The 1967 edition of the 49er Cross Country team would up their season in mid-November with a second place finish in the D I A C meet at Rocky Mount and fourth place in the N A I A District 26 meet From the six team D I A C, only Lynchburg was able to handle the UNC-C harriers Lynchburg defeated the 49ers by 25-30 in their only duel meet loss in the conference The Thinclads, coached by Dr. Murphy, Coach Fleming, and Coach









Steele, compiled a 6-3 overall meet record The other two losses were to High Point College, but the 49ers defeated High Point in the district meet. In individual honors, UNC-C's Marty Fleming finished first in the D.I.A.C. meet. John Lafferty, Larry McAfee, Mike Ridge, and John Byrd also excelled for the 49ers.



The UNC-C 49ers found more disappointment than victory in the course of the 1967-68 basketball season. The roundballers began the season realizing that a great deal lay on the shoulders of several inexperienced players. After four successive defeats, Gary Cress came through with 26 points to lead the squad over UNC-G, 87-84. Four defeats later, the 49ers again swamped the Spartans, 96-80. Jerry Anthony hit 30 points and Bob Lemmond contributed 23 rebounds to the cause. Gary Cress rippled the nets for a season-leading 32 points against local rival Belmont Abbey in another highlight of the season. This game was followed by nine games that seemed to be played by an entirely different team. The 49ers won only three of the nine, but the largest loosing margin was an eight-point loss to converence-champion Greensboro College.

















In a one-point loss to N C Methodist. Pete Donahue hit 14 for 16 field goal attempts for 31 points Donahue then scored 25 in one of the finest team performances of the season as the 49ers destroyed College of Charleston 86-56 A highlight of the 84-81 overtime loss to St Andrews, when Lemmond scored 20 points, was a scuffle between Ben Basinger of Charlotte and Phil Blundell of St









Andrews. For the first time in twoand-half years, Charlotte defeated Lynchburg by a score of 70-63, a game in which a fine team defensive effort held the Knights to 18 points in the first half. The final regular season compiled by the 49ers was 5-16, but this statistic hardly reflects the amount of time and effort spent by Coaches Murphy and Hurley and the team. Jerry Anthony was named to the first team D.I.A.C. team. Robbie Snipes, the only senior on the team, and Bob Lemmond received honorable mention. The young 49ers basketball team wound up a disappointing season with a near-miss in the D.I.A.C. Tournament at St. Andrews. Charlotte's team fell to N.C. Methodist 76-71 in one of the season's most exciting outings. Ben Basinger fired in 24 points and hauled down 16 rebounds as a late 49ers rally fell just short. Greensboro College was the eventual winner of the three-day tournament.












St. Andrews College outclassed the rest of the conference with a 34-6 record. followed by College of Charleston with 26-14. The 49ers rolled both the second high series (2755) and second high game (968) of the year. Ev Jordan joined the team at the semester break and led the team with a 180 average. He was followed closely by Kurt Taube with a 177.



The 1968 edition of the UNC-C Tennis Team was a vastly improved squad over the 1967 netmen. Led by number one player Ronnie Payne, the team managed a win over Greensboro College and an upset win over North Carolina Wesleyan in the DIAC Tournament.

The Forty-niner squad, victims of several close defeats, began to function as a synchronized unit in the doubles matches of the late spring. Payne received ample help from Junior Mike Dolfus, Sophomore Gordon Kay, and Senior Dick Latty. All but Latty will return to stalk the courts for Coach Harvey Murphy again next spring, and an improved record is expected at that time.

Studded with experienced long distance runners and relay teams, the UNC-C thinclads, under the direction of coaches Brent Steele and John Robbins, took to the field against Catawba on March 22 to open the most successful track season in the school's brief history. Catawba took a 30-2 lead in the field events and was able to hold on for an 87-47 final score. Larry McAfee won the 880, and the 49er mile relay emerged victorious with a time of 3:34.0. Marty Fleming also gave a hint of great things to come by winning both the mile and three-mile runs.



In the season's second outing, the Forty-niners fell to a strong St. Andrews team at the Garinger High School track. Gary Cress finished a close second in the 100 yd. dash and the 220. Marty Fleming won the one and three-mile events again, while Harold Cohen was taking the high hurdles. The 440 relay team of Lafferty, Reddy, Cress, and Ridge also won. The followwing week the Charlotte boys finished second in a three way meet. The final score read Campbell College $-77\frac{1}{2}$, UNC-C $-54\frac{1}{2}$, St. Andrews-27. The meet was stopped short due to rain. The two events not run were the three-mile and the mile relay, two of Charlotte's strongest events.

On April 11, the Forty-niner track team traveled to the Davidson Relays where they finished an impressive tenth from a field of eighteen teams. The sprint medley relay team placed fourth, and, in one of the big heartbreaks of the season, the mile relay team finished third but was disqualified for a rule infraction.



The Forty-niners took second place in the DIAC Championships with 68 points. Fleming set a DIAC record in the three-mile run, won the mile, and finished second behind Larry McAfee in the 880. John Lafferty successfully defended his 440 title and Jerry Dawson placed in five events. In the area NAIA meet, the only Forty-niner to win acclaim was Marty Fleming. For Fleming, it was a habit, for he never failed to win a three-mile run in the course of the season.














INTRAMURALFOOTBALLINTR



Charlotte's first annual intramural football season ended with a 12-7 victory for the Animals over the All-Stars in the dusk of a brisk December day. The Animals wound up the season with a 14-1 record, their only loss coming on a forfeit. Led by Hank Rivers, Bucky Weston, and John Mims, the Animals dominated the entire season. The Freshmen finished second with a 9-4-1 record with the APO Lovers close behind (9-5). Fifty-four games were played and over one hundred players occupied their fall afternoons with America's favorite sport. 
He was deliberate, studious, and enjoyed the challenge of a difficult course or provoking debate. It is somehow unfair that such a promising mind in such a young man


Then it happened!
