Russian Protectorate Over Persia. LONDON, Sept. 25.—The commercial treaty now being negotiated between Russia and Persia will provide for the relegating of the duty of representing countries abroad to single representatives.

Germany Interested in Russian Loan. LONDON, Sept. 25.—The Berlin correspondent of the Times says that the participation of Germany in the Russian loan is proof that even Cronstadt had not had the lasting effects in Berlin that the French press imagined.

The King of Servia Betrothed. BELGRADE, Sept. 25.—It is reported that the King of Servia is betrothed to Princess Helena, of Montenegro.

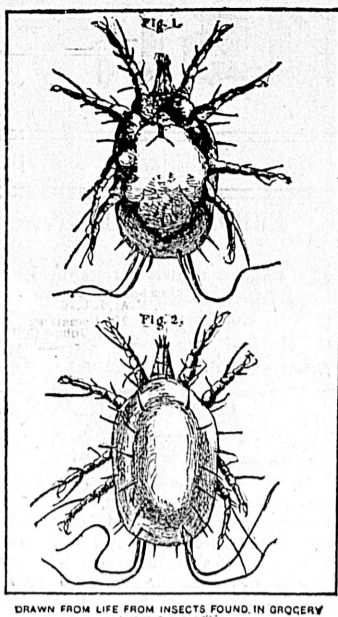

Misery and Distress in the Czar's Empire--Strong Appeals for Help--Maddened People Seize the Corn Loaded for Export.

New York, Sept. 25.—A St. Petersburg correspondent of the Recorder writes that while the horizon of the empire is black with war clouds, a more subtle and persistent foe has entered the Czar's kingdom.

Numerous outbreaks have occurred in several provinces. In the town of Shavii, which is the corn mart of the province of Kovno, the maddened people took possession of the railway station, while others formed themselves into bands and went out on the highways to intercept all carts containing corn.

On August 18, a town in the province of Vilna was the scene of a wild outbreak of fury on the part of the people. A crowd, headed by a number of Jews, took possession of a quantity of corn stored at a station ready for export.

In some families in the stricken districts the scenes witnessed are beyond description. Troops of peasants wander from village to village begging piteously, and crying: "Give us bread, bread."

In the Konstadtova district peasants driven to desperation, burst in the granary doors, and the leaders of the raid dealt corn out to the starving people, rich and poor receiving share and share alike.

In the Caucasus matters are even worse, and it is no longer safe for a stranger to travel its byways and highways, for the peasants in their despair attack those who pass that way in the hope of securing money with which to buy food.

Many villages are the scene of the wildest excitement, and the Czar's officials are said to have become so terrorized as to have lost entire control of the people.

SPORTS AND PASTIMES.

Tacoma's Marksmen Again Defeat the Union Gun Club, of Victoria.

Opening of the Football Season—The Dockyard Eleven Scores a Victory.

To the Tacoma Rifle, Rod and Gun Club belongs the honor of having twice defeated the Unions of this city—at the City of Destiny a few weeks ago, and in Victoria, yesterday.

The visitors arrived over by the Victorian, yesterday morning, and made their way to the Driving Park at 10 o'clock, at which hour a few sweepstakes were shot to enable the Tacoma marksmen to get accustomed to the traps. Light and weather were all that could be desired, and the visitors expressed themselves as well pleased with the grounds and the arrangements for the contest.

After enjoying an appetizing lunch provided by Harry Stone, the match proper was commenced, in the presence of several hundred visitors, at 2 p.m. It was close and exciting to the finish, although several of the Victorians fell off badly. Bassford, Minor, Short, A. R. Langley and John were the main support of the Unions, piling up steady, reliable scores.

The match was upon 25 Peoria blackbirds for each man, and the scores obtained are given hereunder:

In the evening the guests of the day were banqueted with becoming honors at Hotel Dallas. The dinner, with songs, speeches and many expressions of friendship and good will, making a fitting ending to the pleasant day.

FOOTBALL. The opening Rugby match of the season was played, yesterday afternoon, before a large number of spectators, the rival teams being H. M. Navy and the Victoria Football Club.

The play was very fast and after a quarter of an hour the Navy scored the first point. The try, which was a difficult one, did not result in a goal, and the Victoria team shortly afterwards rushed the ball down the field and secured a try, which Ward converted into a goal. Soon after half time, the Navy got the ball behind again and the kick resulted in a goal; and five minutes before "no side" was called, Victoria got in, but the try was not improved upon. Victoria secured one more try which was not allowed by the Navy's umpire, and the game, therefore, ended in a draw, one goal and one try being scored by each side.

Ward, Bayne, Langley and Haines played well for the home team; while Graham, Strickland and Hodges did good service for the Navy. The game was well contested and most friendly on both sides. Mr. E. C. Carpenter officiated as referee.

The Victoria Football Club will hold their second annual athletic meeting, on Saturday, 24th October, when a good programme will be provided and all amateurs are invited to compete.

CRICKET. The match at Beacon Hill, yesterday, between Mr. Martin's eleven of the Victoria Cricket Club and the Royal Dockyard team was won by the latter upon the first innings, the second being barely entered upon when the match closed. Pike, for the dockyard men piled up a score of 24, and Martin for the city ran up 22, before falling to Medway's bowling. Perry's bowling was one of the best features of the game. QUITS. Yesterday the pleasant sunny weather, with a nice cool breeze, made it very agreeable for quiting at Fairbrother's grounds.

There was a good attendance, and some capital play was exhibited. The event of the afternoon was a match between Walter Nathan and Walter Adamthwaite, 18 yards, 3 pound quits, 50 points, the latter getting in the winner by 10 points. The play was very close throughout. During the game Walter Nathan obtained three "ringers," and "ties" were called three times. Adamthwaite is unquestionably good at quits, and in three encounters with another gentleman came out on the right side.

AGAIN AFLOAT. The "Flying Dutchman" Sets Sail in the Sailer Borealis.

Gustav Amor Hansen, formerly master of the German schooner Adele, notorious for her raids upon the seal rookeries of the Pribilof Islands, has for several weeks past been trying to secure command of a vessel for the purpose of reaping another harvest of sealskins this fall after his own peculiar fashion.

Until yesterday he was unsuccessful, the Victoria sealers having been proud in the past to be able to say that they carried on their business openly and honestly, and could not in justice be termed poachers.

Yesterday morning, however, Hansen appeared at the Custom House as the new master of the Borealis, and asked for clearance papers north.

His intentions were so well known that, before he volunteered any explanation of what he wanted, the Collector informed him that he could give him no clearance for sealing in Behring Sea until the expiration of the Modus Vivendi. This Hansen declared he did not want, so his schooner was given authority to proceed on a hunting and fishing voyage to the North Pacific ocean.

The Borealis, which is one of the smallest schooners in the Victoria fleet, carries on this occasion twelve men, all told, including six expert seal hunters. She is expected to be gone about two months.

COLLECTOR MILNE INVESTIGATES. The Enquiry Into the Seizure of the Otto Commenced Yesterday.

Unlike the Behring Sea question itself, the case of the sealing schooner Otto is likely to be very speedily disposed of.

Collector A. R. Milne received a bundle of papers in the matter from Admiral Holtham, yesterday, accompanying instructions for him to hold an investigation immediately into the alleged irregularities of the ship's papers. In compliance with this request, the Collector opened a court of enquiry, at 3 o'clock, and received the evidence of the master and others interested. The taking of evidence was not completed when the Court adjourned until Monday, when it is altogether probable H. M. S. Nympha will have arrived.

All the schooner's papers are now in the hands of the collector, and he pronounces them perfectly correct and straight to all appearances. By them it is discovered that the Otto's owner is George J. Troop, of Halifax, N.S., Mr. Walter Burns being the accredited agent at Victoria, B.C. In addition to the original charge in regard to irregular papers, the allegation is now brought forward that the schooner's master was warned before leaving port by Commander Turner, of H. M. S. Nympha, not to go to Behring Sea. This Captain Riley denies. He says that he had no conversation upon the subject with Commander Turner, or any other officer of the fleet. Had the warning been given as stated, to the knowledge of the Mohican's officers, sealing men admit that the schooner might, with possible legality, have been seized. This matter was not referred to, however, by the Mohican, and her action, which is deemed as high-handed and unjustifiable, has been already reported in dispatches to both Ottawa and Washington.

BUCKLEY HAS GONE EAST. How the Bribery With Which They Are Connected Was Exposed.

Charles Buckley and Sam. Rainey, who on the San Francisco grand jury are so anxious to interview, were passengers east by the Atlantic express from Vancouver on Thursday, with tickets in their pockets for Montreal. How the bribery with which they are connected was exposed:

Rainey was up to two years ago in charge of the corporation yard of San Francisco. He quietly resigned, giving it out that he had decided to retire from active life and live in peace on his earnings. Instead he was fleeing from the "wrath to come" and dug out of San Francisco as fast as he could. Nothing can be done to either of them, and to the interviewer who approaches them they will be as dumb as clams.

The work of the grand jury in San Francisco is creating a great sensation in that city. The whole scheme of bribery was brought to the notice of the public in a peculiar way. One Charles Paylor, an ex-sergeant-at-arms of the senate and late member of the third house, sued a clique of senators for \$6,000, claiming that that amount was due him as a share of all the bribes received by the clique during the session. The suit was not pressed to a finish, but it woke the people of California.

When the grand jury was drawn Superior Judge W. T. Wallace took it from the hands of the friends of the bribers and secured a set of reputable men. He gave special instructions to the jury to investigate the corruption, holding that the conspirators who planned within the city and county of San Francisco regardless of the fact that Sacramento may have been the seat of operations were triable there.

The faithful have received a severe setback in San Francisco and many politicians of both faiths are fleeing from the city to avoid arrest and trial and even testifying before the inquiry.

THE UPTON STEAMERS. Batavia Not to be Taken off—Not Sufficient Freight Received from Portland.

PORTLAND, Sept. 25.—Geo. H. Whymart, general manager of the Upton line of steamers, who is in the city, says:

"The Batavia will not be taken off the route. Rumors as to what will be done and what will not be done are bound to get out, but this one is entirely unfounded. We now have the three steamships, Batavia, Sussex and Zambesi, the latter belonging to Mr. Upton, on the route, and as things look at present we will keep them there. The line is paying now, but the outlook is not entirely satisfactory.

"We have large cargoes from China and Japan. Our steamers are loaded on every trip, but we must have cargoes for return to the Orient. So far Portland has done but very little. We have had some flour and some lumber. The latter does not pay, and flour has been taken in such small quantities and at such low freight rates that there has not been much in the carrying trade from Portland to the Orient.

"This line cannot be supported by freight one way. We must have return cargoes. Why, it costs about \$125,000 per year to run one of these largest steamers. The Sussex made some \$5,000 or \$6,000 in freight here last trip. Every one of these steamers spends from \$4,000 to \$5,000 here in Portland for stevedores and other expenses.

"Up to the present time the outgoing cargoes from the Northwest have not paid the cost of handling. If you want us to keep up our line we must get freight."

THE WESTMINSTER EXHIBITION.

All who were at the Westminster Exhibition speak of it in the highest terms. They say that it was in every respect what an exhibition should be. Those who had the management of it did their work admirably. The exhibits, both as to number and variety, were a credit to the province.

NOT A "SCANDAL."

Some time ago a paragraph appeared in "Colonias and India" to the effect that the Canadian scandals were not confined to Ottawa or the Eastern parts of the Dominion, for the Times of Victoria, British Columbia, had accused the Hon. F. G. Vernon, Commissioner of Lands and Works for that province, of corruption.

British Columbians have reason to feel pleased that the member of their Government whose character was aspersed did not wait for an official enquiry into the way in which he conducts the business of his department—that he did not need to be dragged by political opponents before a parliamentary committee, but that he took the means open to every citizen, of vindicating his character.

It is not likely that Mr. Vernon cares much for the damages, but it is certain that he cares a very great deal for the vindication of his character by the verdict of the jury. And from a public point of view and for the credit of the province, it is gratifying to find that British Columbia is free from the odium which the corrupt acts of public men in other provinces have brought upon the Dominion.

Attracted by his fame as a preacher, thousands of all denominations went to hear him, and from all that we can learn, the great majority of them were not disappointed. They pronounced him a great preacher, and one of the best signs that they were sincere was that they did not consider his very long sermons too long.

Mr. McNeill enjoyed great advantages in this respect. He was, until long after he reached manhood, one of the common people. We have read somewhere that he occupied the position of a railway porter for many years.

A TALE OF HEROISM.

Father Xavier, a Franciscan Monk, Saves Many Lives During the Spanish Floods.

His Heroic Deeds the Talk of Everyone in Toledo—A Night of Peril.

MADRID, Sept. 25.—In contrast to the numerous instances of cowardice and panic among laymen during the terrible floods which recently devastated a portion of the fair province of Toledo, the conduct of many of the priests was conspicuous for bravery and devotion to duty, and the name that shines bright above all others in this noble work is that of a humble Franciscan monk of Consuegra, Father Xavier.

Wherever the reporters, whose duty it was to record the horrors of the disaster, moved, they heard tales of the heroism and matchless energy of Father Xavier, whose praises were in the mouths of all the people.

There is no exaggeration in saying that this brave man saved scores of lives by his individual efforts on the night of the calamity. That he escaped himself is marvellous, as no risk was too great for him to dare, in the hope of saving the life of some unfortunate wretch borne towards death by the restless deluge.

Your correspondent, today, sought out this hero, and found him so modest and diffident that it was with difficulty that any reference to his deeds during the time of peril could be extracted from his lips. Finally he was induced to describe some of the frightful scenes he had witnessed, and in which he had taken an active part.

After mentioning some of the rescues which, under the presence of God, he had been instrumental in effecting, the monk related a thrilling story of one particular case, which had impressed him more strongly than any others.

He had already helped a number of helpless people to places of safety, and was clinging in almost an exhausted condition to some floating beams, when he thought he heard above the noise of the rushing flood the voice of a woman invoking the aid of the Virgin.

The night was densely dark, and the thunder and lightning were almost continuous, and rain poured down in torrents. Praying to God for help, Father Xavier set out to swim in the direction of the cry he had heard.

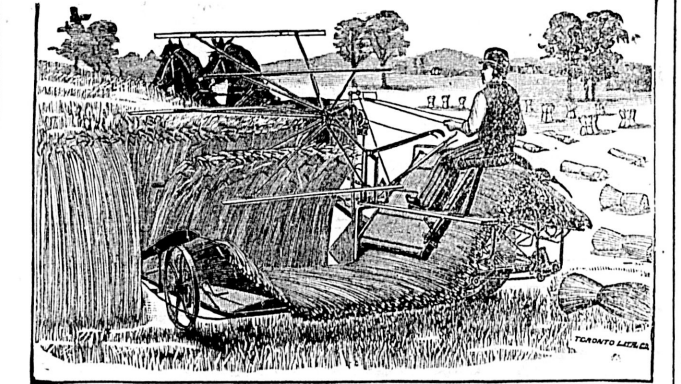

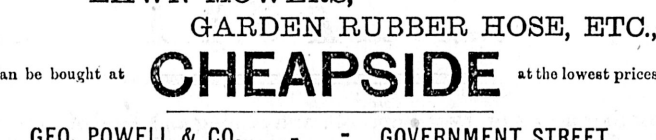
