Council Prunes \$90,000 From Estimates --- Mayor Anscomb Stresses Importance of 40-Mill Rate

OVER \$90,000 was alloed from the controllable expenditures con-tained in the 1930 city budget by the City Council last night, during a four-hour special session at the City Hall. The council will further dis-cuss the budget tonight, at 7:30 o'clock.

Clack, the braget songht, as introduced to the City Council last Monday night by City Comptroller D. A. Mac-donaid, was about six mills, or some \$250,000, in excess of what a forty-mill rate and the usual recipts would bring in. Therefore it will be neces-sary for the council to further cut the estimates approximately \$160,000 if the city is to enjoy a forty will levy in 1930.

levy in 1930. After a lengthy debate, the coun-cil decided to include in the esti-mates a vote of \$15,000 for replacing block paying with asphalt on some streets in the downtown section of the city which require these im-provements.

ESTIMATES DELETED ESTIMATES DELETED The council, however, deiced from the budget estimates of 445,000 for improvements to the Dardamelies on Fort Street, and of \$16,000 for im-provements to Pandora Arenue, be-tween Fort and Elford Streets. The council recognized the impossibility of carrying out these latter projects out of general revenue, and there-fore it is apparent that when the development of these two main arteries is undertaken, it must be done by a process of a loan, which would, of course, be voted upon by the ratepayers beforehand. Mayor Herbert Anscend strangly strassed the importance of artiking a forty-mill rate, which would be a reduction of ohe mill from the 1929 levy.



SUCCESSION DUTIES

SUCCESSION DUTTES Premier Tolmie during his eighteen months in office has shown a keen disposition to do what is in the best interests of the province. He and his Cabinet have had an onerous duty to perform. The exchequer was depleted when they came into power; there had been an era of spendthrift seal; the debt had reached unduly excessive proportions and taxation still lies in the nature of an incubus on prosperity and de-velopment in the province. These were among is the problems with which Dr. Tolmie and his Government have had to wrestle. How far they have gone in the process will become apparent when the Budget is brought down during the coming session. The Government, no doubt, has canvassed the financial situation in all its bear-ings. Auditors have been at work and definite proposals for reformation in the financial struc-ture and relief for the taxpayers should now be ready. ready

In reference to the latter one of the most solid solid methods in promoting capital investment would be the abolition of Succession Duties. They comprise one of the most irksome forms of taxa tion, and, incidentally, they are imposts which definitely operate against provincial develop-They are a penalty on thrift because they carry taxation beyond the grave. We urge our people to become landowners and yet carry on the contradictory policy of adding to the burden of taxation on land. In this taxation Succession Duties are placed as an obstacle against develop ment, and in large measure the land bears this form of impost. Some relief was attempted in the matter of Succession Duties at the last ses-In our import succession Dutles at the last ses-n of the Legislature by the exemption of life urance policies from the tax up to a certain iount. Apparently there is a flaw in this endment which has enabled estates to escape rond the point proposed. The best and most pular way of overcoming this flaw is to abro-ie the Succession Dutles Act altogether. This wince is by far too young in its process of de-opment to be handleapped in this way. EXCAVATING ROME

By word and deed Signor Mussolini has shown By word and deed Signor Mussolini has snown his determination to revive in the hearts of all Italians his own passionate love for ancient Rome, and bring her traditions and aspirations into their daily lives. On the first anniversary of the march on Rome he laid a wreath on the altar of the Forum Magnum, where the body of Caesar had been cremated; and the work of excavating the Imperial Fora was inacquirated by the King and Signor Mussolini in April, 1926, the birthday of Rome, chosen as the Fascist Labor

birthnay of Rohe, chosen as the Fastes Labor festival. Under the old regime, over twenty years ago, Senator Carrodo Ricci, then Director-General of Fine Arts, conceived the idea of restoring and isolating the Imperial Fora; but money being scarce he was destined to await the dynamic Fascist Government before dreams could become realities. He had concentrated his studies al-ways on the Forum of Trajan, the last and most beautiful of the Imperial Fora. This was a great square with an equestrian statue of the Emperor Trajan, approached by means of a triumphal arch and fanked by two colossal curved wings and with two extreme exedite at the extremity of the adjoining Basilica Uipia. The basilica opened out into the square of the column of Trajan with its spiral band of reliefs containing 2,000 human figures; from thence the worshipper 2,500 human figures; from thence the worshipper mounted the steps to the Temple of Mars. A writer in the fourth century described this Forum as a work "which even the gods cannot heip admiring;" Two centuries late Pope Gregory the Great prayed that the soul of the man who had built so wonderful a monument might not omed to perdition, and in a vision he was toid of Trajan's salvation

toid of Trajan's salvation. To make this Forum, the architect, Apollodorus of Damascus, had cut through the ridge between the quirinal and the Capitoline hills to the height of Trajan's column. In order to sustain the shelving slope of the hill which had been cut away, he iaid out great hemicycles on the east side, separated from the actual Forum by a paved road and made use of them as shops. The hemi-cycles disappeared beneath mediaeval and mod-ern erections of all kinds, and some authorities even doubted their existence. Corrado Ricci de-termined to find the building of Apollodorus, and started work on the site. In two years some started work on the site. In two years some 13,000 square metres of earth were removed, and last Autumn the greater part of Trajan's market was uncovered, showing rows of shops, or tab-ernae. The subsoil of Rome is rich beyond the dreams of avarice, and much is expected to come to light from the Forum of Trajan. Only a few weeks ago Senator Ricci noticed that the threshold of one of the shops in this market was made of marbie. Carefully freeing it from earth he found a marble slab six feet long by two fee wide with four niches framed in olive wreaths each one containing a life-sized head.
