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



WHEN AND HOW TO PAY

All fees and board are due at the beginning of each quarter. Money wlil not be refunded to students leaving school except for good reasons. Remittance in payment of bills should be sent by postoffice money order or registered letter, and made payable to the Principal, and not to the student.

All students who live in the dormitories will be expected to pay board, room rent, and lights as stated above. Local students will be required to pay entrance and fuel fees.

Special attention is called to the expenses of the school.

All students, whether boarders or day pupils, must pay at least one month's expenses and the annual fees before they can be registered.

All students, are required to give at least 30 minutes of service to the school each day, or its equivalent.

All old accounts must be settled before entering for the new year. Students must pay for any damage to furniture or buildings resulting from carelessness.

The school year consists of nine months of four weeks each. No student who is behind on the books for 10 days will be admitted into the dining hall or classes.

Some of the students who board in the dormitories may reduce their expenses by doing work needed in various departments of the institution.

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TUITION

Tuition in the Normal School Department is free to those who live in North Carolina and intend to teach in the public schools of North Carolina. Those who do not intend to teach must pay \$18.00 tuition per year. The school is maintained for the purpose of training teachers for the public schools. It is only just and right that those who take advantage of the school and who do not intend to teach shall pay the tuition charges.

PRACTICE AND OBSERVATION SCHOOL

Each pupil who enters this Department will be required to pay an entrance fee of \$2.00 for the year. The following tuition will also be required:

First, second and third grades, \$1.50 per month.

Fourth and fifth grades, \$1.75 per month.

Sixth and seventh grades. \$2.00 per month.

All payments are to be made promptly.

GENERAL INFORMATION

1. OBJECT

The object of this State Normal School is the training of teachers for the Colored public schools of North Carolina.

The General Assembly of 1891 made it possible for this school to begin on January 4, 1892. The State Normal School has stood as a beacon light on the shores of Eastern North Carolina from the first day school was started until now.

Many of the students of this school have made fine records in teaching, in business, and in some of the leading Universities of America.

2. FIELD

The State Normal School is situated in a field where great service can be rendered to our State. Since Eastern Carolina has a large group of rural people, this Eastern Section looks mainly to this school for teachers and leaders in their rural life.

3 LOCATION

Elizabeth City is situated on the Pasquotank River, in an agricultural Section where are grown many of the leading crops of our State and where this great trucking section can reach the Eastern markets by boat and train.

4. RELIGIOUS LIFE

The Opening Exercises. The opening exercises take place in the chapel each school day. The exercises consist of singing, Scripture reading and prayer. Short talks are occasionally made on important topics by the Principal. and members of the faculty. Important announcement are also made during the opening period. The Faculty as well as the students should attend these exercises, in which all find pleasure and profit. No student should ever be absent from the opening exercises. An attentive, respectful attitude is required.

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Prayer-meeting. On Wednesday, after school, the students and Faculty devote a short time to a well-conducted prayer-meeting. This meeting helps to keep the spiritual and religious life of the school vigorous and healthy. It is one of the most important meetings of the school. All students are required to attend and are encouraged to take part in the meetings. This meeting brings us all on a level, in a way which. no other meeting can do.

Christian Associations. The Young Men's and Young Women's Christian Associations are instrumental in toning up and deeping the moral and religious life and activity of the student body. These meetings are regularly held on Sunday afternoon at 3:30 p.m. Every student is expected to be a member of one of these associations and to be in regular attendance upon them on each Sunday afternoon. The annual fee is \$1.00.

Every student is expected to attend the Sunday school every Sunday morning unless providentially hindered.

5, LITERARY SOCIETIES

Lyceum. The Lyceum is a literary society, officered by the students, but under the supervision of the teachers. It affords the students an opportunity to become acquainted with parliamentary usages and to have practice in public speaking and discussion. The society meets weekly and renders an occasional public program. The meetings of this organization are very interesting and beneficial.

6. ATHLETIC ASSOCIATION

Athletic Association. The students have an Athletic Association, officered by the seudent body and under the direction of faculty advisors.

REGULATIONS

Students must be decent, respectful, orderly and well behaved at all times. They must obey cheerfully when spoken to.

In order to promote Christian character as well as good scholarship, students must conform to habits of truthfulness and honesty of purpose, action, and work.

Students must refrain from the use of profane language, card playing, and lounging about streets. Students should not associate with persons who are immoral, untruthful and careless in their deportment.

No student will be allowed to remain in school if the school authorities find out that he has in his possession firearms. We earnestly advise that guns be left at home.

Students must be sober.

We advise students to be courteous and respectful to their instructors, fellow school mates, and to all other persons on all occasions.

There shall not be any passing up and down either one of the halls during school hours nor shall there be permitted any disorderly conduct in the building or on the campus while school is in session.

This institution positively prohibits students connected with it from the use of tobacco and the use of intoxicating liquors. The boys and girls have separate play grounds for their athletic activities and other activities and are requested to remain on their respective territory.

Regular and prompt attendance upon all meetings of the institution is required on the part of every student. Boys must not lounge around the Girl's Dormitories at any time.

Every student is required to attend promptly and regularly Sunday School, Young Men's and Young Women's Christian Associations, Prayer Meetings which are planned by the institution for the benefit of the student body.

All students must obtain permission before leaving their dormitory or campus. Students must never be out without permission or chaperon. Hours will be fixed when all students must be in their rooms.

Students who have not done satisfactory work in the Third Year High School Class and whose conduct has not been commendable will not be permitted to enter the Fourth Year High School Class until there is a change for better in their general conduct and satisfactory improvement made in their class work.

Every student should attend school 180 days each year in order to be eligible for promotion.

Each student must enter school on one of the first three school days.

Fee for registration after third day will be \$1.00.

We advise that every young person own a Bible, which should be read daily and prayerfully. The cultivation of such a worth while habit would evidently add grace and beauty to the life and Christian character of our young people.

IMPORTANT STATEMENT

All students must purchase textbooks. Please bring from \$5.00 to \$10.00 for books. Board must be paid in advance in order that we may have money with which to run the boarding department.

Each student who rooms in the Dormitory should bring four sheets, two pillow-cases, blankets or quilts, towels, rubbers, umbrella, wraps, soap, toothbrush, etc.

The lady teachers and the students who do not live in Elizabeth City will room and board in the dormitories and furnish their rooms.

Instructors will be required to pay the same board room rent, fuel and light fees as student. Teachers board will cost \$16.00.

Some of the students will be given an opportunity to work, which will reduce their board bill.

Enter school on the first day and remain until the session closes.

Not more than 30 pupils may be admitted to the sixth and seventh grades of the Practice and Observation School this year.

By order of the Board of Trustees there will be no eight grade or a first-year high school class maintained by this institution.

SPECIAL NOTICE

All patrons of this institution will please observe that board must be paid promptly at the beginning of each month. If any such monthly payments are not made on or before the 10th of the month for which board ls due the pupils involved are to be dropped. Students board will be \$14.00 per month. Teachers will be required to pay \$16.00 per month for board. Remember four weeks or 28 days make a boarding month and kindly arrange to pay promptly.

No reduction will be made in board or fees for students who are late entering.

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DEPARTMENT OF INSTRUCTION AND COURSES OF STUDY.

NORMAL DEPARTMENT

AIM AND SCOPE

The aim of this department is to train teachers for the elementary public schools of the State. The course consists of two years of study in which the major emphasis is placed upon the history, principles and methods of education. The purely professional subjects are supplemented by such subject matter studies as will give the student a wider academic background for his professional equipment.

ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS

For admission to the Normal Department the applicant must be a graduate of an approved high school. or its equivalent, and must present evidence of having satisfactorily completed at least fifteen (15) units of secondary work.

GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS

Graduation from the Normal Department is based upon the completion of the required number of quarter-hours of work in the Primary or Grammar Grade Curriculum. A quarter-hour of work is a recitation occurring once a week for twelve weeks.

DIPLOMA AND CERTIFICATE

A Diploma will be awarded to all who complete this course. Furthermore, by special arrangement those who complete the course will be granted, without examination, a primary B or Grammar Grade B Certificate by the State Department of Public Instruction.


All students on completing the two year Normal Course will receive a diploma.

Upon graduation from this Normal school, the State Department of Education will issue a Primary B Certificate for the completion of the Primary Curriculum and a Grammar Grade B Certificate for the completion of the work in the Grammar Grade Curriculum.

SUMMER SCHOOL

The work at this school is divided into four regular quarters. Fall, Winter, Spring and Summer. In the Summer School work is offered above the approved High School level and below the approved High School level.

Graduates from an approved High School may take Units one and two from the Summer School Uniform Curricula and receive credit for one quarter of Normal work and at the same time receive credit for the Elementary B. Certificate. When the approved High School graduates have completed four units of work from the Summer School Uniform Curricula they may enter the second year Normal Class and be graduated at the end of another quarter of Summer School work.





This school will take a quarter of approved Summer School work after approved High School graduation as equal to one quarter of regular Normal work.

PRACTICE TEACHING

Practice School of seven elementary grades is maintained on the campus under the direction of trained critic teachers to provide student teachers with instructive observation, participation, and practice. Thus students learn to teach by teaching under supervision and guidance.

HIGH SCHOOL DEPARTMENT

This department aims to give a solid secondary education. Being an accredited State high school, it meets the needs both of those who desire to pursue the Normal course here, and of those who plan to take higher courses elsewhere.

Candidates for admission to the second, third and the fourth years will be examined in English, Grammar and Composition, Arithmetic, Georgraphy and History. Those seeking admission to higher classes must satisfy the committee on classification that they are able to pursue. profitably and successfully, the work of the class to which admission is sought.

No first-year high school class will be maintained in this institution. A Diploma will be awarded to all who complete the course.

COURSE OF STUDY

(Recitations in all subjects occur five times a week 45 minutes)

SECOND YEAR

Required

English II Mathematics II Domestic Science and Art—Girls Agriculture—Boys. Elective Latin II Biology History

FOURTH YEAR

Required

English IV Physics American History and Civics Domestic Art and Science—Girls Agriculture—Boys, Elective Commercial and Advanced Arithmetic Latin IV or French 11.

THIRD YEAR

Required English III Chemistry Domestic Art and Science—Girls Agriculture—Boys Elective Mathematics III Latin III or French I History

DOMESTIC ART

This course is designed to give thorough training in both the theory and practice of sewing and dressmaking.

A three-year course in sewing is offered which gives the student a general knowledge of sewing.

SECOND YEAR

Hand Sewing. Models will be made of the essential stitches, seams, worked buttonholes.

Practice work on hemming towels, napkins, making collar and cuff sets, sewing apron, laundry bag and cooking uniform.

Talks on use of thimble, needles, pins, tracing wheel, scissors, shears, and tape.

Machine Sewing. Undergarments and lingerie. Theory work on care and use of machines. Drafting analysis. Selection of materials and trimmings.

THIRD YEAR

Lingerie and tailored blouses, tailored wash skirts, plain wash dress.

Theory: Use and alteration of commercial patterns. Care and selection of clothing. Color harmony in relation to clothes. Costume and its relation to individuals. The clothing budgets and the wardrobe.

FOURTH YEAR

Tailored woolen skirt, one piece woolen dress and silk dress. Remodeling and renovating of old clothes.

Study of Textiles. Textbook: "Textiles," by McGowen and Waite.

JUNIOR NORMAL

Practice work. Models of all samples necessary for teachers of domestic art.

Theory. General review of all theory work in the High School Department.

SENIOR NORMAL

This course will be devoted entirely to theory work. In this course Methods of Teaching Sewing will be taught; special emphasis will be laid on rural school methods. Lesson plans will be discussed. Each student will be required to outline a year's course of study in sewing.

Courses will be given in Millinery, Tailoring, Costume Designs, Basketry and Weaving to any applicant.

DOMESTIC SCIENCE

SECOND YEAR

The first course in cooking is based on food principles and the selection and preparations of foods. Instruction is given in the care of the kitchen furnishings and equipment.

The second year course is devoted to the study of food preservation menu making, and home sanitation. During this course instruction in the simple processes of housewifery is continued, with special emphasis on the furnishings and care of the dining room and living room.

Text. Greer's "Textbook of Cooking."

THIRD YEAR

This course deals with dishes of a more complicated nature and with dietetics, serving and laundry work.

Text. Kinne and Cooley's "Foods and Household Management."

FOURTH YEAR

Cooking in the fourth year deals with the amount and kinds of foods needed by the body for growth and health, invalid cookery, and school lunches.

Text. Kinne and Cooley's "Foods and Household Management."

JUNIOR NORMAL

In this course a study is made of the proper nourishment of the human body ,the balancing of meals, and lunch room cockery. Instruction is also given in household management and marketing.

SENIOR NORMAL

In this year the fundamentals of cooking are reviewed as a basis for practice work in teaching. Advanced work, including invalid cookery, the making of lesson plans and home making are given.

Texts. Farmer's "Boston Cooking School Book," "Parloa's Home Economics.

ENGLISH

The general aims of the study of English are first, to enable the student to speak and write correctly and effectively; second to acquaint him with the best works of our leading English and American authors; third, to develop in him an appreciation for good literature and the habit of reflective reading.

ENGLISH II

The second year English is a continuation of the work of the previous year on a larger and more comprehensive scale, with stress upon theme work, narration, description, exposition and argumentation. The student becomes familiar with standard literary forms and acquires a proper appreciation of literary values.

ENGLISH III

This course, designed for third year, consists of a study of the theory and practice of English composition—oral and written. All of the fundamental forms of discourse are studied, but the greatest emphasis is put upon exposition. On the side of literature, the history of American literature is studied, and as many poems of the principal writers are studied as the time limits and reference material permit. Special topics in Grammar are reviewed.

Texts. Lewis and Hosic's "Practical English," "Metcalf's "American Literature."

ENGLISH IV

This course, designed for fourth year. is a continuation of the course above, so far as composition is concerned, with emphasis on Argumentative themes. The work in Composition is supplemented by a study of the history of English literature and by an appreciative study of typical examples of the various literary types. Composition based on the literature read, and practice in debate are features of this course.

Texts. Lockwood and Emerson's "Composition and Rhetoric," Metcalf's "English Literature," and Richo's "A Study of Types of Literature."

HISTORY AND CIVICS

SECOND YEAR

History Modern European. The aim of this course is to secure a thorough knowledge of the development of Western Europe from the days of Charlemagne. Special attention is given to the causes leading up to the World War.

Text. Robinson and Beard. Part II.

THIRD YEAR

(a) Civics. The aim of this course is to teach the ethics of citizenship and to show the unity of all human relationship.

Text. Dole's "The New American Citizen."

(b) History. American. This course is a thorough review of the chief events in the development of our government and its institutions. The aim is to enable the student, by contrasting present with past conditions, to better understand our problems of today and to show them their relation to such problems.

MODERN LANGUAGES

FRENCH I.

French offered in the third year is plauned to give the student an accurate knowledge of the language both as written and spoken, and also to develop an appreciation for French Literature.

The work as outlined above is carried on by means of recitation, written exercises, and collateral readings. Much stress is laid, from the beginning, upon the ability of the student to express himself directly in the language. To accomplish this end, the class is conducted as far as possible in French.

Textbook. Le Premier-Meras.

FRENCH II.

French of the fourth year is a continuation of the work above, with the emphasis placed on composition and the acquiring of greater ease in interpreting French thought. Selections from the best authors are used in this course.

LATIN

The four year course in Latin is arranged so as to enable the student to become acquainted with the forms and construction of Latin grammar, familiarity with standard Latin writers and a knowledge of the historical importance and beauty of the Roman Period as conveyed by such writers. It is planned also to meet entrance requirements of the standard colleges and universities of the country.

Bennett's Latin Grammar is used throughout the course.

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LATIN II

The first four books of Caesar's Gallic War used during the Second Year; with stress upon characteristic arrangement of the author, the motive and historical importance of each campaign, and the common construction in use.

Textbook. Bennett's Caesar's Gallic War.

LATIN III

Cicero's Orations are read in the Third Year. including the Catilinarian Orations Defense of Archias, Manillian Law and the Pardon of Marcelius. Emphasis is laid upon the narrative involved and the arguments advanced. A thorough review in the syntax is given also.

Textbook. Bennett's Cicero's Orations.

LATIN IV

The epic poem. Virgil's Æneid, including the first four books and the sixth book is read during the year. The student is drilled in the work of scanscion and its peculiar application to the Æneid. Along with the narrative, as a supplement, the myths of Greece and Rome, as found in Bulflinch's Ages of Fables, are studied.

Textbook. Bennett's Virgil's Æneid.

MATHEMATICS

The three principal aims of this department are: (1) to prepare the student for the practical application of mathematics to every day problems; (2) to develop in him power in mathematics methods of reasoning; and (3) to give him a good foundation for higher mathematics. The following courses are offered from the ninth through the eleventh grade.

SECOND YEAR

Algebra II. This is a continuation of Algebra 1. Common divisors, multiples, simple equations, simultaneous equations, quadratics, exponents, and problems in the form of equations are given special attention.

Text. Milne's "High School Algebra."

THIRD YEAR

Plane Geometry. This course includes a study of rectilinear figures, triangles, the circle, proportion, polygons, proportional lines, and numerical properties of figures.

The solution of original problems and figures is required throughout the course.

Text. Wentworth and Smith's "Plane Geometry."

SCIENCE

The courses of study in the Science Department are planned to give training in habits of precision in accurate observation, in reasoning, in devices of experimentation and in an understanding 'of the valid grounds of proof and the logical basis of generalization.

SECOND YEAR

Biology is offered in the second year to give still a broader aspect. Various type animals are studied. The first year is zoological in character; the second botanical. Field work will be observed.

Text. Smallwood, Beverly & Bailey's "Practical Biology."

THIRD YEAR

Physics wil be offered in the third year. This subject will acquaint the student with the relation of energy and matter.

Laboratory work will be emphasized.

Text. Carhart & Chutes "First Principles of Physics."

FOURTH YEAR

Chemistry. This year's work concerns itself with the principles on which the science is based. Stress will be laid upon certain processes and materials in their application to the commercial arts.

Text. Brownlee, Hancock. Fuller and others.

GRADUATION

15 units are required for graduation as follows:

EXTENSION SERVICE DEPARTMENT

The general purpose of the extension service is to carry the Normal School services to those who cannot attend its regular sessions, but who most truly need its aid.

During the school year 1926-27 extension study classes were conducted by this institution in the following eight counties: Beaufort, Bertie, Chowan, Craven, Currituck. Martin, Pasquotank and Pitt. In these classes 196 teachers received renewal and raising credits on their certificates. This of course hastens the time when these teachers will receive higher salaries. More important than the renewel and raising of the certificates however, was the great professional benefits the teachers received while actually engaged in meeting the problems of their class rooms and communities. This giving of aid at the time and place it is needed made these extension study groups more like service stations than like the traditional academic classes.

Among the various other extension services rendered by the institution were: supplying speakers and singers for educational rallies. speakers for county and group commencements; singers and speakers to churches and civic organizations, plays, advisory services to supervisors, teachers, parent-teachers associations. These various services were rendered by a large proportion of the instructors; including the principal, vice-principal, and at least 18 other members of the faculty. The future of this work appears most promising. [26]



WHEN AND HOW TO PAY

All fees and board are due at the beginning of each quarter. Money will not be refunded to students leaving school except for good reasons. Remittance in payment of bills should be sent by postoffice money order or registered letter, and made payable to the Principal, and not to the student.

All students who live in the dormitories will be expected to pay board, room rent and lights as stated above. Local students will be required to pay entrance and fuel fees.

Special attention is called to the expenses of the school.

All students, whether boarders or day pupils, must pay at least one month's expenses and the annual fees before they can be registered.

All students, are required to give at least 30 minutes of service to the school each day, or its equivalent.

All old accounts must be settled before entering for the new year.

Students must pay for any damage to furniture or buildings resulting from carelessness.

The school year consists of nine months of four weeks each. No student who is behind on the books for 10 days will be admitted into the dining hall or classes.

Some of the students who board in the dormitories may reduce their expenses by doing work needed in various departments of the institution.

TUITION

Tuition in the Normal School Department is free to those who live in North Carolina and intend to teach in the public schools of North Carolina. Those who do not intend to teach must pay \$18.00 tuition per year. The school is maintained for the purpose of training teachers for the public schools. It is only just and right that those who take advantage of the school and who do not intend to teach shall pay the tuition charges.

PRACTICE AND OBSERVATION SCHOOL

Each pupil who enters this Department will be required to pay an entrance fee of \$2.00 for the year. The following tuition will also be required:

First, second and third grades, \$1.50 per month. Fourth and fifth grades, \$1.75 per month. Sixth and seventh grades, \$2.00 per month. All payments are to be made promptly.

GENERAL INFORMATION

1. OBJECT

The object of this State Normal School is the training of teachers for the Colored public schools of North Carolina.

The General Assembly of 1891 made it possible for this school to begin on January 4, 1892 The State Normal School has stood as a beacon light on the shores of Eastern North Carolina from the first day school was started until now.

Many of the students of this school have made fine records in teaching, in business, and in some of the leading Universities of America.

2. FIELD

The State Normal School is situated in a field where great service can be rendered to our State. Since Eastern Carolina has a large group of rural people, this Eastern Section looks mainly to this school for teachers and leaders in their rural life.

3 LOCATION

Elizabeth City is situated on the Pasquotank River in an agricultural Section where are grown many of the leading crops of our State and where this great trucking section can reach the Eastern markets by boat and train.

4. RELIGIOUS LIFE

The Opening Exercises. The opening exercises take place in the chapel each school day. The exercises consist of singing, Scripture reading and prayer. Short talks are occasionally made on important topics by the Principal. and members of the faculty. Important announcements are also made during the opening period The Faculty as well as the students should attend these exercises, in which all find pleasure and profit. No student should ever be absent from the opening exercises. An attentive, respectful attitude is required.

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Prayer-meeting. On Wednesday, after school, the students and Faculty devote a short time to a well-conducted prayer-meeting. This meeting helps to keep the spiritual and religious life of the school vigorous and healthy. It is one of the most important meetings of the school. All students are required to attend and are encouraged to take part in the meetings. This meeting brings us all on a level, in a way which no other meeting can do.

Christian Associations. The Young Men's and Young Women's Christian Associations are instrumental in toning up and keeping the moral and religious life and activity of the student body. These meetings are regularly held on Sunday afternoon at 3:30 p.m. Every student is expected to be a member of one of these associations and to be in regular attendance upon them on each Sunday afternoon. The annual fee is \$1.00.

Every student is expected to attend the Sunday school every Sunday morning unless providentially hindered.

5. LITERARY SOCIETIES

Lyceum. The Lyceum is a literary society, officered by the students, but under the supervision of the teachers. It affords the students an opportunity to become acquainted with parliamentary usages and to have practice in public speaking and discussion. The society meets weekly and renders an occasional public program. The meetings of this organization are very interesting and beneficial.

6. ATHLETIC ASSOCIATION

Athletic Association. The students have an Athletic Association, officered by the student body and under the direction of faculty advisors.

REGULATIONS

Students must be decent, respectful, orderly and well behaved at all times. They must obey cheerfully when spoken to.

In order to promote Christian character as well as good scholarship, students must conform to habits of truthfulness and honesty of purpose, action, and work.

Students must refrain from the use of profane language, card playing, and lounging about streets. Students should not associate with persons who are immoral, untruthful and careless in their deportment.

No student will be allowed to remain in school if the school authorities find out that he has in his possession firearms. We earnestly advise that guns be left at home.

Students must be sober.

We advise students to be courteous and respectful to their instructors, fellow school mates, and to all other persons on all occasions.

There shall not be any passing up and down either one of the halls during school hours nor shall there be permitted any disorderly conduct in the building or on the campus while school is in session.

This institution positively prohibits students connected with it from the use of tobacco and the use of intoxicating liquors.

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The boys and girls have separate play grounds for their athletic activities and other activities and are requested to remain on their respective territory.

Regular and prompt attendance upon all meetings of the institution is required on the part of every student. Boys must not lounge around the Girl's Dormitories at any time.

Every student is required to attend promptly and regularly Sunday School, Young Men's and Young Women's Christian Associations, Prayer Meetings which are planned by the institution for the benefit of the student body.

All students must obtain permission before leaving their dormitory or campus. Students must never be out without permission or chaperon. Hours will be fixed when all students must be in their rooms.

Students who have not done satisfactory work in the Third Year High School Class and whose conduct has not been commendable will not be permitted to enter the Fourth Year High School Class until there is a change for better in their general conduct and satisfactory improvement made in their class work.

Every student should attend school 180 days each year in order to be eligible for promotion.

Each student must enter school on one of the first three school days.

Fee for registration after third day will be \$1.00.

We advise that every young person own a Bible, which should be read daily and prayerfully. The cultivation of such a worth while habit would evidently add grace and beauty to the life and Christian character of our young people.

IMPORTANT STATEMENT

All students must purchase textbooks. Please bring from \$5.00 to \$10.00 for books. Board must be paid in advance in order that we may have money with which to run the boarding department.

Each student who rooms in the Dormitory should bring four sheets, two pillow-cases, blankets or quilts, towels, rubbers, umbrella, wraps, soap, toothbrush, night clothes, etc.

The lady teachers and the students who do not live in Elizabeth City will room and board in the dormitories and furnish their rooms.

Instructors will be required to pay the same board room rent, fuel and light fees as student. Teachers board will cost \$16.00.

Some of the students will be given an opportunity to work, which will reduce their board bill.

Enter school on the first day and remain until the session closes.

Not more than 30 pupils may be admitted to the sixth and seventh grades of the Practice and Observation School this year.

By order of the Board of Trustees there will be no first-year or second-year high school classes maintained by this institution.

SPECIAL NOTICE

All patrons of this institution will please observe that board must be paid promptly at the beginning of each month. If any such monthly payments are not made on or before the 10th of the month for which board is due the pupils involved are to be dropped. Students board will be \$14.00 per month. Teachers will be required to pay \$16.00 per month for board. Remember four weeks or 28 days make a boarding month and kindly arrange to pay promptly.

No reduction will be made in board or fees for students who are late entering.

DEPARTMENT OF INSTRUCTION AND COURSES OF STUDY

NORMAL DEPARTMENT

AIM AND SCOPE

The aim of this department is to train teachers for the elementary public schools of the State. The course consists of two years of study in which the major emphasis is placed upon the history, principles and methods of education. The purely professional subjects are supplemented by such subject matter studies as will give the student a wider academic background for his professional equipment.

ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS

For admission to the Normal Department the applicant must be a graduate of an approved high school. or its equivalent, and must present evidence of having satisfactorily completed at least fifteen (15) units of secondary work.

GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS

Graduation from the Normal Department is based upon the completion of the required number of quarter-hours of work in the Primary or Grammar Grade Curriculum. A quarter-hour of work is a recitation occurring once a week for twelve weeks.

DIPLOMA AND CERTIFICATE

A Diploma will be awarded to all who complete this course. Furthermore, by special arrangement those who complete the course will be granted, without examination, a primary B or Grammar Grade B Certificate by the State Department of Public Instruction.

All students on completing the two year Normal Course will receive a diploma.

Upon graduation from this Normal school, the State Department of Education will issue a Primary B Certificate for the completion of the Primary Curriculum and a Grammar Grade B Certificate for the completion of the work in the Grammar Grade Curriculum.

SUMMER SCHOOL

The work at this school is divided into four regular quarters. Fall, Winter, Spring and Summer. In the Summer School work is offered above the approved High School level and below the approved High School level.

Graduates from an approved High School may take Units one and two from the Summer School Uniform Curricula and receive credit for one quarter of Normal work and at the same time receive credit for the Elementary B. Certificate. When the approved High School graduates have completed four units of work from the Summer School Uniform Curricula they may enter the second year Normal Class and be graduated at the end of another quarter of Summer School work.

This school will take a quarter of approved Summer School work after approved High School graduation as equal to one quarter of regular Normal work.

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PRACTICE TEACHING

Practice School of seven elementary grades is maintained on the campus under the direction of trained critic teachers to provide student teachers with instructive observation, participation, and practice. Thus students learn to teach by teaching under supervision and guidance.








The Joy of Teaching



HISTORY OF NORMAL SCHOOL

The General Assembly of 1891 made it possible for this school to begin January 4, 1892. The first appropriation amounted to \$900.00. Dr. P. W. Moore and one assistant started this school in a frame building on Shannon street. Dr. P. W. Moore served faithfully and well from the beginning until he was made President Emeritus in 1928 and Vice-Principal J. H. Bias was made President.

President J. H. Bias was studying in the University of Chicago in 1904 when he was called to this school. Since then on three occasions Dr. P. W. Moore has called President Bias from other fields.

LOCATION

Elizabeth City is situated on the beautiful Pasquotank river in Pasquotank county. Elizabeth City has made many contributions to the educational history of North Carolina. In this city, N. C. Newbold, Director of Division of Negro Education, and J. C. Price, founder of Livingstone College, were born. Elizabeth City is in the heart of the great trucking section of eastern North Carolina.

Since the eastern section of North Carolina has neither a junior nor senior college, the State Normal School has furnished most of the Negro teachers for the elementary public schools in the eastern counties. There is a great need for this school.

OBJECT AND AIM

The main object of this State Normal School is the training of Negro teachers for the public schools of the State. This school has sent out many trained teachers into the urban life of the East, where they have been leaders in their communities.

SUGGESTED RULES AND REGULATIONS

The Elizabeth City State Normal School is run as nearly as possible as a well-regulated Christian home where all have an interest in all and in each. A few home-like requirements clearly set forth in the beginning should contribute to a better understanding, and should aid in avoiding troubles. All students who do not care to follow these suggestions will be asked to withdraw.

1. Boarding students will not be permitted to make week-end visits to friends. Frequent visits lead to inferior work on the part of the student and tend to interfere with the morale of the School.

2. The students keep their rooms in the Dormitory clean, in order and ready for inspection at all times. The corridors, halls, bathrooms, etc., will be cared for by employees of the School.

3. From 9:00 to 11:00 A.M. on Saturdays, the students are requested to spend two hours in general cleaning, arranging their rooms, repairing clothing and doing regular assigned work.

4. All visitors should get the consent of the Matron of each Dormitory before visiting any room.

5. On Sunday afternoon from 3:00 to 4:00, quiethour will be observed in all Dormitories.

6. Electric irons, electric stoves, etc., will not be allowed in the students' bedrooms. The students should allow the Matron to keep the electric irons and stoves, etc., and should get permission from the Matron to use irons, etc., in a special room. 7. No cooking at any time is allowed in any Dormitory.

8. All damage to furniture or building in the students' rooms will be repaired at the expense of the student causing such damage.

9. The students are requested not to use radios, phonographs, etc., in the students' bedrooms.

10. Boarding students will be required to attend Sunday School on the campus and one preaching service in the city every Sunday. Attendance at Chapel Exercises each school day, Prayer Meeting each Wednesday, Y. W. C. A. or Y. M. C. A., each Sunday afternoon is required of each boarding student.

11. Commencement week is regarded as a regular part of the school year, and all students will be expected to remain until the official close of the school after the final program on Commencement Day has been rendered.

12. Students are regarded as being under the direction and supervision of the school authorities until they have reached their homes. Permission will not be granted young women to make visits or take side trips en route without the written consent of parents or guardians.

13. All excused absences from classes must be passed upon in writing by the Dean. Unexcused absences for the equivalent of one week's work in any subject for one quarter means automatic reduction of the student's grade in that subject. Absences for the equivalent of two week's work in any subject during the quarter for any reason will mean loss of credit unless the student files a written petition with the Faculty through the Dean for special action in the case. The authorities reserve the right at any time to resort to disciplinary measures for deliberate or wanton cutting of classes.

UNIFORM

Girls and boys are not encouraged to spend money on clothes to make a show or attract attention or cause an unfavorable comment from the public.

The School feels this is the time for parents and students to use their best judgment and economy in buying school clothes. Mothers may cause undue embarrassment to their children by not supervising the buying of school clothes.

Rules of Payment

1. All money for fees should be sent by post office money order or cashier's check, registered letter and made payable to the President, J. H. Bias, and not to the student.

2. All students in the Dormitory pay as stated above.

3. Local students pay promptly: Entrace, fuel, athletics and laboratory fees.

4. The School year consists of nine months of four weeks each.

5. Some students may work for money to pay some fees.

ATHLETICS

The State Normal School has an Athletic Association controlled mainly by the students and for the students with faculty supervision. The Athletic Association fosters basketball for young men and young women; baseball, tennis for male and female; football, Inter-High Field Day. The girls' basketball team has a clean record for five years.

MUSIC

Great emphasis is placed on the Teacher-Training phase of public school music. Cultural considerations are given to Glee Club, Orchestra, Choruses. The Elizabeth City State Normal School has conducted an Inter-High School Singing Contest for a silver cup. Many high schools from northeastern North Carolina have entered. A School Band will be started this year.

DRAMATIC CLUBS

For many years this Normal School has offered great service to students who might be gifted in Dramatic Art. Three dramatic clubs were formed last year and gave programs in many eastern centers: Norfolk, Va., Winton, N. C., Wilmington, N. C., Edenton, N. C., and Rich Square, N. C.

Students are encouraged to develop any talent for Dramatic Expression.

LITERARY CLUBS

For four years the high schools of eastern North Carolina have contested in an Oratorical Contest for a silver cup. This contest was to foster greater ideas in literature, oratory and public speaking.

RELIGIOUS LIFE OF THE SCHOOL

The students are allowed to organize and manage the Y. W. C. A. and Y. M. C. A. They are also allowed to conduct Prayer Meeting and teach Sunday School at times.

The teacher in training should be under the high Christian ideals in order that a greater sympathy and leadership might be developed for the future field.

LIBRARY

The Normal School has a full-time trained librarian. The library has been fitted with new book racks, tables, chairs, desks, filing cabinet, newspaper and magazine racks.

The library has many thousand volumes. Practically every volume is new and was selected to fill a need in the Normal Course.

This year three thousand dollars were used in purchasing new books. A gift of one thousand dollars for children's books was made this year by Mr. Julius Rosenwald.

The Dewey Library Record System is being used.

BUILDING AND GROUNDS

The Campus of the State Normal School is of rare beauty with the spacious lawns with velvet carpets of grass, winding driveways of clay gravel, cement walks of service and graceful curves. These walks, lawns and driveways are the results of the skill of a landscape architect.

The buildings are mainly fireproof, well-placed and well-equipped with modern school room furniture.

The Moore Chapel, with the large stage, is among the best in the South.

The two dormitories for ladies have large airy rooms, with white iron beds, student reception rooms, and matrons' rooms.

The dormitory for young men is a double modern three-story fireproof brick building, with shower baths and reception rooms.

The very beautiful well-equipped fireproof dining room, kitchen, pantry and store room are well-arranged. Ladies are not forced outdoors on leaving their rooms in the dormitory.

The first floor of the industrial building for boys will be changed into a Physical Education hall.

A new ten-room brick Rosenwald Training School was completed this year.

TRAINING SCHOOL

This new Training School is across the road from the Administration building. This makes a very convenient arrangement for the lady students. In this building there are offices for Director of Teacher Training, Library, lunch room, and a very large auditorium. This building has steam heat and modern sanitary provisions.

SCHOOL FARM

The School Farm has four cows, forty hogs, two hundred chickens and vegetable gardens for the boarding department and for demonstrations. The farm is managed by a skillful gardener and furnishes work for young men students.

LAUNDRY

The laundry has modern steam equipment for washing and extracting, a new mangle and electric irons for ironing. Under the supervision of a trained laundry matron, the young ladies earn some money by doing all the work for teachers, young men, young ladies, the families of members of the faculty, and the dining room.

SUMMER SCHOOL

The Summer School is the Fourth Quarter of the Normal School in which Normal students may do one quarter of Normal work and regular winter teachers may take either Normal work or regular State Summer School Courses.

STUDENT LOAN FUND

The students and members of the Faculty have organized a P. W. Moore Student Loan Fund. This fund is to furnish students small sums of money for a short time at a low rate of interest. Many students could not have remained in school and completed their courses without the help from this fund.

Since the parents of children in this section will not make very much from the farm crops, there will be a great service for the loan fund this year. We are proud of the aid coming from white friends in trying to increase this fund.

THE EXTENSION DEPARTMENT

Through the Extension Department, the Elizabeth City State Normal School offers opportunities to study to teachers in the field, who are holders of State Certificates or the equivalent and are unable to be in residence during the regular year. Such nonresident credits when combined with residence credits earned during a regular term or a Summer School session are accepted on a certificate and for work on graduation.

All instruction is given by members of the regular faculty in classes which meet at frequent intervals, usually on Saturdays in centers within range of the School.

Residence and Extension work cannot be done at the same time.

The Extension work for one year should neither take the place of Summer School nor equal to the credits of a six-week Summer School.

Special announcements bearing on the work of Extension will be mailed to those interested if they address the President of the Normal School.

PART III

ADMISSION, GRADES, CREDITS, HONOR POINTS, GRADUATION, Etc.

ADMISSION

For admission to the Normal Department, the applicant must show graduation from an approved four-year high school with fifteen units of work, or the equivalent of high school graduation, or by examination.

The applicant must show good health and promise as a teacher.

REGISTRATION

All desiring to enter should send for an application blank, fill and return the blank. This School will then aid the student in getting an official transcript of High School, College, Extension, and Summer School work. The application blank and transcript will classify the student.

ADVANCED STANDING

Advanced standing wil be given to Standard High School graduates, who show College, Extension, and Summer School credits since High School graduation.

GRADING SYSTEM

The following five-point grading system is used for class work:

"A"—Excellent	90	per cent	;
"B"—Very Good	85	per cent	;
"C"—Average	80	per cent	
"D"—Passing	75	per cent	;
"E"—Failing	70	per cent	

HONOR POINTS

Beginning with September, 1929, the following Scholarship Honor Point System will be used:

1.	For each quarter	hour of	credit with a	grade of	"A"3 points
2.	For each quarter	hour of	credit with a	grade of	"B" 2 points

3. For each quarter hour of credit with a grade of "C"---1 point

4. For each quarter hour of credit with a grade of "D"

No honor points

Before being permitted to graduate in either curriculum, the student must have earned as many honor points as there are quarter-hour credits required in the curriculum. This is an average of "C." No student will be allowed to graduate who has a failure or an incomplete in any subject recorded against her.

Those students earning a total of two honor points and over for each quarter-hour credit earned, shall be graduated "with honor."

Those who earn two and one-half honor points and over, shall be graduated "with high honor."

Those who earn three honor points for each quarterhour shall be graduated "with highest honor."

Suitable recognition of such students shall be made on the diploma.

UNIT OF WORK

The unit of work in the Normal School is a "quarterhour." A quarter-hour of credit is obtained when satisfactory work in a course for one hour a week for a quarter of twelve weeks or the equivalent is completed.

DIPLOMA


A Normal Diploma will be granted by the School to all who complete either the Primary Curriculum or the Grammar Grade Curriculum.

CERTIFICATE

The State Department of Education will issue a Grammar Grade Certificate, Class "B" or Primary Certificate, Class "B," to all who complete two years of Standard Normal work.

GRADUATION

Ninety-six (96) quarter hours of credits, with the required grade points are required for graduation.

Description of Courses

EDUCATION

Ed. 111P Ed. 111GG

Introduction to Teaching, Including Observation

The purpose of this course is to orientate the students in the field of education. Topics: Aims of Education; Types of Teaching; Organization; Management; Course of Study; Daily Program; Teacher Preparation; Building, and School as a Social Center. Credit: 3 hours each.

Educational Psychology

Ed. 211P Ed. 211GG

Ed. 211GG

This course consists of a study of (1) Psychology of learning, (2) psychology of individual differences. The method of instruction is two-fold: Discussion and lecture. The psychology of learning is chiefly concerned with the laws and principles governing effective learning. Other topics: Marking System; Sex Differences; Influence of Heredity; Influence of Environment; Influence of Maturity. Credit: 3 hours each.

Arithmetic-Materials and Methods, Grades 1-3

Ed. 213P

The aim of this course is to emphasize the mathematical needs of children in play and work situations of daily life. To stress the importance of speed and accuracy in number computation. To present best materials and methods of presenting the subject.

This course provides for experiences necessary to meet the above needs. Situations that permit development of number concepts, the place of drills, projects in nature study, games and other activities as a basis for formal arithmetic, values and use of standard tests. Credit: 3 hours.

Geography and History—Materials and Methods, Grades 1-3 Ed. 226P

The aim of this course is to acquaint the student teachers with the materials and methods best suited to the presentation of geography and history in these grades.

The course includes the study of stories of Indian life, hero stories of other lands, Bible stories of some of the outstanding characters, stories of national holidays and observance of the other special days. To emphasize the application of geography to immediate needs and problems of life. Lessons are observed in the

grades and each student is required to organize and present with abundant use of visual and such as pictures, sand tables, maps, diagram some topic in home geography. Credit: 3 hours.

Primary Reading—Materials and Methods, Grades 1-3 Ed. 133P

The aim of this course is to acquaint students with the needs, meaning, the psychology and pedagogy of oral and silent reading in the first three grades. To emphasize the modern methods and current practices in the teaching of reading.

The course includes a practical study of materials and methods of teaching reading. The purposes and principles underlying the teaching of phonics, measurements of reading by standard and informal tests. Diagnostic and remedial work in reading. The physiology and hygiene of reading. Attention is given to the between recitation activities and self-directed seat-work. Credit: 3 hours.

Practice Teaching

Ed.	212P	Ed.	212GG
Ed.	225P	Ed.	225GG

Observation and participation precede, accompany and are a preparation for responsible teaching at the beginning of each assignment.

Subject matter unit plans are selected, planned by student teacher, reviewed and checked by critic. Daily lesson plans are planned and prepared by student teacher, reviewed, revised, teaching errors checked and corrected by critic. Individual as well as group conferences are held often. Written criticism by critic is given to each at the close of the teaching period. As soon as student teachers show ability to criticise intelligently, each writes criticisms on each other showing strong points, weak points, and how they can be corrected, etc. Credit: 8 hours each quarter.

Tests and Measurements

Ed. 227P Ed. 227GG

Designed to give elementary teachers sufficient acquaintance with standard tests and scales to enable them to use such instruments for the improvement of classroom instruction. Credit: 3 hours each.

Principles of Elementary School Teaching

Ed. 238P Ed. 239GG

This course considers the aims of education and the work of the teacher in the light of these aims. It includes a study of the principles of psychology which are involved in teaching, and their application in the work of the classroom. Emphasis is placed on special lesson types and methods of group and individual instruction. Credit: 3 hours each.

Material and Methods in History

Ed. 226GG

This course offers a brief survey of the development of school instruction in history from the 17th Century to the present, an appraisal of the existing systems of history teaching in Europe and the United States, a body of principles for guidance in determining what history should be taught and how, and the application in detail of these principles to classroom procedure. Credit: 3 hours.

Classroom Management

Ed. 132P Ed. 132GG

These courses are intended to give the student a practical knowledge of the problems of school organization and control. Topics: Principles of Public Education; Compulsory School Laws; Supervision; Classification and Progress of Children; Daily Schedules, Records and Reports, Grading, Discipline, and School Plant. Credit: 3 hours each.

Materials and Methods in Reading

Ed. 133GG

This course sets up the chief objectives of reading in Grades 4-7, and outlines specific means of reaching these objectives. The relationship of this work of the lower to that of the upper grades is made clear, and special types of group and remedial instruction are considered. Observations in the demonstration school form an important part of this course. Credit: 3 hours.

Arithmetic—Materials and Methods, Grades 4-7 Ed. 213GG

This course is designed to prepare teachers of arithmetic of the fourth, fifth, sixth and seventh grades. A thorough study is made of the fundamental principles upon which computation of whole numbers, fractions, decimals and percentage depend. Time is given to problems from real life. Methods of presentation of the arithmetic of these are worked out in class. Credit: 3 hours.

Materials and Methods in Geography

Ed. 227GG

This course includes (1) a study of the aims in teaching geography, (2) a study of the general principles underlying the selection and organization of the subject matter. There will be a consideration of the various types of Geography beginning with Home Geography with special emphasis on the relation of the work of the upper to the lower grades. Modern methods will be discussed and applied. Observations in the demonstration school form a part of this course. Credit: 3 hours.

ENGLISH

English Literature

Eng. 221P Eng. 221GG

A study of English writers and their contributions beginning with the Age of Chaucer. Student written criticisms and appreciations required. Credit: 3 hours each.

American Literature

Eng. 232P Eng. 232GG

A study of American writers and their contributions beginning with the Knickerbocker group. Student written criticism and appreciations required. Credit: 3 hours each.

Materials and Methods in Oral and Written Composition Eng. 211GG

This course considers (1) the aims in teaching composition, grammar and spelling in grades 4-7 of the elementary school, and (2) the selection and treatment of subject-matter and methods of teaching necessary to accomplish these aims. Observation lessons in the demonstration school are included as a part of this course. Credit: 3 hours.

Story Telling and Oral Composition

Eng. 211P

Aim in Story Telling:

a. To study the value of the story in the mental and moral development of children.

b. To learn how to select and adapt stories for use in the primary grades.

c. To give practice in the best methods of story telling.

Aim in Oral Composition:

a. To study how to develop proper speech habits and effective expression in the primary grades through practice in the correct presentation of suitable materials. Credit: 3 hours.

Children's Literature

Eng.	123GG	Eng.	112P
Eng.	133GG	Eng.	124P

These courses aim to give the student an appreciation of the best in children's literature, to train her to tell stories in such a way that it will give pleasure to herself and others and to give a basis for selecting materials. It will include the following topics: Essentials of Good Story Telling; Types of Materials, as "Mother Goose," Folk and Fairy Tales, Fables, Legends, Myths, Realistic Stories and Poetry. A story for each grade will be used. Credit: 3 hours each quarter.

GEOGRAPHY

Principles of Geography

Geog. 121P

This course is a foundation course for the later study of all geography. Since the major geographical factors in determining the distribution of people, what they do, how they live, etc., is climate, most emphasis will be put upon that topic. Credit: 3 hours.

World Geography

Geog. 132P

An introductory world survey of the economic geography of the different continents according to natural regions. This course leads into world problems involving a knowledge of countries and common races, trade relations and products. Credit: 3 hours.

Geography (North America)

Geog. 211GG

A first course in regional geography which deals with relationships between types of human activities and natural environment. A study will be made of the major human adjustments to natural environments which results from effort to make a living. Credit: 3 hours.

UNITED STATES HISTORY

111P	111GG
122P	122GG
134P	133GG

Complete survey of American history. The conditions in Europe during the fifteenth century which influenced the discovery and settlement of the new world are considered. Causes of the Revolution, the struggle of the English Colonies, problems which lead to Civil War, new economic, political, social era after Civil War, the cause and results of the World War. Credit: 3 hours for each quarter.

BIOLOGY

111P 122P 111GG 122GG

This course includes a broad survey of the entire plant and animal kingdoms and a study of such topics as heredity, embryology, evolution, animal breeding, plant breeding, eugenics, which will develop a background for the study of psychology, sociology and hygiene.

The study of text and reference books is supplemented by the use of lantern slides, microscopic preparation, charts, models and museum specimens. Credit: 3 hours each.

BIOLOGY (Nature Study)

231P

The various topics are treated from two standpoints: subjectmatter and method of teaching. During spring frequent field trips are taken to study plants and animals in their natural environment to learn where materials may be collected.

This work is supplemented by laboratory studies of materials, indoors. Special attention is given to seasonal changes, pets, fruits, and vegetables. Credit: 2 hours.

HYGIENE AND SANITATION

Hyg. 231P Hyg. 231GG

A course in personal and community hygiene as essential to an understanding of school-health problems. Only so much of physiology is included as is needed for a background. The following topics are included: Normal growth and its standards; courses of abnormal growth; common defects; methods of detecting and of treating them from the school standpoint. Credit: 7 hours each.

PUBLIC SCHOOL MUSIC

Music 111P, 122P, 133P, 211P, 222P, 233P; 111GG, 122GG, 133GG, 211GG, 222GG and 233GG.

These courses will consist of the study of the theory, including sight-singing, ear-training, dictation, rhythm and the teaching of rote songs. Certain topics of musical appreciation will be studied. Credit: 1 hour per each quarter.

PHYSICAL EDUCATION AND GAMES

Phys. Ed. 122P, 131P, 211P, 222P, 233P; 122GG, 131GG, 211GG, 222GG and 233GG.

1. General Physical Education. A program of general physical education activities, which includes gymnastics, posture work, folk dancing, games, and self-testing activities. The aims of this course are: (1) the individual participation of students in healthful phys-

ical activities; (2) a foundation for the methods, courses and a preparation for teaching. Credit: 5 hours.

2. Songs and Games. The course deals with the development and use of rhythmic activities and games based upon the play instincts and fundamental movements; a discussion of the principles and methods employed in developing these; the interpretation of instrumental music through simple dances; the dramatization of songs and of experiences growing out of every-day interests, and the use of the best traditional games. Credit: 1 hour for each quarter.

DRAWING

Drawing 111GG, 133GG-a, 211GG, 222GG, 233GG, Credit: 1 quarter hour; 133GG-b, Credit: 2 quarter hours.

The aim of this course is to give instruction and practice in the essentials of drawing, to develop creative expressions rather than copying from text.

This course includes the study of definite art principles followed in each case with assigned problems with practice in the technic of drawing and calls for individual art judgment, differentiated for two departments in elementary school.

Topics Discussed: Color theory, designing, lettering, representation of stories, decoration, perspective drawing principles, the various media used, water color, crayons, lead pencil, charcoal, etc., study of art appreciation and picture study.

INDUSTRIAL ARTS AND HANDWORK-Grades 1-3

Drawing 111P, 133P-a, 211P, 222P, 233P, Credit: 1 quarter hour; 122P, 133P-b, Credit: 2 quarter hours.

This course has been planned to meet the needs of primary teachers, to acquaint the student with the application of the principles of construction, decoration and designing of useful articles with lexlites, paper, crayons, water colors, etc., the elements of free-hand drawing of objects and nature drawing, to develop a desire for creative expression through drawing.

Topics Discussed: Study of lettering, paper folding, construction and designing, poster making, bookbinding and decorating book covers, desk blotters, clay modeling, paper pulp modeling, etc.

SEWING

Sewing 121GG, 121P

This course includes the principles of sewing, use of patterns, cutting, fitting and garment making and also the study of materials and colors. Credit: 2 hours.

COOKING

Cooking 111P, 111GG

This course includes the principles of cooking, a study of the classes of foods and their use in the diet. Stress will be placed on the planning and serving of simple meals. Credit: 2 hours.

PENMANSHIP

Writing 111P, 111GG

The aim of this course is to acquaint the student with the value and need for a legible, rapid, easy style of handwriting. To equip students for teaching handwriting in the grades. It is differentiated for primary and grammar grades divisions.

These are some of the topics discussed: Characteristics of legibility, the psychology of habit-building, the underlying principles of muscular movement processes, standard of speed and accuracy, detection and correction of errors.

Attention is given to practice upon paper and blackboard until mastery of the muscular movement processes is secured and the product is suitable for imitation and demonstration. Special attention is given to the pedagogy and hygiene of handwriting. Credit: $\frac{1}{2}$ hour for each.


TEACHER TRAINING INSTITUTIONS CHAL-LENGE THE HIGH SCHOOL STUDENTS

- 1. *Teaching Rewards.* Besides the ever increasing material pay, the teaching profession receives the highest social approval and appreciation.
- 2. Teaching is a Growing Profession. There is a growing demand in North Carolina for better trained teachers. As the training increases the material rewards and social leadership increase.
- 3. Opportunities in the Teaching Profession. There is room at the top for well-trained teachers. Social, moral, and religious opportunities increase with added training and personal adjustments.
- 4. The Teacher is a Builder. The teachers shape the budding childhood of today into a keystone for the

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social structure of tomorrow and into a link in the future chain of our history.

- 5. Teaching Inspires the Highest Ideals. There is nothing grander or more serviceable to a State than to lead, guide, and direct the unfolding possibilities of children of our State who are soon to handle the future destiny of the nation.
- 6. *Teaching is Real Service*. The greatest of servants was a teacher of children, men and women. No one can enter a calling that offers greater spiritual developments, truer happiness and greater peace than the true calling of a teacher.
- 7. *Teaching is Real Patriotism.* There is no greater guarantee to the perpetuity of the ideals for which we live and for which many died, than the banishing of ignorance and prejudices from our democracy.
- 8. Teaching is the Profession of Professions. Judged by any standards that make people genuinely rich, truly happy, kindly serviceable, teaching is the parent and is the greatest of all professions. Teaching brings the pleasures and sorrows of the past, guides the present and guarantees the future. It is therefore, necessary that a State spend more of its money, give more of its finest talent to the great cause of public education, upon which will rest the solidarity of American ideals, safety of a State and the peace, prosperity, and happiness of the citizens. It is the duty of the teacher to render this service to a republic.



High School Department

This department aims to give a solid secondary education. Being an accredited State High School, it meets the needs both of those who desire to pursue the Normal course here, and of those who plan to take higher courses elsewhere.

Candidates for admission to the third and the fourth years will be examined in English, grammar and composition, arithmetic, geography and history. Those seeking admission to higher classes must satisfy the committee on classification that they are able to pursue, profitably and successfully, the work of the class to which admission is sought.

No first- or second-year high school class will be maintained in this institution.

A diploma will be awarded to all who complete the course.

HOUSEHOLD ARTS

The aim of this course is to create within the girl a self-interest, so as to meet her direct needs, to develop the spirit of good citizenship, and an appreciation of her place in the family and community. The course covers two years' of work. Special effort is made to make the problems practical and to meet the needs of individual students.

Household Arts I

This course is open to third- and fourth-year students. It takes up the selection emphasis on the use and care of the sewing machine. The selection, care and preservation of food in the home; simple principles of preparation, meal planning and service of food. Food and clothing for health are emphasized. The care of the home, and the health of the family and community are all touched upon during the year's work.

NOTE: The course should be carried through the year for credit. Students should come prepared to purchase material for making cookery uniforms when entering school. Approximate cost FOR YEAR'S WORK, \$4.00, which includes garments the student may make and wear to school.

Household Arts II

This course is a continuation of Household Arts I. It is open to Fourth-Year students who have had Household Arts I, or the equivalent. It continues the work in foods and clothing with greater emphasis placed on higher standards of workmanship. The care, feeding and clothing of children; the care of the sick in the home; planning, furnishing and remodeling of homes, and entertainments and amusements within the home are additional problems taken up.

Approximate cost of course \$8.00, which includes graduating dress.

ENGLISH

The general aims of the study of English are: first, to enable the student to speak and write correctly and effectively; second, to acquaint him with the best works of our leading English and American authors; third, to develop in him an appreciation for good literature and the habit of reflective reading.

English III

This course, designed for third year, consists of a study of the theory and practice of English composition—oral and written. All of the fundamental forms of discourse are studied, but the greatest emphasis is put upon exposition. On the side of literature, the history of American literature is studied, and as many poems of

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the principal writers are studied as the time limits and reference material permit. Special topics in grammar are reviewed.

Texts: Lewis and Hosic's Practical English, Metcalf's American Literature.

English IV

This course, designed for fourth year, is a continuation of the course above, so far as composition is concerned, with emphasis on argumentative themes. The work in composition is supplemented by a study of the history of English literature and by an appreciative study of typical examples of the various literary types. Composition based on the literature read, and practice in debate are features of this course.

Texts: Lockwood and Emerson's Composition and Rhetoric, Metcalf's English Literature, and Richo's A Study of Types of Literature.

HISTORY AND CIVICS

Third Year

(a) Civics. The aim of this course is to teach the ethics of citizenship and to show the unity of all human relationship.

Text: Dole's The New American Citizen.

(b) History. American. This course is a thorough review of the chief events in the development of our government and its institutions. The aim is to enable the student, by contrasting present with past conditions, to better understand our problems of today and to show them their relation to such problems.

MODERN LANGUAGES

French I

French offered in the third year is planned to give the student an accurate knowledge of the language both as written and spoken, and also to develop an appreciation for French literature.

The work as outlined above is carried on by means of recitation, written exercises, and collateral readings. Much stress is laid, from the beginning, upon the ability of the student to express himself directly in the language. To accomplish this end, the class is conducted as far as possible in French.

Textbook: Le Premier-Meras.

French II

French of the fourth year is a continuation of the work above, with the emphasis placed on composition and the acquiring of greater ease in interpreting French thought. Selections from the best authors are used in this course.

Latin

The four-year course in Latin is arranged so as to enable the student to become acquainted with the forms and construction of Latin grammar, familiarity with standard Latin writers and a knowledge of the historical importance and beauty of the Roman period as conveyed by such writers. It is planned also to meet entrance requirements of the standard colleges and universities of the country.

Bennett's Latin Grammar is used throughout the course.

Latin II

The first four books of Caesar's Gallic War used during the second year, with stress upon characteristic arrangement of the author, the motive and historical importance of each campaign, and the common construction in use.

Textbook: Bennett's Caesar's Gallic War.

MATHEMATICS

The three principal aims of this department are: (1) to prepare the student for the practical application of mathematics to every day problems; (2) to develop in him power in mathematics methods of reasoning; and (3) to give him a good foundation for higher mathematics. The following courses are offered from the tenth through the eleventh grade:

Third Year

Plane Geometry. This course includes a study of rectilinear figures, triangles, the circle, proportion polygons, proportional lines, and numerical properties of figures.

The solution of original problems and figures is required throughout the course.

Text: Wentworth and Smith's Plane Geometry.

SCIENCE

The courses of study in the science department are planned to give training in habits of precision in accurate observation, in reasoning, in devices of experimentation and in an understanding of the valid grounds of proof and the logical basis of generalization.

Third Year

Physics will be offered in the third year. This subject will acquaint the student with the relation of energy and matter.

Laboratory work will be emphasized.

Text: Cathcart and Chute's First Principles of Physics.

Fourth Year

Chemistry. This year's work concerns itself with the principles on which the science is based. Stress will be laid upon certain processes and materials in their application to the commercial arts.

Text: Brownlee, Hancock, Fuller and others.

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

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TEACHER TRAINING INSTITUTIONS CHAL-LENGE THE HIGH SCHOOL STUDENTS

- 1. Teaching Rewards. Besides the ever increasing material pay, the teaching profession receives the highest social approval and appreciation.
- 2. Teaching is a Growing Profession. There is a growing demand in North Carolina for better trained teachers. As the training increases the material rewards and social leadership increase.
- 3. Opportunities in the Teaching Profession. There is room at the top for well trained teachers. Social, moral, and religious opportunities increase with added training and personal adjustments.
- 4. The Teacher is a Builder. The Teachers shape the budding childhood of today into a keystone for the social structure of tomorrow and into a link in the future chain of our history.
- 5. Teaching Inspires the Highest Ideals. There is nothing grander or more serviceable to a State than to lead, guide, and direct the unfolding possibilities of children of our State who are soon to handle the future destiny of the nation.
- 6. Teaching is Real Service. The greatest of servants was a teacher of children, men and women. No one can enter a calling that offers greater spiritual development, *truer* happiness and greater peace than the true calling of a teacher.
- 7. Teaching is Real Patroitism. There is no greater guarantee to the perpetuity of the ideals for which we live and for which many died, than the banishing of ignorance and prejudices from our democracy.

8. Teaching is the Profession of Professions. Judged by any standards that make people genuinely rich, truly happy, kindly serviceable, teaching is the parent and is the greatest of all professions. Teaching brings the pleasures and sorrows of the past, guides the present and guarantees the future. It is therefore, necessary that a State spend more of its money, give more of its finest talent to the great cause of public education, upon which will rest the solidarity of American ideals, safety of a State and the peace, prosperity, and happiness of the citizens. It is the duty of the teacher to render this service to a republic.

The Joy of Teaching

An Agassiz finds pleasure in digging among fossils in order that he may interpret the great story of prehistoric life; if a John Thoreau by Walden Pond is delighted with his studies of bugs and beetles; if a John Burroughs on his little patch of ground in the valley of the Mohawk glories in his life among the birds and bees; if a Luther Burbank is enraptured with his work of transforming a worthless desert cactus into an edible fruit, or in producing sweeter rose or fairer lily; if these and other workers, whose names are legion, revel in the love of their work-then by what terms shall we designate the joy that should be the teacher's who works not with mere fossils, nor with bugs or beetles, nor with birds, bees, or flowers, but with the child who is at once the most complex, the most plastic, the most beautiful, the most wonderful of all God's creation. Yes, it's a wonderful thing to be a teacher; it's a great thing to teach school.


The Teacher's Creed



HISTORY OF NORMAL SCHOOL

The General Assembly of 1891 made it possible for this school to begin January 4, 1892. The first appropriation amounted to \$900.00. Dr. P. W. Moore and one assistant started this school in a frame building on Shannon street. Dr. P. W. Moore served faithfully and well from the beginning until he was made President Emeritus in 1928 and Vice Principal J. H. Bias was made President.

President J. H. Bias was studying in the University of Chicago in 1904 when he was called to this school. Since then on three occasions Dr. P. W. Moore has called President Bias from other fields.

LOCATION

Elizabeth City is situated on the beautiful Pasquotank river in Pasquotank county. Elizabeth City has made many contributions to the educational history of North Carolina. In this city, N. C. Newbold, Director of Division of Negro Education, and J. C. Price, founder of Livingstone College, were born. Elizabeth City is in the neart of the great trucking section of eastern North Carolina.

Since the eastern section of North Carolina has neither a junior nor senior college, the State Normal School has furnished most of the Negro teachers for the elementary public schools in the eastern counties. There is a great need for this school.

OBJECT AND AIM

The main object of this State Normal School is the training of Negro teachers for the public schools of the State. This school has sent out many trained teachers into the urban life of the East, where they have been leaders in their communities.

UNIFORM

Girls and boys are not encouraged to spend money on clothes to make a show or attract attention or cause an unfavorable comment from the public.

The School feels this is the time for parents and students to use their best judgment and economy in buying school clothes. Mothers may cause undue embarrassment to their children by not supervising the buying of school clothes.

RULES OF PAYMENT

1. All money for fees should be sent by post office money order or cashier's check, registered letter and made payable to the President, J. H. Bias, and not to the student.

2. All students in the Dormitory pay as stated above.

3. Local students pay promptly: Entrance, fuel, ath-

letics and laboratory fees.

4. The School year consists of nine months of four-weeks each.

STUDENTS LOAN FUND

The students and members of the Faculty have organized a P. W. Moore Student Loan Fund. This fund is to furnish students small sums fo money for a short time at a low rate of interest. Many students could not have remained in school and completed their courses without the help from this fund.

Since the parents of children in this section will not make very much from the farm crops, there will be a great service for the loan fund this year. We are proud of the aid coming from white friends in trying to increase this fund.

Some students may work for money to pay some fees.

The school makes some provision to aid needy students by providing them with some work which will help to pay some of the fees. In view of the fact that the amount of work that can be provided is small and the number of applicants is large, the school reserves the right to withdraw such aid when the scholarship of the student aided is not satisfactory or when the work done by the student is not satisfactory.

ATHLETICS

The State Normal School has an Athletic Association controlled mainly by the students and for the students with faculty supervision. The Athletic Association fosters basketball for young men and young women; baseball, tennis for male and female; Inter-High Field Day.

MUSIC

Great emphasis is placed on the Teacher-Training phase of public school music. Cultural considerations are

given to Glee Club, Orchestra, Choruses. The Elizabeth City State Normal School has conducted an Inter-High School Singing Contest for a silver cup. Many high schools from northeastern North Carolina have entered A School Band was started this year.

DRAMATIC CLUBS

For many years this Normal School has offered great service to students who might be gifted in Dramatic Art. Three dramatic clubs were formed last year and gave programs in many eastern centers: Norfolk, Va., Winton, N. C., Edenton, N. C., Rich Square, N. C., Hertford N. C., and Plymouth, N. C.

Students are encouraged to develop any talent for Dramatic Expression

LITERARY CLUBS

For five years the high schools of eastern North Carolina have contested in an Oratorical Contest for a silver cup. This contest is to foster greater ideas in literature, oratory and public speaking.

RELIGIOUS LIFE OF THE SCHOOL

The students are allowed to organize and manage the Y. W. C. A. and Y. M. C. A. They are also allowed to conduct Prayer Meeting and teach Sunday School at times

The teacher in training should be under the high Christian ideals in order that a greater sympathy and leadership might be developed for the future field.

LIBRARY

The Normal School has a full-time trained librarian. The library has been fitted with new book racks, tables, chairs, desks, filing cabinet, newspaper and magazine racks.

The library has many thousand volumes. Practically every volume is new and was selected to fill a need in the Normal Course.

The Dewey Library Record System is being used.

BUILDING AND GROUNDS

The Campus of the State Normal School is of rare beauty with the spacious lawns with velvet carpets of grass, winding driveways of clay gravel, cement walks of service and graceful curves. These walks, lawns and driveways are the result of the skill of a landscape architect.

The buildings are mainly fireproof, well-placed and well-equipped with modern school room furniture.

The Moore Chapel, with the large stage, is among the best in the South.

The two dormitories for ladies have large airy rooms, with white iron beds, student reception rooms, and matron's rooms.

The dormitory for young men is a double modern three-story fireproof brick building, with shower baths and reception rooms.

The very beautiful well-equipped fireproof dining room, kitchen, pantry and store room are well-arranged. Ladies are not forced outdoors on leaving their rooms in the dormitory.

The first floor of the industrial building for boys will be changed into a Physical Education hall.

A new ten-room brick Rosenwald Training School was put into use this year.

SCHOOL FARM


The School Farm has vegetable gardens for the building department and for demonstrations. The farm is managed by a skillful gardener and furnishes work for young men students.

LAUNDRY

The laundry has modern steam equipment for washing and extracting, a new mangle and electric irons for ironing. Under the supervision of a trained laundry matron, the young ladies earn some money by doing all the work for teachers, young men, young ladies, the families of members of the faculty, and the dining room.

ADMISSION

For admission to the Normal Department, the applicant must show graduation from an approved four-year high school with fifteen units of work, or the equivalent of high school graduation, or by examination.

The applicant must show good health and promise as a teacher.

REGISTRATION

All desiring to enter should send for an application blank, fill and return the blank. This School will then aid the student in getting an official transcript of High School, College, Extension, and Summer School work. The application blank and transcript will classify the student.

ADVANCED STANDING

Advanced standing will be given to Standard High School graduates, on the basis College, Extension, and Summer School credits since High School graduation.

GRADING SYSTEM

The following five-point grading system is used for class work:

"A"—Excellent	90-per cent
"B"—Very good	85 per cent
"C"—Average	80 per cent
"D"—Passing	75 per cent
"E"—Failing	70 per cent

HONOR POINTS

Beginning with September, 1930, the following Scholarship Honor Point System will be used:

No honor points

Before being permitted to graduate in either curriculum, the student must have earned as many honor points as there are quarter-hour credits required in the curriculum. This is an average of "C." No student will be allowed to graduate who has a failure or an incomplete in any subject recorded against her.

Those students earning a total of two honor points and over for each quarter-hour credit earned, shall be graduated "with honor."

Those who earn two and one half honor points and over, shall be graduated "with high honor."

Those who earn three honor points for each quarterhour shall be graduated "with highest honor."

Suitable recognition of such students shall be made on the diploma.

UNIT OF WORK

The unit of work in the Normal School is a "quarterhour." A quarter-hour of credit is obtained when satisfactory work in a course for one hour a week for a quarter of twelve weeks or the equivalent is completed.

DIPLOMA

A Normal Diploma will be granted by the School to all who complete either the Primary Curriculum or the Grammar Grade Curriculum.

CERTIFICATE

The State Department of Education will issue a Grammar Garde Certificate, Class "B" or Primary Certificate, Class "B", to all who complete two years of Standard Normal work.

GRADUATION

Ninety-six (96) quarter hours of credits, with the required grade points are required for graduation.

SUGGESTED RULES AND REGULATIONS

The Elizabeth City state Normal School is run as nearly as possible as a well-regulated Christian home where all have an interest in all and in each. A few home-like requirements clearly set forth in the beginning should contribute to a better understanding, and should aid in avoiding troubles. All students who do not care to follow these suggestions will be asked to withdraw.

1. Boarding students will not be permitted to make week-end visits to friends. Frequent visits lead to inferior work on the part of the student and tend to interfere with the morale of the School.

2. The students keep their rooms in the Dormitory clean, in order and ready for inspection at all times. The corridors, halls, bathrooms, etc., will be cared for by employees of the School.

3. From 9:00 to 11:00 A. M. on Saturdays, the students are requested to spend two hours in general cleaning, arranging their rooms, repairing clothing and doing regular assigned work.

4. All visitors should get the consent of the Matron of each Dormitory before visiting any room.

5. On Sunday afternoon from 3:00 to 4:00, quiethour will be observed in all Dormitories.

6. Electric irons, electric stoves, etc., will not be allowed in the students' bedrooms. The students should allow the Matron to keep the electric irons and stoves, etc., and should get permission from the Matron to use irons, etc., in a special room.

7. No cooking at any time is allowed in any Dormitory.

8. All damage to furniture or building in the student's rooms will be repaired at the expense of the student causing such damage. 9. The students are requested not to use radios, phonographs, etc., in the students' bedrooms.


10. Boarding students will be required to attend Sunday School on the campus and one preaching service in the city every Sunday. Attendance at Chapel Exercises each school day. Prayer Meeting each Wednesday, Y. W. C. A. or Y. M. C. A., each Sunday afternoon is required of each boarding student

11. Commencement week is regarded as a regular part of the school year, and all students will be expected to remain until the official close of the school after the final program on Commencement Day has been rendered.

12. Students are regarded as being under the direction and supervision of the school authorities until they have reached their homes. Permission wi'l not be granted young women to make visits or take side trips en toute, without the written consent of parents or g ardians.

13. All excused absences from classes must be passed upon in writing by the Dean. Unexcused absences for the equivalent of one week's work in any subject for one quarter means automatic reduction of the student's grade in that subject. Absences for the equivalent of two week's work in any subject during the quarter for any reason will mean loss of credit unless the student files a written petition with the Faculty through the Dean for special action in the case. The authorities reserve the right at any time to resort to disciplinary measures for deliberate or wanton cutting of classes. Part 4



Description of Courses

EDUCATION

Ed. 111P

Ed. 111GG

Introduction to Teaching, Including Observation

The purpose of this course is to orientate the students in the field of education. Topics: Aims of Education; Types of Teaching; Organization; Management; Course of Study; Daily Program; Teacher Preparation; Building, and school as a Social Center. Credit: 3 hours each.

Educational Psychology

Ed. 211P Ed. 211GG

This course consists of a study of (1) Psychology of learning, (2) psychology of individual differences. The method of instruction is two-fold: Discussion and lecture. The psychology of learning is chiefly concerned with the laws and principles governing effective learning. Other topics: Marking System; Sex Differences; Influence of Heredity; Influence of Environment; Influence of Maturity. Credit: 3 hours each.

Arithmetic—Materials and Methods, Grade 1-3

Ed. 213P

The aim of this course is to emphasize the mathematical needs of children in play and work situations of daily life. To stress the importance of speed and accuracy in number computation. To present best materials and methods of presenting the subject.

This course provides for experiences necessary to meet the above needs. Situations that permit development of number concepts, the place of drills, projects in nature study, games and other activities as a basis for formal arthmetic, values and use of standard tests. Credit: 3 hours.

Geography and History-Materials and Methods, Grades 1-3

Ed. 226P

The aim of this course is to acquaint the student teachers with the materials and methods best suited to the presentation of geography and history in these grades.

The course includes the study of stories of Indian life, hero stories of other lands, Bible stories of some of the outstanding characters, stories of national holidays and observance of the other special days. To emphasize the application of geography to immediate needs and problems of life. Lessons are observed in the grades and each student is required to organize and present with abundant use of visual and such as pictures, sand tables, maps, diagram some topic in home geography. Credit: 3 hours.

Primary Reading—Materials and Methods, Grades 1-3 Ed. 133P

The aim of this course is to acquaint students with the needs, meaning, the psychology and pedagogy of oral and silent reading in the first three grades. To emphasize the modern methods and current practices in the teaching of reading.

The course includes a practical study of materials and methods of teaching reading. The purposes and principles underlying the teaching of phonics, measurements of reading by standard and informal tests. Diagnostic and remedial work in reading. The physiology and hygiene of reading. Attention is given to the between recitation activities and self-directed seat-work. Credit: 3 hours.

Practice Teaching

Ed. 212P Ed. 212GG Ed. 225P Ed. 225GG

Observation and participation precede, accompany and are a preparation for responsible teaching at the beginning of each assignment.

Subject matter unit plans are selected, planned by student teacher, reviewed and checked by critic. Daily lesson plans are planned and prepared by student teacher, reviewed, revised, teaching errors checked and corrected by critic. Individual as well as group conferences are held often. Written criticism by critic is given to each at the close of the teaching period. As soon as student teachers show ability to criticise intelligently, each writes criticisms on each other showing strong points, weak points, and how they can be corrected, etc. Credit: 8 hours each quarter.

Test and Measurements

Ed. 227P Ed. 227GG

Designed to give elementary teachers sufficient acquaintance with standard tests and scales to enable them to use such instruments for the improvement of classroom instruction. Credit: 3 hours each.

Principles of Elementary School Teaching

Ed. 238P

Ed. 239GG

. This course considers the aims of education and the work of the teacher in the light of these aims. It includes a study of the principles of psychology which are involved in teaching, and their application in the work of the classroom. Emphasis is placed on special lesson types and methods of group and individual instruction. Credit: 3 hours each. Ed. 226GG

Material and Methods in History

This course offers a brief survey of the development of school instruction in history from the 17th Century to the present, an appraisal of the existing systems of history teaching in Europe and the United States, a body of principles for guidance in determining what history should be taught and how, and the application in detail of these principles to classroom procedure. Credit: 3 hours.

Classroom Management

Ed. 132P

Ed. 132GG

These courses are intended to give the student a practical knowledge of the problems of school organization and control. Topics: Principles of Public Education; Compulsory School Laws; Supervision; Classification and Progress of Children; Daily Schedules, Records and Reports, Grading, Discipline, and School Plant. Credit: 3 hours each.

Materials and Methods in Reading

Ed. 133GG

This course sets up the chief objectives of reading in Grades 4-7, and outlines specific means of reaching these objectives. The relationship of this work of the lower to that of the upper grades is made clear, and special types of group and remedial instruction are considered. Observations in the demonstration school form an important part of this course. Credit: 3 hours.

Arithmetic—Materials and Methods, Grades 4-7

Ed. 213GG

This course is designed to prepare teachers of arithmetic of the fourth, fifth, sixth and seventh grades. A thorough study is made of the fundamental principles upon which computation of whole numbers, fractions, decimals and percentage depend. Time is given to problems from real life. Methods of presentation of the arithmetic of these are worked out in class. Credit: 3 hours.

Materials and Methods in Geography

Ed. 227GG

This course includes (1) a study of the aims in teaching geography, (2) a study of the general principles underlying the selection and organization of the subject matter. There will be a concideration of the various types of Georgraphy beginning with Home Georg arby with special emphasis on the relation of the work of the upper to the lower grades. Modern methods will be discussed and applied. Observations in the demonstration school form a part of this course. Credit: 3 hours.

Eng. 221P Eng. 221GG

A study of English writers and their contributions beginning with the Age of Chaucer. Student written criticisms and appreciations required. Credit: 3 hours each.

American Literature

Eng. 232P

Eng. 232GG

A study of American writers and their contributions beginning with the Knickerbecker group. Student written criticism and appreciations required. Credit: 3 hours each.

Materials and Methods in Oral and Written Composition Eng. 211GG

This course considers (1) the aims in teaching composition, grammar and spelling in grades 4-7 of the elementary school, and (2) the selection and treatment of subject-matter and methods of teaching necessary to accomplish these aims. Observation lestons in the demonstration school are included as a part of this course. Credit: 3 hours.

Story Telling and Oral Composition

Eng. 211P

Aim in Story Telling:

a. To study the value of the story in the mental and moral development of children.

b. To learn how to select and adapt stories for use in the primary grades.

c. To give practice in the best methods of story telling.

Aim in Oral Composition:

a. To study how to develop proper speech habits and effective expression in the primary grades through practice in the correct presentation of suitable materials. Credit: 3 hours.

Children's Literature

Eng.	123GG	Eng.	$112\mathbf{P}$
Eng.	133GG	Eng.	124P

These courses aim to give the student an appreciation of the best in children's literature, to train her to tell stories in such a way that it will give pleasure to herself and others and to give a basis of selecting materials. It will include the following topics: Essential of Good Story Telling; Types of Materials, as "Mother Goose," Folk and Fairy Tales, Fables, Legends, Myths, Realistic Stories and Poetry. A story for each grade will be used. Credit: 3 hours each quarter.

GEOGRAPHY

Principles of Georgraphy .

Geog. 121P

This course is a foundation course for the later study of all geography. Since the major georgrapical factors in determining the distribution of people, what they do, how they live, etc., is climate, most emphasis will be put upon that topic: Credit: 3 hours.

World Geography

Geog. 132P

An introductory world survey of the economic geography of the different continents according to natural regions. This course leads into world problems involving a knowledge of countries and common races, trade relations and products. Credit: 3 hours.

Georgraphy (North America)

Geog. 211GG

A first course in regional geography which deals with relationships between types of human activities and natural environment. A study will be made of the major human adjustments to natural environments which results from efforts to make a living. Credit: 3 hours.

UNITED STATES HISTORY

111P 111GG 122P 122GG 134P 133GG

Complete survey of American history. The conditions in Europe during the fifteenth century which influenced the discovery and settlement of the new world are considered. Causes of the Revolution, the struggle of the Englich Colonies, problems which lead to Civil War, new economic, political, social era after Civil War, the cause and results of the World War. Credit: 3 hours for each quarter.

Grammar Grade Arithmetic

Arith. 111GG 2 Semester hours credit 3 times per week.

The aim of this course is to provide the student with a knowledge and skill in the use of the tools of arithmetic as is taught in the grammar grades. Special emphasis will be placed upon problems dealing with life situations. Among the topics discussed will be; reading and writing of numbers, integers and de decimals, fundamentals processes with integers, common and decimal fractions, simple factoring, aliquot parts, bills and accounts, ratio, denominate numbers, perimeters and areas of geometrical figures.

BIOLOGY

111P 122P

111GG 122GG

This course includes a broad survey of the entire plant and animal kingdoms and a study of such topics as heredity, embryology, evolution, animal breeding, plant breeding, eugenics, which will develop a background for the study of psychology, sociology and hygiene.

The study of text and reference books is supplemented by the use of lantern slides, microscopic preparation, charts, models and museum specimens. Credit: 3 hours each.

BIOLOGY (Nature Study)

231P

The various topics are treated from two standpoints: subjectmatter and method of teaching. During spring frequent field trips are taken to study plants and animals in their natural environments to learn where materials may be collected.

This work is supplemented by laboratory studies of materials, indoors. Special attention is given to seasonal changes, pets, fruits, and vegetables. Credit: 2 hours.

HYGIENE AND SANITATION

Hyg. 231P Hyg. 231GG

A course in personal and community hygiene as essential to an understanding of school-health problems. Only so much of physiology is included as is needed for a background. The following topics are included: Normal growth and its standards; courses of abnormal growth; common defects; methods of detecting and of treating them from the school standpoint. Credit: 7 hours each.

PUBLIC SCHOOL MUSIC

Music 111P, 122P, 133P, 211P, 222P, 233P; 111GG, 122GG, 133GG, 211GG, 222GG and 233GG.

These courses will consist of the study of the theory, including sight-singing, ear-training, dictation, rhythm and the teaching of rote songs. Certain topics of musical appreciation will be studied. Credit: 1 hour per each quarter.

PHYSICAL EDUCATION AND GAMES

Phys. Ed. 122P, 131P, 211P, 222P, 233P; 122GG, 131GG, 211GG, 222GG and 233GG,

1. General Physical Education. A program of general physical education activities, which includes gymnastics, posture work, folk dancing, games, and self-testing activities. The aims of this course are: (1) the individual participation of students in healthful physical activities; (2) a foundation for the methods, courses and a preparation for teaching. Credit: 5 hours.

2. Songs and Games. The course deals with the development and use of rhythmic activities and games based upon the play instincts and fundamental movements; a discussion of the principles and method employed in developing these; the interpretation of instrumental music through simple dances; the dramatization of scngs and of experiences growing out of every-day interests, and the use of the best traditional games. Credit: 1 hour for each quarter

DRAWING

Drawing 111GG, 133GG-a, 211GG, 222GG, 233GG, Credit: I quarter hour; 133GG-b, Credit: 2 quarter hours.

The aim of this course is to give instruction and practice in the essentials of drawing, to develop creative expressions rather than copying from text.

This course includes the study of definite art principles followed in each case with assigned problems with practice in the technic of drawing and calls for individual art judgment, differentiated for two departments in elementary school.

Topics Discussed: Color theory, designing, lettering, representation of stories, decoration, perspective drawing principles, the various media used, water color, crayons lead pencil, charcoal, etc., study of art appreciation and picture study.

INDUSTRIAL ARTS AND HANDWORK—Grades 1-3

Drawing 111P, 133P-a, 211P, 222P, 233P, Credit: 1 quarter hour; 122P, 133P-b, Credit: 2 quarter hours.

This course has been planned to meet the needs of primary teachers, to accquaint the student with the application of the principles of construction, decoration and designing of useful articles with lexlites, paper, crayons, water colors, etc., the elements of free-hand drawing of objects and nature drawing, to develop a desire for creative expression through drawing.

Topics Discussed: Study of lettering, paper folding, construction and designing, poster making, bookbinding and decorating book covers, desk blotters, clay modeling, paper pulp modeling, etc.

SEWING

Sewing 121GG 121P.

This course includes the principles of sewing, use of patterns, cutting, fitting and garment making and also the study of materials and colors. Credit: 2 hours.

COOKING

Cooking 111P 111GG.

This course includes the principles of cooking, a study of the classes of foods and their use in the diet. Stress will be placed on the planning and serving of simple meals. Credit: 2 hours.


PENMANSHIP

Writing 111P 111GG.

The aim of this course is to acquaint the student with the value and need for a legible, rapid, easy style of handwriting. To equip students for teaching handwriting in the grades. It is differentiated for primary and grammar grades divisions.

These are some of the topics discussed: Characteristics of legibility, the psychology of habit-building, the underlying principles of muscular movement processes, standard of speed and accuracy, detection and correction of errors.

Attention is given to practice upon paper and blackboard until mastery of the muscular movement processes is secured and the product is suitable for imitation and demonstration. Special attention is given to the pedagogy and hygiene of handwriting. Credit: $\frac{1}{2}$ hour for each.



High School Department

Only Fourth Year Class Will Be Maintained in 1930-31

This department aims to give a solid secondary education. Being an accredited State High School, it meets the needs both of those who desire to pursue the Normal course here, and of those who plan to take higher courses elsewhere.

Those seeking admission to Fourth Year must satisfy the committee on classification that they are able to pursue, profitably and successfully, the work of the class to which admission is sought.

A diploma will be awarded to all who complete the... course.

COURSE OF STUDY

(Recitations in all subjects occur five times a week 60 minutes) FOURTH YEAR

Required

English IV Physics American History and Civics Commercial and Advanced Arithmetic or Plane Geometry Latin II or French II

ENGLISH

The general aims of the study of English are: first, to enable the student to speak and write correctly and effectively; second, to acquaint him with the best works of our leading English and American authors; third, to develop in him an appreciation for good literature and the habit of reflective reading.

English IV

This course, designed for fourth year, is a continuation of the course above, so far as composition is concerned, with emphasis on argumentative themes. The work in composition is supplemented by a study of the history of English literature and by an appreciative study of typical examples of the various literary types. Composition based on the literature read, and practice in debate are features of this course.

Texts: Lockwood and Emerson's Composition and Rhetoric, Metcalf's English Literature, and Richo's A Study of Types of Literature.

HISTORY AND CIVICS

Fourth Year

Civics. The aim of this course is to teach the ethics of citizenship and to show the unity of all human relationship.

Text: Dole's The New American Citizen.

History. American. This course is a thorough review of the chief events in the development of our government and its institutions. The aim is to enable the student, by contrasting present with past conditions, to better understand our problems of today and to show them their relation to such problems.

MODERN LANGUAGES

French II

French of the fourth year is a continuation of the work of the third year with the emphasis placed on composition and the acquiring of greater ease in interpreting French thought. Selections from the best authors are used in this course.

Latin II

The first four books of Caesar's Gallic War are studied during the fourth year, with stress upon characteristic arrangement of the author, the motive and historical importance of each campaign, and the common construction in use.

Textbook: Bennett's Caesar's Gallic War.

MATHEMATICS

The three principal aims of this department are: (1) to prepare the student for the practical application of mathematics to every day problems; (2) to develop in him power in mathematics methods of reasoning; and (3) to give him a good foundation for higher mathematics. The following courses are offered in the fourth year. See catalog Page 50 for Plane Geometry.

Advanced and Commercial Arithmetic

This course is offered for the purpose of giving the student an insight into the more advanced work of arithmetic as well as to give him some practice and knowledge of arithmetic as is found in the business world. Special emphasis will be placed on the application of arithmetic to every day life.

SCIENCE

The courses of study in the science department are p'anned to give training in habits of precision in accurate observation, in reasoning, in devices of experimentation and in an understanding of the valid grounds of proof and the logical basis of generalization.

Fourth Year

Physics will be offered in the fourth year. This subject will acquaint the student with the relation of energy and matter.

Laboratory work will be emphasized.

Text: Cathcart and Chute's First Principles of Physics.

SUMMER SCHOOL

The Summer School is the Fourth Quarter of the Normal School in which Normal students may do one quarter of Normal work and regular winter teachers may take either Normal work or regular State Summer School Courses.

TRAINING SCHOOL

This new Training School is across the road from the Administration building. This makes a very convenient arrangement for the lady students. In this building there are offices for Director of Teacher Training, Library, lunch room, and a very large auditorium. This building has steam heat and modern sanitary provisions.

THE EXTENSION DEPARTMENT

Through the Extension Department, the Elizabeth City State Normal School offers opportunities to study to teachers in the field, who are holders of State Certificates or the equivalent and are unable to be in residence during the regular year. Such nonresident credits when combined with resident credits earned during a regular term or a Summer School session are accepted on a certificate and for work on graduation.

All instruction is given by members of the regular faculty in classes which meet at frequent intervals, usually on Saturdays in centers within range of the School.

Residence and Extension work cannot be done at the same time.

The Extension work for one year should neither take the place of Summer School nor equal to the credits of a six-week Summer School.


