NATIONAL COMMANDERY.

WHEREAS, In the Providence of God, victory crowned the efforts of the forces engaged in establishing and maintaining, against foreign foes, the principles contended for by the North American Colonies, and, later, by the United States of America, in the conflicts known as

THE WAR OF THE REVOLUTION;
THE WAR WITH TRIPOLI;
THE WAR OF 1812; and
THE MEXICAN WAR; and

WHEREAS, The MILITARY ORDER OF FOREIGN WARS OF THE UNITED STATES has been instituted and organized in three States, to wit: by the institution of the New York Commandery, on the 27th day of December, 1894; the Pennsylvania Commandery, on the 29th day of April, 1895; and the Connecticut Commandery, on the 13th day of February, 1896; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to the original Constitution of

the Order, the Officers of said three Commanderies have met and are about to proceed to form and organize the National Commanders of the Order, and have joined with themselves the Companions of the Council, etc., of said several State Commanderies;

Now, Therefore, we, officers of said State Commanderies and Companions as aforesaid, have instituted and hereby do institute the

MILITARY ORDER OF FOREIGN WARS OF THE UNITED STATES, NATIONAL COMMANDERY,

to honor and perpetuate the names of brave and loyal men; to keep in mind the memory of their martial deeds and the victories which they helped to gain; to strengthen the ties of fellowship among the Companions of the Order; to foster the cultivation of Military and Naval Science; and to aid in maintaining National Honor, Union and Independence.

And we severally declare upon honor that we will use our best efforts to promote the purposes of this Order, and will observe the Constitution and Bylaws of the same, and will support the Constitution of the United States of America.

Done at a meeting duly assembled, and held at the City Hall in the City of New York, County and State of New York, this eleventh day of March, in the year one thousand eight hundred and ninetysix.

Military Order of Foreign Wars

OF THE

UNITED STATES.

NATIONAL COMMANDERY.

NATIONAL CONSTITUTION.

PREAMBLE.

WHEREAS, In the Providence of God, Victory crowned the efforts of the forces engaged in establishing and maintaining, against foreign foes, the principles contended for by the North American Colonies, and, later, by the United States of America, in the conflicts known as

THE WAR OF THE REVOLUTION;
THE WAR WITH TRIPOLI;
THE WAR OF 1812; and
THE MEXICAN WAR; and

WHEREAS, The MILITARY ORDER OF FOREIGN WARS OF THE UNITED STATES has been instituted and organized in the States of New York, Pennsylvania and Connecticut, by the institution of the New York Commandery, on the 27th day of December, 1894; the Pennsylvania Commandery, on the 29th day of April, 1895; and the Connecticut Commandery, on the 13th day of February, 1896; and

Whereas, Pursuant to the original Institution of the Order, the Military Order of Foreign Wars of the United States—National Commandery has, by the Officers of the said several State Commanderies in meeting duly assembled, been instituted to honor and perpetuate the names of brave and loyal men; to keep in mind the memory of their martial deeds and the victories which they helped to gain; to strengthen the ties of fellowship among the Companions of the Order; to foster the cultivation of Military and Naval Science; and to aid in maintaining National Honor, Union and Independence;

Now, Therefore, To the end that suitable provision may be made for the perpetuation and government of the Military Order of Foreign Wars of the United States as a National Order, with jurisdiction throughout the United States of America, this National Constitution of the Order is hereby adopted, established, ratified and confirmed:

ARTICLE I.

NAME.

The name and title of this Order shall be "MILITARY ORDER OF FOREIGN WARS OF THE UNITED STATES, NATIONAL COMMANDERY."

ARTICLE II.

PRINCIPLES.

This Order recognizes as its fundamental principles:

First—A firm belief and trust in Almighty God, extolling Him under whose guidance the principles contended for have been established and maintained and the blessings of civil liberty secured.

Second—True allegiance to the United States of America, based upon a paramount respect for and fidelity to the National Constitution and Laws.

ARTICLE III.

COMPANIONSHIP.

Section 1. Any male person, above the age of twenty-one years, a citizen of the United States, of good moral character and reputation, shall be eligible to Companionship in this Order upon further qualifying as hereinafter provided. When duly admitted such persons shall be known as "Companions." These shall be either "Veteran Companions," "Hereditary Companions," or "Honorary Companions."

Section 2. VETERAN COMPANIONS—These shall be Commissioned Officers in the Army, Navy or Marine Corps of the United States or honorably discharged therefrom, who did active field, garrison or naval duty in any of the wars designated in Section 4 of this Article, as a soldier, sailor or marine in the service of one of the States; or of the United States; and also persons who did such active field, garrison or naval duty, in any of said wars, as Commissioned Officers therein, and who received their commissions by direct act of either Federal or State authority and who were honorably discharged from service.

Section 3. HEREDITARY COMPANIONS—These shall be the direct male lineal descendants, in the male line, of any Veteran Companion; or of a Commissioned Officer, as the Propositus, who performed active field, garrison or naval duty, as a Commissioned Officer, in any of said wars, and who received his commission by direct act of one of the thirteen original Colonies, or of Vermont, or of the Continental Congress, or one of the States, or of the United States.

Provided, That such Propositus remained always loyal to his cause and was either killed or died in service or was honorably discharged therefrom; and

Provided, That when the claim to eligibility is based upon the service of an ancestor in the "Militia" it must be satisfactorily shown that such ancestor was actually called into the service of one of said thirteen original Colonies, or of Vermont, or of the Continental Congress, or of one of the States, or of the United States, and performed garrison or field duty; and

Provided, That when the claim to eligibility is based upon the service of an ancestor as a "Naval" or "Marine" Officer, it must be satisfactorily shown that such service was regularly performed in the Continental Navy, or in the Navy of one of the thirteen original Colonies, or of Vermont, or of one of the States, or of the United States or on an armed vessel, other than a merchant ship, which sailed under letters of marque and reprisal, and that such ancestor was duly enrolled in the ship's company as a Commissioned Officer.

Section 4. Such service must be satisfactorily shown to have been performed in one of the following wars:

THE WAR OF THE REVOLUTION, between the 19th day of April, 1775, and the 19th day of April, 1783;

THE WAR WITH TRIPOLI, between the 10th day of June, 1801, and the 4th day of June, 1805;

THE WAR OF 1812, between the 18th day of June, 1812, and the 18th day of February, 1815;

THE MEXICAN WAR, between the 9th day of May, 1846, and the 4th day of July, 1848.

Section 5. No applicant shall be admitted to Companionship in this Order who is not judged to be worthy of becoming a Companion and supporter thereof.

Section 6. Honorary Companionship — The President of the United States; ex-Presidents of the United States; General Officers of the Army of the United States, not below the rank of Major-General; Flag Officers of the Navy of the United States, not below the rank of Rear Admiral; shall alone be eligible to Honorary Companionship in this Order, and when admitted shall be known as "Honorary Companions."

Section 7. No amendment of this Article nor of any Section thereof shall be in any way effectual unless notice thereof shall have been given, in writing, signed by the proposer thereof, at a Regular or Special Meeting of the National Commandery next previous to that at which such amendment shall be adopted, nor unless the same shall have received, before its adoption, the consents, in writing, of three-

fourths of all the Veteran and Hereditary Companions of the Order in good standing, and shall have been adopted at a Regular or Special Meeting of the National Commandery, by a two-thirds vote of all the General Officers and Delegates present, after such written consents shall have been filed with the Secretary-General.

ARTICLE IV.

ORGANIZATION.

Section 1. The MILITARY ORDER OF FOREIGN WARS OF THE UNITED STATES, NATIONAL COMMANDERY, shall be composed of the Commanderies of the Order now in existence in the States of New York, Pennsylvania and Connecticut, and such other State Commanderies as may hereafter be chartered by the National Commandery pursuant to the provisions of this Constitution.

Section 2. There shall be but one Commandery of the Order in any State and such Commandery shall be designated by the name of the State in which the same shall be instituted. The District of Columbia and any Territory of the United States shall be regarded as a State within the meaning of the term whenever the same is used in this Constitution or otherwise in reference to State Commanderies. Such State Commanderies shall be co-equal; and the relative seniority of the same shall be governed by the respective dates of their institution.

ARTICLE V.

GENERAL OFFICERS.

Section 1. The Officers of the National Commandery shall be known as "General Officers," and shall be as follows: A Commander-General, a Vice-Commander-General from each State Commandery, a Secretary-General, a Deputy-Secretary-General, a Treasurer-General, a Deputy-Treasurer-General, a Registrar-General, a Historian-General, a Judge-Advocate-General, a Chaplain-General, a Surgeon-General and a Recorder-General.

Section 2. The General Officers, except the Vice-Commanders-General, shall be elected at a Regular Meeting of the National Commandery by a majority vote of all the General Officers and Delegates present. Each Vice-Commander-General shall be elected by the Council of the State Commandery which he be chosen to represent, and of which State he shall be a resident.

Section 3. The General Officers shall respectively serve until the next Regular Meeting of the National Commandery or until their respective successors shall be elected. Vacancies by reason of death or resignation except as to Vice-Commanders-General may be filled by a majority vote of the National Council.

ARTICLE VI.

DUTIES OF GENERAL OFFICERS.

Section 1. Commander-General—The Commander-General shall preside at all Regular and Special

Meetings of the National Commandery and at all meetings of the National Council; and he shall perform such other duties as may be designated herein and also such as usually appertain to such office.

Section 2. Vice-Commanders-General—In the absence of the Commander-General from any meeting of the National Commandery or of the National Council, the Vice-Commander-General there present from the Senior State Commandery thus represented shall preside.

Section 3. Secretary - General — The Secretary-General shall conduct the general correspondence of the National Commandery and of the National Council and keep a record thereof, and shall perform such other duties as his office or the National Commandery or Council may require. He shall have charge of the Seal of the National Commandery and shall affix the same to all properly authenticated Diplomas of Companionship and to such other papers as require a seal. He shall have charge of all books and papers of the National Commandery other than such as are kept by or required to be deposited with the Registrar-General. He shall certify all acts of the National Commandery and National Council and, when required, authenticate them under seal. He shall give due notice of the time and place of all Regular and Special Meetings of the National Commandery and of all Meetings of the National Council, and shall be present at the same. He shall keep accurate records of all the proceedings of the National Commandery and of the National Council, and shall give due notice to

each officer affected thereby of all votes, resolutions and proceedings.

Section 4. Deputy-Secretary-General—The Deputy-Secretary-General shall perform the duties of the Secretary-General at such times and to such extent as may be directed by the Secretary-General, and he shall also act in the place of the Secretary-General at meetings of the National Commandery or National Council from which that officer may be absent.

Section 5. Treasurer-General — The Treasurer-General shall receive and safely keep the moneys and other securities of the National Commandery, and as often as such moneys shall amount to the sum of one hundred dollars he shall deposit them in a Bank or Trust Company, which shall be designated by the National Council, to the credit of the Miltary Order of Foreign Wars of the United States, National Commandery, to be drawn thence for the purposes of the National Commandery and only on check of the Treasurer-General. Out of these sums he shall pay such sums only as may be ordered paid by the National Commandery or National Council or such as the purposes of his office require. He shall keep a true account of all his receipts and disbursements in detail, and at each Regular Meeting of the National Commandery and at such other times as the National Council may require shall render the same to the Order. He shall have charge of the issuance of the Insignia of the Order, subject to such rules as the National Council may from time to time adopt, and he shall keep a record of all such Insignia issued by him.

Section 6. Deputy-Treasurer-General—The Deputy-Treasurer-General shall perform such duties of the Treasurer-General as may be designated by the latter officer.

Section 7. Registrar-General — The Registrar-General shall receive and safely keep the duplicate original applications for companionship in the Order together with the proofs upon which the same shall have been granted and which shall from time to time be forwarded to him by the Secretaries of the State Commanderies, and it shall be his duty to examine the same and to submit to the National Council, for action, such thereof, if any, as he may deem defective.

Section 8. Historian-General — The Historian-General shall keep a record of the growth and progress of the Order; he shall assist in the preparation of the Year Book when directed by the National Council; and he shall perform such other duties of a like nature as the National Council may from time to time direct.

Section 9. Judge-Advocate-General—The Judge-Advocate-General shall be a lawyer of at least ten years standing, duly admitted to the bar, and it shall be his duty to give legal opinions upon questions of law for the benefit of the Order when called upon so to do by the Commander-General or by the National Commandery or National Council.

Section 10. Chaplain-General — The Chaplain-General shall be a regularly ordained clergyman or minister of a Christian Church; and it shall be his

duty to open and close the meetings of the National Commandery with prayer and to perform such other duties as usually appertain to such office.

Section 11. Surgeon-General — The Surgeon-General shall be a physician regularly admitted to practice.

Section 12. Recorder-General — The Recorder-General shall keep all the historical relics and documents of the various wars comprehended under this Constitution, that may from time to time come into the possession of the National Commandery, and keep a record of the same.

ARTICLE VII.

POWERS OF THE NATIONAL COMMANDERY.

The National Commandery shall have the following powers:

- 1—Sole power to grant Charters to Commanderies in States where such are not already in existence, provided nine persons eligible to and qualified for Companionship in the Order make application therefor. Before such Charter shall be issued the persons applying for the same shall make application for and be admitted to Companionship in the Order.
- 2—Sole power to accept the surrender of the Charter of a State Commandery.
- 3—Sole power to demand the surrender of the Charter of a State Commandery. Such action shall be taken only at a Regular Meeting of the National Commandery, after investigation by a Committee

appointed by the National Council and report of such Committee duly read and filed, and by a two-thirds vote of all the General Officers and Delegates present, exclusive of the Vice-Commander and Delegates from such State Commandery.

4—Sole power to pass finally upon all questions of eligibility to Companionship in the Order referred to it by the Registrar-General or otherwise; to require additional proofs of eligibility to be supplied; to suspend or drop from the roll any Companion whose proofs of eligibility shall be found defective and who shall fail, after notice, to supply such additional proofs; and the acts of the National Commandery hereunder shall be enforced without delay by the State Commandery affected thereby.

5—Sole power to issue the Insignia of the Order; the Diploma of Companionship; and the Register of the National Commandery.

The cost of the Register shall be defrayed by the several State Commanderies in proportion to their Companionship.

6—Sole power to regulate the national affairs of the Order.

7—Sole power to pass finally upon any question involving the construction of this Constitution.

8—Sole power to amend this Constitution.

Except as above provided the National Commandery shall not interfere with the affairs of any State Commandery unless requested so to do by such State Commandery in writing.

None of the above powers shall be delegated except as provided in Article VIII. of this Constitution.

ARTICLE VIII.

NATIONAL COUNCIL.

There shall be a National Council, composed of all the General Officers of the National Commandery, which, in the interim between meetings of the National Commandery, shall exercise all the powers of the National Commandery set forth in Subdivisions 1, 4, 5, 6 and 7 of Article VII. of this Constitution, except that any act of the National Council, under subdivision 7 shall be subject to an appeal to the National Commandery at a regular or special meeting thereof. The National Council shall elect to Companionship in the Order the Charter Companions of each new State Commandery, which Companionship shall be transferred to such State Commandery ipso facto with the grant of its Charter. Such Charter Companions shall pay no initiation or other fee to the National Commandery but shall pay to the State Commandery such fees as may be fixed by the By-Laws thereof. The National Council shall report all its acts and proceedings to the National Commandery at each regular meeting thereof and oftener if required so to do by the National Commandery. Meetings of the National Council shall be held at such times and places as shall be provided by its By-Laws or as may be designated by the Commander-General, and must be called by him on the written request of three Vice-Commanders General.

ARTICLE IX.

STATE COMMANDERIES.

Each State Commandery shall, subject to the provisions of this Constitution, have jurisdiction within the territory of its State and power to manage its own affairs; it shall have power to admit Companions of the Order and to judge of the eligibility of applicants for admission subject to the supervision of the National Commandery as hereinbefore set forth, and sole power to pass upon the other qualifications of such applicants; it shall have the power to expel or suspend any Companion upon its roll; and it shall have the power to adopt such Constitution and By-Laws, not inconsistent with this Constitution, as may be best for its government.

No question involving any religious matter or party politics shall ever be discussed at any meeting of the National Commandery, National Council, or of any State Commandery.

The Constitution of every State Commandery shall contain in full and without change, Article III. of this Constitution.

No State Commandery shall elect to Companionship, Companions of or persons resident within the territory of another State Commandery, except upon written consent, given in advance by the Council of the latter Commandery; but Companions changing residence from one State to another, or coming within the jurisdiction of a new State Commandery, may, at their option, retain Companionship in the State Commandery in which they were originally admitted. A member of any State Commandery may be admitted to Companionship by action of the Council of another State Commandery within the bounds of which he is resident, upon satisfactory proof of his Companionship in good standing, in the Commandery from which he comes, and subject to the rules and regulations of the Commandery which he enters. No Companion shall vote except in the Commandery of the State in which he is a resident. An initiation fee shall not be twice required.

Should a life Companion be thus transferred, he shall be at no charges; but should he desire to hold his Companionship in both State Commanderies; he may elect in which of the same he shall be a life Companion, and shall then pay annual dues, or become a life Companion of the other.

No State Commandery shall admit to Companionship any person unless he make application in writing and in duplicate upon an official blank of such State Commandery which shall have been approved as to form by the National Council.

Every such application shall be accompanied by written or printed proofs of eligibility and shall contain a declaration, subscribed by the applicant declaring upon honor that he will use his best efforts to promote the objects and purposes of the Order, and that he will observe this Constitution and that he will support the Constitution of the United States.

No person who may be enrolled as a Companion in any State Commandery shall be permitted to continue in Companionship therein where his proofs of eligibility shall be found to be defective, but upon failure to supply additional proofs, after notice, shall be dropped from the roll.

It shall be the duty of the Secretary of every State Commandery to forward, upon the admission of each Companion, to the Registrar General, a duplicate of the original application of such Companion and of all supplemental applications when filed.

Each State Commandery shall annually forward to the Secretary General complete list of the Officers and Companions of such State Commandery, together with the names of such Companions as have died, resigned or been transferred, and of such as have been expelled or dropped from the roll, with a brief statement of the cause; a copy of the Constitution and By-Laws of such State Commandery if the same shall have been amended during the year; a copy of each publication of such State Commandery; and such other matters as may be desired to be communicated to the National Commandery.

Each State Commandery shall annually pay, on or before the first day of March to the Treasurer General for the use of the National Commandery, the sum of fifty cents for each Hereditary Companion in good and regular standing on such date in such State Commandery.

ARTICLE X.

MEETINGS OF THE NATIONAL COMMANDERY.

There shall be a Regular Meeting of the National Commandery held once in every three years at such time and place as shall have been designated by the

National Commandery at the previous Regular Meeting. Special Meetings of the National Commandery may be called by the National Council at such time and place as may be deemed best and must be called by the Secretary General upon the written application of three Vice-Commanders General. Such Regular and Special Meetings of the National Commandery shall consist of the General Officers and five Delegates from each State Commandery. Each State Commandery may also choose five Alternates, a General Officer or Delegate representing a majority of the State Commanderies must be present at such Regular or Special Meeting of the National Commandery in order to constitute a quorum. All business shall be transacted according to parliamentary law.

The following shall be the order of business:

- 1—Meeting called to order by the Commander General.
 - 2-Prayer by the Chaplain General.
 - 3-Reading of Minutes of Previous Meeting.
 - 4-Report of National Council.
 - 5-Reports of Officers.
 - 6-Reports of Special Committees.
 - 7—Communications from State Commanderies.
 - 8—Unfinished Business.
 - 9-New Business.
 - 10-Notices of Motion for next Meeting.
 - 11—Reading and Consideration of the Institution.
 - 12-Benediction.

ARTICLE XI.

SEAL.

The Seal of the Order shall be as follows: Within a title scroll surrounded by bullets, and bearing the inscription, "Military Order of Foreign Wars of the United States," clouds proper, charged with thirteen stars argent above and about a shield, per pale gules and azure, bearing four swords; two in bend, two in bend sinister, meeting at nombril point proper, upon a chief embattled or, an eagle issuant displayed sable; the shield surmounted as a crest by a mural circlet or, an arm in armor embowed, the hand holding four thunderbolts proper. Motto: "Deus et Libertas" between the date "1894."

ARTICLE XII.

INSIGNIA OF THE ORDER.

The insignia of the Order shall be pendant from a ribbon by a gold ring, and wreath of chased gold, and shall be

Obverse—A red enameled star of eight points, each star-point edged and divided by a line of gold; and between each two star-points, rays of burnished gold, joined, and ending in a point; and in the centre an eagle of raised and chased gold with extended wings.

REVERSE—Stars and rays the same. In the centre within a circular band of blue enamel, edged with gold, and bearing in gold the motto: "Deus et Libertas," an anchor and crossed swords upon a field of red.





The ribbon shall be of watered silk, ribbed, one inch and one-half in width, and one inch and one-half in displayed length, of buff, bordered with blue and edged with red; the border and edge to be respectively one-eighth of an inch in width.

The insignia shall be worn by the Companions of the Order on all occasions when they assemble as such, for any stated purpose or celebration, and may be worn on any occasion of ceremony. It shall be worn conspicuously on the left breast; but Veteran Companions or Companions who are or have been officers may wear it suspended around the neck. The insignia shall never be worn as an article of jewelry, nor except in the manner and under the conditions herein prescribed; and the ribbon shall not be displayed separately.

No Companion shall receive more than one insignia, unless to replace one the loss of which shall first be satisfactorily established.

On occasions as herein before designated, except meetings for a stated purpose, Companions to whom the insignia has been issued may wear a miniature insignia, which shall be a duplicate in miniature of the insignia, with ribbon, and which shall be worn under the conditions prescribed for the wearing of the insignia, but only upon the left breast or at the buttonhole.

On occasions other than those above set forth, Companions may wear a rosette of the prescribed ribbon, and pattern, in the upper buttonhole of the left lapel of the coat.

ARTICLE XIII.

DIPLOMA.


The Diploma of Companionship in the Order shall be as follows:

The Diploma shall be surrounded by an emblematic border, containing scenes from the four foreign wars as follows: For the Revolution, the Surrender at Yorktown; for the Tripolitan War, the Bombardment of Tripoli; for the War of 1812, the Bombardment of Fort McHenry; for the Mexican War, the Storming of Chapultepec.

The same shall be signed by the Commander General, the Secretary General and the Registrar General; and countersigned by the Commander; the Secretary and the Registrar of the State Commandery. It shall bear the Seal of the National Commandery.

ARTICLE XIV.

It shall be competent for the National Council to appoint State Secretaries in States where no State Commanderies exist, with a view to represent the interests of this Order, and, if authorized to do so, to prepare for the organization of new State Commanderies. Such State Secretaries shall be subject to the direction and regulation of the National Council. Their appointment shall be from time to time renewable. They may be removed for cause, and their office shall terminate upon the organization of a Commandery in their State. They shall communicate with and receive communications from the Order, through the Secretary General.

ARTICLE XV.

AMENDMENTS.

No alteration or amendment of this Constitution shall be made unless notice shall have been given, in writing, signed by four General Officers or eight Delegates proposing the same, at a previous Regular or Special Meeting of the National Commandery. Notice of the proposed amendment shall be sent to the Secretary of each State Commandery and the

same shall not be voted upon until six months from the sending of such notice shall have elapsed. No amendment shall be adopted except by a two-thirds vote of all the General Officers and Delegates present at a Regular or Special Meeting of the National Commandery nor unless a majority of the State Commanderies shall each be represented by a Delegate at such meeting. This Article shall not apply to amendments of Article III. of this Constitution, which contains its own amendatory clause.

Act of Congress

Relating to the Insignia of Military Societies, with Decisions of the Secretary of War thereon.

Joint Resolution granting permission to officers and enlisted men of the Army and Navy of the United States to wear the badges adopted by Military Societies of men who served in the War of the Revolution, the War of Eighteen Hundred and Twelve, the Mexican War, and the War of the Rebellion.

Resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That the distinctive badges adopted by Military Societies of men who served in the Armies and Navies of the United States in the War of the Revolution, the War of Eighteen Hundred and Twelve, the Mexican War, and the War of the Rebellion, respectively, may be worn upon all occasions of ceremony * by officers and enlisted men of the Army and Navy of the United States who are members of said organizations in their own right.

Approved, September 25, 1890.

Decision of Acting Secretary of War, April 25, 1891.

Officers of the Army who are members by inheritance of any of the Societies referred to in the act of September 25, 1890, published in General

35

Orders, No. 133, of November 18, 1890, from this office, are entitled to wear the badges adopted by such societies on occasions of ceremony.* (Circular No. 4, Head Qrs. of the Army, A. G. O., Washington, May 9, 1891.)

(Extract.)

* In compliance with the above Joint Resolution of Congress, * * the phrase "occasions of ceremony," in the resolution, will include all musters, reviews, inspections, parades and other occasions on which officers and men are required to appear in full-dress uniform.

The badges are to be worn on the left breast of the coat, the tops of the ribbons forming a horizontal line, the outer end of which shall be from two to four inches (according to the height of the wearer), below the upper line of the shoulder.

The ribbons are to be suspended from a bar of metal passed through their upper ends and attached to the coat. (General Orders, No. 133, Head Qrs. of the Army, A. G. O., Washington, November 18, 1890.)
