Read John 14:13-14 & 15:7-8

In these verses, Jesus makes some pretty bold statements. How do those statements affect you? How do you apply them to your life?

People ask us what we want and we go ahead and tell them, but in these passages, Jesus clearly tells us to bring our wants, desires, wishes to him! This Christmas, we are going to practice bringing our needs to Jesus and through Jesus to our Heavenly Father!

Read Luke 11:1-10

Luke's version of "The Lord's Prayer" is shorter than Matthew's because Jesus probably taught this lesson a lot in slightly different ways. Jesus intended for this prayer to serve as a pattern or model not to be memorized and recited.

The first phrase of the prayer reminds us that we should think of God as our Glorious Father, high and lifted up, but also personal and close. What are some ways you are aware of God's closeness? What are some ways you are aware of his glory and exaltation? How do those two truths affect you?

Read Luke 2:8-20
