The point of this entire series of messages is to go on a journey to rediscover honesty, integrity, and clear thinking. Jesus indicates that understanding the resurrection is a matter not of faith but of accurate, clear thinking. Therefore, we are going to take a rational approach to understanding the resurrection. However, before we do that, answer this question. How easy is it for you to trust the accounts of Jesus' resurrection? Why or why not?
