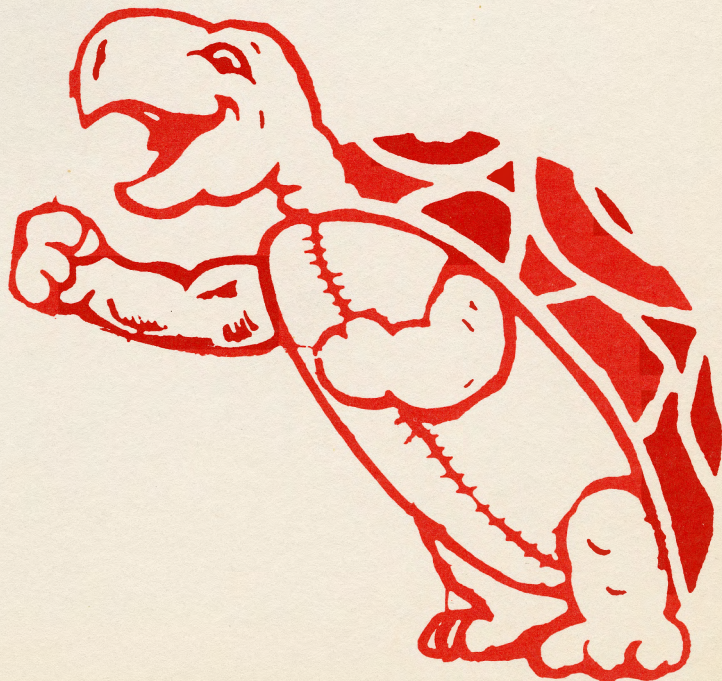
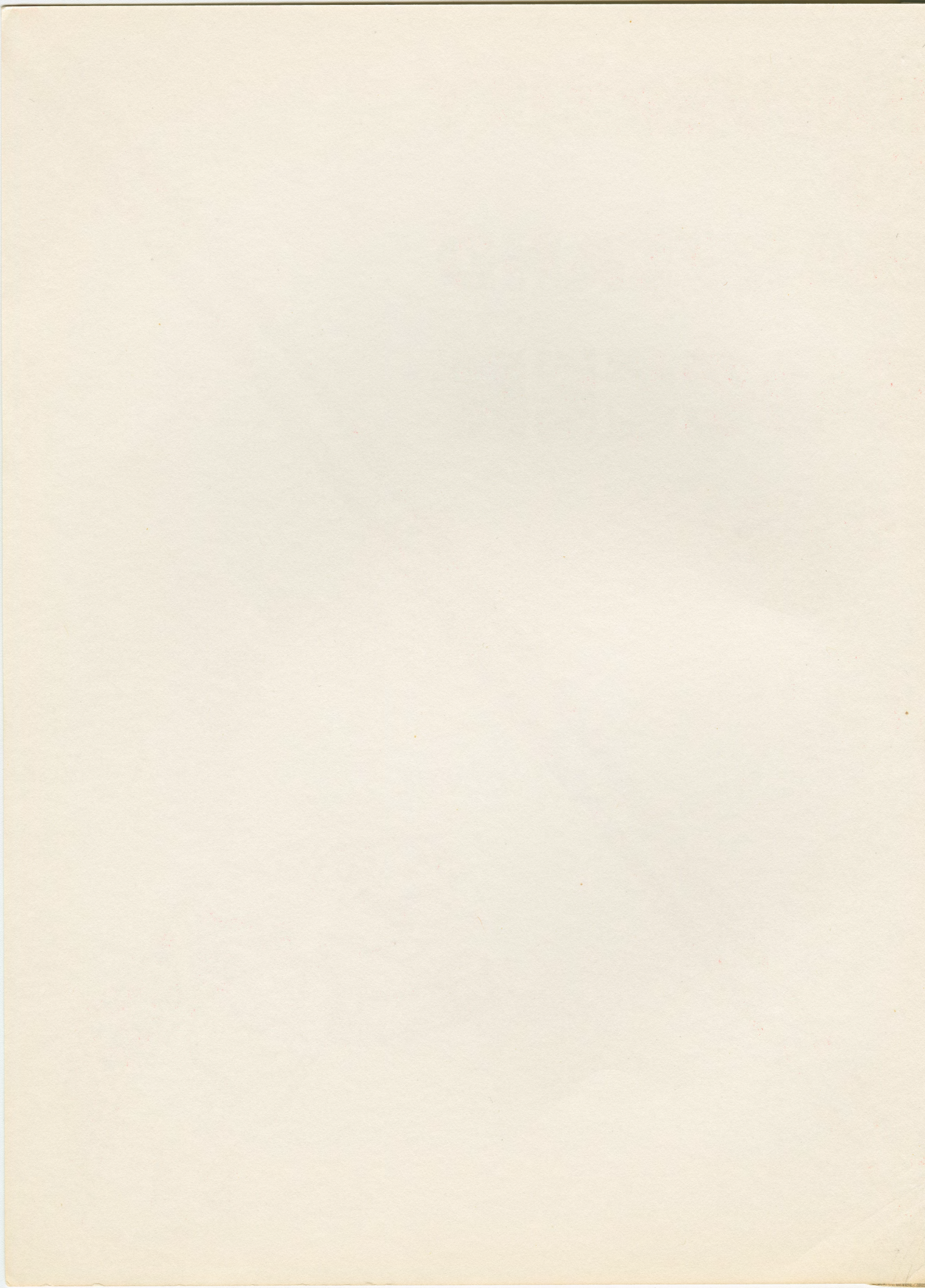

COACHING STAFF

JIM DIETSCH, HEAD SOCCER COACH

Jim's home town is Baltimore where he attended Baltimore Polytechnic High School. After graduation from the University of Maryland in 1969 he served 3 years with the U.S. Army. In 1974 he started working with the Athletic Program as Asst. Soccer and Asst. Lacrosse Coach. In 1975 Jim was named Head Soccer Coach while still remaining Asst. Lacrosse Coach. After his first year he was selected to serve on the South Selection Committee for the NCAA Soccer Championship. Also Jim was chosen to be Chairman of the All Atlantic Coast Conference Soccer Team Committee. Jim is married to the former Barbara Yates who teaches junior high school at Buck Lodge Junior High School.

JOE CRYAN, ASST. SOCCER COACH

Joe's home town is Trenton, N.J. where he attended Notre Dame High School and gained All-State Honors. Joe played for the University of Maryland in 1965 and 1966 before turning pro in 1966, 1967 with the Washington Darts. After serving two years in the Army, Joe returned to the University of Maryland graduating in 1974. Joe teaches at Laurel Sr. High and is working towards his Masters Degree in reading at Bowie State College. This is his fourth year as assistant soccer coach and we are very fortunate to have a specialist who can spend individual time with our goalkeepers.

DAVE PIZARRO, ASST. SOCCER COACH

Dave is from Catonsville, Maryland where he attended Park School. He went on to Springfield College where he played three years of varsity soccer. Named to the All New England Team as fullback his senior year, he was drafted by the Boston Minutemen of the North American Soccer League. Dave decided to continue his studies in Physical Education at the University of Maryland. He is now in his second year as a graduate assistant in the Physical Education Department and working on the completion of a Masters Degree in adapted Physical Education.

LARRY STERN, ASST. SOCCER COACH

Larry's home town is Oceanside, New York where he attended Oceanside High School. He went on to Nassau Community College where he played two years of varsity soccer and baseball. In 1974 Larry attended the University of Maryland and played two years of varsity soccer. He was captain his senior year and was selected to the All-ACC Team. Larry is graduating in December with a degree in Kinesiological Sciences and will be attending graduate school for Physical Therapy next Fall.

DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS

James H. "Jim" Kehoe

When Jim Kehoe assumed the duties as Director of Athletics in 1969 he approached the job with the same fervor and determination he had devoted to his duties as a teacher and coach for 24 years.

His seven years as Terrapin Athletic Director have been exciting to say the least. The Terps have become National powers in basketball, football and lacrosse with one of the most successful athletic programs in the nation both artistically and financially.

Today Kehoe administers a program that encompasses 21 varsity sports, is self supporting financially and nationally acclaimed.

The Football team reigns as the Gator Bowl Champions; the Basketball team has recorded five consecutive 20-victory seasons and the Lacrosse team has been in the NCAA Championship game the past four seasons, winning a pair of National titles.

Kehoe was one of the first Athletic Directors to assume any responsibilities for Women's Athletics and now has a total commitment to making the Maryland Women's program one of the best in the nation with eight Women's varsity sports.

Despite the added responsibilities and financial problems besetting intercollegiate athletics today Kehoe directs one of the few athletic programs in the nation that is not operating at a deficit.

During Kehoe's tenure as Athletic Director the Terrapins have twice won the NCAA Championship in Lacrosse and three times finished as runner-up for the National title, won the National Invitational Tournament title in Basketball and gained the Eastern and Midwestern Regionals of the NCAA basketball tournament and the football team has been to three consecutive Bowls winning the Gator Bowl title this past season.

Within the ACC the Terps have won three consecutive Carmichael Cup and in seven years captured 31 of 89 possible championships under Kehoe's direction as compared to 17 for runner-up North Carolina. Maryland has now captured 125 titles since the ACC was formed in 1953, more than double the 59 by North Carolina to rank second.

While a student at Maryland he was president of the Men's League and a member of Omicron Delta Kappa National Honorary Fraternity.

In addition to coaching at Maryland he served as an Associate Professor of Physical Education and Director of Intramural Athletics. He holds an Honorary Doctor's degree from Steed College in Tennessee.

SOCCER PREVIEW

The '76 Terrapins will return 9 of 11 starters from last year's 6-5-1 squad. This year's team will offer second year Coach Jim Dietsch more experience and more talent than the freshmen oriented team he started last season. Defense plays a very important role in the success of any sport and in soccer this is just as true.

The first line of defense, the fullbacks, will be the strongest position for the Terps. Returning will be lettermen Steve Salamony, Alroy Scott and Don Kraft. Two highly touted freshmen will be pushing this trio for a starting sport. Scott Bodderly, a high school All-American from Webster, N.Y. and Chris Orsborne of Laurel H.S. are expected to see action at fullback.

In goal for the Terps will be senior Tony Kondratenko. Tony came to Maryland after an outstanding junior college career at Essex C.C. in Baltimore. Starting for Maryland as a Junior, he registered three consecutive shutouts against Catholic U., American U. and N.C. State. Backing up Kondratenko will be sophomore Larry Howell who is considered by Dietsch to be one of the best all around athletes on the team.

The halfback line will be very deep this season, so deep in fact that Dietsch will alternate halfbacks in much the same fashion midfielders are in Lacrosse. Senior Paul Tamberino is expected to replace graduated Fred Winckelmann who started for Maryland each of his four years. All ACC halfback Gonzalo Soto returns. Soto was the leading scorer for the Terps in '75 with 6 goals and 2 assists. Others who are going to see action at halfback are Dan Gresser, Bob Kim, Bryan Kittelberger and Hank Lockman, all sophomores this year.

The area of most concern for Dietsch will be the frontline. Two of the four positions are filled with the return of Chris Miller and Ken Johnson, both freshmen starters last year. Competing for the other two starting spots will be Eric Packheiser, Dave Bartels and newcomers Ron McKeever, Kenan McCoy, Jeff Amrhein and John Myers. McKeever and McCoy are freshmen while Amrhein and Myers are transfers from Essex C.C.

The '76 season will see the Terps using a different team philosophy than the one used last season. Instead of playing a 4-3-3 pattern with four fullbacks, the Terps will be using a 4-2-4 with four frontline players. This will give the Terps more offensive punch. The key to this type of pattern is not the frontline but the halfbacks and fullbacks because they will have more responsibilities on offense and defense.

The '76 schedule features a strong ACC challenge with improved teams being fielded at North Carolina and Virginia. Clemson was the conference champs in '75 and one of the best teams in the nation. They return 16 lettermen. In addition to the conference schedule, the Terps will face Eastern powers in Penn State and Navy plus D.C. schools Catholic U., American U. and George Washington.

ACADEMIC ENVIRONMENT

The University of Maryland is a member of the American Universities and Colleges which selects the top fifty university systems in the country. It is currently the seventh largest university in the nation--and, with such size, comes quality. This means better facilities, not only in the day-to-day classroom, but also in the research and faculty staff. Our teaching staff consists of over 6,000 personnel--which brings our student/professor ratio down to 16-1. This allows us to offer a degree in a variety of fields (122) on the undergraduate level, as well as on the graduate level (58 graduate programs, 53 doctoral programs.) With such great flexibility in the curriculum, you also have a flexibility in your desired course of study which you may not enjoy at many other schools.

Not only is your education at the University of Maryland highly flexible, but it is also one of high quality, developed with many years of experience. Our School for Dentistry is the finest dental schools in the world; the School of Pharmacy is the third oldest in the nation; and the College of Agriculture is the third oldest in the Western Hemisphere. The University of Maryland is rich in experience and history, but also has its eye to the future in all fields. The Laser Ranging Retro Reflector experiment placed on the moon by the Apollo II astronauts was developed by a group of scientists headed by a University of Maryland professor. Recently our College of Education won "The Distinguished Achievement Award for Excellence in Teacher Education." This award is given each year to only one university. This campus also has the world's largest sectored isochronous Cyclotron which is available to students.

In many respects the College Park campus is a city of young people with all the advantages, excitement and problems of a community. While the focus of the campus community is on its academic and intellectual activities, the campus has its own daily newspaper, its own police department, an 18 hole golf course, hotel, stores, movie house, theatre, art gallery, pub, bowling alley, tennis courts and swimming pool. It is a Georgian-Colonial campus with nearly 200 buildings spaced across a rolling 1300 acre park-like setting.

The facilities, faculty, history, and flexibility are not our only strengths. The University of Maryland is totally committed to the individual student, regardless of whether he is a freshman or a candidate for a Ph.D. A full-time advisor is provided by our Athletic Department for personal and vocational counseling for student athletes.

We, at the University of Maryland, are extremely proud of our academic programs and will continue to live up to the outstanding academic record we have set.

University of Maryland Soccer players should have these three qualities:

- 1) Hustle - implies determination and motivation to give 100% all the time and to work harder for the team.
- 2) Togetheriness - it is important for teammates to develop good relations with each other, to respect and help each other and to communicate.
- 3) Concentration - implies understanding your role, team objectives, reading and reacting to the opponents, and adjusting to the demands of the game. Be an intelligent soccer player.
