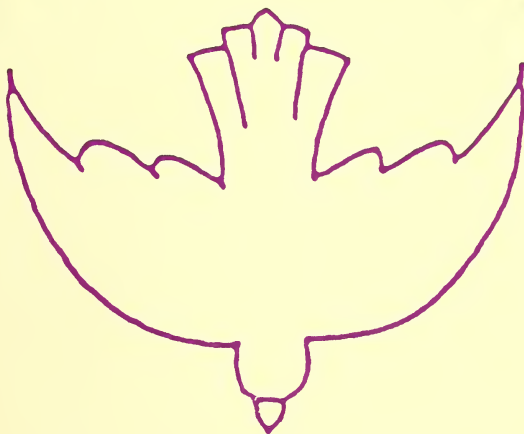

COLUMBUS BAPTIST ASSOCIATION
1996 SPRING MEETING
March 25, 1996

1. The Columbus Baptist Association was called to order at 7:20 p.m. for the 1996 Spring Meeting at Smyrna Baptist Church on Monday, March 25, 1996 by Mr. Robert Howard, Moderator. Smyrna Choir had given a beautiful pre-session concert prior to the opening session, under the direction of Mr. Mel Herring and Mrs. Dot Long at the piano. Mr. Howard expressed thanks to Smyrna Choir.

2. Rev. Merle Johnson, host pastor, gave a warm welcome to messengers and visitors and offered the invocation.

3. Rev. Corey Dawkins led the congregation in the hymn, "Ring the Bells of Heaven". Mrs. Marlene Johnson was pianist and Mrs. Dot Long served as organist.

4. Rev. C. F. McDowell made a motion from the Program Committee and Evangelism Committee to adopt the program, which carried.

5. Mr. John Holcomb, Interim Director of Missions, recognized Dr. Jerry Stanley, pastor at Piney Forest, and Rev. Stanford Roberts of Sweet Home, as new pastors.

6. Rev. Willie McLawhorn introduced the Director of Missions candidate, Rev. Richard "Rick" Astle.

7. Rev. Astle brought a beautiful devotion on his favorite word in the Great Commission, "therefore", using Matthew 28:19-20 as his text.

8. Rev. Dawkins led the congregation again in singing, "Send the Light".

9. Mr. Howard called attention to the written reports in the packet of material for each messenger. Those reports included the Nominating Committee report, Missions Development report, W.M.U. report, Financial report and the Christian Social Ministries report. Also included was proposed changes to the Constitution to be addressed at a later date. He then recognized Mrs. Margaret Evans, Missions Development Team director, who has just returned from South Africa, on the association's behalf, in planning work there for us. Our association is paired with two others in North Carolina and our area of work is in an Eastern province around the city of Port Elizabeth. Our work there will be mainly to build and start churches and organize Sunday Schools.

10. The Nominating Committee report was presented by Dr. Ray Lundy, after which he made a motion for its adoption, which was carried. This report appears elsewhere in these minutes. Mr. Howard recognized the newly elected officers by asking them to stand.

11. Dr. Tony Fulbright, Chairman of the Director of Missions Search Committee, presented the Director of Missions candidate, Rev. Richard "Rick" Astle. He thanked the Search Committee and the Association for their patience and prayers while they searched for the right person to fill this position. Dr. Fulbright listed several suggestions received from leaders in the association regarding the Director of Missions. He should be an administrator, mature Christian, a good listener, have a Master of Divinity from a Baptist college or university, a good communicator, a good counselor, have a good leadership ability, be a pastor's pastor, be a visitor, and be a person with a vision. These attributes were considered by the Search Committee, and Dr. Fulbright gave an indepth background of the committee's work which led them to Rev. Astle. Rev. Astle is married to Donna (Strickland) Astle, formerly of Lumberton, and they have a son, John. A copy of Rev. Astle's resume was provided to messengers in the handout packet. On February 13, 1996, the Associational Council, upon recommendation of the Director of Missions Search Committee, voted unanimously to recommend to the Association in session that Rev. Astle be called as Director of Missions. In addition, during called meetings on March 8, 1996, Rev. Astle met with the Associational Council at 5:30 p.m. and then followed with a joint Associational Council and Executive Committee meeting at 7:30 p.m. All comments from those meetings have been favorable. On behalf of the Associational Council, Rev. Willie McLawhorn, Vice Moderator, nominated Rev. Richard "Rick" Dale Astle as Director of Missions. Upon voice vote, the call was unanimous.

12. Rev. David Todd brought two resolutions. One resolution was concerning the call of Mr. Astle as Director of Missions and the other pertained to the host churches, Smyrna and Union Valley. These resolutions were adopted, and are attached hereto and made a part hereof.

13. Rev. Dawkins led the congregation in singing, "Rescue the Perishing".

FALL PROCEEDINGS

1. The One Hundred Ninety-Second (192nd) Annual Fall Session of the Columbus Baptist Association was called to order by Mr. Robert Howard, Moderator, at 2:00 p.m. on Tuesday, October 22, 1996 at Antioch Baptist Church. Pleasant Plains Church assisted the host church with the meal.
2. The meeting began with the congregation singing, *"I Love to Tell the Story"*. Mrs. Kay Inman served as pianist and Mrs. Dot Thompson led the music.
3. A warm welcome was extended by Rev. David Watts, pastor of Antioch.
4. Rev. C. F. McDowell made a motion for the adoption of the printed program. The motion came from the full approval of the Executive Committee. The motion carried.
5. Rev. Rick Astle, Director of Missions, brought the devotion using John 9:1-4 as his text. He focused on the three words found in verse four: "the night cometh." Rev. Astle urged us to humble ourselves before a holy God, and to confess sins such as apathy, pride, jealousy, and a lack of a burden for lost souls. He said our first matter of business for this Annual Meeting was the matter regarding the condition of our own hearts, and then Rev. Astle led us in prayer.
6. Rev. Astle recognized Rev. Scott Hagaman, Associate Pastor and Minister of Youth and Education at Whiteville First. Rev. Hagaman began his ministry since our Spring Meeting. Rev. Astle then recognized Mrs. Wanda Meares and Mrs. Karen McPherson for their ministries as secretaries in our Association.
7. Mr. Terray Suggs gave the Treasurer's report. He announced that the principal balance on the building debt today is \$10,432.
8. Rev. Astle presented the Committee on Committees report and made a motion for the adoption of this report. The motion carried.
9. Rev. J. Wade Fowler brought a recommendation for changes in the Constitution. This motion was tabled until the evening session. This recommendation appears elsewhere in these minutes.
10. Rev. David Gary used I Thessalonians as his reference during a moment of silence for Our Beloved Dead, after which he led in prayer.
11. Rev. Astle recognized Rev. David Gary, past President of the Pastors' Conference, Rev. Willie McLawhom for serving as Vice-Moderator and Mr. John Holcomb as our former Interim Director of Missions. Rev. Astle then made a special presentation to Mr. Robert Howard, who has served as Moderator the last 2 years. He served in this capacity from October 19, 1994 until October 22, 1996.
12. The congregation joined together in singing, *"Praise Him! Praise Him!"*.
13. After a brief break, Rev. Steve Bailey gave the ASSISTeam report. Two goals for this team for the new year include personal consultation and group training.
14. Rev. C. F. McDowell reported for Discipleship Training. Discipleship Training teaches discipline and basic Bible skills. It has all age-level groups. There are 3 levels of Bible drills which are the church, Association and state. Several of our Association churches participate in Bible drills.
15. Mrs. Dot Thompson reported that 136 children had participated in a workshop to teach singing and acting. Mrs. Thompson promoted the many music festivals for the coming year. The directors' luncheons will be held the second Thursday of each month in the new year.
16. Dr. Jim Lankford brought the Evangelism report and encouraged us to take advantage of upcoming training opportunities that will be made available. He challenged us to win more souls to Christ.
17. Rev. Willie McLawhom brought the Executive Committee report, and described the past year as one of transition. The focus has been the call of a new Director of Missions. A new sign has also been erected identifying the Association Office building.
18. Mrs. Latha Smith gave a report of some of the things that Woman's Missionary Union has been involved with. Some of the events include ministry at the County Fair with the carnival workers, the upcoming prayer retreat, and personal witnessing workshops. She promoted the upcoming prayer breakfast, Annual Association W.M.U. meeting and the state W.M.U. meeting.
19. Rev. David Todd presented the Nominating Committee report. He brought a recommendation from this committee to elect Rev. Eddy Bunton as the Association Youth representative and Rev. Corey Dawkins as the Worship Resource Leader. The motion carried.
20. Mrs. Margaret Evans brought the Missions Development Team report. Thirty churches participated in the World Missions Conference. There is a need to know the location of migrants in the county. Attendance at the lake ministry was the highest on record. The literacy council is in need of more volunteer tutors. Gifts are always welcome at the Help Mission. Mrs. Evans thanked the Association for sending her to South Africa. She told us the people in Africa are hungry for the gospel and eager for us to visit them. There is a request for a construction crew and one literacy worker at the present time. This is a 5-year partnership.
21. Rev. Eddy Bunton led the congregation in singing, *"O Worship the King"*.
22. Dr. Roger Gilbert introduced the guest speaker.
23. Rev. Jim Lambert made a presentation on behalf of the Annuity Board. He encouraged ministers to plan ahead, and churches to give retirement consideration to their pastor and staff.
24. The congregation joined together again in singing, *"Ring the Bells of Heaven"*.
25. Dr. Leon Thomas asked God's blessing on the evening meal.

26. The evening session was called to order at 7:00 p.m. by the Moderator.
27. Rev. Corey Dawkins led the congregation in singing "*He Keeps Me Singing*".
28. The invocation was offered by Mrs. Ruby Spivey.
29. Rev. Tom Womble, Area Missionary, was recognized.
30. Mrs. Phyllis Elliott, a Baptist Foundation representative, promoted the Foundation and used 2 Corinthians 8:10-11 as her text.
31. The Constitution changes recommendations were carried. Those changes included the adding of a Building and Grounds Committee guidelines, terminology in regard to incorporation, responsibilities and term of office for the Trustees, as well as adding a Youth representative, and Worship Resource Leader.
32. Mr. Leo Mercer brought a recommendation and motion to accept the Proposed Budget. The motion carried. He reported the balance to date on the building debt is \$10,432.78 at 6.50% interest rate.
33. Rev. Merle Johnson announced the disaster recovery trailer plans are in progress and that donations will be appreciated. Plans are also in progress to build a home next summer for a needy family in our area.
34. Rev. David Todd brought a resolution and motion for its adoption. The motion carried.
35. Mr. Charlie Martin gave the Time, Place, and Preacher Committee report and a motion for its adoption. The motion carried. This report appears elsewhere in these minutes.
36. Mr. Howard thanked Mr. John Holcomb for his work as Interim Director of Missions.
37. The congregation joined together in singing, *Crown Him With Many Crowns*".
38. Rev. Rick Astle introduced the guest speaker.
39. Rev. David Todd used Matthew 10:32-39 as his text for the Annual Sermon. He spoke of the need for a spiritual awakening in our worship and in evangelism. Rev. Todd said it is time for God's Church to "stand up and be counted."
40. "*I Surrender All*" was the closing hymn of the session.
41. Mrs. Dot Thompson rendered a solo entitled "*He Is Lord*" as special music.

MISSIONS DEVELOPMENT TEAM

The Missions Development Team was very busy this past year.

The World Missions Conference, February 25-28, 1996, was very successful with thirty churches participating. Twenty-four (24) churches reported 6,133 in attendance. Services began at the Sunday morning worship service and concluded on Wednesday evening. A Missions Fair was held at the local National Guard Armory and was well attended. A special thanks to all who helped or participated in any way. **To God be the Glory!**

Rev. Mike Taylor worked with us in our migrant ministry again this year. Services were held at Cerro Gordo and Clarendon. Several professions of faith were reported. We would like to say thanks again to Rev. Taylor for working so faithfully with the migrant ministry the past 3 summers.

The lake services, coordinated by Mr. Willis Horton, were the best attended ever this season. A grand total of 1,026 persons attended and an offering of \$1,749.26 was received for this self-supporting ministry.

Plans are in progress for the Missions Development Team, the Evangelism Committee and the Woman's Missionary Union to work together in a cooperative effort to have more involvement at the County Fair from all the churches, with more emphasis on evangelism.

I would like to again express my appreciation to the Association for your trust and support in allowing me to serve our Lord Jesus Christ and represent the Columbus Association in the five (5) year partnership with the Baptists of North Carolina and the Baptists of South Africa. The planning trip in March was very rewarding as well as successful. There are so many needs to be met. Some project requests are beginning to arrive. The opportunities are there, but the specifics have to be worked out between South Africa and the Baptist State Convention. We ask that you continue to pray for this partnership.

Mrs. Ruth Whitley continues to work with the literacy program. Anyone interested in helping someone learn to read, write, learn E.S.L. (English as a Second Language), or work with the migrant ministry, should contact Mrs. Whitley at 642-2442.

The Missions Team would like to begin a ministry in the rest homes in the county in the future.

Thanks to the support of many of the Columbus Baptist Association churches, as well as numerous other denominations within the county, the Help Mission had another successful year helping the needy in our communities. The annual report reveals that 3,139 people were served in one way or another with clothing, food, emergency funds for medications, rent, utilities, plus furniture, and household items for "burn-out" families. In March, 1996, Rev. Ed Vogt (Hallsboro) was elected as Help Mission Board Chairman and has given leadership and many hours of service to the ministry effort. Rev. Ray Yow (Calvary) has served as Help Mission Chaplain during the year, conducting devotions for staff and clients on a weekly basis. Mr. Lindy Williamson (Evergreen) has faithfully served as grounds keeper for the year, and Mrs. Betty Holcomb (Piney Forest) continues to serve as Help Mission Director. The food pantry was very active during the year, thanks in part to the September visit by Hurricane Fran. For the year, 163 food baskets were prepared, feeding a total of 706 people. Once again, response to emergency funds requests fell far short of the needs due to shortfalls in monthly donations by churches and individuals. We continue to solicit monthly budgeted support from all churches and ask those not yet contributing to please consider doing so. An ongoing need for volunteers to assist during the twice weekly days of operation, plus other routine cleaning and maintenance of building and equipment is also a priority. Pray for this local ministry outreach, serving local people. Thanks.

BAPTIST HOSPITAL REPORT

During the year the 18 to 40 chaplains present at various times at the Hospital made over 55,000 pastoral contacts.

As of July, 1996, the counseling centers will be called CareNet, Inc., of The North Carolina Baptist Hospitals, Inc. Over 26,000 hours of counseling were provided through the eleven centers across the state of North Carolina. Two additional centers will open in the Fall of this year.

The Center for Congregational Health has, since inception in 1992, provided ministry at some level to over 225 North Carolina Baptist Churches.

Mission dollars from the Cooperative Program enabled the above ministries to be carried out and to touch thousands of lives.

North Carolina Baptists joined us in a mutual mission through the Mother's Day Offering. We channeled every penny of the Mother's Day Offering, which amounted to \$461,647, to help patients who had no health-care insurance and no financial means to pay their hospital bills. We are grateful to everyone who made this ministry possible.

Since it's founding in 1922, the Hospital has taken pride in our ministry of service. In doing so, we seek to make tomorrow's patient care and tomorrow's workplace constantly better. That has been our mission historically, and it continues to this day. I firmly believe that our best lies ahead, and I am committed to that reality.

CHRISTIAN ACTION LEAGUE REPORT

In a recent survey released by the Family Research Council, 66% of those polled said that our country was headed down "the wrong track". When asked whether the nation's wrong direction could be attributed to the lack of jobs and economic health or a decline in moral values and family breakdown, over 60% indicated the latter. We, at the Christian Action League, agree that our state and nation need a restoration of biblical, moral and family values. In 1996 we were honored to assist communities in their battles for civic and moral righteousness and to promote laws in the General Assembly that have helped to restore family values to the State of North Carolina.

Christian Values. The Christian Action League joined with other Christian organizations to promote Christian Heritage Week in North Carolina, March 17-23. The week culminated with an awards ceremony and reception for the winners of the state-wide essay contest and their families.

The League undertook a project in association with the American Rights Coalition to distribute thousands of copies of the Ten Commandments throughout North Carolina. To date, over 5,000 copies of the 11 X 14 prints have been distributed throughout the state to individuals and churches.

Lottery. We saw renewed efforts to push a lottery bill through the General Assembly for a state-wide referendum. Representative Fitch introduced two lottery bills: HB 6060 (Rules Committee) and HB 838 (JIL Committee). The League actively lobbied against these bills and both bills died in their respective committees. North Carolina continues to be the largest state in the nation and the only state in the Bible belt with no state-sponsored gambling. Please keep us in prayer as the League faces this battle each year.

Sex Education. CAL actively lobbied for HB 834, Abstinence Until Marriage, a law that mandated that abstinence until marriage be the focus in sex education in North Carolina schools and was passed in the 1995 session.

Homosexuality. CAL participated in efforts to get SB 1487 (No Same-Sex Marriage) passed during the short session of the General Assembly. The bill passed both houses and became law.

We alerted our members in the Winston Salem area about the Family March on June 30 and encouraged them to notify their churches to participate. This march was in response to the homosexual community march held in that city. The Family March attendance was estimated at 8,000.

Abortion. The League actively supported Representative Decker's HB 624, a Woman's Right to Know. This bill would have required the doctor to share vital information with the patient about the risks of abortion and would require a 24-hour waiting period. We were disappointed that the bill did not pass this session; however, we will work for its passage again next session.

Alcohol. CAL assisted several communities in setting up an organization to combat liquor referendums.

We are living in times when the Christian community needs to exercise spiritual discernment and stand strong for Biblical principles that further righteousness, strengthen families and bless our state and nation. We are grateful to God for the prayer and financial support that the League receives from the churches of the Associations that allow us to be on the front lines in this spiritual warfare.

FOREIGN MISSION BOARD REPORT

We will lead Southern Baptists to be on mission with God to bring all the peoples of the world to saving faith in Jesus Christ.

As in the past years, our Lord has abundantly blessed the work of the Foreign Mission Board through countless ways. We wish to thank all Southern Baptists for their roles which undergird the Foreign Mission Board. Without the concerted, cooperative effort of all Southern Baptist churches, the work and mission of the Foreign Mission Board would be only a shadow of its present position.

We are distinctly privileged to follow our Lord's command found in the Great Commission. Each year brings us closer to taking the gospel to all nations (best rendered as ethno-linguistic people groups),

The following annual growth levels reflect the combined reports from all foreign mission points as of the start of this year.

- A record number of newly constituted churches: 2,612
- Total number of countries where missionaries reside: 131
- Total number of baptisms overseas: 287,806
- Number of new people groups touched by the gospel: 41
- Baptisms among least-reached peoples: 6,548
- Total number of missionaries: 4,129
- Total number of short-term volunteers: Over 15,000
- Total number of newly appointed missionaries: 544
- Record amount of Lottie Moon Offering: \$89.9 million
- Number of new cities opened to the gospel: 528

Southern Baptists support the Foreign Mission Board in multiple ways. Daily prayer assistance tops the list. Likewise, sacrificial giving through the Cooperative Program and the Lottie Moon Christmas Offering have provided innumerable opportunities to spread the Gospel. As missionaries preached, taught, healed and counseled, you were there. The Foreign Mission Board counts it an honor to partner with you to spread the Good News of Jesus Christ to every shore.

CHRISTIAN HIGHER EDUCATION REPORT

Thank you, Churches, for your support of Christian Higher Education through the Cooperative Program.

Thank you, North Carolina Baptist Churches, for your support of Baptist colleges and universities in North Carolina.

We are beginning our 111th year of providing quality Christian Higher Education in North Carolina. We are also providing opportunities around the world, including our campus in Kuala Lumpur, Malaysia.

There are nearly 6,000 students, representing all 50 states and 40 foreign countries enrolled in our Baptist colleges and universities.

HOME MISSION BOARD REPORT

The Home Mission Board (HMB) is a missionary-sending agency of the Southern Baptist Convention (SBC). With national offices in the Atlanta, Georgia area, the HMB's purpose is to serve Southern Baptists by assisting churches to proclaim the gospel of Jesus Christ, start and grow New Testament congregations, and minister to people in the name of Christ.

As of December 31, 1995, there were 4,857 missions personnel serving in the United States, the Caribbean, Guam, American Samoa, and Canada. The HMB also has endorsed more than 2,400 chaplains who are serving in healthcare agencies, institutions, businesses, the military, and pastoral-care roles. Nearly 2,300 Mission Service Corps volunteers are serving on home mission fields. During the year there were 1,458 church starts, the second highest number in 10 years. Southern Baptist churches baptized 393,811 people in 1995, an increase of nearly 15,000 over 1994.

Approximately half of the HMB's support comes from the annual Annie Armstrong Easter Offering for Home Missions. In 1995, gifts to the offering totaled \$38,908,339, the largest in HMB history. One hundred percent of the offering goes to support the work of home missionaries in the field. The 1996 Annie Armstrong Easter Offering goal is \$42 million. About 35 percent of the HMB's income comes from the denomination's Cooperative Program.

The following is a summary of program/support ministry highlights from 1995:

Chaplaincy Ministries - The 2,412 Southern Baptists now serving as chaplains and pastoral counselors reported more than 27,000 professions of faith. During the year, 179 Southern Baptist ministers were endorsed for the first time by the Chaplains Commission of the SBC.

Church Loans - The Church Loans Division closed 98 church loans totaling \$25 million, including \$3.4 million of refinancing.

Language Missions - Home missionaries in the Language Church Extension Division worked among 106 ethnic groups and 98 American Indian tribes, using 106 languages and dialects, in addition to sign language.

Volunteers - In 1995, more than 70,000 persons served as volunteers. They were responsible for leading more than 5,600 people to Christ.

Prayer and Spiritual Awakening - The Home Missions Intercessory Prayerline received 82,000 calls in 1995.

Mass Evangelism - This department assisted in implementing the *Here's Hope. Jesus Cares for You.* Harvest Revivals. An estimated 25,000 to 35,000 churches participated in some portion of the *Here's Hope* emphasis.

COLUMBUS BAPTIST ASSOCIATION DIRECTOR OF MISSIONS

1. PERSONAL AND INTERPERSONAL COMPETENCE

- Must be a disciple of the Lord Jesus Christ, called to Christian vocation and keep in constant fellowship with the Master's will.
- Has insight into the needs of individuals and groups, capacity to respond to those needs and be especially sensitive to the needs of local congregations.
- Look to Associational Council for counsel, encouragement and support.
- Due to the nature of the work of the Columbus Baptist Association, all matters pertaining to the inter-working of the association shall be kept in strictest confidence.
- Mature in financial dealings, careful in indebtedness and sensitive toward the payment of bills, good example of stewardship in his own church.

2. GENERAL TRAINING AND EXPERIENCE

- Recognizes wisdom of continuing education and takes advantage of available opportunities.
- Should be a graduate of one of our Southern Baptist Colleges, Universities, or Seminaries.
- Proven worker as a pastor, minister of education, a denominational worker, Director of Missions or has served in some combination of these service ministries.

3. LEADERSHIP ABILITY

- MUST BE ABLE TO:
- Plan, project and promote work of the Association
- Inspire, motivate others
- Remain impartial and objective in dealings with pastors, churches, and associational workers
- Supervise work of others and delegate authority, and
- Evaluate effectiveness of programs and initiate improvements.

4. WORK RELATIONSHIPS

- Responsible to the Associational Council of the Association and work in close cooperation with the Moderator who is chief executive officer of the Association.
- Meet with the Associational Council at regularly scheduled meetings, giving them a report of the work, making plans for the future, and consulting with them about matters pertaining to work of the Association.
- Report to the Columbus Baptist Associational meetings.
- Assist in strengthening Sunday School, Discipleship Training, Brotherhood, Woman's Missionary Union and other denominational programs.
- Work in harmony with and be available to pastors in the Association, offer aid and service to churches, as needed
- Promote interest in the Cooperative Program and all the denominational agencies.
- Lead in maintaining relationships with the North Carolina State Convention and Southern Baptist Convention agencies.

5. BASIC FUNCTIONS

He shall provide responsible leadership in the work of the Association through performing such basic functions as the planning, correlation and implementation of programs, program services and ministries of the Association; counsel to churches; interpretation of information; friendship with pastors, and good public relations.

6. SPECIFIC DUTIES

A. Administration

- Administrate policies and instructions of the Association and its Associational Council as governed by the Constitution and By-Laws of the Association.
- Work closely with associational officers, committees and organizations to help each group determine its opportunities and objectives based on the needs in the churches and the community at large and to help them devise procedures and programs to respond to these needs.
- Keep up to date information on trends within the area of the Association that will influence community and church life, such as shifts in population, economic condition, new recreation facilities and the like.
- Encourage churches to respond to new ministries made available to the Association.
- Correlate work of all organizations and committees in the Association and publish annual calendar of activities.
- Serve as an ex-officio member of all committees of the Association.
- Inform the leadership and other concerned persons of the Association's work through the publication of a monthly newsletter.
- Provide input in the purchasing of equipment and supplies within the approved budget (equipment and supplies are the property of the Association and is to remain in the Associational Office.)
- Cooperate with the State and Southern Baptist Convention agencies informing them of the needs, opportunities and potentialities within the Association, and provide churches with knowledge of assistance available from these agencies.

B. Counselor-Shepherd

- Counsel with church leaders as requested in reference to program and procedures in their churches, calling a pastor or other staff member, church objectives, policies and the like.
- Assist pastor less churches as they request help in finding interim pastors and pulpit supplies.
- Assist as requested pastors and churches in regard to actual or threatened breaches of fellowship and call upon Associational Council to assist when deemed necessary.
- Offer friendship and assistance to all pastors of the Association and their families in times of crisis and give special attention to the new pastors and their families as they move into the Association.
- Assist pastors and others in counseling those who are called into church related vocations.
- Act as a minister-at-large to persons who choose him for support and guidance, doing this in such a way so as not to discredit any pastor or to jeopardize own effectiveness in the oversight of the work of the Association in this activity.

C. To The Churches

- Acquaint himself with the churches of the Association, so as to know how best to respond to them as needs arise.
- Give special attention to visiting the churches for worship and fellowship.
- Visit churches by invitation of the pastor or other church leaders to assist or strengthen the programs and ministries of the churches in a variety of areas. Examples are: pulpit supply, study courses, missionary addresses, deacons' schools, assembly programs, special day addresses, ordination services, VBS planning and programs, to interpret phases of Associational work, budget planning, building planning, revival meetings stewardship drives, long-range planning, studying and evaluating procedures, curriculum, constitutions and by-laws, church-community surveys and the like.

D. Associational Office

- Responsible for the work of the Associational Office.
- Supervise maintenance of all office equipment, buildings and grounds.
- Formulate annual budget for operating the Associational Office.
- Use the office in carrying out of duties.
- Use the office to assist the associational officers, committees and heads of organizations in the promotion of their work.

7. THE DIRECTOR OF MISSIONS IS TO HAVE A CLEAR UNDERSTANDING OF THE TERMS OF EMPLOYMENT

- The prospective DOM and the Selection Committee of the Association will agree that acceptance of the work is within the will of the Lord Jesus Christ before being recommended. The Association employs its DOM upon the recommendation of the Associational Council and by vote of the Association in the annual session or by the Executive Committee between sessions.
- The DOM is employed for an indefinite period of time. Normal retirement will be age 65. However, a person can serve on with re-evaluation annually to age 68. The Associational Council will have the task of re-evaluation. The Association may terminate the services of the DOM by a two-thirds vote, provided 60 days notice is given before services are terminated. The DOM may terminate his services, provided 60 days notice is given to the Associational Council. By mutual agreement of the DOM and the Association or the Associational Council/Executive Committee, the 60 days notice may be waived.
- Regarding salary: The salary of the DOM and items related to it are as in the approved budget of the Association and are subject to change upon the recommendation of the Finance Committee and the approval of the Association.
- The DOM salary needs to be reviewed every year with consideration of the cost of living, and adjusted as appropriate.
- When the DOM is requested by any church, pastor within the Association to: (1) supply for a pastor on vacation or for any other temporary absence, (2) conduct a revival or (3) teach study courses, any honorariums or remuneration shall be for the personal use of the DOM.
- The DOM shall not accept any interim pastorate. Limited supply preaching may be done only by invitation of an associational church without a pastor for not more than two (2) consecutive Sundays or (2) Sunday services a month, and in real emergencies as approved by the Associational Council.
- Regarding special engagements: The DOM is free to accept two (2) weeks in any church-calendar year outside the Association in revival meetings, mission studies and the like.
- Concerning time off: The DOM shall earn 2 weeks (10 days) of vacation per year of employment, not accumulated, and taken in keeping with the ebb and flow of the work. Sick leave is earned at 2 weeks (10 days) per year of employment and may be accumulated up to three (3) years. In cases of extended illness, and should sick leave be exhausted, the DOM is to confer with the Associational Council. Upon termination of employment, unused vacation may be paid at the appropriate salary rate, but unused sick pay is not reimbursed. The DOM is to confer with the Moderator in scheduling vacation and other extended time away from the work and to inform the Associational Council in advance about such times when it would prove helpful.
- Concerning moving expenses: The Association will assume the responsibility for expenses of the DOM's move to the field.

8. SPECIAL CONSIDERATIONS

- This job description is looked upon primarily as a description of the DOM's work as presently conceived, and as such is to be taken seriously. Changes in the job description should be made in consultation with the DOM and when possible prior to employment.
- Finally, the Associational Council pledges itself to a ministry of loyalty, support and loving encouragement of the DOM, so that under the leadership of the Spirit of God, the most effective service possible may be rendered.

ADMINISTRATIVE ASSISTANT GUIDELINES

POSITION ASSIGNMENT:

- Position Title:** Administrative Assistant
Recruited By: Director of Missions in consultation with the Associational Council, who approves employment.
Reviewed By: Director of Missions who prepares the incumbents performance review for the Associational Council annually, prior to the July meeting of Council.

WORKING RELATIONSHIP:

- Accountability:** Works under the direct supervision of and reports to the Director of Missions.
Works Cooperatively With:
The Associational Council, all committees, and member churches but specifically with the Director of Missions in providing secretarial services and assistance necessary to carrying out his/her responsibilities.

BASIC FUNCTIONS:

Secretary to the Director of Missions, providing such secretarial and clerical support as required by the ministries of the Columbus Baptist Association. Also serves as financial clerk to the Association.

RESPONSIBILITIES:

- I. Hours of Work: The Administrative Assistant shall work 40 hours per week to include associational meetings as required. The Director of Missions shall be responsible for coordinating the Administrative Assistant's overall schedule to maintain office hours and meetings as required.
- II. Administrative Assistant Functions:
 - A. Receptionist
 1. Serves as receptionist during office hours. Answer phones, maintain a log of calls, answer inquiries and communicate messages to the Director of Missions and appropriate associational persons in a timely matter.
 2. Receive all visitors to the associational office and refer them to proper persons to meet their needs.
 - B. Secretarial:
 1. Serve as correspondence secretary to the Director of Missions. Duties to include, but not limited to:
 - a. Receive and distribute mail.
 - b. Prepare correspondence for signature.
 - c. Maintain appropriate files.
 2. Operate, maintain and control access to all office equipment. Keep necessary inventories of all office equipment.
 3. Assist the Director of Missions in gathering and preparing copy, layout, paste-up, duplication and distribution of the associational newsletter.
 4. Assist the Director of Missions in recording and maintaining minutes of meetings involving the Council and associational committees, including Spring and Fall general meetings of the Association.
 5. Perform light janitorial duties in the office.
 6. Maintain office supplies, postage and other inventories necessary to accomplish business of the association.
 7. Maintain appropriate database system for the Association as well as paper and electronic filing systems.
 8. Look for opportunities for in-service training and professional improvement, reporting discoveries to the Director of Missions.
 9. Perform any other duties as assigned by the Director of Missions.
 10. With approval of the Director of Missions, may be part of any church secretarial groups that are a part of the Columbus Baptist Association, North Carolina Baptist State Convention or the Southern Baptist Convention.
 - C. Bookkeeper/Financial Clerk (working in consultation with Associational Treasurer and Finance Committee).
 1. Keep a record of all contributions and provide appropriate records to contributors as required. All financial records will be in accordance with IRS regulations/requirements.

2. Keep and produce as necessary all financial reports for the association and its various committees.
3. Work closely with the Finance Committee to provide such information and reports as may be requested. Assist in the preparation of the annual budget and related stewardship matters.
4. Prepare payroll checks, and payroll tax returns for withholding, FICA, North Carolina State Tax, and applications for North Carolina Sales Tax refunds.
5. Pay all financial obligations of the Association after obtaining proper approval. Deposit money withheld monthly.
6. In cooperation with the Treasurer, be responsible for developing, implementing and expanding the use of computer and software technologies related to the financial needs of the association.
7. Keep the Director of Missions/Finance Committee informed about problems which might occur that is or may be out of line with the associational approved budget.
8. Keep accurate records of salaries, salary increases, and other items as may pertain to associational staff.

MINIMUM REQUIREMENTS FOR POSITION:

1. Equivalent education level required: Graduate of an accredited business school.
2. Experience required:
 - a. No less than three years experience as Administrative Assistant.
 - b. Skilled in General Accounting and automated record keeping.
3. General:
 - a. Strong working knowledge of office procedures and related functions.
 - b. Ability to relate to other staff professionally and in a Christian spirit.
 - c. Manageable and flexible, to cope with changes.
 - d. **Due to the nature of the work of the Columbus Baptist Association, all matters pertaining to the inter working of the Association shall be kept in strictest confidence. Any breaches of confidentiality will result in dismissal.**

Note: All public communications regarding the work of the Columbus Baptist Association will be approved by the Director of Missions, the Moderator or other authorized person.

Constitution and Bylaws

PREAMBLE

We, the messengers of Baptist Churches of Columbus County, do hereby propose to establish and maintain the order and rules of a District Association in conformity to the following plan:

ARTICLE I. NAME

This organization shall be known as the Columbus Baptist Association Incorporated.

ARTICLE II. OBJECTIVES

The objectives of the Association shall be to elicit, combine, and direct the energies of Columbus Baptists in advancing the Redeemer's Kingdom throughout the earth, more especially along the lines recommended and adopted by the Southern Baptist Convention, the North Carolina Baptist State Convention, and the Association itself, to promote the fellowship and good will among the churches; and to devise and promote measures for increasing the harmony, intelligence and spiritual powers of the churches.

ARTICLE III. MEMBERSHIP

Section 1. This Association shall be composed of regularly constituted Baptist churches in Columbus County that shall be represented at its regular or special meetings by duly elected messengers in the following ratio: (1) Three (3) for the first one hundred members or fraction thereof, and one for fifty (50) additional members, but provided that no church may have more than ten (10) messengers. (2) All ordained ministers who are serving as pastor within the Association, Associational Officers and Committee Members.

Section 2. Messengers shall be members in good standing with the church they represent, and their names must appear on the letter from their church to the association to entitle them to be seated as messengers.

Section 3. The Association shall be sole judge of its membership, and may reject or receive churches applying for membership therein at its pleasure, provided that the churches so received shall come under the watch care of the Association for a period of one year. During this period such church or churches shall be entitled to all the rights and privileges of the Association except that of their members voting or holding office. At the conclusion of this period, should no valid objection be raised, they become members in regular standing by action of the Association.

Section 4. The Association shall encourage the organizing of new Baptist Churches within Columbus County under the leadership of any pastor, church, churches, or interested persons of the Association. If a new church contemplates being received into the fellowship of the Association after its organization, those who are to compose its charter membership and those leading in its organization are urged to seek counsel of the Executive Promotion Committee and shall proceed with the organization only after approval is given.

Section 5. A church seeking admission into the Association shall present its application to the Credentials Committee and furnish the Committee with such information as it may require about the church. The Committee may then recommend that such church be received under the watch care of the Association for the period of one year from the date of that Associational Meeting.

Section 6. The Association may, at any time, dissolve connection with any church that becomes disorderly in practice or that fails to represent itself either by messengers or letter for two (2) consecutive sessions without sufficient reason or that ceases to be missionary in practice. The support of the causes fostered by the denomination at large and of this Association in particular shall be the test of each church as a missionary body.

Section 7. The New Testament shall be accepted as the sole guide in matters of doctrine and practice, and the Association shall reserve the right to withdraw fellowship from any church that does not conform thereto.

ARTICLE IV. POWERS AND PREROGATIVES

The Association shall have no power whatsoever to infringe upon the *rights* of the churches. It may advise or recommend matters to the usefulness for their adoption and guidance but cannot bind them in any way. All the churches constituting the Association remain sovereign and independent bodies and unite only that they may more effectively promote the causes of Christ throughout the world.

ARTICLE V. DUTIES OF CHURCHES

It shall be the duty of each church to appoint messengers, to insist upon their attendance at Associational Meetings, to contribute toward the expense of the Association, and to send annually a report to the Association which gives information requested in forms provided by the Associational Clerk.

ARTICLE VI. ORGANIZATION

Section 1. The General Officers shall be a Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, Historian and three (3) Trustees. *The Associational Staff shall be non-voting ex-officio members of all committees and councils.*

Section 2. Additional Officers shall be the Associational Director of Sunday School, Discipleship Training Director, W.M.U. Director, Brotherhood Director, Music Director, Library Director, Chairman of Evangelism, *Worship Resource Leader, Youth Representative* and others as needed including a full slate of organizational officers as recommended by the Educational Division of the Baptist Sunday School Board.

Section 3. The Nominating Committee shall recommend the officers to the Association. However, the Association reserves the right to make other nominations for any and all offices and committees.

Section 4. The offices of the Clerk and Treasurer may be held by the same person.

Section 5. The General Officers and additional officers are specified in Section 2 of this Article shall be elected at the Spring Session and shall be installed and assume their duties at the close of the Fall Session of the current year and continue their duties until the successors are installed at the next Fall Session unless removed for cause, or until their successors are appointed.

Section 6. The term of office for Moderator and Vice-Moderator shall not exceed two (2) years in succession. All other officers may be re-elected to succeed themselves in office at the pleasure of the Association.

Section 7. All officers and committees shall be members of the churches affiliated with the Association.

Section 8. The term of office for all members of committees shall be for three (3) years. One-third of the members shall be elected annually.

Section 9. Vacancies in these offices or committees that may occur between the Annual Session of the Association shall be filled for the remainder of the Associational year by the Executive Promotion Committee.

ARTICLE VII. DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Section 1. It shall be the duty of the Moderator to preside when the Association is in session and serve as Chairman of the Executive Promotion Committee. The Moderator shall also appoint a five (5) member Committee on Committees within ten (10) days after the Annual Association Meeting.

Section 2. It shall be the duty of the Vice-Moderator to preside in the absence of the Moderator and to assist him in every way possible and to succeed to the office of Moderator if and when during his tenure the office of Moderator becomes vacant.

Section 3. It shall be the duty of the Clerk to keep an accurate record of the meetings of the Association and prepare minutes to be distributed as soon thereafter as possible. He/she shall serve as secretary of the Executive Promotion Committee.

Section 4. It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to keep an accurate record of the money paid into his hands, pay all bills as they become due and to make an annual report to the Association. He/she shall make a written report of the financial condition to the Associational Council and provide written reports to the Executive Promotion Committee when requested. He/she shall make a monthly report to the associational office. He/she shall be a member of the Finance Committee.

Section 5. It shall be the duty of the Historian to collect minutes of each session of the Association and have these bound into book form every ten (10) years and to assist in any way possible in keeping records of the history of the Associational office. He/she shall submit a short history of two (2) different churches at each Annual Meeting to be incorporated into the association minutes each year until all churches have a written history in the minutes. The churches shall be taken in alphabetical order. Any new church shall be put at the bottom of the list.

Section 6. It shall be the duty of the Associational Director of Sunday School, Church Discipleship Training Director, W.M.U. Director, Music Director, Brotherhood Director and Library Director to lead in the promotion of the activities of the organization of which he/she is head, and to preside over the meetings of the organization. These officers shall bring a report of their work to each quarterly meeting of the Associational Council.

Section 7. It shall be the duty of the Trustees to hold in trust all property of the Association. *Trustees shall serve as Directors of the Corporation. There shall be three trustees for a 3-year rotating system with the Chairperson to be the Trustee that will be rotating off.*

Section 8. *It shall be the duty of the Worship Resource Leader to educate, inform, and encourage the local churches, helping them to realize the importance of worship, identify worship styles of churches in the Association, personally promote associational, regional and state sponsored worship events, and provide input for worship at associational meetings.*

Section 9. *It shall be the duty of the Youth Representative to help educate, inform, and encourage local churches to realize the importance of establishing and maintaining a youth ministry, and to coordinate ministry activities throughout the Association."*

Section 10. All reports, both Associational and Denominational, shall not exceed three hundred (300) words except the Treasurer's Report and the Director of Missions report.

ARTICLE VIII. RULES OF ORDER

Section 1. All business shall be concluded and all discussions carried on in the manner prescribed in *Roberts Rules of Order Revised*.

Section 2. *The method of voting shall be by show of hands, or by the will of the body.*

Section 3. The simple majority shall prevail in all cases except as otherwise provided in this Constitution, provided that any member may at any time call for a written ballot or roll call.

Section 4 A ruling by the presiding officer shall be final unless appeal be had from such ruling to the entire body present.

Section 5. A question having been decided twice by vote in the same attitude at a regular session of the Association shall not be introduced again except by consent of the body as expressed by a majority vote.

Section 6. At least one-fifth of the messengers enrolled shall be necessary to constitute a quorum.

ARTICLE IX. TIME OF MEETING

Section 1. The Spring Associational Meeting shall be held the last Monday night in March each year except when it conflicts with Easter and we delete the April Executive Committee and the afternoon session of the second day during the Fall. The Associational Meeting then would be from 7-9 in March and on Tuesday night and Wednesday morning in the Fall to be held on Tuesday and Wednesday before the 4th Sunday in October. However, in the case of some unavoidable circumstance that makes a change in the date of the annual meeting necessary, with the Associational Council or the Executive Promotion Committee, preferably the Executive Promotion Committee, shall have the authority to change said date provided at least two (2) weeks in advance of the new date for the annual meeting.

Section 2. In the event of some emergency that makes a called meeting of the Association necessary, either the Associational Council or the Executive Promotion Committee shall have the authority to call for a special meeting of the Association, provided that a notice of the time and place and purpose of such a called meeting shall be mailed to the Pastors and Clerks of the Churches of the Association at least two (2) weeks in advance of the time set for the called meeting.

ARTICLE X. THE ASSOCIATIONAL YEAR

Section 1. The Associational year shall begin the first of October and close the last day of the following September.

ARTICLE XI. THE EXECUTIVE PROMOTION COMMITTEE

Section 1. The Executive Promotion Committee shall be composed of the Pastor of each church in the Association, the two (2) members (either men or women) represented by each church in the Association on the church letter, and the following Associational officers: Associational Sunday School Director, Discipleship Training Director, W.M.U. Director, Brotherhood Director, Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, Historian, Music Director, Library Director, and Chairmen of all standing committees.

Section 2. It shall act for the Association in the interim between the annual sessions.

Section 3. The duty of this committee shall be to carry out the policies and will of the Association. It shall not take an action contravening the will of the Association; nor shall it initiate any new policies or practices binding on the Association unless specifically directed, provided: That in an adequate emergency it may take such action as it may deem necessary, but such action shall in every case be submitted to the next meeting of the Association for appropriate consideration. It shall make a full and complete report of its activities at the next Associational meeting. It shall meet quarterly and as often thereafter as is necessary to carry out the policies and will of the Association. A meeting of this committee may be called at any time by the chairman, and it shall be his duty to call a meeting upon the request of any five (5) members of this committee.

ARTICLE XIII. ASSOCIATIONAL COUNCIL

Section 1. The Association shall have an Associational Council composed of the Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, Discipleship Training Director, Sunday School Director, W.M.U. Director, Brotherhood Director, Music Director, Library Director, Chairman of Finance, Evangelism, Missions Committee and Pastor/Staff Self Enrichment Committee of the Pastors' Conference. The representative shall be selected by the Pastors' Conference.

Section 2. The Vice-Moderator shall be chairman of this Council.

Section 3. This Council shall counsel and advise any committee or church in the Columbus Baptist Association on any subject which has been submitted to it.

Section 4. This Council shall meet prior to the regular meeting of the Executive Promotion Committee. The chairman of this Council shall bring to each of the Executive Promotion Committee meetings a report of its work.

Section 5. This Council is responsible for the supervision of the work of the Director of Missions and shall study carefully the program of work for the entire Association and the needs of all the churches. In the light of this study, the Council shall work out an annual Calendar of Activities for the Association to be presented to the Executive Promotion Committee, to run concurrently with the Calendar Year.

ARTICLE XIII. STANDING COMMITTEES AND DUTIES

Section 1. Committee on Committees - This Committee shall be composed of five (5) members which said members shall come from different churches within the Association. (a) It shall be the duty of this Committee to present at the annual meeting of the Association when called upon by the Moderator, a nomination for the membership of all standing committees of the Association unless otherwise provided in this Constitution.

Section 2. Nominating Committee - The Nominating Committee shall be composed of at least five (5) members. The Nominating Committee shall nominate all officers proposed by the Constitution. After they are nominated the Sunday School Director, Discipleship Training Director, W.M.U. Director, Music Director, Baptist Men's Director and Librarian shall enlist and propose a full slate of organizational leaders to the Nominating Committee. After the Nominating Committee makes its report to the Association, nominations shall be in order from floor.

Section 3. Program Committee - The duty of this Committee is to plan the program for the annual meeting of the Association and bring it to the Executive Promotion Committee for discussion and approval. The Committee should begin its work well in advance of the meeting of the Association and should make sure that those requested to make reports are prepared and on hand. Copies of the program should be prepared and distributed to the messengers and visitors at the Associational Meeting.

Section 4. Finance Committee - This Committee should keep a close watch on the needs of the Association for an adequate budget and a well-balanced program of work and should be prepared to bring to the Association in Annual Session a proposed budget. This Committee should also be prepared to advise the Treasurer of the Association during the year concerning the items in the budget to the end that the Association may be kept in a healthy financial condition. It shall be the duty of the Committee to see that an audit of the Treasurer's books be made following the close of the Associational Year and present to each Annual Meeting of the Association.

Section 5. Credentials Committee -

(a) It shall be the work of this Committee to make proper investigation of churches that express a desire to affiliate with the Association concerning their being orthodox in faith and cooperative in spirit, to report to the Association in Annual Session their findings and recommendations concerning the acceptance or rejection of such churches.

(b) If invited, this Committee shall go to any church for the purpose of edifying Christian fellowship.

Section 6. Committee on Ordination:

(a) This Committee shall consist of three (3) ordained ministers presently serving as pastor in the Association and two (2) ordained deacons.

(b) This committee shall serve only in an advisory capacity and, when invited by a church in the Association, shall assist in the examination, preparation and ordination of candidates for the Gospel Ministry.

Section 7. Committee on Evangelism - This Committee should seek to keep alive the fires of evangelism in all meetings of all the organizations of the Association, encourage evangelistic services in churches not reporting baptisms and help provide evangelistic services in unchurched sections within the bounds of the Association, to organize and promote the Simultaneous Revivals, and to promote any county-wide evangelistic services. This Committee shall be organized in accordance with the suggested Southern Baptist Program of Evangelism.

Section 8. Missions Committee - This Committee shall keep alert to any development that may make a church or branch Sunday School necessary, counsel with groups considering a new church or branch Sunday School about the necessity of such organizations, assist in organizing new churches, seek to encourage the best location possible when new churches are formed. This committee shall also, when invited by the Vacation Bible School director or the Director of Missions, assist in promoting and maintaining Vacation Bible School wherever needed in the Association. It shall encourage pastor less, part-time churches to form fields with pastors located as near the center as possible, assist churches when called upon or when there is an evident need, when such is welcomed, to find most suitable pastors, and to serve as a contact for worthy men desiring to become pastors.

Section 9. Committee on Denominational Agencies - This Committee shall consist of one person representing each of the following: Cooperative Program, Baptist Hospital, Children's Homes, Denominational Literature, Homes for the Aging, Baptist Colleges, Ministers' Retirement, and any other causes, agency or institution deemed advisable. It shall be the responsibility of each of these to see that the interests of these causes and agencies are kept before the Association and churches at all times, and that proper report concerning the progress and needs of these causes and agencies are presented to the Associational Meetings.

Section 10. Committee on Libraries - It shall be the duty of this Committee to plan and promote church library work in the Association. It should encourage each church without a library to start one, and help in stabilizing those already in operation. The Committee should assist churches in starting their libraries and help them in organizing their library committee. The Committee should also plan and promote a program of training for all church librarians.

Section 11. Constitutional Committee - It shall be the duty of the Committee to study the Constitution of our Association and to recommend to the Association at its annual session such changes, amendments or revisions as may be deemed necessary and appropriate in accordance with the needs of the Association.

Section 12. Resolutions Committee - It shall be the duty of this Committee to prepare and present to the Association at its annual session such resolutions and other reports as may be appropriate and in order for consideration by the Association.

Section 13. Time, Place and Preacher Committee - It shall be the duty of this Committee to plan and prepare for the sessions of the Columbus Baptist Association and to secure a preacher and alternate for the Fall Session and to do such other acts and things as may be necessary to provide the proper facilities for such annual meetings of the Association.

Section 14. Christian Social Ministries - The work of this Committee is to create an awareness in the Baptist churches of the Association of the teachings and ministries of Jesus Christ in attempting to meet the needs of the total person in light of the Gospel. Workshops will be held to point out needs of persons and possible ways in which we may become involved to meet those needs.

Section 15. Christian Life Council - The work of the Christian Life Council is to be alert and call to the attention any encroachment upon our religious freedom. Working through its chairman it shall report at each Executive Promotion Committee meeting any matter that appears to be in contradiction to our belief.

Section 16. Deacon Representative - The Deacon Representative shall be responsible for seeing that at least one training session (workshop or retreat) shall be conducted for deacons from across the Association during each Associational Year.

Section 17. Energy Consultant - The Energy Consultant will prepare *himself/herself* to the extent that *he/she* will stand ready to make suggestions on how a church may conserve energy.

Section 18. Building and Grounds Committee - *The Building and Grounds Committee shall be composed of five (5) rotating members. It shall be the responsibility of this committee to respond to the needs of the associational building(s) and grounds as they arise. Periodically the committee shall inspect all property to insure proper maintenance, making certain property adheres to all state, county, and city codes. The committee shall be authorized to spend up to three hundred dollars (\$300) for repairs or improvements without approval by the Executive Committee, but in consultation with the Director of Missions. Responsible persons shall be sought to perform tasks of repairs and improvements.*

ARTICLE XIV. REVISION

This Constitution may be immediately revised at any regular session of the Association by a two-thirds vote of the messengers present provided notice of such revision shall be given in the afternoon session and then voted on in the evening session.

COLUMBUS BAPTIST ASSOCIATION

Our Association dates back to 1805 when it was first known as Cape Fear. It existed until 1898. For a long time the Cape Fear Association included churches in Robeson, Columbus, Bladen and Brunswick Counties with some in Pender and a few in South Carolina near the state line.

This was twenty-five (25) years before our Baptist State Convention was organized and sixteen (16) years after George Washington became the first President of the United States.

This southeastern part of North Carolina had been thinly settled, but along about this time a number of families had moved into this section from other parts of this and other states. During the prior half century many Scotch and Irish families had come from Europe and settled along the Cape Fear River and outlying territory.

Religious interest had been rather low in some of this territory and churches were few and far between. A few Methodist churches had been organized and Bishop Asbury made a journey through this section in 1801, organizing some other churches. Some churches believed in missions and some others said that God would save people in His own way and time. In some churches there were men who held to Calvinistic doctrine and beliefs of the Primitive Baptists.

Settlements and farms in this part of the state were widely scattered. Roads were poor and many of the people had very little education. Yet, people at that time appeared to know their neighbors fairly well although their home might have been thirty or forty miles away. Their usual manner of travel was on horseback when too far to walk.

The churches that are members of the Columbus Baptist Association today that were members of the original association and the date of their acceptance are listed here. Porter Swamp entered the association in 1830; Iron Hill in 1831; Pleasant Plains in 1836; Mount Tabor (Tabor City) in 1838; Macedonia in 1839; Western Prong in 1843; Cherry Grove in 1846; Pleasant Hill in 1848; White Marsh in 1852, (which is also the oldest church in our Association, being established in 1765); Whiteville First in 1863; Sweet Home in 1864; Piney Forest in 1869; Cedar Grove in 1870; Gapway and New Hope in 1874; Bogue Chapel (Hallsboro) and Fair Bluff in 1876; Oak Dale in 1884; China Grove in 1890; and Smyrna in 1892.

During the period between the Civil War and the close of the century there were increases in people, farming, roads and schools. There was more interest in church work. In most communities Sunday Schools were organized. Most of the people were poor and living standards continued low for many years. Public schools were available to most children, but usually for only two or three months per year. Many people were illiterate.

In 1888 the first Columbus Baptist Association was formed from churches withdrawing from the Cape Fear Association. This newly organized association remained in existence until 1898. Many of those still existing churches were members. These churches and the year they were admitted to the Association follows. In 1888, New Hope, Union Valley and Whiteville First became members. Williamson's Crossroads joined the Association in 1898, followed by Chadbourn and China Grove in 1891. The year 1892 brought many additions as the Cross Roads (Lennon's), Griffin's Crossroads (Evergreen), Mount Tabor (Tabor City), Macedonia, Oak Dale, Piney Forest, Pleasant Hill and Smyrna were accepted. Then in 1894 Cheerful Hope, Cherry Grove and Porter Swamp became members. This Association did not exist but eleven (11) years and so in 1899 the Cape Fear-Columbus Association was formed.

Those charter members were Bogue Chapel (which changed its name to Hallsboro in 1924); Cedar Grove, Cheerful Hope, Cherry Grove, China Grove, Lennon's Cross Roads, Macedonia, Mount Tabor (Tabor City), Mount Zion, New Hope, Oak Dale, Piney Forest, Pleasant Hill, Pleasant Plains, Porter Swamp, Smyrna, Sweet Home, Western Prong, White Marsh, Whiteville First and Williamson's Crossroads. In 1903 Hinson's Crossroads became a part. Boardman and Union Chapel in 1904, Corinth in 1905, Fair Bluff in 1908. Cerro Gordo and Evergreen in 1909. New Berlin (which changed its name to Delco in 1923) and Lennon's Cross Roads in 1911, Clarendon in 1915, Bolton in 1918 and Union Valley in 1934. Chadbourn and Gapway became members but no dates were given.

In the period before so many churches left the Cape Fear Association there was always a great interest in the annual meeting. Attendance was usually large and the sessions continued from Wednesday or Thursday until Sunday. Many delegates would attend from long distances, considering their means of travel. When the annual meeting was held near a railroad station, some would come by train, but in many cases they came by horse and buggy starting the day before the meeting.

The attendance was large and the people started weeks ahead in preparing for the great number of visitors they expected. It took quite a number of pigs and chickens to feed so many. Many of the homes took more guests than they could take care of, but they were glad to have the privilege of entertaining the folds from other churches. Many times the church building would not hold half the crowd and overflow services were held under the trees in the church yard. Many who attended the Association were greatly interested in religious services, of course, but the social feature was an added attraction. Many of the churches complained if they could not have the associational meeting with their church ever few years.

In 1936 the Columbus Baptist Association was formed with the following charter members. Antioch, Boardman, Bolton, Cedar Grove, Cerro Gordo, Chadbourn, Cheerful Hope, Cherry Grove, China Grove, Clarendon, Corinth, Delco, Evergreen, Fair Bluff, Gapway, Hallsboro, Hinson's Crossroads, Lennon's Cross

Roads, Macedonia, Mount Tabor (Tabor City), Mount Zion, New Hope, Oak Dale, Piney Forest, Pleasant Hill, Pleasant Plains, Porter Swamp, Smyrna, Union Valley, Waccamaw (Lake Waccamaw), Western Prong, White Marsh, Whiteville First and Williamson's Crossroads.

These were followed by Sweet Home in 1940 and Union Chapel in 1941. In 1949 we saw more interest in the denominational work, such as missions, orphanages, and education than was shown generations before.

Churches have continued to be admitted through the years. These include Iron Hill in 1950. John T. Biddle came to serve as Superintendent of Missions on July 1, 1950. Calvary became a part in 1951, Brunswick in 1952, Riegelwood in 1953, Forest Lawn in 1955 and Trinity in 1956.

Mr. Biddle resigned as Superintendent of Missions on June 18, 1956. West Whiteville became a part of the Association in 1959. Henry Powell became Superintendent of Missions on February 15, 1959 and served until July 15, 1961. He was followed by Arch Cree who served from May 1, 1962 until June 1, 1967. William Ross came to us on July 6, 1967.

In 1967 Antioch held its first Homecoming, Cedar Grove completed a new brick structure and Trinity began its prison Sunday School ministry.

In 1968 Antioch observed its Golden Anniversary and Sweet Home erected a new educational building and a fellowship hall. Whiteville First erected a library in February, and Macedonia was offered land for a parking lot on April 14. Also in this year, Oak Dale had land given in May.

On October 19, 1969 Westside held a ground breaking for a new building. On October 26, Trinity held a ground breaking for a new sanctuary.

On June 13, 1970, Brunswick held a note burning. Mr. Ross, Superintendent of Missions, resigned on July 1. We were fortunate in securing Hoyle Langford to become Superintendent of Missions on August 15, 1970. On August 31, Westside was constituted and became a member of the Association. September 30 was the dedication date at Trinity for their sanctuary. November 22 brought the ground breaking services for Oak Dale's new sanctuary and on December 6, Clarendon held a ground breaking for a new building.

In 1971 Faith was organized and became a member of the Association, as well as Friendly Chapel. The year 1971 was a giant stepping stone in the life of Columbus Baptist Association. Property and a house was brought for the associational office at 208 South Thompson Street, Whiteville at a cost of \$10,000. Special cash gifts were received from Cherry Grove RAs, Mount Zion, Pleasant Plains and Union Valley, Marse Grant, Miss Lena Hughes and an anonymous donor. The following items were donated: an occasional chair was given by J. A. Applewhite, drapes for the conference room were given by New Hope, chairs for the conference room were given by Tabor City, drapes for the reception room and office were given by the Trinity WMU, the office desk was given by Whiteville First and a plant was given by Earl Edmunds. Special services were given by Jack Hooks for legal work and S. P. Stanley gave the appraisal of property. Those serving as trustees were Arthur Prince of Tabor City, Winfred Richardson of Fair Bluff and Cecil Stanley of Forest Lawn. The following donated their time in remodeling the building. These included Charles Blackmon, Memory Evans, Delma Ezzell, Larry Ezzell, Nathan Lee and Duval Norris of Brunswick; Grover Vaughan and James Leary of Faith; Paul Johnson of Hallsboro; Walter Rhodes of Pleasant Hill; Colon Ezzell of Pleasant Plains; Gene Ezzell, Carl Hooks, Dave Norris and Richard Skipper of Trinity as well as Martin Benton, Jimmy Lanehart and Ed Worley of Western Prong. When Open House was held, refreshments were served by the Associational WMU Council. Prior to the purchase of this building, the associational office was located in the home of the Superintendent of Missions at 419 South Franklin Street, Whiteville. The office was relocated in March, 1971. Also happening in the Association during 1971 was the first service held in its new building at Oak Dale on June 27. Trinity opened a day care center on August 28. On December 21 Oak Dale held a cornerstone laying service.

In 1972 many things continued to happen in the churches. Sweet Home built a new sanctuary and Clarendon dedicated its new building which was debt free in seven years. In April, Pleasant Hill held its first service in its present sanctuary and Brunswick purchased land for a parsonage. In November, Brunswick purchased an organ and a public address system.

The year 1973 brought about the dedication of the educational building and note burning for Western Prong on January 28. Macedonia had a deed given on November 22 for land to be used for a fellowship hall. During the year Pleasant Hill was debt free of its sanctuary and Sweet Home purchased an organ and piano.

On November 17, 1974 Oak Dale held a note burning for its sanctuary. In November, New Hope held a Centennial program. The characters were descendants of charter members.

In 1975 the Association gained another giant step forward. After returning from a mission trip to Ecuador, the Superintendent of Missions shared his vision of a special need there. A goal of \$2,500 was set to raise funds from our Association to purchase a church lot there. This goal was surpassed by \$1,000. Those churches participating in this mission endeavor included Bolton, Cedar Grove, Chadbourne, Cherry Grove, China Grove, Lake Waccamaw, Mount Zion, New Hope, Oak Dale, Piney Forest, Pleasant Hill, Pleasant Plains, Porter Swamp, Riegelwood, Sweet Home, Tabor City, Trinity, Western Prong, Westside, Whiteville First, West Whiteville and Williamson's Crossroads. Also in 1975, \$1,500 was given for remodeling the associational office. Happenings in the churches included Antioch purchasing a piano, a tract of land given to Iron Hill, and West Whiteville's completed sanctuary. In April Cerro Gordo's parsonage was completed and on November 26 Porter Swamp held dedication services for its new fellowship hall. On December 6 land was given to Macedonia for a new educational building. December 7 brought about the ordination of Neil J. Harrelson by Brunswick.

In 1976 the Association voted to change from a two (2) day meeting in the fall to one day in the Spring for inspiration and one in the Fall for taking care of business. The Association also was debt free of the purchase of the associational building. Happenings in the church during this year included the educational building for Macedonia being completed, Pleasant Hill purchased a new Baldwin piano and Western Prong remodeled its sanctuary. West Whiteville erected a steeple. On June 6 Whiteville First dedicated its pipe organ. On August 26 Westside's educational building was debt free. In September, Smyrna purchased land for an educational building and Trinity sold their parsonage. In October, Antioch dedicated its new educational building and on October 23 ground breaking services were held for new facilities at Bolton. December 26 saw Westside's parsonage debt free.

The year 1977 brought changes within the associational leadership. A World Missions Conference was held in February. Mr. Langford resigned April 30. Among the churches, Cherry Grove had the honor of ordaining Elmore Strickland to the Gospel Ministry, Delco decided to become full-time and build a parsonage, Sweet Home constructed a new educational building, and Williamson's Crossroads fellowship hall was built. August brought the relocation of Calvary and the building of its educational building. On August 17, Walter Jones became Director of Missions for our Association. November 8 was an important day in the life of Clarendon Baptist Church when a note burning service was held. Also during the year an addition was built on the church. November 22 was the day Bolton held its first services in its new building.

The year 1978 was filled with growth among the churches. Cerro Gordo purchased a new organ. Bolton dedicated its new building on January 8 and sold the old building on March 18. Trinity held dedication services for its new sign on March 15. In June Brunswick sold its parsonage. In August Thomas and Kim Hinton of Trinity were off to Tanzania, East Africa as journeymen for two years. Antioch held ground breaking services for its sanctuary on September 4. Faith dedicated their building on October 1 they had purchased from Calvary. At the October annual meeting, Nakina was accepted into membership of the Association.

The year 1979 held its important events also. Lennon's Cross Roads completed its fellowship hall, Pleasant Plains dedicated a church library, White Marsh purchased a new organ and at Whiteville First a memorial garden was established. March brought the completion of the Delco parsonage. On July 17 Bolton's steeple was erected and November 25 saw the ordaining of Dennis Phillips, Minister of Music, at Whiteville First, to the Gospel Ministry. At the annual associational meeting in October, Peace was accepted into our fellowship.

The year 1980 was filled with events in the churches. The Association employed its first full-time Office Assistant. Her name is Wanda Thompson Horton. Cerro Gordo dedicated a new brass Bible stand and candlesticks, Chadbourne paid off an indebtedness of property, Trinity had several men recognized by Governor Hunt for their prison Sunday School ministry. January 6 brought happiness to New Hope when it broke ground for its new educational building. Also on January 6 Antioch held its first services in its new building. January brought sadness to Tabor City church when it was destroyed by fire. They did not sit still though and immediately began to remodel the old parsonage for the purpose of using it for offices. In February, Nakina purchased land for a new building. March brought to Delco its first full-time pastor, Dr. George N. Knight. On March 16 Antioch held dedication services for its new sanctuary. Delco held a note burning service on June 29 for its new parsonage. Calvary's sanctuary was completed in October and Peace held dedication services November 9 for its new building. New Hope held dedication services for its new educational building on November 2.

In 1981 things were continuing to prosper all over the association. A most impressive World Missions Conference was held February 22-29 with twenty-five (25) churches participating. Also, Union Chapel completed a new fellowship hall and bricked the church, Union Valley began construction of a fellowship hall and White Marsh was happy to be debt free. In the early morning hours of April 23, Cedar Grove lost its building to fire. July brought a vision not experienced before when Riegelwood Church enlisted sixty-six (66) persons to spend the week of July 13-17 in Kingwood, West Virginia, constructing a church building, taking religious censuses and conducting Backyard Bible Clubs. Members of several other churches participated in this mission endeavor. Their testimonies are overwhelming of what God did through them while they were there. On September 20 dedication services were held for the new educational building at Tabor City. At the Annual Meeting in October a flag was commissioned to fly at the State Convention in November. The lake ministry has proven very successful in that worship services are held each Sunday morning during the summer at Dupree Landing for the campers at Lake Waccamaw. Mrs. Sally Council has been so gracious as to let us use her facilities for many years. There are over one hundred twenty-five (125) tutors, and over two hundred (200) students have been taught to read and write since literacy work began. Mrs. Ruth Whitley leads this very important part of this missions endeavor.

In 1982 the Association saw the following events happen within the churches. At Brunswick dedication of their baptistry, Cerro Gordo celebrated their 75th anniversary, Porter Swamp received a gift of \$10,000 for upkeep of the church cemetery and the Tabor City Youth Choir won first place at the World's Fair in Knoxville, Tennessee in the Choral Festival. Nakina completed their fellowship hall and educational building in March.

In 1983 Bolton completed its parsonage, Brunswick added a steeple and Delco held ground breaking services for an educational building and fellowship hall. Cedar Grove held dedication services for their new facilities on May 29. Lennon's Cross Roads licensed Gene Hackman, Jr. to the Gospel Ministry on August 14. Oak Dale celebrated its 100th anniversary on September 25. Tabor City began construction of a sanctuary. Western Prong ordained Tommy Fields to the Gospel Ministry on August 28.

In 1984 we saw the following happenings in the churches. Clarendon purchased approximately one acre of land adjoining the church, Delco completed their educational building and acquired additional land, Evergreen built a new fellowship hall, Faith had twelve (12) members go to Sutton, West Virginia to help build a church there, Friendly Chapel relocated to County Road 1428, (now Thompson Town Road) changed its name to South Whiteville Baptist Church and voted to ordain Bobby Waddell to the Gospel Ministry. Hinson's Crossroads ordained Lewis Howard to the Gospel Ministry on November 4. Oak Dale licensed Cindy Gray Brock into the Ministry on January 15, 1984. Peace constructed new Sunday School rooms and a fellowship hall, Smyrna completed their fellowship hall and held dedication services on October 21. Tabor City voted to ordain Jim Smith to the Gospel Ministry and Western Prong acquired additional land as Westside built a new sanctuary.

In 1985 and 1986, Antioch ordained Robbie Fore to the Gospel Ministry on June 22, 1986. Lake Waccamaw held ground breaking services for a new fellowship hall and South Whiteville began construction of a new building.

In 1987 Brunswick leased a rec field from Ferby Sledge and preparation for use was done by Calton Thompson. Cheerful Hope brought about the addition to their fellowship hall. Clarendon was able to pay off a land purchase balance which was undertaken in April, 1985. Robert and Sue Shaw of Evergreen began their retirement from secular employment to begin work in missions through the Missions Service Corps of the Southern Baptist Convention. New Hope licensed Gary Cabbage to the ministry. Sweet Home ordained Russell Long to the Gospel Ministry. Tabor City dedicated their church sanctuary and bell tower. Riegelwood dedicated their new educational building on October 4, 1987. Mount Zion celebrated their 150th anniversary with a special program on October 18, 1987. Nakina held a note burning on March 20, 1988, of the mortgage of their educational building. Chadbourn had Dennis and Linda Bazemore, Elaine Carr and Emily Peal to participate in the evangelistic crusade in Mombasa, Kenya in May, 1988. Delco dedicated their new educational and fellowship building on September 11, 1988. In September, 1988, Rev. Benny Sprouse of Evergreen and his wife, Ann, spent two (2) weeks in the Inter-Regional Baptist Association of Sao Paulo, Brazil, as missions volunteers. Whiteville First honored 50-year members at their Homecoming and the church voted to build a new educational building with construction to begin in September 1988.

The year 1988-89 was an exciting year in the Association. Some of the events celebrated by the churches were: Cheerful Hope completed an addition to their fellowship building in September. China Grove held their Centennial on October 16, 1988. At Evergreen a Broadman Hymn Player was given to the church in memory of Dan Bartley by his family, and a Lord's Supper service set was given in honor of Mildred Shaw McNairy by her husband, C. Banks McNairy, III. New Hope held dedication services for new choir robes and also dedicated new choir folders which were given in memory of Harry Fluharty. Whiteville First built a 12,400 square foot educational building, honored new members of the past five years and remembered their deceased members of the past five years. On June 20, 1969, Cerro Gordo Baptist Church suffered a great tragedy when their pastor, Rev. Robert Neil (Robbie) Fore, Jr., accidentally drowned in a private pond. This was his first church. Ironically his funeral was held on June 22, 1989, three (3) years to the day of his ordination. One of the pastors conducting his service referred to a statement he had heard Robbie make. It had been his dream to see Cerro Gordo Baptist Church filled! And it was filled that day - because of Robbie Fore. On August 21, 1989, the Association held a special called conference and voted to sell the property on Highway 701 North and to build on the present site at 208 South Thompson Street, Whiteville.

The year 1989-90 saw the following events taking place in the churches of the Association. Cerro Gordo dedicated a multi-purpose building and placed a portrait of a former pastor, Robbie Fore, in the new building in his memory. Chadbourn celebrated its Centennial. Cheerful Hope called Rev. Percy Heath as its pastor on January 22, 1990. Corinth dedicated a new organ. Hinson's Crossroads called a new pastor, Rev. Earl Brooks. At Pleasant Hill, Rev. Russell Long graduated from the seminary, and the church sponsored a trip for Betty Carpenter to go on a mission trip to Brazil. Union Valley licensed Kenneth Skipper. Westside finished paying the debt of their church sanctuary. White Marsh made preparation for its 225th anniversary to be held on October 14, 1990. Whiteville First dedicated their new educational building on November 5, 1989 and called a new staff member, Mr. Tony Brooks, as Associate Minister.

During the church year of 1990-1991, the following events were recorded from these churches. Calvary called a new pastor, Rev. Ray Yow, in November, 1990. Gapway ordained Stephen L. Nobles to the Gospel Ministry and installed a baptistry. Hinson's Crossroads had a ground breaking for a fellowship hall. Macedonia ordained Mark Brown to the Gospel Ministry. Pleasant Hill reburnished the interior and exterior of the parsonage, refurbished the educational wing and held a Sunday School celebration on September 29 with an increase of 11% over the previous year. Sweet Home ordained Henry McKeithan to the Gospel Ministry. West Whiteville licensed and ordained Ray Yow to the Gospel Ministry and Williamson's Crossroads ordained Larry M. Nobles to the Gospel Ministry.

On Saturday, June 15, 1991 at 7:00 a.m., thirty-one (31) people came together at 208 South Thompson Street, Whiteville, to dig the foundation for the new associational office building. Norvan Babson of Trinity was the building supervisor. On Tuesday, June 18, 1991, the concrete for the foundation was poured. There were nine (9) persons with this beginning at 7:30 a.m. Sunday, July 7, 1991, was a long awaited day in the history of Columbus Baptist Association. Services were held at 3:00 p.m. at Trinity Church to celebrate the beginning of the construction. During the year October 1, 1991 to September 30, 1992, the following events occurred in the churches. Delco paid off the debt on their new educational building. Hinson's

Crossroads built and furnished a new fellowship hall. Sweet Home licensed Tim Fowler to the ministry, Tabor City began a local cable television ministry, licensed Perry Dicus to the ministry and called Rev. James Lankford as pastor. Trinity dedicated their fellowship hall on October 27, 1991 and White Marsh built a new fellowship hall.

Then, finally, on Sunday, April 26, 1992 at 2:30 p.m., a dedication service was held in Trinity Church for the completion of the new associational building. The theme was "Pulling Together". A slide presentation was made of the work and workers during the construction period. Dr. Roy Smith, Executive Secretary-Treasurer of the North Carolina Baptist State Convention, was the guest speaker. A reception was held in Trinity's fellowship hall after the service and Open House was at the new associational office building across the street. The Church WMUs of the association provided refreshments of this occasion. The Building Committee chairperson was Dr. Ray Lundy of Fair Bluff. The other committee members were Keith Blake of Chadbourne, Dan Strickland of Cherry Grove, Mrs. Melba Wyche of Hallsboro and Randolph Ford of Tabor City, who also drew the plans for the building. The Special Finance Committee was Terry Bryant of Riegelwood and Chairperson, Mrs. Ann Wallace of Cerro Gordo, Rev. Bennie Pledger of New Hope, E. W. Greene, Jr. of Sweet Home, and Horace Whitley of Whiteville First. The Interior Committee consisted of Ms. Sally Hewett of Trinity as chairperson, Mrs. Emily Peal of Chadbourne, Mrs. Cheryl Powell of Delco, Mrs. Sue Shaw of Evergreen, Mrs. Anna Odham of Fair Bluff, Mrs. Melba Wyche of Hallsboro, Mrs. Cheryl Peverett of Lake Waccamaw, Mrs. Betty Thompson of New Hope and Mrs. Caroline Rogers of Tabor City. When the building was completed, over one hundred twenty-five (125) people had volunteered their time and services to see this long time dream come to pass. Twenty-eight (28) of the forty-nine (49) churches had volunteers represented and nineteen (19) pastors had given time. Meals had been provided for the workers by twenty-one (21) churches.

The Associational year 1992-1993 saw the following events happen. On Thursday, August 20, 1992, a dinner for the volunteers were held at 7:00 p.m. in Whiteville First Baptist Church. A delicious meal was prepared by Mrs. Renie Jones of Trinity and Mrs. Shirley Ferguson of Union Valley. Calvary sent their pastor, Ray Yow, to Brazil for a two (2) weeks missions trip. Cerro Gordo was given a Baby Grand Piano. Cherry Grove called Rev. Tony Fulbright as their pastor. Delco began renovation of the sanctuary in June of 1993 to be completed in October, 1993. New Hope held a note burning program denoting the completion of the church debt. Piney Forest began a fellowship building. Pleasant Hill completed four (4) classrooms and a Memorial Trust was given to the youth of the church from Bessie and Frank Buffkin and Riegelwood's Homecoming offering reached high to pay off their church debt. Unity Baptist Church was established on May 23, 1993.

A lot of history was made during the 1993-94 church year as you will discover as you read the following events. Cerro Gordo paid off the debt on the multi-purpose building, started a migrant workers ministry and hired a music director for the first time. Chadbourne held a dedication service of the church history book written by Dr. R. Hargas Taylor, "The Heritage of a Century". The church purchased a new 15 rank Zimmer pipe organ and an addition of recreation area. Hinson's Crossroads bought a new Baldwin piano, and a new Rogers organ. Rev. Earl Brooks resigned as pastor. New Hope celebrated the 120th anniversary of the church on several occasions during the year. Mr. and Mrs. O'Neil White donated a substantial gift of land for a portion of the parking lot. Whiteville First attended the St. Paul Missionary Baptist Church, (a Black church), including the choir and the pastor, who was the guest speaker. Whiteville First was involved in their organization. At Williamson's Crossroads God has truly blessed this church with the help of an anonymous donation the church has been able to purchase a new church van. Piney Forest held dedication services for the new fellowship hall on December 5, 1983. Oak Dale ordained Mr. Timmy Ray Jernigan into the Gospel Ministry on February 20, 1994. At Pleasant Hill, Rev. Ricky Donaldson became their pastor in April. Smyrna purchased a new organ, which is the second in the church history. Unity purchased church property and on August 7, 1994 the church held it's first church service in their new building.

The church year 1994-95 saw many historical events. These are the accomplishments recorded. Antioch's pastor, Larry Nobles resigned. At Cerro Gordo, twenty-eight (28) persons went to West Virginia for a week to conduct Vacation Bible School and community witnessing, furnished carpet, tile and other materials and repaired and beautified the existing church, did clown and puppet ministry there and at another church in the community. Chadbourne purchased a Baldwin Grand Piano. Hinson's Crossroads called a new pastor, Rev. Billy Stines and dedicated a new organ and piano. Mr. and Mrs. Carey Fleming, III, gave New Hope a 15 passenger van in memory of Mr. Fleming's parents, sister and grandmother. Porter Swamp purchased 26 acres adjoining the church grounds. The church did not have to borrow money for this. At Smyrna a new organ was purchased in March, 1994 and was paid for by November, 1994. Union Chapel called a new minister, Rev. Currie Long, who was ordained by Sandy Grove Church in Bladen County in July, 1995. Unity was accepted into full membership of the Association. White Marsh held the ordination service on August 20, 1995 for their new pastor, Rev. James L. (Jim) Roper.

During February 25-28, 1996, a World Missions Conference was held in thirty (30) associational churches. A very nice missions fair was held February 24, 1996 with approximately 200 people attending.

The following events occurred in the Association Churches during the Association Year, 1995-1996.

At Antioch construction began on enlarging the present fellowship hall by adding a new building a new wing. Anticipated completion is late October or early November, 1996. Some W.M.U. age-level groups were reactivated. Calvary paid their church loan off. China Grove purchased approximately one and one half acres of land adjoining the East side of the church yard. Corinth celebrated its 100th anniversary on November 26, 1995. Delco had an organ donated to the church. Their Youth went on a mission trip to the Navajo Reservation in Arizona to help with Bible studies and revival. A member of the church went on a mission trip to South Africa. Hinson's Crossroads began a home bound ministry and observed their third Hanging of the Greens. A new pump was put down at the church as well as a new well at the pastor's home. Senior Adult Day was observed with a catered dinner. Youth of the church presented the drama "The Three Nails." Iron Hill paved the church parking lot. Pleasant Hill installed new vinyl on wood part of church exterior and a \$15,000 endowment to Pleasant Hill Cemetery Association was made by Earl McKeithan, Jr. in memory of his parents. Pleasant Plains refurbished its sanctuary, painted walls, refinished floors, and new carpet was installed. Porter Swamp purchased the land surrounding the church property. This included approximately 25 acres, cleared and woodlands. The church was able to pay cash for this land. Smyrna updated its pictorial directory. Sweet Home ordained Timothy Boyd Fowler to the Gospel Ministry on November 19, 1995. Unity had a lot of "firsts" this year. They held their first Pastor Appreciation Service, began a debt retirement program, held baby dedication services, their first revival services, first Easter "Sonrise" service, first wedding was held at the church and their first funeral for a church member. The Women on Mission held first Enlistment Banquet, and all Brotherhood members attended the Promise Keepers Seminar. The church experienced wonderful spiritual growth. A multi-purpose building was built which added to the property value, and approved building plans for a new church. White Marsh dedicated 3 babies, held one deacon ordination, started Acteens, Mission Friend, the RAs, and held Youth Sunday. Whiteville First paid off their church debt on the new educational building and pastor built his own home. Williamson's Crossroads started and completed a new brick structure in which to house its church van.

FOREST LAWN

In the summer of 1955 a group of Christians met for the purpose of organizing a Missionary Baptist Church. This meeting was held in a vacant house belonging to Mr. Zeno Ray, located on County Road 1005, (Peacock Road), about five miles east of Tabor City. One acre of land was donated by Mrs. Leila Harrelson and \$1,000 was given by the Columbus Baptist Association.

On September 4, 1955, the church was organized under the name of Forest Lawn and became a member of the Columbus Baptist Association.

The Baptist churches from the surrounding area that were represented at this organization were Clarendon, Iron Hill, New Life, Sweet Home and West Bladenboro.

Those ministers attending were Gaston Hester, Woodrow Jolly, Earl Lanier, J. T. Biddle and J. P. Lanier.

The ground breaking ceremonies were held at the site of the new church, which is located on Highway 701, (James B. White Highway), east of Tabor City, across from the Forest Lawn Cemetery. Approximately thirty members attended the services which were conducted by Gaston Hester of Bladenboro.

The construction was begun November 13, 1955, and the first worship service was held in the church the following month. A few months later the building was completed and heat and air conditioning were installed. The dedication services were held on November 29, 1959.

During its time of existence the church has had the following pastors. Mr. Hester, Robert Duncan, D. Ed Frye, Bervin Ferguson and David Todd.

GAPWAY

Gapway Baptist Church was organized in 1874 with a very small membership. A church building was erected by the few members on property donated by Mr. and Mrs. E. L. Strickland. Gapway also became a part of the Cape Fear Association in 1874.

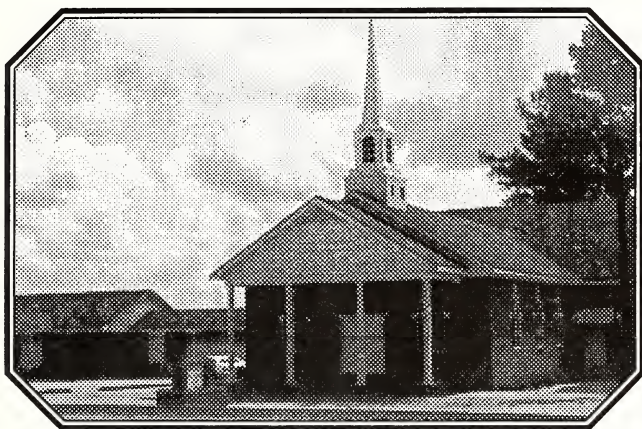
When Gapway School was consolidated with Tabor City School, the church building was moved across the road to the site where the school was. The first church building was used with the addition of two Sunday School rooms until the present building was completed. The present building was planned by the membership under the leadership of the Rev. R. W. Strickland. The present church building is of block structure and was completed without a debt.

In 1936 Gapway was a charter member of the Columbus Baptist Association formed that year.

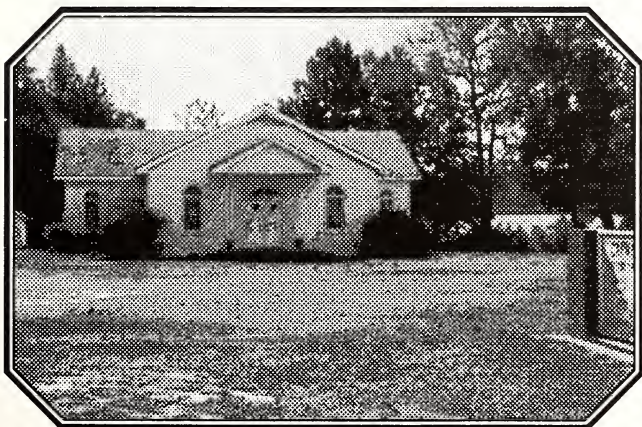
In March, 1988, the church completed a new church foyer and a steeple was added.

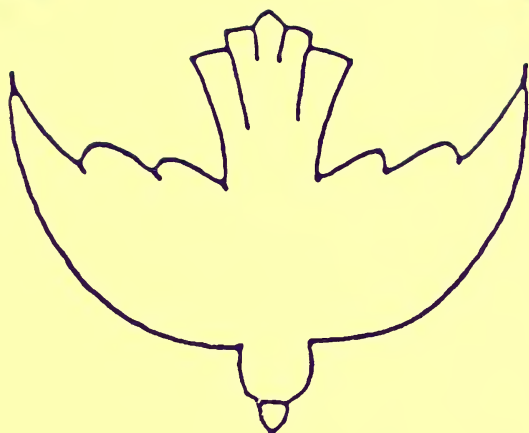

Missions are a very important part of our Association. The different areas of missions opportunities are the Hispanic Ministry, Resort (Lake) Ministry, Literacy, Help Mission, South Africa/North Carolina Partnership, and many others. We have had a good year in most areas of our work.

There was an enrollment in the Hispanic Ministry of approximately 125 people. Our goal is to have more involvement from the churches and a full time ministry in each end of the county. Please pray for Rev. Jose Vazquez as he continues to minister to the Hispanics.

Mr. Willis Horton reported there was a total attendance at the Lake Services this summer of 952. The offerings totaled \$2,265.30, with \$260.19 of this offering designated for the Gideons.

Help Mission is doing well except in finances. We would like to see all our churches include Help Mission in their budget. The Help Mission would greatly appreciate any amount given. Thirteen of our churches contributed in 1996, but only eight contributed to this cause in 1997. There were 1,903 clients served this year.

Voted to authorize the Finance Committee to order a financial review (audit) of the Association's books and procedures. Also included was a recommendation to have the Secretary/Treasurer position bonded.

Voted to pay air fare for Mrs. Nell Bruce to visit Columbus Baptist Association and conduct the Spiritual Awakening Conference in August.

Voted to accept the recommendation of the Stewardship Committee and pass on the Fall Meeting the 1997-1998 budget of \$121,503.86.

Voted to authorize the Association's Brotherhood Committee to purchase a Disaster Recovery Trailer for us in responses to local community and others needs following a disaster. Cost: \$4,100.

Voted to accept Nominating Committee recommendation to elect Rev. Bennie Pledger as Worship Resource Leader and Rev. Charles Hester as Discipleship Training Director.

Voted to establish a History Committee for the Association to prepare for the 200th anniversary of the Association in the year 2005.

Voted to establish a local emergency fund (ongoing) to assist churches in the Association for emergencies on an as needed basis. The Executive Committee to have authority to disperse monies from this fund.

He shall provide responsible leadership in the work of the Association through performing such basic functions as the planning, correlation and implementation of programs, program services and ministries of the Association; counsel to churches; interpretation of information; friendship with pastors, and good public relations.

6. SPECIFIC DUTIES

A. Administration

- Administrate policies and instructions of the Association and its Associational Council as governed by the Constitution and By-Laws of the Association.
- Work closely with associational officers, committees and organizations to help each group determine its opportunities and objectives based on the needs in the churches and the community at large and to help them devise procedures and programs to respond to these needs.
- Keep up to date information on trends within the area of the Association that will influence community and church life, such as shifts in population, economic condition, new recreation facilities and the like.
- Encourage churches to respond to new ministries made available to the Association.
- Correlate work of all organizations and committees in the Association and publish annual calendar of activities.
- Serve as an ex-officio member of all committees of the Association.
- Inform the leadership and other concerned persons of the Association's work through the publication of a monthly newsletter.
- Provide input in the purchasing of equipment and supplies within the approved budget (equipment and supplies are the property of the Association and is to remain in the Associational Office.)
- Cooperate with the State and Southern Baptist Convention agencies informing them of the needs, opportunities and potentialities within the Association, and provide churches with knowledge of assistance available from these agencies.

B. Counselor-Shepherd

- Counsel with church leaders as requested in reference to program and procedures in their churches, calling a pastor or other staff member, church objectives, policies and the like.
- Assist pastor less churches as they request help in finding interim pastors and pulpit supplies.
- Assist as requested pastors and churches in regard to actual or threatened breaches of fellowship and call upon Associational Council to assist when deemed necessary.
- Offer friendship and assistance to all pastors of the Association and their families in times of crisis and give special attention to the new pastors and their families as they move into the Association.
- Assist pastors and others in counseling those who are called into church related vocations.
- Act as a minister-at-large to persons who choose him for support and guidance, doing this in such a way so as not to discredit any pastor or to jeopardize own effectiveness in the oversight of the work of the Association in this activity.

C. To The Churches

- Acquaint himself with the churches of the Association, so as to know how best to respond to them as needs arise.
- Give special attention to visiting the churches for worship and fellowship.
- Visit churches by invitation of the pastor or other church leaders to assist or strengthen the programs and ministries of the churches in a variety of areas. Examples are: pulpit supply, study courses, missionary addresses, deacons' schools, assembly programs, special day addresses, ordination services, VBS planning and programs, to interpret phases of Associational work, budget planning, building planning, revival meetings stewardship drives, long-range planning, studying and evaluating procedures, curriculum, constitutions and by-laws, church-community surveys and the like.

D. Associational Office

- Responsible for the work of the Associational Office.
- Supervise maintenance of all office equipment, buildings and grounds.
- Formulate annual budget for operating the Associational Office.
- Use the office in carrying out of duties.
- Use the office to assist the associational officers, committees and heads of organizations in the promotion of their work.

7. THE DIRECTOR OF MISSIONS IS TO HAVE A CLEAR UNDERSTANDING OF THE TERMS OF EMPLOYMENT

- The prospective DOM and the Selection Committee of the Association will agree that acceptance of the work is within the will of the Lord Jesus Christ before being recommended. The Association employs its DOM upon the recommendation of the Associational Council and by vote of the Association in the annual session or by the Executive Committee between sessions.
- The DOM is employed for an indefinite period of time. Normal retirement will be age 65. However, a person can serve on with re-evaluation annually to age 68. The Associational Council will have the task of re-evaluation. The Association may terminate the services of the DOM by a two-thirds vote, provided 60 days notice is given before services are terminated. The DOM may terminate his services, provided 60 days notice is given to the Associational Council. By mutual agreement of the DOM and the Association or the Associational Council/Executive Committee, the 60 days notice may be waived.
- Regarding salary: The salary of the DOM and items related to it are as in the approved budget of the Association and are subject to change upon the recommendation of the Finance Committee and the approval of the Association.
- The DOM salary needs to be reviewed every year with consideration of the cost of living, and adjusted as appropriate.
- When the DOM is requested by any church, pastor within the Association to: (1) supply for a pastor on vacation or for any other temporary absence, (2) conduct a revival or (3) teach study courses, any honorariums or re-enumeration shall be for the personal use of the DOM.
- The DOM shall not accept any interim pastorate. Limited supply preaching may be done only by invitation of an associational church without a pastor for not more than two (2) consecutive Sundays or (2) Sunday services a month, and in real emergencies as approved by the Associational Council.
- Regarding special engagements: The DOM is free to accept two (2) weeks in any church-calendar year outside the Association in revival meetings, mission studies and the like.
- Concerning time off: The DOM shall earn 2 weeks (10 days) of vacation per year of employment, not accumulated, and taken in keeping with the ebb and flow of the work. Sick leave is earned at 2 weeks (10 days) per year of employment and may be accumulated up to three (3) years. In cases of extended illness, and should sick leave be exhausted, the DOM is to confer with the Associational Council. Upon termination of employment, unused vacation may be paid at the appropriate salary rate, but unused sick pay is not reimbursed. The DOM is to confer with the Moderator in scheduling vacation and other extended time away from the work and to inform the Associational Council in advance about such times when it would prove helpful.
- Concerning moving expenses: The Association will assume the responsibility for expenses of the DOM's move to the field.

8. SPECIAL CONSIDERATIONS

- This job description is looked upon primarily as a description of the DOM's work as presently conceived, and as such is to be taken seriously. Changes in the job description should be made in consultation with the DOM and when possible prior to employment.
- Finally, the Associational Council pledges itself to a ministry of loyalty, support and loving encouragement of the DOM, so that under the leadership of the Spirit of God, the most effective service possible may be rendered.

ADMINISTRATIVE ASSISTANT GUIDELINES

POSITION ASSIGNMENT:

- Position Title:** Administrative Assistant
Recruited By: Director of Missions in consultation with the Associational Council, who approves employment.
Reviewed By: Director of Missions who prepares the incumbents performance review for the Associational Council annually, prior to the July meeting of Council.

WORKING RELATIONSHIP:

- Accountability:** Works under the direct supervision of and reports to the Director of Missions.
Works Cooperatively With:

The Associational Council, all committees, and member churches but specifically with the Director of Missions in providing secretarial services and assistance necessary to carrying out his/her responsibilities.

BASIC FUNCTIONS:

Secretary to the Director of Missions, providing such secretarial and clerical support as required by the ministries of the Columbus Baptist Association. Also serves as financial clerk to the Association.

RESPONSIBILITIES:

- I. Hours of Work: The Administrative Assistant shall work 40 hours per week to include associational meetings as required. The Director of Missions shall be responsible for coordinating the Administrative Assistant's overall schedule to maintain office hours and meetings as required.
- II. Administrative Assistant Functions:
 - A. Receptionist:
 1. Serves as receptionist during office hours. Answer phones, maintain a log of calls, answer inquiries and communicate messages to the Director of Missions and appropriate associational persons in a timely matter.
 2. Receive all visitors to the associational office and refer them to proper persons to meet their needs.
 - B. Secretarial:
 1. Serve as correspondence secretary to the Director of Missions. Duties to include, but not limited to:
 - a. Receive and distribute mail.
 - b. Prepare correspondence for signature.
 - c. Maintain appropriate files.
 2. Operate, maintain and control access to all office equipment. Keep necessary inventories of all office equipment.
 3. Assist the Director of Missions in gathering and preparing copy, layout, paste-up, duplication and distribution of the associational newsletter.
 4. Assist the Director of Missions in recording and maintaining minutes of meetings involving the Council and associational committees, including Spring and Fall general meetings of the Association.
 5. Perform light janitorial duties in the office.
 6. Maintain office supplies, postage and other inventories necessary to accomplish business of the association.
 7. Maintain appropriate database system for the Association as well as paper and electronic filing systems.
 8. Look for opportunities for in-service training and professional improvement, reporting discoveries to the Director of Missions.

9. Perform any other duties as assigned by the Director of Missions.
 10. With approval of the Director of Missions, may be part of any church secretarial groups that are a part of the Columbus Baptist Association, North Carolina Baptist State Convention or the Southern Baptist Convention.
- C. Bookkeeper/Financial Clerk (working in consultation with Associational Treasurer and Finance Committee).
1. Keep a record of all contributions and provide appropriate records to contributors as required. All financial records will be in accordance with IRS regulations/requirements.
 2. Keep and produce as necessary all financial reports for the association and its various committees.
 3. Work closely with the Finance Committee to provide such information and reports as may be requested. Assist in the preparation of the annual budget and related stewardship matters.
 4. Prepare payroll checks, and payroll tax returns for withholding, FICA, North Carolina State Tax, and applications for North Carolina Sales Tax refunds.
 5. Pay all financial obligations of the Association after obtaining proper approval. Deposit money withheld monthly.
 6. In cooperation with the Treasurer, be responsible for developing, implementing and expanding the use of computer and software technologies related to the financial needs of the association.
 7. Keep the Director of Missions/Finance Committee informed about problems which might occur that is or may be out of line with the associational approved budget.
 8. Keep accurate records of salaries, salary increases, and other items as may pertain to associational staff.

MINIMUM REQUIREMENTS FOR POSITION:

1. Equivalent education level required: Graduate of an accredited business school.
2. Experience required:
 - a. No less than three years experience as Administrative Assistant.
 - b. Skilled in General Accounting and automated record keeping.
3. General:
 - a. Strong working knowledge of office procedures and related functions.
 - b. Ability to relate to other staff professionally and in a Christian spirit.
 - c. Manageable and flexible, to cope with changes.
 - d. **Due to the nature of the work of the Columbus Baptist Association, all matters pertaining to the inter working of the Association shall be kept in strictest confidence. Any breaches of confidentiality will result in dismissal.**

Note: All public communications regarding the work of the Columbus Baptist Association will be approved by the Director of Missions, the Moderator or other authorized person.

CONSTITUTION AND BYLAWS

PREAMBLE

We, the messengers of Baptist Churches of Columbus County, do hereby propose to establish and maintain the order and rules of a District Association in conformity to the following plan:

ARTICLE I. NAME

This organization shall be known as the Columbus Baptist Association Incorporated.

ARTICLE II. OBJECTIVES

The objectives of the Association shall be to elicit, combine, and direct the energies of Columbus Baptists in advancing the Redeemer's Kingdom throughout the earth, more especially along the lines recommended and adopted by the Southern Baptist Convention, the North Carolina Baptist State Convention, and the Association itself, to promote the fellowship and good will among the churches; and to devise and promote measures for increasing the harmony, intelligence and spiritual powers of the churches.

ARTICLE III. MEMBERSHIP

Section 1. This Association shall be composed of regularly constituted Baptist churches in Columbus County that shall be represented at its regular or special meetings by duly elected messengers in the following ratio: (1) Three (3) for the first one hundred members or fraction thereof, and one for fifty (50) additional members, but provided that no church may have more than ten (10) messengers. (2) All ordained ministers who are serving as pastor within the Association, Associational Officers and Committee Members.

Section 2. Messengers shall be members in good standing with the church they represent, and their names must appear on the letter from their church to the association to entitle them to be seated as messengers.

Section 3. The Association shall be sole judge of its membership, and may reject or receive churches applying for membership therein at its pleasure, provided that the churches so receive shall come under the watch care of the Association for a period of one year. During this period such church or churches shall be entitled to all the rights and privileges of the Association except that of their members voting or holding office. At the conclusion of this period, should no valid objection be raised, they become members in regular standing by action of the Association.

Section 4. The Association shall encourage the organizing of new Baptist Churches within Columbus County under the leadership of any pastor, church, churches, or interested persons of the Association. If a new church contemplates being received into the fellowship of the Association after its organization, those who are to compose its charter membership and those leading in its organization are urged to seek counsel of the Executive Promotion Committee and shall proceed with the organization only after approval is given.

Section 5. A church seeking admission into the Association shall present its application to the Credentials Committee and furnish the Committee with such information as it may require about the church. The Committee may then recommend that such church be received under the watch care of the Association for the period of one year from the date of that Associational Meeting.

Section 6. The Association may, at any time, dissolve connection with any church that becomes disorderly in practice or that fails to represent itself either by messengers or letter for two (2) consecutive sessions without sufficient reason or that ceases to be missionary in practice. The support of the causes fostered by the denomination at large and of this Association in particular shall be the test of each church as a missionary body.

Section 7. The New Testament shall be accepted as the sole guide in matters of doctrine and practice; and the Association shall reserve the right to withdraw fellowship from any church that does not conform thereto.

ARTICLE IV. POWERS AND PREROGATIVES

The Association shall have no power whatsoever to infringe upon the rights of the churches. It may advise or recommend matters to the usefulness for their adoption and guidance but cannot bind them in any way. All the churches constituting the Association remain sovereign and independent bodies and unite only that they may more effectively promote the causes of Christ throughout the world.

ARTICLE V. DUTIES OF CHURCHES

It shall be the duty of each church to appoint messengers, to insist upon their attendance at Associational Meetings, to contribute toward the expense of the Association, and to send annually a report to the Association which gives information requested in forms provided by the Associational Clerk.

ARTICLE VI. ORGANIZATION

Section 1. The General Officers shall be Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, Historian and three (3) Trustees. The Associational Staff shall be non-voting ex-officio members of all committees and councils.

Section 2. Additional Officers shall be the Associational Director of Sunday School, Discipleship Training Director, W.M.U. Director, Brotherhood Director, Music Director, Library Director, Chairman of Evangelism, Worship Resource Leader, Youth Representative and others as needed including a full slate of organizational officers as recommended by the Educational Division of the Baptist Sunday School Board.

Section 3. The Nominating Committee shall recommend the officers to the Association. However, the Association reserves the right to make other nominations for any and all offices and committees.

Section 4. The offices of the Clerk and Treasurer may be held by the same person.

Section 5. The General Officers and additional officers are specified in Section 2 of this Article shall be elected at the Spring Session and shall be installed and assume their duties at the close of the Fall Session of the current year and continue their duties until the successors are installed at the next Fall Session unless removed for cause, or until their successors are appointed.

Section 6. The term of office for Moderator and Vice-Moderator shall not exceed two (2) years in succession. All other officers may be re-elected to succeed themselves in office at the pleasure of the Association.

Section 7. All officers and committees shall be members of the churches affiliated with the Association.

Section 8. The term of office for all members of committees shall be for three (3) years. One-third of the members shall be elected annually.

Section 9. Vacancies in these offices or committees that may occur between the Annual Session of the Association shall be filled for the remainder of the Associational year by the Executive Promotion Committee.

ARTICLE VII. DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Section 1. It shall be the duty of the Moderator to preside when the association is in session and serve as Chairman of the Executive Promotion Committee. The Moderator shall also appoint a five (5) member Committee on Committees within ten (10) days after the Annual Association Meeting.

Section 2. It shall be the duty of the Vice-Moderator to preside in the absence of the Moderator and to assist him in every way possible and to succeed to the office of Moderator if and when during his tenure the office of Moderator becomes vacant.

Section 3. It shall be the duty of the Clerk to keep accurate record of the meetings of the Association and prepare minutes to be distributed as soon thereafter as possible. He/she shall serve as secretary of the Executive Promotion Committee.

Section 4. It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to keep an accurate record of the money paid into his hands, pay all bills as they become due and to make an annual report to the Association. He/she shall make a written report of the financial condition to the Associational Council and provide written reports to the Executive Promotion Committee when requested. He/she shall make a monthly report to the Associational office. He/she shall be a member of the Finance Committee.

Section 5. It shall be the duty of the Historian to collect minutes of each session of the Association and have these bound into book form every ten (10) years and to assist in any way possible in keeping records of the history of the Associational office. He/she shall submit a short history of two (2) different churches at each Annual Meeting to be incorporated into the association minutes each year until all churches have a written history in the minutes. The churches shall be taken in alphabetical order. Any new church shall be put at the bottom of the list.

Section 6. It shall be the duty of the Associational Director of Sunday School, Church Discipleship Training Director, W.M.U. Director, Music Director, Brotherhood Director and Library Director to lead in the promotion of the activities of the organization of which he/she is head, and to preside over the meetings of the organization. These officers shall bring a report of their work to each quarterly meeting of the Associational Council.

Section 7. It shall be the duty of the Trustees to hold in trust all property of the Association. Trustees shall serve as Directors of the Corporation. There shall be three trustees for a 3-year rotating system with the Chairperson to be the Trustee that will be rotating off.

Section 8. It shall be the duty of the Worship Resource Leader to educate, inform, and encourage the local churches, helping them to realize the importance of worship, identify worship styles of churches in the Association, personally promote associational, regional and state sponsored worship events, and provide input for worship at Associational meetings.

Section 9. It shall be the duty of the Youth Representative to help educate, inform, and encourage local churches to realize the importance of establishing and maintaining a youth ministry, and to coordinate ministry activities throughout the Association.

Section 10. All reports, both Associational and Denominational, shall not exceed three hundred (300) words except the Treasurer's Report and the Director of Missions report.

ARTICLE VIII. RULES OF ORDER

Section 1. All business shall be concluded and all discussions carried on in the manner prescribed in *Roberts Rules of Order Revised*.

Section 2. The method of voting shall be by show of hands, or by the will of the body.

Section 3. The simple majority shall prevail in all cases except as otherwise provided in this Constitution, provided that any member may at any time call for a written ballot or roll call.

Section 4. A ruling by the presiding officer shall be final unless appeal be had from such ruling to the entire body present.

Section 5. A question having been decided twice by vote in the same attitude at a regular session of the Association shall not be introduced again except by consent of the body as expressed by a majority vote.

Section 6. At least one-fifth of the messengers enrolled shall be necessary to constitute a quorum.

ARTICLE IX. TIME OF MEETING

Section 1. The Spring Associational Meeting shall be held the last Monday night in March each year except then it conflicts with Easter and we delete the April Executive Committee and the afternoon session of the second day during the Fall. The Associational Meeting then would be from 7-9 in March and on Tuesday night and Wednesday morning in the Fall to be held on Tuesday and Wednesday before the 4th Sunday in October. However, in the case of some unavoidable circumstances that makes a change in the date of the annual meeting necessary, with the Associational Council or the Executive Promotion Committee, preferably the Executive Promotion Committee, shall have the authority to change said date provided at least two (2) weeks in advance of the new date for the annual meeting.

Section 2. In the event of some emergency that makes a called meeting of the Association necessary, either the Associational Council or the Executive Promotion Committee shall have the authority to call for a special meeting of the Association, provided that a notice of the time and place and purpose of such a called meeting shall be mailed to the Pastors and Clerks of the Churches of the Association at least two (2) weeks in advance of the time set for the called meeting.

ARTICLE X. THE ASSOCIATIONAL YEAR

Section 1. The Associational year shall begin the first of October and close the last day of the following September.

ARTICLE XI. THE EXECUTIVE PROMOTION COMMITTEE

Section 1. The Executive Promotion Committee shall be composed of the Pastor of each church in the Association, the two (2) members (either men or women) represented by each church in the Association on the church letter, and the following Associational officers. Associational Sunday School Director, Discipleship Training Director, W.M.U. Director, Brotherhood Director, Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, Historian, Music Director, Library Director, and Chairmen of all standing committees.

Section 2. It shall act for the Association in the interim between the annual sessions.

Section 3. The duty of this committee shall be to carry out the policies and will of the Association. It shall not taken an action contravening the will of the Association; nor shall it initiate any new policies or practices binding on the Association unless specifically directed, provided: That in an adequate emergency it may take such action as it may deem necessary, but such action shall in every case be submitted to the next meeting of the Association for appropriate consideration. It shall make a full and complete report of its activities at the next Associational meeting. It shall meet quarterly and as often thereafter as is necessary to carry out the policies and will of the Association. A meeting of this committee may be called at any time by the chairman, and it shall be his duty to call a meeting upon the request of any five (5) members of this committee.

ARTICLE XII. ASSOCIATIONAL COUNCIL

Section 1. The Association shall have an Associational Council composed of the Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, Discipleship Training Director, Sunday School Director, W.M.U. Director, Brotherhood Director, Music Director, Library Director, Chairman of Finance, Evangelism, Missions Committee and Pastor/Staff Self Enrichment Committee of the Pastors' Conference. The representative shall be selected by the Pastors' Conference.

Section 2. The Vice-Moderator shall be the chairman of this Council.

Section 3. This Council shall counsel and advise any committee or church in the Columbus Baptist Association on any subject which has been submitted to it.

Section 4. This Council shall meet prior to the regular meeting of the Executive Promotion Committee. The chairman of this Council shall bring to each of the Executive Promotion Committee meetings a report of its work.

Section 5. This Council is responsible for the supervision of the work of the Director of Missions and shall study carefully the program of work for the entire Association and the needs of all the churches. In the light of this study, the Council shall work out an annual Calendar of Activities for the Association to be presented to the Executive Promotion Committee, to run concurrently with the Calendar Year.

ARTICLE XIII. STANDING COMMITTEES AND DUTIES

Section 1. Committee on Committees - This Committee shall be composed of five (5) members which said members shall come from different churches within the Association. (a) It shall be the duty of this Committee to present at the annual meeting of the Association when called upon by the Moderator, a nominating for the membership of all standing committees of the Association unless otherwise provided in this Constitution.

Section 2. Nominating Committee - The Nominating Committee shall be composed of at least five (5) members. The Nominating shall nominate all officers proposed by the Constitution. After they are nominated the Sunday School Director, Discipleship Training Director, W.M.U. Director, Music Director, Baptist Men's Director and Librarian shall enlist and propose a full slate of organizational leaders to the Nominating Committee. After the Nominating Committee makes its report to the Association, nominations shall be in order from floor.

Section 3. Program Committee - The duty of this Committee is to plan the program for the annual meeting of the Association and bring it to the Executive Promotion Committee for discussion and approval. The Committee should begin its work well in advance of the meeting of the Association and should make sure that those requested to make reports are prepared and on hand. Copies of the program should be prepared and distributed to the messengers and visitors at the Associational Meeting.

Section 4. Finance Committee - This Committee should keep a close watch on the needs of the Association for an adequate budget and a well-balanced program of work and should be prepared to bring to the Association in Annual Session a proposed budget. This Committee should also be prepared to advise the Treasurer of the Association during the year concerning the items in the budget to the end that the Association may be kept in a healthy financial condition. It shall be the duty of the Committee to see that an audit of the Treasurer's books be made following the close of the Associational Year and present to each Annual Meeting of the Association.

Section 5. Credentials Committee -

(a) It shall be the work of this Committee to make proper investigation of churches that express a desire to affiliate with the Association concerning their being orthodox in faith and cooperative in spirit, to report to the Association in Annual Session their findings and recommendations concerning the acceptance or rejection of such churches.

(b) If invited, this Committee shall go to any church for the purpose of edifying Christian fellowship.

Section 6. Committee on Ordination:

(a) This Committee shall consist of three (3) ordained ministers presently serving as pastor in the association and two (2) ordained deacons.

(b) This committee shall serve only in an advisory capacity and, when invited by a church in the Association, shall assist in the examination, preparation and ordination of candidates for the Gospel Ministry.

Section 7. Committee on Evangelism - This Committee should seek to keep alive the fires of evangelism in all meetings of all the organizations of the Association, encourage evangelistic services in churches not reporting baptisms and help provide evangelistic services in unchurched sections within the bounds of the Association, to organize and promote the Simultaneous Revivals, and to promote any county-wide evangelistic services. This Committee shall be organized in accordance with the suggested Southern Baptist Program of Evangelism.

Section 8. Missions Committee - This Committee shall keep alert to any development that may make a church or branch Sunday School necessary, counsel with groups considering a new church or branch Sunday School about the necessity of such organizations, assist in organizing new churches, seek to encourage the best location possible when new churches are formed. This committee shall also, when invited by the Vacation Bible School director of the Director of Missions, assist in promoting and maintaining Vacation Bible School wherever needed in the Association. It shall encourage pastor less, part-time churches to form fields with pastors located as near the center as possible, assist churches when called upon or when there is an evident need, when such is welcomed, to find most suitable pastors, and to serve as a contact for worthy men desiring to become pastors.

Section 9. Committee on Denominational Agencies - This Committee shall consist of one person representing each of the following: Cooperative Program, Baptist Hospital, Children's Homes, Denominational Literature, Homes for the Aging, Baptist Colleges, Ministers' Retirement, and any other causes, agency or institution deemed advisable. It shall be the responsibility of each of these to see that the interests of these causes and agencies are kept before the Association and churches at all times, and that proper report concerning the progress and needs of these causes and agencies are presented to the Associational Meetings.

Section 10. Committee on Libraries - It shall be the duty of this Committee to plan and promote church library work in the Association. It should encourage each church without a library to start one, and help in stabilizing those already in operation. The Committee should assist churches in starting their libraries and help them in organizing their library committee. The Committee should also plan and promote a program of training for all church libraries.

Section 11. Constitutional Committee. It shall be the duty of the Committee to study the Constitution of our Association and to recommend to the Association at its annual session such changes, amendments or revisions as may be deemed necessary and appropriate in accordance with the needs of the Association.

Section 12. Resolutions Committee - It shall be the duty of this Committee to prepare and present to the Association at its annual session such resolutions and other reports as may be appropriate and in order for consideration by the Association.

Section 13. Time, Place and Preacher Committee - It shall be the duty of this Committee to plan and prepare for the sessions of the Columbus Baptist Association and to secure a preacher and alternate for the Fall Session and to do such other acts and things as may be necessary to provide the proper facilities for such annual meetings of the Association.

Section 14. Christian Social Ministries - The work of this Committee is to create an awareness in the Baptist churches of the Association of the teachings and ministries of Jesus Christ in attempting to meet the needs of the total person in light of the Gospel. Workshops will be held to point out needs of persons and possible ways in which we may become involved to meet those needs.

Section 15. Christian Life Council - The work of the Christian Life Council is to be alert and call to the attention any encroachment upon our religious freedom. Working through its chairman it shall report at each Executive Promotion Committee meeting any matter that appears to be in contradiction to our belief.

Section 16. Deacon Representative - The Deacon Representative shall be responsible for seeing that at least one training session (workshop or retreat) shall be conducted for deacons from across the Association during each Associational Year.

Section 17. Energy Consultant - The Energy Consultant will prepare himself/herself to the extent that he/she will stand ready to make suggestions on how a church may conserve energy.

Section 18. Building and Grounds Committee - The Building and Grounds Committee shall be composed of five (5) rotating members. It shall be the responsibility of this committee to respond to the needs of the associational building(s) and grounds as they arise. Periodically the committee shall inspect all property to insure proper maintenance, making certain property adheres to all state, county, and city codes. The committee shall be authorized to spend up to three hundred dollars (\$300) for repairs or improvements without approval by the Executive Committee, but in consultation with the Director of Missions. Responsible persons shall be sought to perform tasks of repairs and improvements.

ARTICLE XIV. REVISION

This Constitution may be immediately revised at any regular session of the Association by a two-thirds vote of the messengers present provided notice of such revision shall be given in the afternoon session and then voted on in the evening session.

COLUMBUS BAPTIST ASSOCIATION

Our Association dates back to 1805 when it was first known as Cape Fear. It existed until 1898. For a long time the Cape Fear Association included churches in Robeson, Columbus, Bladen and Brunswick Counties with some in Pender and a few in South Carolina near the state line.

This was twenty-five (25) years before our Baptist State Convention was organized and sixteen (16) years after George Washington became the first President of the United States.

This southeastern part of North Carolina had been thinly settled, but along about this time a number of families had moved into this section from other parts of this and other states. During the prior half century many Scotch and Irish families had come from Europe and settled along the Cape Fear River and outlying territory.

Religious interest had been rather low in some of this territory and churches were scarce. A few Methodist churches had been organized and Bishop Asbury made a journey through this section in 1801, organizing other churches. Some churches believed in missions and some others said that God would save people in His own way and time. In some churches men held to Calvinistic doctrine and beliefs of the Primitive Baptists.

Settlements and farms in this part of the state were widely scattered. Roads were poor and many people had very little education. Yet, people then appeared to know their neighbors fairly well although their home might have been thirty or forty miles away. Their usual manner of travel was on horseback when too far to walk.

The churches that are members of the Columbus Baptist Association today that were members of the original association and the date of their acceptance are listed here. Porter Swamp entered the association in 1830; Iron Hill in 1831; Pleasant Plains in 1836; Mount Tabor (Tabor City) in 1838; Macedonia in 1839; Western Prong in 1843; Cherry Grove in 1846; Pleasant Hill in 1848; White Marsh in 1852, (which is also the oldest church in our Association, being established in 1765); Whiteville First in 1863; Sweet Home in 1864; Piney Forest in 1869; Cedar Grove in 1870; Gapway and New Hope in 1874; Bogue Chapel (Hallsboro) and Fair Bluff in 1876; Oak Dale in 1884; China Grove in 1890; and Smyrna in 1892.

During the period between the Civil War and the close of the century there were increases in people, farming, roads and schools. There was more interest in church work. In most communities Sunday Schools were organized. Most of the people were poor and living standards continued low for many years. Public schools were available to most children, but usually for only two or three months per year. Many people were illiterate.

In 1888 the first Columbus Baptist Association was formed from churches withdrawing from the Cape Fear Association. This newly organized association remained in existence until 1898. Many of those still existing churches were members. These churches and the year they were admitted to the Association follow. In 1888, New Hope, Union Valley and Whiteville First became members. Williamson's Crossroads joined the Association in 1898, followed by Chadbourn and China Grove in 1891. The year 1892 brought many additions as the Cross Roads (Lennon's), Griffin's Crossroads (Evergreen), Mount Tabor (Tabor City), Macedonia, Oak Dale, Piney Forest, Pleasant Hill and Smyrna were accepted. Then in 1894 Cheerful Hope, Cherry Grove and Porter Swamp became members. This Association did not exist but eleven (11) years and so in 1899 the Cape Fear-Columbus Association was formed.

Those charter members were Bogue Chapel (which changed its name to Hallsboro in 1924); Cedar Grove, Cheerful Hope, Cherry Grove, China Grove, Lennon's Cross Roads, Macedonia, Mount Tabor (Tabor City), Mount Zion, New Hope, Oak Dale, Piney Forest, Pleasant Hill, Pleasant Plains, Porter Swamp, Smyrna, Sweet Home, Western Prong, White Marsh, Whiteville First and Williamson's Crossroads. In 1903 Hinson's Crossroads became a part. Boardman and Union Chapel in 1904, Corinth in 1905, Fair Bluff in 1908. Cerro Gordo and Evergreen in 1909. New Berlin (which changed its name to Delco in 1923) joined in 1911, Clarendon in 1915, Bolton in 1918 and Union Valley in 1934. Chadbourn and Gapway became members but no dates are given.

In the period before so many churches left the Cape Fear Association there was always a great interest in the annual meeting. Attendance was usually large and the sessions continued from Wednesday or Thursday until Sunday. Many delegates would attend from long distances, considering their means of travel. When the annual meeting was held near a railroad station, some would come by train, but often they came by horse and buggy starting the day before the meeting.

The attendance was large and the people started weeks ahead in preparing for the great number of visitors they expected. It took quite a number of pigs and chickens to feed so many. Many homes took more guests than they could take care of, but they were glad to have the privilege of entertaining the folds from other churches. Often the church building would not hold half the crowd and they held overflow services under the trees in the church yard. Many who attended the Association were greatly interested in religious services, of course, but the social feature was an added attraction. Many churches complained if they could not have the associational meeting with their church ever few years.

In 1936 the Columbus Baptist Association was formed with the following charter members. Antioch, Boardman, Bolton, Cedar Grove, Cerro Gordo, Chadbourn, Cheerful Hope, Cherry Grove, China Grove, Clarendon, Corinth, Delco, Evergreen, Fair Bluff, Gapway, Hallsboro, Hinson's Crossroads, Lennon's Cross

Roads, Macedonia, Mount Tabor (Tabor City), Mount Zion, New Hope, Oak Dale, Piney Forest, Pleasant Hill, Pleasant Plains, Porter Swamp, Smyrna, Union Valley, Waccamaw (Lake Waccamaw), Western Prong, White Marsh, Whiteville First and Williamson's Crossroads.

These were followed by Sweet Home in 1940 and Union Chapel in 1941. In 1949 we saw more interest in the denominational work, such as missions, orphanages, and education than was shown generations before.

Churches have continued to be admitted through the years. These include Iron Hill in 1950. John T. Biddle came to serve as Superintendent of Missions on July 1, 1950. Calvary became a part in 1951, Brunswick in 1952, Riegelwood in 1953, Forest Lawn in 1955 and Trinity in 1956.

Mr. Biddle resigned as Superintendent of Missions on June 18, 1956. West Whiteville became a part of the Association in 1959. Henry Powell became Superintendent of Missions on February 15, 1959 and served until July 15, 1961. Arch Cree who served from May 1 followed him, 1962 until June 1, 1967. William Ross came to us on July 6, 1967.

In 1967 Antioch held its first Homecoming, Cedar Grove completed a new brick structure and Trinity began its prison Sunday School ministry.

In 1968 Antioch observed its Golden Anniversary and Sweet Home built a new educational building and a fellowship hall. Whiteville First built a library in February, and Macedonia was offered land for a parking lot on April 14. Also, in this year, Oak Dale had land given in May.

On October 19, 1969, Westside held a ground breaking for a new building. On October 26, Trinity held a ground breaking for a new sanctuary.

On June 13, 1970, Brunswick held a note burning. Mr. Ross, Superintendent of Missions, resigned on July 1. We were fortunate in securing Hoyle Langford to become Superintendent of Missions on August 15, 1970. On August 31, Westside was constituted and became a member of the Association. September 30 was the dedication date at Trinity for their sanctuary. November 22 brought the ground breaking services for Oak Dale's new sanctuary and on December 6, Clarendon held a ground breaking for a new building.

In 1971 Faith was organized and became a member of the Association, as well as Friendly Chapel. The year 1971 was a giant stepping stone in the life of Columbus Baptist Association. Property and a house were bought for the associational office at 208 South Thompson Street, Whiteville at a cost of \$10,000. Special cash gifts were received from Cherry Grove RAs, Mount Zion, Pleasant Plains and Union Valley, Marse Grant, Miss Lena Hughes and an anonymous donor. The following items were donated: J. A. Applewhite gave an occasional chair, drapes for the conference room were given by New Hope, chairs for the conference room were given by Tabor City, drapes for the reception room and office were given by the Trinity WMU, Whiteville First gave the office desk and Earl Edmunds gave a plant. Special services were given by Jack Hooks for legal work and S. P. Stanley gave the appraisal of property. Those serving as trustees were Arthur Prince of Tabor City, Winfred Richardson of Fair Bluff and Cecil Stanley of Forest Lawn. The following donated their time in remodeling the building. These included Charles Blackmon, Memory Evans, Delma Ezzell, Larry Ezzell, Nathan Lee and Duval Norris of Brunswick; Grover Vaughan and James Leary of Faith; Paul Johnson of Hallsboro; Walter Rhodes of Pleasant Hill; Colon Ezzell of Pleasant Plains; Gene Ezzell, Carl Hooks, Dave Norris and Richard Skipper of Trinity as well as Martin Benton, Jimmy Lanehart and Ed Worley of Western Prong. When Open House was held, the Associational WMU Council served refreshments. Before the purchase of this building, the associational office was in the home of the Superintendent of Missions at 419 South Franklin Street, Whiteville. The office was moved in March 1971. Also, happening in the Association during 1971 was the first service held in its new building at Oak Dale on June 27. Trinity opened a day care center on August 28. On December 21 Oak Dale held a cornerstone laying service.

In 1972 many things continued to happen in the churches. Sweet Home built a new sanctuary and Clarendon dedicated its new building which was debt free in seven years. In April, Pleasant Hill held its first service in its present sanctuary and Brunswick purchased land for a parsonage. In November, Brunswick purchased an organ and a public address system.

The year 1973 brought about the dedication of the educational building and note burning for Western Prong on January 28. Macedonia had a deed given on November 22 for land to be used for a fellowship hall. During the year Pleasant Hill was debt free of its sanctuary and Sweet Home purchased an organ and piano.

On November 17, 1974, Oak Dale held a note burning for its sanctuary. In November, New Hope held a Centennial program. The characters were descendants of charter members.

In 1975 the Association gained another giant step forward. After returning from a mission trip to Ecuador, the Superintendent of Missions shared his vision of a special need there. A goal of \$2,500 was set to raise funds from our Association to purchase a church lot there. This goal was surpassed by \$1,000. Those churches participating in this mission endeavor included Bolton, Cedar Grove, Chadbourne, Cherry Grove, China Grove, Lake Waccamaw, Mount Zion, New Hope, Oak Dale, Piney Forest, Pleasant Hill, Pleasant Plains, Porter Swamp, Riegelwood, Sweet Home, Tabor City, Trinity, Western Prong, Westside, Whiteville First, West Whiteville and Williamson's Crossroads. Also, in 1975, \$1,500 was given for remodeling the associational office. Happenings in the churches included Antioch purchasing a piano, a tract of land given to Iron Hill, and West Whiteville's completed sanctuary. In April Cerro Gordo's parsonage was completed and on November 26 Porter Swamp held dedication services for its new fellowship hall. On December 6 land was given to Macedonia for a new educational building. December 7 brought about the ordination of Neil J. Harrelson by Brunswick.

In 1976 the Association voted to change from a two (2) day meeting in the fall to one day in the Spring for inspiration and one in the Fall for taking care of business. The Association also was debt free of the purchase of the associational building. Happenings in the churches during this year included the educational building for Macedonia being completed, Pleasant Hill purchased a new Baldwin piano and Western Prong remodeled its sanctuary. West Whiteville erected a steeple. On June 6 Whiteville First dedicated its pipe organ. On August 26 Westside's educational building was debt free. In September, Smyrna purchased land for an educational building and Trinity sold their parsonage. In October, Antioch dedicated its new educational building and on October 23 ground breaking services were held for new facilities at Bolton. December 26 saw Westside's parsonage debt free.

The year 1977 brought changes within the associational leadership. A World Missions Conference was held in February. Mr. Langford resigned April 30. Among the churches, Cherry Grove had the honor of ordaining Elmore Strickland to the Gospel Ministry, Delco decided to become full-time and build a parsonage, Sweet Home constructed a new educational building, and Williamson's Crossroads fellowship hall was built. August brought the relocation of Calvary and the building of its educational building. On August 17, Walter Jones became Director of Missions for our Association. November 8 was an important day in the life of Clarendon Baptist Church when a note burning service was held. Also, during the year an addition was built on the church. November 22 was the day Bolton held its first services in its new building.

The year 1978 was filled with growth among the churches. Cerro Gordo purchased a new organ. Bolton dedicated its new building on January 8 and sold the old building on March 18. Trinity held dedication services for its new sign on March 15. In June Brunswick sold its parsonage. In August Thomas and Kim Hinton of Trinity were off to Tanzania, East Africa as journeymen for two years. Antioch held ground breaking services for its sanctuary on September 4. Faith dedicated their building on October 1 they had purchased from Calvary. At the October annual meeting, Nakina was accepted into membership of the Association.

The year 1979 held its important events also. Lennon's Cross Roads completed its fellowship hall, Pleasant Plains dedicated a church library, White Marsh purchased a new organ and at Whiteville First a memorial garden was established. March brought the completion of the Delco parsonage. On July 17 Bolton's steeple was erected and November 25 saw the ordaining of Dennis Phillips, Minister of Music, at Whiteville First, to the Gospel Ministry. At the annual associational meeting in October, Peace was accepted into our fellowship.

The year 1980 was filled with events in the churches. The Association employed its first full-time Office Assistant. Her name is Wanda Thompson Horton. Cerro Gordo dedicated a new brass Bible stand and candlesticks, Chadbourne paid off an indebtedness of property. Trinity had several men recognized by Governor Hunt for their prison Sunday School ministry. January 6 brought happiness to New Hope when it broke ground for its new educational building. Also, on January 6 Antioch held its first services in its new building. January brought sadness to Tabor City church when fire destroyed it. They did not sit still though and immediately began to remodel the old parsonage to use it for offices. In February, Nakina purchased land for a new building. March brought to Delco its first full-time pastor, Dr. George N. Knight. On March 16 Antioch held dedication services for its new sanctuary. Delco held a note burning service on June 29 for its new parsonage. Calvary's sanctuary was completed in October and Peace held dedication services November 9 for its new building. New Hope held dedication services for its new educational building on November 2.

In 1981 things were continuing to prosper all over the association. A most impressive World Missions Conference was held February 22-29 with twenty-five (25) churches participating. Also, Union Chapel completed a new fellowship hall and bricked the church, Union Valley began construction of a fellowship hall and White Marsh was happy to be debt free. In the early morning hours of April 23, Cedar Grove lost its building to fire. July brought a vision not experienced before when Riegelwood Church enlisted sixty-six (66) persons to spend the week of July 13-17 in Kingwood, West Virginia, constructing a church building, taking religious censuses and conducting Backyard Bible Clubs. Members of several other churches participated in this mission endeavor. Their testimonies are overwhelming of what God did through them while they were there. On September 20 dedication services were held for the new educational building at Tabor City. At the Annual Meeting in October they commissioned a flag to fly at the State Convention in November. The lake ministry has proven very successful in that worship services are held each Sunday morning during the summer at Dupree Landing for the campers at Lake Waccamaw. Mrs. Sally Council has been so gracious as to let us use her facilities for many years. There are more than one hundred twenty-five (125) tutors, and more than two hundred (200) students have been taught to read and write since literacy work began. Mrs. Ruth Whitley leads this very important part of this missions endeavor.

In 1982 the Association saw the following events happen within the churches. At Brunswick dedication of their baptistry, Cerro Gordo celebrated their 75th anniversary, Porter Swamp received a gift of \$10,000 for upkeep of the church cemetery and the Tabor City Youth Choir won first place at the World's Fair in Knoxville, Tennessee in the Choral Festival. Nakina completed their fellowship hall and educational building in March.

In 1983 Bolton completed its parsonage, Brunswick added a steeple and Delco held ground breaking services for an educational building and fellowship hall. Cedar Grove held dedication services for their new facilities on May 29. Lennon's Cross Roads licensed Gene Hackman, Jr. to the Gospel Ministry on August

14. Oak Dale celebrated its 100th anniversary on September 25. Tabor City began construction of a sanctuary. Western Prong ordained Tommy Fields to the Gospel Ministry on August 28.

In 1984 we saw the following happenings in the churches. Clarendon purchased approximately one acre of land adjoining the church, Delco completed their educational building and acquired additional land, Evergreen built a new fellowship hall, Faith had twelve (12) members go to Sutton, West Virginia to help build a church there, Friendly Chapel moved to County Road 1428, (now Thompson Town Road) changed its name to South Whiteville Baptist Church and voted to ordain Bobby Waddell to the Gospel Ministry. Hinson's Crossroads ordained Lewis Howard to the Gospel Ministry on November 4. Oak Dale licensed Cindy Gray Brock into the Ministry on January 15, 1984. Peace constructed new Sunday School rooms and a fellowship hall. Smyrna completed their fellowship hall and held dedication services on October 21. Tabor City voted to ordain Jim Smith to the Gospel Ministry and Western Prong acquired additional land as Westside built a new sanctuary.

In 1985 and 1986, Antioch ordained Robbie Fore to the Gospel Ministry on June 22, 1986. Lake Waccamaw held ground breaking services for a new fellowship hall and South Whiteville began construction of a new building.

In 1987 Brunswick leased a rec field from Ferby Sledge and preparation for use was done by Calton Thompson. Cheerful Hope brought about the addition to their fellowship hall. Clarendon was able to pay off a land purchase balance which they undertook in April 1985. Robert and Sue Shaw of Evergreen began their retirement from secular employment to begin work in missions through the Missions Service Corps of the Southern Baptist Convention. New Hope licensed Gary Cabbage to the ministry. Sweet Home ordained Russell Long to the Gospel Ministry. Tabor City dedicated their church sanctuary and bell tower. Riegelwood dedicated their new educational building on October 4, 1987. Mount Zion celebrated their 150th anniversary with a special program on October 18, 1987. Nakina held a note burning on March 20, 1988, of the mortgage of their educational building. Chadbourne had Dennis and Linda Bazemore, Elaine Carr and Emily Peal to participate in the evangelistic crusade in Mombasa, Kenya in May 1988. Delco dedicated their new educational and fellowship building on September 11, 1988. In September 1988, Rev. Benny Sprouse of Evergreen and his wife, Ann, spent two (2) weeks in the Inter-Regional Baptist Association of Sao Paulo, Brazil, as mission volunteers. Whiteville First honored 50-year members at their Homecoming and the church voted to build a new educational building with construction to begin in September 1988.

The year 1988-89 was an exciting year in the Association. Some events celebrated by the churches were: Cheerful Hope completed an addition to their fellowship building in September. China Grove held their Centennial on October 16, 1988. At Evergreen a Broadman Hymn Player was given to the church in memory of Dan Bartley by his family, and a Lord's Supper service set was given in honor of Mildred Shaw McNairy by her husband, C. Banks McNairy, III. New Hope held dedication services for new choir robes and dedicated new choir folders which were given in memory of Harry Fluharty. Whiteville First built a 12,400 square foot educational building, honored new members of the past five years and remembered their deceased members of the past five years. On June 20, 1969, Cerro Gordo Baptist Church suffered a great tragedy when their pastor, Rev. Robert Neil (Robbie) Fore, Jr., accidentally drowned in a private pond. This was his first church. Ironically his funeral was held on June 22, 1989, three (3) years to the day of his ordination. One pastor conducting his service referred to a statement he had heard Robbie make. It had been his dream to see Cerro Gordo Baptist Church filled! It was filled that day - because of Robbie Fore. On August 21, 1989, the Association held a special called conference and voted to sell the property on Highway 701 North and to build on the present site at 208 South Thompson Street, Whiteville.

The year 1989-90 saw the following events taking place in the churches of the Association. Cerro Gordo dedicated a multi purpose building and placed a portrait of a former pastor, Robbie Fore, in the new building in his memory. Chadbourne celebrated its Centennial. Cheerful Hope called Rev. Percy Heath as its pastor on January 22, 1990. Corinth dedicated a new organ. Hinson's Crossroads called a new pastor, Rev. Earl Brooks. At Pleasant Hill, Rev. Russell Long graduated from the seminary, and the church sponsored a trip for Betty Carpenter to go on a mission trip to Brazil. Union Valley licensed Kenneth Skipper. Westside finished paying the debt of their church sanctuary. White Marsh made preparation for its 225th anniversary to be held on October 14, 1990. Whiteville First dedicated their new educational building on November 5, 1989 and called a new staff member, Mr. Tony Brooks, as Associate Minister.

During the church year of 1990-1991, the following events were recorded from these churches. Calvary called a new pastor, Rev. Ray Yow, in November 1990. Gapway ordained Stephen L. Nobles to the Gospel Ministry and installed a baptistry. Hinson's Crossroads had a ground breaking for a fellowship hall. Macedonia ordained Mark Brown to the Gospel Ministry. Pleasant Hill refurbished the interior and exterior of the parsonage, refurbished the educational wing and held a Sunday School celebration on September 29 with an increase of 11% over the previous year. Sweet Home ordained Henry McKeithan to the Gospel Ministry. West Whiteville licensed and ordained Ray Yow to the Gospel Ministry and Williamson's Crossroads ordained Larry M. Nobles to the Gospel Ministry.

Saturday, June 15, 1991 at 7:00 a.m., thirty-one (31) people came together at 208 South Thompson Street, Whiteville, to dig the foundation for the new associational office building. Norvan Babson of Trinity was the building supervisor. Tuesday, June 18, 1991, the concrete for the foundation was poured. There were nine (9) persons with this beginning at 7:30 a.m. Sunday, July 7, 1991, was a long awaited day in the history

of Columbus Baptist Association. Services were held at 3:00 p.m. at Trinity Church to celebrate the beginning of the construction. During the year October 1, 1991 to September 30, 1992, the following events occurred in the churches. Delco paid off the debt on their new educational building. Hinson's Crossroads built and furnished a new fellowship hall. Sweet Home licensed Tim Fowler to the ministry, Tabor City began a local cable television ministry, licensed Perry Dicus to the ministry and called Rev. James Lankford as pastor. Trinity dedicated their fellowship hall on October 27, 1991 and White Marsh built a new fellowship hall.

Then, finally, Sunday, April 26, 1992 at 2:30 p.m., a dedication service was held in Trinity Church for the completion of the new associational building. The theme was "Pulling Together." A slide presentation contained the work and workers during the construction period. Dr. Roy Smith, Executive Secretary-Treasurer of the North Carolina Baptist State Convention, was the guest speaker. A reception was held in Trinity's fellowship hall after the service and Open House was at the new associational office building across the street. The Church WMUs of the association provided refreshments of this occasion. The Building Committee chairperson was Dr. Ray Lundy of Fair Bluff. Other committee members were Keith Blake of Chadbourne, Dan Strickland of Cherry Grove, Mrs. Melba Wyche of Hallsboro and Randolph Ford of Tabor City, who also drew the plans for the building. The Special Finance Committee was Terry Bryant of Riegelwood and Chairperson, Mrs. Ann Wallace of Cerro Gordo, Rev. Bennie Pledger of New Hope, E. W. Greene, Jr. of Sweet Home, and Horace Whitley of Whiteville First. The Interior Committee consisted of Ms. Sally Hewett of Trinity as chairperson, Mrs. Emily Peal of Chadbourne, Mrs. Cheryl Powell of Delco, Mrs. Sue Shaw of Evergreen, Mrs. Anna Odham of Fair Bluff, Mrs. Melba Wyche of Hallsboro, Mrs. Cheryl Peverett of Lake Waccamaw, Mrs. Betty Thompson of New Hope and Mrs. Caroline Rogers of Tabor City. When the building was completed, more than one hundred twenty-five (125) people had volunteered their time and services to see this long time dream happen. Twenty-eight (28) of the forty-nine (49) churches had volunteers represented and nineteen (19) pastors had given time. Twenty-one churches had provided meals for the workers.

The Associational year 1992-1993 saw the following events happen. Thursday, August 20, 1992, a dinner for the volunteers was held at 7:00 p.m. in Whiteville First Baptist Church. Mrs. Renie Jones of Trinity and Mrs. Shirley Ferguson prepared a delicious meal of Union Valley. Calvary sent their pastor, Ray Yow, to Brazil for a two (2) weeks' missions trip. Cerro Gordo was given a Baby Grand Piano. Cherry Grove called Rev. Tony Fulbright as their pastor. Delco began renovation of the sanctuary in June of 1993 to be completed in October 1993. New Hope held a note burning program denoting the completion of the church debt. Piney Forest began a fellowship building. Pleasant Hill completed four (4) classrooms and a Memorial Trust was given to the youth of the church from Bessie and Frank Buffkin and Riegelwood's Homecoming offering reached high to pay off their church debt. Unity Baptist Church was established on May 23, 1993.

Much history was made during the 1993-94 church year as you will discover as you read the following events. Cerro Gordo paid off the debt on the multi purpose building, started a migrant worker's ministry and hired a music director for the first time. Chadbourne held a dedication service of the church history book written by Dr. R. Hargas Taylor, "The Heritage of a Century." The church purchased a new 15 rank Zimmer pipe organ and an addition of recreation area. Hinson's Crossroads bought a new Baldwin piano, and a new Rogers organ. Rev. Earl Brooks resigned as pastor. New Hope celebrated the 120th anniversary of the church often during the year. Mr. and Mrs. O'Neil White donated a substantial gift of land for part of the parking lot. Whiteville First attended the St. Paul Missionary Baptist Church, (a Black church), including the choir and the pastor, who was the guest speaker. Whiteville First was involved in their organization. At Williamson's Crossroads God has truly blessed this church with the help of an anonymous donation the church has purchased a new church van. Piney Forest held dedication services for the new fellowship hall on December 5, 1993. Oak Dale ordained Mr. Timmy Ray Jemigan into the Gospel Ministry on February 20, 1994. At Pleasant Hill, Rev. Ricky Donaldson became their pastor in April. Smyrna purchased a new organ, which is the second in the church history. Unity purchased church property and on August 7, 1994 the church held its first church service in their new building.

The church year 1994-95 saw many historical events. These are the accomplishments recorded. Antioch added a covered drive-thru shelter to their fellowship building, driveway and parking spaces, and their pastor, Larry Nobles resigned. At Cerro Gordo the church hired its first part-time youth director, twenty-eight (28) persons went to West Virginia for a week to conduct Vacation Bible School and community witnessing, furnished carpet, tile and other materials and repaired and beautified the existing church, did clown and puppet ministry there and at another church in the community. Chadbourne purchased a Baldwin Grand Piano. Cherry Grove did renovation of the church sanctuary. Hinson's Crossroads called a new pastor, Rev. Billy Stines, and dedicated a new organ and piano. Macedonia remodeled their fellowship hall. Mr. and Mrs. Carey Fleming, III, gave New Hope a 15-passenger van in memory of Mr. Fleming's parents, sister and grandmother. Pleasant Plains renovated the educational/fellowship building. Porter Swamp purchased 26 acres adjoining the church grounds. The church did not have to borrow money for this. At Smyrna a new organ was purchased in March 1994 and was paid for by November 1994. Union Chapel called a new minister, Rev. Curie Long, whom Sandy Grove Church in Bladen County ordained in July 1995. Unity was accepted into full membership of the Association. White Marsh held the ordination service on August 20, 1995 for their new pastor, Rev. James L. (Jim) Roper.

During February 25-28, 1996, a World Missions Conference was held in thirty (30) associational churches. A very delightful mission fair was held February 24, 1996 with approximately 200 people attending. Antioch enlarged their fellowship hall by adding a new wing. Some WMU age-level groups were reactivated. Calvary paid off their building debt. China Grove purchased approximately one and one half acres of land adjoining the East side of the church yard. Corinth celebrated its 100th anniversary on November 26, 1995. Delco had an organ donated to the church. The youth went on a mission trip to the Navajo Indian Reservation in Arizona to help with Bible studies and revival. A member of the church went on a mission trip to South Africa. Hinson's Crossroads began a home bound ministry. Iron Hill paved the church parking lot. Pleasant Hill installed new vinyl of the wood part of the church exterior and a \$15,000 endowment to Pleasant Hill Cemetery Association was made by Earl McKeithan, Jr., in memory of his parents. Pleasant Plains refurbished its sanctuary. Porter Swamp purchased the land surrounding the church property. This includes approximately 25 acres, cleared and woodlands. The church was able to pay cash for this land. Sweet Home ordained Timothy Boyd Fowler to the Gospel Ministry on November 19, 1995. Unity began a debt retirement program, build a multi purpose building which added to the property value, and approved building plans for a new church. Whiteville First paid off their church debt on the new educational building and the pastor built his own home. Williamson's Crossroads completed a new brick structure in which to house its church van.

During 1996-1997 Cerro Gordo's roof was extensively damaged by Hurricane Fran. In the process of repairs, the church upgraded other areas by replacing sanctuary lights with chandelier, painting, adding wainscoting and chair rail to hallways in the education department, carpeting hallways and secretarial and pastoral offices. Forest Lawn dedicated a prayer garden. Hinson's Cross Roads wrote and printed a church history and prepared to celebrate their centennial. Iron Hill purchased a new church van. Lennon's Cross Roads' great year of historical events began October 27, 1996 and will conclude with the 200th anniversary celebration on October 26, 1997. The church began in 1797. At Mount Zion a picture was made from a glass negative found recently of the second Mount Zion Baptist Church and the congregation, and placed in the church. Records show it was built about 1860. A 160th anniversary celebration is scheduled for October 19, 1997. Pleasant Plains refurbished the church parsonage, hand bells were purchased, and a new sound system was installed. West Whiteville connected the arcade between the church sanctuary and the fellowship hall.

HALLSBORO

Hallsboro Baptist Church was organized as Bogue Chapel Church on September 10, 1876 and met in the building that is now used as the Hallsboro Clubhouse. It joined the Cape Fear Association the same year.

Thirteen members, mostly from the disbanded Mount Moriah Baptist Church, formed the new congregation. Services were held one Saturday and Sunday per month, and the pastor's salary was about \$100 a month. Sunday School met regularly, but sometimes they stopped them during the winter months. It joined the Cape Fear - Columbus Association when it was formed in 1899.

Two Sunday School rooms were built sometime before 1920. Smaller rooms were added later. In 1920 the church went to half-time, remaining so until 1951 when it went full-time. They changed the name to Hallsboro on October 19, 1924. The parsonage was built about this time also, which was used until 1962 when it was replaced.

In 1930 the present building was dedicated, debt-free. It became a charter member of the Columbus Baptist Association when it was formed in 1936.

The educational building was added in 1952.

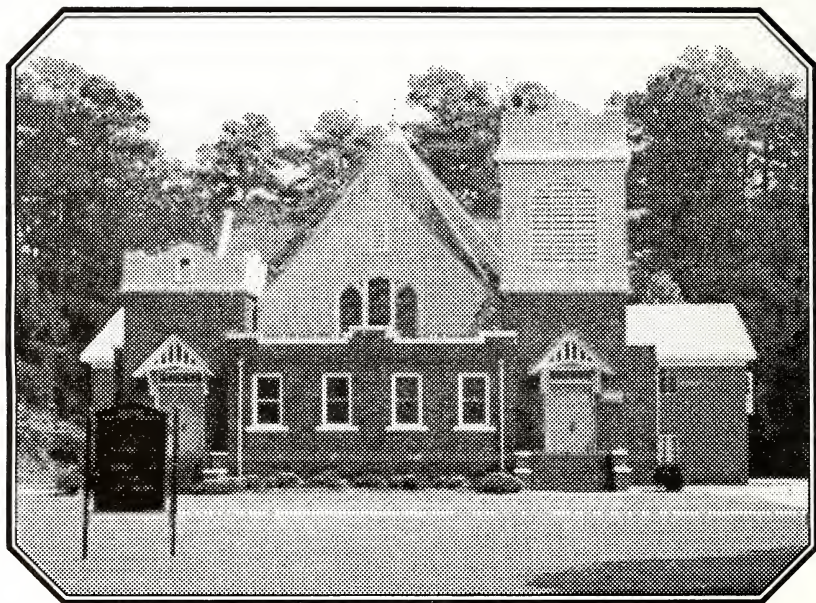
The educational building was dedicated September 25, 1960. Dedication services for the new parsonage was held June 17, 1962. A church library was established in 1965.

On April 18, 1971, chimes were dedicated. Also, in 1971, Rev. Paul Johnson began a summer resort ministry at Dupree Landing, with the assistance of Mrs. Sallie Council. In 1972 extensive renovations were made to the buildings, and basketball and tennis courts were paved. The first youth worker for the summer was Kenny Shore in 1976.

In 1983 Steve Holland was licensed to preach.

The pastors have included G. W. Hill, E. W. Wooten, and J. W. Dickson in 1876 and 1877. Others have included the following:

HALLSBORO BAPTIST CHURCH



Hinson's Crossroads Baptist Church was organized in 1894. A storm destroyed the early records of this church. It is known; however, that it joined the Cape Fear - Columbus Association in 1904.

Records from 1917 reveal the following facts. Rev. Cornelius Stanley served as pastor from 1917 until 1921. During his pastorate the wood structured building was enlarged.

Serving as pastor from 1921 until 1922 was W. A. Coleman followed by Cornelius Stanley again from 1922 until 1930. In 1930, I. F. Britt began his pastorate and served until 1934. Cade Beaver served the church as pastor from 1934 until 1941. Hinson's Crossroads Church was a charter member of the Columbus Baptist Association formed in 1936.

In 1941, Paul Britt was called as pastor and served until 1942. Jasper Hinson served from 1942 until 1943. During the pastorate of B. G. Early from 1943 until 1947, a new brick sanctuary with classrooms was constructed in 1945. R. C. Melton served the church from 1949 until 1951.

E. P. Lockamy served from 1951 until 1953. From 1954 until 1957, J. R. Blanchard served as pastor. R. E. Watson came in 1957 and served until 1959. In 1958 the educational building with a kitchen and recreational area were completed. From 1959 until 1964, E. L. Marks served the church.

In 1960 an organ was installed and the sanctuary was renovated in 1961. Also, at this time a heating and air-conditioning plant was installed along with wall to wall carpeting. In 1962 an outside bulletin board was erected, and the church organ was paid in full. On March 1, 1963, the church worshiped in the newly remodeled church. The church and Porter Swamp Church formed a field in 1963 also. The walls were repaired, carpet was installed, and a new heat and air-conditioning plant was installed. On July 5, 1964, Grady Mc Keithan became the pastor. He served until 1965. Rev. McKeithan was followed as pastor in 1966 by Rev. Joseph Creech. In 1968 Charles Ray Rackley became the church's first full-time pastor. Rev. Rackley resigned in 1968. On November 1, 1969, Rev. George W. White became the pastor.

In 1971 a new heat and air-conditioning plant was installed in the educational building. On November 1, 1972, Rev. White resigned and retired. Lehmon Hardin became pastor in 1973, and served until 1974. In 1974 a new steeple was erected the front of the building was remodeled. On January 5, 1975, Tommy Deese became pastor, and in 1975 the church purchased an organ. Tommy Deese retired in 1978, and Brancie Stephens is called as pastor. Mr. Stephens resigned in 1983. He was followed by Lewis Howard, who was ordained by this church on November 4, 1984. Earl Brooks became the pastor on June 10, 1990.

On November 4, 1984, the church ordained Lewis Howard to the Gospel Ministry.

In 1990 Hinson's Crossroads called Earl Brooks as pastor. In 1991 a ground breaking was held for a new fellowship hall. It has since furnished the new fellowship hall. In 1994 the church bought a new Baldwin piano, and a new Rogers organ. Mr. Brooks also resigned in 1994. In 1995 the church called Rev. Billy Stines as pastor and dedicated the new organ and piano.

In 1997 the church wrote and printed the church history and prepared to celebrate the church's centennial.

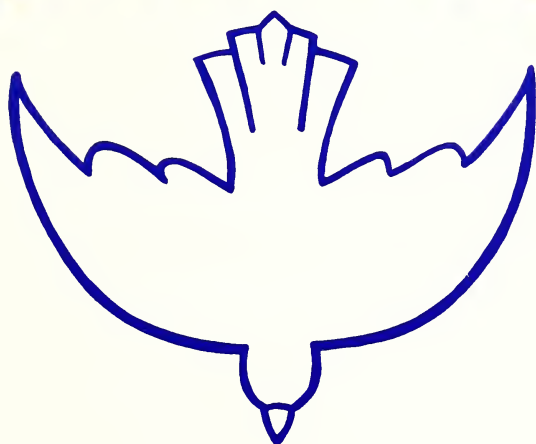

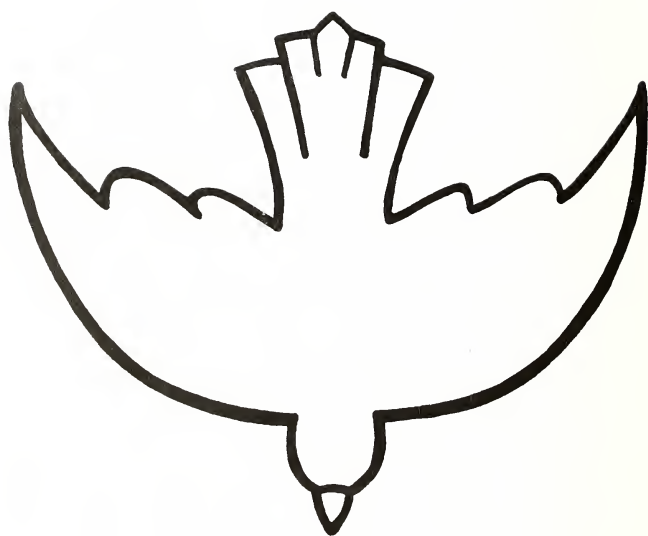

The Missions Committee will be leading the "Preservation" or an assimilation of the new believers into a local congregation during Celebrate Jesus 2000.

They had decided that at this time it would not be wise for the Association to set aside money for this. Although if churches would like to donate to this they could do this. EVANGELISM

The primary focus of evangelism for the Columbus Baptist Association has been "Celebrate Jesus 2000" (CJ2000). In September 1998 a regional meeting was held discussing the national strategy for CJ2000. National, State, and Regional leaders met to discuss how CJ2000 could impact North America.

After hours of study, prayer, and meetings with CBA leaders we could see how God was compelling us to share the gospel with every person in Columbus County through CJ2000. Our CJ2000 goal is to pray for and share the gospel of Jesus Christ with every person in Columbus County by the year end 2000. Our association's role in CJ2000 is to act as a catalyst, a communicator of information, and a strategy coordinator. It is also our hope that other churches and denominations will join us in the task of reaching the CJ2000 goal.

We offered personal witnessing training in February at the Association Office. Almost 30 persons were in attendance and 10 churches were represented. Our director of evangelism offers personal witnessing training on an ongoing basis in our churches upon invitation.

In March our Director of Missions offered prayer walking training through our association. Prayer walking can be an integral part of CJ2000. Also, at our Spring Association meeting held at New Hope Baptist Church, we commissioned our churches to CJ2000. Packets of CJ2000 information were distributed to each church in attendance.

Prayer teams are currently scheduled in Tabor City, but plans are to have teams at the three other major entrances into our county. Your help is needed for this prayer strategy.

In August our Evangelism Committee met and set goals for the 1999-2000 year. Our goals are: (1) to provide encouragement and assist our churches in every possible way with CJ2000; (2) contact all 50 churches and survey their evangelism program and ask how we as an association can better serve their needs; (3) work with the Columbus County Ministerial Association in promoting and implementing the Ralph Bell Crusade scheduled for May 19-23 2000. (The committee sees this as a cooperative effort conjoining a CJ2000 mass evangelism event and the crusade.); (4) provide personal witnessing training.

Our fair booth the first week of October at the Columbus County Fair will promote CJ2000. We want our county to know we are Celebrating Jesus! We know it will be a great success. The booth will be a cooperative project of the evangelism and mission's committees.

As of August 24, 1999, 35 persons have come to know Jesus Christ through our church Vacation Bible Schools. A special thanks to all prayer warriors and teachers who faithfully seek to save the lost.

A special thanks to our Evangelism Committee for their faithful commitment to share the Gospel of Jesus Christ!

We have received two anonymous gifts, one in the amount of \$10,000 and another in the amount of \$5,000 to be used for Vision 51. We praise the Lord for people who give so generously, out of a heart of love for the lost, all, lost people. We are still praying for someone to donate (or sell) one or two acres of land on which to build our 51st church (Hispanic). We have the funds to begin, we now need the land.

CONSTITUTION AND BYLAWS

PREAMBLE

We, the messengers of Baptist Churches of Columbus County, do hereby propose to establish and maintain the order and rules of a District Association in conformity to the following plan:

ARTICLE I. NAME

This organization shall be known as the Columbus Baptist Association Incorporated.

ARTICLE II. OBJECTIVES

The objectives of the Association shall be to elicit, combine, and direct the energies of Columbus Baptists in advancing the Redeemer's Kingdom throughout the earth, more especially along the lines recommended and adopted by the Southern Baptist Convention, the North Carolina Baptist State Convention, and the Association itself, to promote the fellowship and good will among the churches; and to devise and promote measures for increasing the harmony, intelligence and spiritual powers of the churches.

ARTICLE III. MEMBERSHIP

Section 1. This Association shall be composed of regularly constituted Baptist churches in Columbus County that shall be represented at its regular or special meetings by duly elected messengers in the following ratio: (1) Three (3) for the first one hundred members or fraction thereof, and one for fifty (50) additional members, but provided that no church may have more than ten (10) messengers. (2) All ordained ministers who are serving as pastor within the Association, Associational Officers and Committee Members.

Section 2. Messengers shall be members in good standing with the church they represent, and their names must appear on the letter from their church to the association to entitle them to be seated as messengers.

Section 3. The Association shall be sole judge of its membership, and may reject or receive churches applying for membership therein at its pleasure, provided that the churches so receive shall come under the watch care of the Association for a period of one year. During this period such church or churches shall be entitled to all the rights and privileges of the Association except that of their members voting or holding office. At the conclusion of this period, should no valid objection be raised, they become members in regular standing by action of the Association.

Section 4. The Association shall encourage the organizing of new Baptist Churches within Columbus County under the leadership of any pastor, church, churches, or interested persons of the Association. If a new church contemplates being received into the fellowship of the Association after its organization, those who are to compose its charter membership and those leading in its organization are urged to seek counsel of the Executive Promotion Committee and shall proceed with the organization only after approval is given.

Section 5. A church seeking admission into the Association shall present its application to the Credentials Committee and furnish the Committee with such information as it may require about the church. The Committee may then recommend that such church be received under the watch care of the Association for the period of one year from the date of that Associational Meeting.

Section 6. The Association may, at any time, dissolve connection with any church that becomes disorderly in practice or that fails to represent itself either by messengers or letter for two (2) consecutive sessions without sufficient reason or that ceases to be missionary in practice. The support of the causes fostered by the denomination at large and of this Association in particular shall be the test of each church as a missionary body.

Section 7. The New Testament shall be accepted as the sole guide in matters of doctrine and practice, and the Association shall reserve the right to withdraw fellowship from any church that does not conform thereto.

ARTICLE IV. POWERS AND PREROGATIVES

The Association shall have no power whatsoever to infringe upon the rights of the churches. It may advise or recommend matters to the usefulness for their adoption and guidance but cannot bind them in any way. All the churches constituting the Association remain sovereign and independent bodies and unite only that they may more effectively promote the causes of Christ throughout the world.

ARTICLE V. DUTIES OF CHURCHES

It shall be the duty of each church to appoint messengers, to insist upon their attendance at Associational Meetings, to contribute toward the expense of the Association, and to send annually a report to the Association which gives information requested in forms provided by the Associational Clerk.

ARTICLE VI. ORGANIZATION

Section 1. The General Officers shall be Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, and three (3) Trustees. The Associational Staff shall be non-voting ex-officio members of all committees and councils.

Section 2. Additional Officers shall be the Sunday School Director, Discipleship Training Director, W.M.U. Director, Brotherhood Director, Music Director, Media/Library Director, Evangelism Director, Missions Director, Finance Chairman, Worship Resource Leader, Youth Director and others as needed including a full slate of organizational officers as recommended by the Educational Division of the Baptist Sunday School Board.

Section 3. The Nominating Committee shall recommend the officers to the Association with the exception of the W.M.U. Director, who shall be elected by the W.M.U. in accordance to the By-Laws of the Woman's Missionary Union of the Association. However, the Association reserves the right to make other nominations for any and all offices and committees at the Annual Spring Meeting.

Section 4. The offices of the Clerk and Treasurer may be held by the same person.

Section 5. The General Officers and additional officers are specified in Section 2 of this Article shall be elected at the Spring Session and shall be installed and assume their duties at the close of the Fall Session of the current year and continue their duties until the successors are installed at the next Fall Session unless removed for cause, or until their successors are appointed.

Section 6. The term of office for Moderator and Vice-Moderator shall not exceed two (2) years in succession. All other officers may be re-elected to succeed themselves in office at the pleasure of the Association.

Section 7. All officers and committees shall be members of the churches affiliated with the Association.

Section 8. The term of office for all members of committees shall be for three (3) years with a portion of the members rotating off annually.

Section 9. Vacancies in these offices or committees that may occur between the Annual Session of the Association shall be filled for the remainder of the Associational year by the Executive Promotion Committee.

Section 10. Each committee shall have not less than three (3) and not more than five (5) members unless otherwise specified. Members shall be from different churches.

ARTICLE VII. DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Section 1. It shall be the duty of the Moderator to preside when the association is in session and serve as Chairman of the Executive Promotion Committee. The Moderator shall also appoint a five (5) member Committee on Committees within ten (10) days after the Annual Fall Association Meeting.

Section 2. It shall be the duty of the Vice-Moderator to preside in the absence of the Moderator and to assist him in every way possible and to succeed to the office of Moderator if and when during his tenure the office of Moderator becomes vacant.

Section 3. It shall be the duty of the Clerk to keep accurate record of the meetings of the Association and prepare minutes to be distributed as soon thereafter as possible. He/she shall serve as secretary of the Executive Promotion Committee.

Section 4. It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to keep an accurate record of the money paid into his hands, pay all bills as they become due and to make an annual report to the Association. He/she shall make a written report of the financial condition to the Associational Council and provide written reports to the Executive Promotion Committee when requested. He/she shall make a monthly report to the Associational office. He/she shall be a member of the Finance Committee.

Section 5. It shall be the duty of the Sunday School Director, Church Discipleship Training Director, W.M.U. Director, Music Director, Brotherhood Director, Missions Director, Evangelism Director, and Media/Library Director to lead in the promotion of the activities of the organization of which he/she is head, and to preside over the meetings of the organization. These officers shall bring a report of their work to each quarterly meeting of the Associational Council.

Section 6. It shall be the duty of the Trustees to hold in trust all property of the Association. Trustees shall serve as Directors of the Corporation. There shall be three trustees for a 3-year rotating system with the Chairperson to be the Trustee that will be rotating off.

Section 7. It shall be the duty of the Worship Resource Leader to educate, inform, and encourage the local churches, helping them to realize the importance of worship, identify worship styles of churches in the Association, personally promote associational, regional and state sponsored worship events, and provide input for worship at Associational meetings.

Section 8. It shall be the duty of the Youth Director to help educate, inform, and encourage local churches to realize the importance of establishing and maintaining a youth ministry, and to coordinate ministry activities throughout the Association.

Section 9. All reports, both Associational and Denominational, shall not exceed three hundred (300) words except the Treasurer's Report and the Director of Missions report.

ARTICLE VIII. RULES OF ORDER

Section 1. All business shall be concluded and all discussions carried on in the manner prescribed in *Roberts Rules of Order Revised*.

Section 2. The method of voting shall be by show of hands, or by the will of the body.

Section 3. The simple majority shall prevail in all cases except as otherwise provided in this Constitution, provided that any member may at any time call for a written ballot or roll call.

Section 4. A ruling by the presiding officer shall be final unless appeal be had from such ruling to the entire body present.

Section 5. A question having been decided twice by vote in the same attitude at a regular session of the Association shall not be introduced again except by consent of the body as expressed by a majority vote.

Section 6. At least one-fifth of the messengers enrolled shall be necessary to constitute a quorum.

ARTICLE IX. TIME OF MEETING

Section 1. The Spring Associational Meeting shall be held the last Monday evening in March each year, except when it conflicts with Easter. The Fall Associational Meeting shall be held on the Tuesday before the fourth Sunday in October, with an afternoon and evening session. The Associational Meeting then would be from 7-9 in March and on Tuesday night and Wednesday morning in the Fall to be held on Tuesday and Wednesday before the 4th Sunday in October. However, in the case of some unavoidable circumstances that makes a change in the date of the annual meeting necessary, with the Associational Council or the Executive Committee, preferably the Executive Committee, shall have the authority to change said date provided at least two (2) weeks in advance of the new date for the annual meeting.

Section 2. In the event of some emergency that makes a called meeting of the Association necessary, either the Associational Council or the Executive Promotion Committee shall have the authority to call for a special meeting of the Association, provided that a notice of the time and place and purpose of such a called meeting shall be mailed to the Pastors and Clerks of the Churches of the Association at least two (2) weeks in advance of the time set for the called meeting.

ARTICLE X. THE ASSOCIATIONAL YEAR

Section 1. The Associational year shall begin the first of October and close the last day of the following September.

ARTICLE XI. THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

Section 1. The Executive Committee shall be composed of the Pastor of each church in the Association, the two (2) members (either men or women) represented by each church in the Association on the church letter, and the following Associational officers. Sunday School Director, Discipleship Training Director, W.M.U. Director, Brotherhood Director, Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, Music Director, Media/Library Director, Missions Director, Finance Chairman, Youth Director, Worship Resource Leader, and Chairperson of all standing committees.

Section 2. It shall act for the Association in the interim between the annual sessions.

Section 3. The duty of this committee shall be to carry out the policies and will of the Association. It shall not taken an action contravening the will of the Association; nor shall it initiate any new policies or practices binding on the Association unless specifically directed, provided: That in an adequate emergency it may take such action as it may deem necessary, but such action shall in every case be submitted to the next meeting of the Association for appropriate consideration. It shall make a full and complete report of its activities at the next Associational meeting. It shall meet quarterly except in April following the Spring Association Meeting and as often thereafter as is necessary to carry out the policies and will of the Association. A meeting of this committee may be called at any time by the chairman, and it shall be his duty to call a meeting upon the request of any five (5) members of this committee.

ARTICLE XII. ASSOCIATIONAL COUNCIL

Section 1. The Association shall have an Associational Council composed of the Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, Discipleship Training Director, Sunday School Director, W.M.U. Director, Brotherhood Director, Music Director, Media/Library Director, Finance Chairman, Evangelism Director, Missions Director and the President of the Pastors' Conference.

Section 2. The Vice-Moderator shall be the chairman of this Council.

Section 3. This Council shall counsel and advise any committee or church in the Columbus Baptist Association on any subject which has been submitted to it.

Section 4. This Council shall meet prior to the regular meeting of the Executive Promotion Committee. The chairman of this Council shall bring to each of the Executive Promotion Committee meetings a report of its work.

Section 5. This Council is responsible for the supervision of the work of the Director of Missions and shall study carefully the program of work for the entire Association and the needs of all the churches. In the light of this study, the Council shall work out an annual Calendar of Activities for the Association to be presented to the Executive Promotion Committee, to run concurrently with the Calendar Year.

ARTICLE XIII. STANDING COMMITTEES AND DUTIES

Section 1. Committee on Committees - This Committee shall be composed of five (5) members which said members shall come from different churches within the Association. It shall be the duty of this Committee to present at the annual meeting of the Association, a nomination for the membership of all standing committees of the Association unless otherwise provided in this Constitution.

Section 2. Nominating Committee - The Nominating Committee shall be composed of at least five (5) members. The Nominating shall nominate all officers proposed by the Constitution. After they are nominated the Sunday School Director, Discipleship Training Director, W.M.U. Director, Music Director, Brotherhood Director and Media/Library Director shall enlist and propose a full slate of organizational leaders to the Nominating Committee. After the Nominating Committee makes its report to the Association, nominations shall be in order from floor.

Section 3. Program Committee - The duty of this Committee is to plan the program for the annual meeting of the Association and bring it to the Executive Promotion Committee for discussion and approval. The Committee should begin its work well in advance of the meeting of the Association and should make sure that those requested to make reports are prepared and on hand. Copies of the program should be prepared and distributed to the messengers and visitors at the Associational Meeting.

Section 4. Finance Committee - This Committee shall consist of five (5) members from different churches. This Committee should keep a close watch on the needs of the Association for an adequate budget and a well-balanced program of work and should be prepared to bring to the Association in Annual Session a proposed budget. This Committee should also be prepared to advise the Treasurer of the Association during the year concerning the items in the budget to the end that the Association may be kept in a healthy financial condition. It shall be the duty of the Committee to see that an audit of the Treasurer's books be made following the close of the Associational Year and present to each Annual Meeting of the Association.

Section 5. Credentials Committee -

(a) It shall be the work of this Committee to make proper investigation of churches that express a desire to affiliate with the Association concerning their being orthodox in faith and cooperative in spirit, to report to the Association in Annual Session their findings and recommendations concerning the acceptance or rejection of such churches.

(b) If invited, this Committee shall go to any church for the purpose of edifying Christian fellowship.

Section 6. Committee on Ordination:

(a) This Committee shall consist of three (3) ordained ministers presently serving as pastor in the association and two (2) ordained deacons.

(b) This committee shall serve only in an advisory capacity and, when invited by a church in the Association, shall assist in the examination, preparation and ordination of candidates for the Gospel Ministry.

Section 7. Committee on Evangelism - This Committee should seek to keep alive the fires of evangelism in all meetings of all the organizations of the Association, encourage evangelistic services in churches not reporting baptisms and help provide evangelistic services in unchurched sections within the bounds of the Association, to organize and promote the Simultaneous Revivals, and to promote any county-wide evangelistic services. This Committee shall be organized in accordance with the suggested Southern Baptist Program of Evangelism.

Section 8. Missions Committee - This Committee shall consist of five (5) members from different churches. This Committee shall keep alert to any development that may make a church or branch Sunday School necessary, counsel with groups considering a new church or branch Sunday School about the necessity of such organizations, assist in organizing new churches, seek to encourage the best location possible when new churches are formed. This committee shall also, when invited by the Vacation Bible School director of the Director of Missions, assist in promoting and maintaining Vacation Bible School wherever needed in the Association. It shall encourage pastor less, part-time churches to form fields with pastors located as near the center as possible, assist churches when called upon or when there is an evident need, when such is welcomed, to find most suitable pastors, and to serve as a contact for worthy men desiring to become pastors.

Section 9. Committee on Denominational Agencies - This Committee shall consist of one person representing each of the following: Cooperative Program, Baptist Hospital, Children's Homes, Denominational Literature, Retirement Homes, Baptist Colleges, Annuity Board, Baptist Foundation and any other causes, agency or institution deemed advisable. It shall be the responsibility of each of these to see that the interests of these causes and agencies are kept before the Association and churches at all times, and that proper report concerning the progress and needs of these causes and agencies are presented to the Associational Meetings.

Section 10. Committee on Libraries - It shall be the duty of this Committee to plan and promote church library work in the Association. It should encourage each church without a library to start one, and help in stabilizing those already in operation. The Committee should assist churches in starting their libraries and help them in organizing their library committee. The Committee should also plan and promote a program of training for all church libraries.

Section 11. Constitutional Committee. It shall be the duty of the Committee to study the Constitution of our Association and to recommend to the Association at its annual session such changes, amendments or revisions as may be deemed necessary and appropriate in accordance with the needs of the Association.

Section 12. Resolutions Committee - It shall be the duty of this Committee to prepare and present to the Association at its annual session such resolutions and other reports as may be appropriate and in order for consideration by the Association.

Section 13. Time, Place and Preacher Committee - It shall be the duty of this Committee to plan and prepare for the sessions of the Columbus Baptist Association and to secure a preacher and alternate for the Fall Session and to do such other acts and things as may be necessary to provide the proper facilities for such annual meetings of the Association.

Section 14. Christian Social Ministries - The work of this Committee is to create an awareness in the Baptist churches of the Association of the teachings and ministries of Jesus Christ in attempting to meet the needs of the total person in light of the Gospel. Workshops will be held to point out needs of persons and possible ways in which we may become involved to meet those needs.

Section 15. Christian Life Council - The work of the Christian Life Council is to be alert and call to the attention any encroachment upon our religious freedom. Working through its chairman it shall report at each Executive Promotion Committee meeting any matter that appears to be in contradiction to our belief.

Section 16. Deacon Representative - The Deacon Representative shall be responsible for seeing that at least one training session (workshop or retreat) shall be conducted for deacons from across the Association during each Associational Year.

Section 17. Energy Consultant - The Energy Consultant will prepare himself/herself to the extent that he/she will stand ready to make suggestions on how a church may conserve energy.

Section 18. Building and Grounds Committee - The Building and Grounds Committee shall be composed of five (5) rotating members. It shall be the responsibility of this committee to respond to the needs of the associational building(s) and grounds as they arise. Periodically the committee shall inspect all property to insure proper maintenance, making certain property adheres to all state, county, and city codes. The committee shall be authorized to spend up to three hundred dollars (\$300) for repairs or improvements without approval by the Executive Committee, but in consultation with the Director of Missions. Responsible persons shall be sought to perform tasks of repairs and improvements.

Section 19. It shall be the duty of the Historian to collect minutes of each session of the Association and have these bound into book form every ten (10) years and to assist in any way possible in keeping records of the history of the Associational office. He/she shall submit a short history of two (2) different churches at each Annual Meeting to be incorporated into the association minutes each year until all churches have a written history in the minutes. The churches shall be taken in alphabetical order. Any new church shall be put at the bottom of the list.

ARTICLE XIV. REVISION

This Constitution may be immediately revised at any regular session of the Association by a two-thirds vote of the messengers present provided notice of such revision shall be given in the afternoon session and then voted on in the evening session.

CHURCH HISTORY FROM ACP REPORTS 1999

Antioch Baptist VBS broke their record this year with an attendance of 108 and an average attendance of 98 for the week. Windows were replaced in the sanctuary. WMU sponsored a reception for their pastor and his wife for their 31st Anniversary.

Calvary Baptist renovated sanctuary and Fellowship Hall. Former Pastor Rev. S C Davis died.

Hallsboro Baptist completed phase II of the sanctuary renovation. Sent two ladies from their church to Kosova (Verlene Batten and Jessie High).

Hinson's Cross Roads Baptist remodeled and enlarged bathrooms in church building. Installed lights to shine on steeple. Had a Bible study "Experiencing God" led by pastor. Had RA basketball team. Observed Independence Day with food, fellowship and fire works.

Iron Hill Baptist sponsored 8 youth and 2 adults who attend "Super Summer Celebration at Ridgecrest. The quiet atmosphere of the church yard has been enhanced by the establishment of a Prayer Garden. Concrete tables and benches, a project of the Senior Citizens, are now in place. A Cross contributed by others has become an inspiring focal point. Plans are already in place to further enhance the area by adding shrubbery - a project of the Young Adult Ladies Sunday School Class. A special event for the year was our Pastor Appreciation Day August 15, 1999 honoring Rev. Russel Long and his wife Betty for 6 years of devoted service. Mark Player surrendered to the call of the Gospel Ministry.

Nakina Baptist have completed plans for the sanctuary. Over \$255,000 has been collected toward the building of the sanctuary. This money was collected over a period of years.

Riegelwood Baptist installed beautiful stained glass windows in their sanctuary in January. Ordained Rev. David Mull to preach at Whites Creek Baptist Church, Clarkton, North Carolina.

Unity Baptist received approval of a loan for \$250,000 to build their church. This letter came by FedEx during worship service while the pastor was preaching on "The Power of a Vision" on March 14. On April 4th they enjoyed an Easter Sun-Rise Service and note burning ceremony; on April 11th they had a Groundbreaking ceremony and dinner. In May they began preparations for the sewer beds and foundation pad for the new building.

Western Prong Baptist renovated their parsonage.

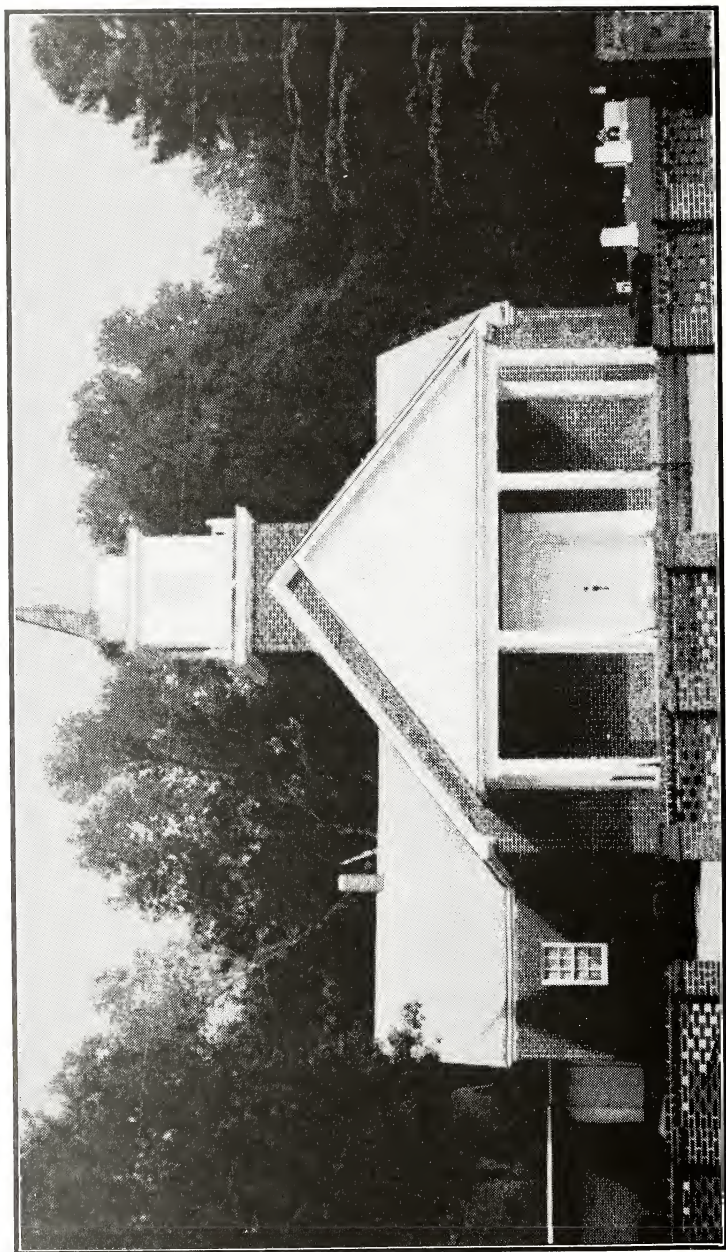
Westside Baptist held a Choir Chair Dedication Service on September 12, 1999.

MACEDONIA BAPTIST CHURCH

MACEDONIA

There are no records of the early work of Macedonia Baptist Church, but according to the associational minutes, the church was organized in 1839. The first church building was built of logs and stood near where the present building stands. Macedonia joined the Cape Fear Association in 1839 also.

A building was built about 1840 of lumber. About 1880 another building was built of lumber which was used until 1946. Those serving as pastor from 1806 until 1912 include David Dowe, Charlie Pridgen, Neil Stanley and Charlie Bullock. The church joined the first Columbus Baptist Association in 1892 and was a charter member of the Cape Fear - Columbus Association formed in 1899.

Serving as pastor from 1912 until 1915 was Methuel Stephens. Pastor from 1915 until 1918 was Paul Britt. W. A. Coleman served the church from 1918 until 1922. They called Paul Britt for a second time from 1922 until 1932 and W. A. Coleman served a second time from 1932 until 1934. G. M. Singletary was pastor from 1934 until 1937. Macedonia was a charter member of the Columbus Baptist Association formed in 1936. Mr. Grant Russell served the church from 1937 until 1938. W. S. Caudle came to serve in 1939 and did so until 1940.

S. M. Singletary served as pastor from 1941 and was followed by R. W. Strickland in 1942. The present building was voted upon about 1946 and was built of cement blocks, plaster and stucco.

When Mr. Strickland left in 1951, he was followed by R. W. Melton who served until 1962.

L. L. Todd was pastor from 1962 until 1964. Restrooms were added to the church. S. C. Davis was called as pastor in 1965 and served until January 23, 1972. In 1966 the aisle and vestibule were carpeted. On April 14, 1968, Mrs. Myrtle Nance offered land for parking spaces.

In 1971 a new Baldwin electric organ and baptistry were installed. Vernon Williamson came as pastor in 1972. On November 22, 1973, Mrs. Myrtle Nance presented Macedonia Baptist Church a deed for the land on which the fellowship hall was built. Mr. Williamson resigned in 1975. Earl Lanier was called the same year, and served until 1981. On December 6, 1975, .3 of an acre of land was purchased from Mr. and Mrs. Paul Nance for the building of an educational building. This building was completed in 1976. On January 25, 1976, Robert Alan McNair was recommended to be licensed into the Gospel Ministry by the pastor and deacons. On May 13, 1979, Linzy Nance gave evidence that God had called him to the Gospel Ministry. October 7, 1979 was a proud day for Macedonia Baptist Church as it ordained Robert Alan McNair into the Gospel Ministry.

God showered His blessings upon Macedonia again on August 31, 1980 as Linzy Nance was ordained into the Gospel Ministry.

Vernon Williamson began a second call on July 5, 1981 and still serves this church.

On October 10, 1990, the church voted to ordain Mark Brown into the Gospel Ministry, and this came to pass on November 11, 1990. On July 14, 1991, the church honored Mr. Williamson on his 10th year anniversary with them. In the 1995-1996 church year the fellowship hall was remodeled.

On January 1, 2000 new pews were installed. On January 2 they prepared a time capsule. During a special Sunday evening service several items were placed in the time capsule. Rick Astle, DOM, participated in the service. The capsule was sealed and buried January 3, 2000 at 9:00 a.m. and will be opened in the year 2050. May the name of our Lord Jesus Christ forever be lifted up!

MOUNT ZION BAPTIST CHURCH



MOUNT ZION

Mount Zion Baptist Church was organized in 1837. Services were held in a small one-room building. In the following years the membership grew. This required more space in which to worship, so about 1900 construction began on a larger building. When completed this building contained a sanctuary, four classrooms and a balcony. It was located about two hundred yards from the present building. It was a charter member of the Cape Fear - Columbus Association when it was formed in 1899.

Mount Zion was also a charter member of the Columbus Baptist Association formed in 1936.

By the year 1957 the membership had continued to grow and attendance had increased until the facilities were inadequate to accommodate the membership. They started another building in the Fall of that year. This building consisted of more classrooms and other necessary facilities. The first services were held in the new building on the first Sunday in January 1959, (January 11).

By the end of 1963 central air and heat had been installed, and a belfry and steeple was added. The building was completed in 1964 by the addition of an attractive steeple. Total monetary cost of the building was \$45,261. Besides this cost, the members donated much time in free labor. In 1965 they built a parsonage near the church, with an open house being held November 28, 1965. It consisted of eight rooms, one and a half baths and a carport. On May 4, 1969 a note burning service of all indebtedness on the church and parsonage was held. The church was valued at \$50,000, and the parsonage value was \$18,000.

In 1971 the parking lot was paved.

K. C. Lennon was ordained to the Gospel Ministry on May 20, 1984. On October 18, 1987, Mount Zion celebrated its 150th Anniversary with a special program.

In December 1987 Mount Zion received a certificate of recognition for their 150th Anniversary from the Southern Baptist State Convention Historical Committee.

In 1997a historical section was established in the educational building with pictures of the four Mount Zion Churches and former Pastors.

In 1998 the church parking lot, parsonage drive way and the basketball court was resurfaced. A special building fund has been established to build a fellowship hall.
