With the graduation of the class of 1939, Albert A. Fredericks will complete his fifth year as President of the Louisiana State Normal College . . . It seems fitting that we review the outstanding events of his term of office ... First of all, the enrollment in residence, correspondence, and extension class students has increased 45 per cent under the administration of President Fredericks . . . The varied activities of President Fredericks in the educational and social world and his appointment to state-wide committees have popularized the name of NORMAL among influential circles . . . New extra-curricular activities have taken root in the past five years, making the students' leisure hours interesting . . . A vast intramural league in all sports and entertainment has been inaugurated to stimulate competition between the various groups . . . Alumni clubs have been established in numerous cities. The Alumni Columns reaches the homes of graduates all over the South . . . Among the improvements on the State Normal College campus during the past five years are the Richard W. Leche library, a new power and light plant, including a parkway lighting system, three N. Y. A. dormitories, that accommodate over 200 students, renovations of all the old buildings on the campus, a new football "bowl," embracing a football field and a quarter-mile cinder track and an extensive

roadway and landscaping project . . . Under construction as this edition of THE POTPOURRI goes to press are a fine arts building and auditorium, two dormitories for women, a social room, a men's dormitory, a stadium, a student center and natatorium, and additions to the infirmary and to the power plant . . . 



Opening against the powerful Centenary Gentlemen of Shreveport, the Demons yielded two touchdowns and a safety and lost 14-0. Even with Weenie Bynum, second-string All-S. I. A. A. in perfect stride, Sophomore Parker Wiggins, pointing to his future brilliant play, was the stand-out on the field.

The East Texas Teachers were next on the schedule, and led by Tully, Little All-American back, chalked up a 19-6 victory. Steve Harmon's 68-yard touchdown jaunt, the longest of the season both for and against the Demons, was the highlight of the game.

A third consecutive loss was handed the Normalites by the Sam Houston Bear Kats. With seven injured regulars on the side lines, the Demons lost 14-6, Wiggins' plunge from the six-yard line resulting in their only score.



Still without a tally in the win column, the Demons met the Southeastern Lions here on the new athletic field and completely outplayed the visitors to register a 6-0 victory. Murrell's pass to Black that was good for 55 yards in the last minute of play gave the local team its margin of supremacy.

Fired over their lone win, in spite of the five regulars that were injured, the local squad, the following week, invaded the lair of the Louisiana College Wildcats and, in a thrill-packed game, emerged on the little end of a 17-14 score. A pass from Barber to Ulmer gave the Central Louisiana team first blood but it was quickly tied by a pass from Murrell to Perkins. The Demons then forged into the lead with a pass from Murrell to Pernici. This lead was dissipated in the third quarter as another connection was made by the Wildcat passing combination of Barber and Ulmer. In the last few minutes of the fourth quarter, the Wildcats took the ball on the Demons' thirty-yard line, from where Barber, on third down, kicked a perfect field goal.

Undaunted still, the Purple and White team met the Louisiana Tech Bulldogs at



Trailing six points for fiftyfive minutes, the local team, with Murrell passing, worked the ball down to the nineyard line, from where three passes were thrown into the end zone before Migues caught the fourth for a touchdown. Ledet then kicked the extra point that gave the local squad its second victory.


Once more on their home field, the Normalites turned on a crushing attack that swamped the Mississippi Delta Statesmen 42-0. Loomis, Wiggins, Scurria, Pernici, Tyler and Jackson all scored touchdowns; and Saucier converted three times, Ledet twice and Renwick once to complete the total points.

For the third consecutive time the Demons remained on top, as they defeated the Stephen F. Austin Lumberjacks in Nacogdoches the following week, 6-0. Although penalized 125 yards, a pass from Wiggins to Perkins again paid dividends and the local squad had four wins to show.

Accomplishing what only Ole Miss among nine other opponents had been able





to do, Coaches Turpin's and Aillet's charges two weeks later, on the strength of Steve Harmon's twenty-yard touchdown run in the first quarter, upset the powerful Mississippi State Teachers, 6-0.

Then, with the Little-Four Championship at stake, the Demons invaded LaFayette Thanksgiving Day and completely outplayed the Southwestern Bulldogs, only to lose 7-0. A pass which was intercepted on the local squad's thirty-yard line placed the Bulldogs in a position to score. A pass from Montgomery to Abel, All-S. I. A. A. back, who had been and from then on, completely bottled up, scored the touchdown.


Although the season was even insofar as games won and lost were concerned, a study of the statistics of all ten games reveals that the Demons are ahead in practically every phase. Coaches Turpin's and Aillet's squad scored 94 points to the opposition's 77, and rolled 2,330 yards from scrimmage or approximately one and one-half miles. On the other hand, their opponents were able to chalk up only 1,148 yards, less than half as much. In the course of this

marching the local team made 109 first downs to the 77 that were made against them. The opposition gained a slight advantage in passing only, attempting 127 heaves, 44 of which were completed for a total of 651 yards or an average of 14.5 yards for each completion. The Demons attempted 121 passes and completed 29 for a gain of 438 yards or an average of 15.3 yards for each completion.

In a squad of thirty-three men, twenty-

seven of which earned letters, fourteen are seniors. The graduating class contains three ends, E. D. Perkins, Jr., John Elkins, and Gordon Wiggins; three tackles, Maxey, Tom Elkins, and Flournoy; a center, "Kidd" Farr; four backs, Loomis, Pernici, Cope, and Harmon; and three guards, Russell, Hillman, and Walter Ledet, who was selected by the Associated Press for a position on the first string of the All-S. I. A. A. team.

FRESHMAN FOOTBALL RESUME



In the first game of the season the Imps met the strong Mansfield High School squad and with Boucher doing all the scoring, emerged the winner by a 13-0 margin.

Against the DeRidder High Dragons, the Demon underlings, scoring at will, won 39-0. Gus Boucher again set the pace, accounting for 20 of the points.

Then doped the underdogs against the Tech Bullpups, who were rated the best first-year squad in the history of that school, a fact substantiated by a 12-6 win over the Centenary freshmen, Coach Nesom's charges completely cutplayed their cpponents but had to be content with a 7-7 tie. Topping the season with the S. I. A. A. championship, Coach "Rags" Turpin's 1938 Demon trackmen ended one of their most successful years of competition.


Opening in the strong Southwestern Relays, the Normalites in competition with Rice, L. S. U., Stephen F. Austin, Tulane, and Southwestern, gained third place. Parker's 196 foot, 5 inch heave of the javelin was the highlight of the meet and the only first place earned by any Demon.

In a triangular meet with L. S. U. and Southwestern, the Purple and White clad squad placed second to the "Ole War Skule," Parker again winning the javelin throw.

The Stephen F. Austin Lumberjacks, the first opponents met on the home track, were defeated 65 to 52 by the Demon spikemen, who piled up eight first and seven second places. Ledet was high point man with firsts in the shot put and the discus.

Still before a local audience, Coach Turpin's charges next defeated the Southwestern Bulldogs 66 to 51, compiling nine first and seven second places. Ledet and Webb tied for scoring honors, each with two first places to his credit.

Then in Pineville, May 7, the Demon trackmen ran off with the S. I. A. A., scoring 91 2/3 points to second place Southwestern's 53. Twelve first, three second, and eight third places were stacked up by the local squad to carry off the honors.

With the largest membership in its twelve years of history, the 1938-39 Forensic Club topped all previous records, traveling over 4,500 miles and engaging in over 300 debates and individual contests held in eight intercollegiate speech tournaments.

Debating two questions: "Resolved that the United States should cease to use public funds (including credits) for the purpose of stimulating business" and "Resolved that world democracies should form an alliance to preserve democracy," Normal College debaters participated in the Millsaps College Invitation Tournament at Jackson, Mississippi, on December 9 and 10; the Louisiana College Tournament at Pineville, Louisiana, on December 16 and 17; the Baylor University Tournament at Waco, Texas, on January 13 and 14; the Mid-South Tournament at Conway, Arkansas, on February 10 and 11; the Savage Forensic Tournament, at Durant, Oklahoma, on March 3 and 4; Louisiana Forensic on local campus, on March 17 and 18; the Southern Association of Teachers of Speech Tournament at Baton Rouge, Louisiana, on March 28, 29, 30 and 31; and the Grand Eastern Tournament at Rockhill, South Carolina, on April 13, 14, and 15. In addition to debating members of the squad entered contests in oratory, extemporaneous speaking, after-dinner speaking, poetry reading, and radio speaking.

Miller of Natchitoches, Norman Dowty of Alexandria and Pat Murphy of Natchitoches, Henry Ford Glass of Natchitoches and Wallace Hunter of Alexandria, and Gardner Krieger and John Norris of Natchitoches. Results of the other tournaments are not available as THE POTPOURRI goes to press. The squad, composed of 14 first-year speakers and 10 varsity debaters maintained an exceptionally high average, winning over sixty per cent of the contests engaged in.

The Forensic Club also sponsored high school tournaments on the local campus February 18 and at several high schools throughout the state.


T H E Y. M. C. A.
