What to know about the supermoon lunar eclipse

Planning on seeing the super blood moon this weekend? No, it's not the latest "Twilight" movie, though it would be a good contender to follow in the series after the "New Moon," "Eclipse" and "Breaking Dawn" installments.

Chicagoans will join people around the globe in staring at the sky Sunday night when the supermoon coincides with the lunar eclipse. It's also referred to as a blood moon because of the moon's glowing color.

If you're 33 years old or younger, you have

never seen this eerie cosmic event. And if you miss it Sunday, you will have to wait another 18 years.

Since Millennials haven't experienced the sky show, here's what to expect.

What is a supermoon lunar eclipse?

A supermoon appears 14 percent bigger and 30 percent brighter because the moon on its orbit is at its closest point to Earth compared with when it is furthest away.

A lunar eclipse occurs when the moon falls into Earth's shadow and darkens. The moon takes on a reddish-copper color caused by sunlight refracting through Earth's atmosphere. The color depends on factors such as

particles in the air. It could be darker, for instance, if there have been volcano eruptions.

It's also a harvest moon, the full moon that is closest to the autumnal equinox. Sunday's lunar eclipse will be the final one in what's called a tetrad, a series of four consecutive total eclipses occurring at six-month intervals.

How rare is it?

A lunar eclipse and a supermoon haven't happened at the same time since 1982. It won't happen again until 2033.

When is it happening in Chicago?

Beginning at 8:07 p.m., the moon's edge will slip into Earth's shadow, and it will look like a

piece of it is cut away. For the next hour, the moon will gradually move into the shadow, and by 9:11 p.m. it will be completely covered by the planet's shadow. The event will last for a little longer than one hour, until 10:23 p.m.

The weather forecast calls for partly cloudy skies, so it won't be a completely clear sky, but it will be a nice night to be outside: Temperatures will be in the low 60s, according to the National Weather Service.

The Adler Planetarium is hosting a viewing party from 7 to 11:30 p.m. with telescope viewing and special lectures for a ticket price of \$12 for adults.

Trust me, eating doughnuts all the time and not working out does not help your waistline despite what you tell yourself. So I packed a different pair of shorts and

spent the holiday weekend binge-eating.

The truth is, the older I get, the harder it is for me to seriously lose weight. I lose motivation and focus quickly. So I bought new shoes and slowly started making the effort. Look, I'm clearly not an expert in weight loss. Sometimes the methods I use to lose weight don't work. I'm even eating a doughnut right now as I reflect on my recent weight troubles. "Stonewall" opens in theaters Friday, but for weeks now the movie has been a source of controversy, with thousands signing at least one petition calling for a boycott of the film.

The movie focuses on Danny (Jeremy Irvine), a fictional white gay man whose father kicks him out of their Indiana home after learning his son's sexual orientation. Danny heads to New York City, where he befriends a group of drag queens and transgender women and eventually participates in the June 1969 riots at the Stonewall Inn, a popular West Village gay bar frequently raided by corrupt police. The riots became highly influential in sparking gay pride marches and the modern gay rights movement.

But with the release of the trailer, critics—in the LGBT community and beyond—have taken exception to what they've seen thus far, saying that the film leaves out or at least blurs the major players who were really there that night, including Latina and black trans protesters

Pat Cordova-Goff, an 18-year-old California college student, created the Gay-Straight Alliance Network petition calling for a boycott of "Stonewall" after watching the movie's trailer.

"Essentially, when I first saw the trailer for the movie I was really excited, but when I watched it, I understood that it would be centered around a white person and the people who were really the essential people behind it were women of color and trans women," Cordova-Goff, who identifies as a trans woman of color, told RedEye this week.

The petition now has more than 24,000 signatures.

Precious Davis, a Hyde Parker who identifies as transfemale, said she won't boycott the movie, but she still has problems with it.

"I do think that in terms of representation, ['Stonewall'] is going to miss the mark," said Davis, who along with fiance Myles Brady, who identifies as transmasculine, was featured in Miley Cyrus' Happy Hippie Foundation #InstaPride campaign in June. Using her personal and the foundation's Instagram accounts, Cyrus shared portraits of those in the LGBT community who inspired her—to celebrate the community as well as highlight the injustices the community faces.



Davis said she feels that movies like "Stone-wall" should tell authentic stories that honor the LGBT community and push the movement forward.

"I think it's important that we claim our narratives as queer and trans people, especially the narratives of marginalized populations who have been erased and forgotten," Davis said.

JD Caudill, 23, of Bucktown, said he has no plans to see the movie in the wake of the controversy.

"The person who threw the first stone was a transgender woman of color, Marsha P. [Johnson], and to whitewash and ciswash this is a shame," said Caudill, who said he's a cisgender white gay man. "No, it's more than a shame—it's an insult to a community of people who have fought for the rights of gay men, the very group they fought for who would then turn their backs on them and pretend they weren't a part of the movement."

Director Roland Emmerich, 59, who is white and gay, was quoted in a recent New York Times story about the controversy: "What can I say? I put all I know as a filmmaker into this film."

He noted that it was a coming-of-age story and said he was proud of the film. "No studio wanted to finance it," he said. "If people want to boycott a movie because of its trailer, what kind of country do we live in?"

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Hundreds trampled to death at hajj in Saudi Arabia

MINA, Saudi Arabia Two giant waves of Muslim pilgrims collided at an intersection Thursday near a holy site in Saudi Arabia, and more than 700 people were crushed and trampled to death in the worst disaster at the hajj in a quarter-century.

"People were climbing over one another just to breathe," said Abdullah Lotfy of Egypt. "It was like a wave. You go forward and suddenly you go back."

The hajj, which drew 2 million people from more than 180 countries this year, is a huge logistical challenge for Saudi Arabia. The kingdom has spent billions of dollars to accommodate the growing number of pilgrims and maintain safety and security at Islam's holy cities of Mecca and Medina for the

annual event.

Saudi authorities began an investigation, said Interior Ministry spokesman Maj. Gen. Mansour al-Turki, adding that initial reports showed two crowds coming from opposing directions converged at an intersection in Mina, on the outskirts of Mecca, when the pushing and shoving started.

"Unfortunately, these incidents happen in a moment," al-Turki said at a news conference.

But four survivors questioned how officials managing the flow of people could allow two big crowds going in different directions to intersect on two streets packed with pilgrims.


"What happened was more than they were ready for," Lotfy, 44, told The Associated Press. ASSOCIATED PRESS

Food carts legal in Chicago

Chicago's food cart vendors will be able to operate legally under a measure approved Thursday by City Council. The estimated 2,000 vendors operating 1,500 carts will be required to get a license—at a cost of \$350 every two years—as well as pass health inspections and prepare food at a commercial kitchen under the new ordinance, which kicks in in 30 days. Legalizing food carts could help the city's economy, resulting in new jobs and as much as \$8.5 million a year in sales tax revenue, according to Ald. Roberto Maldonado (26th), chief sponsor of the ordinance, who cited the Illinois Policy Institute. TRIBUNE, REDEYE

he beverage industry is about giving back to the community. Producers of craft beer and spirits possess an underrated power, humbly changing water into magical elixirs that give us lushes life. But Half Acre Beer Company co-founder Gabriel Magliaro is taking the community service act to another level by giving back to a place that's partially responsible for his success. Introducing Harshad kolsch, a super-clean beer with an earthy, citrusy nose, brewed specially for the 150th anniversary of his alma mater, the School of the Art Institute of Chicago. The beer was released at a private event for SAIC alumni, but the curious can head to the Lincoln Square taproom (4257 N. Lincoln Ave.) for a pint on draft (\$5) or a bomber (\$7.99 and worth it for the label while it lasts).

Magliaro, 37, went to SAIC from 2001 to 2003 and worked in advertising for three years after he graduated. Before SAIC, he lived in Colorado, where he got a taste of the culture behind microbreweries, and though he didn't see himself opening a brewery while in school, it eventually became his dream job. Half Acre got its start in 2006, brewing with Sand Creek Brewing Company in Wisconsin when there wasn't much going on in Chicago's craft beer scene. Magliaro teamed up with Matt Gallagher, and the two took off from there. Now, the pair operate two brewing facilities—the original in Lincoln Square with a taproom and a new 60,000-square-foot, 30-barrel brewhouse (2050 W. Balmoral Ave.) in Bowmanville, where flagship beers such as Daisy Cutter are produced and that soon will house a restaurant and biergarten. Magliaro sat down to chat about Harshad and how an art school kid rose to running a successful business.

What does Harshad mean?

Harshad is a mathematical reference to the number itself, 150, but it's also a Sanskrit word that means joy seeker. [Half Acre and SAIC] thought that was very appropriate, seeing as the artistic process really centers on that—whether it's on the creative's side or on the observer's side.

What did you study at SAIC?

I studied visual communication, photography and writing. The great thing about the school is you can experience a lot of different things while you're there, and it can be as narrow or as broad as you choose. ... I got to experience a range of ideas that tie back to Half Acre and being an entrepreneur almost perfectly because doing what we do for a living, just being an entrepreneur and starting a business, you really have to be proficient, if not good, at a lot of different things and be able to tackle different subject matter quickly and effectively.

Coming from an art school, were you ever fearful about starting your own business and not having a cut-from-the-fabric business background?

Sure. Still am. I think that's part of the gig kind of. I think the types of insecurities change. They exist today, but different types of fears. But I did not go to business school. I did not have an MBA. Getting into this, that factual, raw tax-law mindset was not something I possessed, but I think what I did have was some guts and also the ability or confidence to think about things creatively. I could bob and weave in a way that allowed me ... to think creatively about what was happening and how to approach it, and that certainly speaks to my experience at the school. ... A lot of things that you might learn in business school are out there right now in books, but at art school and SAIC, that

sort of ongoing training in the process of creativity, you can't really access that in the same way.

You take a very creative approach to your business, and I think some people are really stuck in this idea that business-minded people have to be really clean-cut and uncreative.

But the challenge is to interject your art into whatever you're doing, so you have to really be willing to

define or redefine whatever your undertaking is and apply your arts education or the way you think into making your artwork. Here, it was about looking at how we approach making beer when we're doing it, our labels and how we communicate and interjecting ourselves in a way that best suits our creative self. When I was at school, I saw [Mark Bello] from Right-On Futon speak—he went to the Art Institute—and at the time, he had this corner store at Milwaukee and Division, and he talked about, like, "I sell futons, but every month in my window I have a revolving display," and they were really good. I can remember going by them all the time. So he took it upon himself to interject



that part of him in what he was doing. So you gotta get out there and apply your creativity wherever you land, and there is that outlet.

Any other inspirations?

Just the Right-On Futon guy. [Laughs.] No, everywhere there were little bits, and I try to be a student of everything. Today we don't pretend to have this mapped out. We're very

much still students of this, and it's an ongoing learning process and we'll try to evolve. We'll try to be the same type of students from 'o6 until whatever it is, we'll keep going.

Money can be an intimidating factor for any business, and it's especially something that hinders artists who get in their heads about not having money. So were you sitting on a gold mine?

Oh, God no. We started brewing at another brewing com-

pany because we couldn't afford to do this, which is not uncommon. We didn't possess a lot of the things to build a brewery at the time ... and we started making beer up north and bringing it back to Chicago and begging people to try it. That was pre-'08 market collapse. Matt and I wrote up a business plan and we pitched some banks, and they bit. They loaned us what we thought at the time was a colossal amount of money, and we knew some other brewers in Colorado, they had just built their new brewery, so we offered to buy their entire old brewery.

What's your advice to students on how they can be better artists?

Really think about the definition of what that is. I would say don't be afraid to completely define it and redefine it and redefine it again. It's really just about taking a creative approach to life and to really get after it. A lot of what allowed us to do this was risk and laying it out there and working a lot of hours. ... The success of the early days of Half Acre was on our sweat. It's really not any more complicated than that. I think we made some good choices, but we did it at the expense of ourselves. ... And hopefully you're

doing something you feel really good about. Otherwise, I can't imagine it happening any other way. If I wasn't pumped about really everything, start to finish—what we were making, who I was working with, the people coming in and connecting with it—if all that didn't feel right to me, we would have definitely bailed or something because it's hard enough if all of those things feel good. Definitely shoot for things that feel good, and don't be afraid to sweat a bunch.

But the challenge is to interject your art into whatever you're doing, so you have to really be willing to define or redefine whatever your undertaking is and apply your arts education or the way you think into making your artwork.

Since Half Acre was one of the early breweries in the Chicago craft scene, you could very easily just keep doing what you're doing and be successful, but do you find that other new breweries popping up challenge you?

Sure, but I'd say they uplift us too. Just doing [Harshad] is a way for us to invigorate [ourselves] and invigorate the people that are drinking our beer and connect back to the community and serve Chicago and probably will stand as an example for other breweries too. That's something you can do, connect with an educational institution that meant something to your business and highlight your path through what they do. So I'd say we [challenge] other people, and we have others that [challenge] us, and it's a positive thing.

wenty years ago, dive bars weren't anything special. They were neighborhood drinking dens with singing bass decorations and wood paneling left over from a blip in '60s, when designers declared floors for walls as fashionable. Oftentimes, they were dark, neglected, grimy places that served a single purpose: to keep the locals' mouths wet. Today, the dive bar trend is on the rise, and ironically, when one dive closes, another opens—sometimes right where the old one stood. Such is the case with Best Intentions, which used to be Marble, a Logan Square corner bar dearly loved by the neighborhood regulars. Brothers Calvin and Chris Marty bought up the space last summer, closed it down in February and re-opened quietly with an updated concept in July. Despite all the new—new owners, new menu, new floor plan—nothing really feels new about Best Intentions, something many neo-dives can't seem to pull off.

The scene: When I walked inside, I admittedly wasn't sure if the dark corner tavern with wood-paneled walls, linoleum checkered floors and tchotchkes that hearken back


to your grandpa's man cave had enough to offer outside of the typical neighborhood bar. There's no hip signage outside, and it glows like any other hole in the wall with Big

Beer neon lights in the windows. But this is all part of its charm. This is what makes Best Intentions the homey dive I've been looking for. The carpeted bar seats about 20 and spans the length of the narrow room, which is cluttered with mismatched frames and a jukebox that plays 45s. Behind the bar is a beer fridge with a blocky sign that reads "Fancy cocktail bar," but there isn't much that's fancy inside it, between the Schlitz, Tecate and Miller High Life. A second room is home to a few free arcade games, such as Big Buck Hunter, and leads to a large patio with its own bar. Still skeptical, my friend and I decided we'd get one drink and looked for a seat at the inside bar, which is encased by a wood-paneled overhead, where a cocktail menu board is plastered. The woman next to me asked if I'd even been there before. She was a regular when it was Marble, but she had nothing but good things to say about Best Intentions."Get the sazerac," she said. Maybe

I was quick to judge. The bar was pretty full with a mixed crowd of all ages and seemingly incomes, "which is what a neighborhood bar should be," according to Calvin Marty.

He and his brother have been Chicago bartenders for years, pouring drinks at places such as Matilda, Untitled and Luxbar. They spent a lot of time sitting in low-lit bars talking about their dreams of opening one of their own but never doing it, until now. That's what Best Intentions is, "a dark place for people with bright ideas," Calvin Marty said. With a lot of help from friends and family, the Martys did much of the work on the bar themselves. The authentic down-home feel comes from the pair's love of wood paneling and other charms of old watering holes in Wisconsin, where they grew up. Calvin pictures Best Intentions as a neighborhood bar where there's no pressure to order anything too fancy, but the option is there. Chicago, we've gone to a dive bar and felt comfortable but felt like ... we can't get a good manhattan," he said. "And we've gone to a cocktail bar where you can get a really good cocktail but felt like, 'Oh, I wish it was more relaxed in here.' So our goal was to create the bar that did both really well."

The drinks: Between the menu board that's reminiscent of an old concession stand and the "Fancy cocktail bar" sign on the beer fridge, someone looking for a quality drink could assume Best Intentions isn't the place for it. It's quite the contrary, though, and these details are meant to fly in the face of the pretentious stereotype that surrounds the craft cocktail scene. Making a fancy cocktail doesn't require a lot of frills for Calvin, who exemplified saloons and taverns of the 1900s. "It wasn't like some fancy place, they were holes in the walls that were doing really nice cocktails," he said. "We can make a really nice cocktail without a vest and tie, and you can make one in your grandfather's basement if you have the right stuff." The menu board

has all the classics-moscow

mule, manhattan, negroni,

old fashioned—simply stated in bold block letters. We went for the sazerac (\$10) and a gimlet (\$9). What the board doesn't mention are the ingredients, including the artisan cordials sourced from Todd Appel of Appel's Cordials, such as the lime cordial in the gimlet. Good cocktails don't have to brag. The bar menus, simple fabric-bound books that look like old schoolhouse texts, detail original drink creations and creole dishes, a

recent partnership with Kevin Cowens of Prince Po' Boys. There are \$4 angostura shots from the draft on offer, house-made ginger beer (\$4) and a wondermint malt (\$8-\$11). The bartender won me over with the Jungle Bird (\$9), sheerly based on the barware, if you consider a tin can barware. Fancy that.

The bottom line: Best Intentions retains the charm and feel of a no-frills dive, capturing the broken-in vibe in a way most newer bars can't, and succeeds where the old neighborhood joints fail on the quality cocktail front. It proves that good cocktail-

ing doesn't ruin the sacred corner tavern. It doesn't try too hard to impress with perfectly curated decor and menus that talk down to patrons. It's a place barflies of any kind might fancy because what's important is who's coming through the door and what's in their glass.

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

Raspberry gin buck (\$10) at Frontier

At Frontier, the pioneer-inspired West Town hot spot where urbane eats and drinks are served in a rustic, communal-dining milieu, the craft cocktails are a triumph of understated chic.

One such charmer is Frontier's signature Raspberry Gin Buck, a tall, brisk and blush-hued cocktail that also can be ordered as a punch (\$55, serves parties up to six). The fixings of Hendrick's Gin, raspberry-basil syrup, fresh lime and ginger beer are simple on their own, but in combination provide a vast breadth of sensations—effervescent, tart, zesty, savory and sweet, with touches of ginger spice and aromatic herb—that register this libation as more than just pretty in pink.

And if the lime and ginger beer elements sound familiar, it's because this fruit and herb-infused sipper is a spin on the vodka buck, better known as the Moscow mule.

"I've always liked the combo of basil, raspberry and gin," said Sean Nielsen, beverage director at Frontier. "The floral and vegetal qualities of Hendrick's Gin are a natural pairing with fresh fruit and basil."

There is something to be said for a light, simple and straightforward cocktail that also offers a serenade for the senses, and this buck certainly fits the bill.


I hadn't heard of Spam musubi before stumbling into Lost Lake at the tail end of a bachelorette party, at the time of the night when we didn't really need another drink. But hey—if we were going to do it, better to do it with food. Thankfully, the Chinese-American takeout spot at the front of the Logan Square tiki bar serves to mai tai-sipping patrons until 2 a.m. (3 a.m. on Saturdays), with an after-midnight-only bonus: the musubi, advertised as seared, teriyaki-glazed Spam with sushi rice, nori and furikake (a Japanese seasoning made from dried fish, seaweed, sugar and salt).


From a cartoon sketch on the menu, I deciphered musubi to be, essentially, a piece of Spam nigiri. What landed on my table was better than I imagined: a generous rectangle of Spam, about the size of a jumbo domino, resting on a tidy bed of rice (we're talking hospital corners), with meat and carbs bound by a wide cummerbund of

nori. Each bite—granted, there were only three, but that's all you need—delivered a welcome jolt of salt tempered, somewhat, by the light topcoat of sweet, sticky teriyaki sauce.

The next day, still stuck on this dish, I turned to a colleague and found out musubi is a staple in Hawaii, sold everywhere from convenience stores to school cafeterias. While I wish I could find this at my corner grocery, I'll happily travel to Logan Square to get it—it is, after all, a lot closer than Hawaii.—MARISSA CONRAD, TRIBUNE

Most annoying words on restaurant menus

If you cringe when you see "cooked to perfection" on a restaurant menu, you have a friend in Ezra Eichelberger.

As a professor of hospitality and service management at The Culinary Institute of America in Hyde Park, N.Y., Eichelberger is a pro at menu writing.

"It's very frustrating for me to go to restaurants and see menus [with] the misuse of punctuation or certain terminology," he said.

For example: the overuse of adjectives, many of which are inaccurate or unnecessary.

"Just list ingredients," he said, "and especially the allergens."

A few terms that particularly frustrate the professor:

» Delicious

"Don't tell me how good it is. Just describe the dish and let the guest decide if it's good or not."

"In some states, health departments will

look at that and say, 'Well, whose home was that made in?' and they want see a health certificate." He suggests menu writers use "made on premises," "our own" or "baked on premises.'

» Traditional

"Everyone has their own concept of what traditional is. Now you've got to match

» Wild mushrooms

"Drives me crazy because quite often they're not wild mushrooms. It's basically lying if you're saying wild mushrooms and you've got buttons in there." Plus, it's better to be specific: Different mushrooms have different textures, and knowing which varieties will be used adds value to a dish, he

» Fresh

"It's another word I tell [students] not to use unless they're doing a fruit plate or something, because if you say one thing is fresh, it makes it sound like everything else isn't."

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

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
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Cliched 'Stonewall' is neither competent nor a total outrage

» mpais@rede chicago.com» @mattpais Play count the clichés in "Stonewall," and you may have trouble keeping up. There's Danny (Jeremy Irvine), the former football player whose bigoted head coach dad kicks him out of the house after finding out that his son's gay. There's Ray (Jonny Beauchamp), a drag queen who

also goes by Ramona, loves Judy Garland and turns every conversation into a dramatic show. (After Danny arrives to New York from Indiana and immediately finds a community of colorful outsiders to surround him, Ray soon laments, "Oh, baby, you don't know nothin', do you?"). And there's the new detective (Matt Craven) who's "a total straight arrow" and may not subscribe to the department's usual policies of accepting payoffs and protecting the mob-connected owner (Ron Perlman) when they raid a gay club. Or beating members of the gay community after confronting them on the street.

Of course clichés weren't the focus of pre-release controversy regarding "Stonewall," which is named for the club where the 1969 riots now seen as the beginning of the gay rights movement took place. And while we 100 percent live in a time when people sometimes get very worked up over trailers, it's hard to deny the backlash: The major figures reportedly involved in this event were primarily transgender women of color, so to


concoct the fictional, white, cisgender (nontrans) Danny, whose less traditionally feminine wardrobe and behavior make him less of a target to bigots and a "less different" entry point to the story for conservative viewers, turns transgender leaders like Marsha P. Johnson into supporting characters.

The filmmaking also just isn't good. Director Roland Emmerich ("Independence Day," "Godzilla") keeps explosions to a minimum (the riots only take up about 10 minutes of screen time), but he and writer Jon Robin Baitz (ABC's "Brothers and Sisters") fail to competently depict the effects of the era's prejudiced federal laws (including preventing government agencies from hiring people who are gay and classifying homosexuality as a mental illness) and glaze over the impact, positive and negative, of violent protest. It's suggested that Ray turns tricks because he can't get any other employment, but that's never really shown. Pretty much all of Danny's generic backstory could have been condensed into a few brief glimpses. Also, Danny arrives in New York and quickly has a drag queen hitting on him, saying he's dragging suitcases "like a little baby chicken." Is that something baby chickens do? Or adult chickens?

Fortunately, Irvine (the awful "War Horse") and Beauchamp are pretty good, and at times "Stonewall" effectively identifies the misguided fear and basic denial of human rights that comes along with persecution. But when text appears on screen at the end about what happened to the characters actually based on real people, many will think, "That's what the movie should have been."

'Sicario' has harsh beauty, but not enough detail

Relatively early in "Sicario," FBI agent Kate Macer (Emily Blunt) joins other U.S. officials of deliberately vague identification for an operation in El

Paso. Actually, she's told they're going to El Paso, but it's really Juarez, Mexico, a hotbed of drug kingpinism (not a word, should be) and sickening violence. "You're asking me how a watch works," says Alejandro (Benicio Del Toro) when Kate asks if there's something she should know about the cartels in advance. "For now let's just keep an eye on the time." Only someone as endlessly cool as Del Toro could pull off that line, and the ensuing highway action sequence is a beautiful, terrifying study in tension and uncertainty. If not for the subject matter, I'd have broken into a grin.

In some ways "Sicario" maintains this gripping sense of style, with legendary cinematographer Roger Deakins ("Skyfall," "No Country for Old Men") the undeniable MVP here. Rather than bring the story to a boil, director Denis Villeneuve ("Prisoners," the spectacular "Incendies") prefers to glide along it, even a slow zoom past a rock formation seeming to find muscles and a screaming face within.


Yet the narrative, largely driven by the squad leader (Josh Brolin) who would rather make progress than worry too much about rules of engagement, never offers an investigation complex enough to intellectually engage. The movie sometimes feels like "Zero Dark Thirty" and has a title (which in Jerusalem refers to a person hunting Roman invaders and means "hit man" in Mexico) that sounds like "Syriana," but "Sicario" is simpler than both of those—thankfully, to an extent, as how many people can actually explain all of "Syriana"?

The clear sense remains, however, that several government folks have decided procedure is a losing battle in the drug war, chipping away at a cliff that never seems to get smaller (though that's more told than shown). Villeneuve overdoes it with observing Kate's watchful, concerned eyes in the silent



moments before chaos, but Blunt provides a useful character through which to experience this world without seeming naïve or unqualified. "If your fear is operating out of bounds,

you are not," her boss (Victor Garber) tells her. "The boundary has been moved." Kate's not the only person who'd be less than encouraged by that type of permission slip.



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A plot so underwritten it's more like a plo



There's no doubt in my mind that the blandly peppy, pianoand-strings music relentlessly caressing "The Intern" was improvised by tossing musicians innocu-

ous titles like "Best Friends Order Cheesecake," "Skipping in the Park" and "Toddler Dance Party." The real sugary stuff sounds like "Puppy Smiles." Occasionally things get a little moody and the music turns into "Man Wearing Slippers." Like a toned-down version of the vamps your phone wakes you up with, this score would be considered too anonymously soothing for a Jack Johnson album.

Of course, it suits the aggressively mild and quietly offensive "The Intern," which I'm shocked to see is not rated G and has a plot so underwritten it's more like a plo. As if Vince Vaughn's zero-star abomination "The Internship" was a great idea but just needed its lead to be older, the new big-screen heating pad from writer-director Nancy Meyers ("It's Complicated") stars Robert De Niro as Ben, a retired, 70-year-old widower who never gets annoyed no matter how many times people patronize him. Looking for a productive way to spend his days, Ben applies for the new senior intern program at the poorly named online clothing store About the Fit, whose founder/CEO Jules (Anne Hathaway) hates when people don't blink and rides her bike around the office. An older female intern calls this adorable, only

because she's too senior to know the word "adorkable." Thank God.

For dubious reasons, Ben begins working directly for Jules, who marvels at his professionalism while spineless young dudes working there (including Adam DeVine of "Workaholics") seek romantic advice and lust after his vintage briefcase. Where "While We're Young" satirized 20-somethings who fetishize old things, "The Intern" endorses them, continually looking down at youngsters who don't wear suits or carry handkerchiefs and saying that the way everyone used to be was better.

Along with telegraphing every lame joke, Meyers clearly thinks she's being empowering in her presentation of Jules' dedication to her work. But 1. Hathaway's horrible in the role; just no comic timing or dramatic presence at all and 2. The film ignores the importance of anyone, whether they're employed or not, putting work into a relationship to keep it strong. "The Intern" acts like a couple should not address communication issues when one works all the time and they never see each other or talk (Anders Holm, as Jules' husband, plays almost the same role here that he did in the Chicago-set "Unexpected").

It hurts to hear De Niro, who's the only appealing thing in the movie, say "homie." Embarrassing attempts at comedy result from Ben's relationship with the company's, sigh, 60-something in-house masseuse (Rene Russo). And someone actually says the phrase "It's a confusing world out there" out loud. If this vapid crap is what people want, consider me baffled.

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
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
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'Goodnight Mommy' isn't as sophisticated as it thinks it is

argue—and I'm not usually good at this sort of thing—is pretty obvious from the get-go. Yes, this much-buzzed psychological thriller is well-made from a technical standpoint. It's also thin, boring and unpleasant in ways that aren't revealing; they just make you look away from the screen and wonder when this drawn-out thing's going to wrap up. Unless you love mouth-related torture scenes, in which case, have at it.

Right away, things aren't going well in this household. Bandages cover Mom's (Susanne Wuest, who looks somewhat like the Austrian Kristen Bell) face, and her affinity for strolling naked through the woods doesn't necessarily scream "dealing with whatever

happened in a healthy manner." Meanwhile, she's refusing to feed one of her twin sons (Elias and Lukas Schwarz), and Elias has dreams in which he slices open her stomach and cockroaches crawl out. (If you think these 9-year-olds are too old to be bathing together, apparently you're wrong.) This could be because of his accumulating cockroach collection in his room, which is a totally normal thing for a kid to have. Or because he's having trouble handling the thinly veiled recent incident, which feels like when your friend who can't keep a secret swears he isn't hiding anything. You know he is. Just out with it already so we can all move on.

As Elias accuses his mom of not really being their mom and special effects briefly make her look like an alien or something, writers-directors Severin Fiala and Veronika Franz confuse a slow pace for tension and a synopsis for a story. The performances are uniformly strong, and bugs always will be creepy, especially when a kid puts one on his sleeping mother and watches it crawl into her



mouth. I'm not saying that's not unsettling.

But the violence to which "Goodnight Mommy" descends feels like it's compensating for a movie that doesn't ask any good questions about coping with trauma. Xavier Dolan's "Mommy" was a far more challenging look at difficult parenting. It dared to present a nightmare in which the ropes are only figurative, and scissors are an option but not a solution.




And yet Rocky, born Rakim Mayers, lost his business partner and mentor, Steven "A\$AP Yams" Rodriguez, to an accidental overdose in January. Yams was a founder of A\$AP Mob, the hip-hop collective to which Rocky belongs, and his best friend. In a recent phone interview, he talked about Yams' legacy, the trouble with rappers and his trippy, experimental new album. This is an edited version of that conversation.

What are you working on in the studio?

As of now, I'm working on an album that Yams started, as well as my own album. It's basically everything he wanted, his preferences of artists and sonics, everything that defines Yams as an artist. He wrote a lot of things down detailing who he wanted to collab with, what kind of songs he wanted to do in the future. We have all of his composition books. So, I'm working on that right now.

You've said you feel the word "rapper" doesn't mean anything honorable.

As rappers, we get grounded by stereotypes. ... It's sad, sometimes, the way we're perceived and belittled, and that's due to us sometimes because rappers fit a lot of the same cliches, and you can marginalize them because they do fit a certain kind of demographic for a certain type of man. They got baby mamas, they got



bad credit with all these fancy cars and houses, they got legal issues, they [use] all these big words inaccurately, they just sound ignorant. There's no eloquence. That's how we're viewed at the end of the day. ... Listen, I come from that. I get it, being from a poverty-stricken neighborhood, having nothing to look forward to but something like hip-hop or fashion or graffiti. I get it. I think the whole thing now is, people are starting to realize we actually don't really have to do that. If a person is into that, if that's their lifestyle, that's cool, but at this point it's oversaturated. When I want to watch all that ratchet [stuff], I turn it on, don't get me wrong, but you gotta be in the mood for that.

Your new album talks about a lot of cultural stuff, but it isn't overtly political.

I hate when somebody lectures, that's not what I'm here for. I want to express myself freely, but not, "Oh, let me try LSD for the first time, then make a song," "Let me turn on the news and look at what's going on in Ferguson and make a song." That's not how it works. I feel like if it's necessary and it's really in my life, then it's necessary to speak about. We got other rappers for that

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
