TENNYSON'S GOOSE.

The prosaic title of one of the laureate's poems is "The Goose," to which he gives no key, and offers no explanation. It is capable, probably, of several explanations. Let me attempt one. Education is a goose! Nay, gentle reader, don't be affronted. Have patience and I will explain. I do not mean the iron goose of the famous nine knights of the needle that together made a man. Neither do I refer to the world-wide famed "Mother" of the nuisery rhymes. And if you should ask whether I meant the historic fowl of that ilk which saved the capital of the Romans, I should have to answer, "You haven't hit yet." I mean that it is the goose that lays the golden eggs. See if it is not. The poet describes an "old wife, lean and poor," whose "rags scarce held together." Let that represent the tatterdemalions of uncultured ignorance. "Where strode a stranger to the door;" call that the teacher. "And it was windy weather." The true teacher, as a general thing, has either to go against the wind of prejudice, or raise the wind of excitement, or both, in order to secure attention to his mission. "He held a goose upon his arm." That means education. "He uttered rhyme and reason." That comes from being cultured and well educated himself. "Here, take the goose, and keep you warm," he said. The teacher is anxious to share his treasures with others. The lean and poor "old wife," in that awkward and abrupt manner so characterictic of the rude and lettered, accepts the offer. "She caught the white goose by the leg." Ignorance is always impolite. What need was there of any special manners in accepting and handling a goose? "A goose 'twas—no great matter." Ignorance is conceited, and never has a realizing sense of the great value of education until it begins to acquire it. It soon transpires that this was no common goose: "the goose let fall a golden egg." Ah! here was indeed a discovery. A goose like this was worth having. Education will prove that to any one who gives it a chance. Her "golden eggs" have enriched the ages. The poet's old lady "went for "the gold, "She dropped the goose and caught the pelf, and ran to tell her neighbors; and blessed herself, and cursed herself, and rested from her labors." Of course she cursed herself if at the sight of the first glittering treasure "she dropped the goese and rested from her labors." She did what the young lady did on graduating day—"considered her edication finished." Education is a life-work. The teacher only puts us in the way of acquiring lossession of greater and still greater treasures. The goose in this case was abused and neglected. Agassiz had "had no time make money." The dazzling bait of so much a night for lecturing could not tempt him. The teacher's work was far above that. And the effect of that work on others comes short of the goal if it does not lift its subject high above mere sordid lust. The true discipline and development of manhood and womanhood must take place first of all. Ignorance and rudeness are the same everywhere—the same, whether in rags or clad in relyet and satin. And culture and gentility remain unchanged whether shining in plush and gold, or found in coarse array. Tennyson's "old wife," even after fortune favored her with "the pelf," and she,

"Feeding high and living soft,

"Feeding high and living soft,
Grew plump and able bodied;
Until the grave churchwarden doffed,
The parson smirked and nodded"—

proved to be the same unchanged old crone as when lean and poor and illfavored. The cat transformed into a godcrone as when tean and poor and ill-favored. The cat transformed into a goddess in the fable, and married to a noble husband, divulged her old feline nature the moment she heard a mouse squeal. So a happy chance occurred which "stirred the old wife's mettle;" and, behold, the lady could bandy curses, use billingsgate generally, "hurl the pan and kettle," and stir a common rumpus in which we hear mingling with her words, which are piped on a high key, the yelp of the cur, the yawl of the cat; and in which we see Gaffer running, Gammer stumbling, the tables dancing, the housekeeper with her cap and hair and gown all awry in the wind, and the house filled with clamor, "as head and heels upon the floor they floundered all together!" "All that glitters is not gold," and gold acquired for its own sake will not cause a glistening refinement to appear in the man or the woman. Shoddy is over ungrateful, cursing the goose that filled its nests. True learning never results in shoddy.

No wonder we read that the "stranger" came again, and with "uttered words of scorning, took the goose upon his arm," and departed. Education acquired partially and indolently, and with unworthy views of its worth, never blesses nor refines its possessor; and in nine cases out of ten is soon lost again. This moral of the poem also leads us within hearing of the solemn-voiced warning to "the angel of the church of Ephesus": "Remember, therefore, from whence thou art fallen, and repent, and to the first works; or, else I will come unto thee quickly, and will remove thy candlestick out of his place."

We then contended that whilst Pine River Pass are incomes of even instinction in order was in course of examination, in order to afford protection to the community as well as to open up a splendid section of the country, a line from Yale to Savona should be built, submitting at the same time that the railway to connect Esquimalt with Nanaimo ought to be simultaneously commenced. though our efforts to secure the construction of the Island railway have not been rewarded with that success to which they were entitled, it is, nevertheless, gratifying to us to observe that the grounds we took with respect to the Yale-Savona line have at last been adopted by the Dominion Government. The people have battled manifully with the depression which during the past two or three years has pre-vailed, not only in Canada, but in England and throughout European countries, and it would be gratifying indeed if the stability and perseverance characteristic of British Columbians were rewarded with a prosperous era such as has never been experienced in the Province. We hope we shall not be considered visionary when we assert that the cloud which has rested so heavily of late on Provincial industries is about to disclose its silver lining. We can see depicted before us innumerable benefits resulting from the construction of this promised link of the railway. Our young men, who now walk the streets in idleness, or have emigrated to a foreign country, not of their own will, but because their sincere efforts to obtain employment here have in a large majority of cases been unsuccessful, will be afforded an opportunity to gain a good livelihood. The wages they will earn will bring comfort to many homes, and the money they must ex-pend for the necessaries of life will stimulate business and give to the trader, who was lately disconsolate and apprehensive of bankruptcy, a smiling countenance and a contented mind. The Cruise of the Iris.

SHE IS WRECKED AT CADRORO BAY.

Hairbreath 'Scapes -- Gallant Conduct -- All Hands Saved. On Friday morning the handsome, commodious and well-found steam-yacht Iris sailed from this harbor to receive a party on board at Cordova Bay and thence proceed on a duck-slaughtering expedition to the Fraser flats. The yacht was well provisioned for a long cruise, having a barrel of Stuart & Keast's celebrated ale on board. There were also a number of fowling-pieces and several well-trained dogs—the latter of whom relieved the tedium of the passage by occasional yelps and whines which had the effect on the spirits of those on board of a local brass band in full cry. The afternoon proved squally. Dense masses party on board at Cordova Bay and thence afternoon proved squally. How is it that the Court charges are so much more here than the costs of the same Court in England, where a summons costs either three or four shillings, and that includes all the expenses of Court, whereas the expense of a summons here in British Columbia is \$2, besides \$1.25 more in addition, making in all \$3.25, and that amount according to exchange would be between 13 or 14 shillings sterling?

We assume that the scale of charges is fixed by statute, and that due allow ance in framing it was had for the difference in the cost of living here and in England. Law is an expensive luxury at best, and no one should resort to it who has not a long purse and a thoroughly good case.—Editor.]


