## **PROCEEDINGS**

of the

THREE FORKS BAPTIST ASSOCIATION held with

PLEASANT GROVE BAPTIST CHURCH Zionville, N. C.

#### FIRST DAY

Tuesday, August 26th, 1941

#### **Morning Session**

- 1. The Three Forks Baptist Association of North Carolina met in its One Hundred First Session with Pleasant Grove Baptist Church, Zionville, N. C., August 26th, 1941, at 9:00 A. M.
- 2. The Session was opened by singing "How Firm a Foundation," led by Gordon Hodges and R. C. Eggers led in prayer.
- 3. The Moderator called the One Hundred First Session to order for the transaction of business.
- 4. The Clerk called the roll of churches. All churches were represented either by messenger or letter.
- 5. By motion duly seconded and carried it was agreed that the Association would run on Eastern Standard Time.
- 6. The Moderator delivered a short address in which he emphasized the history of the Association and the efforts made recently by our leadership to improve both our churches and the Association.
- 7. Wade E. Brown read the report of the Executive Committee on Order of Business which was adopted on motion of R. C. Eggers.
- 8. The report on Religious Literature was read by the Clerk and was discussed by J. C. Canipe, Wade E. Brown, Clyde R. Greene, N. M. Greene, Dr. R. C. Gresham and Walter Carroll and was adopted.

#### REPORT ON RELIGIOUS LITERATURE

Your committee desires to call attention to the abundance or literature available at our publication headquarters in Nashville. It is not possible to find a phase of our work for which there is not a fund of excellent material. Hundreds of tracts are ours for the asking.

In our own state there is now being published one of the most far-sighted and readable religious papers to be found in the whole Southland. We also have Charity and Children published by the orphanage press.

All of these publications are helpful and should be read widely. We only wish that many of them would make a greater appeal to our young people, many of whom seem to be finding greater attraction in the publications of some of the other denominations. We know that this is purely a selfish attitude, but feel that we are justified in an effort to enliven and continue the doctrines and practices which have made our denomination the citadel of religious liberty.

9. J. C. Canipe presented the report on Temperance which was discussed by Vilas Minton, Levi Greene, J. C. Canipe, J. S. Brown, M. J. Williams, J. M. Hodges and Henry Crisp and the report was adopted.

#### REPORT ON TEMPERANCE

The liquor situation has become so bad in the Nation that it is now our major problem. The four curses of the human race have been and are, prostitution, gambling, godlessness and liquor. Of these liquor is now leading the way in our modern American life. When our nation repealed her prohibition laws she took the worst turn in all her history. Liquor men and liquor interests now ride high in the nation and even control state legislatures in so-called dry states.

We hear a great deal about democracy today. We fought one world war to make the world safe for democracy. We are now the arsenal of the democracies. But where is our democracy in reality? More than one hundred citizens went to Raleigh with more than one thousand signed resolutions from churches and citizens in their hands and requested the Legislature to put beer out of Watauga County. What answer did we get? Every person in this Association knows. We were almost laughed at and the reply was "NO."

Then in the last Legislature thousands of the citizens of this state petitioned that body which is supposed to represent the best citizenship of the state, to give us the right to vote on the liquor

question. What was the answer again? "NO," and this decision was made by twelve men against the request of the tens of thousands of our best citizens over the state. Is that democracy? Is it democracy when twelve men say to a state of three millions of people that they can't vote on any situation or public question? Is it democracy when a dry county wants to be rid of the curse of beer and yet has no say so in any way about the question? Do we have to sit still and see our sons murdered in road houses that are openly so foul that they smell to high heaven and have no protection from the law or no right to vote our convictions? Is that democracy?

What are we going to do about it? Are we going to sit still and, have the rotten liquor and beer crammed down our throats against our wills, or are we going to rise up and do something about it? If the Baptists of North Carolina would rise up together like the Israelites and smite the wet Philistines hip and thigh with our ballots at election time, we could regain our self-resepct, our dry state and our democracy. But until this is done we can keep on crying democracy, democracy when there is no democracy. What shall it profit America if she gain the whole world and lose her own soul? Respectfully submitted,

W. Sebastian, Brushy Mountain Association; Henry Crisp, Caldwell Association; Carl Triplett, Moderator Stony Fork Association, and J. C. Pipes representing the State Board.
- 13. Beech Valley, a new Baptist Church of Beech Creek, N. C., requested membership in our Association and the Moderator appointed the following as a committee to report of her application: J. C. Canipe, Grady Hamby and R. C. Eggers.
- 14. The Moderator announced the following committees: NOMINATIONS: R. C. Eggers, Dallas Wilson and I. B. Wilson.

- FINANCE: M. J. Williams, J. J. Wellborn, Kemp Wilson and Larkin Pennell.
- TIME, PLACE AND PREACHER: Ira Hodges, Walter Carroll and Lawrence Greene.
- 15. J. C. Canipe, the appointee to preach the Annual Sermon, read from the 26th chapter of the Acts and announced his text. "Whereupon, O King Agrippa, I was not disobedient to the heavenly vision," and his subject, "Paul's Vision and Ours. His sermon was very timely emphasizing the following thoughts:

#### A. Paul Had a Vision

- 1. He saw the Christians as they were persecuted, 2. He saw God in Stephen, 3. He met the Christ on the Damascus road, 4. He saw his own condition, 5. He saw a lost world, 6. He experienced the remedy.
- B. Paul Obeyed the Vision
- 1. He worked at the job, 2. He overcame difficulties, 3. He pressed toward the mark, 4. He kept his eyes on the cross, 5. He talked of his experiences with Christ, 6. He sought the lost everywhere and anywhere.
- C. Results of His Obedience to the Vision
- 1. Souls were saved, 2. Churches were organized, 3. The Kingdom of God was advanced, 4. Christ was glorified, 5. Paul was immortalized himself.
- 16. The Association adjourned for noon recess; benediction by W. D. Ashley.

#### Tuesday Afternoon Session

- 17. The Association reconvened at 1:00 P. M., the devotional service being conducted by Clayton Greene. R. H. Satterfield led in prayer.
- 18. The committee recommended that we admit Beech Valley Baptist Church of Beech Creek, N. C., into our Association. By motion and second this was done and the Moderator extended a welcome to the delegates from this church.
- 19. Mrs. Verne Greene read the report on Missions. Upon motion to adopt it was discussed by Mrs. Verne Greene, R. H. Satterfield and J. C. Pipes and was adopted.

#### REPORT ON MISSIONS

From the great commission which Jesus gave to his chosen disciples has come the greatest task human beings have ever undertaken. Jesus said go into the world preaching, teaching, baptizing and making disciples in every nation. Here missionary work began from which has developed our program of missions divided into State, Home and Foreign Missions.

Southern Baptists at this time are also interested in providing churches, chapels and preachers for our boys who are in the service of our country in the army camps.

Every church in the Three Forks Association should endeavor to pray, teach and give more, making our churches more in keeping with the great commission. If we as Christians fail to do this and complete the task Jesus gave us, upon whom can He depend? Your committee urges every church in our association to become real missionary churches, growing in the knowledge and faith of Jesus, continuing in prayer and the winning of lost souls to Christ, at all times giving God the glory.

#### REPORT ON CHRISTIAN TRAINING

We are living in days of the greatest stress and tribulation that the world has ever known. It would seem that all the evil forces of Satan and all his cohorts have been unleased to run rampant upon our civilization in an effort to destroy it from the face of the earth. It is the consensus of this committee that there is only one solution to the evils that do so thoroughly beset us — that of a return to the religion of our forefathers. This can only be accomplished through a world program of Christian training.

It was the program of our Saviour when he lived among us to gather a small group of sincere and devoted disciples at his feet and instruct them in His plan of world salvation. These were then to go into all the world and preach the gospel to every creature. Thus the plan of salvation is a personal and individual one. If each one of us who profess to be His disciples would follow His plan and take the gospel to our loved ones, our friends, and to the world, trying to win them by our personal efforts and by our love for them, dawn of the millenium would soon break upon us.

But His disciples need a program of Christian training before they are able to do their best for their Master. For this purpose, therefore, we have set up certain agencies in our land to aid in such a training program.

We would, therefore, recommend to our pastors and church leaders a renunciation of all creeds and propaganda and a return to the Old Time Religion of our fathers. If such could be the case, we sincerely believe that a great world revival would soon sweep our civilization and that peace and goodwill would again reign supreme upon the face of the earth.

- 26. N. M. Greene, Associational Missionary, offered his report. This report was adopted after being discussed by N. M. Greene and Roby Eggers.

#### REPORT OF ASSOCIATIONAL MISSIONARY

During the past year I have traveled ten thousand miles and visited more than one thousand homes as your Missionary. I have helped in the following revivals and received the following amounts for this service: Poplar Grove \$30.49, Mount Gilead \$19.90, Brushy Fork \$43.87, Timbered Ridge \$17.30, and Zion Hill \$28.15. I have also held ten group evangelistic meetings at the following churches: Gap Creek, Middle Fork, Three Forks, Brushy Fork, Meat Camp, Poplar Grove, Bethel, Union, Howards Creek and Antioch. In addition to the above amounts reported in the revival work I have received the following support: Gap Creek \$9.71, Three Forks \$4.50, collection at Preachers Conference \$5.50, Brushy Fork \$4.75, Meat Camp \$8.23, Boone \$12.15, Poplar Grove \$3.46, Bethel \$10.68, Union \$5.96, Zionville \$1.00, Howards Creek \$1.50, Antioch \$5.50, W. C.



Phillip Greer was born November 20th, 1843. He died May 8, 1941. In early manhood he moved to Dorton, Kentucky, where he married Mary Greer on November 16, 1864. This union was blessed with the following sons and daughters: Dr. F. M. Greer, Mabel; Mrs. J. F. Roten, Denver, Colo.; A. J. Greer, Washington, D. C.; W. C. Greer, Boone; I. G. Greer, Thomasville; Mrs. Chas. A. Greer, Zionville. T. M. Greer, Boone, and H. F. Greer, Morganton. Mrs. Greer passed on in October, 1931.

Mr. and Mrs. Greer moved to Zionville about 1880 where they lived until their deaths. Bro. Greer had been a member of Zionville Baptist Church since he settled there and for more than 50 years was a deacon and leader in the religious life of his community. The Watauga Democrat summed up his life in the following tribute: "Mr. Greer reared a family of eight sons and daughters who were brought up under Christian influences and they have grown into men and women of outstanding spiritual and material value to their various communities. No more upright or useful group of citizens have been reared in this region, and Mr. Greer and his devoted wife. have thus made a magnificent contribution to their country. Mr. Greer lived unostentatiously, and cared not for public position or wide influence. He devoted his long life to the well-being of his family, his neighbor and the furtherance of the Christian religion. The influence of this remarkable pioneer citizen shall be felt by generations yet unborn."



### CONSTITUTION

- 1. The Association shall be composed of members chosen by the different churches in our Union and duly sent to represent them in the Association, who, on producing letters from their respective churches certifying their appointment, shall be entitled to their seats. Each church shall be entitled to three delegates, the ministers being members ex-officio.
- 2. In the letters from the different churches is to be expressed their numbers in full fellowship, those baptized, received by letter, dismissed by letter, excommunicated and dead since last Association.
- 3. The members thus chosen and convened shall have no power to lord it over God's heritage, nor shall they have any special power over the churches. They shall not infringe any internal right of any church in this Union.
- 4. The Association shall have a Moderator, Vice-Moderator, and clerk, who shall be chosen annually by the suffrage of the members present.
- 5. New churches, or any regular Baptist church of Christ being legally dismissed by letter by any sister Association, upon application and delegates, shall be admitted to our Union.
- 6. Every church in the Association shall be entitled to representation in the Association.
- 7. Every query presented by any member of the Association shall be once read, and before it is debated the Moderator shall put it to a vote, and if there is a majority for it being debated, it shall be taken into consideration and be debated, but if there be a majority against it, it shall be withdrawn
- 8. Every motion made and seconded shall come under the consideration of the Association except it be withdrawn by the member who made it.
- 9. The Association shall endeavor to furnish the churches with the minutes of their proceedings. The best method of accomplishing this purpose shall be at the direction of the future Associations.
- 10. We think it is absolutely necessary that we should have an Associational fund for defraying the expenses of the same. For the raising and supporting of which we think it to be the duty of each church in the Union to contribute annually such sums as they shall think proper and send it by their delegates to the Association. The money thus raised shall be deposited in the hands of the Treasurer, appointed by the Association, who shall be accountable for the same. He shall pay the money out from time to time as the Association may direct.

- 11. There shall be an Association book kept wherein the proceedings of the Association shall be regularly recorded by the secretary appointed by the Association, who shall receive a compensation yearly for his services.
- 12. The Minutes of the Association shall be read and corrected, if needs be, and signed by the Moderator and the Clerk before the Association rises.
- 13. Amendments to the plan or form of government may be made at any time by a majority of the Association when they deem it necessary, by giving the churches twelve months prior notice.
  - 14. The Association shall have power:

To provide for the general union of the churches.

To endeavor to preserve a chain of union amongst the churches.

To give the churches the necessary advice in matters of difficulty. To inquire into the cause why the churches fail to represent themselves at any time in the Association.

To appropriate the money contributed by the churches for an Associational fund to any purpose they may think proper.

To have power to withdraw from any church in their Union who shall violate the rules of this Association or deviate from the orthodox principles of religion.

To correspond with sister Associations.

To invite any Baptist in the ministry to a seat in the Association, who may be present at the time of their sitting.

To adjourn the Association to any future ime and place they may thing proper and most convenient to the churches in the Union.

### RULES OF DECORUM

- 1. The Association shall be opened and closed with prayer.
- 2. Only one person shall speak at a time, who shall arise from his seat and address the Moderator. The person thus speaking shall not be interrupted in his speech by any except the Moderator, till he is done speaking.
- 3. He shall strictly adhere to the subject and in no wise reflect upon the person who spoke before him as to make remarks on his steps, failings, or imperfections, but shall fairly state the matter as he can do so as to give his views or ideas.
- 4. No person shall abruptly break off or absent himself from the Association without liberty obtained from it.
- 5. No person shall rise and speak more than three times to any one subject without liberty from the Association.
- 6. No member shall have liberty of laughing during the sitting of the same or whispering in the time of public speaking.

### MINUTES OF THE THREE FORKS BAPTIST ASSOCIATION

- 7. No member shall address another in any other appellation than that of brother.
- 8. The Moderator shall not interrupt any member in, or prohibit him from speaking until he gives his light on the subject, except he break the rules of this decorum.
- 9. The names of the several members of the Association shall be enrolled by the Clerk and called over as often as required by the Association.
- 10. Th Moderator shall be entitled to the same privilege of speech as any of the other members, provided the chair be filled. He shall not vote unless the Association be equally divided.

### Morning Session

- 1. The Three Forks Baptist Association of North Carolina met in her One Hundred Second Session with Mount Calvary Baptist Church, Balm, N. C., Tuesday, August 25th, 1942, at 9:30 a.m.
- 2. The Association was opened by singing "Brethren We Have Met to Worship," led by Gordon Hodges. N. M. Greene offered prayer.

- 6. The Moderator delivered his Annual Address in which he emphasized the Theme of the Session "Into the Highways and Hedges."
- 7. Wade E. Brown, Chairman of the Executive Committee, reported for the Committee on Order of Business and the report was adopted after it had been amended to change the time from 9:00 A. M. to 9:30 A. M. for the beginning of the Sessions each day.
  - 8. Mrs. L. M. Hodges read the report on Religious Litera-

ture and after motion to adopt it was discussed by G. A. Hamby and J. C. Canipe and was adopted.

### REPORT ON RELIGIOUS LITERATURE

The Bible, the model book, the perfect book, is the best literature known. To know the Bible means a marvelous storehouse of knowledge, written by men inspired of God. We are told that what we read becomes a part of us. Therefore, we suggest that the Bible be read which will enable us to know more and to become more like Jesus.

The Committee also requests our people to read our Baptist literature. We urge parents to see that good, wholesome literature is kept in the home and trashy reading material be not allowed in the hands of their children.

The Baptist Sunday School Board has fine literature for supplementary reading and study, for Sunday School and Training Union helps and for study courses for teaching and training work in our churches. Ample books are also available for W. M. U. training courses. More of our people should read the Biblical Recorder and Charity and Children.

- 15. H. K. Middleton, the appointee to preach the Annual Sermon took charge of the service and "We Are Marching to Zion" was sung. R. C. Gresham led in prayer. Brother Middleton read the 18th, 19th and 20th verses of the 28th chapter of Matthew and announced his subject, "We Must Be Baptists." In an inspiring message he outlined some of the outstanding thoughts which should guide us as follows:
  - 1. Jesus saves the full man and all who call on Him.
  - 2. Only submission to the will of God counts. Race, creed, color or wealth are nothing.
    - 3. Baptists must meet the test of the present.
    - 4. Baptists must be true to Christ and His Teachings.
    - 5. Baptists have a message and a mission.
  - 6. The Christ is the supreme authority in a Baptist church.
    - 7. Baptists must retain their faith and practice.
  - 8. Baptists must follow Christ in carrying out the Great Commission. (A) Make disciples, (B) Baptize the believers, (C) Teach them all things.
  - 9. Baptists should face the future with courage. Brother Middleton closed his message with prayer.
- 16. The Association adjourned for the noon recess, benediction by Vilas Minton.

### **Tuesday Afternoon Session**

- 17. The Association reconvened at 1:15 P. M., Tom Stanberry conducted the devotional service, G. A. Hamby leading prayer.
- 18. The committee recommended that we admit Tabernacle and Mountain Dale Baptist Churches and the Moderator

extended a welcome to the pastors and delegates from these new churches.

- 20. Raymond Hendrix read the report on Missions. Upon motion to adopt it was discussed R. C. Gresham, Joseph J. Grossholty and J. C. Canipe and was adopted.

### Report On Missions

The New Testament states the full and complete missionary program of Jesus in the following words: "He went about all the cities and villages teaching in their synagogues, preaching the gospel of the kingdom and healing all manner of diseases among the people." This is complete evangelism. This is the gospel for the whole man. This was the missionary program of Jesus. When he left this world He left this program in the hands of His disciples.

Southern Baptists have undertaken in a small way to carry out this program. Every church, every preacher and every Baptist ought to do his best to fulfill this mission on earth. Preaching, teaching, healing, what a program, what a challenge, and how miserably we have failed in our efforts to do it? Yet we have made a beginning. We are now fighting a war and also we talk of peace, yet we have spent more on this war since Pearl Harbor than combined Christendom has spent since the beginning of time to save the world. We did not seem to realize that we have been at war against disease, ignorance and sin in the wonderful missionary program of Jesus, teaching, healing and preaching. Southern Baptists should rise up now and pay all debts, and also train at least ten thousand missionaries to meet the challenge of a disillusioned and all but destroyed world after the war is over. Let us work while it is day for the night cometh when no man can work.

Rather, we urge that all of us, regardless of what any other individual may do, shall do all we can to bring about a world community with Christ at the center of EVERY LIFE.

- 5. The churches are seriously urged to make every reasonable effort possible to pay off all existing debts and to make such improvements as are needed and otherwise adopt and adhere to a sound financial policy by adopting a budget and putting on an every

member canvass against the day when financial conditions may be less favorable and the opportunity of missions may be greatly enlarged.

May we as Missionary Baptists open cur hearts to help other homeless, fatherless and motherless children who will come to this great institution by making a once-a-month offering.

We are glad to note in the work of our Hospital at Winston-Salem that the Mothers' Pay offering increased this year. The Hospital gave in free services in 1941 \$92,000. There will be at least 2700 patients this year who cannot pay a hospital bill. Our Superintendent tells that there will be 7000 patients who will be treated this year. The war is creating additional burdens for the Hospital, and in order to meet the needs we are asking the churches of this Association to increase your gifts.

Also in our benevolent work our Relief and Annuity Board helps the old retired servants of God who have no other provisions for support.


A. J. Greene

Andrew Jackson Greene was born March 2, 1883 at Mabel, Watauga County, N. C. He was the son of Hiram Greene and Elizabeth Lawrence Greene. He received his early education in the public schools of Watauga County, later he attended the Appalachian Training School and finished his education at Wake Forest College.

Brother Greene taught in the county schools for many years before joining the faculty of Apalachian State Teachers College in 1913 as English instructor. He held this position until his retirement in 1941.

He was an active force in the Three Forks Association for many years doing much to improve the Sunday Schools through his efforts in securing better trained teachers. He was largely responsible for the Fifth Sunday Meetings which were held in the Association for several years. He was also historian of the Association and prepared the history of the Association used at the One-Hundredth Session in 1940 and which is printed in the minutes of that session.

Brother Greene was ordained as a minister in 1921, but was forced to retire from that field because of bad health. He was Superintendent of the Sunday School at both Union and Willowdale churches and taught the Bible Class until his death. On August 12, 1942, our brother passed to the Great Beyond, leaving us saddened but rejoicing in his Opportunity.

Eller McNeil was born in Wilkes County, N. C., June 13th, 1379, and died February 9,1942. He moved to Watauga County when a young man. He married Miss Belle Ragan and established his home at Rutherwood, N. C., where he conducted a general store for many years. We have there the Bible, Bible stories, books on great men and women, books on how better to live the Christian life and on church membership, mission study books, books helpful on all walks of the Christian life and books for children. She ended by asking all of us to read more good books from our library.

The inspirational message of the morning was brought by Miss Ruby Daniels on "Light Bearing in Hungary". After reading Isaiah 40:29-31 and 42:16 she told of the countries of Europe, Italy, Spain, Hungary, Roumania, and Jugoslavia, in which Southern Baptists have worked since 1920. In Hungary we have a Girls' School Seminary and Orphanage. The Girls' School is supported entirely by the Lottie Moon Christmas Offering. Hungary is now overshadowed by economic depression, lack of food and clothing, and persecution because of religion. But Hungarian Baptists are keeping their eyes on our Father and He will keep them for Himself.

#### CONSTITUTION

- 1. The Association shall be composed of members chosen by the different churches in our Union and duly sent to represent them in the Association, who, on producing letters from their respective churches certifying their appointment, shall be entitled to their seats. Each church shall be entitled to three delegates, the ministers being members ex-officio.
  - 2. In the letters from the different churches is to be expressed their numbers in full fellowship, those baptized, received by letter, dismissed by letter, excommunicated and dead since last Association.
  - 3. The members thus chosen and convened shall have no power to lord it over God's heritage, nor shall they have any special power over the churches. They shall not infringe any internal right of any church in this Union.
  - 4. The Association shall have a Moderator, Vice-Moderator, and clerk, who shall be chosen annually by the suffrage of the members present.
  - 5. New churches, or any regular Baptist church of Christ being legally dismissed by letter by any sister Association, upon application and delegates, shall be admitted to our Union.
- 6. Every church in the Association shall be entitled to representation in the Association.
- 7. Every query presented by any member of the Association shall be once read, and before it is debated the Moderator shall put it to a vote, and if there is a majority for it being debated, it shall be taken into consideration and be debated, but if there be a majority against it, it shall be withdrawn.
- 8. Every motion made and seconded shall come under the consideration of the Association except it be withdrawn by the member who made it.
- 9. The Association shall endeavor to furnish the churches with the minutes of their proceedings. The best method of accomplishing this purpose shall be at the direction of the future Associations.
- 10. We think it is absolutely necessary that we should have an Associational fund for defraying the expense of the same. For the raising and supporting of which we think it to be the duty of each church in the Union to contribute annually such sums as they shall think proper and send it by their delegates to the Association. The

money thus raised shall be deposited in the hands of the Treasurer, appointed by the Association, who shall be accountable for the same. He shall pay the money out from time to time as the Association may direct.

- 11. There shall be an Association book kept wherein the proceedings of the Association shall be regularly recorded by the secretary appointed by the Association, who shall receive a compensation yearly for his services.
- 12. The Minutes of the Association shall be read and corrected, if needs be, and signed by the Moderator and the Clerk before the Association rises.
- 13. Amendments to the plan or form of government may be made at any time by a majority of the Association when they deem it necessary, by giving the churches twelve months prior notice.
  - 14. The Association shall have power:
- To provide for the general union of the churches.
- To endeavor to preserve a chain of union amongst the churches.
- To give the churches the necessary advice in matters of difficulty.
- To inquire into the cause why the churches fail to represent themselves at any time in the Association.
- To appropriate the money contributed by the churches for an Associational fund to any purpose they may think proper.
- To have power to withdraw from any church in their Union who shall violate the rules of this Association or deviate from the orthodox principles of religion.

To correspond with sister Associations.

- To invite any Baptist in the ministry to a seat in the Association, who may be present at the time of their sitting.
- To adjourn the Association to any future time and place they may think proper and most convenient to the churches in the Union.

#### RULES OF DECORUM

- 1. The Association shall be opened and closed with prayer.
- 2. Only one person shall speak at a time, who shall arise from his seat and address the Moderator. The person thus speaking shall not be interrupted in his speech by any except the Moderator, till he is done speaking.
  - 3. He shall strictly adhere to the subject and in no wise reflect

upon the person who spoke before him as to make remarks on his steps, failings, or imperfections, but shall fairly state the matter as he can do so as to give his views or ideas.

- 4. No person shall abruptly break off or absent himself from the Association without liberty obtained from it.
- 5. No person shall rise and speak more than three times to any one subject without liberty from the Association.
- 6. No member shall have liberty of laughing during the sitting of the same or whispering in the time of public speaking.
- 7. No member shall address another in any other appellation than that of brother.
- 8. The Moderator shall not interrupt any member in, or prohibit him from speaking until he gives his light on the subject, except he break the rules of this decorum.
- 9. The names of the several members of the Association shall be enrolled by the Clerk and called over as often as required by the Association.
- 10. The Moderator shall be entitled to the same privilege of speech as any of the other members, provided the chair be filled. He shall not vote unless the Association be equally divided.

#### FIRST DAY

Tuesday, August 24, 1943

#### **Morning Session**

- 1. The One Hundred Third Session of the Three Forks Baptist Association of North Carolina met with Clark's Creek Baptist Church, Valle Crucis, N. C., Tuesday, August 24, 1943, at 9:30 a. m.
- 2. The Association was opened by singing "Amazing Grace," led by Gordon Hodges. Raymond Hendrix, pastor of Clark's Creek Church, led the opening prayer.
- 3. The Moderator, S. C. Eggers, called the One Hundred Third Session to order for the transaction of business.
- 4. The Clerk called the roll of the churches and all responded, either by messengers, pastors or letters except Blowing Rock, Brookside and Union. (Blowing Rock and Union were represented later and Brookside sent a letter after the Session.)
- 5. R. C. Eggers led in prayer and the Moderator delivered his annual address which was built around the theme of the session, "The Light in a Dark World."
  - 6. The Clerk read the report of the Executive Committee

on Order of Business. The report was adopted as read by motion, giving the Moderator the power to make any necessary changes in the program which he may deem expedient.

7. The report on Temperance was called for, but was not ready, so the subject was discussed by James C. Sherwood, Clyde R. Greene, J. A. Williams and J. C. Canipe. The report is to be submitted later by the committee.

#### REPORT ON TEMPERANCE

At no time in our history has the cause of temperance received such a challenge as now, for it appears that the liquor forces have taken complete control of our law making bodies to such an extent that the people themselves do not have any opportunity to say whether we shall or shall not have alcohol in its various forms put before our young people. Shall we as Christian people decide that there is no use to continue the fight against "Public Enemy Number One," or shall we dig deeper and broader until we as Christians can forget our politics and prejudices and realize that there is nothing confronting us now so important as crushing this deadly foe of our civilization? We cannot defeat this terrible monster unless we are willing to sacrifice some things and be willing to pay the price necessary to break his hold on our legislative bodies.

10. C. J. Farthing read the report on Religious Literature and upon motion to adopt led the discussion. Smith Hagaman, G. W. Sebastian, S. C. Eggers and J. C. Canipe also discussed the subject and the report was adopted.

#### REPORT ON RELIGIOUS LITERATURE

The moral dynamic of our people today is at a low ebb. So much has been done in the scientific realm to draw the attention to a materialistic life; so much has been and is being written about new inventions, new and better ways of living a life of ease, until we have spent the most of our reading time in a field that does not contribute to building morals.

There are but two agencies that can be depended on to promote the reading of literature that tends to build a spiritual and moral life—the christian home and the church. If these two divine institutions fail in their responsibility, how shall we expect our people, both old and young, to meet the issues and problems of life with high spiritual and moral ideals?

Every church in our Association should have a library and should encourage its members to read. We should utilize through our Sunday Schools the literature published by our Sunday School Board. The Biblical Recorder should be in every Baptist home. Without information regarding the work of Christ's Kingdom there can be no inspiration.

- 13. The Association reconvened at 1:10 p. m. with Vice-Moderator Wade E. Brown presiding. Grady Hamby conducted the devotional service.
- 14. Carl Triplett, a former pastor of Clark's Creek Church, was recognized and he gave a short account of the reorganization of the church and the building of the present house of worship.
- 15. G. A. Hamby presented the report on Missions. Upon motion to adopt the report was discussed by M. A. Huggins, Secretary of the Baptist State Convention, and was adopted.

16. The congregation stood and sang "Nearer My God to Thee."

#### REPORT ON MISSIONS

In Matthew 4:23 we find the program of Jesus as a missionary teacher and preacher. Here he healed all manner of sickness among the people. His program was to minister to human needs and it has not been changed. We should endeavor to carry out His program as outlined and carried on by Him.

Twenty years ago we had men and women who wanted to go as foreign missionaries, but we had no money with which to support them. Now we have the money and the missionaries are few. We should pray the Lorld of the harvest to send laborers into the fields which are white to harvest. In Matthew 28:19 Jesus commanded us to carry the gospel story to the whole world. Our job is to change the world and bring it to the feet of Jesus.

#### REPORT ON CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

Christian Education is education in and about Christ. We can educate non Christians about Christ, but we can only educate Christians in Christ.

In our homes and in the Sunday Schools we can and ought to educate our children about Christ until they come to the years of accountability. Then we are obligated to win them to Christ and begin their education in Christ. The process of Christian education never ends till we come to the full knowledge of the stature of Christ as God has revealed it in Him.

In the first stages of this educational process—that is before

they become Christians—we prepare the way for them to come to Christ. We form the influences and the environments that make it easy for them to come to Him. The Sunday School, the home and the conduct of church members are all leading factors in this important preparation. After they become Christians through faith in Christ as their personal savior other factors come into the educational process. Of course, the home and the Sunday Schools continue their noble work, but the schools and the Training Unions now become an important factor in this Christian educational picture.

In this war-torn world of sin and strife there has never been a greater need for Christian education. Let our homes take note; let our churches get busy; let our Christian Schools take heed, or they will soon be out of business. This is no time for retreat since advance is the order of the day. This sad comment about one of the tribes in the Old Testament almost tells the story in our day, "The Children of Ephraim being armed and carrying bows turned back in the day of battle."

Our homes, our churches and our Christian colleges must all press the battle for Christian Education now as never before. Christian leaders and statesmen are dreaming and hoping to have a large part in forming that new and better world that we are thinking of now as never before. God grant that we may not only have the opportunity to do it but that we may be prepared to do it.

#### REPORT OF EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

Your Executive Committee has met at the call of the Chairman to pass on the business of the Association as the needs arose and as matters came to our attention for the good of the Association. The following recommendations are made to the Association

and it is our earnest hope that these matters be seriously considered and if approved that every church seek to carry out these matters faithfully.

- 1. That our ministers and laymen be urged to always magnify the local church as the fundamental unit of the Christian Program, and that each church adopt and strictly adhere to the policy of not inviting any minister or other person to fill the pulpit without first getting the approval of the pastor of the church or the board of deacons. It is the duty of the church to hold up the pastor as the fundamental leader of the churches' work in the community.
- 2. That we commend C. J. Farthing as the leader in the movement for Sunday School Teachers' Revivals during the year. We recommend that the Association designate some suitable person to be Educational Director for the Association whose duty it shall be to teach in the Sunday School, B. T. U., W. M. U. and other training services for the advancement of the program of the church.
- 3. We recommend that each church designate some person to look after the interest of the orphanage and that the name of that person be given to the Association Orphanage Director. It is also urged that all our churches take the once-a-month offering and send it promptly to the orphanage.
- 4. That the churches are again seriously urged to make every effort to pay off any existing debts, to make such improvements as are needed and to otherwise adopt and strictly adhereto a sound financial program, by adopting a budget, putting on the every member canvass and otherwise to prepare against the day when financial conditions may be less favorable and the opportunities for mission activities be greatly enlarged.

#### HISTORY OF CLARK'S CREEK BAPTIST CHURCH

During the summer of 1898 a group of citizens of the Clark's Creek community decided that a Baptist Church should be organized in their community. By request of this group Elders D. C. Harmon, C. S. Farthing and E. M. Gragg met the people on Saturday, Oct. 22, 1893 at the Clark's Creek School House and organized a Baptist church with the following members: S. C. Byrd, Martha Byrd, J. S. Byrd, G. W. Byrd, Alice Byrd, Elizabeth Taylor, Jacob Taylor, Adelaide Taylor, Martha Taylor, J. E. Pearson, A. V. Lawrence, Larkin Townsend, G. W. Rowe, S. A. Rowe, Joel Eggers, Polly Eggers, Delitha Honeycutt and Eliza Townsend. The church selected C. S. Farthing its first Moderator and G. W. Rowe clerk.

Of the eighteen charter members only five are now members of the church, twelve are dead and one is a member of another church.

This church remained an active Baptist Church from its organization until 1927 when its last minutes were written for the first period of her history. During this twenty-nine years, C. S. Farthing, E. M. Gragg, Edmund Greene, Isaac McGinnis, John Norris, N. H. Hampton, W. H. Glenn, L. W. Hall, R. H. Shore, A. T. Watson and E. C. Hodges served as pastor. Of these C. S. Farthing served the longest period or thirteen years. He died in this community at the home of S. C. Byrd while filling his regular appointment. Clerks during this time were: G. W. Rowe, Joel Eggers, L. A. Lawrence, C. C. Lawrence, H. C. Taylor, J. S. Byrd and Ellen Lawrence.

During an eleven year period from Oct. 1927 until Aug. 1938 Clark's Creek Baptist Church was dead. Some of her members died and others joined other Baptist Churches. The church building was neglected. In Aug. 1938 Carl Triplett, being led by the Holy Spirit came to Clark's Creek and began a revival meeting. With him was Earl Colvard. This meeting resulted in a modern miracle, the dead church was brought back to life. The first minute of the reorganized church show that fifteen members were added by baptism. Carl Triplett was elected pastor and served until 1943. Raymond Hendrix is the present pastor.

After reorganization the church decided they must have a better building. The old building was sold, a new site selected, bought and paid for and a new building erected. This new building bears elequent testimony to the devotion of the membership of the church which at present is 55.

- 8. N. M. Greene, pastor of Tabernacle Church, was recognized and took charge of the service of dedication of the church building. He gave a brief history of the work which was started in 1941 at Miller School. The congregation sang "I Love To Tell The Story" and A. E. Moretz led in prayer in which he thanked God for the work at Tabernacle. The sermon of dedication was delivered by W. D. Ashley who announced his subject, "Why Dedicate a Meeting House." He read from the prayer of Solomon when the Temple was dedicated and discussed the purposes of a church building. 1.

God's name and presence is there. 2. His altar is there. 3. A place of teaching. 4. A place of fellowship. 5. A place of worship. R. C. Eggers offered the dedicatory prayer.

  - 14. A roll call revealed that 27 churches were represented.
- 15. Resolutions endorsing the decision of the County Commissioners not to issue licenses for the sale of wine and beer in the County were presented as follows by Raymond Hendrix and were unanimously adopted:

WHEREAS the Churches of the Three Forks Association have from time to time as opportunity presented itself expressed their opposition to the sale of wine and beer in Watauga County, and

WHEREAS the Board of Commissioners of Watauga County has declined to issue more licenses for the sale of wine and beer after being requested to refuse to issue the said license by petition of 4000 citizens of the County, now therefore be it resolved by the Three Forks Baptist Association in Spring Session assembled on April 30, 1943:

FIRST, that we endorse the stand of the County Commissioners in their refusal to issue such licenses and we commend them on their stand for sobriety and righteousness in our county;

Second, that we pledge to them our support in this worthy decision;

THIRD, that a copy of these resolutions be given to the Watauga Democrat for publication.

## Constitution

- 1. The Association shall be composed of members chosen by tte different churches in our Union and duly sent to represent them in the Association, who, on producing letters from their respective churches certifying their appointment, shall be entitled to their seats. Each church shall be entitled to three delegates, the ministers being members ex-officio.
- 2. In the letters from the different churches is to be expressed their numbers in full fellowship, those baptized, received by letter, dismissed by letter, excommunicated and dead since last Association.
- 3. The members thus chosen and convened shall have no power to lord it over God's heritage, nor shall they have any

special power over the churches. They shall not infringe any internal right of any church in this Union.

- 4. The Association shall have a Moderator, Vice-Moderator, and clerk, who shall be chosen annually by the suffrage of the members present.
- 5. New churches, or any regular church of Christ being legally dismissed by letter by any sister Association, upon application and delegates, shall be admitted to our Union.
- 6. Every church in the Association shall be entitled to representation in the Association.
- 7. Every query presented by any member of the Association shall be once read and before it is debated the Moderator shall put it to a vote, and if there is a majority for it being debated, it shall be taken into consideration and be debated, but if there be a majority against it, it shall be withdrawn.
- 8. Every motion made and seconded shall come under the consideration of the Association except it be withdrawn by the member who made it.
- 9. The Association shall endeavor to furnish the churches with the minutes of their proceedings. The best method of accomplishing this purpose shall be at the direction of the future Associations.
- an Associational fund for defraying the expense of the same. For the raising and supporting of which we think it to be the duty of each church in the Union to contribute annually such sums as they shall think proper and send it by their delegates to the Association. The money thus raised shall be deposited in the hands of the Treasurer, appointed by the Association, who shall be accountable for the same. He shall pay the money out from time to time as the Association may direct.
- 11. There shall be an Association book kept wherein the proceedings of the Association shall be regularly recorded by the secretary appointed by the Association, who shall receive a compensation yearly for his services.
- 12. The Minutes of the Association shall be read and corrected, if needs be, and signed by the Moderator and the Cler's before the Association rises.
- 13. Amendments to the plan or form of government may be made at any time by a majority of the Association when they deem it necessary, by giving the churches twelve months prior notice.
  - 14. The Association shall have power:

To provide for the general union of the churches.

To endeavor to preserve a chain of union amongst the churches.

To give the churches the necessary advice in matters of difficulty.

- To inquire into the cause why the churches fail to represent themselves at any time in the Association.
- To appropriate the money contributed by the churches for an Associational fund to any purpose they may think proper.
- To have power to withdraw from any church in their Union who shall violate the rules of this Association or deviate from the orthodox principles of religion.

To correspond with sister Associations.

- To invite any Baptist in the ministry to a seat in the Association, who may be present at the time of their sitting.
- To adjourn the Association to any future time and place they may think proper and most convenient to the churches of the Union.

# Rules Of Decorum

- 1.. The Association shall be opened and closed with prayer
- 2. Only one person shall speak at a time, who shall arise from his seat and address the Moderator. The person thus speaking shall not be interrupted in his speech by any except the Moderator, till he is done speaking.
- 3. He shall strictly adhere to the subject and in no wise reflect upon the person who spoke before him as to make remarks on his steps, failings,or inperfections, but shall fairly state the matter as he can do so as to give his views or ideas.
- 4. No person shall abruptly break off or absent himself from the Association without liberty obtained from it.
- 5. No person shall rise and speak more than three times to any one subject without liberty from the Association.
- 6. No member shall have liberty of laughing during the sitting of the same or whispering in the time of public speaking.
- 7. No member shall address another in any other appellation than that of brother.
- 8. The Moderator shall not interrupt any member in, or prohibit him from speaking until he gives his light on the subject, except he break the rules of this decorum.
- 9. The names of the several members of the Association shall be enrolled by the Clerk and called over as often as required by the Association.
- 10. The Moderator shall be entitled to the same privilege of speech as any of the other members, provided the chair be filled. He shall not vote unless the Association be equally divided.

### FIRST DAY

Tuesday, August 29, 1944

### Morning Session

- 1. The One Hundred Fourth Session of the Three Forks Baptist Association of North Carolina convened with Bethel Baptist Church, Sugar Grove, N. C. August 29th, 1944 at 9:45 A. M.
- 2. Wm. Hodges led the opening song service and R. C. Eggers offered prayer.
- 3. The Moderator, S. C. Eggers, called the One Hundred Fourth Session to order for the transaction of business.
- 4. The Clerk called the roll of churches and twenty responded. The Clerk reported that all forty churches of the Association had sent letters.
- 5.The Moderator delivered his Annual Address which emphasized the theme of the Session, "Back to Bethel." He reminded us that "Back to Bethel" means to repent of our mistakes and get back to fundamentals in Christian work.
- 6. The Clerk brought the report of the Executive Committee on Order of Business for the Session. This report was adopted upon motion by R. C. Eggers with the amendment that the Moderator have power to make any changes therein found to be desirable or necessary.
- 7. Smith Hagaman, Superintendent of the Baptist Hospital at Winston-Salem, N. C. spoke on the work of this and other Baptist service institutions. In his address he referred

to the present trend toward the taking over of all service institutions by the Government. He took the position that unless the Denominational institutions give something above and beyond what the State can give there is no reason for their existence. He continued his address by pointing out that if the Baptist Denomination is to continue to thrive we must operate service institutions that go above and beyond what the State can give. We have the message of eternal life and our institutions must really be Christian.

8. After singing, "How Firm a Foundation," the report on Temperance was read by Howard Shore who led the discussion. G. M. Watson continued the discussion and the report was adopted.

### REPORT ON TEMPERANCE

We were attacked at Pearl Harbor by two deadly enemies, the Japanese Empire and the Empire of Liquor. We immediately declared war on the Japanese but we made, first an armistice and then peace with liquor. For six weeks all beer and alcohol was removed and then it flooded Pearl Harbor and all the rest of the Allied World except Russia. Japan attacked us from the outside and the entire nation arose to see that she was defeated, but liquor attacking from the inside is now our worst enemy.

M. L. A. Martin, leader of the Allied League for Temperance, declared recently in a public speech, "No voice of protest against our worst enemy, liquor, has been raised in the capitol of our state in North Carolina or in the capitol of our nation in Washington." He meant, of course, those in authority in government.

Christian churches and gospel ministers will have to put on the whole armor of God and go to battle against this chief enemy of our nation. Politicians cannot be trusted for they will sell out the best interests of our people to the highest bidder. Citizens of heaven and earth will have to exert their rights by prayer, education, soul winning and right voting to put out this evil with all the politicians who have sold out to the devil and liquor.

### REPORT ON RELIGIOUS LITERATURE

"Blessed is he that readeth" Rev. 1:3. In carrying out this injunction we should exercise care in the selection of our reading materials. Certainly the Bible as the foundation of all good literature, should come first. Then we recommend the Biblical Recorder, Charity and Children and the Commission in order to keep up with the Baptist work in our state and around the world. The Sunday School literature published by our Sunday School Board should be used by all our people. We must urge our people to read less of the trashy which corupt and demoralize by providing them with good literature. Our churches should establish libraries with this in mind.

- 3. The condition of our world has come about because of the greed for gain.
  - 4. Many pass by on the other side and offer no help.
- 5. The good Samaritan recognized that help was needed and acted upon that knowledge.
- 6. The Church must recognize the needs of a broken and suffering world.
  - 7. The Church must act intelligently upon that knowledge.
- 8. The Church has the only message that will heal a broken and suffering world.
- 9. The Church is composed of individuals so we must serve as such by giving ourselves to the Church in this program.
- 15. Ben Lee Ray led in prayer and the Association adjourned for the noon recess, benediction by J. A. Williams.

### Noon Recess

- 16. The Association reconvened at 1:30 P. M. D. M. Edmisten conducted the devotional service.
- 17. Cecil Glenn offered the report on Missions. After motion to adopt this subject was discussed by Cecil Glenn; M. A. Huggins, Secretary Baptist State Board; Miss. Kathleen Frink; and was adopted.

### REPORT ON MISSIONS

In this day of modern devices of every sort we find that all the countries of the world have been brought very close together. Although they are near, the proper feeling does not exist between them. Today it is a feeling of hate, jealousy and misunderstanding. The Church and the Christian people in it are the only agents which can bring an everlasting goodwill between these neighbors.

In view of these facts, the Church of today is faced with new responsibilities which the Church of yesterday did not have. Distance and money are no longer problems, but what we do need is men and women who will dedicate their lives to the carrying of the Gospel of Jesus Christ to all parts of the globe. When Jesus said, "Go ye into all the world," he was speaking to the Church and to the individuals who make up its membership. We are not all expected to go to foreign fields in person but we can go in spirit by giving our money and our prayers. We can spread the Gospel here

at home by giving to the Church regularly, using our talents properly, ministering to the needy, giving of our means and prayers and telling the people of our country of the wonderful power of our Savior's love.

Christian people, when mission offerings are taken, let us not forget those countless numbers of men, women and children in all parts of the world who are not only starving for material food, but for spiritual food as well. Here is a great opportunity to serve Jesus.

### REPORT ON CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

When Jesus gave the marching orders to his disciples one of His demands was to teach. What are Southern Baptists doing about this command?

Baptists have now in the South five types of schools; theological seminaries, three in number, for the education of the Christian ministry; one training school for women who are being trained for work in the home land or foreign fields; twenty-six colleges and universities; twenty-four junior colleges and eleven academies, making a total of sixty-five schools owned and operated by Southern Baptists. We have taken great steps forward, but I wonder if there is not danger of our looking at these steps we have taken and becoming satisfied with them. Surely we can see the need for Christian Education now as never before. Less than five per cent of the Baptist ministers in N. C. have a college education. I do not think this would be true if the Baptists of this state were awake to their possibilities and responsibilities. If all the Baptists of the state would give one cent per week each for one year enough money would be provided to give every Baptist minister in the state a college education. Surely we will awake to this great need and do something about it.

5. In keeping with the theme of this Session we recommend that all our churches reemphasize evangelism in cooperation with the other churches throughout the Southern Baptist Convention. We realize that the responsibilities of the Church will be grealy increased as our servicemen and women as well as the war workers return to their homes. We should meet this opportunity.



# Constitution

- 1. The Association shall be composed of members chosen by the different churches in our Union and duly sent to represent them in the Association, who, on producing letters from their respective churches certifying their appointment, shall be entitled to their seats. Each church shall be entitled to three delegates, the ministers being members ex-officio.
- 2. In the letters from the different churches is to be expressed their numbers in full fellowship, those baptized, received by letter, dismissed by letter, excommunicated and dead since last Association.
- 3. The members thus chosen and convened shall have no power to lord it over God's heritage, nor shall they have any special power over the churches. They shall not infringe any internal right of any church in this Union.
- 4. The Association shall have a Moderator, Vice-Moderator, and clerk, who shall be chosen annually by the suffrage of the members present.
- 5. New churches, or any regular church of Christ being legally dismissed by letter by any sister Association, upon application and delegates, shall be admitted to our Union.
- 6. Every church in the Association shall be entitled to representation in the Association.
- 7. Every query presented by any member of the Association shall be once read and before it is debated the Moderator shall put it to a vote, and if there is a majority for it being debated, it shall be taken into consideration and be debated, but if there be a majority against it, it shall be withdrawn.
- 8. Every motion made and seconded shall come under the consideration of the Association except it be withdrawn by the member who made it.
- 9. The Association shall endeavor to furnish the churches with the minutes of their proceedings. The best method of accomplishing this purpose shall be at the direction of the future Associations.
- 10. We think it is absolutely necessary that we should have an Associational fund for defraying the expense of the same. For the raising and supporting of which we think it to be the duty of each church in the Union to contribute annually such sums as they shall think proper and send it by their delegates to the Association. The money thus raised shall be deposited in the hands of the Treasurer, appointed by the Association, who shall be accounta-

ble for the same. He shall pay the money out from time to time as the Association may direct.

- 11. There shall be an Association book kept wherein the proceedings of the Association shall be regularly recorded by the secretary appointed by the Association, who shall receive a compensation yearly for his services.
- 12. The Minutes of the Association shall be read and corrected, if needs be, and signed by the Moderator and the Clerk before the Association rises.
- 13. Amendments to the plan or form of government may be made at any time by a majority of the Association when they deem it necessary, by giving the churches twelve months prior notice.
  - 14. The Association shall have power:
- To provide for the general union of the churches.
- To endeavor to preserve a chain of union amongst the churches.
- To give the churches the necessary advice in matters of difficulty.
- To inquire into the cause why the churches fail to represent themselves at any time in the Association.
- To appropriate the money contributed by the churches for an Associational fund to any purpose they may think proper.
- To have power to withdraw from any church in their Union who shall violate the rules of this Association or deviate from the orthodox principles of religion.
- To correspond with sister Associations.
- To invite any Baptist in the ministry to a seat in the Association, who may be present at the time of their sitting.
- To adjourn the Association to any future time and place they may think proper and most convenient to the churches of the Union.

# Rules of Decorum

- 1. The Association shall be opened and closed with prayer.
- 2. Only one person shall speak at a time, who shall arise from his seat and address the Moderator. The person thus speaking shall not be interrupted in his speech by any except the Moderator, till he is done speaking.
- 3. He shall strictly adhere to the subject and in no wise reflect upon the person who spoke before him as to make remarks on his steps, failings, or inperfections, but shall fairly state the matter as he can do so as to give his views or ideas.
- 4. No person shall abruptly break off or absent himself from the Association without liberty obtained from it.

#### MINUTES OF THE THREE FORKS BAPTIST ASSOCIATION

- 5. No person shall rise and speak more than three times to any one subject without liberty from the Association.
- 6. No member shall have liberty of laughing during the sitting of the same or whispering in the time of public speaking.
- 7. No member shall address another in any other appellation than that of brother.
- 8. The Moderator shall not interrupt any member in, or prohibit him from speaking until he gives his light on the subject, except he break the rules of this decorum.
- 9. The names of the several members of the Association shall be enrolled by the Clerk and called over as often as required by the Association.
- 10. The Moderator shall be entitled to the same privilege of speech as any of the other members, provided the chair be filled. He shall not vote unless the Association be equally divided.

#### FIRST DAY

Tuesday, August 28, 1945

#### **Morning Session**

- 1. The One Hundred Fifth Session of the Three Forks Baptist Association of North Carolina met with Boone Baptist Church, Boone, N. C. on Tuesday, Aug. 28, 1945 at 9:45 A. M.
- 2. J. C. Canipe led the opening song, "How Firm a Foundation" and R. C. Eggers conducted the devotional. He read from the First chapter of the Gospel of John and called attention to the Theme of the Session "He That Winneth Souls Is Wise."
- 3. The Moderator, J. C. Canipe, called the One Hundred Fifth Session to order for the transaction of business. After a short opening statement the Moderator requested Vilas Minton to lead in prayer.
- 4. The Clerk called the roll of the churches and twenty-four responded. The Clerk announced that letters from all churches had been received.
- 5. The Moderator then brought his Annual Address which paramounted the following needs of our churches:
- 1. Church buildings should be repaired and church grounds beautified.
- 2. At least six more churches in the Three Forks Association should have full-time pastors and we should have ten more parsonages; ten more of our churches should have one-half

time pastors and no pastor should serve more than four churches.

- 3. We need more pastors for there is a difference in a pastor and a preacher. The pastor should lead his people since the shepherd always goes before the flock.
- 4. We need a more comprehensive teaching program for our pastors, preachers and church members which should emphasize the Biblical way of church finance.

How can we achieve these objectives?

- 1. Pray about these needs.
- 2. Set a goal and strive to reach it.
- 3. Use God's plan for our finances.
- 6. R. C. Eggers, Chairman of the Executive Committees, presented the report of the Committee on Order of Business.

The report was adopted.

7. The Moderator named the following Committees:

NOMINATIONS—S. C. Eggers, R. C. Eggers and Ellis Coffey

FINANCE-L. M. Hodges, Alfred Thomas and George Wilson

TIME, PLACE AND PREACHER—C. J. Farthing, Odes Wilson and Ben Lee Ray.

8. G. M. Watson offered the report on Temperance. After a motion to adopt the report Bro. Watson led the discussion. The subject was further discussed by L. A. Martin, Ex. Secretary of the Allied Church League and the report was adopted.

#### REPORT ON TEMPERANCE

The report on Temperance made to our last Session emphasized the attack of Japan at Pearl Harbor which forced our nation into war. Our nation had already been attacked by a far more deadly enemy-beer, wine and liquor. We have subdued Germany and Japan but not the liquor traffic with which we have entered into a peace treaty with the forces of liquor getting much the better of the deal.

Alcohol is the arch enemy of man and has been through all written history. Its destruction is far greater than war. It destroys the morals of nations. It is the base of crime more than any other one thing mentioned in the catalog of criminal records. It

brings to disgrace and shame the very virtues of the land where it is patronized. It destroys homes, communities, churches and nations and last of all the souls of men. Yet our nation cries, "Give us more liquor, wine and beer."

The Bible tells us that of making books there is no end. If that were true in that far off day, how much more so now? Since the days of Moses men have been writing books.

This report is to deal with Baptist literature. Baptist authors have wrought wonders in this field; and today Baptists are making the pages of literature shine. Possibly, no denomination can boast of greater men and women who have written better pages or brought greater blessings to the world through literature.

We recommend the Biblical Recorder and Charity and Children as being wholesome periodicals.

All our churches should use our own Sunday School and Baptist Training Union literature, published at Nashville, Tenn.

Among all, the Bible is by far the most precious. It gives us the seed thought for every good thing, therefore, we recommend that it be read and studied more daily.

I wish to 'submit the following report for the Associational year of 1944-45. I have either visited or worked in twenty-two churches of our forty churches and one mission. I have taught nineteen study courses including B. T. U. and Sunday School. We also, had an Associational B. T. U. Enlargement Campaign in which seven churches participated. During the year I aided in two enlargement campaigns outside our Association. I worked part time in five revivals; and helped to promote nineteen Vacation Bible Schools and taught in thirteen of them. I had the pleasure to help organize or reorganize four Baptist Training Unions and two Junior Missionary Unions. In the work I traveled 4192 miles and visited 275 homes.

#### WILEY F. SHERWOOD

In the long history of Cove Creek Baptist Church, many outstanding christians, men and women, have labored diligently in



the Lord's vineyard, but none of them have surpassed in zeal and fervor the late Wiley F. Sherwood.

Bro. Sherwood was born in Gravson County. Virginia, on Oct. 3, 1870, later coming to the Cove Creek community with his father, J. J. L. Sherwood, who was for 24 years the beloved pastor of Cove Creek Baptist Church. When young Wiley was fourteen years of age he was converted and joined this church, remaining a devoted member until his death on Sept. 14, 1944. He was a deyout and consecrated laborer in the Lord's work, never being absent from his church unless he was too ill to attend or providentially hindered. Not only was he a regular attendant but he was actively interested in every phase of church work. He was both a

teacher and Sunday School superintendent for many years. All who sat under his instruction were deeply impressed with his knowledge of the Bible and his love for its great truths as well as his readiness to use it as a "lamp unto his feet."

Bro. Sherwood, like the Master, loved and served, went about doing good in his humble way. Many needy and charitable enterprises felt his keen interest and concern. He gave not only of himself but of his means to every worthy cause.

Bro. Sherwood was not only an active member of his church, but a leading citizen of his community who never failed to stand for the civic welfare of his community. He was chairman of the Watauga County Board of Education for many years and the schools in Watauga grew and flourished during this period of time. His love for children, and great concern in child welfare, always dominated his interest in the schools of his county. He believed that every child should be accessible to a school and worked toward that end. His educational vision and foresight have helped to produce a better citizenry in our county.

Bro. Sherwood was a pioneer merchant and leading business man in his community for 52 years. His straight-forward and honest manner in dealing with people won for him a great number of friends. These friends of the community and church have lost one of their most beloved members, but they take consolation in the fact that their loss is his gain. He was a faithful servant of whom it may be said, "Well done thou good and faithful servant."

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



# CONSTITUTION

- 1. The Association shall be composed of members chosen by the different churches in our Union and duly sent to represent them in the Association who, on producing letters from their respective churches certifying their appointment, shall be entitled to their seats. Each church shall be entitled to three delegates, the ministers being members ex-officio.
- 2. In the letters from the different churches is to be expressed their numbers in full fellowship, those baptized, received by letter, dismissed by letter, excommunicated and dead since last Association.
- 3. The members thus chosen and convened shall have no power to lord it over God's heritage, nor shall they have any special power over the churches. They shall not infringe any internal right of any church in this Union.
- 4. The Association shall have a Moderator, Vice-Moderator, and clerk who shall be chosen annually by the suffrage of the members present.
- 5. New churches or any regular church of Christ being legally dismissed by letter by any sister Association, upon application and delegates, shall be admitted to our Union.
- 6. Every church in the Association shall be entitled to representation in the Association.
- 7. Every query presented by any member of the Association shall be once read and before it is debated the Moderator shall put it to a vote, and if there is a majority for it being debated, it shall be taken into consideration and be debated, but if there be a majority against it, it shall be withdrawn.
- 8. Every motion made and seconded shall come under the consideration of the Association except it be withdrawn by the member who made it.
- 9. The Association shall endeavor to furnish the churches with the minutes of their proceedings. The best method of accomplishing this purpose shall be at the direction of the future Associations.
- 10. We think it is absolutely necessary that we should have an Associational fund for defraying the expenses of the same. For the raising and supporting of which we think it to be the duty of each church in the Union to contribute annually such sums as they shall think proper and send it by their delegates to the Association. The money thus raised shall be deposited in the hands of the Treasurer,

appointed by the Association, who shall be accountable for the same. He shall pay the money out from time to time as the Association may direct.

- 11. There shall be an Association book kept wherein the proceedings of the Association shall be regularly recorded by the secretary appointed by the Association, who shall receive a compensation yearly for his services.
- 12. The Minutes of the Association shall be read and corrected, if needs be, and signed by the Moderator and the Clerk before the Association rises.
- 13. Amendments to the plas or form of government may be made at any time by a mojority of the Association when they deem it necessary, by giving the churches twelve months prior notice.
  - 14. The Association shall have power:

To provide for the general union of the churches.

To endeavor to preserve a chain of union amongst the churches.

To give the churches the necessary advice in matters of difficulty.

To inquire into the cause why the churches fail to represent themselves at any time in the Association.

To appropriate the money contributed by the churches for an Associational fund to any purpose they may think proper.

To have power to withdraw from any church in their Union who shall violate the rules of this Association or deviate from the orthodox principles of religion.

To correspond with sister Associations.

To invite any Baptist in the ministry to a seat in the Association, who may be present at the time of their sitting.

To adjourn the Association to any future time and place they may think proper and most convenient to the churches of the Union.

## Rules of Decorum

- 1. The Association shall be opened and closed with prayer.
- 2. Only one person shall speak at a time, who shall arise from his seat and address the Moderator. The person thus speaking shall not be interrupted in his speech by any except the Moderator, till he is done speaking.
- 3. He shall strictly adhere to the subject and in no wise reflect upon the person who spoke before him as to make remarks on his steps, failings, or imperfections, but shall fairly state the matter as he can do so as to give his views or ideas.

- 4. No person shall abruptly break of absent himself from the Association without liberty obtained from it.
- 5. No person shall rise and speak more than three times to any one subject without liberty from the Association.
- 6. No member shall have liberty of laughing during the sitting of the same or whispering in the time of public speaking.
- 7. No member shall address another in any other appellation than that of brother.
- 8. The Moderator shall not interrupt any member in, or prohibit him from speaking until he gives his light on the subject, except he break the rules of this decorum.
- The names of the several members of the Association shall be enrolled by the Clerk and called over as often as required by the Association.
- 10. The Moderator shall be entitled to the same privilege of speech as any of the other members, provided the chair be filled. He shall not vote unless the Association be equally divided.

### FIRST DAY

Tuesday, August 27, 1946

### MORNING SESSION

- 1. The One Hundred Sixth Session of the Three Forks Baptist Association of North Carolina met with Rutherwood Baptist Church, RFD No. 1, Boone, N. C., on Tuesday, August 27, 1946 at 9:10 A. M.
- 2. The opening song, "All Hail the Power" was led by C. J. Farthing and Carl Triplett conducted the worship service. He read the 23rd Psalm and led in prayer.
- 3. The Moderator, J. C. Canipe, called the Session to order for the transaction of business.
- 4. R. C. Eggers, Chairman of the Executive Committee, presented the Report from the Committee on Order of Business which was adopted with an amendment thereto giving the Moderator the power to change the program when he desired.
- 5. The Clerk, Clyde R. Greene, called the roll of the churches. Twenty-three answered present. All the churches except Brookside have sent in letters.
- 6. The Moderator named the following committees:
  NOMINATIONS—H. K. Middleton, Ben Lee Ray and N. M.
  Greene
- FINANCE—Dallas Wilson, R. C. Eggers and J. L. Miller TIME, PLACE AND PREACHER—W. J. Farthing, Walter Carroll and Smith Harmon
- 7. The Moderator delivered his Annual Address in which he outlined a program for the churches of the Three Forks Association as follows:

- 1. Every church should adopt a budget which should include all objects of the Denomination.
- 2. Call pastors for an indefinite period instead of the annual call.
- 3. Fields should be formed and the pastor should live near his churches.
- 4. The churches should see to it that their members read at least four denominational papers—Charity and Children, Biblical Recorder, Home Mission Journal and Foreign Mission Jorunal.
- 5. A Woman's Missionary Society should be in every church in our Association.
  - 6. At least one revival every year in all our churches.
- 7. Cooperate with our Associational Sunday School Superintendent in his efforts to promote better Sunday Schools.
  - 8. Better and more worshipful music; we need heart music.
- 9. A good weekly prayer meeting led by the pastor in every church.
- 10. Refusal on the part of all our churches to ordain a candidate for the ministry until he has proven himself in doctrine and right living.
- 8. The report of the Executive Committee was read by the Clerk who discussed the report at the suggestion of the Chairman of the Committee, Rev. R. C. Eggers. The report was adopted without further discussion.

### REPORT OF EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

During the past year the Executive Committee met three times at the call of the Chairman, R. C. Eggers as matters required the consideration of the Committee.

At our first meeting a "Suggested Order of Business" was prepared and adopted for our present Session.

We met next to prepare a program for the Spring Session which was held with Poplar Grove Baptist Church.

At our last meeting we studied the needs of our Association and have the following recommendations for the consideration of the Association:

- 1. Realizing that the Sunday School, as the teaching agency of the church, is of great importance to Kingdom work and progress we endorse the Sunday School Enlargement Campaign and urge all our churches to participate therein each year.
- 2. We recommend that all our churches cooperate with their pastors in enrolling in the Ministers' Retirement Plan.
- 3. We recommend that our churches give more attention to the New Testament plan of discipline.
- 4. We recommend that our Association accept the suggested quota of \$1000.00 for Relief and Rehabilitation of Southern Baptist

Work around the world and urge our churches to have a part in this worthy cause.

5. We recommende that our Association employ an Educational Director under the same plan as heretofore used.

9. Lawrence Hagaman presented the report on temperance. After a motion to adopt this report was discussed by J. A. Williams, R. M. Hauss, representing Allied Church League, R. C. Eggers, J. C. Canipe, Wade E. Brown and Eldridge Trivett and it was adopted.

### REPORT ON TEMPERANCE

It is the duty of every citizen, especially Christian citizens, to try to make our country a better place in which to live and rear our children.

We are faced with nothing more important now than our deadly enemy, the liquor traffic, which is rightfully called, "Public Enemy Number One." We, as Christians, are almost asleep on the job. To defeat this enemy we will have to sacrifice, work, teach and pray. We should teach temperance in the Sunday School, W. M. U., B. T. U. and in all other church work.

We must understand that we are not dealing with a passing problem. The forces of evil are never overcome completely. Satan is the cause of all the sin in the world and he has his forces organized. So we must organize to continue our battle for the right as long as the forces of evil are loose in the world.

- 11. he Moderator requested all ministers present to stand and twelve responded.
- 12. The following visitors were recognized: N. L. Harrison, Moderator, Stony Fork Association; Mr. and Mrs. G. W. Gragg, Stony Fork Association; G. F. Critcher, Stony Fork Association; L. L. Estep, Avery Association; W. N. Brookshire,

Wilkesboro; G. W. Bullard, Associate State Sunday School Secretary, Raleigh Association; Mrs. J. F. McGill, Hampton, Va.; J. C. Pipes, Buncombe Association and Victor Trivett, Watauga Association, Butler, Tenn.

- 13. The congregation stood and after a song a season of prayer was engaged in led by W. J. Farthing, J. G. Allen, H. K. Middleton and J. C. Canipe.
- 14. Lawrence Hagaman, the appointee to preach the Annual Sermon, took charge of the service. He read from the first chapter of First Thessalonians and G. A. Hamby led in prayer. Bro. Hagaman announced his subject, "The Model Church." He emphasized fifteen attributes of the Model Church as follows:
  - 1. The Model Church is an example.
  - 2. Jesus is the head of the Model Church.
  - 3. The Model Church recognizes the Holy Spirit.
- 4. The Model Church looks to God and keeps His commandments.
- 5. The Model Church is a church of faith in three steps—Knowledge, Belief and Practice.
  - 6. The Model Church is a church of love.
  - 7. The membership of the Model Church is saved.
  - 8. The Model Church loves the lost.
  - 9. The Model Church seeks to tell the gospel story to others.
  - 10. Prayer is not neglected by the Model Church.
- 11. The Model Church recognizes the necessity of genuine repentance and regeneration before church membership and baptism.
- 12. The interest of the Model Church in lost people should produce upright living on the part of her members.
  - 13. The Model Church praises God.
  - 14. The members of the Model Church are "lively stones."
- 15. The Model Church will feed the people and carry the gospel to the entire world.

Bro. Hagaman closed his message with prayer.

15. The Association adjourned for the noon recess, benediction by Howard Shore.

### NOON RECESS

- 16. The Association reconvened at 1:00 P. M. After a song, J. C. Canipe read a scripture and N. M. Greene led in prayer.
- 17. S. C. Eggers reported for the Committee to examine the two churches seeking membership with us. The report was

favorable to their admission and White Rock and Green Valley Baptist Churches were received by a unanimous vote of the Association. The hand of welcome was extended to the pastors and messengers from these two new churches by the Moderator.

- 18. At the suggestion of S. C. Eggers a collection was taken for the two new churches amounting to \$90.38 which was divided equally between them.
- 19. The report on Missions was offered by Mrs. J. C. Canipe. This report was discussed by J. C. Pipes, W. J. Farthing, J. C. Canipe, Lawrence Hagaman and Levi Greene. The report was adopted.

### REPORT ON MISSIONS

"Missions is our mission" as someone has truly said. Whether it be the winning of a soul in our own church or the healing of a leper in China it is missions according to the New Testament.

The war has cost more than we can compute in money, in emotional strain and in life itself; but the war did allow us to see something of missions in the Orient and in the Pacific. A British Major wrote of the missionaries in India as those above all others who had kept alive the respect for the white man in the Orient.

The task of Christian Missions is a long-range one, though it offers first hand results for every day's work even now. We do not ever get through with the task but we see each day the fruits of the labors of the Christian worker. Not many of us expect the world to be won to Christ in one generation but we must remember that we are a link in a chain that connects the past with the future. Today there are seven million Christians in India. Did Carey and others work in vain? I think not.

The gospel will outlast the world. It is stronger than the hammers which beat upon it. The confidence is enough to keep thousands of missionaries on the field and millions of supporters at this God-given task. Let us not grow weary in well doing for we shall reap in due season if we faint not.

During the week of Sept. 29th three Bible Schools will be taught in the Association. W. J. Farthing presented his report as B. T. U. Director and led the discussion. The report was adopted.

### REPORT ON B. T. U. WORK

I wish to submit the following report for the Associational year from Sept. 1, 1945 to Aug. 31, 1946. I have visited five churches. Three new unions have been organized at Zion Hill, Timbered Ridge and Brushy Fork. We now have active unions in ten of our churches.

The Baptist Training Union work is badly needed in our churches. It is very difficult to interest churches in training work where their pastors are not interested. The churches should have study courses this fall and winter.

"Laborers Together with God," the perpetual watchword of our Woman's Missionary Union, is a reminder that Christians must be true and labor for the mission of Christ.

### CONSTITUTION

- 1. The Association shall be composed of members chosen by the different churches in our Union and duly sent to represent them in the Association who, on producing letters from their respective churches certifying their appointment, shall be entitled to their seats. Each church shall be entitled to three delegates, the ministers being members ex-officio.
- 2. In the letters from the different churches is to be expressed their numbers in full fellowship, those baptized, received by letter, dismissed by letter, excommunicated and dead since last Association.
- 3. The members thus chosen and convened shall have no power to lord it over God's heritage, nor shall they have any special power over the churches. They shall not infringe upon any internal right of any church in this Union.
- 4. The Association shall have a Moderator, Vice-Moderator, and clerk who shall be chosen annually by the suffrage of the members present.
- 5. New churches or any regular church of Christ being legally dismissed by letter by any sister Association, upon application and delegates, shall be admitted to our Union.
- 6. Every church in the Association shall be entitled to representation in the Association.
- 7. Every query presented by any member of the Association shall be once read and before it is debated the Moderator shall put it to a vote, and if there is a majority for it being debated, it shall be taken into consideration and be debated, but if there be a majority against it, it shall be withdrawn.
- 8. Every motion made and seconded shall come under the consideration of the Association except it be withdrawn by the member who made it.
- 9. The Association shall endeavor to furnish the churches with the minutes of their proceedings. The best method of accomplishing this purpose shall be at the direction of the future Associations.
- 10. We think it is absolutely necessary that we should have an Associational fund for defraying the expenses of the same. For the raising and supporting of which we think it to be the duty of each church in the Union to contribute annually such sums as they shall think proper and send it by their delegates to the Association. The money thus raised shall be deposited in the hands of the Treasurer, appointed by the Association, who shall be accountable for the same. He shall pay the money out from time to time as the Association may direct.

- 11. There shall be an Association book kept wherein the proceedings of the Association shall be regularly recorded by the secretary appointed by the Association, who shall receive a compensation yearly for his services.
- 12. The Minutes of the Association shall be read and corrected, if needs be, and signed by the Moderator and the Clerk before the Association rises.
- 13. Amendments to the plans or form of government may be made at any time by a majority of the Association when they deem it necessary, by giving the churches twelve months prior notice.
  - 14. The Association shall have power:
- To provide for the general union of the churches.
- To endeavor to preserve a chain of union amongst the churches.
- To give the churches the necessary advice in matters of difficulty.

  To inquire into the cause why the churches fail to represent themselves at any time in the Association.
- To appropriate the money contributed by the churches for an Associational fund to any purpose they may think proper.
- To have power to withdraw from any church in their Union who shall violate the rules of this Association or deviate from the orthodox principles of religion.

To correspond with sister Associations.

- To invite any Baptist in the ministry to a seat in the Association, who may be present at the time of their sitting.
- To adjourn the Association to any future time and place they may think proper and most convenient to the churches of the Union.

### Rules of Decorum

- 1. The Association shall be opened and closed with prayer.
- 2. Only one person shall speak at a time, who shall arise from his seat and address the Moderator. The person thus speaking shall not be interrupted in his speech by any except the Moderator, till he is done speaking.
- 3. He shall strictly adhere to the subject and in no wise reflect upon the person who spoke before him as to make remarks on his steps, failings, or imperfections, but shall fairly state the matter as he can do so as to give his views or ideas.
- 4. No person shall abruptly break or absent himself himself from the Association without liberty obtained from it.
- 5. No person shall rise and speak more than three times to any one subject without liberty from the Association.
- 6. No member shall have liberty of laughing during the sitting of the same or whispering in the time of public speaking.

- 7. No member shall address another in any other appelation than that of brother,
- 8. The Moderator shall not interrupt any member in, or prohibit him from speaking until he gives his light on the subject, except he break the rules of this decorum.
- 9. The names of the several members of the Association shall be enrolled by the Clerk and called over as often as required by the Association.
- 10. The Moderator shall be entitled to the same privilege of speech as any of the other members, provided the chair be filled. He shall not vote unless the Association be equally divided.

## PROCEEDINGS OF THE ONE HUNDRED SEVENTH SESSION OF THE THREE FORKS BAPTIST ASSOCIATION OF NORTH CAROLINA

### HELD WITH WILLOWDALE BAPTIST CHURCH VILAS, N. C.

#### FIRST DAY — TUESDAY, AUGUST 26, 1947 MORNING SESSION

- 1. The One Hundred Seventh Session of the Three Forks Baptist Association of North Carolina convened with Willow-dale Baptist Church, Vilas, N. C., on Tuesday, August 26, 1947 at 9:00 a. m.
- 2. The opening song service was conducted by C. J. Farthing. N. M. Greene had charge of the opening worship period. After making a plea that we make room for Jesus in our lives, he offered prayer.
- 3. The Moderator, H. K. Middleton, called the One Hundred Seventh Session of the Three Forks Baptist Association to order for the transaction of business.
- 4. The Clerk, Clyde R. Greene, called the roll of the churches and twenty-nine responded. All churches had sent in letters except Brookside and Mount Calvary. (Their letters came later).
- 5. The Chairman of the Executive Committee, R. C. Eggers, read the report of the Committee on Order of Business. This report was adopted upon motion of R. C. Eggers with the provision that the Moderator be given authority to make any changes in the program which he deems necessary.
- 6. The Moderator delivered his Annual Address in which he outlined a program for our people as follows.
  - (a) We should seek to lay the foundation for the right kind of evangelism.
  - (b) We should know and follow the teachings of the Bible.
  - (c) We should seek to develop in and toward our young people Christian attitudes.
  - (d) We should adopt a sound financial policy in all our churches.

7. Clyde R. Greene read the report of the committee on Temperance. This report was discussed by R. M. Hauss, representing the Allied Church League, Smith Hagaman, Clyde R. Greene, E. J. Farthing, Ben Wood, W. G. Bond and H. K. Middleton and was adopted.

#### REPORT ON TEMPERANCE

Your Committee on Temperance hears all around that the use of intoxicating beverages is increasing. We also read in the papers that the same thing is true throughout our land. We believe that, among an intelligent citizenship, these things ought not to be. The population of Watauga County is about twenty thousand souls. Of this number, more than eight thousand are members of Baptist churches. Your committee would like to suggest that this group can and should make itself felt. It is very hard to see how such a situation as we hear about can continue if Baptists take a united stand against it.

It may be that your Committee on Temperance is guilty as charged, because people do say that we have done nothing except to be personally against alcoholic beverages and to say intemperate things about people who are not against them. It would appear that such behavior does not have much influence. Something is needed to show Christians everywhere that the principles of Christ's teachings apply to every act of our daily lives and that these same principles constitute the only really intelligent life program. We are brethren; sons of one Father.

- 14. The Association reconvened at 1:00 p.m. After the song service, Dr. Wiley Smith led the devotional service. He read some verses from Paul's Letter to Philemon and discussed the worth of Paul's assistants to the spread of the gospel in the early days, and he led in prayer.

Go ye therefore, and teach all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son and of the Holy Ghost; teaching them to observe all things whatsoever I have commanded you; and, lo, I am with you always, even unto the end of the world', Amen."

Mark 16:15-18:

"And Jesus said unto them, 'Go ye into all the world, and preach the gospel, to every creature. He that believeth and is baptized shall be saved; but he that believeth not shall be damned'."

Luke 24: 46-48:

"And Jesus said unto them, 'Thus it is written, and thus it behooved Christ to suffer, and to rise from the dead the third day; and that repentance and remission of sins should be preached in His name among all nations, begining at Jerusalem. And ye are witnesses of these things'."

17. The report on Christian Education was read by J. H. Winkler who commented as the report was read. Dr. Sankey Blanton discussed the place of Baptist Colleges in our State and nation. Clyde R. Greene discussed some phases of Christian Education. Miss Juanita Davis, Associational Educational Director, was introduced by C. J. Farthing. She offered a report on her work and discussed it in detail. C. J. Farthing also discussed the report with reference to Vacational Bible Schools. J. W. Norris spoke, calling attention to the need in our churches for a more adequate program for our returned servicemen and women. The report was adopted.

#### REPORT ON CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

Christian Education represents all efforts of Christian Teaching, whether in the home, in the church, in public institutions or in schools and colleges owned and operated by denominations. It behoves all of us who are interested in Christian Education to direct our efforts along all these lines.

In this report we are thinking specifically of the program of Christian Education supported by Baptists through our three Southwide Seminaries and the W.M.U. Training School; and our six Baptist Colleges in North Carolina. In the four Southwide institutions during the past year we had a total of 2705 students, of whom 1744 were ministerial students.

The six Baptist Colleges in North Carolina are: Wake Forest, Meredith, Mars Hill, Campbell, Gardner-Webb and Wingate. We are this year contributing to these schools about \$351,959 divided as follows: Wake Forest \$108,882; Meredith \$78,540; Campbell \$43,175; Gardner-Webb \$37,812; Mars Hill \$59,048; and Wingate \$24,502. This is the most generous aid we have ever given our colleges for operating expenses. With a total enrollment of 4500 these six colleges will face the new year with all facilities taxed to their capacity.

Our Council on Christian Education is located in Raleigh and has 52 members—24 representing the administration of the colleges and 24 the churches at large with 4 ex-officio members. The Council provides a co-ordinating agency through which our program of Christian Education is promoted. In addition to distributing the funds, the Council has engaged in numerous activities to improve the services of our institutions and to give the

people of the state a better understanding of the over-all program. A folder of general information on all our colleges has been prepared and mailed to more than 23,000 high school graduates in the state. Through the cooperation of the Biblical Recorder and other Baptist publications information on the work of the colleges has been largely distributed throughout the state, and definite efforts have been made to emphasize the observance of Christian Education Day in our churches and Sunday Schools.

Everyone is aware of the dominant position which Wake Forest College now occupies in the thinking of North Carolina Baptists which has come about because of the challenging opportunities which came through the gift of the income from the Z. Smith Reynolds Foundation. The way is now open for the Baptists of the State to fulfill their obligations by providing funds for the new plant at Winston-Salem.

During the fall of 1946 our Sunday School Organization sponsored three central Bible Study Schools of one week duration—one at Bethel taught by Ben Lee Ray, one at Willowdale taught by J. C. Pipes and one at Laurel Springs taught by H. K. Middleton.

Since I have been in the Association it has been my privilege to be in 11 of the 26 Vacation Bible Schools that have been held this summer in the Three Forks. Miss Mabel Clay of Hickory and Miss Mary Ellen Bachelor of Rocky Mount have worked with me. Mr. W. J. Farthing has also assisted with this work. In the 26 schools we had an enrollment of 1016 with an average attendance of 795. I have helped with one Training Union Study Course at Union Church with 67 average attendance and Mission Class at Cove Creek with 19 girls enrolled.

- 23. The report on Woman's Work was read by Mrs. Don C. Perry, who discussed the report. After a motion to adopt the report had been made it was further discussed by Mrs. H. K. Middleton, C. J. Farthing, W. G. Bond, and H. K. Middleton and was adopted.

#### REPORT ON WOMAN'S WORK

Christ's command "Go ye, and make disciples of all nations" is our Watchword for this year. We are carrying out this commission to some extent in our different activities. In our meetings we study the problems and possibilities of the different countries, particularly those in which we have missionaries.

The different organizations have given programs at the local prison camp many times. Most of them serve meals at home in their communities where a death has occurred. Many of the societies have given linen and other articles both to our local hospital at Boone and our Baptist hospital at Winston-Salem.

We have 14 Missionary Societies and 11 Young People's Organizations in our association. We are encouraging more of these in our churches. Our contributions for Missions for the past year totals \$2,290.69.

Our Annual Associational W. M. U. Meeting was held with Blowing Rock Church on April 12, 1947. It was both informing and inspirational. June 9th, 1947 there was held an Associational Mission Study Course, with teachers from all over the state, at Cove Creek Church, with an enrollment of 100.

With God's help we plan to go forward, striving at all time to carry out the chief aims of the W. M. U.—Prayer, Study of the Missionary Message of the Bible, World Missions, Tithes and Offerings, Community Missions and Missionary Education of our Young People.

#### REPORT OF EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

During the past year your Executive Committee met three times at the call of our Chairman, R. C. Eggers, as matters of business required our attention. Our first meeting was held to prepare a program for this Session. We met next to prepare for the Spring Session which was held with Union Church. Then we met Aug. 3, 1947 to consider matters concerning this Session and also to make recommendations to the Association for your consideration. We recommend:

- 1. That all our churches contribute to the support of our Associational Educational Director and that this present session appoint a committee of three to work with the church in the connection,
- 2. That our churches extend an indefinite call to their pastors rather than the annual call as is in general practice now and that when a church is in the process of calling a pastor that only one man be considered at a time.
- 3. That our pastors preach more on the New Testament plan of church discipline.
  - 4. That our churches use a more worshipful type of music.
- 5. That the quota of \$9000.00 assigned to the Three Forks Association for the building program of Wake Forest College be accepted and all our people are urged to support this work.
- 6. That after this present session the custom of providing dinner on the grounds by the host church be discontinued.

Another phase of this work that is sadly neglected is our local poor and unfortunate. We should be ever ready to go to their aid at all times.







### Constitution

1. The Association shall be composed of members chosen by the different churches in our Union and duly sent to represent them in the Association who, on producing letters from their respective church certifying their appointment, shall be entitled to their seats. Each church shall be entitled to three delegates, the ministers being ex-officio.

2. In the letters from the different churches is to be expressed their numbers in full fellowship, those baptized, received by letter, dismissed by letter, excommunicated and dead since

last Association.

3. The members thus chosen and convened shall have no power to lord it over God's heritage, nor shall they have any special power over the churches. They shall not infringe upon any internal right of any church in this Union.

4. The Association shall have a Moderator, Vice-Moderator, and clerk who shall be chosen annually by the suffrage of the

members present.

5. New churches or any regular church of Christ being legally dismissed by letter by any sister Association, upon application and delegates, shall be admitted to our Union.

6. Every church in the Association shall be entitled to rep-

resentation in the Association.

7. Every query presented by any member of the Association shall be once read and before it is debated the Moderator shall put it to a vote, and if there is a majority for it being debated, it shall be taken into consideration and be debated, but if there be a majority against it, it shall be withdrawn.

8. Every motion made and seconded shall come under the consideration of the Association except it be withdrawn by the

member who made it.

9. The Association shall endeavor to furnish the churches with the minutes of their proceedings. The best method of accomplishing this purpose shall be at the direction of the future

Associations.

- 10. We think it is absolutely necessary that we should have an Associational fund for defraying the expenses of the same. For the raising and supporting of which we think it to be the duty of each church in the Union to contribute annually such sums as they may think proper and send it by their delegates to the Association. The money thus raised shall be deposited in the hands of the Treasurer, appointed by the Association, who shall be accountable for the same. He shall pay the money out from time to time as the Association may direct.
- 11. There shall be an Association book kept wherein the proceedings of the Association shall be regularly recorded by the secretary appointed by the Association, who shall receive a compensation yearly for his services.

  12. The Minutes of the Association shall be read and cor-

rected, if needs be, and signed by the Moderator and the Clerk

before the Association rises.

13. Amendments to the plans or form of government may

be made at any time by a majority of the Association when they deem it necessary, by giving the churches twelve months prior notice.

14. The Association shall have power:

To provide for the general union of the churches.

To endeavor to preserve a chain of union amongst the churches. To give the churches the necessary advice in matters of difficulty.

To inquire into the cause why the churches fail to rep-

resent themselves at any time in the Association.

To appropriate the money contributed by the churches for an Associational fund to any purpose they may think pro-

To have power to withdraw from any church in their Union who shall violate the rules of this Association or deviate from the orthodox principles of religion.

To correspond with sister Associations.

To invite any Baptist in the ministry to a seat in the Associa-

tion, who may be present at the time of their sitting.

To adjourn the Association to any future time and place they may think proper and most convenient to the churches of the Union.

### Rules of Decorum

1. The Association shall be opened and closed with prayer.

2. Only one person shall speak at a time, who shall arise from his seat and address the Moderator. The person thus speaking shall not be interrupted in his speech by any except the Moderator, till he is done speaking.

- 3. He shall strictly adhere to the subject and in no wise reflect upon the person who spoke before him as to make remarks on his steps, failings, or imperfections, but shall fairly state the matter as he can do so as to give his views or ideas.
- 4. No person shall abruptly break or absent himself from the Association without liberty obtained from it.

5. No person shall rise and speak more than three times on

any one subject without liberty from the Association.

6. No member shall have liberty of laughing during the sitting of the same or whispering in the time of public speaking.

7. No member shall address another in any other appela-

tion than that of brother.

8. The Moderator shall not interrupt any member in, or prohibit him from speaking until he gives his light on the subject, except he break the rules of this decorum.

9. The names of the several members of the Association shall be enrolled by the Clerk and called over as often as re-

quired by the Association.

10. The Moderator shall be entitled to the same privilege of speech as any of the other members, provided the chair be filled. He shall not vote unless the Association be equally divided.

### Proceedings Of The One Hundred Eighth Session Of The THREE FORKS BAPTIST ASSOCIATION Of North Carolina HELD WITH LAUREL SPRINGS BAPTIST CHURCH LAXON, N. C.

### FIRST DAY — TUESDAY, AUGUST 24, 1948 MORNING SESSION

1. The One Hundred Eighth Session of the Three Forks Baptist Association of North Carolina met with Laurel Springs Baptist Church, Laxon, N. C., on Tuesday, August 24, 1948, at 9:15 A. M.

2. The opening Song Service was conducted by C. J. Farthing. Victor Trivett read the fourth chapter of James and com-

mented on verses eight and ten. He then led in prayer.

3. Because of the absence of the Moderator, H. K. Middleton; the vice-Moderator, R. C. Eggers called the One Hundred Eighth Session to order for the transaction of business.

4. The roll of the churches was called by the Clerk, Clyde R. Greene, who announced that twenty-three churches responded and that letters had been received from all the churches

except four.

- $\hat{5}$ . The address of the Moderator was delivered by R. C. Eggers, who announced his subject, "Lengthen your cords and strengthen your stakes." The following suggestions were made as to how Christians can accomplish the purpose suggested in the subject:
  - 1. Christian living 2. Daily Bible study

3. Daily prayer

4. Winning the lost to Christ.

6. R. C. Eggers, Chairman of the Executive brought the report of the committee on Order of Business for the 1948 Session. The report was adopted as read.

7. I. A. Bumgarner presented the report on Temperance. The subject was discussed by W. J. Farthing and C. O. Vance

and the report was adopted.

### REPORT ON TEMPERANCE

Our land continues to come face to face with her number one enemy — the liquor traffic. Today we are told that there are fifty million drinkers in the United States. At least 750,000 of these are alcoholics and more than two millions are exposed to physiological damage beyond contraversy. These are figures published by the Yale University School of Alcohol Studies.

The enemy increases in damage done, especially among women. Far more women drink today than five years ago.

This means that the American home will continue to suffer in an even greater way as the women in the home lends her

support to the liquor industry.

Government figures indicate that the consumption of al-

coholic beverage has increased in the United States in the last eleven years by 112 per cent. Any straight-thinking individual facing this increase during the war years when grain was scarce knows that tragedy is all we can hope for unless there is a radical change in the present trend.

What can we do about this? The first thing anyone can do is to be a party to the widespread feeling that John Barleycorn and all his brothers and sisters be voted out. Our county permits the sale of beer and wine. The people will vote it out if

given a chance.

Another thing which can be done is to continue to spread information about the damage the liquor industry is doing in our country to our national economic, social and spiritual life. Newspapers and magazines should be forbidden to advertise alcoholic drinks in any form.

Still another thing we must do as Christians — rescue the

men and women who drink.

ther his designs.

Every church in our Association should have a good library with suitable books for our young people. Likewise, every home should see to it that good books and magazines are provided. Of course, we recommend the reading of the Bible every day, as it is God's second best gift to man. Jesus Christ is God's first best gift to men. The Bible should be read at least 15 minutes each day by every Christian and every night in family devotion. The Biblical Recorder and Charity and Children should be in every Baptist home. All our churches should mabor clubs of at least 5 or more. The Commission and Southern Home Missions are good.

pastor, that only one man be considered at a time.
7. That our pastors preach more on the New Testament plan of church discipline.

There are many institutions of learning in reach of us all but the best and most important of all institutions is the Christian Home and the Church of Jesus Christ, the only two insti-

tutions of Divine orgin on earth.

The Church is the best school of all. It has the best teacher — our Savior and Lord. It studies the best book — the inspired Word of God. It enlists the best people — those who love God and would do good. It engages in the best work — winning souls to Christ and building them up in Christ. It strives toward the best goal - the new birth and the good life. In short, the Church School is the school of the best — the best of heart and hand, the best of heaven and earth, the best for time and eternity. It affords the highest educational motive in

that it places Christ in the center of life.

The Church School or Sunday School's primary responsibility is to reach the people, and win them to Christ. It's only textbook is the Bible — the greatest textbook in all the world. It teaches people how to live the good life here and prepares them for Eternal life hereafter. It stands squarely for thorough moral teaching and sound Christian doctrine, which is the one aggressive agency of Christianity. Another very important agency of the Church is the Baptist Training Union. Its responsibility is to train and develop all the members of the Church, and fit them for the various activities of the Church.

All the churches of an Association today, stand in dire need of trained leaders, and teachers for the Sunday Schools and the Training Unions - leaders and teachers for the Vaca-

tion Bible Schools.

All of our churches have Sunday Schools, but less than half of them have Training Unions. And very few of them had

Vacation Bible Schools this year.

Jesus Christ's last commission to his followers was, "Ye are my Witnesses from Home to the Uttermost parts of the Earth." A witness is one who knows something and is willing and anxious to tell it. A large per cent of our church members are not reading the Bible as they should. They are not reading our religious papers. How can they be witnesses for our Savior unless they read and study the work of God.

Very few unsaved people attend church any more. If we are to reach them, we must go out into the highways and hedges and bring them in. The primary reason for the existence of the church is to reach the people and win the lost to Christ. If a church ceases to win lost people to Christ, then there is

no longer any reason for it to exist.

The greatest opportunities of all ages are now knocking at our doors. If we do not wake up and avail ourselves of these opportunities, it will soon be too late.



### Constitution

1. The Association shall be composed of members chosen by the different churches in our Union and duly sent to represent them in the Association, who, on producing letters from their respective church certifying their appointment, shall be entitled to their seats. Each church shall be entitled to three delegates, the ministers being ex-officio.

2. In the letters from the different churches is to be expressed their numbers in full fellowship, those baptized, received by letter, dismissed by letter, excommunicated and dead since

last Association.

3. The members thus chosen and convened shall have no power to lord it over God's heritage, nor shall they have any special power over the churches. They shall not infringe upor any internal right of any church in this Union.

4. The Association shall have a Moderator, Vice-Moderator, and clerk who shall be chosen annually by the suffrage of the

members present.

5. New churches or any regular church of Christ being legally dismissed by letter by any sister Association upon application aand delegates, shall be admitted to our Union.

6. Every church in the Association shall be entitled to rep-

resentation in the Association.

7. Every query presented by any member of the Association shall be once read and before it is debated the Moderator shall put it to a vote, and if there is a majority for it being debated, it shall be taken into consideration and be debated, but if there be a majority against it, it shall be withdrawn.

8. Every motion made and seconded shall come under the consideration of the Association except it be withdrawn by the

member who made it.

9. The Association shall endeavor to furnish the churches with the minutes of their proceedings. The best method of accomplishing this purpose shall be at the direction of the future Assuriations.

10. We think it is absolutely necessary that we should have an Associational fund for defraying the expenses of the same. For the raising and supporting of which we think it to be the duty of each church in the Union to contribute annually such sums as they may think proper and send it by their delegates to the Association. The money thus raised shall be deposited in the hands of the Treasurer, appointed by the Association, who shall be accountable for the same. He shall pay the money out from time to time as the Association may direct.

11. There shall be an Association book kept wherein the proceedings of the Association shall be regularly recorded by the secretary appointed by the Association, who shall receive a compensation yearly for his services.

12. The minute of this Association shall be read and corrected, if need be, and signed by the Moderator and the Clerk before the Association rises.

13. Amendments to the plans or form of government may

be made at any time by a majority of the Association when they deem it necessary, by giving the churches twelve months prior notice.

14. The Association shall have power:

To provide for the general union of the churches.

To endeavor to preserve a chain of union amongst the churches.

To give the churches the necessary advice in matters of difficulty.

To inquire into the cause why the churches fail to rep-

resent themselves at any time in the Association.

To appropriate the money contributed by the churches for an Associational fund to any purpose they may think proper.

To have power to withdraw from any church in their Union who shall violate the rules of this Association or deviate from the orthodox principles of religion.

To correspond with sister Associations.

To invite any Baptist in the ministry to a seat in the Asso-

ciation, who may be present at the time of their sitting.

To adjourn the Association to any future time and place they may think proper and most convenient to the churches of the Union.

### Rules of Decorum

1. The Association shall be opened and closed with prayer.

2. Only one person shall speak at a time, who shall arise from his seat and address the Moderator. The person thus speaking shall not be interrupted in his speech by any except the Moderator, till he is done speaking.

3. He shall strictly adhere to the subject and in no wise reflect upon the person who spoke before him as to make remarks on his steps, failings, or imperfections, but shall fairly state the matter as he can do so as to give his views or ideas.

4. No person shall abruptly break or absent himself from

the Association without liberty obtained from it.

5. No person shall rise and speak more than three times on

any one subject without liberty from the Association.

6. No member shall have liberty of laughing during the sitting of the same or whispering in the time of public speaking.

7. No member shall address another in any other appela-

tion than that of brother.

8. The Moderator shall not interrupt any member in, or prohibit him from speaking until he gives his light on the subject, except he break the rules of this decorum.

9. The names of the several members of the Association shall be enrolled by the Clerk and called over as often as re-

quired by the Association.

10. The Moderator shall be entitled to the same privilege of speech as any of the other members, provided the chair be filled. He shall not vote unless the Association be equally divided.

FIRST DAY — TUESDAY, AUG. 39, 1949 MORNING SESSION

- 1. The One Hundred Ninth Annual Session of the Three Forks Baptist Association of North Carolina met with Forest Grove Baptist Church, Vilas, N. C., at 9:10 A. M.
- 2. The opening song service was conducted by Tipton Greene, after which C. H. Kincaid led the devotional service by reading from the 28th chapter of the Gospel according to Matthew and leading in prayer.
- 3. The Moderator, R. C. Eggers, called the One Hundred Ninth Annual Session of the Three Forks Baptist Association to older for the transaction of business.
- 4. The Clerk called the roll of the churches and announced that 23 churches had responded and that all church letters had been received except four.
- 5. R. C. Eggers delivered the Moderator's Address from the theme of the present session, "Fear not, stand still, and see the salvation of the Lord." He described the four groups in the congregation of Israel at the crossing of the Red Sea as follows:
  - 1. Those who would drown themselves in the face of danger.
  - 2. Those who would return to Egypt.
  - 3. Those who wanted to fight.
- 4. Those who would shout at the Egyptians and thus stop them.
- 5. Moses said, "Fear not, stand still and see the Salvation of the Lord."
- 6. The report of the Executive Committee on Order of Business for the present session was presented by Clyde R. Greene and was adopted.
- 7. R. E. Hendrix brought the report from the Committee on Temperance. After being discussed by R. E. Hendrix, Victor Trivette, C. J. Farthing, S. C. Eggers and Clyde R. Greene it was adopted. It was called to the attention of the session that Forsyth and Stokes county were voting on liquor stores today. Victor Trivett led a prayer for the success of the dry forces in both counties.

### REPORT ON TEMPERANCE

In Luke 21:34-35 our Saviour, in most solemn language, says, "Take heed to yourselves lest your hearts be weighed down with dissipation and drunkenness and the care of this life and that day come upon you suddenly like a snare; for it wil come upon all who dwell upon the face of the whole earth. But watch at all times, praying that you may have strength to escape all these things that will take place, and to stand before the Son of Man."

Gal. 3:27, "For as many of you as have been baptized into Christ have put on Christ. To put on Christ is to be clothed with His very likeness, to demonstrate in our daily lives the fruits of the Spirit which includes TEMPERANCE or self - control. These references to temperance by Jesus and Paul include not only drunkenness but all kinds of dissipation which weaken our

bodies, our minds and our spiritual lives.

Some apparent gains have been made in our fight on the liquor traffic during the last year but continuous effort is necessary to make these gains good. Crusades should be launched against every major vice confronting our young people. All these evils cannot be enumerated here but important among them is the use of tobacco in any way whatsoever. Nicotine is a deadly poison and once the individual has become addicted to it he will most likely use it the remainder of his life. Recent scientific studies show that nicotinism is almost as difficult to overcome as is alcoholism.

Self - control with respect to emotional living should receive greater emphasis. Violent emotional outbursts may have a ruinous effort upon spiritual, mental and even physical well-being. Many of our churches are torn to pieces by this sort of infantilism. We are admonished to grow up and "put away childish things," and to "train ourselves in godliness," and "above all things put on love, which binds everything together in perfect harmony."

2. We recommend that our churches provide a program of singing and other Christian work on Sunday afternoons dur-

ing the summer of 1950.

3. That our churches extend the indefinite call to their pastors and that when a church is without a pastor a pulpit committee be appointed by the church and that during the process of calling a pastor only one man be considered at a time.

4. That our pastors preach more on the New Testament

plan of church discipline.

### REPORT ON RELIGIOUS LITERATURE

May we consider religious literature from two angles -

its production and use.

1. The Baptist Sunday School Board is producing much literature for the use of Baptist church through Sunday Schools, Baptist Training Unions and Woman's Missionary Societies. The Baptist book stores scattered throughout the territory of the Suthern Baptist Convention are distributing this and other items of literature to our people.

2. In North Carolina we have two outstanding papers — Biblical Recorder and Charity and Children, which offer to our

people complete ilformation on our work in the state.

3. We urge our people to use the above mentioned publications and suggest to the churches of the Three Forks Association that possibly the greatest opportunity for directing the thinking of our people is by placing the right literature in the hands of our members. Twenty - two boys and forty - eight girls, accepting the theme, "Linked Together in World Missions," entered into the camp activities of mission study, morning and evening worship, offering, singing and recreation in a fine Christian spirit. We greatly appreciate the work of the pastors, couselors, state W. M. U. workers, missionaries, parents and others who helped to make the camps worthwhile.

There are great opportunities through the W. M. U. organizations for women and young peop'e to serve the Lord. Pray that we may be faithful in laboring together to make known

### CHRISTIAN EDUCATION REPORT

What is happening to the home is a commentary on Christian education, for it begins in the home. Most of our attitudes are formed while we are in the tender years of life. We may have reached a strange situation in the American home. Its fail-

ures may be the cause of our high crime cost, extreme expenditures for alcoholic beverages, and almost unbelievable moral conditions. Maybe we have come to the point where the failures of the home make demands on the church and school to equip new parents for new homes, where the failures will not be so

glaring.

The church today faces its greatest challenge to do something for its members which will stand in a category by itself. Its horizon is clouded, but its vision needs to be clear for its purpose is to do something for man which the world cannot do. Christian education in the church must give people facts about the Bible, and life. These must be related. The task of Christian education goes on to train its constituency to carry on the work of God's kingdom. It is the duty of Christian education in the church to help man see the world with the gospel avail-

able as its only hope for redemption.

Out across the length and breadth of the land we see education today as one of our largest institutions. The church can be credited with starting this great movement. The state has taken over great segments of this task of education. This is necessary if we are to be aware of our potential. Yet the church cannot go out of the business of education, for it must develop Christian minds to lead Christians everywhere. I have not come to the point that I want the state to train men for the leadership of our great denomination. Personally it means something to me that we have Christian schools like Mars Hill, Wingate, Gardner - Webb, Campbell College, Meredith and Wake Forest to which we may look for a great impact on our state. I believe in Christian education in the home, church, college and seminary.

and hospital.

Receipts from the churches in the Mother's Day offering this year totaled \$141,150.50. Approximately one half of the 8880 bed patients and all the 36,000 visits to the outpatient clinics paid no doctor fees. We earnestly commend the work of our hospital to our churches and request their loyal support therefor.

Since the establishment of our Orphanage in 1885, thousands of homeless boys and girls have been cared for. Last year we helped 793 children — 22 more than in 1947 and 93 more than in 1948. A new cottage will soon be opened at Kennedy Home which will enable them to care for 24 more children.

It is the duty of our churches to aid our aged ministers who

have fought a good fight and are very dear to our people.

# Constitution

1. The Association shall be composed of members chosen by the different churches in our Union and duly sent to represent them in the Association, who, on producing letters from their respective church certifying their appointment, shall be entitled to their seats. Each church shall be entitled to three delegates, the ministers being ex-officio.

2. In the letters from the different churches is to be expressed their numbers in full fellowship, those baptized, received by letter, dismissed by letter, excommunicated and dead since

last Association.

3. The members thus chosen and convened shall have no power to lord it over God's heritage, nor shall they have any special power over the churches. They shall not infringe upon any internal right of any church in this Union.

4. The Association shall have a Moderator, Vice-Moderator, and clerk who shall be chosen annually by the suffrage of the

members present.

5. New churches or any regular church of Christ being legally dismissed by letter by any sister Association upon application and delegates, shall be admitted to our Union.

6. Every church in the Association shall be entitled to representation in the Association.

7. Every query presented by any member of the Association shall be once read and before it is debated the Moderator shall put it to a vote, and if there is a majority for it being de-bated, it shall be taken into consideration and be debated, but if there be a majority against it, it shall be withdrawn.

8. Every motion made and seconded shall come under the consideration of the Association except it be withdrawn by the

member who made it.

9. The Association shall endeavor to furnish the churches with the minutes of their proceedings. The best method of accomplishing this purpose shall be at the direction of the future

Associations

10. We think it is absolutely necessary that we should have an Associational fund for defraying the expenses of the same. For the raising and supporting of which we think it to be the duty of each church in the Union to contribute annually such sums as they may think proper and send it by their delegates to the Association. The money thus raised shall be deposited in the hands of the Treasurer, appointed by the Association, who shall be accountable for the same. He shall pay the money out from time to time as the Association may direct.

11. There shall be an Association book kept wherein the proceedings of the Association shall be regularly recorded by the secretary appointed by the Association, who shall receive a compensation yearly for his services.

12. The minutes of this Association shall be read and cor-

rected, if need be, and signed by the Moderator and the Clerk

before the Association rises.

13. Amendments to the plans or form of government may be made at any time by a majority of the Association when they deem it necessary, by giving the churches twelve months prior notice.

14. The Association shall have power:

To provide for the general union of the churches.

To endeavor to preserve a chain of union amongst the churches.

To give the churches the necessary advice in matters of dif-

ficulty.

To inquire into the cause why the churches fail to represent themselves at any time in the Association.

To appropriate the money contributed by the churches for an Associational fund to any purpose they may think proper.

To have power to withdraw from any church in their Union who shall violate the rules of this Association or deviate from the orthodox principles of religion.

To correspond with sister Associations.

To invite any Baptist in the ministry to a seat in the Association, who may be present at the time of their sitting.

To adjourn the Association to any future time and place they may think proper and most convenient to the churches of the Union.

# Rules Of Decorum

1. The Association shall be opened and closed with prayer.

2. Only one person shall speak at a time, who shall arise from his seat and address the Moderator. The person thus speaking shall not be interrupted in his speech by any except the Moderator, till he is done speaking.

3. He shall strictly adhere to the subject and in no wise re-flect upon the person who spoke before him as to make remarks on his steps, failings, or imperfections, but shall fairly state the matter as he can do so as to give his views or ideas.

4. No person shall abruptly break or absent himself from

the Association without liberty obtained from it.

5. No person shall rise and speak more than three times on any one subject without liberty from the Association.

6. No member shall have liberty of laughing during the sitting of the same or whispering in the time of public speaking. 7. No member shall address another in any other appela-

tion than that of brother.

8. The Moderator shall not interrupt any member in, or

prohibit him from speaking until he gives his light on the subject, except he break the rules of this decorum.

9. The names of the several members of the Association shall be enrolled by the Clerk and called over as often as re-

quired by the Association.

10. The Moderator shall be entitled to the same privilege of speech as any of the other members, provided the chair be filled. He shall not vote unless the Association be equally divided.

MORNING SESSION

1. The One Hundred Tenth Annual Session of the Three Forks Baptist Association of North Carolina met with Perkinsville Baptist church, Boone, N. C. at 9:10 a. m.

2. J. C. Farthing led the opening song service, after which C. O. Vance conducted the worship service which was closed with prayer by Grady Minton, Smith Hagaman and C. O. Vance.

3. The Moderator, R. C. Eggers, called the One Hundred Tenth Session of the Three Forks Baptist Association to order for the transaction of the business of the session.

- 4. R. C. Eggers delivered the Moderator's Address using as his subject "Evangelism." This address is summerized as follows:
  - 1. He that winneth souls is wise.

2. The soul winner must be spirit filled.

3. The soul winner must be clean.

4. The soul winner must exercise faith.

5. Wade E. Brown, Chairman of the Executive Committee, presented the report of the Executive Committee on "Suggested Order of Business for the 1950 Session." The report was adopted as read with the provision that the Moderator be empowered to make any necessary changes as the Session progressed.

6. Kent K. Brown offered the report on Public Morals. He discussed the report, followed by Smith Hagaman and it

was adopted.

### REPORT ON PUBLIC MORALS

It is now 1950 and the Baptists of the Three Forks Association again assemble to take stock of our work for the past year. This report on Public Morals can't possibly show con-

ditions in detail as they really are today; because over the wide world we are certainly at a low ebb so far as morals are concerned.

There is only one reason for this-people everywhere are turning their faces away from God. In the United States one out of twelve attend church. Here in Watauga county the percentage of those attending church is much higher. Seven out of ten children drop out of church and church work by the time they are fifteen years old.

Our people spend one and one half billion shows. Our people drink two million gallons of strong drink annually. About 55 per cent of our young people are drinking. Crime marches on - marriage failures increase - five billion for education - fifteen billion for crime.

We surely know the remedy as Christians but are we willing to make the personal application of the only remedy that has the slightest change to cure?

- 3. That our churches give due consideration to the request of the N. C. Baptist Hospital for funds to erect the New Wing in Winston-Salem.
  - 4. That our churches consider only one man at a time when

calling a Pastor and that it is more profitable for both church and pastor for the call to be indefinite.

### W. M. U. REPORT

### MISSIONS REPORT

The World has suddenly gotten very close together. Looking at a map of the world we now see by the air in a straight line the world becomes very close together. What goes on in one part of the world affects us whether we realize this or not. Jesus must have seen this day for he proclaimed the field is the world. He came to be the saviour of the world. His commission says start at home but don't quit until you nave carried the message around the world. If there is any reason for us to be scared at world conditions today it is that we have failed to give the gospel to the world and now un-

suspectingly the world is at our door with all of its heathenism.

The program of Jesus was to start with his followers and inspire them to so love God and focus their attention on his program that it would of its own accord reach out to those around them. The gospel has that power if we will concentrate our attention here. If ours is a spiritual family it has spiritual power that goes beyond its own doors to the doors of the world. If we love God enough we will love the peoples of the

world enough to give them the gospel.

The means by which we give the gospel to the surroundings in which we live is important. For twenty five years Southern Baptists have had a unified program by which it might minister to the home territory, the southland and the world. On a percentage basis we have worked to help as many causes as were pessible. It meant training our people at home and preparing them to go out as preachers, missionaries and educational workers in many fields. On this twenty-fifth anniversary it is indeed worthwhile to look at the progress which has been made. The world has been astounded at the progress Southern Baptists have made and today we have won the acclaim by our growth of religious leaders in other denominations. Outstanding strides have been made in evangelism and numerical growth. Other denominations now fervently expect us to be able to report within another year a membership of 7 and one half millions. Much of our growth has been due to the consistent way we have taken care of the needs of our growing institutions and our advancing mission program. Southern Baptists are looking forward to 1750 missionaries on the field. The cooperative program is the means by which we have sought to carry out work at home and abroad.

Some basis facts must be faced. We must do a better job at home if we expect to do a better job around the world. Our volunteers for missions come from home churches. If we are not training our young people for this great task then we will fail abroad. Another basis fact is this: Can it be that here in America we had rather see people go to hell while we rationalize our position and fill our banks with our deposits? Then in later years we have to pray the price of our folly by sending our boys to pay the price of our sins. Still another basic fact is that we can not confine the gospel. It will go out of its own accord. That little band of Jesus disciples must have been astounded when the commission came to go to the whole world. And yet if they thought long enough they would have remembered. The Greeks who came to see Jesus. Already his gospel was going out.

### REPORT ON CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

Never before in the history of our nation has there been so great an educational program, neither has there ever been such a great need for Christian education as there is today. Education someone has said, is "Directed growth." Christian education then is "directed Christian growth."

The leaders of our homes, our nation and our world need to be genuinely Christian at heart and trained under Christian leadership in order that their thinking and actions may be sincerely Christian. This training can come only through Christian leadership in the home, the church and the school, by parents and teachers who know the Lord Jesus Christ as Savior, Education without Christ Jesus is not Christian.

The homes and the churches are God's greatest institutions for Christian training. We should emphasize by precept, by example and by every way possible, the building and maintenance of Christian homes. All the organizations of the Church; the Sunday School; Baptist Training Union; the Vacation Bible School; the Brotherhood; and the Woman's Missionary Union, should exist for and be engaged in Christian Education.

If our thinking and actions are right, they must come from hearts that are Christian who have been instructed in the principles of the New Testament. This must be done not only through the homes and the Church, but also through Church supported and church controlled schools. Baptists of Three Forks Association and of North Carolina must awake to the fact that we have a duty, are obligated an opportunity under God to support, with our co-operation, money, and every effort possible, our Baptist School of the State.

It is interesting to know that the Baptist of North Carolina have supported colleges since 1834, when Wake Forest was first opened. We now have seven (7) fine colleges with a total of 5,000 students, most of whom are Baptists of our North Carolina homes and churches. By actual count 4,000 of these students are members of Baptist churches, who will become our leaders as they leave college and return to some community to take up whatever work they may select or can secure. The kind of leaders they will be is dependent on what we will do for them today.

Let Baptist educate in New Testament principles. Let us make stronger our homes, our churches and our colleges, that our people may receive a Christian Education for the glory of God. Let us as parents, pastors and church leaders do more to influence more of our fine young people to dedicate and train themselves for active Christian service in whatever they

do in life.

We have the opportunity to be Christ minded in our support of the above objects. What is our record? In 1947 we gave \$4020.86 to the Orphanages and \$825.24 to the Hospital; in 1948 we gave \$4,626.82 to the Orphanage and \$813.81 to the Hospital; in 1949 we gave \$3,569.40 to the Orphanage and \$939.05 to the Hospital; in 1950—this year—we gave \$3,321.12 to the Orphanage and \$1,309.85 to the Hospital. This is about 1 1-4 cent per week per member for our membership. A package of cigarettes costs 15 times as much as a member of the Three Forks Association pays per week for our program of benevolences. Are we satisfied with our record?

14. The Association shall have power:

To provide for the general union of the churches.

To endeavor to preserve a chain of union amongst the churches.

To give the churches the necessary advice in matters of difficulty.

To inquire into the cause why the churches fail to rep-

resent themselves at any time in the Association.

To appropriate the money contributed by the churches for an Associational fund to any purpose they may think proper.

To have power to withdraw from any church in their Union who shall violate the rules of this Association or deviate from the orthodox principles of religion.

To correspond with sister Associations.

To invite any Baptist in the ministry to a seat in the Association, who may be present at the time of their sitting.

To adjourn the Association to any future time and place they may think proper and most convenient to the churches of the Union.

# **Rules Of Decorum**

1. The Association shall be opened and closed with prayer.

2. Only one person shall speak at a time, who shall arise from his seat and address the Moderator. The person thus speaking shall not be interrupted in his speech by any except the Moderator, till he is done speaking.

3. He shall strictly adhere to the subject and in no wise reflect upon the person who spoke before him as to make remarks on his steps, failings, or imperfections, but shall fairly state the matter as he can do so as to give his views or ideas.

4. No person shall abruptly break or absent himself from

the Association without liberty obtained from it.

5. No person shall rise and speak more than three times on any one subject without liberty from the Association.

6. No member shall have liberty of laughing during the sitting of the same or whispering in the time of public speaking.

7. No member shall address another in any other appela-

tion than that of brother.

8. The Moderator shall not interrupt any member in, or prohibit him from speaking until he gives his light on the subject, except he break the rules of this decorum.

9. The names of the several members of the Association shall be enrolled by the Clerk and called over as often as re-

quired by the Association.

10. The Moderator shall be entitled to the same privilege of speech as any of the other memoers, provided the chair be filled. He shall not vote unless the Association be equally divided.

# Constitution

1. The Association shall be composed of members chosen by the different churches in our Union and duly sent to represent them in the Association, who, on producing letters from their respective church certifying their appointment, shall be entitled to their seats. Each church shall be entitled to three delegates, the ministers being ex-officio.

2. In the letters from the different churches is to be expressed their numbers in full fellowship, those baptized, received by letter, dismissed by letter, excommunicated and dead since

last Association.

3. The members thus chosen and convened shall have no power to lord it over God's heritage, nor shall they have any special power over the churches. They shall not infringe upon any internal right of any church in this Union.

4. The Association shall have a Moderator, Vice-Moderator, and clerk who shall be chosen annually by the suffrage of the

members present.

5. New churches or any regular church of Christ being legally dismissed by letter by any sister Association upon application and delegates, shall be admitted to our Union.

6. Every church in the Association shall be entitled to rep-

resentation in the Association.

7. Every query presented by any member of the Association shall be once read and before it is debated the Moderator shall put it to a vote, and if there is a majority for it being debated, it shall be taken into consideration and be debated, but if there be a majority against it, it shall be withdrawn.

8. Every motion made and seconded shall come under the consideration of the Association except it be withdrawn by the

member who made it.

- 9. The Association shall endeavor to furnish the churches with the minutes of their proceedings. The best method of accomplishing this purpose shall be at the direction of the future Associations
- 10. We think it is absolutely necessary that we should have an Associational fund for defraying the expenses of the same. For the raising and supporting of which we think it to be the duty of each church in the Union to contribute annually such sums as they may think proper and send it by their delegates to the Association. The money thus raised shall be deposited in the hands of the Treasurer, appointed by the Association, who shall be accountable for the same. He shall pay the money out from time to time as the Association may direct.
- 11. There shall be an Association book kept wherein the proceedings of the Association shall be regularly recorded by the secretary appointed by the Association, who shall receive a compensation yearly for his services.

12. The minutes of this Association shall be read and corrected, if need be, and signed by the Moderator and the Clerk

before the Association rises.

13. Amendments to the plans or form of government may

# REPORT ON RELIGIOUS LITERATURE

What are we reading? Much of our thinking is directed by that which we read. A thought is a powerful thing. If religious literature has the right place in the home much good will come. If our people

are reading the wrong things untold damage is being done.

At the heart of what our denomination is doing we find the publication of religious literature. Whatever we might say about these publications they are being used for noble purposes. The light of our progress has been illuminating the paths of men and women, boys and girls. Todays growth is reflected in the reading of yesterday. Among our publications some of these rate high according to material and purposes. pose. Home Life receives commendation frequently, both by good accomplished as well as for its makeup.

Here in our state we have the Biblical Recorder, our state Baptist paper and Charity and Children, published by the Orphanage. These publications deserve the right place in every Baptist home in North Carolina. Through these papers articles of interest to the work of North Carolina Baptists continue to inform the people of our state. News of churches remains a source of constant interest to their readers. Reports of contributions by the churches frequently occur that we may know what is the state of affairs.

Being raised in a Baptist home should mean certain specific rela-

tions. One of these is an interest in the work of our denomination. One church put their state paper in the budget, sending it to all of the families of the church. Immediately the pastor sponsored among the youth of the church an interest in finding out how many times each week their church was mentioned in their state Baptist paper. You can see what happened that pastor reported the unusual events that went on in his church. The youth interested their parents in reading the paper to help them find the references to their church. To me reading these publications deepens my interest in the Kingdom of God. As I see what other churches are doing both small and large, city and county, mountain and churches of the plains I am inspired to greater effort for the Kingdom of God.

What our denomination is doing beyond our borders, as well as the conditions of the world, are reflected in the Missions Magazines—Home

Missions and The Commission.

Enough material is being published by our denomination for every family to be associated in some way with reading. The variety is such

most of our needs can be met.

The Bible remains at the center of what the Christian does, as well as reads. In our denomination it is the heart of our faith and practice. It is taught in our Sunday Schools, read at our family altars, has a vital place in our devotional life as well as that of the organization, is the source of our preaching and is a medium for the voice of God to speak to our lives. And yet how great a number in the world do not have access to a Bible.

More and more the work of the American Bible Society is claiming the attention of Southern Baptists. Every man must have the Bible in his native tongue, if the Word of God is to speak to his heart. Someone must translate it into his language, publish it and send it to him, wherever he may live.

In many sections of the world people are too poor to afford a Bible that costs a few cents. Someone must help those who can only pay a part of the cost. The American Bible Society comes in to be that someone.

Last year they distributed 11 million volumes of scriptures at home and abroad. Another three million volumes were produced through gifts of materials and money to Bible Societies of other countries, especially Germany and Japan, bringing the grand total to more than 14 million volumes for the year.

What are we reading? On the schedule should be religious literature

with the Bible at the center.

### REPORT ON MISSIONS

# REPORT ON CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

"Teaching them to observe all things whatsoever I have commanded you . . ." (Matt. 28:20). Primary responsibility for Christian education rests on the home, and they on the parents of the countless children in North Carolina. Whatever parents teach by word and example children will inevitably learn. Our first need then is for more thoroughly Christian homes.

The church can overcome bad influence in the home but in large measure what the church can do depends on what the home has done. Education in Sunday School and Training Union, by carefully teaching God's Word, help people find Christ as Saviour and learn week by week

about Christ's words, His will, and His work.
In Christians Schools and Colleges again much depends on what the church and homes have accomplished as to what colleges can do. The skills and facts that our schools provide, plus the vision created by wider fellowships are greatly needed in this generation of God-denying, Bible-denying, Christ-less leadership and movements. Dedicated talent and leadership ability, well-trained in Christian principles and subject to the will of God without compromise are North Carolina's and America's greatest needs. Our colleges, seven strong, have this as their goal. Another school, Fruitland Baptist Bible Institute ministers to a specific need in North Carolina in providing Christ-centered training for the Gospel ministry.

In giving the best possible educational preparation for a preaching, teaching or singing ministry, Southern Baptists now have five theological seminaries stretched from Louisville, Ky., to San Francisco, California. By support of the Cooperative Program they are our schools. where thousands of tomorrow's leaders are trained. Our nation and the world are looking to these schools in hope.

Education is not the answer, alone. Coupled with a personal knowledge of Christ and zeal for speeding the Gospel, education can help us more fully meet the need all about us, "Study . . . search the scriptures . . . preach the word . . . teaching them to observe . . . that the

world may know."

- (2) That the purpose of this fund be for the hiring of an associational missionary, the purchasing of minutes of the association, and any other needs that may arise for the promoting of the Kingdom of God in our association.
- (3) That this committe with our associational missionary formulate some plan of presenting to our churches the needs of our association.
- (4) We recommend that our churches adopt one of three plans for contributing to this associational mission fund:

(A) Include it in your budget if you have one.

- (B) Designate definite times during the year for associational missions day as we do for orphanage, state missions, etc.
- (C) Retain a certain percent of all contributions made to objects outside our association and send it in to our associational mission treasurer.

# NORTH CAROLINA BAPTIST HOME FOR AGING

The North Carolina Baptist State Convention in its November, 1950, session authorized the committee on the Home for the Aging to make plans for the opening and operation of our Home for the Aging as soon as the committee might find a way to meet the cost of equipping and operating. Because of the drive to raise money for the construction of the new wing to the Baptist Hospital, the Convention instructed the committee for the Home not to expect direct help from the Baptist State Convention during the year 1951.

Convention during the year 1951.

On January 9, the committee on the Home elected Rev. James M. Hayes, pastor of North Winston Baptist Church, Winston-Salem, superintendent of the Home, and Miss Edna Heinzerling, Director of Nurses of the Baptist Hospital, to serve as supervisor of our Home. The committee decided to open the Home for residents when sufficient funds be-

came available to begin.

There are many evidences of the Lord's favor upon the Home thus far. In the first place, He led in making a home immediately available. Ten years ago the trustees of the Bowman Gray School of Medicine of Wake Forest College leased a three-story, brick-constructed, fireproof building, with an elevator, for a period of 25 years for \$.1.00 a year. The committee on the Home was able to secure this building for

15 years at the same rental price. The building accommodates 20 residents at present. The top floor, if completed, would give space for 16 additional residents. The completion of this floor would cost approximately \$23,000. With more than 100 applications for admission already received, and inquiries coming almost daily, one can easily see the pressing need of more space.

The Home has been greatly helped by the gifts received - furniture: office equipment, heating system, blankets, linens, towels, and many other items, as well as discounts on supplies necessary to be purchased. Although the Home has been operating only since March 16, yet it now has assets approximating \$50,000, and is not operating in the red.

Our residents range in age from 67 to 91 years, and come from widely scattered sections of North Carolina - from Franklin to Elizabeth City - the mountains to the sea. Regardless of the sections from which they come, they are a happy, congenial family, all rejoicing in the opportunity to live in the Home. The attitude of all the residents is well expressed in the brief statements of Miss Bertha Callaway, former matron of Mills Home Orphanage: "I like this good Christian home"; and of Mrs. Carroll: "I wouldn't exchange it for any other."

The Home offers four things to those who come to live there: security, comfort, congeniality, and a Christian ministry. With this sort of program, North Carolina Baptists can add years to life, and life to years for those who reside in our Baptist Home for the Aging.

One donor said when he sent his check to the Home: "I believe in this practical kind of Christianity. North Carolina Baptists have waited too long to begin it." Surely it is practical, for Jesus said: "Inasmuch as ye have done it unto one of the least of these my brethren, ye have done it unto me."

The committee on the Home challenged North Carolina Baptists to build a home adequate to meet the need of the increasing number of old people from 65 years up. Their program calls for a million dollar plant, which would accommodate 270 residents. With the Lord leading and North Carolina Baptists cooperating, such a plant should be built and in operation within a few years.

"Now also I am old and grayheaded, O God, forsake me not" (Psalm 71:18).



# Constitution

1. The Association shall be composed of members chosen by the different churches in our Union and duly sent to represent them in the Association, who, on producing letters from their respective church certifying their appointment, shall be entired to their seats. Each church shall be entitled to three delegates, the ministers being ex-officio.

2. In the letters from the different churches is to be expres-

sed their numbers in full fellowship, those baptized, received by letter, dismissed by letter, excommunicated and dead since

last Association.

3. The members thus chosen and convened shall have no power to lord it over God's heritage, nor shall they have any special power over the churches. They shall not infringe upon any internal right of any church in this Union.

4. The Association shall have a Moderator, Vice-Mcderator, and clerk who shall be chosen annually by the suffrage of the

members present.

5. New churches or any regular church of Christ being lagally dismissed by letter by any sister Association upon application and delegates, shall be admitted to our Union.

6. Every church in the Association shall be entitled to rep-

resentation in the Association.
7. Every query presented by any member of the Association shall be once read and before it is debated the Moderator shall put it to a vote, and if there is a majority for it being debated, it shall be taken into consideration and be debated, but if there be a majority against it, it shall be withdrawn.

8. Every motion made and seconded shall come under the consideration of the Association except it be withdrawn by the

member who made it.

9. The Association shall endeavor to furnish the churches with the minutes of their proceedings. The best method of accomplishing this purpose shall be at the direction of the future Associations.

10. We think it is absolutely necessary that we shall have an Associational fund for defraying the experses of the small For the raising and supporting of which we think it to be the duty of each church in the Union to contribute annually such sums as they may think proper and send it by their delegates to the Association. The money thus raised shall be deposited in the hands of the Treasurer, appointed by the Association, who shall be accountable for the same. He shall pay the money out from time to time as the Association may direct.

11. There shall be an Association book kept wherein the proceedings of the Association shall be regularly recorded by the secretary appointed by the Association, who shall receive a compensation yearly for this service.

12. The minutes of this Association shall be read and corrected, if need be, and signed by the Moderator and the Clerk

before the Asociation rises.

13. Amendments to the plans or form of government may be made at any time by a majority of the Asociation when they deem it necessary, by giving the churches twelve months prior notice.

14. The Association shall have power:

To provide for the general union of the churches.

To endeavor to preserve a chain of union amongst the churches.

To give the churches the necessary advice in matters of dif-

ficulty.

To inquire into the cause why the churches fail to rep-

resent themselves at any time in the Association.

To appropriate the money contributed by the churches for an Associational fund to any purpose they may think proper.

To have power to withdraw from any church in their Union who shall violate the rules of this Association or deviate from the orthodox principles of religion.

To correspond with sister Associations.

To invite any Baptist in the ministry to a seat in the Asso-

ciation, who may be present at the time of their sitting.

To adjourn the Association to any future time and place they may think proper and most convenient to the churches of the Union.

# Rules Of Decorum

1. The Association shall be opened and closed with prayer.

2. Only one person shall speak at a time, who shall arise from his seat and address the Moderator. The person thus speaking shall not be interrupted in his speech by any except the Moderator, till he is done speaking.

3. He shall strictly adhere to the subject and in no wise reflect upon the person who spoke before him as to make remarks on his steps, failings, or imperfections, but shall fairly state the matter as he can do so as to give his views or ideas.

4. No person shall abruptly break or absent himself from

the Association without liberty obtained from it.

5. No person shall rise and speak more than three times on any one subject without liberty from the Association.
6. No member shall have liberty of laughing during the

sitting of the same or whispering in the time of public speaking.

7. No member shall address another in any other appelation than that of brother.

8. The Moderator shall not interrupt any member in, or prchibit him from speaking until he gives his light on the subject, except he break the rules of this decorum.

9. The names of the several members of the Association shall be enrolled by the Clerk and called over as often as re-

quired by the Association.

10. The Moderator shall be entitled to the same privilege of speech as any of the other members, provided the chair be filled. He shall not vote unless the Association be equally diwided.

## REPORT ON RELIGIOUS LITERATURE

Many adults believe they can lead clean moral lives and at the same time fill their minds with the "trash" found

One glance at the news stands is enough to convince any rational minded person that America is reading the wrong kind of literature. What we read has a very definite influence on our daily lives. We might ask ourselves — "What kind of literature do I read, and what kind of reading material do I place in the hands of my children?" Do we have magazines in our homes that we would not want our pastor to see? If Jesus should look over the list of your reading material, would you be ashamed?

The winning of people to Christ and the training and development of our people must be carried on primarily through preaching, teaching and the use of good religious literature. We must place in the hands of the people religious literature in the form of tracts, magazines, and books. The Bible, of course,

cccupies the chief place in our list of literature.

The immence volume of literature produced by Southern Taptist covers the fields of Bible study, Sunday School and Training Union work, W. M. U., Brotherhood, Home and Toreign Missions, etc. We must encourage our people to read and study the various types of literature which help us to understand and teach the Bible and which offer inspiration and guitance in Christian living and service. Unique in this list is our own State Baptist paper because it seeks to promote and support all phases of our Baptist work, at home and abroad. And while they looked steadfastly toward heaven as he went up, behold two men stood by them in white apparel; which also said, ye men of Galilee, why stand ye gazing up into heaven." (Acts 1:7-11).

These are just two of many passages from the Holy Bible which emphasises the purpose of the church as well as that of the individual in the world. At no other time in modern history has a greater need been felt for missions at home and missions abroad. Men in all professions and all walks of life are telling us daily that the only hope for man is the gospel of Jesus Christ. There is no other agency in the world whereby this great Light may be spread except the church.

With the condition of the world as it is today and the weighty task as it lies before us we cannot hope to successfully accomplish all the work individually, by churches or even by our associational organizations, but by banding together as "one strong man," working together and praying for Divine guidance we can win the world.

The churches of Three Forks Association have responded in a magnificant way during the past year in contributing to the cooperative program and the various phases of the mission work in our denomination, but in reporting on this subject we feel there is yet a greater vision for us to behold. The aim of our work is the salvation of souls, and may we continue and work harder for the winning of the unsaved in our association and throughout the world. May we also work and pray that God will call more of our young people to full time Christian service and the foreign mission fields.

### REPORT OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

Education is defined as the acquisition of knowledge, skill or the development of character. As good citizens we support our state schools, colleges and other governmental teaching agencies as a means of getting an education. As good Baptists however we are not satisfied with the mere education which cur children and adults get from state and governmental institutions and training agencies, we believe we should have Christian Education, such as is offered by our Sunday Schools, Baptist Training Unions, Brotherhood and the Christian Schools and Colleges

Our Sunday Schools have long been considered as our most universally accepted type of formal Christian Training. Since our Sunday Schools administer to all ages from the babies to those too old to leave their homes, and since in many instances the only Christian training received is received through the Sunday Schools, it is considered that too great emphasis cannot be placed on this agency of our churches toward the building of a stronger and ever increasing influence of each

Sunday School of our Association.

The Baptist Training Union in each church offers further apportunity for Christian training, knowledge and practice of the fundamentals of the Bible and the workings of the Church. Every pastor and every church in the association would do well to consider the advantages offered in a good training union in the church.

The Baptist Brotherhood is an organization of the men of our church, and while it has not been active as long as some of our other training agencies, it has already made great progress toward many worthwhile projects for further advancements in Christian Training and better fellowship between the men of our churches and between the men with other churches. One example of its forward outlook is the definite steps in cooperation with the Womans Missionary Union toward spensoring and supporting a religious camp for our young people. Through the Brotherhood organization worthy young people have been helped toward their college education that perhaps could not have gone to school otherwise. More Brotherhoods should be organized in our association and those already organized should exert an even greater influence.

Our Baptist Schools and Colleges in North Carolina are

unsurpassed in quality of training, high standards and Christian ideals for the training of our young people. The school for nurses of our Baptist hospital, five Junior Colleges, Chowan, Wingate, Gardner-Webb, Campbell and Mars Hill, and our two Senior Colleges, Meredith and Wake Forest are all outstanding in their field and deserve the most careful and prayerful consideration. Unless there is some definite reason otherwise our Baptist young people going to college should be encouraged to attend one of our fine Baptist schools or colleges.

The Baptist Council on Christian Education of our Bap-

tist State Convention is seeking to make a closer tie between the schools and colleges themselves as well as with the in-cividuals and churches throughout North Carolina. Without the counsel, advise and support of Baptist throughout North Carolina such as those of the Three Forks Association this group cannot hope to serve you in the most effective manner.

Our Baptist home for the aging both needs and deserves our support as it ministers to the aging in the name of Jesus.

### REPORT ON NORTH CAROLINA BAPTIST HOME FOR THE

### AGING, RESTHAVEN, Winston-Salem, N. C.

Operation of Resthaven was begun March 16, 1951, Soon after the opening, it was filled to capacity, twenty residents. When the news spread of the beginning, applications began to accumulate rapidly. To date, there have been close to 500 inquiries. Had there been rooms available, and all applicants could have made financial arrangement, our home would have had 200 residents instead of only twenty at present.

There is encouraging prospect of getting the top floor of the present building completed, which will provide space for fifteen additional residents. The cost of this enlargement project has been underwritten by a business man of Winston-Salem, who is not a Baptist. This same friend has already donated a television set, and has concreted the basement of

Our residents range in age from 64 to 92 years, and come from widely scattered sections of our State — Franklin to Elizabeth City. All rejoice in the opportunity to be in the home Here are some of their statements:

"I like this good Christian Home and all the family. I would not exchange it for any other in all the world." — Mrs. J. L. Smith, coming from Franklin.

"This 'more than we expected' about this home makes us all hope and pray that more men and women may come to enjoy its many blessings." — Miss Ella Moffett, coming from Southern Pines.

"I never thought I would be so happy in my last years of

life." — John Holt, age 92, coming from Wilson Mills.

In spite of the fact that Resthaven did not receive financial assistance last year from the Baptist State Convention (except a loan which was repaid), it was operated clear of a deficit. How did this happen? By the Lord laying our needs upon the hearts of friends and causing them to respond. Of course, the home was compelled to charge the cost of keep from the residents who came on the monthly-pay plan. The income from this source, together with that coming from residents giving property or cash for their maintenance, plus donations by churches and auxiliary organizations and friends, enabled the home to pay its way and to accumulate assets in excess of \$100,000.00.

Beginning the year 1952, with the new Nine Year Program, our home receives three-fourths of 1 per cent of the funds to be divided. From this source has come less than \$500.00 per month since January of this year. The home is estimated to receive a total of approximately \$500,000.00 in nine years. It is apparent, therefore, that slow provision for enlarged facilities will be made to accommodate the hundreds of aging people who want to come to our home, unless funds come from other sources than our denominational program as it now

operates.

Our home presents a great challenge to North Carolina Baptists to provide adequate facilities. There are probably 100,000 people in our state past 65 years of age, and a large number of these are of Baptist faith. We must make provision as time and finances permit for these aging Baptists. Since Baptists of our state now number more than 700,000 in membership, we are well able to make such provision. If every Baptist would give an average of \$1.00 to our home in the year, we could raise \$700,000.00 and not one person would suffer hardship. As soon as a practical and adequate plan of support can be agreed upon, it is reasonable to expect that our Baptist home will be worthly supported.

Many suggestions have been made as to the best plan of supporting our home. Among them are: (1) Fifth Sunday of-ferings through the Sunday schools, as the Virginia Baptist home plan; (2) Special day offering, as the Mother's Day plan for our Baptist hospital; and (3) Putting the home in the local church budget, and appealing to the churches that have no budget for at least one special offering a year.

Either of these plans, supplemented by such special gifts as may come from individuals and corporations, and provisions made in wills, would enable the home to make reasonable progress, and thus enlarge our facilities on the pay-as-you-go plan.

We are closing our report with a statement made by a prominent furniture manufacturer, Mr. B. C. Philpott, of Lexington, N. C.

"I consider this one of the most important forward steps the Baptists of North Carolina have taken in a long time, because it is indeed a great move and one that has been neglected all too long.

Mrs. Philpott and I want to have a part in this fine undertaking, and herewith you will find my check for one thousand (\$1,000.00) dollars, which we desire used as a memorial to our son, B. C. Philpott, Jr.

May the Lord continue to bless you in such a noble work."



### Constitution

1. The Association shall be composed of members chosen by the different churches in our Union and duly sent to represent them in the Association, who, on producing letters from their respective church certifying their appointment, shall be entitled to their seats. Each church shall be entitled to three delegates,

the ministers being ex-officio.

2. In the letters from the different churches is to be expressed their numbers in full fellowship, those baptized, received by letter, dismissed by letter, excommunicated and dead since

last Association.

3. The members thus chosen and convened shall have no power to lord it over God's heritage, nor shall they have any special power over the churches. They shall not infringe upon any internal right of any church in this Union.

4. The Association shall have a Moderator, Vice-Moderator,

and clerk who shall be chosen annually by the suffrage of the

members present.

5. New churches or any regular church of Christ being locally dismissed by letter by any sister Association upon application and delegates, shall be admitted to our Union.

6. Every church in the Association shall be entitled to rep-

resentation in the Association.

7. Every query presented by any member of the Association shall be once read and before it is debated the Moderator shall put it to a vote, and if there is a majority for it being de-bated, it shall be taken into consideration and be debated, but if there be a majority against it, it shall be withdrawn.

8. Every motion made and seconded shall come under the consideration of the Association except it be withdrawn by the

member who made it.

9. The Association shall endeavor to furnish the churches with the minutes of their proceedings. The best method of accomplishing this purpose shall be at the direction of the future

Associations.

10. We think it is absolutely necessary that we shall have an Associational fund for defraying the expenses of the same. For the raising and supporting of which we think it to be the duty of each church in the Union to contribute annually such sums as they may think proper and send it by their delegates to the Association. The money thus raised shall be deposited in the hands of the Treasurer, appointed by the Association, who shall be accountable for the same. He shall pay the money out from time to time as the Association may direct.

11. There shall be an Association book kept wherein the proceedings of the Association shall be regularly recorded by the secretary appointed by the Association, who shall receive a compensation yearly for this service.

12. The minutes of this Association shall be read and corrected, if need be, and signed by the Moderator and the Clerk

before the Association rises.

13. Amendments to the plans or form of government may be made at any time by a majority of the Association when they deem it necessary, by giving the churches twelve months prior notice.

14. The Association shall have power:

To provide for the general union of the churches.

To endeavor to preserve a chain of union among the churches.

To give the churches the necessary advice in matters of difficulty.

To inquire into the cause why the churches fail to rep-

resent themselves at any time in the Association.

To appropriate the money contributed by the churches for an Associational fund to any purpose they may think proper.

To have power to withdraw from any church in their Union who shall violate the rules of this Association or deviate from the orthodox principles of religion.
To correspond with sister Associations.

To invite any Baptist in the ministry to a seat in the Association, who may be present at the time of their sitting.

To adjourn the Association to any future time and place they may think proper and most convenient to the churches of the Union.

### Rules Of Decorum

1. The Association shall be opened and closed with prayer. 2. Only one person shall speak at a time, who shall arise from his seat and address the Moderator. The person thus speaking shall not be interrupted in his speech by any except the Moderator, till he is done speaking.

3. He shall strictly adhere to the subject and in no wise re-

flect upon the person who spoke before him as to make remarks on his steps, failings, or imperfections, but shall fairly state the matter as he can do so as to give his views or ideas.

4. No person shall abruptly break or absent himself from the Association without liberty obtained from it.

5. No person shall rise and speak more than three times on any one subject without liberty from the Association.

6. No member shall have liberty of laughing during the sitting of the same or whispering in the time of public speaking.

7. No member shall address another in any other appela-

tion than that of brother.

8. The Moderator shall not interrupt any member in, or prohibit him from speaking until he gives his light on the subject, except he break the rules of this decorum.

9. The names of the several members of the Association

shall be enrolled by the Clerk and called over as often as re-

quired by the Association.

10. The Moderator shall be entitled to the same privilege of speech as any of the other members, provided the chair be filled. He shall not vote unless the Association be equally divided.

### PROCEEDINGS OF THE ONE HUNDRED THIRTEENTH ANNUAL SESSION THREE FORKS BAPTIST ASSOCIATION OF N. C. HELD WITH

SOUTH FORK AND GREEN VALLEY BAPTIST CHURCHES TUESDAY AND WEDNESDAY, AUGUST 25 and 26, 1953

### FIRST DAY

1. The One Hundred Thirteenth Annual Session of the Three Forks Baptist Association of North Carolina convened with South Fork Baptist Church, Todd, N. C. at 9:10 a.m. Tuesday, August 25, 1953.

2. In the absence of the song leader, E. R. Mikeal led the song service using "How Firm A Foundation" and Gene Sher-

wood conducted the devotional.

3. The Moderator, R. C. Eggers, called the One Hundred Thirteenth Session to order for the transaction of business.

4. The Moderator's address was delivered on the subject,

"When Jesus Comes."

5. Wade E. Brown, Chairman of the Executive Committee, presented the suggested program for the Session. The report

was duly passed.

6. The Moderator called for the report on Public Morals. The report was not ready and a motion prevailed to discuss the subject. R. M. Haus, Allied Church League of North Carolina, spoke, calling our attention to the two outstanding matters of public morals at this time — Legalized Liquor Stores and Legalized Gambling — pointing out that the only way to solve them is by the right kind of teaching in the HOME and CHURCH.

7. The report of the Executive Committee was made by its

Chairman, Wade E. Brown, as follows:

a. That the Spring Session be discussed by the present Annual Session and a decision arrived at as to whether or not to discontinue.

b. That the Associational Mission program be continued

and enlarged.

c. That the Association elect a Camp Director for the camp which is now under construction.

By a motion duly made and unanimously passed, Mrs. Nora

M. Wilson was elected Camp Director for Camp Joy.

After considerable discussion it was voted to continue the Spring Session of the Association and that the Committee on Time, Place and Preacher receive invitations for the Spring Session and decide where it will be held.

8. A. C. Moody affered the report on Religious Literature. It was discussed by C. W. Bazemore, Assistant Editor Biblical Recorder and J. C. Canipe, Secretary for Evangelism for N. C.

Baptists and was adopted.

### REPORT ON RELIGIOUS LITERATURE

Christian literature is a tremendous force in the lives of our people today. In our own country virtually all persons read, and what they read is largely what they believe. Glorious opportunities are ours to crusade for Christian literature. If we fail to meet such opportunities, our Baptist people and Baptist work will suffer untold harm from little vision and lack of knowledge.

In days of old, the prophet Hosea said, "My people perish for lack of knowledge." Today the devil is exploiting as never before, the power of the printed word. The mails, the newsstands, and too many homes, are loaded with the ugly tide of bad books, periodicals, magazines cleverly designed to delude people, to promote cheap diversions, to glorify worldliness, to encourage Sabbath-breaking and liquor sales with all its attendant evils, and to undermine Christianity in general.

To meet this evil flood of bad literature we have a marvelous array of well printed, sound Baptist periodicals, Sunday

School and other Christian publications for every age, spiritual interest and need. Perhaps no denomination in America has so fine a selection of Christian literature as Southern Baptists have today. The aim of it all is to inform, enlist, indoctrinate, unify and inspire our people for faithful service in our Lord's name. Our Christian literature must be magnified and promoted in all the churches if God's work is to go forward.

In our own state, the BIBLICAL RECORDER is the one publication covering the entire field of our co-operative efforts as Baptists. Without our State Baptist paper a successful promotion of all our Baptist work would be well-nigh impossible. For 120 years the RECORDER has been going into Baptist homes with its weekly message. Wise pastors, associational missionaries, Sunday School superintendents and many other leaders have over the years promoted its circulation, and they have rejoiced at the many visible fruits of good reading. People do more when they know more. As they read, they lead. As they are informed, they are inspired. In 1830 North Carolina Baptists were organized with the stated purpose of "promoting missions, education, social service, and the distribution of sound religious literature.

9. The Clerk, Clyde R. Greene, called the roll of the churches; five failed to answer. The clerk reported that he had received letters from all the churches except Shulls Mills. (This report was received later.)

10. The Moderator recognized the twenty-eight ministers present including the following new pastors in our Association:

M. D. Hart — South Fork. Gene Sherwood — Vanderpool. Homer Greene — Three Forks.

B. F. Porch — Poplar Grove

12. The Moderator extended an invitation for any church seeking membership in our Association and a new church just organized at Vilas, N. C. RFD-Vanderpool-responded with a church letter and messengers. A committee composed of E. O. Gore, Ronda Earp and Ira Hodges, was appointed to examine

this church and report to the Association later.

13. The Moderator announced that the time had arrived for the Annual Sermon and after a song led by C. J. Farthing

he presented Victor Trivett, the appointee to preach.

Bro. Trivett read from the 16th chapter of Matthew and announced his subject, "Who Is Christ?" He answered this question by pointing out very vividly that CHRIST IS Savior, King, God, The Son of Man, The Bread of Life, The Light of the World, Creator of All Things, The Forgiver of Sin, Our Daily Strength and above all, Love.

Bro. Trivett closed his sermon with a plea for greater con-

sercration and dedication on the part of all Christians.

19. Woodrow Greene offered the report on Mission. After a motion to adopt, the report was discussed by L. H. Hollingsworth who announced the resignation of Mrs. Blanche Perry as Associational Missionary. The Association stood as an expression of our appreciation of her very vaulable work during the past years. The discussion of the report was continued by Dr. M. A. Huggins, Secretary of the Baptist State Convention. The report was adopted.

### MISSIONS REPORT

The members of Three Forks BAPTIST ASSOCIATION have made definite strides forward in some phases of the field of missions. Perhaps in some other phases of missionary endeavor we have not made the progress that we should be satisfied with, and when we Baptist can and will, interpert the scriptures correctly we will waste not another day in taking our place in the much needed mission program here in our association as well as all over our south land and throughout the world.

The 44 churches in the Three Forks Association present this record at this time in comparison with 1948, 1950 and 1952.

In 1948, approximately 14 churches of the 44 churches in this Association contributed to the Baptist Cooperative Program, State, Home and Foreign Mission. Only 7 churches contributed to Association Missions.

In 1950, approximately 13 churches of the 44 churches in the Association contributed to the Baptist Cooperative, State,

Home, Foreign and only 4 to Association Missions.

In 1952, approximately 18 churches of the 44 churches in the Association contributed to the Paptist Cooperative Program State, Home, Foreign and 17 to Association Missions. Of these churches who contributed to this phase of missions we find the amount of contributions in 1948: \$5,935,90., in

Of these churches who contributed to this phase of missions we find the amount of contributions in 1948: \$5,935,90., in 1950: \$6,725,23., and in 1952: \$9,090,98. This was for cooprative, Home, State, and Foreign Missions. The complete contributions to all missions amount to: 1948: \$12,618,03., in 1950: \$13,252,57., and in 1952: \$19,510.32.

So we see in 1952 we did make notable progress in contributions to missions. Also we made very noticeable progress in number of churches participating in our Baptist Mission

Program.

Christ gave very plain instructions on this matter of missions. So plain that we can't misinterpret the true meaning, and in chapter after chapter, in book after book of the New Testament we find specific instructions on preaching and teaching not only for ourselves, but to others from us. Can we afford to ignore these instructions? What a wonderful opportunity to do something for Christ.

REPORT ON CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

Christian Education empraces every type of Christian training from that received in the home, the local church with all of its program such as Sunday Schools, Training Unions, W. M. U., etc. on through our Seminaries, but since all these phases of our Baptist work will be considered in other reports, this report will deal primarily with our Christian Colleges in North Carolina. For information we should all be acquainted with our newest Seminary, the Southeastern Baptist Theological Seminary now operating on the campus of Wake Forest College. It is beginnig its third year of operation with an enrollment of 320. When Wake Forest College is moved to Winston-Salem the entire campus will be utalized by this great institution.

North Carolina Baptists have seven colleges, two senior:

Wake Forest and Meredith and five junior: Mars Hill, Gardner-Webb, Campbell, Wingate and Chowan. As of October 15, 1952 the enrollment of these colleges were as follows: Wake Forest including the School of Medicine and Law, 1,714; Meredith, 600; Mars Hill, 787; Gardner-Webb, 401; Campbell, 440, including 54 high school students; Wingate, 255, including 63 high school students; and Chowan, 192, making a total of 4,389. This enrollment including Summer School exceeded 5,000 for the

year.

From a financial standpoint the most significant undertaking in 1953 is the effort to complete the raising of \$1,500,000 in the churches for the removal program of Wake Forest College to Winston-Salem. This was authorized by our Convention in 1946 and it is confidently hoped that this amount will be raised by the end of the year.

As Baptists of Three Forks Association, how much do we know of these fine institutions? For the welfare of our boys

and girls we should know more about our Baptist Schools. As parents and Pastors we should encourage more of our fine boys and girls to attend our own Baptist Supported Christian Schools.

### SUNDAY SCHOOL

The Sunday School is being recoginized more this year than ever before as the chief agency of the churches in evangelism, teaching and enlistment. The major emphasis for Baptist churches for 1953-54 is the effort to enroll a million more people in Sunday School in one year. Right of way has been granted for this, the greatest Sunday School enlargement program in the history of the world. As a result of this program, it is confidently expected that there will be substantial in-

creases in baptisms, offerings and Christian homes.
Our State Sunday School Secretary, L. L. Morgan, reports gains this year in enrolment, and it is expected that the number of Vacation Bible Schools will reach an all time high. In the 3,055 churches in the state, we now have more than 620,000 enrolled in Sunday School.

We are reporting in our association this year 45 Sunday Schools with an enrolment of 6,294. This represents a gain of

244 in membership.

We make the following recommendations: (1) That the Association approve the efforts of Baptist to enroll "A Million More in '54," and commend to the churches the practical plans for accomplishing this worthy objective. (2) That September 20-27 be observed as Preparation Week in the churches, or a week near this time if this date is not convenient. It is recommended that the new book, "The Pull Of The People," by Dr. J. N. Barnett, be taught in the churches. (3) That regular Sunday School meetings be held this year for the purpose of the multitudes for Bible study. (4) That the Association seek to do its full share in enrolling "A Million More In 54" by tryday Schools in the year October 1953-October 1954. (5) That the churches spend at least a part of the time during Preparation Week, in Prayer, seeking Gods leadership in this enlargement program.

### REPORT ON NORTH CAROLINA BAPTIST HOMES FOR THE AGING

The youngest member of our Baptist family of institutions, the North Carolina Baptist Homes, Inc., has had the best year since it began operating March 16, 1951.

Resthaven, with space for twenty residents, has been filled to capacity. The number of inquiries for rooms has in-

creased into the hundreds.

The home received its best financial support. The share received from the nine year program (1952) was \$14,062.80; our first special day offering, February 15, exceeded \$52,000; and from individuals, churches, and auxiliary organizations we have received \$12,380.33, as of August 1.

The response to the first special day offering for the home was most encouraging. More than half of our 3055 Baptist churches responded. About seventy-five per cent of the amount

came from the smaller churches.

Considering the short time our home has been operating (2 years), and the fact that this was the first opportunity to appeal to our churches for a special offering, all of us should be encouraged by the response. Our next special day offering,

February 21, 1954, should amount to \$100,000.

On June 18, this year, property was purchased for a Branch Home at Albemarle. This property, consisting of a vacated hospital building and a nurses' home building and nearly three acres of land, was purchased for \$25,000. It will cost an equal amount to renovate the property. Even so, it is well worth twice the amount invested. Thus, we can care for 60 residents—20 at Resthaven, Winston-Salem; and 40 at the Albemarle Home.

At the time of purchase, it was hoped that the branch home would be ready for operation by October 1, this year.

The general health of the residents has been exceptionally good, considering the range of their ages, 66 to 93. There has been only one death this year. The spirit and the general attitude of the residents have been most satisfactory.

There are many evidences of increasing interest in our homes. Pastors, conducting worship services, have brought delegations from their churches to share the inspiration of worship with our residents. Auxiliary and Sunday School groups have frequently visited us to conduct devotional services. Gifts of supplies and cash are often received from these various organizations.

Plans for the future enlargement are encouraging. With a general special day offering in February, 1954, and other special gifts from individuals and corporations, we should be ready to begin construction of our administration building, which would give us room for fifty additional residents, and making our total capacity 110 residents.

Since North Carolina Baptists now number more than 700,000 members, with thousands of our constituency now over 65 years of age, we should keep in mind the great number of our elderly brethren who need a home to provide security, comfort, congeniality, and a Christian ministry. Our North Carolina Baptists are able to meet the challenge to make adequate provision for the aging, and as "laborers together with God," we can meet it.

"Cast me not off in the time of old age; forsake me not when my strength faileth." — Psalms 71:9.

Our organizations now total 12 W. M. S. and 21 Young People's organizations. The reading and studying of books on prayer, stewardship and world missions has included almost every member. A special emphasis on stewardship was given in October, 1952 when Miss Janet Wilson and Mrs. John Wacaster, Field Representatives, led our women and young people in a week of study on stewardship.

Our W. M. U. annual assocational meeting held at Perkinsville church on April 23, brought to us the joy and inspiration of Executive Secretary, and the inspirational challenge from

Miss Frances Talley, Missionary to Japan.

Emphasis this year "Christ for the Whole Wide World" is a challenge to all. "Lift up your eyes, and look on the fields; for they are white already to harvest." (John 4:35b)

the new demands of the sick over the state and the great new medical college connected with it. May we continue our Moth-ers Day offering in ever increaing amounts.

Our old ministers relief dept, will continue to help those old retired servants of God, who have no other provisions for them. Our new plan will help more and will be a blessing to all our churches and preachers. We recommend our new plan to all our churches.





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

#### CONSTITUTION

- 1. The Association shall be composed of members chosen by the different churches in our Union and duly sent to represent them in the Association, who, on producing letters from their respective church certifying their appointment, shall be entitled to their seats. Each church shall be entitled to three delegates, the ministers being ex-officio.
- 2. In the letters from the different churches is to be expressed their numbers in full fellowship, those baptized, received by letter, dismissed

by letter, excommunicated and dead since last Association.

- 3. The members thus chosen and convened shall have no power to lord it over God's heritage, nor shall they have any special power over the churches. They shall not infringe upon any internal right of any church in this Union.
- 4. The Association shall have a Moderator, Vice-Moderator, and Clerk who shall be chosen annually by the suffrage of the members present.
- 5. New churches or any regular church of Christ being locally dismissed by letter by any sister Association upon application and delegates, shall be admitted to our Union.
- 6. Every church in the Association shall be entitled to representation in the Association.
- 7. Every query presented by any member of the Association shall be once read and before it is debated the Moderator shall put it to a vote, and if there is a majority for it being debated, it shall be taken into consideration and be debated, but if there be a majority against it, it shall be withdrawn.
- 8. Every motion made and seconded shall come under the consideration of the Association except it be withdrawn by the member who made it.
- 9. The Association shall endeavor to furnish the churches with the minutes of their precedings. The best method of accomplishing this purpose shall be at the direction of the future Associations.
- 10. We think it is absolutely necessary that we shall have an Associational fund for defraying the expenses of the same. For the raising and supporting of which we think it to be the duty of each church in the Union to contribute annually such sums as they may think proper and send it by their delegates to the Association. The money thus raised shall be deposited in the hands of the Treasurer, appointed by the Association, who shall be accountable for the same. He shall pay the money out from time to time as the Association may direct.
- 11. There shall be an Association book kept wherein the proceedings of the Association shall be regularly recorded by the secretary appointed by the Association, who shall receive a compensation yearly for this service.
- 12. The minutes of this Association shall be read and corrected, if need be, and signed by the Moderator and Clerk before the Association rises.
- 13. Amendments to the plans or form of government may be made at any time by a majority of the Association when they deem it necessary, by giving the churches twelve months prior notice.
  - 14. The Association shall have power:

To provide for the general union of the churches.

To endeavor to preserve a chain of union among the churches.

To give the churches the necessary advice in matters of difficulty.

To inquire into the cause why the churches fail to represent themselves at any time in the Association.

To appropriate the money contributed by the churches for an Associational fund to any purpose they may think proper.

To have power to withdraw from any church in their Union who shall violate the rules of this Association or deviate from the orthodox principles of religion.

To correspond with sister Associations.

To invite any Baptist in the ministry to a seat in the Association, who may be present at the time of their sitting.

To adjourn the Association to any future time and place they may think proper and most convenient to the churches of the Union.

#### RULES OF DECORUM

- 1. The Association shall be opened and closed with prayer.
- 2. Only one person shall speak at a time, who shall arise from his seat and address the Moderator. The person thus speaking shall not be interrupted in his speech by any except the Moderator, till he is done speaking.
- 3. He shall strictly adhere to the subject and in no wise reflect upon the person who spoke before him as to make remarks on his steps, failings, or imperfections, but shall fairly state the matter as he can do so as to give his views or ideas.
- 4. No person shall abruptly break or absent himself from the Association without liberty obtained from it.
- 5. No person shall rise and speak more than three times on any one subject without liberty from the Association.
- 6. No member shall have liberty of laughing during the sitting of the same or whispering in the time of public speaking.
- 7. No member shall address another in any other appelation than that of brother.
- 8. The Moderator shall not interrupt any member in, or prohibit him from speaking until he gives his light on the subject, except he break the rules of this decorum.
- 9. The names of the several members of the Association shall be enrolled by the Clerk and called over as often as required by the Association.
- 10. The Moderator shall be entitled to the same privilege of speech as any of the other members, provided the chair be filled. He shall not vote unless the Association be equally divided.

Basing his remarks on the theme "Toward Spiritual Growth" he read Revelation 11:1 which calls for the measuring of the temple, the altar and the people. Calling attention to the marvelous blessings which have come to Three Forks Association, Mr. Hollingsworth challenged us to measure ourselves by the purpose of God, the needs of the people to whom we minister, and the opportunities which are ours. He led us to face the question whether we are big enough for the task to which God has called us and challenged us to measure up in faith, vision, and Christian stewardship.

After prayer by Smith Hagaman, the Moderator ap-

pointed the following committees:

Nominations—James Sherwood, C. P. Calloway, Clyde R. Greene.

Finance-Grady Minton, Mrs. Gene Sherwood.

Time, Place and Preacher—Mrs. Rex West, Basil Tester,

Joe L. Coffey, Sr.

C. O. Vance spoke briefly in the interest of a Christian Life Revival in the Association November 1-5 and said that J. C. Pipes would come to lead in it. The motion was made that the Association commit itself to this effort, that the Missions Committee work with Mr. Pipes in planning it, and all churches be urged to cooperate. This motion carried.

C. J. Farthing read the report of the Executive Committee

and each point was discussed and approved separately.

#### REPORT OF EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

The Executive Committee held three meetings this past year: the first a joint meeting with the Finance and Missions Committees November 1; the Executive Committee alone February 26 and July 11.

Much of the discussions centered around Associational Missionary work with suggestions and plans as to how the work might be projected in the future. The last meeting was devoted almost entirely with specific plans for the Fall Session.

Clyde R. Greene was authorized by the Executive Committee to have all copies of the minutes of the Association since 1939 bound into

one volume and these, together with those previously bound, be put into a rented vault in the Northwestern Bank.

The Executive Committee offers the following specific recommendations to the Association:

- 1. That an Executive Committee composed of nine members, plus the Moderator, Vice-Moderator and Clerk, be elected by the Association and its power continued to act between sessions of the Association; that all pastors be invited to meet with and function in an advisory capacity and when they do it shall be known as the Executive and Promotion Committee.
- 2. That the Association instruct the Executive Committee to have four stated meetings each year and called meetings when necessary.
- 3. That the Association sponsor one major effort this next year to improve the effectiveness of its work. That the Executive Committee arrange and promote such a week's effort and for its guidance it is suggested that possibilities include a Sunday School Enlargement Campaign, a Church Enlargement Campaign and a Better Bible Teaching Clinic and Dr. Henry Walden and L. L. Morgan be consulted for assistance.
- 4. That the Executive Committee superintend the printing of the minutes with a view toward getting them into the churches within a few weeks after the Association meets.
- 5. That the recommendation in regard to the Associational Missions program made in 1953 be continued.

The Associational Missions report was read by Rex West and after motion to adopt was strongly discussed, with emphasis on need and cost, by E. J. Farthing, Clyde R. Greene, C. J. Farthing, Victor Trivette, Gene Sherwood, L. H. Hollingsworth, and Grady Minton. A standing vote was called for and the report was adopted.

#### REPORT OF ASSOCIATIONAL MISSIONS COMMITTEE

Your committee on Associational Missions has met numerous times throughout the year discussing plans and problems of the associational missions work which includes the following:

Our Moderator has spoken in twenty three churches explaining the work and necessity of associational missions and the missions committee chairman has spoken in two churches making a total of twenty five churches where the plan and need of associational missions has been presented to our churches.

On January 25, 1954 the Baptist State Convention advised that they would assist us in the amount of \$1440.00 a year or \$120.00 a month as a supplemental amount for our associational missions work. This was

granted to the Association at the request of your committee and will be given as part of the budget for associational missions if a Missionary is obtained in 1954.

Letters were sent to all the churches in our Association relative to the actual monetary support that they would each contribute to associational missions. Our churches were very cooperative in answering the letters of inquiry. Sixteen churches pledged to support the associational missions work in the approximate amount of \$150.00 each month.

Our Finance Committee, after careful study and investigation, feels that we must ask from our churches enough to provide a budget of \$5,500.00 to \$6,000.00 per year to obtain a man who would make a satisfactory effort in associational missions work. This amount they feel would be commensurate with the services rendered to our churches and the work of the Kingdom of Christ under our present day of high prices. This amount would include salary, rent, office and car expenses.

We trust, hope and pray that more of our churches will cooperate in this much needed work so that your Missions Committee, Executive Committee and Finance Committee may be able to complete the task of securing an Associational Missionary, as authorized by the Association in session at South Fork Baptist Church, Tuesday, August 25, 1953 and recorded on pages 16 and 17 of the minutes of the Three Forks Baptist Association's One Hundred Thirteenth Annual Session.

Rex West led the singing of "I Gave My Life For Thee" and E. O. Gore came for the preaching period. He read Luke 4:18-19 and John 10:16 and directed our thoughts toward spiritual growth through preaching of the Word. Taking "The World Vision of Jesus" as his subject he said that Jesus saw a world lost in sin, a world He loved, and He left a world program as an indication of His world vision.

"Send the Light" was sung and Guy Cain led the closing prayer and asked the blessing on the lunch which followed.

#### AFTERNOON SESSION

The afternoon session was opened with singing "Down At the Cross" and "Come Thou Fount," Rex West leading.

Homer Greene led the devotions reading Ezekiel 28:14 and Psalm 118:22 and said that we must have a faith anchored in God, that fear and complacency are our greatest enemies, and a return to Christ is necessary if our nation survives. He closed his remarks with prayer.

R. C. Eggers read the report on Benevolent Activity and after motion to adopt, Mr. Hollingsworth recognized W. C. Reed, superintendent of the Baptist Orphanage, who spoke to the report. Mr. Reed introduced Zeb A. Caudle, superintendent of Baptist Home for the Aging, Albemarle, who spoke for both the Baptist Home there and at Winston-Salem and mentioned plans for having one central home in Winston-Salem in the future. Mr. Reed then introduced W. K. McGhee who spoke for the Baptist Hospital. He told of a chapel being built for the hospital by a business firm in Winston-Salem, which would be known as the Davis Memorial Chapel. Mr. Reed then told about the new church being built at Kennedy Home through special gifts. After this discussion the report was adopted.

#### REPORT ON BENEVOLENCES

Under the above heading we have four great Christian Institutions to consider:

- 1. First, the Orphanage with all its great work. We think the Orphanage should be supported by every church in this Association, faithfully every week, both by prayer, and canned fruits, and also our weekly offerings.
- 2. The Baptist Hospital in its ministry of healing the sick should likewise be supported by our prayers and offerings. Many of us have been there and know the blessings we received. Jesus healed the sick and this is what this great institution is doing, surely God smiles upon the Baptist Hospital.
- 3. The Home for the Aging. This institution is young yet, and should have started fifty years ago, and when the time comes to make our offerings, do as the Bible says, open our hands wide unto them, and continue to make these old folks happy.
- 4. The old Ministers Relief. We wish that our young ministers could see into the future like they will see by and by through their tears and from the grave's mound, then surely they would join the old Minister's Retirement Plan, and lead the churches to support it.

C. O. Vance read the Report on Missions in the State, Homeland and Foreign Lands and moved its adoption. Mr. Hollingsworth then recognized M. A. Huggins, Secretary of North Carolina Baptist Convention, who challenged the churches to have a good financial plan and to give through the Cooperative Program. The report was adopted.

#### REPORT ON MISSIONS

"...for we are come as far as to you also in preaching the gospel of Christ: — having hope, when your faith is increased, that we shall be enlarged by you according to our rule abundantly, to preach the gospel in the regions beyond you ..." 2 Cor. 10:14-16.

Some time ago Dr. M. T. Rankin, capable and consecrated executive secretary of our Foreign Mission Board until his sudden death recently, challenged Southern Baptists to truly advance in their task of carrying the Gospel of Jesus Christ to the whole world by asking, "Do Baptists dare follow God?" As we have sought to follow God into all the world, we have learned that the world has no bounds whatsoever. It is gratifying in many respects to note the "spiritual growth" of Baptists through missions.

It must be assumed that people who have accepted Christ as Saviour and Lord will desire to have a share in the support of missions, education and beneficence. That is to say they will have the urge to support State, Home and Foreign Missions, colleges, seminaries, and the institutions for the support of orphans, the sick and the aging. This urge is felt by all genuine Christians, and having this urge, the question of the best way to do it has always been a very important one.

#### IN FORMER DAYS

Up until about 27 years ago the plan followed in most Baptist churches was to set a special day during the year for some particular object, and the people were asked to make an offering for the support of this object. It became clear to thoughtful people that this method was becoming outmoded and inefficient. As these people began to think more on the words found in the New Testament, "On the first day of the week let every one of you lay by him in store," some plan was sought whereby people could make an offering, not on just some special day in the year but on every Sunday. Thus the Cooperative Program was a result of this new understanding of the New Testament and of the clearer thinking on the part of Baptist people. The Cooperative Program, then, is simply the channel through which the offerings of each worshipper and each church flow into all the world.

#### CO-OPERATION IS THE KEY

No big things can occur apart from co-operation. "Co-operation" is a great word among Baptists. It is a word which is Biblical in principle and in spirit, as Paul reminded the Corinthians, "We are laborers together with God." Few individuals, or few churches can provide for the operation of a college, a seminary, an orphanage, a hospital, or even provide for the support of a state, home, or foreign missionary, but

through the cooperation of other individuals and churches, these great programs can be provided for. The Cooperative Program makes it possible for an individual or a church to have a share in everything Baptists are doing at home and abroad.

I, as an individual, make an offering, and when I do:

I worship God

I express my gratitude

I manifest my stewardship

I have a share in the support of all missions, education and beneficence.

In other words, I have a share in the support of:

- 1, 900 missionaries of the Foreign Mission Board.
- 2. About 1000 missionaries of the Home Mission Board.
- 3. About 100 missionaries working in North Carolina through State Missions.
  - 4. The purchase of lots for new churches.
- 5. All departments of the State Mission Program with its 18 activities.
- 6. Helping provide an education for some 6000 students in our 7 Baptist colleges and some 5000 students in our 6 seminaries.
- 7. Our Baptist Hospital at Winston-Salem and our Southern Baptist Hospital at New Orleans.
  - 8. North Carolina Baptist Homes for Aging.
- 9. The Orphanage with about 700 children. (This support to begin in 1955).

"Dare we follow God?" We have advanced, yet we face with searching uneasiness, our records here in the Three Forks Association. Confessing our failures to dare follow God, let us face the future with the resolvement to give more generously of our money, of our prayers, of our interest, of our sons and daughters that the "Kingdoms of this world may become the Kingdom of our Lord and His Christ."

The afternoon session was closed with prayer by C. O. Vance.

#### NIGHT SESSION

For the first time in many years a night session of the Association was held. 10 churches were represented when it met in Oak Grove church at 7:15 p.m. and was opened with Wm. Hodges leading the singing of "Must I Go and Empty Handed" and "Rescue the Perishing."

In the absence of Glenn Gentry, C. O. Vance read John 4:31-36, and made a few well-chosen remarks in regard to the

practice of evangelism in the life and teachings of Jesus, and

led in prayer.

Mrs. Nora Wilson, director of Camp Joy, read the report for the camp and after motion to adopt, discussed it. The report was adopted.

#### REPORT OF CAMP JOY

Dreams — Yes, dreams coming true in the development of Camp Joy, for such has been in the hearts and minds of many for several years. In 1952 a four acre semi-woodland plot was donated for associational camp grounds, located in upper Cove Creek valley, one mile off Highway 421, 12 miles northwest of Boone. In the summer of 1953 construction work was begun and in August the dining room-kitchen building was completed and equipped, and grounds graded. During May 1954, the bunk building was completed.

Equipment amounting to \$388.40, was donated to the camp. 48 cots and 50 mattresses were purchased at a cost of \$513.50. Individuals and groups from 15 churches gave on these. An amount \$90.14 is still due on the mattresses. 52 chairs, costing \$88.48, were bought by individuals and camp fund. Kitchen and dining room equipment and other necessary equipment, amounting to \$231.22, has been purchased during the last three years from the Associational Young People's Camp Fund. Donations made possible a piano.

The camp is to be used for religious purposes: summer camps for our Baptist young people; any and all Baptist church group gatherings; picnics, fellowship meetings, and associational meetings. We want all of you to use the camp, believing that you will experience joy in your hearts by so doing.

From August 1953 through June 1954, the camp was used on 17 different occasions: 1 B. S. U. pre-school retreat; 2 associational-wide gatherings; 3 associational one-day camps for junior and intermediate boys and girls during September and October 1953, with attendance of 68 from 12 churches; 3 associational two-day camps for junior and intermediate boys and girls in June 1954, with 73 attending from 11 churches; and 8 other church group gatherings. These gatherings from Camp Joy have had in attendance people from 18 churches of Three Forks Association and from 28 other places. The mission offering for the camps was \$34.26. Previous mission offerings from young people's camps and rallies, 1947-1952, were \$118.68, making a total of \$152.94.

The Lord has blessed in the work of Camp Joy in many ways and we praise Him for these blessings. During the associational camps our hearts were filled with joy as 12 of the boys and girls trusted Jesus as their Saviour and many others rededicated their lives. The Christian fellowship experienced in all of the gatherings has been wonderful. We feel that Camp Joy has had and will continue to have its part in the

spiritual growth of people.

We are grateful for all who have had a part in Camp Joy and may God bless you as you continue to support the camp through your prayers and efforts.

Mr. Hollingsworth recognized Mrs. Blanche Perry, Superintendent of Associational W. M. U. who presented Miss Elizabeth Campbell, Associational Missionary of Caldwell, who spoke on "Spiritual Growth Through W. M. U." She told how Woman's Missionary Union enlarges the vision of women through prayer, mission study, Bible study, young people's organizations, community missions, stewardship, and encouragement to service.

After singing "Standing On the Promises" C. O. Vance asked that a report on Evangelism be written after the message by J. C. Canipe which would include suggestions from the committee and Mr. Canipe, and this report be included in

the minutes. This was granted.

J. C. Canipe, State Secretary of Evangelism, was recognized who spoke on plans for "Every Church Revived In '55." He said that Communism, Roman Catholicism and Secularism were out to dominate the world and had no scruples as to how it was done. He stirred the hearts of those present as he spoke of true evangelistic Christianity.

"At the Cross" was sung and J. C. Canipe led the closing

prayer.

A goodly number of persons was present for this, one of the best sessions of the Association. They were challenged, as they had not been before, to active work for the Lord and left expressing appreciation for this special session of the Association.

#### REPORT ON EVANGELISM

Evangelism, we believe, means the winning of the lost to Christ, the enlistment of the life for Him, and the development of all a person is and has for God's glory and for the advancement of His Kingdom work here in this world. Evangelism has made us and Evangelism will sustain us. If we lose our evangelistic fervor, we cease to be the kind of a Christian or Church God intended us to be.

We are glad to report that our churches baptized 313 people last year; yet, we regret to report that 10 of our churches did not report any baptisms.

Believing next year to be one of the greatest in Evangelism for our denomination yet, we offer the following suggestions:

1. That we adopt the slogan "Every Church Revived ln '55," and that we work and pray that this may be true.

- 2. That each church be urged to cooperate in the great Southwide Simultaneous Crusade of Evangelism April 10-24, 1955.
- 3. That a chairman of Evangelism be elected and a complete organization be set up in the association to work with him.
- 4. That we would seek to follow the steps of preparation for this great Crusade suggested to us by our State Secretaries of Evangelism. Among these are the following:
- (1) Every pastor teach the book "One To Eight" to his Sunday School workers during Victory Week, September 19-26, 1954.
- (2) That each Sunday School sponsor the teaching of "Studies In Hebrews" January 3-7, 1955, accompanied by thirty minutes of prayer each evening.
- (3) All pastors and church leaders be urged to attend the Statewide Conference on Evangelism at Greensboro, N. C., February 7-9, 1955.
- (4) The taking of a religious census in all churches March 8, 1955, and that the Training Union sponsor church-wide Study Courses in Soul Winning, March 13-18, 1955.
- (5) That a special week of prayer be observed in every church April 4-9, 1955.
- (6) Two full weeks of preaching, visiting, and working be conducted in every church April 10-24, 1955.

"There is a tide in the affairs of men which, if taken at the flood, leads to victory." Surely there is a tide rising, and if we shall grasp it with courage and faith, we shall be led to victory for Christ Jesus.

#### SECOND DAY

At 9:00 a.m. Wednesday morning, soft organ music by Mrs. Graydon Eggers marked the beginning of the session of the second day at Boone Baptist Church.

Pex West led the congregation in singing "What A Friend

We Have In Jesus" and "My Jesus I Love Thee."

M. D. Hart led the devotions, reading Genesis 22:1-3, he showed how out of faith and obedience would come spiritual growth, and led in prayer.

The Moderator called the morning session of the second day of Three Forks Association to order and recognized new pastors: K. Maurice Cooper, Willowdale; Grady Minton, Clark's Creek; Frank Walker, Gap Creek; and visitors: Lester D. Cravton, French Broad Association; M. H. Kendall, Mars Hill; Dr. Roger Crook, Raleigh; Dr. Phil Elliot, Boiling Springs; Dr. L. L. Carpenter, Raleigh; R. M. Hauss, Shelby; Horace Easom, Shelby.

Mr. Hollingsworth referred to a letter which he had received from Claude Gaddy expressing regret that he could not be present for the meeting.

The first report of the morning, "Christian Education," was read by C. Ray Lawrence and after motion to adopt, Mr. Hollingsworth recognized M. H. Kendall who brought greetings from Mars Hill, Dr. Roger Crook who brought greetings from Meredith, and then introduced Dr. Phil Elliot, president of Gardner Webb Junior College, who spoke on Christian Education. Mr. Elliot stated that where there were no Baptist colleges to train leadership there was a great lack in enrollment in seminaries for further training and quoted figures from many institutions to prove his statements. He strongly urged that we (1) Keep our Baptist schools; (2) Support them, and (3) Use them.

#### REPORT ON CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

Christian Education is a basic concert for the promotion and perpetuation of the Christian Faith. Proverbs 22:6 lies the promise upon which a great challenge is to be met. "Train up a child in the way he should go; and when he is old, he will not depart from it." The home should always be the beginning place of the Christian life. In addition to home training the church offers opportunity for spiritual growth and Christian service. The Sunday School, Training Union and W. M. U. are the medium through which we receive training and spiritual development. These phases of our Baptist work will be given in other reports. This report concerns our Baptist colleges in North Carolina.

North Carolina Baptists possess one of the finest systems of Christian Education in America. We have seven colleges whose geographic locations are within a short distance for anyone who enjoys wholesome atmosphere and high academic rating. They are as follows: Wake Forest, Wake Forest and Winston-Salem; (Senior College); Meredith, Raleigh, (Senior College for women); Mars Hill Junior College, Mars Hill; Gardner-Webb Junior College, Boiling Springs; Campbell Junior College, Buies Creek; Wingate Junior College, Wingate; Chowan Junior College, Murfreesboro.

The enrollment of our seven Baptist supported colleges exceeds 5,000 each year. Four hundred of these are being trained for the Baptist ministry, and an additional 250 are student volunteers for other full-time Christian services. This year approximately 600 students will graduate from our two senior colleges, and 500 from the junior colleges. Four hundred officers and teachers work as full-time employees in the seven institutions. The responsibility for the operation of each of these colleges is vested in the Board of Trustees named by the Baptist State Convention.

The seven Baptist Colleges have a net plant value of \$15,000,000 and an annual operating expenditure of \$3,000,000. The present endowment, including the \$11,000,000 provided in the Smith-Reynolds Foundation for Wake Forest College, totals \$15,500,000. The nine-year program of the Baptists of North Carolina provides for the expenditure of \$8,125,000 for plant additions and improvements, and an annual operating fund of \$450,000, or approximately \$100 per student.

The North Carolina Baptist Council on Christian Education has 45 members, 21 of whom are institutional representatives, 20 pastors and

laymen from the General Board, and 4 ex-officio members.

North Carolina Baptist parents should acquaint themselves with our Baptist supported colleges and encourage their sons and daughters to match their career with Christian Training.

Kent Brown read the report on Sunday Schools, Ralph Beshears the report on Training Unions, Mrs. Russell Hodges that on Woman's Missionary Union, and I. S. Ayers the report on Brotherhoods. After motion to adopt these reports the Moderator recognized Horace Easom, State Brotherhood Secretary, who spoke to all four reports. He read Matthew 16:13-19 and likened our Sunday Schools, Training Unions, Woman's Missionary Unions and Brotherhoods to four keys which unlock all things which Baptists are trying to do. He said the most important things which Baptists are trying to do through these organizations are: to reach, teach, win to Christ, train, indoctrinate, enlist for all church services, stimulate missionary spirit, promote grace of giving, give world-wide vision, lead everyone into a definite place of service, and lead all Christians to be soul-winners. The reports were adopted.

#### REPORT ON SUNDAY SCHOOLS

About two-thirds of the Sunday Schools in the Association were visited in the interest of our Sunday School program — either for the growth of Sunday School work or in the interest of Vacation Bible Schools. The State Sunday School Department supplied us with the services of Miss Betty Jean Chambers, who conducted 10 Vacation Bible Schools in our association. Approximately 26 churches had Vacation Bible Schools with a total attendance of 1785.

Your Sunday School Department wishes to recommend a program that we feel will work well in all our churches and Sunday Schools:

1. If possible, to obtain Miss Chambers again next year to assist in the Vacation Bible Schools and if need be, obtain one other State worker. This can be done only if the work of our Vacation Bible Schools is started early. Also, if possible, to contact every Sunday School in the association and to enlist every person in our association who can and will work in this field.

2. That the Sunday School Department promote two or more Sunday School officers and teachers training courses in the fall or early winter months of 1954. That our officers of the different departments in our Associational Sunday School work know their work and be willing to perform to the best of their ability the job to which they have been assigned.

Much prayer and work will be done before this program can be accomplished. Each church, with its leaders, will have to make a decision as to whether or not this program is worth anything to their people. Three Forks Association is growing — let us keep it growing in the Lord's work. If you feel that the Sunday School and Vacation Bible School are not beneficial to the religious education and growth of our churches, then let us know why you think so. If it is good and sound, then you should get behind it with all your power so that the Lord's will may be done in our churches and Association.

#### REPORT ON TRAINING UNIONS

During the past year the churches of Three Forks Baptist Association have experienced an increase in the interest of Training Union work. Some new unions have been organized and people are foreseeing the values of a training program in their church.

Last fall, under the direction of James P. Morgan, State Training Union Secretary, a Central Training School was held for the benefit of all the churches of this association. This school was held at Oak Grove and nine state workers were here to assist in the instruction of the various groups. Representatives from 21 of our churches attended with a total enrollment of 179. Since that time we have realized this to be one of our most worthwhile endeavors.

December 7, 1953 we held our "M" Night meeting with Perkinsville Church. Our program was built around the theme for this year, "Keeping the Faith." Dr. John Farrar, Boiling Springs, was the principal speaker. 12 churches were represented with a total attendance of 161. 8 pastors were present.

An Associational Tournament was conducted last spring for the selection of participants in the district tournaments at North Wilkesboro. Associational quarterly meetings have been held throughout the year.

As we think of the things that have been done we also think of the many things yet to do. Our association, as a whole, still has a long way to go in the field of Training Union. Many of our churches would have Unions do not have the attendance and interest that they should. Also,

there are too many of our churches who have not as yet seen cause to participate in this phase of our work, and by not so doing are being held back in the advancement of the work that God would have them do. Time will not permit in this report the setting forth of the values of this work, but we would sincerely recommend that each of our 45 churches see to it that a good wide-awake Training Union is functioning as a part of their church program.

### REPORT ON WOMAN'S MISSIONARY UNION

The Woman's Missionary Union is composed of the Woman's Missionary Societies and the Young People's Organizations, and we now have in this association 14 societies and 24 young people's organizations—an increase over the preceeding year.

Its object is to distribute missionary information and stimulate missionary effort; to secure cooperation of each individual in giving, not only money, but her time and talents to the mission program. For this purpose we would enlist and develop our women and young people in the practice of prayer for and study of all phases of our work.

In our program of work this year, we have conducted planned mission study courses and have encouraged the reading of other books on prayer, stewardship and missions.

The seasons of prayer for Foreign, Home, and State Missions were observed, including our first Association-wide Day of Prayer for Foreign Missions, held at Cove Creek Baptist Church. Contributions were made to each cause. A special donation, known as the Burney gift, was made to the Margaret Fund. This fund supplies scholarships for the education of the sons and daughters of our missionaries and the Burney gifts helps with their extra expenses.

We have established a Memorial Scholarship Fund which is used each year to aid one of our pastors to attend Fruitland Institute.

Our Annual Meeting was held with Rutherwood Baptist Church. At this time, Miss Janet Wilson and Miss Anna Frances Toda presented talks which brought a challenge to us for more earnest mission work.

One of our greatest assets toward spiritual growth of our young people is the work done at Camp Joy. The training and inspiration received there means more and better Christians.

Our theme for this year is "A Sinful World — A Sufficient Saviour," and as we continue to pray, study, and work together may we truly become "Laborers together with God" and do our share in presenting this Saviour to a "Sinful World."

### REPORT ON BROTHERHOOD

Last year at the time the Three Forks Association met we had four Brotherhoods among our churches. Today we are happy to report five active Brotherhoods: Boone. Oak Grove, Rutherwood, Perkinsville, and Cove Creek. In the last eight weeks Horace Easom, State Brotherhood Secretary, and I have visited and counseled with several other churches. We are confident that within the next month to six weeks we will have at least three more Brotherhoods started in our churches. Our aim and the goal which we intend to strive for until we reach it, is a Brotherhood in every church in our association. We call now for the interest, support and cooperation of every pastor and responsible church leader to help us achieve this end.

We cannot report all the activities of all the Brotherhoods for these include the whole range of the Kingdom Program in the churches. But I do want to mention one or two special activities that these Brotherhoods have engaged in successfully. The Boone Brotherhood has sponsored a very fine Boy Scout Hut on the church property and, for several years, has maintained at least one student in the college who otherwise could not have had an education. At present Arvil Greene is the student at ASTC who is being sponsored by this Brotherhood.

But the activity of which we are most proud and thankful is the Camp Joy project for the young people of our association, which has become a reality through the support of the Brotherhoods in our county. I could not say how much this camp is worth in dollars and cents, though this is considerable. Its worth to the cause of Christ among our people cannot be measured at all. The total amount spent at Camp Joy to date is \$3,822.89. Our churches have given \$2,310.20 and we have received \$1,237.21 in individual donations. We have \$236.40 in the bank at present and we still owe \$1,531.72 on the project. While of course every gift has not been from a Brotherhood member, this camp would never have become a reality without the active effort of these Brotherhoods and in fact, almost all the money given has come from Brotherhoods. Ten churches so far have given to Camp Joy. We urge those churches to continue their support and the others to join us in what we firmly believe to be one of our association's most important activities.

We pledge our best efforts in the future, even while we ask for your interest and support.

### REPORT ON RELIGIOUS LITERATURE

Christian literature does not need defending; it needs more distribution and wider reading. Never before have Baptists had such opportunities as today to magnify and promote the Lord's work through vital Christian literature. The printed page is powerful; its influence is universal. People tend to become like the things they read and absorb in their minds and hearts. The flood of bad literature has spread over our land, with almost every news stand, drug store, bus station, and even grocery stores, selling objectionable comic books, bad magazines, lurid books and periodicals that the United States mails refuse to carry. This bad literature very often finds its way into Baptists homes, and its pages are filled with the seeds of evil. Wider reading of good Christian literature would soon destroy the thirst for the bad. Baptists have a great opportunity to provide the best reading matter they can get for their homes.

To meet this evil flood of bad literature we have a marvelous array of well printed, sound Baptist periodicals, Sunday School, and other Christian publications for every age, spiritual interest, and need. Included in these publications are the Home Life, The Commission, Home Missions, Royal Service, and our own Baptist State papers, Charity and Children and the Biblical Recorder. Perhaps no denomination in America has so fine a selection of Christian Literature as Southern Baptists have today. The aim of it all is to inform, enlist indoctrinate, unify, and inspire our people for faithful service in our Lord's name. Our Christian literature must be magnified and promoted in all our churches if God's work is to go forward. Dr. M. E. Dodd said, "A non-reading Baptist is a non-informed Baptist; a non-informed Baptist is a non-interested Baptist; a non-cooperative Baptist, and a non-cooperative Baptist is not much of a Baptist."

In North Carolina, the Biblical Recorder covers the entire field of our Baptist work. Without our state Baptist paper, successful promotion of the Lord's work in all Baptists channels would be well-nigh impossible. The Recorder has carried the message of Baptist progress into Baptist homes for 121 years. Pastors, associational missionaries, and consecrated Baptist leaders have over the years promoted its circulation, and they have rejoiced to see the fruits of much good reading. People always do more when they know more. As they read, they lead. As they are informed, they are inspired. People are not interested in,

and will not support, that which they do not know about. We trust that our Baptist papers will be in each Baptist home of our association and will be read by each member in the home.

Roby Vines read the report on Public Morals. After motion to adopt, Mr. Hollingsworth recognized R. M. Hauss, representative of the Allied Church League of North Carolina, who spoke to the report. He asked that protest be made to radio stations that they stop advertising strong drink, that we stop taking magazines that advertise strong drink and that we be careful to send to the Legislature this fall men who are Dry. He suggested too, that we follow suggestions made

by the Baptist State Convention in its Annual Meeting in November 1953 and set up a Temperance Committee in every church and observe the first Sunday in December as Commitment Day. E. J. Farthing in further discussing the subject said that the breakdown of morals was one great thing threatening our nation and this was due in almost every instance to strong drink. The report was adopted.

A motion was made and adopted that the association go on record as approving the suggestion of each church setting up a committee on Temperance.

### REPORT ON PUBLIC MORALS

The time has come when the Scriptures must be consulted for the problem that now faces the entire human family and which threatens to destroy our Christian civilization, namely the problem of immorality.

According to recent statistics compiled by our Southern Baptist Board, on the subject of "Public Morals," there is at this time some 67,000,000 young people above the age of 15 who use alcoholic beverages. \$10,000,000 is spent annually for strong drink alone, not to mention the other vices and corruptions among the youth of our land. It is estimated that for the \$18,000,000 spent for crime that 95% of it is related to alcoholic beverages.

The question that all of our church people should be vitally concerned about is: "What can we do about it?" We submit to you that each "born again child of God" can and must do something about this destructive problem. First, we all can find out how many and what type places are distributing alcoholic beverages. Second, we can find out how many and what type places are not handling alcoholic beverages and encourage our people to properly warn and train their children to not patronize such places. Third, we can get people to work in the many processes of educational programs of good citizenship, both in this world and in the world to come.

Something must be done. The following figures are submitted for your information and consideration of the rapid increase in the use of alcoholic beverages from 1934 to 1977: In 1934 there was 31% of all people 20 years old who used alcoholic beverages. In 1950 there was 50% of all people 16 years old who used alcoholic beverages, and it is estimated that by 1977 there will be 87% of the nation's youthful population using alcoholic beverages.

Someone has well said that "When conditions are at their worst, the Church must be at its best."

In its final analysis, the Scriptures must first, last and always be consulted for the solution to this gigantic problem. We find the solution in 2 Chronicles 7:14, "If my people which are called by my name, shall

humble themselves, and pray, and seek my face, and turn from their wicked ways; then will I hear from heaven, and will forgive their sin, and will heal their land."

Mrs. Graydon Eggers played "When They Ring the Golden Bells" as a prelude and then played soft organ music during the reading of the names of our beloved dead by Mrs. Wilson. C. O. Vance led in a few moments of memorial meditation. Mrs. Lawrence read John 14:1-4, Beth Eggers and Bob Gilley sang "The Holy City" and L. H. Hollingsworth led in prayer.

Then, using his gavel, Mr. Hollingsworth declared the association adjourned until its next session or until called into

session by the Executive Committee.

### PROCEEDINGS OF THE SPRING SESSION OF THREE FORKS BAPTIST ASSOCIATION

The Spring Session of the Three Forks Baptist Association, which met at Beaver Dam Church May 4, 1954, was called to order by the Moderator, L. H. Hollingsworth, at 9:30 a.m.

William Hodges led the congregation in the singing of several hymns which prepared the minds and hearts of those present for the messages which followed.

The theme for the day's program, "The Revival We Need," was followed in all phases of the program.

M. D. Hart, leading the devotional period, read Mark 2:1-5, and said that the kind of revival we need is one that will stir us to action to bring the unsaved to Jesus.

Following prayer, Victor Trivette, chairman of the program committee, presented the program as suggested by the committee and moved its adoption, subject to any change which might be found necessary to be made during the day. The motion carried.

The Moderator recognized Bynum Trivette, pastor of the host church: R. C. Eggers, past Moderator of the association; and D. C. Watkins, Kannapolis. Other pastors present were: Gene Sherwood, Victor Trivette, M. D. Hart, E. J. Farthing, Fred Hagaman, David Greene, E. O. Gore, W. C. Payne, Carl Wilson and Arrant Greer. Smith Hagaman, visitor. was also recognized.

When the roll was called 19 churches answered. Later representatives from 10 other churches came, making a total

of 29 churches represented.

D. C. Watkins, in speaking on "Personal Evangelism" said that the biggest job in the world is to win others and with the use of many scriptures showed why and how to win others.

"Church Evangelism" was ably discussed by A. R. Smith who closed by saying that an evangelistic church would have a consecrated, praying membership who would be willing to sacrifice for God's cause.

C. O. Vance read Acts 11:19-24 and using as his subject "Associational Evangelism" presented some definite things which should be done looking toward simultaneous revivals in all the churches April 10-24, 1955, most important of which were enlisting 1000 consecrated Christians praying for a revival and 500 dedicating themselves to the task of winning at least one lost person to Christ.

After singing "What A Friend We Have In Jesus" Mr. Hollingsworth introduced M. O. Owens, Jr., pastor of the First Baptist Church, Lenoir, N. C., who in his message further challenged the people. After prayer, he read John 4:35-38. In his comments he said that evangelism is preaching and teaching to win souls and change lives. After giving the requisites for the revival we need he closed with these words, "All God needs is reapers — you and I have a place."

The morning session was closed with prayer by Smith

Hagaman.

### AFTERNOON SESSION

William Hodges led the song service which opened the afternoon session.

Gene Sherwood read Philippians 1:9-10 and gave love as the basis for cooperation and unity between churches and closed his remarks with prayer.

After singing "My Faith Looks Up To Thee," Mr. Hollingsworth called on all present to express their appreciation to the host church for their hospitality and for all the blessings of the day with a hearty "Amen."

Mrs. Nora Wilson, director of Camp Joy, expressed appreciation for all that had been done for the camp and made announcement of future activities and urged all the churches to send their young people to one of three camps which would be held in June.

Mr. Hollingsworth referred to the statement he made when elected Moderator in regard to visiting the churches and stated that to date he had spoken in 23 of them and planned to visit the other 22 before the Fall Session in August.

C. J. Farthing spoke on "State-wide and South-wide Evangelism." Using scriptures he stressed leading people to accept Christ as Saviour and Lord and said the weakest link in Baptist churches was getting Christians to accept the Lordship of Christ in their individual lives.

G. C. Cox in his message on "Worldwide Evangelism" said three things were necessary. We must look and see a lost world, pray for laborers, and go with ourselves dedicated and consecrated and claim God's promise "Lo, I am with you."

After singing "Blest Be the Tie That Binds," R. C. Eggers

led the closing prayer.

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

REV. NATHAN M. GREENE

Nathan M. Greene, pioneer preacher and servant of the Lord among the churches of the Three Forks Association, was born Sept. 28, 1875, and died Sept. 1, 1955. He is survived by his widow, the former Nannie Norris; two sons, Clyde R. and George C., of Boone; 6 grandchildren and 12 great-grandchildren.

He joined Meat Camp Baptist Church Jan. 10, 1894. He served as Sunday School Superintendent, teacher and deacon for a number of years. He was ordained to the ministry Jan. 21, 1939 and immediately began active service. He served as Associational Missionary in Three Forks for 7 years, was active in the organization of Mountain Dale, Tabernacle, Green Valley and Perkinsville churches and was the first pastor of each except Mountain Dale.

At the Association mention was made of the critical illness of Mr. Greene; and he passed away late the day following the close of the Association. The Executive Committee recommended that the minutes of the 1955 Session be dedicated to him.

#### CONSTITUTION

1. The Association shall be composed of members chosen by the different churches in our Union and duly sent to represent them in the Association, who, on producing letters from their respective church certifying their appointment, shall be entitled to their seats. Each church shall be entitled to three delegates, the ministers being ex-officio.

2. In the letters from the different churches is to be expressed their numbers in full fellowship, those baptized, received by letter, dismissed by letter, excommunicated and dead since last Association.

3. The members thus chosen and convened shall have no power to lord it over God's heritage, nor shall they have any special power over the churches. They shall not infringe upon any right of any church in this Union.

4. The Association shall have a Moderator, Vice-Moderator, and Clerk who

shall be chosen annually by the suffrage of the members present.

5. New churches or any regular church of Christ being locally dismissed by letter by any sister Association upon application and delegates, shall be admitted to our Union.

Every church in the Association shall be entitled to representation in the Association.

7. Every query presented by any member of the Association shall be once read and before it is debated the Moderator shall put it to vote, and if there is a majority for it being debated, it shall be taken into consideration and be debated, but if there be a majority against it, it shall be withdrawn.

8. Every motion made and seconded shall come under the consideration of the Association except it be withdrawn by the member who made it.

9. The Association shall endeavor to furnish the churches with the minutes of their proceedings. The best method of accomplishing this purpose shall be at the direction of the future Associations.

10. We think it is absolutely necessary that we shall have an associational fund for defraying the expenses of the same. For the raising and supporting of which we think it to be the duty of each church in the Union to contribute annually such sums as they may think proper and send it by their delegates to the Association. The money

thus raised shall be deposited in the hands of the treasurer, appointed by the Association, who shall be adcountable for the same. He shall pay the money from time to time as the Association may direct.

11. There shall be an Association book kept wherein the proceedings of the Association shall be regularly recorded by the secretary appointed by the Association, who shall receive a compensation yearly for this service.

12. The minutes of this Association shall be read and corrected, if need be, and signed by the Moderator and Clerk before the Association rises.

13. Amendments to plans or form of government may be made at any time by a majority of the Association when they deem it necessary, by giving the churches twelve months prior notice.

14. The Association shall have power:

To provide for the general union of the Churches.

To endeaver to preserve a chain of union among the churches.

To give the churches the necessary advice in matters of difficulty.

To inquire into the cause why the churches fail to represent themselves at any time in the Association.

To appropriate the money contributed by the churches for an associational fund to any purpose they may think proper.

To have power to withdraw from any church in their Union who shall violate the rules of this Association or deviate from the orthodox principles of religion.

To correspond with sister Associations.

To invite any Baptist in the ministry to a seat in the Association, who may be present at the time of their sitting.

To adjorn the Association to any future time and place they may think proper and most convenient to the churches of the Union.

#### RULES OF DECORUM

1. The Association shall be opened and closed with prayer.

2. Only one person shall speak at a time, who shall arise from his seat and address the Moderator. The person thus speaking shall not be interrupted in his speech by any except the Moderator, till he is done speaking.

3. He shall strictly adhere to the subject and in no wise reflect upon the person who spoke before him as to make remarks on his steps, failings, or imperfections, but shall fairly state the matter as he can do so as to give his views or ideas.

4. No person shall abruptly break or absent himself from the Association without liberty obtained from it.

5. No person shall arise and speak more than three times on any one subject without liberty from the Association.

No member shall have liberty of laughing during the sitting of the same or whispering in the time of public speaking.

7. No member shall address another in any other appellation than that of brother.

8. The Moderator shall not interrupt any member in, or prohibit him from speaking until he gives his light on the subject, except he break the rules of this decorum.

9. The names of the several members of the Association shall be enrolled by the Clerk and called over as often as required by the Association.

10. The Moderator shall be entitled to the same privilege of speech as any of the other members, provided the chair be filled. He shall not vote unless the Association be equally divided.

One Hundred Fifteenth Annual Session of Three Forks Baptist Association of N. C.

#### Held With

Bethany and Mount Calvary Baptist Churches Tuesday and Wednesday, August 30 and 31, 1955

#### FIRST DAY

The One Hundred Fifteenth Session of the Three Forks Baptist Association of North Carolina met with the Bethany Baptist Church August 30, 1955.

The session was opened at 9:10 A. M. with L. H. Hollingsworth

leading the song service.

L. H. Hagaman brought the opening devotional. He read Matthew 16:13-20 and urged more zeal and interest and more dependence

upon the power of God, and closed with prayer.

The moderator, L. H. Hollingsworth, called the One Hundred Fifteenth Session to order for the transaction of business. He recognized Dwight Long, chairman of the program committee, who moved the adoption of the program as printed and in the hands of the messengers with whatever changes might be necessary. The motion carried.

Mr. Hollingsworth gave a cordial welcome to all visitors. He recognized Dwight Long, Cove Creek, Glenn South, Howard's Creek, and William Smith, White Rock, who came as pastors in the associa-

tion during the past year.

Thirty-four churches answered to the roll call. During the course of the sessions all but two were represented. The report on Association-

al Progress was postponed until later.

Dr. I. G. Greer, Chapel Hill, when recognized, brought greetings from the Baptist Orphanage explaining that gifts to the Orphanage could be sent as formerly even though the Orphanage is now in the Cooperative Program, and he said the Thanksgiving offering is as important and necessary as it ever has been. "The most important thing in the world is to make the right kind of men and women out of our boys and girls" and "The tragedy of North Carolina is its broken homes" were two significant statements he made.

C. J. Farthing, Vice-Moderator, came to the platform and presented Mr. Hollingsworth, who brought the Moderator's address. He read Romans 1:1-16, and in the course of his remarks said we should feel the same compulsion as Paul when he said "I am ready to preach," and we should pray for readiness, cast aside concern for

ourselves, and face the needs of a dying world.

The following committees were appointed: Nominations—Ralph Beshears, Chairman, J. T. C. Wright, A. E. Moretz, and Mrs. James Sherwood; Finance—Maurice Cooper, Chairman, and Mrs. B. D. Clawson; Time, Place and Preacher—Roby Vines, Chairman, Mrs. Boyd Cook, and George Hagaman.

The churches were asked to increase their minute fund so that all expenses could be cared for.

The report on Christian Education was read by G. C. Fox. M. H. Kendall, Mars Hill College, spoke to the report. He brought greetings from the college which is celebrating its One Hundredth anniversary this year. Quoting Dr. Phil Elliott, he said "The total Christian Program can be found in Evangelism, Education, and Actions or Deeds." Wade E. Brown, Chairman of the Council of Christian Education for North Carolina Baptists was recognized. The report was adopted.

#### REPORT ON CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

We are Christians who have been saved and commissioned by our Lord Jesus Christ. Therefore we are under His Missionary Orders: namely, "Go ye therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit, teaching them to observe all things whatsoever I have commanded you: and, lo, I am with you always, even unto the end of the world." Matthew 28:19-20, This is the Lord's Great Commission, the greatest of all commissions, to all whom He has saved. We have accepted this Great Commission. As Missionary Baptist, Southern Baptist, North Carolina Baptist, and Three Forks Association Baptist, we are associated together, and are cooperating in Christ's great program of Christian Education.

As Southern Baptists we own and support five Southern Baptist Theological Seminaries. In addition to these, we contribute to the American Baptist Seminary for Negroes in Nashville, Tenn., and the Carver School of Missions and Social Work in Louisville, Ky. During the past school year, the total enrollment in our five Seminaries was 4,636, of whom 3,826 were ministerial students, and 810 were mission volunteers.

In our Southern Baptist Convention territory, missionary Baptists have in operation 30 senior colleges, 21 junior colleges, 8 academies, and 4 Bible schools, with a total enrollment last college year of 53,457 students, of which 6,628 are ministerial students, and 2,011 are mission volunteers.

As North Carolina Baptists, we have 2 senior colleges: Wake Forest and Meredith; and 5 junior colleges: Mars Hill, Gardner Webb, Campbell, Wingate, and Chowan. The total enrollment in these colleges during the last school year was approximately 6,000 students of which 750 are training for ministry and full time mission service. For the financial support of our Baptist colleges, we provided during the past school year \$945,000 for both operating expense and capital needs.

Three Forks Association Baptists can and should do more for our Seminaries and Colleges by praying for them, and sending to them our sons and daughters, and directing our young men and women who graduate from High School to attend one of our Christian colleges, and by supporting our Nine-Year Program of Advance through increased giving through our Cooperative Program.

#### ASSOCIATIONAL MISSIONS

The Missions Committee is happy to report that the horizon of Associational Missions Work is looking brighter for the future. Many churches are supporting this work regularly, and many others have made committments.

In cooperation with the Finance Committee, an Associational budget will be offered at this session for your approval. This budget gives all churches equal share in

the work.

The Committee is glad to report that we now have an Associational Missionary. Rev. Hoyt Roberson has been secured and is now working in our midst. Mr. Roberson is serving Bethel Church on a half-time basis and is giving the rest of his time to the Associational work.

Mr. Hollingsworth presented the following ministers: J. Hoyt Robertson, new pastor of Bethel and Associational Missionary, Paul Phipps, new pastor of Meat Camp Church, Glenn Blackburn, Va., Howard Hodges, Crossnore, and Lloyd Culler, Lenoir. He also announced the evening session at Perkinsville and Wednesday's session at Mt. Calvary, urging attendance at both.

C. O. Vance came for the morning worship service. He read Revelation 1:4-20, following which the Oak Grove trio sang "I'd Rather Have Jesus." Mr. Vance took as his subject "The Triumphant Christ," bringing out the many things that should convince people that Christ is the Son of God. He closed with a note of challenge to follow the Triumphant Christ. He pronounced the benediction and thanksgiving for the noon meal.

# AFTERNOON SESSION

The afternoon session was opened with a song service, followed with scripture reading, Acts 2:42-47, and comments by Raymond Hendrix. Prayer by Paul Phipps.

The announcement was made of letters received from every church except Mountain Dale, and the financial goal for expenses was about

\$25.00 short.

In the absence of C. Ray Lawrence, Mrs. Blanche Perry read the report on Benevolences. The Moderator recognized James M. Hayes, Superintendent of Homes for the Aging, who spoke briefly. W. K. McGee, of Baptist Hospital, was then introduced, who spoke on Benevolent Activities. He emphasized the importance of the total program of Baptists, urging that we support all our benovelent institutions. The report was adopted.

By standing, the messengers signified that they would present Homes for the Aging, Orphanage and Hospital to their people. He urged support through special offering: Homes for the Aging the third Sunday in February, Hospital on Mother's Day and Orphanage at Thanksgiving.

#### REPORT ON BENEVOLENCES

Under the above heading, North Carolina Baptists maintain four great Christian Institutions:

1. Mills Home at Thomasville, and Kennedy Home at Kinston, care for our orphan children and provide wholesome Christian environment. Many of those cared for become the finest citizens. Our Thanksgiving offering is for the Orphanage. We covet the support of every church in the Three Forks Association for this worthy cause.

2. The Baptist Hospital is doing a marvelous work in ministering to the sick. Those who know of the services rendered there can best evaluate the worth of the Baptist Hospital. Many of our people in this Association have used the services the hospital provides. Surely, every church will show its gratitude by supporting the Baptist

Hospital.

- 3. The Home for the Aging is another one of our institutions which has not been in existence but a short while, yet it is rapidly gaining favor among the aged. The Home for the Aging gives a sense of security and tranquility to those dear souls who are in the "sunset" of life. We need to give concern to the progress of this institution.
- 4. Not the least of our consideration in the Minister's Retirement Plan. In years past many of our ministers have reached old age and declining health without provision. This should not be allowed to happen to our preachers who give their very lives to the spreading of the Gospel. Every church in our Association would do a great service to provide funds for the minister's retirement.

C. O. Vance was recognized for the report on missions. He placed copies of the report in the hands of the messengers and asked that they take them back to their churches. Mr. Vance then read the report. Dr. E. L. Spivey, leader of State Missions, spoke to the report with an overall message on Christian missions challenging those present to do more for the sake of Christ.

## REPORT ON MISSIONS

"The Spirit of the Lord is upon me, because he hath anointed me to preach the gospel to the poor; he hath sent me to heal the broken-hearted, to preach deliverance to the captives, and recovering of sight to the blind, to set at liberty them that are bruised, to preach the acceptable year of the Lord." (Luke 4:18-19.) This is the program of Jesus. This was his mission. "As my Father hath sent me even so send I you." (John 20:2b.) This becomes the mission of every follower of Christ. "Missions," we are told, is the organized effort to spread Christianity. We believe that home is a good place to start but a bad place to stop. We must witness at home and at the same time abroad. "The brighter the light shines at home, the brighter it shines away from home."

For the first time in history of Southern Baptists, the number of Foreign missionaries has reached the one-thousand mark. On May 15, 1955, the number stood at 1,002.

To step up the annual number of appointments, the Foreign Missions Board is placing major emphasis on life commitment to special Christian service. Young people who feel the call of God to lifetime service will be asked to consider foreign service in harvest fields where laborers are fewest.

A summary of work done by missionaries of the Home Mission Board of the Sou-

thern Baptist Convention during 1954 indicated a total of 1,324 missionaries, 370 of whom were summer student missionaries, serving 10 weeks, or 954 regular missionaries

In the field of Direct Missions, the Home Mission Board ministers to Chinese, the deaf, French, Indians, Italians, Japanese, Russians, Spanish-speaking people, and other isolated and neglected groups. Through Rescue Missions and Good Will Centers, as well as through missions and churches, home missionaries seek to win the lost to Christ.

The Department of Co-operative Missions conducts conferences in co-operation with state convention forces and promotes city missions, rural church work, mountain missions, western and pioneer missions, a service to broken homes and juvenile delinquents, a ministry to military personnel, a trailer camp ministry, and provides a correspondence Bible course.

In Negro work, evangelism, and Jewish work the Board extends its ministry

to missions of Americans in a vital service.

Other ministries of the Board include Alaska, Cuba, Panama and Canal Zone,

Migrants, summer student missions and western missions.

For 30 years the Cooperative Program has been our major Southern Baptist channel of supporting all our missionary educational and benevolent work. With the dollars you give through the Cooperative Program you literally "go into all the world." You preach, teach, minister to the sick and needy, train church leaders and missionaries, and give the gospel to men of every race in our country and around the world.

Statistics reveal that Southern Baptists are growing in their stewardship more

rapidly than any other major denomination in America.

Southern Baptists are growing in their support of the Cooperative Program. Although many churches still have no part in support of the program of world missions through the Cooperative Program, the number of such churches is growing smaller each year. The State office of the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina reports that from August 1954 through June 1955 the churches of Three Forks Association contributed through the Cooperative Program undesignated \$6,793.93, and designated \$6,585.44, making a total of \$13,374.37. There is increasing awareness of spiritual need beyond one's own church and community. There is increasing concern about the proportion being expended on the local programs of the churches in comparison with what is given for the whole world beyond one's own church. This concern is revealed by the fact that of each dollar given we spend 86 cents on ourselves and only 14 cents is given for the whole world.

What can be done to increase our support of the local church programs and of world missions? We offer the following recommendations suggested to us by the Com-

mittee on the Cooperative Program:

1. That every church plan to observe Church and Denomination night this fall.

2. That every church plan a Stewardship Revival.

3. That every church have a budget.

- That every church include gifts to missions through the Cooperative Program
  in this budget for a certain percentage of the total budget, rather than for a
  certain number of dollars.
- That every church prayerfully consider increasing the percentage going to missions through the Cooperative Program each year.

Mr. Roberson recognized Mrs. Blanche Perry, who introduced Mrs. James L. Sherwood, associate superintendent of Associational W.M.U., who spoke on the aims of the W.M.U. for the women and youth of our churches.

Wade E. Brown spoke on "The Value of Associational Missions," emphasizing the place of the associational missionary in the total plan of work in all the churches.

William Hodges led in singing of "Send the Light."

The closing remarks were by Mr. Roberson, who said that Baptists have one mission, reaching people for Christ, and they carry out that mission through Evangelism, Stewardship and Missions. Associational missions has a vital part in the total world program.

With prayer by Grady Minton, the session was recessed until

Wednesday morning at Mount Calvary.

## SECOND DAY

L. H. Hollingsworth led the song service which began the second day's session at Mount Calvary Baptist Church.

Glenn Gentry led the morning devotional by reading I Corinth-

ians 13, commenting briefly, and leading in prayer.

Mr. Hollingsworth called the session to order, and he recognized Clyde R. Greene, who brought the report on Associational Progress which had been deferred from the previous day. It was discussed by Mr. Hollingsworth and was adopted.

C. J. Farthing read the report of the Executive Committee, and after a motion for adoption, it was discussed by Wade E. Brown and C. J. Farthing. The motion carried.

#### REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

The Executive Committee met five times during the past year—November 11, January 6, April 28, special called session May 7, and August 21, with an average attendance of 11.

Much of the discussions centered on the calling of an Associational Missionary which resulted in the name of Rev. J. Hoyt Roberson, Owenton, Ky., being presented at the Spring Session of the Association. Mr. Roberson was unanimously elected and began his work on a half-time basis July 1.

Plans for the programs of the Spring and Fall Sessions were made and recom-

mendations passed to be presented to the Fall Session.

The Executive Committee of the Three Forks Baptist Association makes the following recommendations:

- 1. The Association is the business of all the churches and it is recommended that every pastor, as well as the messengers, make a special effort to arrange their work so they can attend all sessions of the Association.
- 2. That the pastors meet monthly with the Associational Missionary to plan for the promotion and progress of the work of the Kingdom of God in this Association.
- 3. That each church adopt an annual budget for the local and missions program of the church.
- 4. That each church of the Association organize and promote a Training Union. Woman's Missionary Union, and a Brotherhood, with special emphasis on the Youth Program.
- 5. That a committee, consisting of the Moderator, Associational Missionary, Sunday School superintendent, Training Union director, Woman's Missionary Union superintendent, and the Brotherhood president, meet at least quarterly, to plan for the promotion of these organizations.

6. That each church make a monthly contribution to support the Associational

Missions program.

C. J. Farthing, Vice-Moderator, presided for the reports on Sunday School, Training Union, Woman's Missionary Union, and Brotherhood.

Kent Brown read the report on Sunday Schools.

Miss Doris Vance read the report on Training Unions.

Mrs. B. W. Stallings read the report on Woman's Missionary Unions.

The Brotherhood report was not ready, but it was to be inserted later.

#### REPORT ON SUNDAY SCHOOLS

The Bible teaches, "The entrance of thy word giveth light," and "That the word maketh people wise unto salvation," therefore, the importance of the Bible teaching ministry of the Sunday School.

The Sunday Schools have proven themselves to be a great teaching, evangelistic, enlistment, and financial agencies of the churches. We therefore have reason to rejoice in the growth and service of the Sunday Schools of the Three Forks Association.

In addition to the report to be found in the tables, we held an Association-wide training school for one week at Brushy Fork church, with Rex West teaching the book. "One to Eight." Sunday School members earned 119 training awards in 1955. We conducted 11 business and inspirational meetings; superintendent and staff members made 36 visits to Sunday Schools, and edited and distributed 10 issues of "The Hour Before Eleven."

We are working and praying for a complete well-founded Sunday School organization. We recommend that an all-out effort be made to have a Vacation Bible School in every church, have two or more Association-wide study courses, and that every Sunday School will have at least one study course, and urge our teachers to attend the monthly meetings and get to know each other.

We recommend that the Sunday Schools use the bulletin, "The Hour Before Eleven," as a means of exchanging ideas, announcements, and information pertaining to Sunday Schools.

#### REPORT OF TRAINING UNIONS

Three Forks Baptist Association now has more Training Unions in its churches than at any other time in its history. Two additional unions have been organized this year. You are to be commended, but in checking the membership we are made to realize that far too many of our churches have not availed themselves with this part of the Kingdom work.

In the absence of Rex West, Mrs. Blanche Perry read the report on Public Morals. It was discussed by Wade E. Brown from a lawyer's viewpoint, Grady Minton from a pastor's viewpoint, R. C. Eggers, E. J. Farthing, and L. H. Hollingsworth. The report was adopted.

#### REPORT ON PUBLIC MORALS

We have come again to report the devastating action of Satan's forces upon the lives of our society. One of the evils of our modern day is beverage alcohol. Legal control in our county is to be commended, but is insufficient as laws are broken as well as hearts and homes as a result of beverage alcohol. Through the improved media of modern advertising technique, the liquor forces are holding before the eyes of our people and pouring into their ears glaring misrepresentations about liquor and drinking which multitudes of our people have taken to be true. Only the widespread information of accurate knowledge about this drug can ever counteract this advertising by the liquor

forces of our nation.

We make no apology for the claim that the Christian gospel is the greatest force at our disposal for the redemption of the individual and the defeat of evils in human society. The gospel is both preventive and curative and should be proclaimed extensively and boldly. The manufacture, sale and use of alcoholic beverages is a giant dope racket that operates from behind a respectable business front under the protection of the laws that our citizens have permitted to be enacted. But for every dollar of liquor revenue received we pay ten dollars for crime, wrecks, and property damage legally laid to liquor as the primary cause. Added to this is moral degeneracy and ruin, for which liquor has been held responsible.

The fight against this enemy is not a battle; it is a war. And it is one in which the forces of righteousness in this nation can accept no armistice nor agree to any com-

promise.

Another factor in public morals is the increase of juvenile delinquency. The law enforcement officers and juvenile courts of our land are dealing with cases which per-

tain to juveniles, in numbers astounding.

Much obscene literature is also hitting the newsstands of our Nation and may, in many cases, come into the homes and lives of our own people. This literature carries a display of sex provocation such as to be found nowhere else in the world. This could lead to the destruction of our nation morally, physically and spiritually, for the judgment of God has been meted out to other peoples and nations for the same and similar sins.

Last, but not least, is the evil of gambling which is being participated in by fifty millions of adults and larger numbers of minors. The evil of gambling spreads from very small beginnings. Sometimes it is the result of an easy tolerance in both home and church toward games of chance, raffles, etc. What many may call an innocent past-time of penny ante, matching for a Coke, social card games and the so-called harmless appearing game of Bingo, can become the spark of a consuming fire to others, if not to you.

Our Sunday School lessons for the remainder of this year and all of 1956, will be based upon the theme "Crusade for Christian Morality." We trust that our churches will urge all their constituency to attend every Sunday in this series of Study and apply the teachings of God's Word to their lives, which is the only answer to improvement of Public Morals.

REPORT OF CAMP JOY

"Live Christ," the camp theme for 1955 is our aim in all the activities of Camp Joy. We appreciate your demonstration of the love of the Living Christ as you pray and give of yourselves and money that the camp may grow and render a greater service.

The Lord marvelously blessed the youth camps this year in the quality of workers and campers, in the activities and spirit manifested. There were 37 decisions for Christ: 8 accepting Him as Saviour and 29 rededications and commitments, many of these feeling God's call for foreign mission service. The offering for missions was \$44.82. In the table on Camp Joy you will find more information concerning these camps and other phases of Camp Joy. We are most grateful for the blessings of the Lord, for everyone who rendered service in any way.

Plans are being made for six youth camps in 1956: a one-day Sunbeam camp for boys and girls, ages 4-8; a Y.W.A. camp for girls 16 years and above; a camp for each of these age groups—9-11 year girls, 12-15 year girls, 9-11 year boys, and 12-15 year boys. Each of these four camps will run from Monday through Friday. Dates and other information will be announced later. The camps are for all boys and girls who want to come, and we hope that every church in Three Forks Association will be represented in the 1956 camps. We also appeal to our Christian men and women to volunteer their services as camp counselors. We need at least 42 for the six camps. We are confident that you will experience great joy in working with the youth in our camps.

At the camp planning meeting, August 25, 1955, the following Camp Joy regulations, applicable to all groups using the camp, were discussed and approved:

 No marring or destruction in any way of the camp buildings, equipment, grounds, and surroundings.

2. Report any damage, breakage, or disturbance to associational camp director.

3. Be responsible for any damage or breakage while at camp.

4. Keep grounds clean and free from trash at all times.

5. Campers are not to be upon the roads unnecessarily.

6. No questionable activities.

7. No mixed groups sleeping in any of the buildings.

8. Quiet from 10 p. m. to 6:30 a. m.

9. Overnight camp capacity is 50. Upon request 60 might be allowed.

10, Those working in the kitchen during camps should have food handlers health certificates.

11. Keep garbage, cans, papers, etc. in covered containers outside the kitchen.

12. Leave buildings and all equipment in good and sanitary condition. The camp is to be used for religious purposes. Let's keep it Christian.

Let us pray, plan, and proceed in the development and activities of Camp Jov. "For ye serve the Lord Christ."

# PROCEEDINGS OF THE SPRING SESSION OF THREE FORKS BAPTIST ASSOCIATION

The Spring Session of Three Forks Baptist Association met with Cove Creek Church May 24, 1955.

To get the people into the spirit of worship, Miss Joyce Perry played soft organ music, and L. H. Hollingsworth read Psalm 100 as a call to worship.

After a song service led by Mr. Hollingsworth, E. O. Gore read I Corinthians 3:9-23 and led in prayer.

L. H. Hollingsworth, moderator, declared the Spring Session in order, expressed appreciation to Cove Creek Church and its pastor for the privilege of meeting there, and recognized the visitors present: Rev. Elliott Hayes, Newland; Rev. Hoyt Roberson, Kentucky; Rev. Lloyd Culler and Rev. Will Bolick, Lenoir; Mrs. Selma Fuller, Mountain City, Tenn.

Mr. Hollingsworth introduced Rev. Hoyt Roberson, Associational Missionary, Owen County, Ky., who, in speaking on "Evangelism Defined" was following the theme of the program, "Conserving the Results of Evangelism." He read Matthew 28:19-20, defined evangelism, gave the basic beliefs in evangelism and stressed that preaching, prayer, compassion, personal evangelism, and the power of the Holy Spirit were necessary factors in evangelism.

After a song, Dwight Long, pastor of Cove Creek Church, spoke on "After Baptism, What?" Referring to Matthew 28:20 he said that after baptism every new church member should be enlisted and enrolled in Sunday School, Training Union, missionary organizations of the church, and taught true Christian church discipline and urged to practice it.

A change was necessary in the program because of the inability of some to be present. Instead of the planned panel discussion, Mr. Hollingsworth spoke on "Conserving the Results of Evangelism." He mentioned the more important places he would visit on his trip to the Baptist World Alliance, London, in July, his tour of foreign countries, and the short time it would take to reach all of them, using it as proof that we could take the gospel to every person in the world if we wanted to. He said our greatest problem was not in lack of evangelism, but in losing those we have won because we have failed to enlist and use them. Evangelism is not a complete thing until the life as well as the soul has been redeemed.

Because of the unavoidable absence of Homer Greene, who was to have brought the sermon, and Howard Hodges, alternate, G. C. Cox, pastor of Blowing Rock Church, closed the morning session with his message, "Witnesses for Christ." After reading from Luke 24 and Acts 1 and 2, he emphasized that God has chosen us to be his witnesses, and what we are, do, say, and go, witness either for or against Him. We cannot all be great, but we can be faithful. If we go in the power of the Holy Spirit, conviction and repentance will follow.

Dwight Long pronounced the benediction and included thanks for the lunch which followed.

## Lunch

The afternoon session was opened with organ music by Mrs. James B. Mast.

L. H. Hollingsworth led the singing of "Heavenly Sunlight" and C. J. Farthing led in prayer.

Contrary to the usual custom, because of necessity, two items of business were disposed of.

Mr. Hollingsworth referred to the action of the Association in its Fall Session 1954, when a joint committee, composed of the Executive, Finance, and Missions committees, was empowered to investigate, contact, and call an Associational Missionary. He told of the activity of this committee which led eventually to the con-

sideration of Rev. Hoyt Roberson. After careful investigation as to the personal qualifications of Mr. Robertson and the type of work he had done as Associational Missionary in Kentucky, he was asked to come for a conference. He appeared before the committee, preached at Oak Grove and Bethel, making a very favorable impression on all who heard him. He was called as pastor of Bethel church, and if he came, would serve as half-time pastor and half-time missionary. The joint committee, since it was so near the time for the spring session of the association, brought it to the association that as a body it might extend the call. G. C. Cox made the motion that the report of the committee be accepted and the call extended to Mr. Roberson. A. E. Moretz seconded the motion. After disscussion by Wade E. Brown, C. J. Farthing, G. C. Cox and L. H. Hollingsworth, a standing vote was called for, and it was unanimous.

Mr. Hollingsworth then told of the request of Myers Park Baptist Church, Charlotte, through Mrs. Lowery, for permission to use Camp Joy for one week, preferably in August, for a camp for underprivileged Negro children. C. J. Farthing made the motion that the use of the camp be granted this group, without charge, with final arrangements to be made through Mrs. Nora Wilson, camp director. Mrs. Ethel Hodges seconded the motion, and the vote was unanimous.

Mrs. Nora Wilson made an announcement of the opening of Camp Joy for the summer on June 17 with a covered dish supper to which everyone who cared to come was invited. Also, she gave the dates for the camps for the boys and girls which would be held in June and July.

Mr. Roberson came back into the assembly, after having been notified of its action, and expressed appreciation for the action taken, and, although he had already been giving it prayerful consideration, he asked that he be given a few more days before giving a definite answer. He promised an answer by the end of the week, and if he came he would begin his work July 1.

Mr. Hollingsworth commended those churches which were giving regularly and systematically to the associational missions fund and, he urged all others to begin doing something in regard to it at once.

The session was brought to a close with prayer by Hoyt Roberson.



### CONSTITUTION

- 1. The Association shall be composed of members chosen by the different churches in our Union and duly sent to represent them in the Association, who, on producing letters from their respective church certifying their appointment, shall be entitled to their seats. Each church shall be entitled to three delegates, the ministers being ex-officio.
- 2. In the letters from the different churches is to be expressed their numbers in full fellowship, those baptized, received by letter, dismissed

by letter, excommunicated and dead since last Association.

- 3. The members thus chosen and convened shall have no power to lord it over God's heritage, nor shall they have any special power over the churches. They shall not infringe upon any internal right of any church in this Union.
- 4. The Association shall have a Moderator, Vice-Moderator, and Clerk who shall be chosen annually by the suffrage of the members present.
- 5. New churches or any regular church of Christ being locally dismissed by letter by any sister Association upon application and delegates, shall be admitted to our Union.
- 6. Every church in the Association shall be entitled to representa-
- 7. Every query presented by any member of the Association shall be once read and before it is debated the Moderator shall put it to a vote, and if there is a majority for it being debated, it shall be taken into consideration and be debated, but if there be a majority against it, it shall be withdrawn.
- 8. Every motion made and seconded shall come under the consideration of the Association except it be withdrawn by the member who made it.
- 9. The Association shall endeavor to furnish the churches with the minutes of their precedings. The best method of accomplishing this purpose shall be at the direction of the future Associations.
- 10. We think it is absolutely necessary that we shall have an Associational fund for defraying the expenses of the same. For the raising and supporting of which we think it to be the duty of each church in the Union to contribute annually such sums as they may think proper and send it by their delegates to the Association. The money thus raised shall be deposited in the hands of the Treasurer, appointed by the Association, who shall be accountable for the same. He shall pay the money out from time to time as the Association may direct.
- 11. There shall be an Association book kept wherein the proceedings of the Association shall be regularly recorded by the secretary appointed by the Association, who shall receive a compensation yearly for this service.
- 12. The minutes of this Association shall be read and corrected, if need be, and signed by the Moderator and Clerk before the Association rises.
- 13. Amendments to the plans or form of government may be made at any time by a majority of the Association when they deem it necessary, by giving the churches twelve months prior notice.
  - 14. The Association shall have power:

To provide for the general union of the churches.

To endeavor to preserve a chain of union among the churches.

To give the churches the necessary advice in matters of difficulty.

To inquire into the cause why the churches fail to represent themselves at any time in the Association.

To appropriate the money contributed by the churches for an Associational fund to any purpose they may think proper.

To have power to withdraw from any church in their Union who shall violate the rules of this Association or deviate from the orthodox principles of religion.

To correspond with sister Associations.

To invite any Baptist in the ministry to a seat in the Association, who may be present at the time of their sitting.

To adjourn the Association to any future time and place they may think proper and most convenient to the churches of the Union.

### RULES OF DECORUM

- 1. The Association shall be opened and closed with prayer.
- 2. Only one person shall speak at a time, who shall arise from his seat and address the Moderator. The person thus speaking shall not be interrupted in his speech by any except the Moderator, till he is done speaking.
- 3. He shall strictly adhere to the subject and in no wise reflect upon the person who spoke before him as to make remarks on his steps, failings, or imperfections, but shall fairly state the matter as he can do so as to give his views or ideas.
- 4. No person shall abruptly break or absent himself from the Association without liberty obtained from it.
- 5. No person shall rise and speak more than three times on any one subject without liberty from the Association.
- 6. No member shall have liberty of laughing during the sitting of the same or whispering in the time of public speaking.
- 7. No member shall address another in any other appelation than that of brother.
- 8. The Moderator shall not interrupt any member in, or prohibit him from speaking until he gives his light on the subject, except he break the rules of this decorum.
- 9. The names of the several members of the Association shall be enrolled by the Clerk and called over as often as required by the Association.
- 10. The Moderator shall be entitled to the same privilege of speech as any of the other members, provided the chair be filled. He shall not vote unless the Association be equally divided.

The Moderator recognized C. J. Farthing, Vice-Moderator, who asked for the roll call of the churches. Thirty six churches answered and messengers from other churches came in later. Mr. Farthing then presented L. H. Hollingsworth for the Moderator's address. He read John 14:12, led in prayer and as a basis for his message asked the question, "What is the world's and our greatest problem today?" and answered it with "Spiritual and low-level living." He reviewed Christianity from its beginning and brought out that it is a vibrant reality which can change lives as it develops people in the image of Christ. In our hands is not only the charge of the task but the power to perform it if we lay hold on it.

After prayer by J. C. Canipe, the Moderator appointed the following committees: Finance, Carl Day and E. M. Blankenship to work with Clyde R. Greene and Mrs. Blanche Perry; Time, Place and Preacher, Bert Farthing, Joe Coffey, Sr., and Mrs. Nora M. Wilson.

It being time for the election of officers, Mr. Hollingsworth declared the floor open for nominations. Rex West offered the name of C. O. Vance for nomination for Moderator, Oscar Ward nominated Bynum Trivette, Roby Vines moved that nominations cease. The name of Bynum Trivette was presented first and 17 votes were counted for him. When the name of C. O. Vance was presented there was such an overwhelming majority that it was unnecessary to count them. Rex West made the motion that it be made unanimous for C. O. Vance and it was so done. C. J. Farthing nominated Wade E. Brown for Vice-Moderator, Mrs. Nora Wilson moved nominations cease and Roby Vines moved that the rules be suspended and Smith Hagaman cast the vote of the Association for Mr. Brown. E. O. Gore placed the name of Mrs. Blanche Perry in nomination for Clerk. No other name being presented, Mrs. Perry was elected unanimously, Roby Vines nominated Clyde R. Greene for the office of Treasurer, Rex West moved rules be dispensed and R. C. Eggers cast the vote of the Association for Mr. Greene.

The Moderator recognized M. H. Kendall, Mars Mill College, John Roberts, Gardner-Webb College and Guy Cain, general missionary for this western area, who will have his headquarters in Boone.

The report on Christian Education was read by A. E. Moretz and after a motion for adoption was discussed by Dr. Phil Elliott, president of Gardner-Webb College. He stressed the needs of our Baptist colleges and their importance to our denominational program through Evangelism, Christian Education and Social Service. He said the solution of all our problems came back to the fundamental truth that our one great job is to bring people to our Lord Jesus Christ.

The report was adopted as read and discussed.

### CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

All education should be Christian. There is not a great deal of difference between denominational institutions and state or other institutions in academic training. The main difference, and this is a major one, is the personal effect and result that the denominational institution has upon the individual life and leadership. In addition to the non-denominational institutions, the Baptist supported schools provide four years of study of the Bible and training for effective Christian leadership. Even though Bible may be an elective, it offers a systematic analytical study of the Bible under the guidance of a consecrated qualified professor.

The great need of the world today is for consecrated Christian leadership — lay leaders — in occupations offering the greatest opportunity for Christian influence. The major objective of our Baptist institutions is to produce this type of leadership. The enrollment in both secular and denominational institutions is going to increase over a period of the next five years. There will be a greater demand than ever for support of our denominational institutions.

It is urgently recommended that we give of our time, money and prayers. You are urged to support and give guidance to the Baptist Student Union groups as well as our denominational institutions.

Degrees are available in a Southern Baptist college or university in every major subject except agriculture. Twenty nine of the fifty one are senior colleges offering a bachelor's degree. Nine offer the master's degree, and one offers the Doctor of Philosophy and Doctor of Education degrees. Of these institutions there are seven in North Carolina—two senior colleges and five junior colleges.

#### REPORT ON ASSOCIATIONAL MISSIONS

The Missions Program of the Three Forks Association has taken on a progressive and forward look. The program itself is that working together of the churches for the advancement of the Kingdom of God in a better way here in the Association. We are delighted in the fine spirit of cooperation from most of our churches. More churches are supporting the work in a financial way now than ever before, having adopted the suggested budget for their church which was presented to the Association last year. In view of the fact that we believe and hope our associational missionary will be able to give his full time to this work soon, we urge the churches to continue, and if possible to increase, their support of this work and that the churches doing nothing in this way yet will join with us immediately in this great work.

Through this program during the last year, the organizations of our association and those of many of our churches have been increased and strengthened; more Vacation Bible Schools have been conducted; our associational camp with its program has been enlarged; we have had a Simultaneous Rural Church Enlargement Revival with many of our churches participating; and our associational missionary has been supported.

Herewith is a report of part of the work Brother Hoyt Roberson has been able to do through Associational Missions during the thirteen months he has been our missionary. Let us bear in mind that Brother Roberson is only giving half of his time to this work and is serving the other half as pastor of the Bethel church where God is blessing in a wonderful way.

Middleton family, formerly of Cove Creek church, now missionaries to Chile, home on furlough, were recognized. Announcement was made of the night session of the Association at Brushy Fork and Wednesday's session at Bethel.

R. C. Eggers came to the platform for the morning worship service. A song was sung, Ronda Earp led in prayer, Mr. Eggers read Matthew 6:19-23 and led in prayer. He announced his subject, "Laying Up Treasures." Some of the treasures we may lay up are: A dedicated life, prayer life, life of service, life of stewardship and love for all people, especially the unfortunate ones. He closed with prayer which included thanks for the bountiful lunch.

# AFTERNOON SESSION

Rex West led in the song service, and Glenn South read John 14:1-6 and led in prayer.

Herbert McCoy, new pastor at Zion Hill, was recognized. Mr. Hollingsworth expressed appreciation for the work of the churches and cooperation of the pastors and people during his term as Moderator, and commendation for the newly-elected Moderator, C. O. Vance. He named for the Resolutions Committee A. E. Moretz, George Hagaman, and Robert Greene. With stirring words he presented the gavel to Mr. Vance who accepted and presided for the remainder of the afternoon session.

The report on Benevolences not being ready, Mr. West made the motion that the report be read later but discussed at this time. Mr. Vance recognized James Hayes, superintendent of Homes for the Aging. Mr. Hayes introduced W. K. McGhee who spoke briefly on the growth in size and development of work, equipment and so forth, of the Baptist Hospital. Mr. Hayes spoke on the growth of the Baptist Homes for the Aging and called attention to the bulletins and pamphlets already distributed, which explained the operation of the Homes. He also mentioned the Orphanage, but this was to be presented more fully on Wednesday.

## REPORT ON BENEVOLENCES

When we hear the word Benevolences we immediately think of our Orphanage, Hospital. Homes for the Aging and Old Ministers' Relief The ministry of each of these is increasing each year. Our childrens' homes at Thomasville and Kinston are both our care and our blessing as they continue to minister to needy children of our land. We are proud of our Hospital and the service it is rendering. Our Baptist Homes, now in their sixth year, always have a waiting list. They are putting forth their best efforts to render a ministry of security, comfort, congeniality, and Christian love to its residents. We would recommend that our ministers join the Old Ministers Retirement Plan and lead the churches to support it that they might be adequately taken care of when they have reached old age and declining health.

Homer Greene read the report on Missions and moved its adoption. Mr. Vance introduced H. K. Middleton, missionary to Chile, who spoke to the report. He read Matthew 9:36-38 and stirred our hearts as he spoke of the world task of God's people. It is a challenging responsibility that God would have us see. He spoke feelingly of the Baptist work in Chile and closed by saying that the most blessed thing is to hear God's voice and follow it. The report was adopted.

## REPORT ON MISSIONS

Ours is a global mission. Jesus said in Matthew 28:19-20, "Go ye therefore, and teach all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost; Teaching them to observe all things whatsoever I have commanded you: and, lo, I am with you alway, even unto the end of the world, A-men." John 20-21, "Then said Jesus to them again, Peace be unto you: as my Father hath sent me, even so send I you." It has been said "that missions is not a function of a department of a church, but is the identifying element in every Christian." Missions is not optional, but is a must for we believe that the Gospel is to be shared with others.

Just as charity begins at home, but does not end there, so the home is a good place to start but we must go beyond the confines of our own interests into the regions beyond, even unto the uttermost part of the earth. In doing this we know that state missions undergirds world missions. In our state there are still areas that need churches, thousands that do not know our Lord, and many churches that need to be strengthened. As we endeavor to reach our state for Christ we are strengthening our efforts to win our world to Him.

The Home Mission Board is particularly seeking to make Christ known within the territory of the Southern Baptist Convention. It ministers to the Chinese, French, Italians, Indians, Japanese, Russians, and Spanish speaking peoples. The Board extends its ministry in Negro and Jewish work.

We also have churches and mission stations in Alaska and a number of missions in Cuba, Panama and the Canal Zone where there is a possibility of organizing churches. The work among the migrants is making progress. There are about 750,000 migrants in the convention territory. Also there is the pioneer ranch ministry, the summer student mission program in which students from 23 states and 6 foreign countries work. There is also the mountain mission program, city mission program, rural church work, a ministry to military personnel and our work among the Jews by visitation and preaching. We now have more than 1,324 missionaries working through the Home Mission Board.

The Foreign Mission Board has 1,058 missionaries laboring for our Lord in 35 countries around the world which represents the maximum world witness of more than 8,000,000 Southern Baptists. Whereas we have 1,058 missionaries we adequately have the potentiality of no less that 3,000. We lay upon the altar annually \$10,000,000 for Foreign Missions but could lay \$30,000,000 for a world-wide witness.

For over 30 years the Cooperative Program has been an effective channel through which Southern Baptists have supported all our missionary, educational and benevolent work. As we give through the Cooperative Program, we preach, teach, minister and give the Gospel to the whole world.

May we support all our work with our prayers and with our gifts.

# NIGHT SESSION

Rex West led the song service which opened the night service at Brushy Fork church. C. J. Farthing, vice-moderator, presided. He recognized W. R. Eaton, assistant pastor of Boone Baptist Church, who brought the evening devotion. After some comments, he read Hebrews 6:1-12 and led in prayer.

Mrs. Nora Wilson read the report on Camp Joy, moved its adoption and discussed it, assisted by Rex West, John

Ward and C. J. Farthing.

## REPORT OF CAMP JOY

"Magnify Christ," the camp theme for this year, is our aim in all activities of Camp Joy. Many of you have had a part in this through your prayers, your promotion and participation in the development, youth camps, and other meetings.

Outstanding in the development is the construction of the new building, 40 by 60 feet, which was begun June 18 and was ready for use by July 7. The cost in cash was \$2,732.80 with \$836.92 being donated in labor and materials, making a total of \$3,569.72. The amount of \$2,850.00 which included interest for a year, was borrowed — to be paid in three annual payments. This building, used for assembly and recreation, added much to the camping program this year and will prove to be a great asset in the future activities. Other projects were the purchase of a refrigerator and mattress covers by the Associational W. M. U., and the putting in of three showers and three bath booths.

During the year Camp Joy has been used for 22 different meetings by various church groups, B. S. U., youth camps and colored camps. It is hoped that more of the churches will make plans to use the camp during the coming year.

Five youth camps were held during July and August, one for each of the following: 12-15 year girls, 9-11 year girls, 9-15 year boys, 4-6 year boys and girls, and 6-8 year boys and girls. Also, the youth camps sponsored two night meetings in the churches for everyone with emphasis on Y.W. A.'s and missions. We are grateful for all those who worked in these camps and meetings. Many of our own consecrated

men and women, Mrs. Sara Funderburk of Lexington, S. C., Miss Beverly Neilson and Mr. Lloyd Jackson from the state W. M. U. force, and Mrs. H. K. Middleton, missionary to Chile. The Lord's blessings upon all the efforts are most gratifying. In the three camps for junior and intermediate age boys and girls, there were 93 in attendance and of this number there were 25 professions of faith in Christ, 23 rededications, and 9 who felt the call to definite service. "And the name of the Lord was magnified." Acts 19:17. The mission offering from all the camps was \$31.95.

The youth camp plans for 1957 include: Monday to Friday camps for 9-11 year girls, 12-15 year girls, and 9-15 year boys; one-day camps for 4-6 year boys and girls, and 6-8 year boys and girls; and an evening meeting for 16-24 year girls.

The table on Camp Joy carries more detailed information on the youth camps, the use of the camp, and the churches and others having a part in the support of Camp Joy.

"Thank you," two little words with big meaning, to all who have in any way had a part in the work of Camp Joy. We desire your continuing prayers and cooperation.

U. work in Chile, through all the organizations, we were challenged to be more faithful in our work here. The report was adopted.

### REPORT OF WOMAN'S MISSIONARY UNION

We should like to ask you some questions concerning our work and answer them with verses of Scripture, which carry a special meaning to all W. M. U. workers.

- 1. In what attitude do we go about our work? "We are laborers together with God." I Cor. 3:9. We receive joy and assurance from Rom. 14:17, "For the kingdom of God is not meat and drink; but righteousness, and peace, and joy in the Holy Spirit."
- 2. What is the central theme kept before us as we plan our work? "And as Moses lifted up the serpent in the wilderness, even so must the Son of man be lifted up." John 3:14. Our annual W. M. U. meeting was held at Three Forks Church. Mrs. Frank Pool, missionary from Cuba, spoke to us. She showed us how people are drawn to Christ when He is lifted up to them. One of our needs is for more missionaries to be sent to places where they do not know Christ.

- 3. As we seek to enlist others in the kingdom work, what need do we try to show them? "Say not ye, there are yet four months, and then cometh harvest? behold, I say unto you, Lift up your eyes, and look on the fields; for they are white already to harvest." John 4:35. We now have reported 16 W. M. U.'s and 26 youth organizations.
  - 4. What do we emphasize in our Missionary Fundamentals?
- A. Prayer both individual and group. "And all things, whatsoever ye shall ask in prayer, believing, ye shall receive." Matt. 21:22.
- B. Study. "Study to show thyself approved unto God, a workman that needeth not to be ashamed, rightly dividing the word of truth." 2 Tim. 2:15.
- C. Stewardship. "As every man hath received the gift, even so minister the same, one to another, as good stewards of the manifold grace of God." 1 Peter 4:10.
- D. Missions. "And ye shall be witnesses unto me both in Jerusalem, and in all Judea, and in Samaria, and unto the uttermost part of the earth." Acts 1-8b.
- 5. What about our Missionary Education of Youth? "Let no man despise thy youth: but be thou an example of the believers, in word, in conversation, in charity, in spirit, in faith, in purity." 1 Tim. 4-12. To guide the young people in our association we have Sunbeams, G. A.'s, R. A.'s, Y. W. A.'s, study courses, seasons of prayer and Camp Joy.
- 6. What special help do we give to Christian Education? "Thou therefore, my son, be strong in the grace that is in Christ Jesus. And the things that thou hast heard of me among many witnesses, the same commit thou to faithful men, who shall be able to teach others also." 2 Tim. 2:1-2. We have had love offerings for: Margaret Fund, Carver School, our Seminaries, our Denominational Colleges, our four Seasons of Prayer, and our local Scholarship to Fruitland.
- 7. How do we help our Benevolent Institutions? "We then that are strong ought to bear the infirmities of the weak, and not to please ourselves." Rom. 15:1. We urge the continued and generous support through the churches of the Baptist Hospital, the Baptist Orphanage, the Baptist Homes for the Aging, and providing linens for the Baptist Hospital.

May the women of Three Forks Association so plan, live, and do the Lord's work that the Holy Spirit can come in and abide with us and continue to bless our work.

# SECOND DAY

At 9:00 a.m. Wednesday morning the Association began its session with Rex West leading the singing of "All Hail the Power." For the morning devotion M. D. Hart read John 1:35-46 and led in prayer.

C. J. Farthing, vice-moderator, presided. He recognized Hoyt Roberson, pastor of the host church and then called for the report of the Executive Committee. Mrs. Blanche Perry read the report and R. C. Eggers moved its adoption, C. O. Vance discussed Point 1, C. J. Farthing Point 2, and Clyde R. Greene Point 3. The report was adopted.

## REPORT OF EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

The Executive Committee met 6 times during the Associational year with an average attendance of 12. It heard reports from the Associational Missionary and Treasurer, all of which were encouraging; approved requests for aid from General Board for Blowing Rock church and Associational Missionary; pledged its support to the Church Enlargement Revival which was held in April: approved Rex West to serve in the capacity of Sunday School Superintendent — made vacant by the resignation of Kent Brown — until the end of the associational year; expressed its willingness for the construction of the proposed new building at Camp Joy, provided satisfactory financial arrangements could be made; approved the use of Camp Joy by colored group from Charlotte and reacted favorably to the request that other denominations be permitted the use of the Camp.

The Committee makes the following recommendations:

- 1. The Executive Committee has studied carefully the results of its associational missions program, is well-pleased, and feeling the time has come to launch out into a full-time program, recommend that the Association look with favor on the establishment of a full-time program of associational missions and that the Association give the Executive Committee authority to go ahead with plans for work on a full-time basis with expectation that it will be done by the time of the next Fall Session.
- 2. The Executive Committee favors the efforts of those leaders in charge, for planning and projecting weeks of instruction for preachers, deacons, and teachers, a School of Missions and a Simultaneous Revival Campaign and recommend that plans for these be begun and executed as plans mature.

3. There are some things needed to carry out an effective program at Camp Joy. The Executive Committee recommends that the following, listed in order of their importance, be projected as possible: 1. Miscellaneous repairs needed to the buildings for their preservation; 2. An electric range for cooking facilities, replace present sink with a three-compartment sink and suitable cabinets. (The present stove is completely beyond reasonable and satisfactory use. The three compartment sink is a standard requirement to meet the specifications of the State Board of Health.) 3. Build a fireplace in the new building. (This is considered essential for cold or rainy weather.) 4. Roads improved and graveled, a masonry retaining wall above the kitchen. 5. Playground improvements and additional new equipment. 6. Cabins for visiting workers. 7. General clean up of the grounds. It is planned for next year to have more meetings in order to meet the needs for more age groups in the spiritual training and facilities provided by Camp Joy and the workers.

C. J. Farthing, Chm. of Executive Committee

The Training Union report was read by Mrs. Blanche Perry and the Sunday School report by Rex West. There was no Brotherhood report ready. The reports were adopted as read with discussion to be later.

## TRAINING UNION REPORT

We have been made to realize that the most effective growth in the kingdom work of God is slow and steady, founded upon deep convictions and practical aims rather than emotional and spasmodic upheavels. During the past year three new Training Unions have been organized in our Association. It is heartening to all of us who try to take an active part in this type of work to see more and more people interested in the training of church membership.

We have endeavored during the past year to follow the Baptist program in a practical way as it applies to our local situation. We have been made to realize more and more that we will do well to seek the advice of our denominational leaders in regard to the program of our denomination. These people are not available to tell us what to do but instead to advise us when we ask.

Our Training Union work this year has included a successful "M" night meeting at which time the yearly program was brought before us, also a "Youth Night" rally which was very successful in that we all, including our young people, were inspired and challenged for greater efforts in God's kingdom.

In order to succeed we cannot dwell upon the past but instead we need to survey our petentialities and plan for the future. The harvest in Three Forks Association is so white and ready for reaping. We find ourselves at a place where we can go forward or if we become complacent we are sure to fall behind.

We recommend that more churches participate in the Training

Union tournaments, and with the services of the Associational Missionary available follow his and the Training Union staff leadership expecting great things of God.

## SUNDAY SCHOOL REPORT

The Apostle Paul in his letter to Timothy admonishes him to, "Study to show thyself approved unto God." This has been and should continue to be the ministry of the Sunday Schools in our association. We feel that God's Word has been made more real to the people in our Association by this ministry during the past year, and many have studied when the Bible has been taught in the Sunday Schools.

We feel that the Sunday School has a very vital place in every church in enlisting, winning and making disciples for Christ and we are encouraged at the interest being shown by the churches in their use of this important agency of the church.

Under the very capable leadership of Mr. Kent Brown and his associates, our associational Sunday School work has progressed very much during the last few years. But due to his health he tendered his resignation as Sunday School Superintendent to the Executive Committee early in the associational year. This resignation was accepted and for several months the organization functioned without a superintendent. However in the April meeting of the Committee Rex West was elected to serve the remainder of the associational year.

We have had 12 associational Sunday School meetings (one each fourth Sunday afternoon) which have been very challenging, inspirational and informative. These meetings have been well attended but attendance could be improved greatly if each Sunday School in the Association would cooperate in making an effort to have all of their officers and teachers present. In several of these meetings we have had group conferences for officers and teachers where methods of enlistment and study have been discussed as well as problems encountered in the individual class room and Sunday School. We have also had an inspirational message at each of these meetings which has proven very helpful in our Sunday School work.

There have been 22 churches having Vacation Bible schools during the past year. These report a very good enrollment, attendance, professions of faith, dedications and several joining the churches. Also a very good offering for world-wide missions through the Cooperative Program has been realized through the Vacation Bible Schools reporting. Therefore, it is hoped that each Sunday School in the Association will see the possibilities which can be accomplished in Vacation Bible Schools and will endeavor to have one in each church within the next year.

We recommend the following:

- 1. That the Sunday School department continue their monthly meetings, endeavoring to enlist every pastor, Sunday School officer and teacher of each church to attend these meetings.
  - 2. To have Departmental Conferences in each of these meetings.
- 3. To have an Associational-Wide Better Bible Teaching Clinic, asking our state Sunday School workers to help.
- 4. That every church observe Bible Study Week in January and Preparation Week in September as suggested by the Southern Baptist Convention, Sunday School Board, as well as one other week of study as the church feels led.

## REPORT ON RELIGIOUS LITERATURE

Nearly 2000 years ago the Apostle Paul said, "Give attention to reading." He knew today, that God's people must read to strengthen their faith, to increase their knowledge, to open their vision, to inspire their minds. Christian literature must ever be dedicated to the furtherance of the Gospel and the whole work of the Lord through His people and His churches. Like some evil flood today, the swelling tide of bad literature has come to deceive all who will, covers and attractive print, as it bedecks every news stand and lures the heedless person to take and read. To stem this ugly tide, is the solid array of well printed, sound Christian periodicals, books, and other good literature to meet every interest.

It is impossible to overestimate the power of the printed page. Words have wings and printed words can get in many places where the spoken word cannot reach. Baptists ought to make much use of Christian literature; much of it comes from Baptist presses. It must be read. promoted, and used widely by our people in their homes and churches. Nowhere can the whole program of Christ be so fully carried, people reached so completely, so constantly, so cheaply and so successfully as through the Baptist Literature.

"The promotion of missions, education, social service and the distribution of sound religious literature" was the main purpose of the Baptist State Convention of N. C. when it was organized in 1830. Shortly afterwards, in 1833, the BIBLICAL RECORDER was founded to help carry out the high aim and purpose of our Baptist forefathers. For 123 years, since the Recorder along with other fine literature that is published by our Southern Baptist Convention has sought to do that, it is the desire of the committee, all the pastors, Sunday School superintendents, Training Union directors, Brotherhood and W. M. U. presidents and all other officers of our churches, to promote the reading of the Bible and all the other literature published by our Southern Baptist Convention.

And His name will be known when we plan an adequate program for all our churches and out of that which is brought into our churches on Sunday morning, share with others.

Mr. Vance recognized Roger Williams, pastor of Mills Home Baptist Church, who represented the Baptist Orphanage. He brought greetings from the Orphanage staff, stressed the Thanksgiving offering and gave thanks for all Baptists are doing for the Mills Home family.

The report on Public Morals was read by G. C. Cox, after motion to adopt it was discussed by Rex Campbell, West Jefferson, and R. M. Haus, representing the Allied Church League. Mr. Campbell said the evils of alcoholic beverages, gambling, cheating in public schools, human relationships, obscene literature, divorce and juvenile delinquency will be solved in social life when we solve them in our individual life. Mr. Haus spoke of Committment Day in Baptist churches the first Sunday in December and referred to the petitions being sent to the 1957 General Assembly. R. C. Eggers, chairman for Watauga county, stated that the petitions had been distributed and urged those who hadn't signed to do so. The report was adopted.

## PUBLIC MORALS

As to a report on Public Morals, I can not give to you a statistical report. I can say what all of us know, that many people. including many church members, are not living up to the moral principles which God has outlined for us in His Holy Word, and which the Lord Jesus Christ proclaimed to us in His preaching and teaching. We need only to "lift up our eyes and look on the fields," and there we see the report on Public Morals; we see evil, all kinds of evil.

We see the distilling, and the sale, and the consumption of alcoholic beverages; we see the liquor dealers trying to force liquor stores upon the people of every city, town and village; we see them promoting an aggressive and concerted program of publicity and education to get everybody they can to drink, and especially the young people. We see alcoholics, broken homes, sorrow and suffering, poverty, disease, death, and hell resulting from the sale and use of alcohol as a beverage.

We see immorality. We see separation and divorce of husbands and wives, and broken homes and scattered families. We see juvenile delinquency to the extent that even our national government is alarmed. We see intoxicated drivers, hot rod and drag racing on our highways.

Seeing these evils, we hear the Lord Jesus Christ say, "The evil one has done it: the one whose nature and being is evil, and whose aggressive and concerted program is evil; "The evil one has done it."

The antidote to this evil one and his evil program is Jesus Christ as Saviour and Lord of sinful men, and His Gospel and teachings lived out in their lives. Therefore the Southern Baptist Convention, of which we are a part, is at this very time, promoting a crusade for Christian Morality, and is calling on every Baptist State Convention, and Association, and Church and pastor, and church member to unite in an aggressive and concerted Crusade for Christian Morality. This program is a five point program with emphasis as follows:

- 1. The need for PERSONAL REGENERATION as the foundation of morality. The entire program will stress the need for spiritual rebirth as the first step toward a life that is pleasing to God, morally sound, and beneficial to others.
- 2. The importance of HONESTY in all areas of life. Personal integrity, good business ethics, uprightness in government, and mutual fairness between capital and labor are some of the phases of this subject which need vigorous restatement and renewed committment in the light of prevailing conditions.
- 3. The imperative of CLEAN LIVING. The accepted moral standards of our day have departed widely from God's commandments. A clear call must be sounded to personal chastity, purity in thought and word, loyalty to marriage vows, and a higher level of sexual morality in literature and entertainment.
- 4. The practice of CIVIC RIGHTEOUSNESS in personal, community, and national life, Christian concepts of the responsibilities of citizenship must be recognized as the only answer to lawlessness and crime, to gambling and vice rings, and to corrupt practices in government.
- 5. The necessity for ABSTINENCE FROM ALCOHOLIC BEVER-AGES on the part of Christians. Christian people must give the answer of personal abstinence to the growing practice of social drinking. Education in the evils of strong drink must give the rebuttal to the unscrupulous publicity and sales campaigns of the makers of alcoholic beverages.

Fellow Christians of the Three Forks Baptist Association, let us accept this basic and aggressive Five Point Program for Christian Morality, and let us preach it and teach it in our churches and in our homes, and let us live it out in our personal lives.

# REPORT OF AMERICAN BIBLE SOCIETY

There are two missionary principles which are true in all lands. People must have the Bible because it presents Jesus Christ, the one hope of men and nations and each person must have the Bible in his own language because it speaks to his heart as no other language can speak. The Bible itself is a missionary. It goes where the human missionary cannot go. It can stay on after he must leave — and keep on speaking to a man's heart.

The American Bible Society aids in Bible translation, publishes the Scriptures without note or comment and distributes them without profit, usually below cost. For the Blind it supplies Scriptures in raised-letter systems and on Talking Book records. The Bible Society serves every form of Southern Baptist mission work around the world.

During 1955 the American Bible Society distributed throughout the world almost 15 million volumes of Scriptures. Southern Baptists support the work because the Bible Society serves mission work and because Southern Baptist missionaries depend on the Society for Scriptures they need for distribution in their own work. Southern Baptist churches should give to the American Bible Society. The help of every church is needed. Has your own church given this year? Please send your gifts to our Baptist state office marked for The American Bible Society.

C. O. Vance expressed his willingness to be of service to every church in the Association and his desire to visit every church.

# PROCEEDINGS OF THE SPRING SESSION OF THREE FORKS BAPTIST ASSOCIATION

The Spring Session of Three Forks Baptist Association met with Howard's Creek Baptist Church May 22, 1956 with representatives from 22 churches present.

W. M. Hodges led the song service which opened the meeting, the theme of which was "Baptists — Opportunities

and Challenges."

L. H. Hollingsworth, Moderator, declared the Spring Session in order, expressed appreciation to Howard's Creek church and Glenn South, pastor, for the privilege of meeting there, recognized the 14 pastors present, A. E. Moretz, minister but not pastor, and Lloyd Culler, Lenoir.

Glenn Huffman read selected passages of Scripture, com-

mented briefly and led in prayer.

Mr. Hollingsworth introduced Rev. W. P. Biggerstaff, representative of the Allied Church League of North Carolina,

who presented a petition which he urged all eligible voters of Watauga county to sign and send to the 1957 General Assembly requesting a state-wide referendum on the question of the manufacture and sale of alcoholic beverages in North Carolina. Quoting facts and figures he showed that 50% of crime is alcohol-related and a program of prevention is needed as well as rehabilitation. He closed by saying that to combat the evil there should be a program of legislation, education and evangelism.

Following Mr. Biggerstaff's suggestion that the county be organized, Mr. Hollingsworth stated that R. C. Eggers had agreed to serve as general chairman for circulating the petition among the churches and people and he and Hoyt Roberson would work with him.

Julian Hopkins, newly elected secretary of Evangelism

for North Carolina, was introduced.

After singing "Revive Us Again" Mr. Hopkins read 2 Timothy 4:1-5 and stirred hearts to self-examination as he spoke on the Southern Baptist Convention program of Evangelism which he said was Christ-centered, Bible-based and all-demanding.

W. M. Hodges led another song service followed by announcements and the introduction of Paul Phipps, pastor of Meat Camp and Proffit's Grove churches, who led the morning worship service. He read Mark 6:32-44 and M. D. Hart led in prayer. Taking as his subject, "Jesus seeing the multitudes," he related his message to those which had already been brought and challenged us to see a lost and needy world as Jesus saw it.

Raymond Hendrix pronounced the benediction and included thanks for the noon meal which followed.

# LUNCH

After the song service following lunch, Hoyt Roberson

led in prayer.

C. J. Farthing presided over a brief business session. Stressing the opportunities of Camp Joy for ministering to the people not only of our own county but of other places also, he explained the urgent need for another building. He asked that the Association authorize the Executive Committee to study intently the need for the building, and if the decision is favorable, work out a long range plan whereby the building could be constructed this year without impairing any other phase of our associational program. Roby Vines made the

motion which, with brief discussion, was adopted. Mr. Farthing then announced a special called meeting of the Executive Committee for May 25 at Oak Grove to discuss the need.

Mr. Hollingsworth announced the program committee to plan for the Fall Session of the Association: James Sherwood, chairman, Paul Phipps, Glenn South, and Mrs. Rex West.

The Executive Committee asked the Association to approve its decision to let the colored group from Charlotte use the facilities of Camp Joy again this summer, explaining that they would invest \$150.00 in the upkeep of the camp if allowed to do so. A. E. Moretz made the motion which was seconded by R. F. Townsend and approved.

The closing message "Baptists and their Doctrines" was brought by Mr. Hollingsworth. Following the reading of scattered verses from Paul's letter to Galatia, he spoke on the very heart of Baptist beliefs, ably and forcibly discussing each — Baptists are unanimously agreed on: 1—The Lordship of Jesus Christ and no other; 2—Primacy of the Scriptures; 3—Priesthood of the believer. He stressed that we be loyal to God, to the need of humankind, and dedicate our all to the work of the Lord.

The hours of fellowship and worship, which had been informing, inspiring, and challenging, were ended with prayer by Mr. Hollingsworth.

# MINUTES OF THE WOMAN'S MISSIONARY UNION OF THREE FORKS BAPTIST ASSOCIATION

Mrs. Blanche Perry, Superintendent, presided when the forty-third annual session of Woman's Missionary Union was held at Three Forks Church April 10, 1956, beginning at 4:00 P.M. The theme of this session was "His Commission... Our Mission."

The meeting began with the singing of our missionary hymn of the year, "The Kingdom Is Coming."

For the devotional period Rev. C. O. Vance, pastor of Oak Grove Church, read some select passages of scripture. Rev. Maurice Cooper sang "Open Mine Eyes That I May See," after which Rev. Vance led in prayer.
