
CLASSES


WHAT MAKES A RANGER PEP RALLY?




What's worse than getting a ticket? Getting another one when you have gone to pay for the first one! Nevertheless, everything security does is always for our own benefit regardless what we may think.

One last note of advice, always stop and count to three at each stop sign and I guarantee you won't get a ticket!



Career-oriented programs are available on all five Northwest campuses. Some courses of study - for example, cosmetology, computer operations, and business technology — are offered at more than one site. Other majors such as Telecommunications (Senatobia), Fashion Merchandising Technology (DeSoto Center), Aviation Maintenance Technology (Olive Branch Center), Medical Clerical Technology (Lafayette-Yalobusha Technical Center) and Housebuilding and Woodworking (Benton-Marshall Center) are exclusive to one location. The Northwest Farm, a few miles west of Senatobia, provides a laboratory for the Livestock Management Technology curriculum. It is also the location of the college's rodeo arena. In addition to the Agriculture Club, Vo-Tech students have a number of organizations in which to participate — the Cosmetology Club, Delta Epsilon Chi for Sales and Marketing and Fashion Merchandising majors, Northwest Professional Engineers, Student Association of Legal Assistants, and VICA (Vocational and Industrial Club of America), open to all vocational and technical students.






IN THE NEWS

The World Series belonged to the Los Angeles Dodgers. The Dodgers captured their sixth World Series title in October with a 5-2 victory over the Oakland A's in the fifth game of the series.

Vice President George Bush, after serving for eight years in the Ronald Reagan administration, got the expected nod at the Republican National Convention in New Orleans in the summer of 1988. His choice for running mate was unexpected — Sen. Dan Quayle of Indiana. The public opinion polls showed that the inexperienced 41 year-old senator was not a popular choice. The election proved different and George Bush was sworn into office as the 41st president of the United States.

The Democrats went to Atlanta in the summer of 1988, and decided on Michael Dukakis, the governor of Massachusetts, to be its candidate for President of the United States. He decided to pick Lloyd Bentsen, a senator from Texas, as his running mate.

President Ronald Reagan and Soviet Leader Mikhail S. Gorbachev worked for several years to bring the two countries together. After a treaty was signed to eliminate certain nuclear weapons, 1988 was the year the efforts of these two leaders went into effect.

It was one of the big marriages of the year. Heavyweight boxer Mike Tyson married actress Robin Givens. But the stormy marriage of the 22 year-old rich boxer and the 23 year-old beautiful actress lasted less than a year. She filed for divorce. But after being accused of marrying "Iron Mike" for his money, Ms. Givens said she wouldn't take a dime.

The summer of 1988 was hit with the worst drought in many years. Throughout the Midwest, farmers watched helplessly as their crops went dry.

The shuttle Discovery blasted into orbit in September, the first space flight since the shuttle Challenger mission ended tragically 73 seconds after liftoff on January 28, 1988. 

It became an international effort of good will. Russians and American rescuers cut through the ice in Alaska to save two California gray whales. The whales were trapped in the ice for more than three weeks. News media from around the world converged on the tiny village of Barrow, Alaska, to cover the successful rescue.

Amid tears and grief, thousands of people who had died of AIDS were memorialized in October in ceremonies centered on a huge quilt that was made from friends and family members of the victims. Each of the panels measured three feet by six feet and all 50 states and a dozen foreign countries were represented in the 375,000 square foot quilt.

Rangers Kick Off Season With a 51-24 Victory


The 1988 Ranger season started off on the right foot — a victory. Sophomore quarterback Bobby Byrd threw three touchdown passes and scored on a 16yard keeper to lead Northwest to a 51-24 win over Southwest.


Ranger wide receiver James Wright scored on an 80-yard catch from Byrd in the first quarter and a 9-yard reception in the second. In the third period Byrd shot a 72-yard touchdown strike to freshman runningback Dan Footman, who also picked up 131 yards rushing to lead the Rangers' ground attack.

Rangers' ground attack. Cory Jones, freshman runningback, added two Ranger touchdowns — first on a 5-yard run in the second quarter, and then on a 1-yard dive after a handoff from freshman quarterback Kevin McCarthen.

In the final period, McCarthen hit sophomore wide receiver Wesley Carroll with a 32-yard touchdown strike to cap Northwest's offensive show. Freshmen Lynn Jenkins and Claude Locke shared kicking duties. Jenkins nailed four PAT's, while Locke added two extra points and a field goal.

Conference Rival Falls Into Rangers' Clutches

Bobby Byrd again led the team with 201 yards rushing, two TD's, and one touchdown pass to a 29-22 win over conference rival East Mississippi. The offensive pace was set for the night on the first play from scrimmage with a 35-yard gallop around the end by Byrd. Two plays later, after connecting with Wesley Carroll for a 14-yard strike, Byrd scored from a yard out. Late in the first quarter East Mississippi put three on the board with a field goal, the first of three by the Lions in the half. The Rangers retaliated with a touchdown drive that featured a 30-yard keeper by Byrd, a Corey Jones first-down run to the Lion 17, and a scramble to the five by Byrd, who scored on the first play of the second quarter. Fresh-man Claude Locke kicked the PAT. The Lion quarterback was forced to go to the air by linemen Mike McClenton, Tracey Adams, and the rest of the defensive front This led to trouble for the Lion's passing at-tack with interceptions by linebacker Devin Coleman and defensive back Jolo Wright. Locke was then put into position for a 28-yard field goal. Third quarter fumbles were exchanged be-fore Lynn Jenkins drilled a 27-yard field goal. East Mississippi countered with a 78-yard kickoff return and a TD. Jolo Wright kept the PAT out of the end zone with a smashing solo tackle.

PAT out of the end Zone with a smasning solo tackle. Byrd and Carroll struck with a combination of a 28-yard pass and a 15-yard TD pass. Kevin McCarthen hit Michael Crenshaw for a 15-yard completion, setting up Jenkins for a 22-yard FG. Northwest headed for the Gulf Coast game with a 2-0 record.

Nationally Ranked Rangers Defeat Bulldogs

The Northwest Rangers went into the Gulf Coast game with a ranking of 5th nationally and came out with a record of 3-

"Somebody must think we're pretty good, but we've got a lot of proving to do," stated Head Coach Bobby Franklin of the

anking. After a scoreless first quarter, a Gulf Coast Bulldog picked off a pass by Byrd and ran for the touchdown.

Northwest evened the score with 47 sec-onds remaining in the half when Dan Footman scored on a 1-yard plunge. Claude Locke provided the PAT. Two plays later Steve White pulled

down an interception which led to the touchdown by Corey Jones with three sec-onds left in the half. Once again Locke added the PAT leaving the Rangers up 14-7

An 84-yard march by the Rangers sparked early in the third quarter, ended with Footman's second touchdown of the night. The PAT was made good by Lynn Jenkins.

Jenkins. Jim Bellany recovered a Bulldog fumble on the next possession. Byrd and Wesley Carroll connected with an 18-yard touch-down to pad the Ranger lead, and again Jenkins added the PAT. Gulf Coast retaliated in the fourth scor-ing 13 points, but they were defenseless against Carroll's eight receptions for 150 of the total 197 yards and a Ranger rushing attack of 168 yards. The Rangers scored once more on a 5-

The Rangers scored once more on a 5-yard keeper by Byrd followed by Jenkins third PAT of the night. The Rangers over-came the Bulldogs with a 35-20 win and an unblemished record of 3-0.



Rebel Hall of Famer

On Sept. 3, 1988, Ranger Head Coach Bobby Franklin was among 24 new mem-bers inducted into the University of Mississippi Athletic Hall of Fame at the Ramada Renaissance ballroom in Jackson before the Ole Miss-Memphis State game.

"I'm surprised and proud," said Franklin concerning his newly acclaimed honor. "I never thought about being in the same category with some of those people. I guess it's the highest honor I've ever received."

Franklin added his Hall of Fame honor to a long list: former All-Southeastern Conference quarterback for the Ole Miss Rebels, MVP in the 1958 Gator Bowl and 1960 Sugar Bowl, member of the College All-Star team that played at Soldier Field in Chicago against the World Champion Baltimore Colts.

After his college career, he added even more to his list of accomplishments. He joined the ranks of the pros, playing with the Cleveland Browns. In 1967 he left to join Georgia Tech as assistant coach. The following year he returned to the pros as a defensive backfield coach with the Dallas Cowboys, earning two Super Bowl rings during his tenure there.

In 1972 he joined the Baltimore Colts staff, then entered private business, and in 1979 joined the Ranger coaching staff as offensive coordinator. In 1981 Franklin moved up to the head coaching job.

Franklin's eight years as head football coach for Northwest have brought the Rangers the 1982 national crown, two region and two state titles, and three division championships. The 1987 squad captured the North Division, State, and Region 23 titles under his direction. The Rangers finished 10th in the final national rankings, and Franklin was named Coach of the Year from Region 23. Of course, he's always "Coach of the Year" to us Rangers!



Undefeated Rangers Top North Division

The Rangers moved to the top of the North Division standings with a 31-27 victory over the Holmes Bulldogs. Both teams went into the game with 3-0 records. Only the Rangers came out an un-defeated 4-0, but not without a battle. Holmes had the momentum in the first quarter with a touchdown, PAT and a field goal.

Holmes had the momentum in the first guarter with a touchdown, PAT and a field coal. The initial points came after a hand-off to Grenshaw and a field goal by Jenkins. The Kangers took the second quarter when Byrd found Drexter Evans on the option, and an 85-yard touchdown run by Evans resulted. Then lenkins added the PAT. The Rangers moved ahead 14-10. Jenkins again added three points to the scoreboard with a 41-yard field goal and two minutes later Corey Jones dived from the one for the third Northwest touchdown. The kangers left the field at 24-10. In the third quarter Holmes retailated with 14 points — the first six on a blocked punt, and the second touchdown with a quarterback sneak from the one. The two-point conversion was good — a tie ballgame 24-24. The Bulldogs pulled ahead with a 41-yard field goal. Then Bulldog passes were broken up by Eric Chalk and Steve White, who in-tercepted with 22 seconds left in the game. Evans brought the winning touchdown with a plunge from the one and the Rangers emerged victorious with a 4-0 record.







Rangers Overcome Delta Rivalry

Northwest improved its record with a 17-7 victory over Mississippi Delta. Coach Bobby Franklin said afterwards, "We've got a big rivalry with Delta," he continued, "we played ragged, we've got four starters out. My big 6'7", 255 tight end (Craig) Malone was out; Mike Pugh stepped in and did an excellent job."

Delta scored early in the first quarter on a 39-yard run, but the Ranger defense held them scoreless for the remainder of the game.

The score was evened by Byrd after a crucial third down catch by Wesley Carroll. Claude Locke added the PAT.

Locke gave Northwest its first lead after a scoreless 2nd quarter, on a 23-yard field goal that was set up when Joel Gallagher blocked a punt deep in Trojan territory.

Another Ranger touchdown was added when Byrd found the end zone from six yards out. Locke was good with yet another PAT.

Offensive lineman Eddie Blake caught the Trojans napping and crashed through with a 10-yard run. The game ended with a 17-7 Ranger victory, and the Rangers moved back up the national rankings to number 8.

Bobby Byrd, ranked third in the nation in total offense, came out runnin' and gunnin' the second half.


The Rangers marched 63 yards to set Claude Locke up for a 25-yard field goal, after a crucial 11-yard strike to Craig Malone.

With less than three minutes left in the game, Hinds found a receiver on the Northwest five. Unfortunately for Hinds they had too many men on the field and it was brought back.


The next play found the Ranger defense corralled on the Hinds' quarterback. Four plays later Crenshaw sealed the Ranger victory with a touchdown plunge.


In a season that surely could use a couple of games in the win column, Northwest keeps getting




February 17, 1989 In a North Division tournament filled with well-matched teams and close-scoring



The Rangers came back to overcome Delta 10-8 and 6-4 for the Region 23 Championship and a berth in the Eastern District Playoffs.

Northwest finished the season at the Eastern District Playoffs in Madisonville, Tenn., May 20, losing to Louisburg (N.C.) 2-0. It was the first time anyone could remember the Rangers being shut out. "We don't have anything to be ashamed of," said Head Coach Jim Miles. "The team has faced a lot of adversity all year long, and I'm proud of every player," Miles continued.

Miles had more than one player to be proud of for the '88 season.

Three of the Rangers were chosen to be on the All-State Team — Mike Cosman, Cameron Blount, and Brian Geeslin. Players who received All-State Honorable Mention were: Mark Carson, Bobby Pickett, Robbie Williams, Mark Johnston, Thom Griffiths, and Ronnie Smith.

Sophomore right-hander Cosman was also named to the All Region 23 Team and the NJCAA All-American Team.

Representing the Rangers on the All-Star Team were Blount, Cosman, Geeslin, and Johnston.

The team was honored by the City of Senatobia and Mayor W. E. Callicott, who proclaimed May 18 "Ranger Baseball Day."

PRESIDENT --- DR. DAVID M. HARAWAY


