Entering the home stretch the latter was turned loose and he came the balance of the way in a strong gallop. La Salle had quit at the last quarter and Collins was done as far as first money was concerned. At the opening of the betting Tabor was posted as the rider of Governor Sheehan, but a moment later when "Wash" Norvell yelled, "Put Caywood on Governor Sheehan," the bookmakers quickly shrank the price from 3 to 1 down to 2 to 1, it finally advancing to 2½ to 1.
