Some antiquarian has been overhauling the minute-books of the City Council for 1872, and finds it therein set forth that Mr. C. McK. SMITH, ostensible proprietor of the Standard, made application to the City Council for a franchise to lay pipes and supply the City with gas at a rate not to exceed \$4 per thousand feet. The application was couched in the following language:

VICTORIA, B.C., March 26, 1872. To the Mayor and Council of the City of Victoria.

of rectoria.

Gentlemen:—Being desirous of supplying the city of Victoria with gas at moderate rates, it is my intention, in conjunction with others, to form a company to be called the British Columbia Gas Company, who shall undertake to supply consumers with good gas at not eeding \$4 per 1000 cubic feet. It is the intention of the company to commence operations as soon as the neces sary arrangements can be made; but before doing so consider it their duty to communicate with your honorable body, requiring permission for the laying down, relaying and connecting and repairing all pipes along, through, under and over the streets, alleys, grounds and thoroughfares of the city that may be necessary for supplying to the con-sumers thereof. I, therefore, on be half of myself and others who may form the company, request your honor able body to grant permission as afore said for the purposes herein mentioned, and that this application may be approved of and entered on the minutes of the corporation of the city of Victoria. I remain, gentlemen,

A committee of the Council was appointed to inquire into the bonafides of Mr. Smith, and on the 10th April following reported as follows:

"We, your committee, appointed to consider the application of Mr. Charles McK. Smith, on behalf of a company, to be called the British Columbia Gas Company, for permission to lay down, relay, connect and repair certain pipes along, through, under and over the streets, grounds, alleys and thoroughfares of this city, beg leave to report as follows: They have made due inquiry into the nature and character of the proposed gas, and hav-ing been assured that it is of a non-explosive nature and free from any smell in connection with the manufacture thereof, and as it is represented that the said gas can and will be furnished to the citizens at a greatly reduced price compared with the present rates for gas, and the illuminating power thereof is considerably greater than that now in use, your committee would therefore recommend that this council comply with the request of the appli-cants subject to a by-law which may hereafter be passed by this council, defining the duties of the said company, as the council may deem necessary.

We have seen a telegram in which the intention of Hon. H. L. Langevin—who was Minister of Public Works in Sir John Macdonald's Government, and who visited British Columbia shortly after Confederation—to stand for the Commons in the adjacent district of Vancouver, is an-Mr. Langevin was defeated at Rimouski, Quebec, at the recent election, and is at present without a seat. It is understood that an effort will be made to secure the election of Mr. Langevin by acsecure the election of Mr. Langevin by acclamation, by inducing the retirement of Messrs. Bunster, McLellan, Jessop, Gordon and Pagden, the present candidates. The following brief review of Mr. Langevin and his career we take from the Parliamentary Companion for 1872:

"Son of the late Jean Langevin, Esq., formerly Asst. Civil Secretary to the Earl

Sat as a member of the City Council, Quebec, for some years, and was chairman of the Water Works Committee. Was secretary-treasurer of the North Shore Railway Co.; Mayor of Quebec from 1857 to 1860, and during his incumbency visited England on matters affecting the city finances, &c. President of the St. Lore Earlier Society. President of the St. Jean Baptiste Society (Quebec), 1861-2; and of the Institute Canadien same city, 1863-64. Author of Le Canadien, see Institutions, &c., an essay, (Quebec 1855), and of Droit Administratif Manuel des Paroisses et Fabriqe (do. 32.) Was a member of the ex-Council. on Manuel des Larouses et Larouse (1862.) Was a member of the ex-Council, Canada, from March, 1864, until the Union; Solicitor-General L. C. from March, General from latter date until the Union Was sworn to the Privy Council and ap July, 1867, in which office he remained until transferred to the Public Works, 9th December, 1869. Was, while at the State Department, ex-officio Registrar-General of Canada, and Superintendent General of Indian Affairs. EXTRADITION CASE.—United States rs.
Ah See. Mr. McCreight, Q. C., for the prosecution, examined two witnesses— Seattle constables, named Thornton and Jordan. They proved the murder of Ah Yow on Washington street, Seattle, by shooting three pistol shots at 2 a.m. on 4th of July, 1878.

On cross-examination by Mr. Drake, counsel for the prisoner, the witnesses could not identify Ah See as the murderer, although one had seen him at Scat-tle previous to the occurrence. Mr. Drake suggested that his apprehension

was the result of a Chinese conspiracy.

Mr. Justice Crease adjourned the examination till Thursday next at 11 a.m. for the production of further witnesses. The points of general interest were that the application for extradition is made under the Ashburton Treaty of June, 1842, and Canadian Act, 41 Vict., C. 25, which, under the authority of the cases referred to by the Judge, allows the examination and committal of a fugitive criminal to take place in B. C. before any requisition from the United States, although no surrender can take place un til the U. S. Government make a formal requisition for the surronder, and the Governor-General issues his warrant for the delivery of the prisoner so committed to the U. S. Authorities.

THE GREAT BOAT RACE.

Fivo Mile Race at Montreal— The American Beaten—An Exciting Contest.

MONTREAL, Oct. 3.-Fully 10,000 people witnessed the Hanlon-Courtney race to-day. Hanlon won the choic of position and took the outside, there by getting to the lee of Isle Dorval. Both men as they passed toward the starting point were heartily cheered They were both in splendid condition. With considerable dexterity they wheeled their boats into line, the latter being immediately taken hold of and held by parties stationed at the starting buoys. "Go" was given at 4:56. The men dipped their sculls together and sent their shells forward with terrific force, Hanlon making 31 and Courtney 33 strokes to the minute. They appeared to be taking it easily for the first half mile. A "waiting race" was seemingly determined on Up to the first half mile buoy no perceptible difference could be discerned.

The men were pulling a slow and reckless support appears to have begiven to builders. The immediate coff the failure was the impossibility of steady stroke, Courtney especially so. Their style of rowing was somewhat similar, the American being a little jerky as compared with his rival's full, casy and graceful sweep. Before reaching the half-mile signal boat, Hanlon drove the nose of his craft in advance of Courtney's shell. He maintained his position until he passed, when the red flag went up, indicating Hanlon's supremacy so far. Rain now began to fall briskly, but did not last more than a few minutes. On approaching the two mile signal boat, Hanlon drew to the front and passed about a length and a half ahead. Time of second mile, 9 minutes. At Isle Dorval, Courtney rowed a tremendous atroke, steering straight for his turn buoy, but having diverged very much by getting under the lee of the island. Hanlon obtained a slight advantage and drew almost imperceptibly ahead, turn-England. ing his rounding buoy in 21 minutes and 25 seconds from the start, Courtney only about five seconds behind. Both men lay to their oars, and with any amount of vim strove to obtain an advantage, but unsuccessfully. At this time only about the length of a boat and a half separated them, their boats

being nearly abreast the press boat which had laid to. When they passed the buoys on their return they swept past in magnificent style, each one bending to his work with a will and nerved by the cheers of the spectators. The third mile was completed in nine minutes. Very little change took place in the fourth mile, which was done in six minutes, the men pulling with all their might. At the com-mencement of the fifth and last mile Hanlon took the lead, pulling 33, and Courtney 36 to the minute. down the homestretch some skill was displayed, but both men created considerable consternation among their backers by veering too much to the south, and rendering it necessary for both to recover ground. Hanlon eventually came in winner in 36 minutes 22 seconds. Before reaching the goal Courtney stopped rowing to avoid foul, having got into Hanlon's water. The Great Bank Failure.

LONDON, Oct. 3 .- The Times, in nancial article, states that the City of Hasgow Bank had one hundred and hirty-three branches. It had a progressthirty-three branches. It had a progress-ively increasing dividend for several years past, until it reached 12 per cent. It would be incorrect to say that the disaster was unexpected. On the contrary, in banking circles it created no surprise, for the latest section with the banking circles it created no surprise, for the bank had been losing credit gradually for ten years past, yet the Scotch banks in London were not in possession of infor-mation which showed that the end was actually near until Tuesday morning. Rumors of the bank being in difficulty had been so often circulated before with-in strictly banking circles, that a repeti-tion of the white travets a particular in tion of them did not excite particular interest on this occasion. The business of the bank had been conducted for years upon unsound principles, and from the fact that other Scotch banks having decided to let the bank stop, it is inferred that it is a bad case. Operations upon an enor-mous scale had been indirectly entered into with Indian produce and Australian wool, some \$14,000,000 having been accepted for the account of three firms. Large advances had been made to firms in the iron trade in the north and utterly longer getting bills drawn from India on the bank in Glasgow. Its bills were dis-counted in the London market, a circumstance which explains to some extent the feverish oscillation. For some months past, in rates demanded for loans, these bills had been sold in India to Indian banks ostensibly against the shipment of produce, and ultimately came upon the discount market and the terms of necotiating having steadily advanced, instructions were at length telegraphed to Indian branches to take no more bills, and so soon as it was no longer possible to keep the open credit system going and paper afloat the bank closed its doors. The liabilities of the bank are estimated at \$50, 000,000; acceptances slightly below \$15, unlimited liability of shareholders may perhaps secure depositors. The authorized note circulation was only £72,000, but ed note circulation was any all states, according to last accounts the issue is between £600,000 and £700,000, against pearly all which the law compels to have between £500,000 and £700,000, against nearly all which the law compels to have gold. We believe we are correct in saying that the deplorable catastrophe is with reference to Scotch banks entirely an exception, and that no other banking institution in Sactland is in recommended. tution in Scotland is in any way mixed up with the City of Glasgow bank, or hes been engaged in a business of a kind which led to this failure. Attempts have been made in India to complicate matters by saying that there was a panic, but there has been no panic. The Bank of England is in an exceptionally strong posi-tion relatively to the extent of business going on, and the state of affairs is very different to what it would have been had disaster happened to a bank whose soundness had been above suspicion. The Financier anticipates no additional bank failures, but it says some mercantile failures can hardly be avoided, which may extend into the iron districts of North MR. JUSTICE KEOGH.—The Times


