HAWTHORNE RACING.

Chicago's general feeling of great relief at being released from the clutches of the torrid weather of the past week extended to Hawthorne and the race-goers congratulated each other about still being alive and well. The track was very heavy, and as under such condition could easily be forstold the class of horses engaged for the six races of the day, was "not much," as the fellow said. Of the sixty-eight entries sixteen were scratched, but the second race was the only one to suffer to any extent. There were on twenty regular and two field bookmakers.

On the strength of his remarkable burst of speed shown in the Harlem stake race with Frank Bell and Ailyar, some speculators thought of backing Elmer S for the first race, but these were scared off by the price, the bookies opening the bad acting son of Julien at 7 to 1. Arrived at the post Elmer S at once began his exhibition and finally ran the wrong way of the track. As he made the turn coming to the judges stand off slipped the bridle, and passing the grand stand, Bloss was seen hanging on as best he could, yet showing no sign of fear. A coward would have jumped off, so taking a chance of losing his life, but this brave boy sat as comfortable, apparently as if riding in the park. Elmer S is not a vicious horse, but rather one of playful moods, and as he reached the far turn Bloss jumped off and, hanging to the reins, stopped the freakish animal amid cheers from the lawn and grand stand that even he must have heard a quarter of a mile away. Bets on Elmer S stood. To a good start for all, except Shinfane left at the post, Defender's colors showed in front for an instant, then Antiquary took the lead, Willie Howard, second. Rounding the turn Old Fox was fourth, Sidtilla fifth. The latter ran to second position just behind Antiquary as the home stretch was made, and here Old Fox, third, was the only other horse left in the race. Rutter started to bring Antiquary home on the inside rail, but "shifting" at the eighth he cut across to the outside and, taking the path, won somewhat easily from Old Fox, who beat Sidtilla an open length. Two lengths away came Frank Ireland and three lengths behind the latter Willie Howard and Defender II.

Lucid, well supported by the followers of J. Reiff, got away two lengths behind all others in the second race. Wilson at once ran to the lead and he won all the way and was galloping at the finish. Nivoce ran second for a half mile. Molo, off third, dropped back to fifth on the upper turn, where Jackanapes got going and passed all the others, save Wilson, into the straight. Here Prince Blazes was third and Molo fourth. The latter, taking the extreme outside, managed to secure place honors, but Prince Blazes third, and Jackanapes fourth, were hot after him.

Streamer, in the third race, downed the talent as he was backed heavily at 6 to 5 only to run in the bunch all the way, never showing to have a chance. The ride of L. Reiff on Doremus was said by some persons to have been a bad one. Silver Tone led from post to finish and won in a drive from Mr. Johnson, a long shot that seemed to be much improved by the soft going. However, at his last Harlem start he threw his jockey at the post, and that day also was at a long price. Cheval d'Or was second a quarter from home and finished a close third, Prince McClurg being fourth well up. The race was practically confined to the first three horses.

To a splendid start Vice Regal went to the front around the first turn where Collins ran second and La Salle third. At the half mile

ground the trio leading were well ahead of the second bunch headed by Reuben Rowett. Moncreith and Pete Kitchen just behind, while Inconstancy was still farther away, was many lengths better than Queen Safie and Sobriquet. A like order and arrangement was the condition on the upper turn except that Collins had passed Vice Regal. Entering the home stretch the latter was turned loose and he came the balance of the way in a strong gallop. La Salle had quit at the last quarter and Collins was done as far as first money was concerned. Moncreith, straightened out for home, ran surprisingly fast, as also did Inconstancy and they finished second and third in the order named, with Collins fourth and Reuben Rowett fifth.

Governor Sheehan's acting badly at the post got Czarowitz to doing likewise, and when Bruen touched off the machine the pair were left four open lengths behind the others, led by Red Gidd, who was sailing along in front of King Dance as if the race was over. Governor Sheehan outran Czarowitz the first quarter, but at the middle of the upper turn the favorite caught him and the pair quickly disposed of the "crabs" and as Red Gidd either "ran out" or else Macklin (who by the way, here made his first appearance for a long time) took him out to get a hard path, the favorites ran one, two into the home stretch. Czarowitz had Governor Sheehan beaten when three-sixteenths from the wire and won as he pleased, like a real race horse. Red Gidd had such an overwhelming lead at one time that there was no way for him to lose the third money. At the opening of the betting Tabor was posted as the rider of Governor Sheehan, but a moment later when "Wash" Norvell yelled, "Put Caywood on Governor Sheehan," the bookmakers quickly shrank the price from 3 to 1 down to 2 to 1, it finally advancing to 2 1/2 to 1. Czarowitz opened at 3 to 5, went to the post at even money. Strange, isn't it, what marvelous changes the shifting of jockeys causes at the Chicago tracks?

Trebor won the last race in a great finish, six horses all having a chance an eighth out from the wire. Inuendo was first off to a fair start, but Little Alarm headed her and was not shaken off until the home stretch was made. Julia Hazel held the third position for three-eighths and Brightie S. was never worse than fourth. Branch ran third into the straight. In a general rally at the last eighth Trebor, in the center of the course, came on and, although stagefearing about, was lucky enough to touch no other horse and got first money. The judges' decision was necessary to separate Inuendo and Brightie S., respectively second and third, while Branch, Empress Josephine and Miss Lizzie were "right there." Rigiculy was up at the eighth post.

J. M. Murphy said: "It is a hard matter to tell what a horse is likely to do, since the weather of late has been so changeable. Still, Streamer has been doing well and I expected him to run a good race. With a workout under his belt he might have gone all right, but I know his chances were not improved by the bumping Thorpe gave him with Silver Tone on the far turn."

The touts have a peculiar whistle, hybrid of the cries of quail and other game birds, by which they denote their several locations about the betting ring. Noticing the calls a countryman said yesterday: "By gosh! the next time I come to the races I shall bring my gun."

The overcast sky of the early afternoon cleared in the west and north at 4:30 and the change was so marked that coat collars were turned up and horsemen's overcoats brought over from the stables. All rejoiced for the summer's back is broken at last.

The entries of Elmer S. and Shinfane will hereafter be refused.

GOSSIP OF THE TURF.

Of a colt that is expected to be one of the two-year-old stars of next year "Kelston" says in Monday's Morning Telegraph: "C. T. Patterson, who arrived at Sheepshead Bay on Friday on a week's visit, tells me that he has some very promising yearlings among the lot of youngsters which he has been handling at Louisville, while in the chestnut colt, by Lamplighter—Harebell, (dam of MacIvor) he thinks he has the best colt he ever handled, not excepting Ornament and Hamburg."

"This colt, for which Mr. Patterson paid \$6,100 at the sale of the McGrathiana yearlings in June, was perhaps the finest youngster seen in any sale ring during the past season, and it says a good deal for Mr. Young's judgment that in the first of the get of Lamplighter there is every prospect of his expectations that Lamplighter would be a great stud success being partially realized. I myself am of the opinion that Lamplighter will prove second only to the peerless Hanover."

Arrangements are now practically complete for the benefit in aid of the widow of Charles Victor Sass. It will take place at the Brighton Beach track next Friday, and the program is already out. Purses ranging from \$400 to \$700 are offered. Horses of all ages and qualities are equally catered to, and the card includes two distance races in addition to a hurdle race at one mile and a half. Owners have promised a bumper entry, and all the regular officials of the Brighton Beach track, as well as Lander's band, have volunteered their services. The book program is out for the autumn meeting of the Brooklyn Jockey Club at Gravesend track. The fixture begins on September 13 and runs for thirteen days. The opening day will be signalized by the running of one of the richest events of the season, the Junior Champion Stakes, for two-year-olds. Following is a brief summary of the stake events scheduled:

Sept. 13—The Junior Champion Stakes of \$15,000, for two-year-olds; six furlongs. The First Special, for three-year-olds and upward, with \$2,500 added; one mile and a quarter. The Hitchcock Steeplechase Handicap, with \$750 added; about two and a half miles.

Sept. 15—The Willow Stakes, for fillies two years old, with \$1,000 added; five and a half furlongs. The Speculation Stakes, for three-year-olds and upward, with \$1,000 added; one mile.

Sept. 17—The Prospect Stakes of \$2,500, for two-year-olds; six furlongs. The Oriental Handicap of \$2,500, for three-year-olds and upward; one mile and a quarter.

Sept. 19—The Youthful Stakes, for two-year-olds, with \$1,000 added; five and a half furlongs.

Sept. 20—The Greenfield Stakes, for three-year-olds, with \$1,000 added; six furlongs.

Sept. 22—The Seabreeze Stakes, for three-year-olds, with \$1,000 added; one mile.

Sept. 24—The Algeria Stakes, for two-year-olds, with \$1,000 added; five furlongs. The Oceanview Stakes, for three-year-olds, with \$1,000 added; one mile and a sixteenth.

Sept. 24—The Flatlands Stakes of \$2,000, for two-year-olds; five furlongs.

Sept. 28—The King's Highway Hurdle Handicap, with \$750 added; one mile and three-quarters over seven hurdles.

Sept. 29—The Parkville Handicap, for three-year-olds, with \$1,000 added; six furlongs.

Sept. 29—The Holly Handicap, for two-year-olds, with \$1,000 added; five and a half furlongs. The Bayshore Stakes, for three-year-olds and upward, with \$1,000 added; six furlongs.

Vanderbilt, brown horse, foaled 1871, by Vanderbilt—Melrose, by Child Harold, out of Miss Peyton, by American Eclipse, the property of W. R. Rogan, died at Rogana, Mr. Rogan's farm in Macon County, Tenn., on August 2. Vanderbilt was 27 years old and was a good racehorse in his day and was the sire of Madstone and some other fairly good horses, though his stud career was not a brilliant success.

The good race mare Calleen died a few days ago. She was seven years old and by Harry O'Fallon out of Fleeta, by Hurrah. She broke down at Newport about three weeks ago and was bought by Baker & Gentry and placed in the stud. Her death was due to pneumonia.

A NEW STARTER.

Jake Holtman's gook work with the flag at Fort Erie Saturday has secured him a short engagement in the role of starter. Dick Dwyer, who entered upon his duties at the track yesterday, will do the starting for two weeks, when he will be obliged to return to Chicago to resume work at Harlem. The Fort Erie meeting continues four days into the week following and Jake has already been engaged to do the starting those four days. In all probability he will also be employed to act as starter at the Toronto meeting. The Toronto people want Curly Brown to again do their starting, but the Toronto meeting will run through the last seven days of the meeting now in progress at Newport and Mr. Brown feels so kindly toward the Queen City Jockey Club that he will not leave them. He so wired the Toronto management yesterday and at the same time recommended that they employ his big assistant to do their starting. As Jake's work at Fort Erie Saturday was so satisfactory Messrs. Farmer, Hendrie and associates will in all probability engage him to take Mr. Brown's place at their meeting.—Cincinnati Enquirer.

NOTES OF THE TURF.

The Toronto Jockey Club of Toronto, Ont., has engaged J. J. Burke to act as judge and presiding steward at the coming fall meeting to be held September 24 to October 1. Five races will be given each day, with purses and stakes ranging from \$300 to \$500.

Just before starting to California Hugh L. Jones purchased the 4-year-old colt Truxillo and took him along. Truxillo has been ailing this year but toward the close at St. Louis gave signs of recovering form and is likely to prove a bread winner at Frisco.

Siva, a three-year-old in P. Tomlinson's stable at Latonia, died Friday night. The colt was taken sick while being shipped from St. Louis to Latonia. He was by Hindoo—Miss Eppie, and was a frequent winner at St. Louis and New Orleans.

W. Oliver has purchased of J. L. Dwyer King T., bay horse, 5, by Kinglike—Revolt; price, \$600.

In his preparation for the Twin City Handicap Handspring broke down again. After a mile and a quarter trial in 2:10 his legs gave way.

The well known trainer Peter Wimmer is quite sick, but is expected to recover.
