It was also resolved: "While condemning as cruel and unpatriotic any attempt to make amnesty an instrument of factions, we earnestly commend the question to the sympathy of the Irish people, and hereby summon the county conventions of clergy, delegates to the national conventions of clergy and delegates to the federation, to consider the case of the evicted tenants and our general election policy." 

is making sad havoc with his people. Failure of the crops is every day increasing the distress of the poorer classes and many are the harrassing tales which are told of the misery they are forced to endure.

Local legislatures of more than 20 provinces have appealed to the relief fund of the empire, but the answer has not been one to inspire hope.

Nunicrous outbreaks have occurred in several provinces. In the town of Shavii, which is the corn mart of the province of Kovno, the maddened people took possession of the railway station, while others formed themselves into bands and went out on the highways to intercept all carts containing corn. The police attempted to arrest the leaders, but the crowd interfered and rescued their companions. The military assisted in restoring order.

After the arrival of the police, the railway officials attempted to start the train, but the people prostrated themselves on the rails, shouting: "We would rather die in Siberia than starve here."

His intentions were so well known that, before he volunteered any explanation of what he wanted, the Collector informed him that he could give him no clearance for sealing in Behring Sea until the expiration of the Modus Vivendi. This Hansen declared ho did not want, so his schooner was given authority to proceed on a hunting and ishing voyage to the North Pacific ocean.

The Borealis, which is one of the smallest schooners in the Victoria fleet, carries on this occasion twelve men, all told, including six experts seal hunters. She is expected to be gone about two months.

COLLECTOR MILNE INVESTIGATES.

The Enquiry Into the Seizure of the Otto Commenced Yesterday.

The Enquiry Into the Selzure of the Otto Commenced Yesterday.

Unlike the Behring Sea question itself, the case of the sealing schooner Otto is likely to be very speedily disposed of.

Collector A. R. Milne received a bundle of papers in the matter from Admiral Hotham, yesterday, accompanying instructions for him to hold an investigation immediately into the alleged irregularities of the ship's papers. In compliance with this request, the Collector opened a court of enquiry, at 3 o'clock, and received the evidence of the master and others interested. The taking of evidence was not completed when the Court adjourned until Monday, when it is altogether probable H. M.S. Nymphe will have arrived.

All the schooner's papers are now in the hands of the collector, and he pronounces them perfectly correct and straight to all appearances. By them it is discovered that the Otto's owner is George J. Troop, of Halifax, N.S., Mr. Walter Borns being the accredited agent at Victoria, B.C. In addition to the original charge in regard to irregular papers, the allegation is now brought forward that the schooner's master was warned before leaving port by Commander Turner, of H. M. S. Nymphe, not to go to Behring Sea. This Captain Riley denies. He says that he had no conversation upon the subject with Commander Turner, or any other officer of the fleet. Had the warning been given as stated, to the knowledge of the Mohican's officers, sealing men admit that the schooner might, with possible legality, have been seized. This matter was not referred to, however, by the Mohican, and her action, which is denounced as high-handed and unjustifiable, has been already reported in dispatches to both Ottawa and Washington.

BUCKLEY HAS GONE EAST.

How the Bribery With Which They Are Con-nected Was Exposed.

How the Bribery With Which They Are Connected Was Exposed.

Charles Buckley and Sam. Rainey, whom the San Francisco grand jury are so anxious to interview, were passengers east by the Atlantic express from Vancouver on Thursday, with tickets in their pockets for Montreal. How the bribery with which they are connected was exposed:

Rainey was up to two years ago in charge of the corporation yard of San Francisco. He quietly resigned, giving it out that he had decided to retire from active life and live in peace on his earnings. Instead he was fleeing from the "wroth to come" and dug out of San Francisco as fast as he could. Nothing can be done to either of them, and to the interviewer who approaches them they will be as dumb as clams.

The work of the grand jury in San Francisco is creating a great sensation in that city. The whole scheme of bribery was brought to the notice of the public in a peculiar way. One Charles Faylor, an exsergeant-at-arms of the senate and late member of the third house, used a clique of senators for \$6,000, claiming that that amount was due him as a share of all the bribes received by the clique during the session. The suit was not pressed to a finish, but it woke the people of California up. When the grand jury was drawn Superior Judge W. T. Wallace took it from the hands of the friends of the bribers and secured a set of reputable men. He gave special instructions to the jury to investigate the corruption, holding that the conspirators who planned within the city and county of San Francisco regardless of the fact that Sacramento may have been the seat of operations were triable there.

The faithful have received a severe setback in San Francisco and many politicians of both faiths are fleeting from the city to avoid arrest and trial and even testifying before the inquiry.

THE UPTON STEAMERS.

Batavia Not to be Taken off-Not Sufficient Freights Received from Portland.

PORTLAND, Sept. 25 .- Geo. H. Whymart, general manager of the Upton line of steam ers, who is in the city, says:

"The Batavia will not be taken off the route. Rumors as to what will be done and what will not be done are bound to get out,

route. Rumors as to what will be done and what will not be done are bound to get out, but this one is entirely unfounded. We now have the three steamships, Batavia, Sussex and Zambesi, the latter belonging to Mr. Upton, on the route, and as things look at present we will keep them there. The line is paying now, but the outlook is not entirely satisfactory.

"We have large cargoes from China and Japan. Our steamers are loaded on every trip, but we must have cargoes for return to the Orient. So far Portland has done but very little. We have had some flour and some lumber. The latter does not pay, and flour has been taken in such small quantities and at such low freight rates that there has not been much in the carrying trade from Portland to the Orient.

"This line cannot be supported by freight only one way. We must have return cargoes. Why, it costs about \$125,000 per year to run one of these largesteamers. The Sussex made some \$3,000 or \$6,000 in freight here last trip. Every one of these steamers spends from \$4,000 to \$5,000 here in Portland for stevedores and other expenses.

"Up to the present time the outgoing cargoes from the Northwest have not paid the cost of handling. If you want us to keep up our line we must get freight."



PREACHERS AND PREACHING.

The Rev. John McNeil, one of the most popular of the pulpit orators of Great Britain, has been preaching to immense audiences in Montreal and Toronto. Attracted by his fame as a preacher, thousands of all denominations went to hear him, and from all that we can learn, the great majority of them were not disappointed. They pronounced him a great preacher, and one of the best signs that they were sincere was that they did not consider his very long sermons too lorg.

Among others the Presbyterian clergymen

of Toronto were pleased with Mr. McNeill and were edified by his preaching. They observed, too, its effect on his hearers of all classes. Wishing, if possible, to learn the secret of his success they invited him to address them on the subject of preaching. He complied with their request, and met them in the Board Room of the Presbyterian denomination. The room was crowded with preachers who were most desirous to get instruction on the art and mystery of preaching. Mr. McNeil gave them this advice: (1.) Be sympathetic, and enter into the feelings and point of view of your audience. (2.) Abandon the conventionalities of the pulpit. (3.) Preach extemporaneously. In short he told the clergymen that if they wanted to preach effectively, to convince and persuade their hearers, they must benatural. This was excellent advice, but how many of his hearers were in a position to profit by it? They had nearly all acquired an artificial manner, and most of them spoke a language in the pulpit which the audiences neve hear anywhere else. Besides, a few of them have formed false ideas of what constitutes excellence in preaching, and others feel that there is a dignity of the pulpit which must be maintained at all risks and at any cost. The whole education of the average preacher is unfavorable to his be-



REV. DR. BURCHARD DEAD.

Politically Notorious as the Author of "Run Romanism and Rebellion."

SARATOGA, N. Y., Sept. 25.-Rev. S. D. Burchard died at 4 p.m.

Samuel Dickinson Burchard was born in Steuben, N. Y., Sept. 6, 1812. He gradu ated at Danville in 1836, and at once began to lecture on temperance. He gained notoriety as a volunteer nurse during the cholera epidemic in Kentucky in 1837. It was his

fate, near the close of the presidential can-vass of 1884, to raise himself, by the utter-ance of a brief alliterative sentence, into political notoriety. In concluding a speech before some 600 clergymen, he stigmatized the Democrats as the party of "Rum, Rom-anism and Rebellion." Republicans had made extraordinary efforts to secure the Roman Catholic vote, but these fatal words undid the work of months.

A SECOND BALMACEDA.

Governor of British Honduras Runs [Government and Gets into Trouble.

PANAMA, Sept. 26 .- The Star and Herald publishes the following account of the difficulty at Belize, British Honduras, between culty at Belize, British Honduras, between the administration and the legislature. After a protracted struggle between the government and the popular element of the legislature, not unlike that of the Balmacedan congress, the representatives vacated their seats in a body. The governor, in no way disconcerted, promptly appointed in their places certain officials whom he designated "unofficially" members, inasuuch as they did not occupy their seats ex-officio. There was at that time (February last) no one to gainsay him, and from February to July the colony was practically run under a Balmadedan form of government. Action was laid in July against the collector of customs to recover alleged illegal exacted duties on the ground that the colony possessed no constitutional legislature, either at the present time or when the new tariff was voted. The government went into court and defended itself. Chief Justice Anderson was in a quandary for precedents, but finally gave judgment for plaintiffs, thereby over-ruling the legislature and annuling all laws passed since February. The government has appealed to the privy council of the empire. the administration and the legislature



His Heroic Deeds the Talk of Every one in Toledo-A Night

of Peril. MADRID, Sept. 25 .- In contrast to the numerous instances of cowardice and panic among layman during the terrible floods which recently devastated a portion of the fair province of Toledo, the conduct of many of the priests was conspicuous for bravery and devotion to duty, and the name that shines bright above all others in this noble work is that of a humble Franciscan monk of Consuegra, Father Xavier. monk of Consuegra, Father Xavier. Wherever the reporters, whose duty it was to record the horrors of the disaster, moved, they heard tales of the heroism and matchless energy of Father Xavier, whose praises were in the mouths of all the people. There is no exaggeration in saying that this brave man saved scores of lives by his individual efforts on the night of the calamity. That he escaped himself is marvellous, as no risk was too great for him to dare, in the hope of saving the life of some unfortuthe hope of saving the life of some unfortu-nate wretch borne towards death by the day, sought out this hero, and found him so modest and diffident that it was with difficulty that any reference to his deeds during the time of peril could be extracted from his lips. Finally he was induced to describe some of the frightful scenes he had witnessed, and in which he had taken a active part. After mentioning some of the rescues which, under the presence of God, he had been instrumental in effecting, the monk related a thrilling story of one particular case, which had impressed him more strongly than any others. He had already helped a number of helpless people to places of safety, and was clinging in almost an exhausted condition to some floating beams, when he thought he heard above the noise of the rushing flood the voice of a woman invoking the aid of the Virgin. The night was densely durk, and the thunder and lightning were almost continuous, and rain poured down in torrents. Praying to God for help, Father Xavier set out to swim in the direction of the cry he had heard. Trees and logs, hurried down by the current, struck and bruised his body, and debris of all kinds barred his progress, but the hope of saving a life gave him freshstrength, and, praying for strength, he continued on. At last his perseverance was rewarded, and he reached a balcony, where the woman was clinging to an iron railing, bearing on her shoulders a girl of twelve who was unconscious and half drowned. The mother, thus clasping her child, had been swept by the flood against the balcony, and had clung there in the face of the rising waters, which must have soon overcome them. The first impulse of the priest was to seize both and endeavor to bear them to a place of safety, but the mother cried. The mother, "It besech you to save my child. I will pray for you in Heaven. God's will be done." Finding further urging useless, the monk took the child upon his shoulders, promising the mother that after bearing her to some secure resting place, he would return. As he struggled through the seething flood he realized that the mother' culty that any reference to his deeds during ing place, he would return. As he struggled that through the seething flood he realized that the mother's instincts had been true, and that it would have meant death to all three if she had yielded to his entreaties to trust herself with him. With the comparatively light burden of the child alone, it was a herself with him. With the comparatively light burden of the child alone, it was a fearful task to make headway against the torrent. Often they were entangled in branches of trees or were struck by floating wreckage, but after many hairbreadth exapes, the current carried them upon the shore. After a moment's rest the priest set about reviving the child, and having done so he left, exacting a promise that she would remain on the spot until he should return with her mother. Another perilous voyage through the flood brought him back to the balcony whence he had rescued the little one, but the heroic mother was now still in death. Her arms, rigid in death, clung to the railing. Hoping that it might be possible to resuscitate her, the priest took the body on his back and once more braved the flood. The spot where he had left the child was reached after many difficulties, but the girl, probably too dazed to heed his injunction, had vanished. Turning his attention to the pother he found that she was heavend hope.

The body was quite cold, and it was likely that she had died a few moments after parting with her daughter. The priest reverently composed the body, and leaving it where it would not be disturbed by the waters, he returned to the task of aiding other unfortunates. It was by such deeds that Father Xavier became the hero of the great flood, the sainted in the hearts of the people of the stricken district. AMERICAN NEWS.

He was convicted at Salem, Ill. Brown went to Supt. Henderson, yesterday, and told his story. It was so strange that the chief set him down as a crank. The man was so earnest, however, that the chief ordered him locked up, and sent a telegram to Centralia, Ill., where the murder was done. is a strange one. Brown, who was tramping, went into a box car to sleep. He stumbled over a man in the dark, and a fight ensued. Brown hit his assailant a death blow with a coupling pin and fled. Shortly afterwards another tramp named Gray came along and went to sleep in the same car, not knowing that he had a dead man for a companion. The next morning he arose and found that his arm had lain in a pool of blood. That sleeve caused his arrest and conviction.

The explo-sion was caused by ten drums filled with carbolic acid, in an exposed position on the wharf, waiting shipment by steamer Tole-do. Several of the drums must have gone off together, for the whole southern wal of off together, for the whole southern wall of the warehouse was wrecked. About 3,000 pounds of tobacco in bales were torn to rib-bons, the tin sheathing on the warehouse ripped off and scattered in all directions, and all the windows in the neighborhood shat-tered. One of the unexploded drums was hurled through the brick wall of the ad-joining building, and W. McCorkle, who was standing about 20 feet from the drums at the time of the explosion, received a seri-ous fracture of the skull, which may prove fatal.


