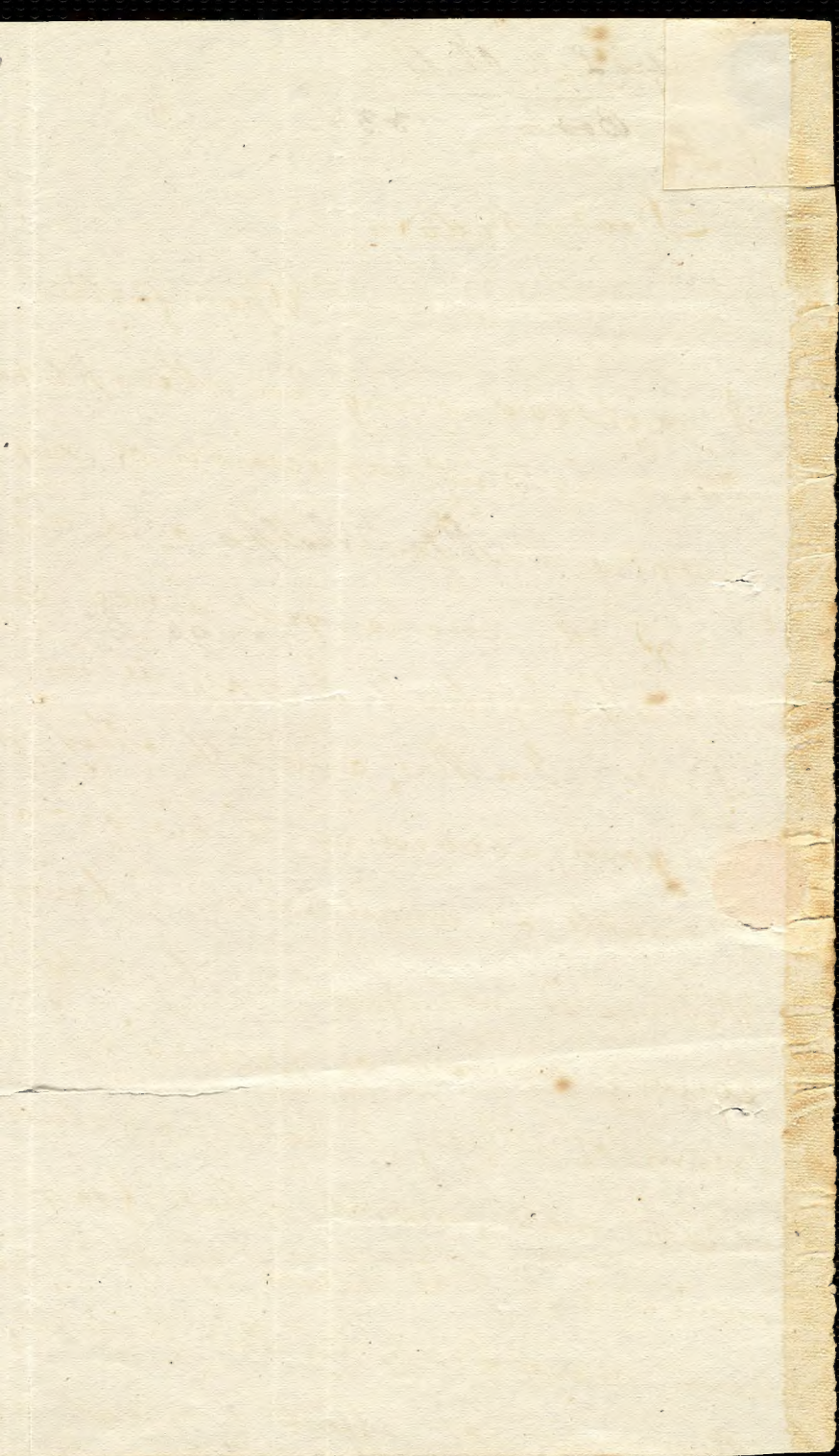
Dear Madam,
