE: Outstanding halfback and end at Syracuse and was a star in the East-West Shrine Game in San Francisco.

PRO: Author of a real football fairy tale . . . Maitland was a 16th draft choice from Williams College, a school which had never before had a pro football player . . . he was placed on the move list, which was an accomplishment in itself, on Sept. 2 . . . he was activated Sept. 19 before the opener with San Diego for Tom Curtis (head injury) . . . played in every game, extensively in nine games . . . was the second busiest



running back for the Colts (Bulaich was first) with 74 carries for 209 yards and one TD rushing . . . he scored another on a fourth down swing pass from John Unitas against the Patriots . . . his best game was an 82-yard day in Boston, a game he started (third game of the season) - 42 yards rushing and 40 on five receptions . . . also started the next two games at Houston and at N.Y. Jets . . . used on special teams . . . given little chance of making the club in 1970, he looked better every day as the rookies got longer looks because of the player strike . . . Jack's father, an advertising executive in Ft. Lauderdale, Fla., refused to accept a bonus for his son when he signed: "The American system is based on reward for production," said Mr. Maitland. "When Jack produces then he should be rewarded. Until then he shouldn't receive a bonus." . . . Maitland's draft pick was a result of the astute eye of personnel director George Young.

COLLEGE: Third team Little All-American at Williams . . . All-New England and three-time All-East . . . gained over 1,200 yards rushing as a senior . . . added 350 more on 21 pass receptions.

PERSONAL: Born Feb. 2, 1948 in Pittsburgh, Pa. . . . now lives in Ft. Lauderdale . . . bachelor . . . worked for father's advertising agency branch in Dallas this past off season.

"In college, especially at a school like Williams, there's a lot of rah rah associated with the football team and players are friendly and close-knit. I didn't expect to see so much of that in professional football, but I've been surprised by the camaradiere on the Colts. It's great." — Jack Maitland

TOM MATTE (41) 11 Yr. #1-61 Running Back 6-0, 214 Ohio State

PRO: Matte injured a knee in the season opener (second half) against San Diego after he had gained 43 yards in 12 carries, including a 16-yard run...he was not to carry the ball again in 1970...he was placed on the move list for four weeks and was activated for the Patriots game on Oct. 25... on the first play of the game he ran out of the backfield on a pass play and the knee gave way... put back on

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the move list for another four weeks, Matte was practicing with the club again on Nov. 25 (the day before Thanksgiving) he suffered a reinjury...he had knee surgery Dec. 3 for cartilage repair and missed the remainder of the season . . . he also had his appendix removed on April 8, the day after John Unitas' Achilles tendon operation, when it was believed he was having a bleeding ulcer attach (a chronic condition) . . . Tom had ulcer trouble the night before the pre-season game with Miami in late August and missed two pre-season games because of it . . . he is expected back in top condition this year despite his physical problems . . . "Obviously 1970 was a disappointing and frustrating season to me," Matte said. "I certainly don't want to end a career this way. I worked hard in the off season to strengthen my leg and I expect to come back this year and have another good season." . . . 1970 was particularly frustrating because 1969 had been Matte's most productive season . . . he was the NFL's third leading rusher (909 yards on 235 carries and 11 TDs) and led the league by far in combined rushing-pass receiving yardage with 1,422 . . . he caught 43 passes for 513 yards in '69 . . . 1969 was the third straight year he led the Colts in rushing . . . Matte played in the Pro Bowl in 1968 and 1969 . . . his beggest publicity year came in 1965 when injuries claimed Colt quarterbacks Unitas and Gary Cuozzo and Ed Brown became ineligible and the Colts had to turn to Matte, who had been a quarterback at Ohio State . . . the "Instant Quarterback" inspired the Colts to a 20-17 victory over the Los Angeles Rams to tie Green Bay first place in the Western Conference then turned in a thrilling performance against the Packers in the playoff, a game the Colts lost in sudden death . . . Tom then threw two touchdown passes in Baltimore's 35-3 triumph over Dallas in the Playoff Bowl in Miami . . . Matte became a starter in 1967 after sharing job with Lenny Moore, and he responded with 12 touchdowns . . . he scored a total of 23 TDs in his last two full seasons -- '68 and '69. .. his career total is 48 and he scored 35 of them in three years . .. he scored three TDs in the 1968 NFL title game at Cleveland.

COLLEGE: Quarterback at Ohio State after one year as half-back... rushed for 833 yards in 161 carries his senior year... outstanding back of East-West Game... completed 78 of 146 passes (53.4%) for 1,476 yards and 12 TDs in QB years.

PERSONAL: Born June 14, 1939 in Pittsburgh . . . went to Shaw High School in Cleveland, O., but now lives in Glen Arm, Md. . . . wife's name is Judy and they have son named Roland (2) and daughter Kate who was born last January.

RAY MAY (56) 5 Yr. Trade-Steelers-70 Linebacker 6-1, 230 Southern California PRO: Acquired by Colts in trade with Steelers May 30, 1970 along with 12th round 1971 draft choice (who turned out to be Bob Wuensch of Texas) for Preston Pearson and Ocie Austin . . . was tremendously impressive right away with his play of the special teams . . . played a lot as fourth linebacker in first Jets game . . . went in early for Bob Grant in ninth and tenth games of season against Buffalo and Miami then started Bears game . . . he



made 13 tackles in that game, nine solos, and was fixture from that point on . . . one of the reasons Colts think they have best linebacking corps in professional football . . . he blocked a field goal in Cincy playoff and intercepted George Blanda in AFC Championship Game on Baltimore 10 with less than four minutes to play and Colts leading 27-17 . . . can also play middle very well, in fact, took over starting job for Pittsburgh when Bill Saul suffered leg injury in 1968 and kept it . . . he was Steelers' fourth round draft choice in 1967 . . . a punishing tackler, he also has great quickness and is at his best in pass coverages.



Placekicker-WR 6-0, 195 Cincinnation PRO: Besides hitting the "Kick Heard Round the World" Jimmy O'Brien, the Colts' mod, rookie kicker had a very consistent season the kick, of course, was a 32-yard field goal with five seconds left in the Super Bowl to defeat Dallas and give the Colts the world championship, 16-13 there was considerable irony surrounding O'Brien's kick provided by his comments the day before the Super Bowl,



after practicing two days on the Orange Bowl's synthetic turf: "I'm worried about kicking on artificial turf," O'Brien said. "I've never kicked well on it. I like to take a divot when I kick and I can't do it on this stuff. I like to get under the ball. My foot is bouncing off this carpet and I'm not kicking well." . . . he proceeded to miss an extra point (it was blocked), almost blew another but hit an attempted 52-yard field goal pretty well

with three grabs for 77 yards, the game he broke his toe ... he caught two for 41 yards against KC, two for 40 against Green

Bay, including a big 26-yarder on third and eight from Baltimore's five yard line in the fourth period that was a critical play in preserving Colt 13-10 victory . . . Perkins had beaten out Willie Richardson in training camp but lost starting job to Roy Jefferson before regular season started ... lined up at running back position to start second Buffalo game . . . he caught 28 passes for 391 yards in '69 and three touchdowns although hampered by injuries . . . carried ball three times for 36 yards on end around that season . . . COLLEGE: A consensus All-American at Penn State, Glenn won the Maxwell Trophy as college player of the year in 1964 ... played an incredible game in Penn State's monumental upset of No. 1 ranked Ohio State in 1964.

PERSONAL: Born May 21,1943 in Dornsife, Pa. ... went to Mahanoy (Pa.) Joint High School ... he and his wife Sandra have one child, a son $(1\frac{1}{2})$... with Oakland and nailed DaryleLamonica on crucial third down play, driving Raiders out of field goal range and Lamonica out of game . . . was at his best in pressure games and playoffs . . . he blocked a field goal against Houston . . . was triple teamed in first Jets' game and still got to Joe Namath and played well . . . in second Boston game Bubba chased Joe Kapp all around Memorial Stadium . . . he finished second in balloting for AP Defensive Player of the Week ... he tipped Namath's pass that Jerry Logan picked off and returned 31 yards for Colts' first touchdown . . . injured ankle in Bears' game and played on it (although he didn't start) against Philadelphia and Buffalo the two succeeding weeks . . . "He just had a fantastic year," says defensive line coach John Sandusky. "He is such a difficult factor to contend with when he comes driving into the backfield. Charlie did a pretty good job on Fred Biletnikoff in championship game except for 38-yard TD pass when he slipped ... had three interceptions on the season ... pulled a muscle early in camp and didn't start in pre season until fourth game against Miami... played well in Super Bowl.

van once said. "There's just a great deal of satisfaction in going home after a winning game and knowing you did your job; knowing you protected your quarterback, and seeing him have a good day behind you. There's a special feeling a lineman has for his quarterback." . . . "It's a coaching pleasure to work with a man like Dan Sullivan," said George Young . . "Temperament has a lot to do with the way anyone plays," Sullivan says. "For defense, they like a little extra aggressiveness. PRO: Johnny Unitas has completed more passes for more yardage and more touchdowns and more mileage than any player in N. F. L. history in commemoration of the 50th anniversary of the NFL he was selected as the greatest quarterback of all time . . . he was also named Player of the Decade by the Associated Press, outpolling second place Bart Starr by over 100 votes . . . his credentials read;



2,616 completions in 4,777 attempts (54.8 percent) for 37,715 yards, 280 touchdowns and over 21 miles . . . one of his most incredible accomplishments is the streak of 47 straight games throwing a touchdown pass, recorded from 1956-60 ... Unitas holds NFL records for most passes attempted in a career, most games passed for 300 yards or more (25), most touchdown passes in a career and most consecutive games throwing a TD pass...he also holds the league record for passing yardage in a championship game with 349 against the Giants in 1958 . . . he holds club records for most passes completed in one season (255), most passes attempted for one season (436), most yards gained passing in one game (401), best passing efficiency (58.5 percent), yards passing in one season (3,481), and naturally every career club passing mark . . . it was in the famed sudden death thriller in Yankee Stadium in 1958 that Unitas' performance caused widespread agreement that it was the "Greatest Game Ever Played" ... "Quarterbacks can't permit themselves to think of injuries," Unitas has said, "or they'll leave their game in the locker room." . . . and yet Unitas' entire, brilliant career has been sprinkled with injuries . . . the last big one was in 1968 when he missed most of the season . . . in 1970, at the age of 37, John Unitas added another jewel to his legendary era -he led the Colts to the first American Football Conference championship with not necessarily a super-statistical season -- 166 for 321 for 2,213 yards (51.7 percent), 14 touchdowns and 18 interceptions -- but his brilliant leadership again prevailed as he bailed out the Colts with four late heroics . . . he guided the game-winning drive at San Diego which set up O'Brien's FG . . . he hit Jefferson for a 55-yard TD pass with 1:58 to put the Boston game away . . . he connected with Jefferson again with 0:46 remaining for a 31-yard touchdown at Houston to beat the Oilers 24-20 . . . he found John Mackey open for a 54-yard TD with 3:47 left to beat Chicago 21-20 . . . he tossed two touchdown passes in the playoff game against Cincinnati -- 45 yards to Jefferson, 53 yards to Eddie Hinton . . . he was 11 for 29 but threw for 245 yards in AFC title game including 68-yard scoring pass to Ray Perkins that assured victory . . . John suffered rib injury when he was nailed by George Andrie in Super Bowl at the end of the first half and never returned to action . . . there is much uncertainty surrounding Unitas' playing career after he ruptured his right Achilles tendon on April 7 . . . he was named winner of NEA Third Down Trophy as Most Valuable Player for 1970 season by a vote of his teammates ... Unitas is a three-time NFL Most Valuable Player (1957, 64, 67) ... he has been All-Pro six times and selected to the Pro Bowl 10 times . . .

he was a ninth round draft choice of the Pittsburgh Steelers in 1955, cut without playing one play in pre-season games and picked up as a free agent by the Colts in 1956 after playing a year of sandlot ball with the Bloomfield (Pa.) Rams . . . in 1956 Colt quarterback George Shaw got hurt; Unitas took over, and similar to the Wally Pipp-Lou Gehrig Legend, got his chance and simply became the greatest quarterback who ever played the game. Pro Bowl -- 1957, 58, 59, 61, 62, 63, 64, 67. All Pro -- 1957, 58, 59, 64, 65, 67.

COLLEGE: Had an outstanding career as a quarterback at the University of Louisville . . . passed for over 3,000 yards and threw 27 touchdown passes.

PERSONAL: Born May 7, 1933 in Pittsburgh, where he went to St. Justin's High School ... lives in Lutherville, Md. .. has five children -- Janice (15), John (14), Bob (12), Chris (11), Kenneth (3) ... owns a restaurant in Towson with Bobby Boyd ... this past off season Unitas received two prestigious awards --- The NFL Man of the Year Award by ballot of the nation's fans conducted by Vitalis. The award resulted in five Baltimore area youths sharing \$25,000 in scholarship money and the Gold Medal Award by Pennsylvania presented the Broadcasters Pennsylvania's full compliment of Senators and Representatives for outstanding achievement by a Pennsylvanian . . . John was only the second sports figure to receive the honor.





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
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
