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The University of Massachusetts Dartmouth

In completion of its first year as the University of Massachusetts Dartmouth, our school is just beginning a new era of a long history. What started out nearly a century ago as the New Bedford Textile School, UMass Dartmouth has endured many transformations. Since 1895, this institution has gone through countless transformations and seven name changes, but continues to adapt to the changing times and the needs of the students. The history of the university consists of many steps towards building a stronger system of public education in Massachusetts.

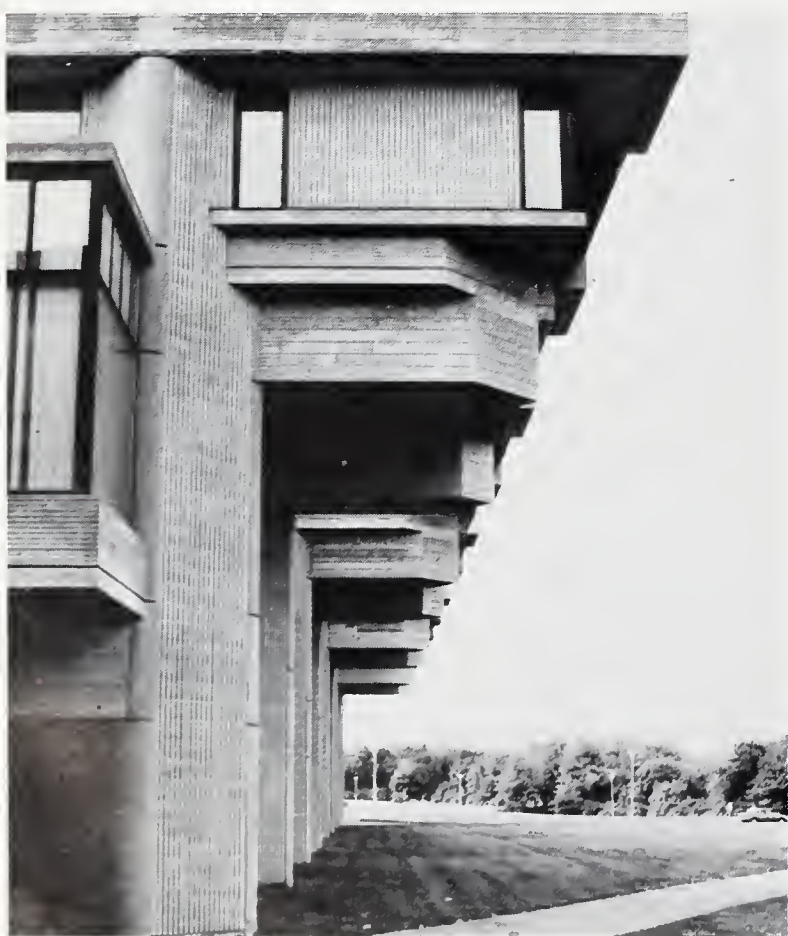
The legacy begins with the establishment of the Bradford Durfee Textile School in 1895. The original curricula consisted of classes in textile manufacturing which was largely in demand in the surrounding areas. As the years went on and the emphasis changed to the automation of the local cotton mills, the school became more sophisticated in their engineering programs and added courses such as English, economics, and accounting. The school then again changed names to the New Bedford Textile Institute in 1944, then to the New Bedford Institute of Textiles and Technology in 1954. As the textile industry diminished locally, the focus of education and the name changed yet again in 1957 to the New Bedford Institute of Technology.

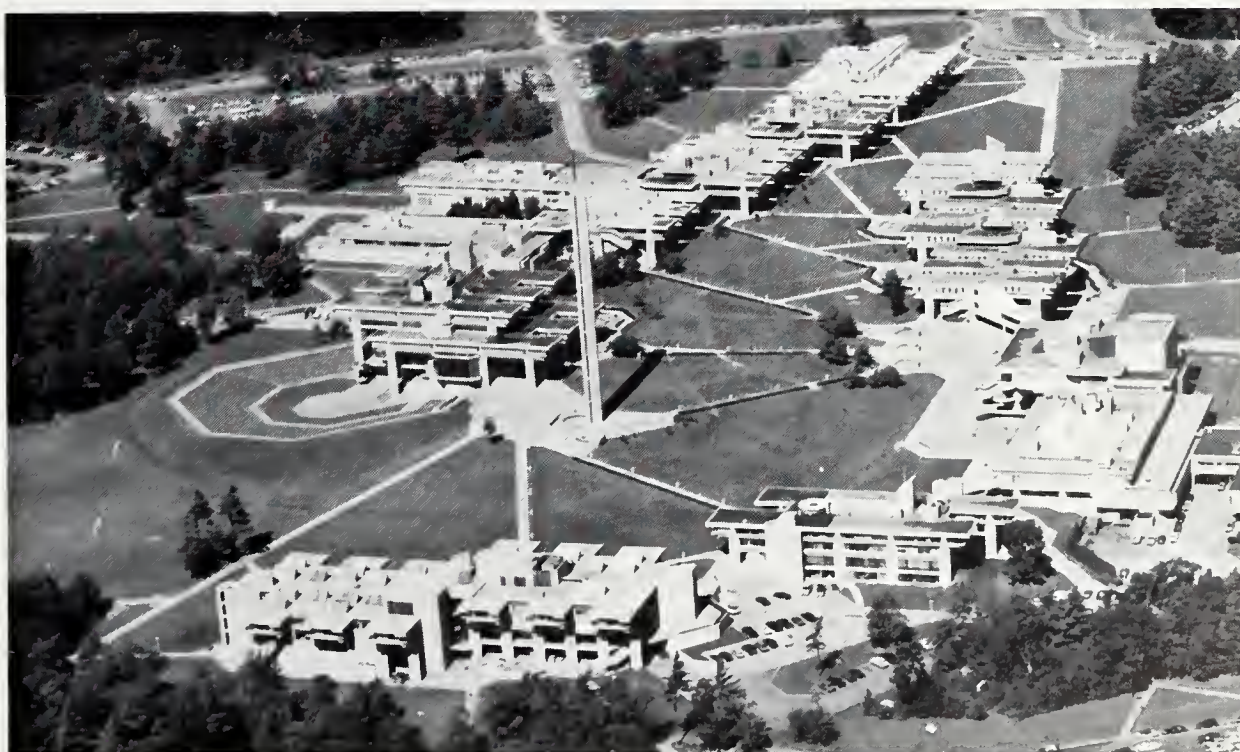
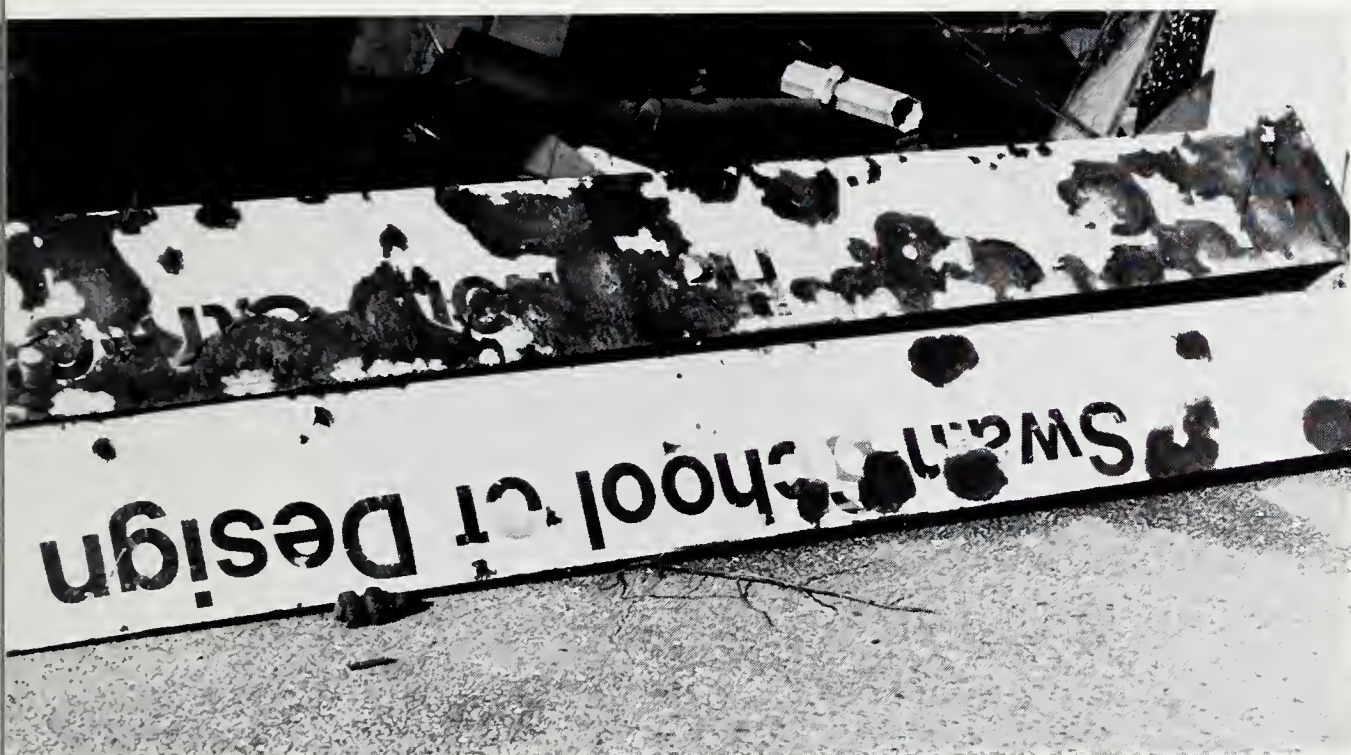
On July 1, 1964 the administrative consolidation of the Bradford Durfee College of Technology and the New Bedford Institute of Technology occurred. The school became the Southeastern Massachusetts Technological Institute and the development of a new campus began. Internationally renowned architect, Paul Rudolph designed the buildings which now stand on the 740 acres of lush fields and woodland in North Dartmouth.

In December of 1964, the Harrington Willis Commission report challenged the concept of the expanding educational leadership role of SMTI. The report suggested a reorganization of the state educational system, which would have threatened the growing curricula at SMTI as a result of the consolidation. When this new problem arose, the southeastern Massachusetts community banded together to fight the potential ramifications. As a result, the Harrington Willis reorganization was revised and on June 9, 1969, the governor signed into law a bill which changed the school's name once again to Southeastern Massachusetts University.

For the next twenty-two years, SMU established a respected and reputable status throughout New England. Over the years, SMU continued to fight proposed budget cuts that would effect the quality of education. In 1988, SMU absorbed the Swain School of Design, evidence of the school's ability to prosper in the shadow of an ailing economy.

On July 11, 1991, Governor William Weld signed the merger legislation combining the state's five public universities- SMU, the University of Lowell, the University of Massachusetts at Amherst, the University of Massachusetts at Boston, and the University of Massachusetts Medical School at Worcester- into a single University of Massachusetts system. SMU officially became the University of Massachusetts Dartmouth on August 31, 1991. For most students, the name change marked the end of an era. What had been rumored to happen for many years became reality, and for the members of the class of 1992, SMU would become a fond memory. The transformation was bitter-sweet, for although the title and identity of SMU would be lost, a new prestige would be gained as part of the five-university system. But for most of the members of the first graduating class of the University of Massachusetts Dartmouth, our University remains the same institution we have grown to love, our home that nurtured and educated us into adulthood.





Celestino D. Macedo

The history of any university- especially one that has traveled the unique evolutionary road of UMass Dartmouth- is written by a multitude of people. Some of them compose the prologue, others a chapter, many contribute footnotes. But a certain significant few write the heart of the story and Celestino D. Macedo is one of them.

For 37 years, the students of this University and its predecessor institutions have been the beneficiaries of Mr. Macedo's energetic and empathetic attention to their welfare. We, the most recent of these students, bear grateful witness to his commitment to helping each and every one of us extend our reach and reach our goal, a goal we may never have chosen had Mr. Macedo not helped to stretch the possibilities.

Before his retirement as Vice Chancellor for Student Services, Mr. Macedo held a variety of key positions that ranged from associate professor of English to Director of Student Financial Aid to Dean of Students. Whatever the role, he imbued it with kindness, fairness and thoughtful intelligence. A teacher of wit and warmth, he is remembered for his accessibility, his genuine interest in students, and his ability to fire up youthful minds. As an administrator, he earned the esteem of both students and colleagues with his evenhanded and productive leadership, doing much to keep the ship steady and on course in the turbulent educational waters of the past few years. Recognizing the differing special needs of individuals and groups, he moved to design and implement a program of student support and development services. Because of his sensitivity to the needs of persons of color, for example, he played an initiating part in establishing the Office of Minority Students at UMass Dartmouth and was also well known for vigorously recruiting minorities and women to fill positions on his staff.

If UMass Dartmouth owes much of what it is to Mr. Macedo, so do we, shaped by this University, owe much of what we are. As he begins his retirement, we, the Class of 1992, dedicate our yearbook to Celestino Macedo and hope he will see it always as a message of our appreciation for his years of devotion and as our heartfelt wish for Godspeed.

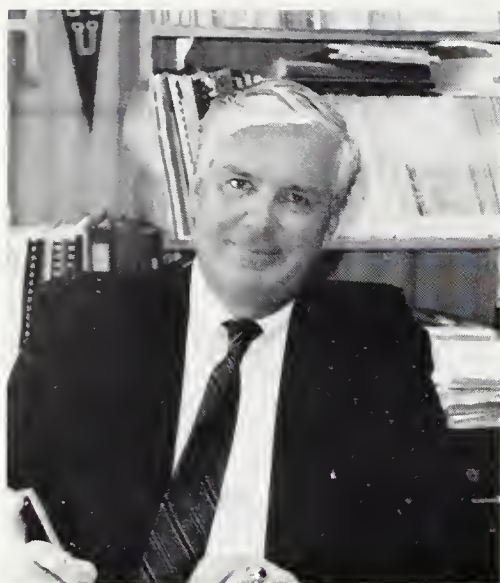
And then we became the University of Massachusetts.

Both Croatia and Slovenia proclaimed independence on June 25, and within 24 hours, military tanks were rolling toward border crossings and airports, attempting to secure the country. The trade of artillery fire began.

Strong ethnic and political divisions have existed in the country for centuries, but the peaceful co-existence that has maintained in the region for decades has splintered.

Serbia's Communist-turned-Socialist president, Slobodan Miloevic, wants Yugoslavia to survive as a federation even if Slovenia and Croatia secede. But he says the Serb minority in Croatia of covertly backing Serbian militants in the neighboring republic who are fighting for territory.

The Croatians claim the federal army is siding with insurgents, a charge the army denies.

More than 5,000 people have been killed since civil war began in Yugoslavia, and the count is still rising.

Schwarzkopf, General Colin Powell and Defense Secretary Dick Cheney were the grand marshals of the New York parade, with over 600,000 people turning out to welcome the soldiers home. More than 1 million people attended a welcome home parade May 19 in Hollywood, and an estimated 800,000 turned out for the parade in Washington.

"U.S.A.! U.S.A.!" The flag-waving crowd chanted during a half-hour of nighttime fireworks over the East River in New York City. The \$1 million display was accompanied by the New York Pops Orchestra. A teary-eyed Korean War veteran said, "These young boys put their lives on the line and now they're getting their reward."



Life has not been the same for law professor Anita Hill since going public with allegations that Supreme Court Justice Clarence Thomas sexually harassed her nearly a decade ago.

Hill was valedictorian of her high school in 1973 and went on to Oklahoma State University as a National Merit Scholar, graduating in 1977 with a degree in Psychology. From there she went to Yale University to receive a law degree in 1980.

Most friends and colleagues described her the same way — honest, sincere and a principled person.

Although Thomas was confirmed, professor Hill insisted that by letting her story be known that she had accomplished everything she set out to do. "All that's happened has made the general public much more aware of sexual harassment than ever before," said Hill.

She offered one piece of advice to victims of sexual harassment, "Try to find somebody who can help make you feel that you are not at fault. Find someone you can trust because you can't take it all out on yourself, you can't internalize it."

Forty-three year old Clarence Thomas grew up poor, Black and Democratic on Pinpoint, Georgia, but later switched parties and became a controversial symbol of Black conservatism.

"Only in America," Thomas said after President Bush announced his nomination as the second Black justice on the Supreme Court. Thomas will succeed Thurgood Marshall who has retired.

Prior to Thomas' nomination to the Supreme Court, he served as an assistant to Sen. John Danforth (R-Mo.), seven years as chairman of the Equal Employment Opportunity Commission and a judge of the U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals for the District of Columbia.

In addition to the controversy of Thomas' legal views, a charge of sexual harassment was brought against him by law professor Anita Hill. Thomas vehemently denied the allegations and said, "This is Kafkaesque. Enough is enough."

After much debate over who was right and who was wrong - Clarence Thomas, Anita Hill, the system itself - the United States Senate voted to confirm him.

On October 18, 1991, Clarence Thomas became the 106th United States Supreme Court Justice.



Magic Johnson, whose beaming smile and sparkling play entertained basketball fans for more than a decade, announced on November 7, 1991, that he had tested positive for the AIDS virus and was retiring.

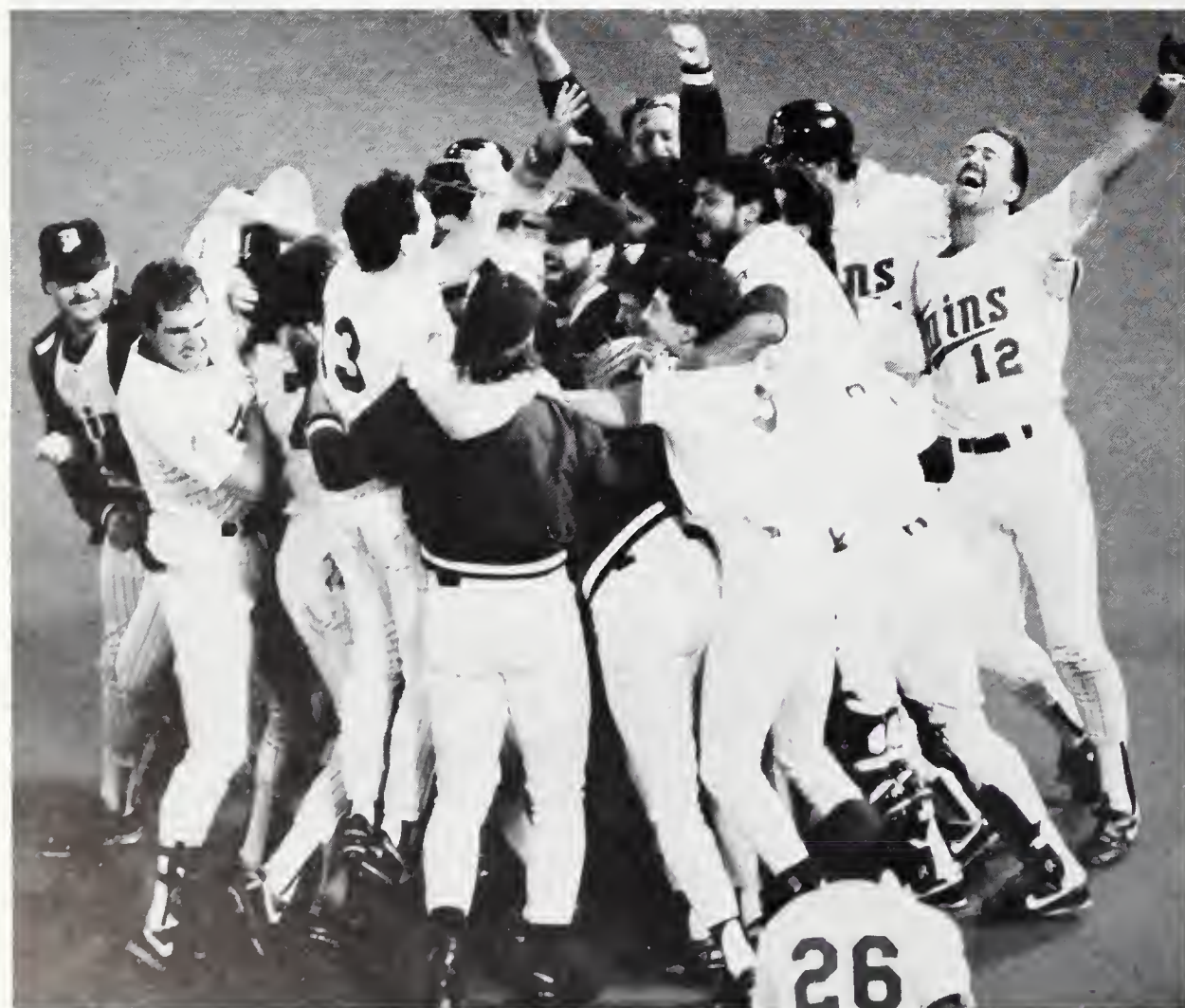
"Because of the HIV virus I have attained, I will have to announce my retirement from the Lakers today," Johnson told reporters at the Forum, where he played for 12 superstar seasons with the Los Angeles Lakers.

"I plan on going on, living for a long time," he said. Johnson said he would become an AIDS activist and campaign for safe sex.

More than just a basketball star who led the Lakers to five NBA championships, Johnson has been a philanthropist, a prominent corporate spokesman and a role model for young people. His broad grin, familiar nickname and electrifying ability have made him familiar to people around the world.

"I'm going to go on, I'm going to beat it and I'm going to have fun," he insisted, displaying some of the irrepressible zest for life that he brought daily to the basketball court.

Johnson, whose given name is Earvin, received his nickname from a Lansing, Michigan, sportswriter after a 36-point, 18-rebound, 16-assist performance in high school.



After all the twists, turns and tension, the closest of World Series ended in the closest of games.

The Minnesota Twins and Jack Morris squeezed past the Atlanta Braves 1-0 on pinch-hitter Gene Larkin's single in the bottom of the 10th inning on October 27, 1991, to win Game 7 and end baseball's most dramatic odyssey.

Never before had three series games gone into extra innings, and the Braves and Twins saved the best for last, matching zero for zero, pressure pitch for pitch even turning back bases-loaded threats in the same inning.

"Someone had to go home a loser, but there's no loser in my mind," Morris said. "Those are two of the greatest teams. I just didn't want to quit. Somehow, we found a way to win this thing."

Yeltsin called on Russians to resist the takeover, and resist they did. Constructing a protective human wall around Yeltsin's headquarters, his supporters demanded Gorbachev's return.

On Wednesday, as the Communist Party denounced the takeover, Yanayev and the other coup leaders fled Moscow. Latvia and Estonia declared immediate independence from the Soviet Union.

The coup had failed, and before the day was through, all coup leaders were arrested except for Interior Minister Boris Pugo, who reportedly killed himself.

Russian President Boris Yeltsin waved the white-blue-and-red Russian tricolor flag from the Russian Federation building before a crowd of about 100,000 jubilant supporters celebrating the end of the three-day coup attempt. Bodyguards held bulletproof shields in front of him.

In addition to telephone service being cut to all KGB buildings and Gorbachev naming a new chief of the KGB, the statue of the founder of the KGB was toppled while thousands of Muscovites watched. Freedom has come to the Soviet Union.



President F. W. de Klerk, African National Congress president Nelson Mandela and Zulu Inkatha leader Mangosuthu Buthelezi came together in September 1991 when black and white leaders gathered to sign a peace pact in a bid to end faction fighting that has claimed hundreds of lives in South Africa.

The accord, which created groups to investigate violent acts by police and citizens, marked the first joint agreement between the government and the two main black movements.

It was also seen as an important test of whether the main political groups can work together for reforms to end white-minority rule.

The government and the ANC reached a cease-fire in August 1990 and Mandela and Buthelezi agreed to peace terms in January 1991. But in both instances, the violence raged on.

At least 6,000 people have been killed in the past six years.



Firefighters were unprepared for the sight they were met with in Kuwait — scores of oil wells sending plumes of red and orange flames 30 yards into the air. Oil lakes and soot blackened the sand.

During the seven-month Iraqi occupation of Kuwait, more than 730 oil wells were damaged or set ablaze. Firefighting crews have been able to extinguish 584 wells since the effort began in March 1991.

When the effort to combat the blazes began in March, it took an average of four days to put out one well fire. Now the teams are averaging 8.5 wells each day, according to the Oil Minister Hamous al-Rquba.

Oil experts say that if the effort continues at the same rate, the wells should be capped before the end of the year, earlier than the projected date of March 1992.

The faster rate of progress has been attributed to the increase in the number of firefighting companies, the availability of needed equipment, the completion of the water system and the growing experience of the firefighters.

Teams from the United States, Canada, China, Iran, Kuwait, Hungary and France are all working together to clean up this environmental disaster.





On July 11, 1991, the moon slipped over the sun in the celestial ceremony of the eclipse, turning day into night for thousands of viewers and scientists.

About 500 astronomers and tens of thousands of tourists came to see the moon line up between the sun and Earth and plunge into darkness a 160-mile-wide swatch stretching from Hawaii to Mexico's Baja Peninsula, central and southern Mexico, Central America, Colombia and Brazil.

One after another, spectators around the mountaintop astronomy observatory in Hawaii exclaimed, "Oh, my God!" as the sky went dark. This was the first time an eclipse path of totality passed over a major observatory, scientists said.

One objective of the scientists was to learn more about why the sun's corona is about 3 million degrees Fahrenheit, while the sun's surface is only 10,000 degrees. Other experiments involved taking photos through the sun's atmosphere and watching the effect on Earth's atmosphere by the swift passage of the moon's shadow.



Terry Anderson emerged on December 4, 1991, from the dark hole of 6 1/2 years of captivity in Lebanon and was handed over to U.S. officials, ending a brutal hostage ordeal for both himself and the United States.

Asked what had kept him going in captivity, Anderson, the chief Middle East correspondent for The Associated Press, said it was his companions, his faith and his stubbornness.

"You just do what you have to do," he said. "You wake up every day and summon up energy from somewhere, and you get through the day, day after day after day."

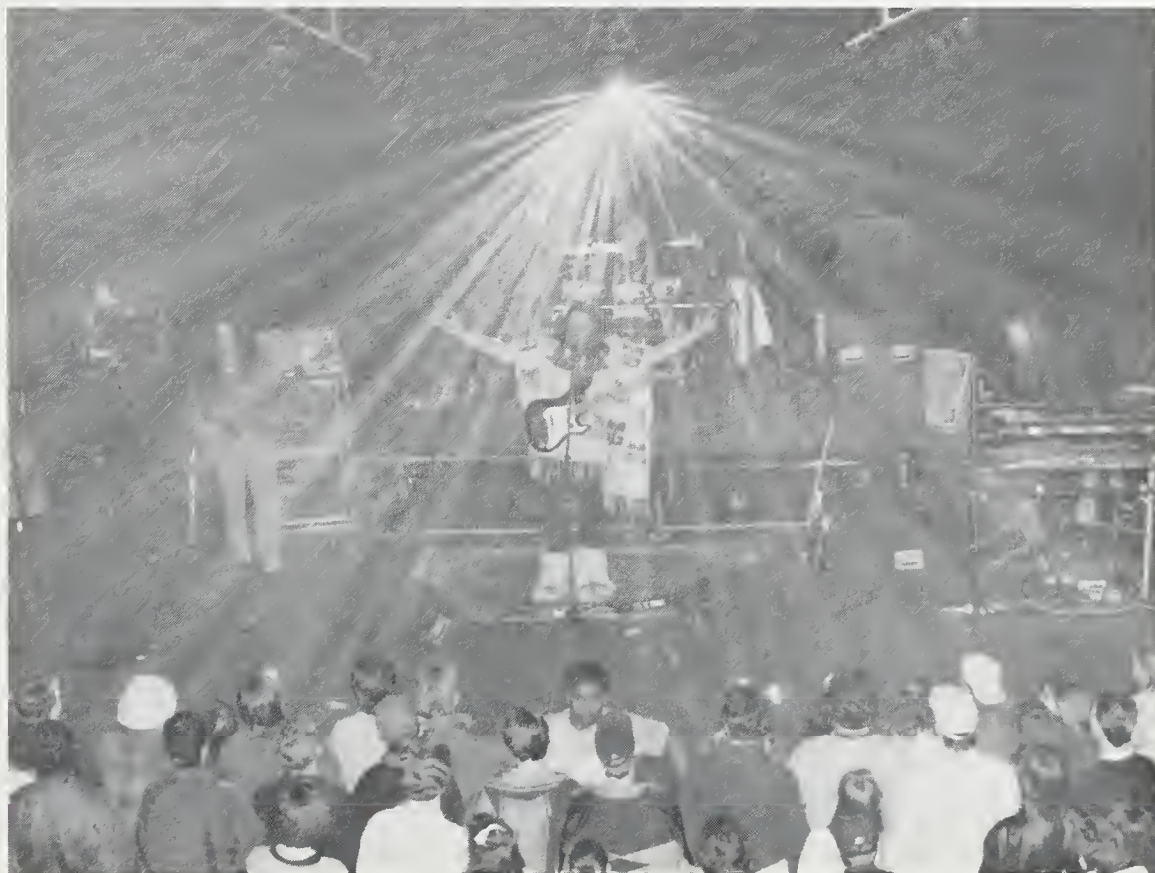
The freedom of Anderson marked the end of a hostage saga that haunted two American presidencies.

He was the 13th and last American captive freed since Shiite extremists in 1984 launched a campaign of seizing foreigners in Lebanon to drive out Western influence which they claimed corrupted the nation. Many of the Americans were tortured and beaten during their captivity, and three died.

Campus Center Dedication

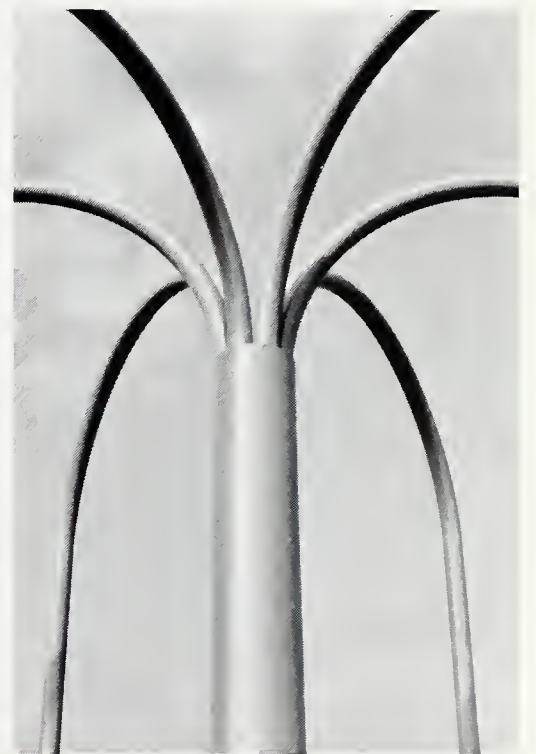
The University Of Massachusetts Dartmouth had the privilege of honoring Senator William "Biff" Q. MacLean, Jr. on Friday afternoon, September 27. The Campus Center was dedicated in the Senator's name in recognition of his continued support to the university and its students. Senator MacLean made numerous contributions to the University throughout its history, including the appropriations of funds to support the library, various campus buildings, and student scholarships.

Despite some controversy over Chancellor John Brazil's recommendation of Senator MacLean, the dedication ceremony was a successful one, attended by many students, faculty and local dignitaries. MacLean referred to the honor as "absolutely overwhelming." A bronze plaque was designed to be hung in the campus center to commemorate the dedication and the efforts made by Senator MacLean to improve the well being of this university.



Spinwinder

During September, 1991, an impressive sculpture was erected in order to symbolize the university's industrial and textile history. The *Spinwinder* serves to commemorate the textile industry as well as its impact upon this institution, and its predecessors, for nearly a century. The sculpture, designed by artist Nancy Holt, is "an abstraction of a turn of the century textile mechanism" and sits atop a buried time capsule containing textile artifacts. While the university's new name is a sign of change, the *Spinwinder* will stand as a strong reminder of the past.



Eisteddfod

During the weekend of September 20th, UMass Dartmouth was host to the twentieth anniversary celebration of the Eisteddfod Folk Festival. This annual event, reminiscent of the traditional Scottish ceilidh, draws people from all over New England each autumn. This year, the festivities included folk concerts, dancing, and craft workshops. Artisans of all types set up booths in the commuter cafeteria to display their hand-crafted artwork. Also available was a table to occupy tots while moms and dads browsed about. Eisteddfod provided a rare taste of tradition and was a weekend for all to enjoy.



Cultural Diversity Week

Cultural Diversity week is a chance for members of the university to be exposed to the variety of cultures that comprise our society. From September 30 to October 5, a series of discussions, readings, films, workshops, and concerts were offered. Topics including racism, sexism, sexuality, physical disability, and even the issue of ecology and culture in the rainforests of New Guinea were discussed. Some of the featured musical performances included a Jazz set during the opening ceremony featuring Herbie King and Semanya McCord, a concert of Afro-Caribbean Funk performed by "Mikata," and a presentation of African drumming that involved members of the audience as well. Cultural Diversity week offered a wide variety of programs in hopes of closing the gaps between cultures.

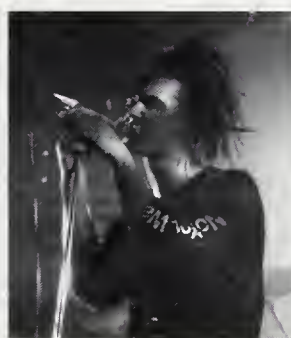
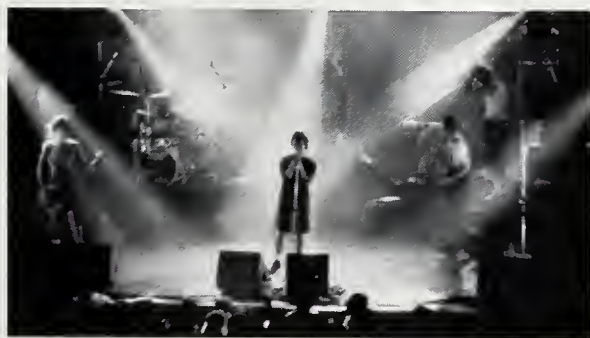
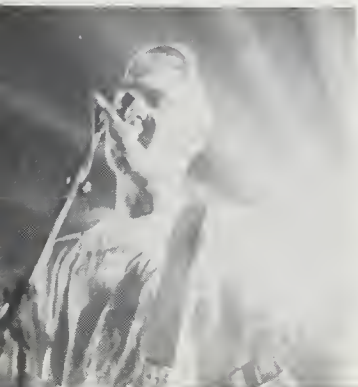

EMF

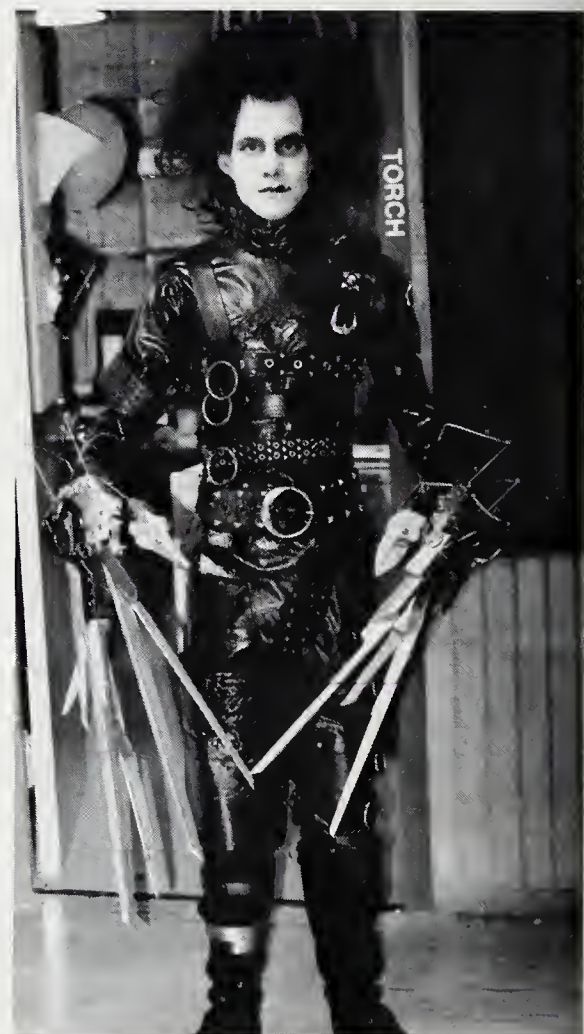

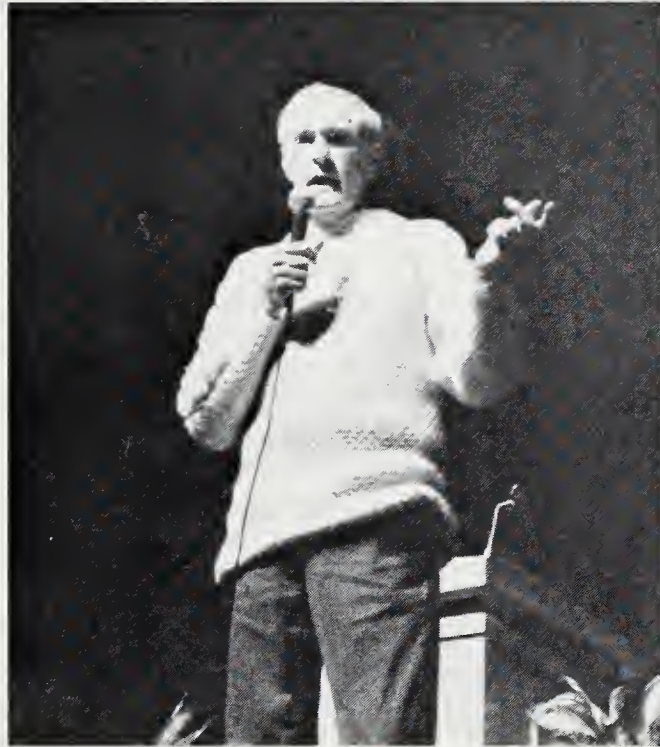
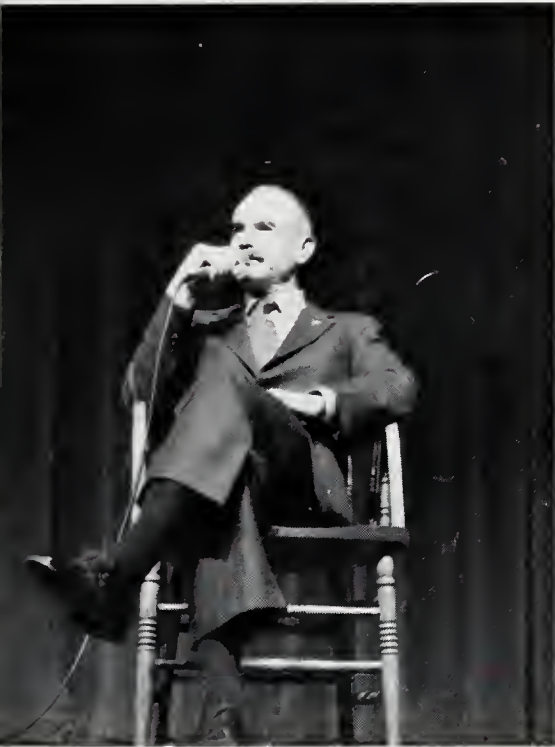

Leary-Liddy Debate

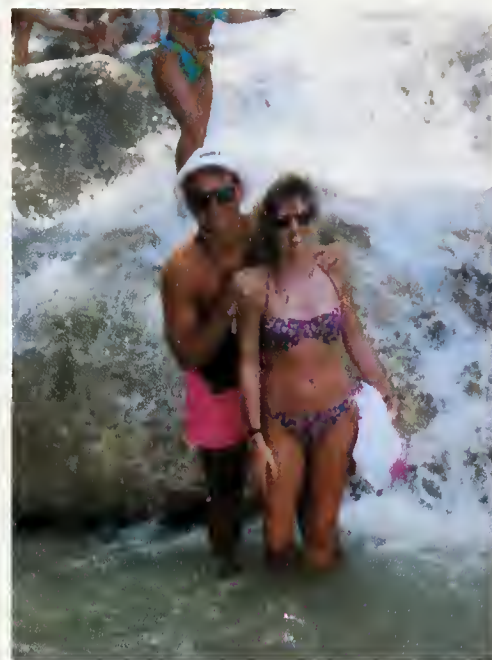

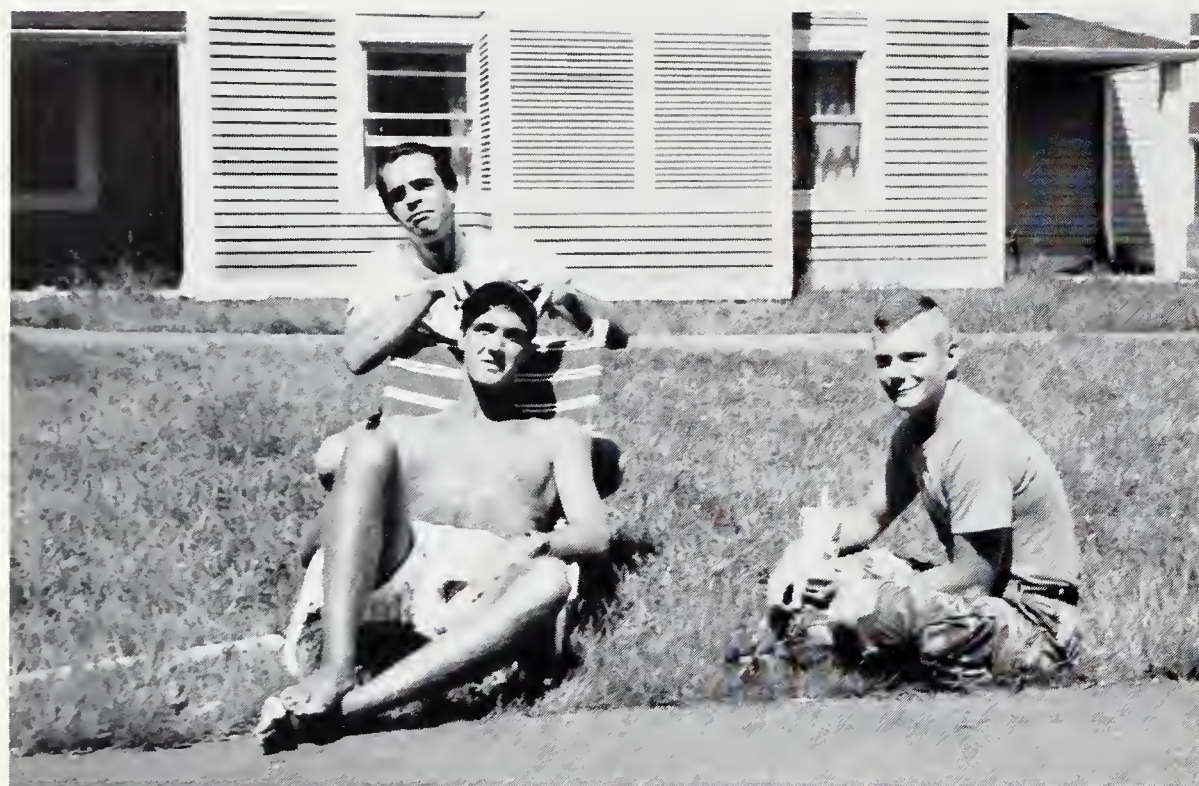




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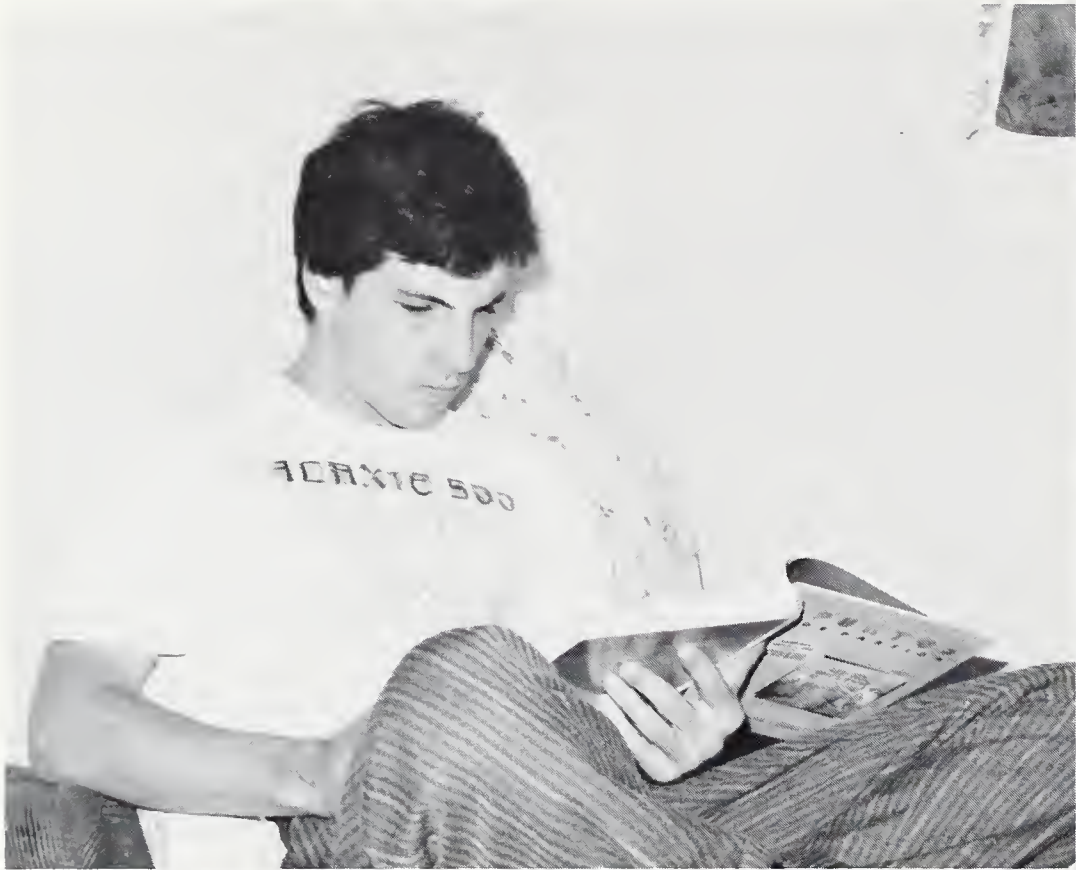














In Memory of Dr. Thomas A. Wassmer, S.J.

Doctor Thomas Wassmer, Professor of Philosophy, was the epitome of Jesuit education. He was educated at Regis High School in New York and continued on to Fordham University, where he received his Doctorate in Philosophy. He had a strong base in the classics, in literature, and theology as well as in philosophy. Philosophy and particularly ethics was the center of his interests.

Before his appointment at what was then Southeastern Massachusetts University, he had held academic appointments at Canisius College, LeMoyne College, St. Peter's College and Ohio University. The last twenty-one years of his career were devoted to the students on this campus. During his academic career he authored two books and over 60 articles in professional journals.

The appointments and the writings are indicative of a distinguished career. But if those facts about his scholarly life are all that we are aware of, we will have missed the depth and complexity of the man. He was very literally a philosopher, that is, a lover and pursuer of the truth. His mind was relentless in seeking new information and new insights. It was important to him to communicate this love of reflection and thinking for oneself to his students, and to his colleagues. He could tolerate mistakes in those trying to work things out for themselves, but he could not tolerate a refusal to try to think for oneself.

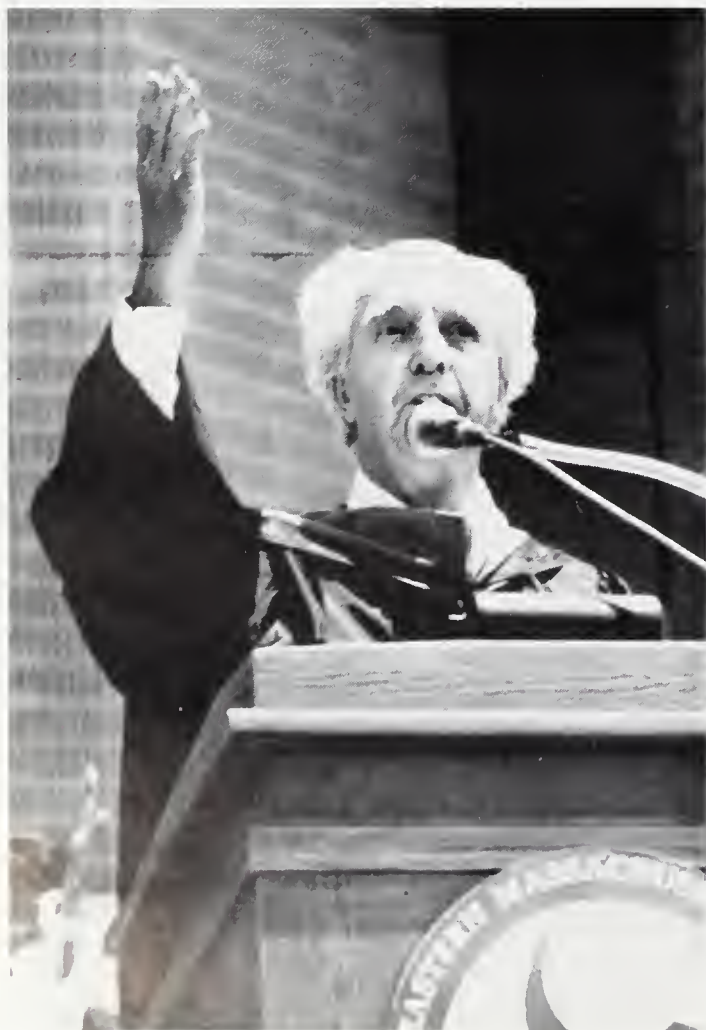
He was a Jesuit priest, a religious person. But this did not lead to a dogmatic or an unquestioning attitude. He lived the tension between the pursuit of philosophy and the demands of faith, and set an example for others in balancing the demands.

He was a wise counselor who was much sought out by students working their way through personal problems to a more autonomous life. His time, his caring and his sharing were always available for those needing help.

His colleagues and his students will remember him as a vigorous, open-minded, loving person. Our lives have been deeply touched by him.

Intense concentration and thought, chills and excitement, awe and respect - these were feelings I experienced while listening to Professor Wassmer both in his classroom, as well as in my visits to his office here at UMass. He was an intellectual challenge to me. He encouraged his students to constantly question everything, especially the truths and beliefs presented to us by the "authorities": teachers, the legislature, the judiciary, and even the church. It saddened and angered him to experience students who quietly and submissively accepted what was taught to them. He encouraged autonomous thought, beliefs, and convictions, even to the point of borderline intimidation in his attempt to set afire the minds of the young.

Professor Wassmer's pursuit of knowledge was a habitual process. His excitement with studying, investigating, questioning, learning, and the general love and enjoyment of life in general, is the most intense that I have ever seen. He created a folder, which I presently hold dear to me, in which he carefully cut out various newspaper, magazine, and journal articles that he knew would be of interest to me. Upon visiting him, he would read phrases with such an intensity that I was lead to share with him the wonder and beauty of life, love, happiness, and the pursuit of knowledge. I will miss this splendid interaction we shared. I believe Professor Wassmer desired to instill in his students to never cease questioning, examing, feeling, enjoying and loving.

When the community would fill up your answering machine with "Will you do a free-be?", you'd often respond too generously with a deep, warm, "Yes, in-dee-dee!" Affirmation and positivity were among the many gifts you shared with us, your concentric circles of kin, friends, acquaintances, making us whole: Music for the mind, body and soul; with solos, like an austere warm glow in a big, dark place, your life-affirming, serene, ever-Greene music.

In an uncreative response to the bit about credentials, the University balked at full-time status, but bought into what you taught, though much too cheaply.

You taught personal dignity; you taught generosity of spirit; you taught a composed, orchestrated love; you taught a disciplined freedom and the sophistication that is our jazz. *And*, you taught our school's most popular course; and they had you with brunch every Sunday - for free, cannibalizing your kindness.

Your audiences responded to your intensely personal playing, your artistry making us unaware of all the practice, the requisite energy, discipline, concentration and the other rigors of good improvisation, which are the rigors of the artist. We heard but did not hear these things: the necessary independent attitude, the vulnerability mixed with courage, because improvisation takes chances, every breath, every minute, every note, chord, riff takes chances toward a spontaneous composition, coherence of voice, toward perfect pitch, toward masterful moments when every note and even every silence is musical

and the nodding or swaying or finger-popping or foot-tapping listener feels witness to magic in the making.

And what is an African American life but an improvisation. Improvisation, the classic symbolic action for our survival, our existence.

And so, you playing and your dying showed us how to live. Hopefully, we who knew you will be the afterlife of your harmonies, your grace notes, on this bandstand called the world, in this Grand Jam Session, this improvisation we call Life:

On March 12, 1989, David Andrews, a freshman visual design major, died in an accident after his car hit a patch of black ice in his hometown of Foster, R. I. During his brief time here at the University, he managed to make many friends, and it is for him that this memorial is written.

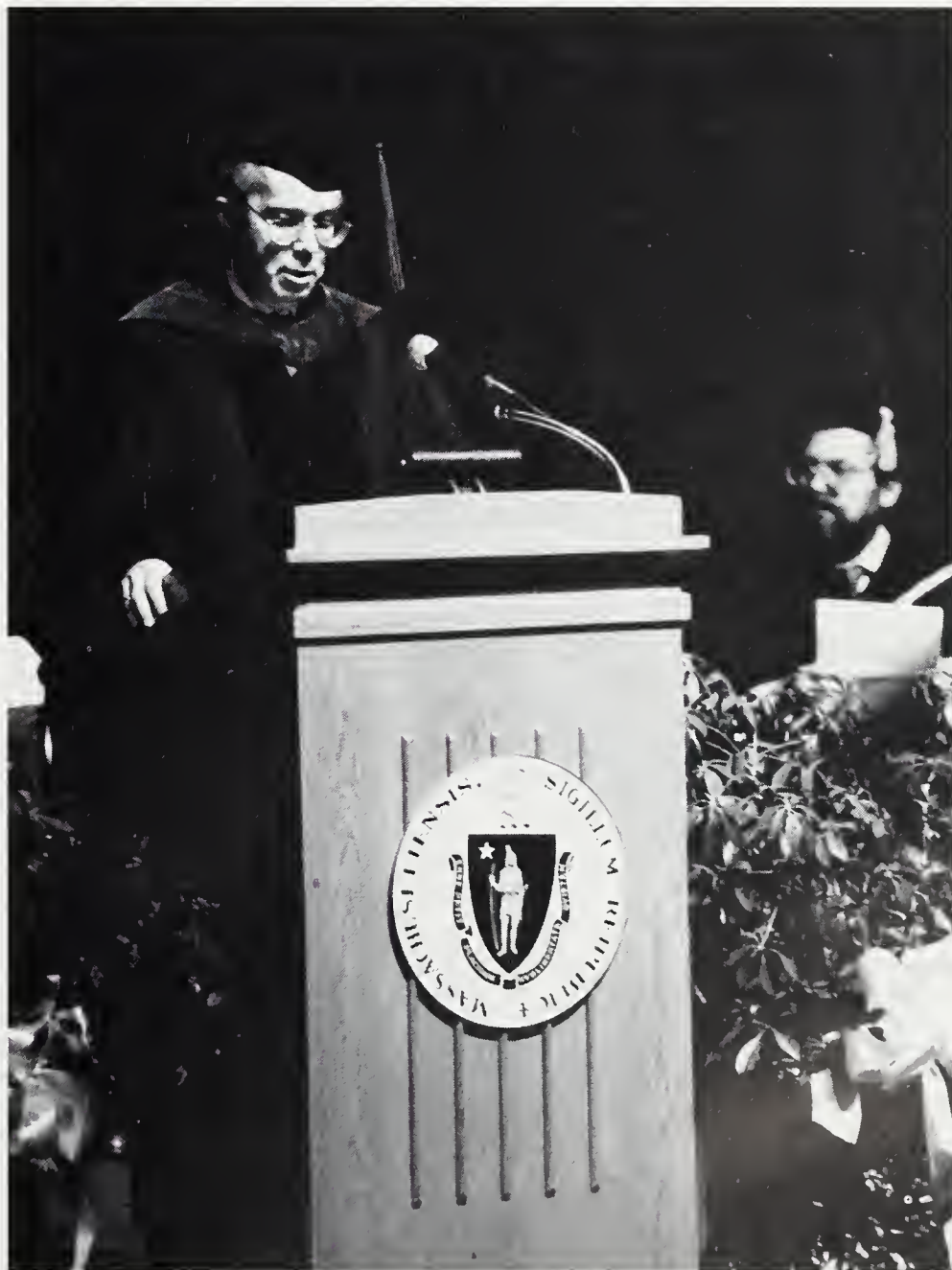

Football

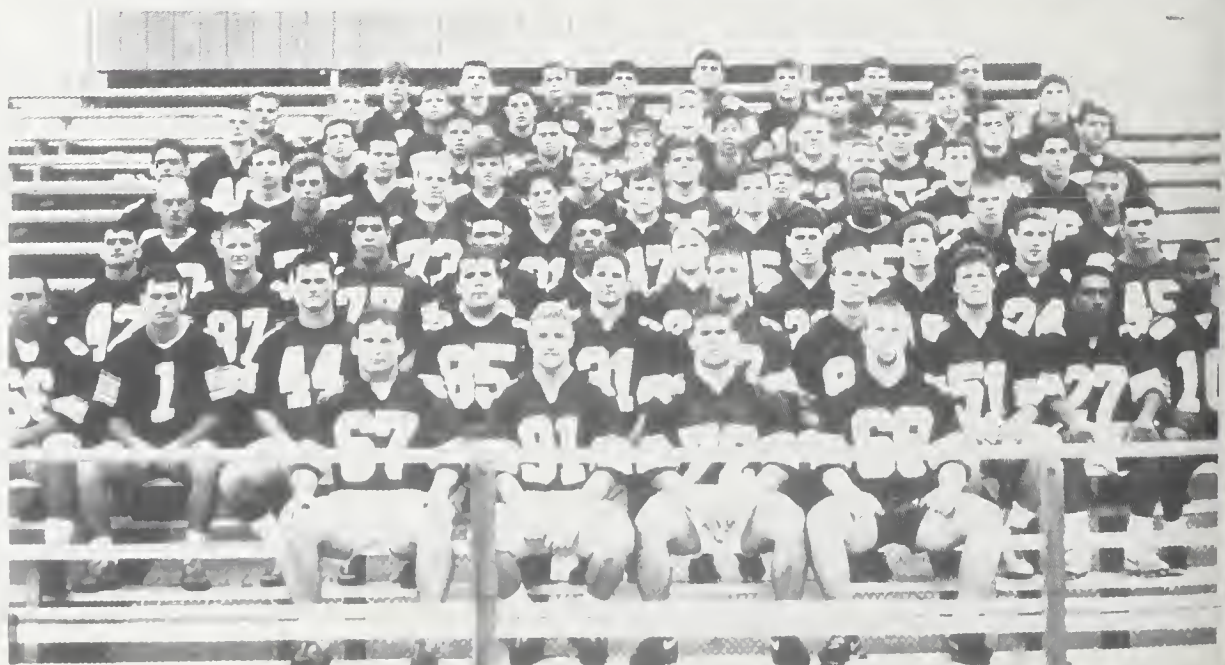
Head football coach Bill Kavanaugh and his crew put the past behind them, pushing by opponents to a 6-3 record, establishing the best record in the school's history. With avenging victories against Worcester State, Fitchburg State, and Framingham State, the Corsairs finished second in the Southern division of the New England Football Conference.

The team established a strong running game with rushing leader Billy Johnson, who scored a season-high thirteen touchdowns while rushing for 820 yards. This sophomore running back broke the school's rushing record with 1354 career yards. Quarterback and sophomore James Winters passed for six TD's and at the receiving end, freshman James Santucci caught a season-high 24 receptions.

On the defensive end, senior captain Ted Greenblott led his team with 8.5 sacks, while seniors Scott Rigney and Robert O'Brien compiled 81 and 60 tackles, respectively. A promising newcomer, freshman Ken Morrell, finished with a team-high seven interceptions.

A highlight game in the season was the homecoming game against the Worcester State Lancers. The football team overpowered them 55-14, setting the school football scoring record in the process. By the end of the game, Freshman Mike Noe crossed the goal twice and fellow freshman Mark Williams scored one.

Many players received individual honors. Rigney, Tardie, Johnson, Greenblott, Morrell and Winters each made the NEFC as well as the ECAC Honor Roll once; Johnson making it twice.



Volleyball

First year head coach Ken Duarte had his work cut out for him, with a balanced team of returnees who were coming back after a record-breaking season. His team ended their season with a respectable 23-14 record.

Highlights of the season were found in tournament action. The Corsairs ended up tied for third in the Salem State Invitational, where sophomore Donna Willey was an all-tourney selection. 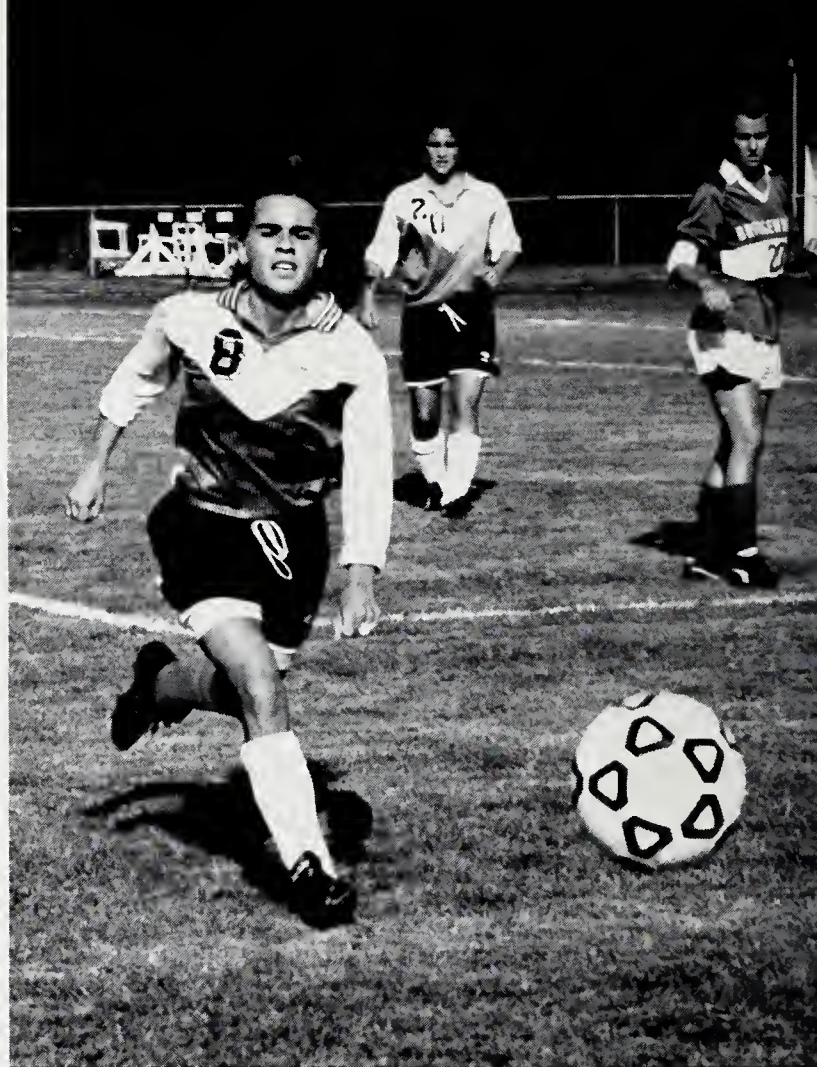

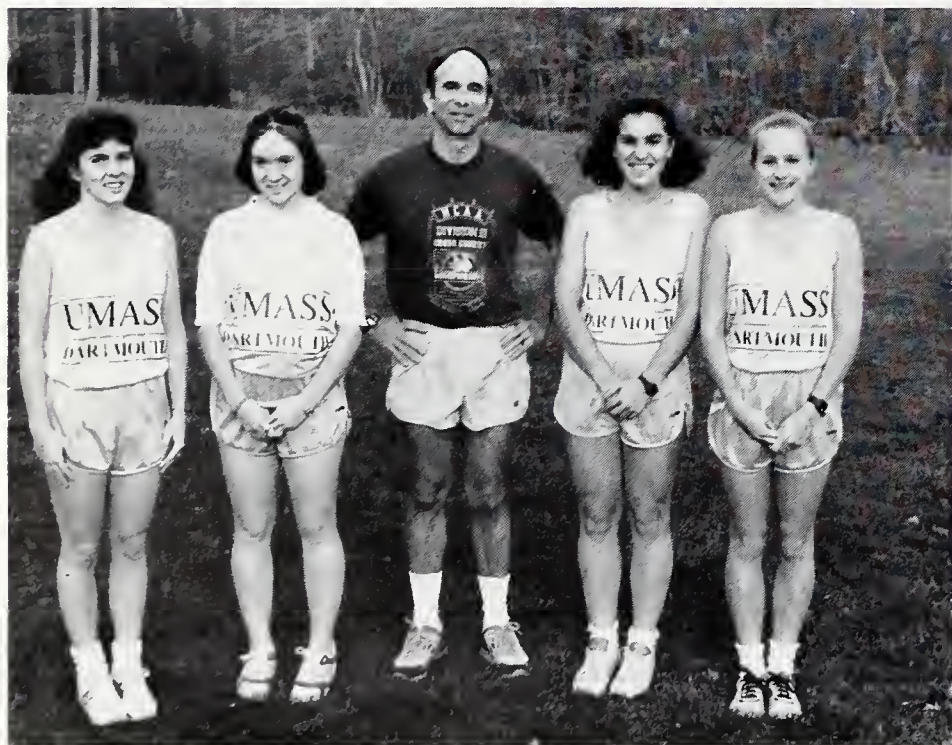

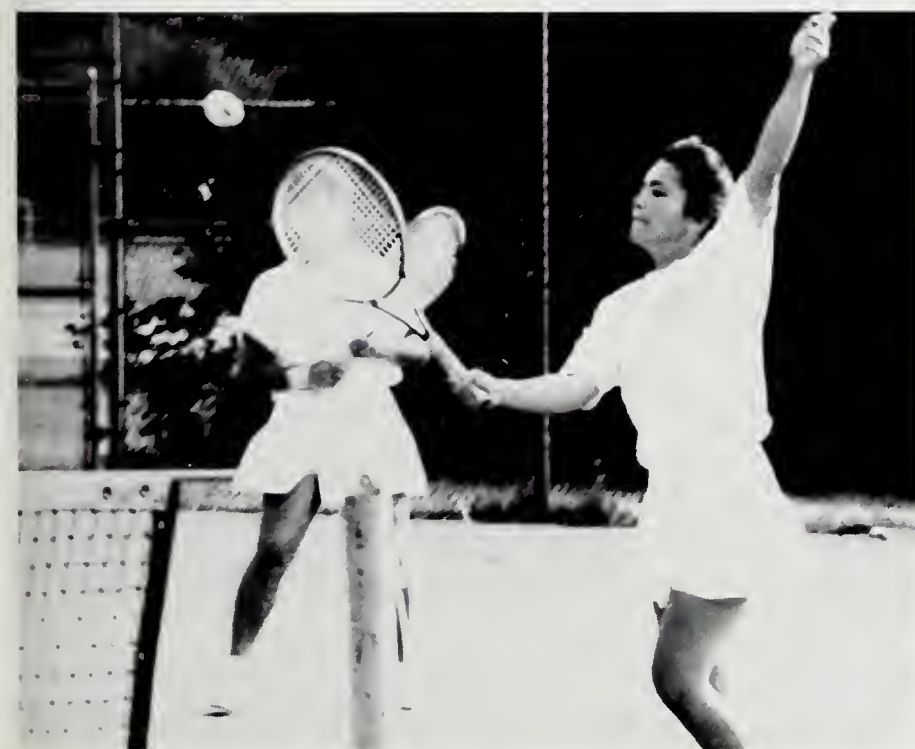
Women's Tennis

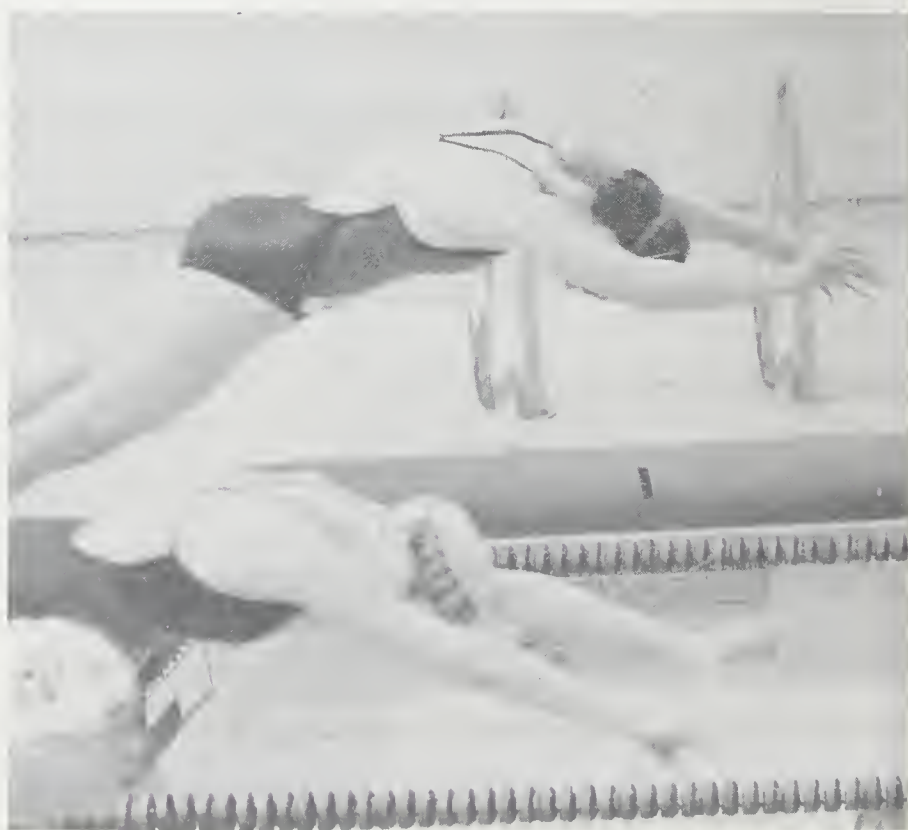
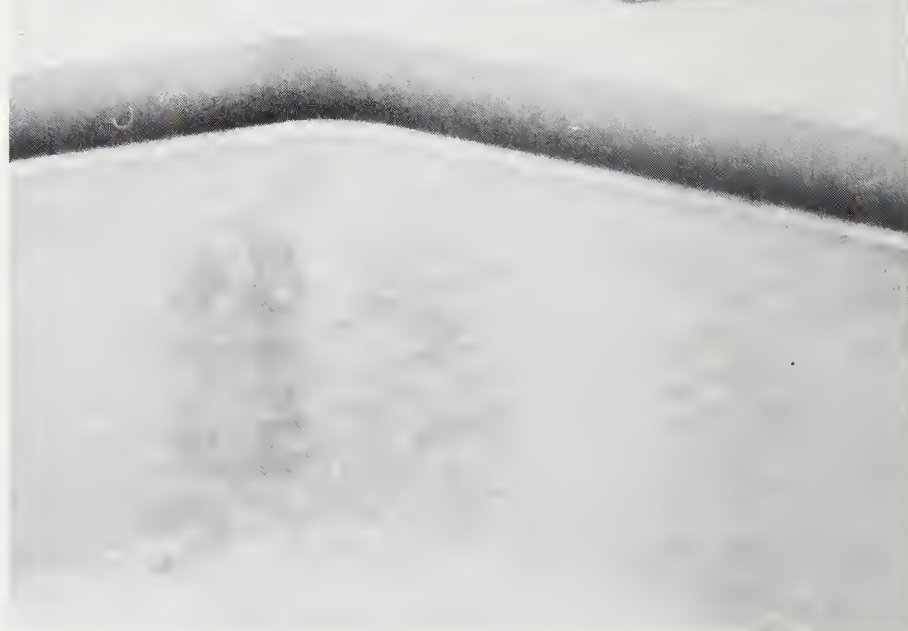


Women's Swimming and Diving

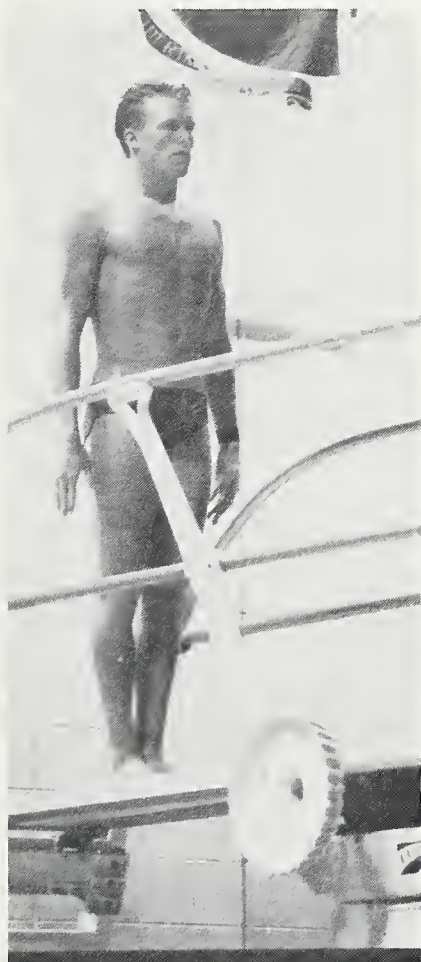

Women's Basketball

The women's basketball team had an impressive season, going 16-10 before being stopped in the Little East Conference semi-finals, 71-51, by Southern Maine. Men's Basketball

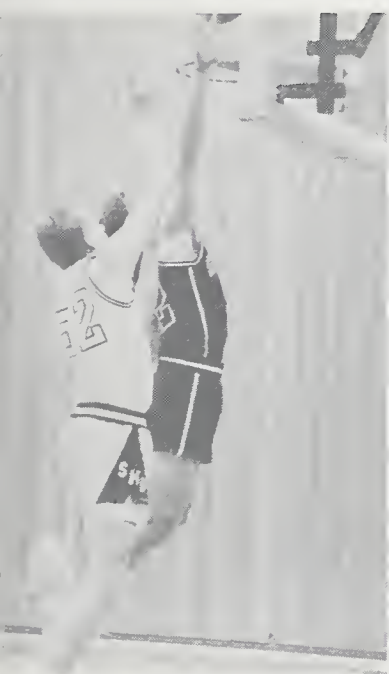
By normal Corsair standards, the men's basketball team's 15-10 record was somewhat of a disappointment. But considering the poor expectations most people had for the team before the season began, their .667 winning percentage and Little East Conference regular season championship were more than impressive.

Although the Corsairs won the regular season title for the fourth time in the 6-year history of the LEC, they were shocked in the LEC Tourney Finals by Eastern Connecticut, and failed to make the NCAA Tournament. Despite the snubbing by the NCAA, the Corsairs qualified for the ECAC Tournament, but lost in the first round to second-seeded Williams College.

Pagios was the surprise of the season, as the 5-foot-7 freshman averaged 13.2 points and led the team with 127 assists.

Steve Haynes garnered numerous awards this season, including the All-ECAC New England first team, Little East Player-of-the-Year, and was named to both the LEC All-Star team and the All-Tourney team. Pagios joined Haynes on both LEC teams, while head coach Brian Baptiste was named LEC Coach-of-the-year.

Softball

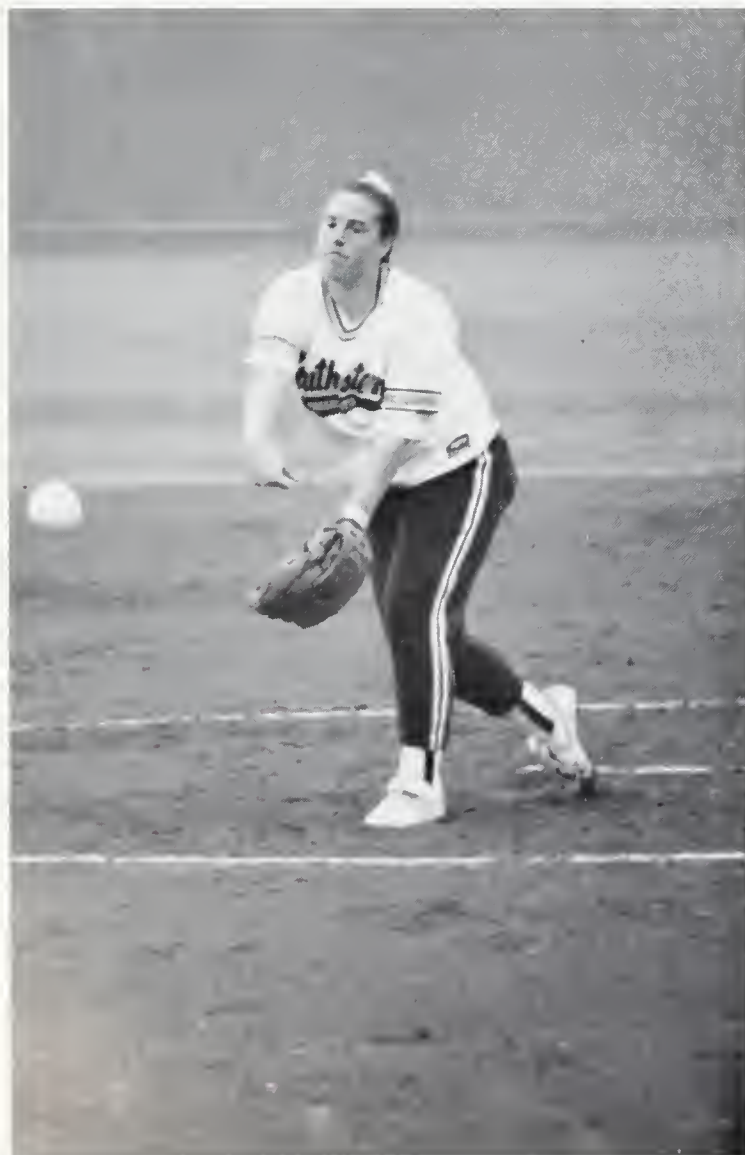
The UMass Dartmouth softball squad put together one of the most impressive seasons in its history, culminating an 18-4 record with the ECAC North Tournament title, the first since the team's inception.

The four-team double-elimination tourney, hosted by the Corsairs, was 100% UMass Dartmouth as the club swept through, winning all their games. For the five seniors on the team, Barrie Brissette, Deb Torosian, and co-captains Beth Brooks, Jen Doyle, and Sue Quinn, it was the perfect way to end their collegiate careers.

Brooks and Brissette both made the ECAC first-team and sophomore Julie Smalley was named the tournament MVP. Also, Smalley and Brooks were selected as Regional All-Americans. For the season, Brooks had 21 RBI and a .375 batting average, and Smalley contributed 17 RBI. Brissette had 5 steals, 30 runs, 32 hits, and a .438 average.

The team had impressive numbers as well. Over their 22-game schedule, they out-scored their opponents 136-70 and had a team batting average of .332.

In the ECAC title game, the team routed Western Connecticut by a 10-1 tally. Freshman Jen Pfister went the distance for the victory, finishing up her season with a 1.62 ERA and 28 strikeouts. On the offensive end, Smalley went 3-for-3 with 2 RBIs. Sophomore Chris Greaney went 2-for-4 with 2 RBIs, and freshman Kerri Parkinson added an RBI while going 2-for-3.

The baseball team put together a spectacular season, going 32-11 and falling one game short of getting out of the Regionals and into the National Tournament.

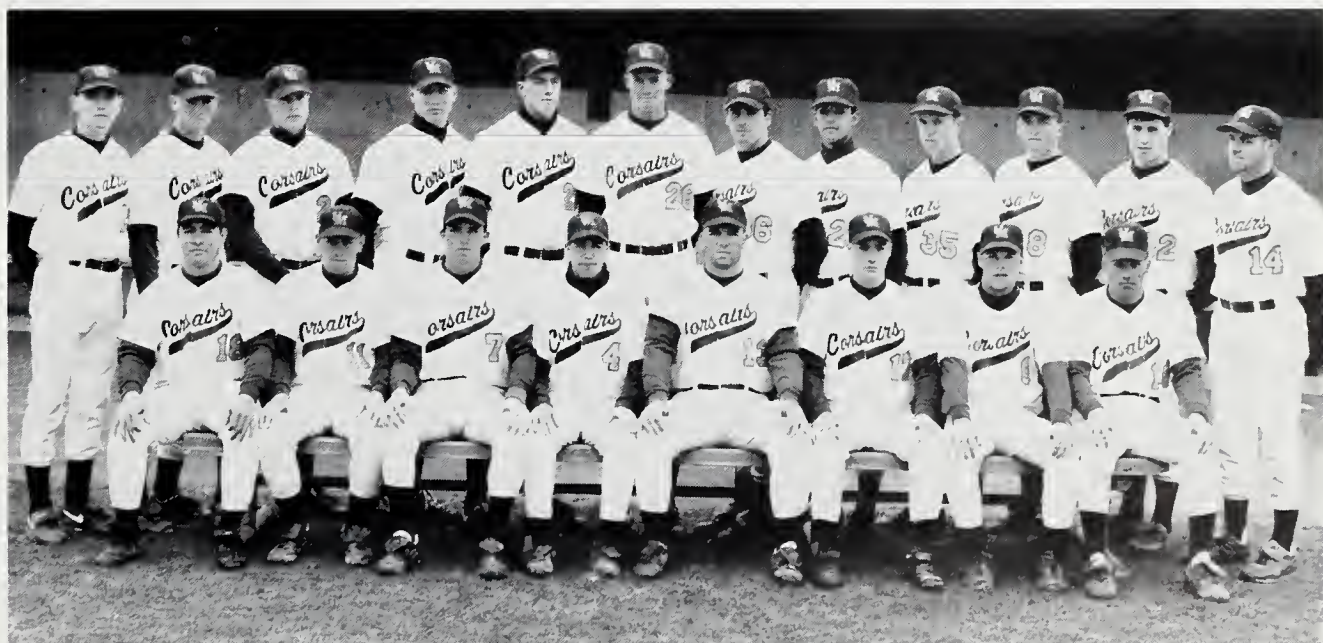
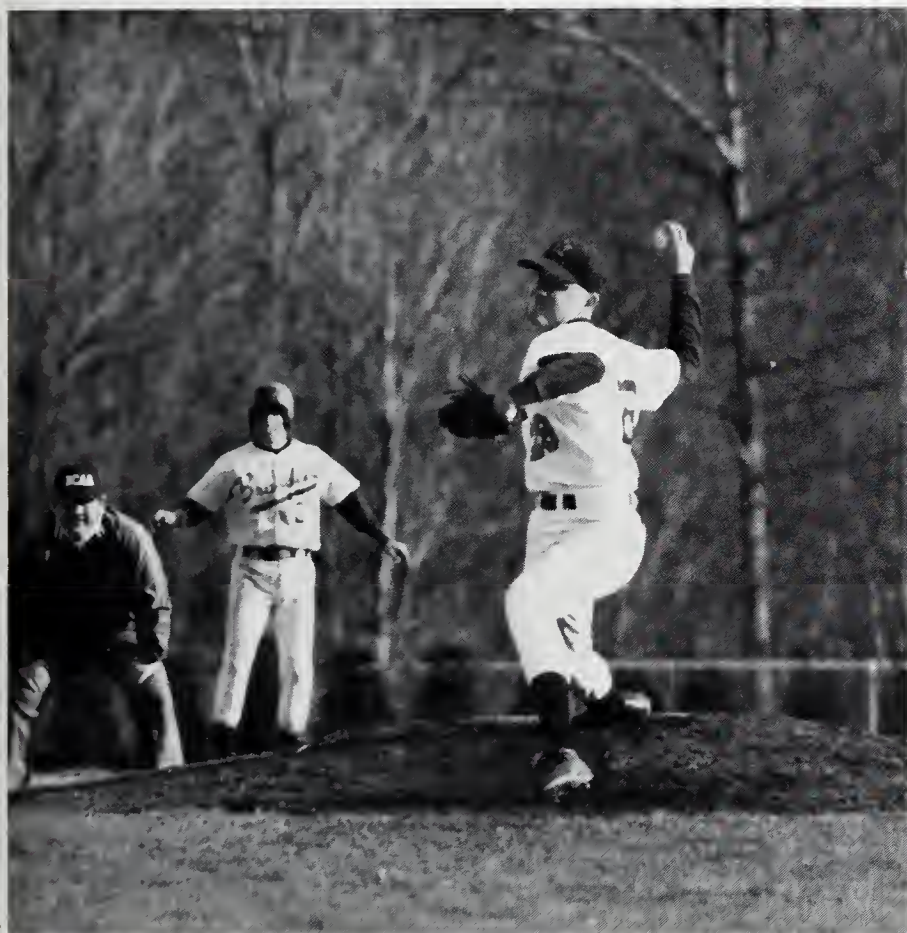
After posting a 29-9 regular season record, the Corsairs steamed into the Northeast Regional and rolled past Bridgewater State 10-3. But then the squad ran into the Southern Maine juggernaut and got trounced 21-4. The team, however, staved off elimination by cruising past Brandeis 8-5 and bouncing back past Southern Maine 4-2, to set up a one-game showdown to see who would play in the Nationals in Battle Creek, Michigan.

The 4-2 victory was done in dramatic fashion as Obed Cole jacked a two-run dinger in the eighth inning for the win. Tom Beaulieu was excellent on the mound, going the distance with a seven-strikeout performance. But the finale was all Southern Maine, and an exhausted Corsair club that played five games in three days was beaten 13-1. The lone UMass Dartmouth run was a two-out RBI single by Cole.

Six Corsairs were named to the All-Tournament team. Beaulieu and Cole made the team, being joined by pitcher Kurt Dreher, catcher Jeff Coppeta, center fielder John Graham, and designated hitter Greg Haley.

Three members of the team earned All-American status for their efforts during the season. All three were juniors, and the honored stars were Core, Graham, and Dreher. All three also made the ECAC All-Star team and Graham was named ECAC Player-of-the-Year.

Graham, the squad's centerfielder, was a first-team All-American. He hit .443, cranked 8 homers, and tallied 58 RBIs. To compliment these already impressive numbers, Graham also had 24 steals. Cole made the second-team and put up numbers almost as impressive as Graham's. The third baseman had a .393 average with 4 home runs, 43 RBIs, and 19 stolen bases. Dreher, the team's top pitcher, earned third-team status. He finished with a 9-3 record and had 8 saves to go with his 2.40 ERA.



Men's Tennis

The men's tennis team made tremendous strides from last year's dismal season, going in one year from an abysmal campaign to a 9-2 record. The top winner for the team was sophomore Felipe Miguel, who went 10-2. His extra win came in a rained-out contest where individual wins counted, but not team results as the match was never finished.

Sophomore Scott Christo went 9-1 for the team, and sophomore Eric Page went 9-2. The lone senior on the squad was Daniel Marques. With such a young squad, this team looks very promising for the upcoming seasons.

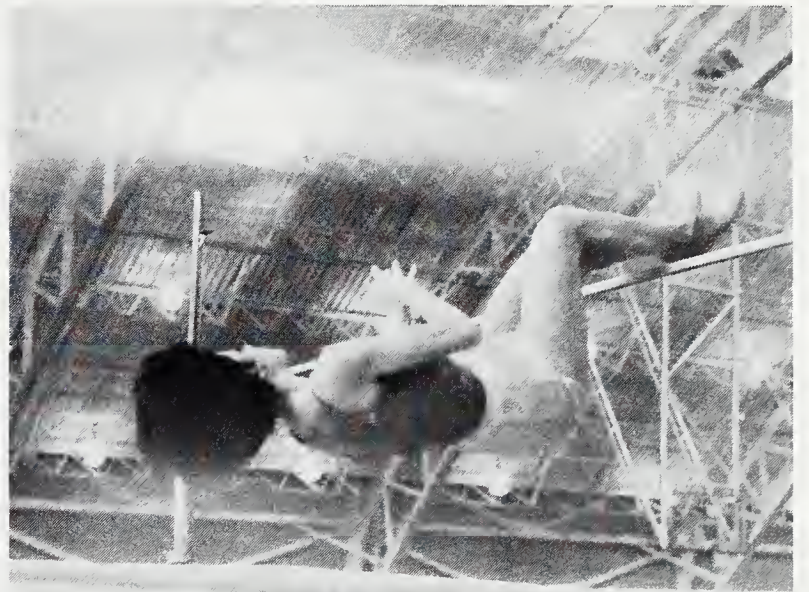


Track and Field

The seniors on the men's squad were Tom Bleakney, Ron Grigg, and Lopes. Seniors on the women's side were Adams and Susan Gould.

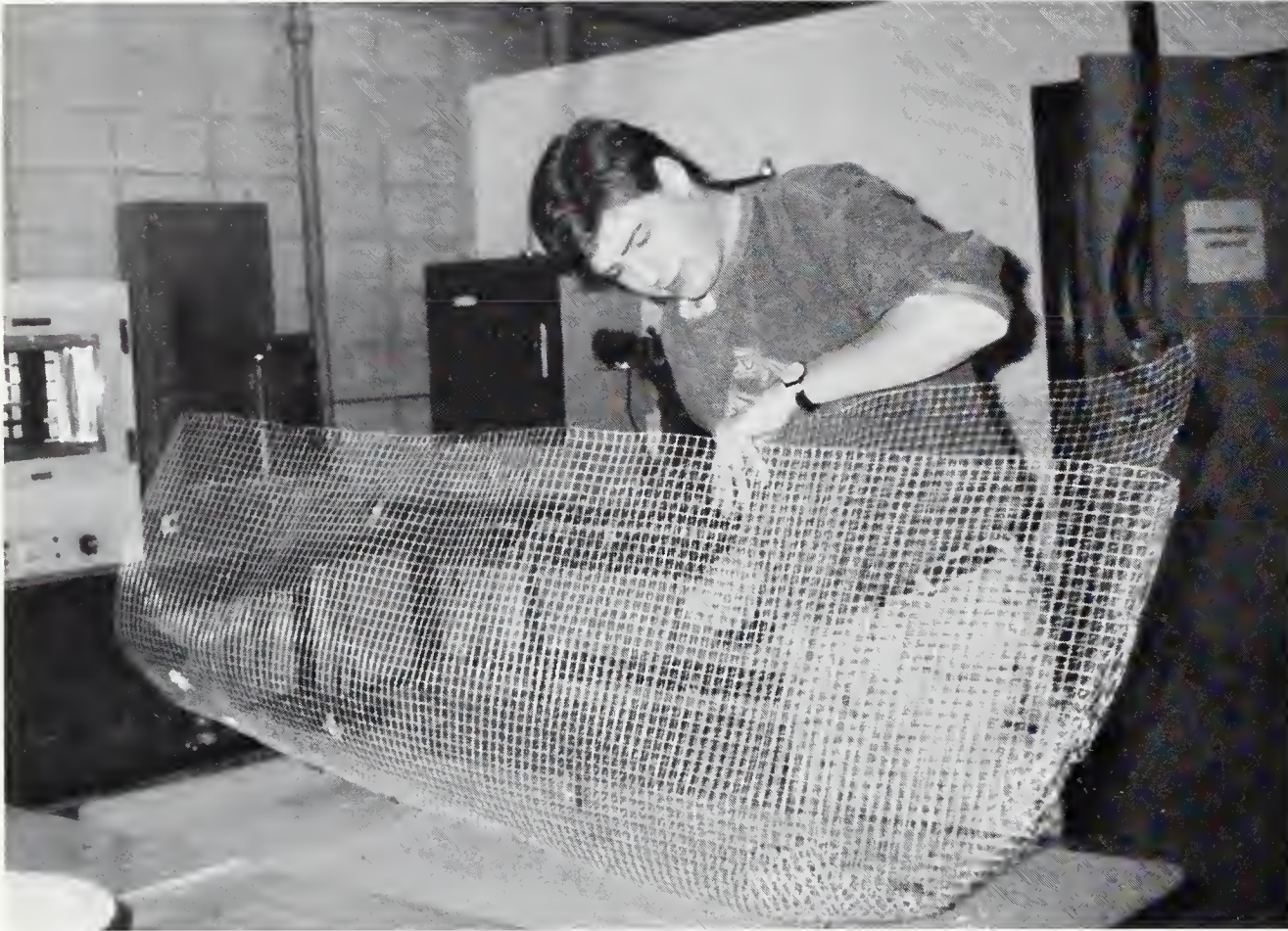


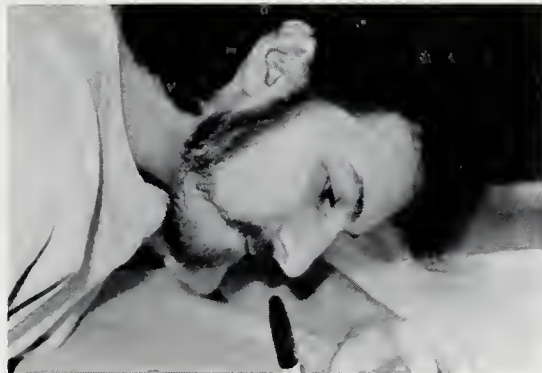
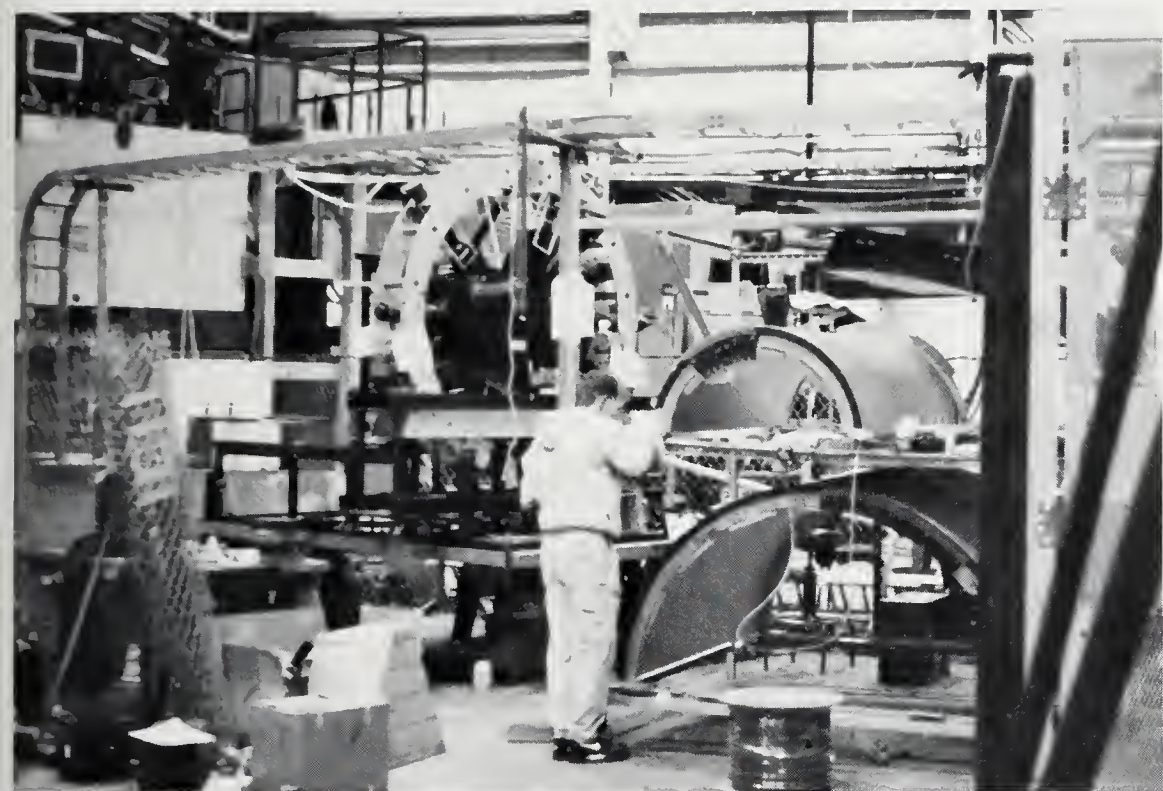

Commencement

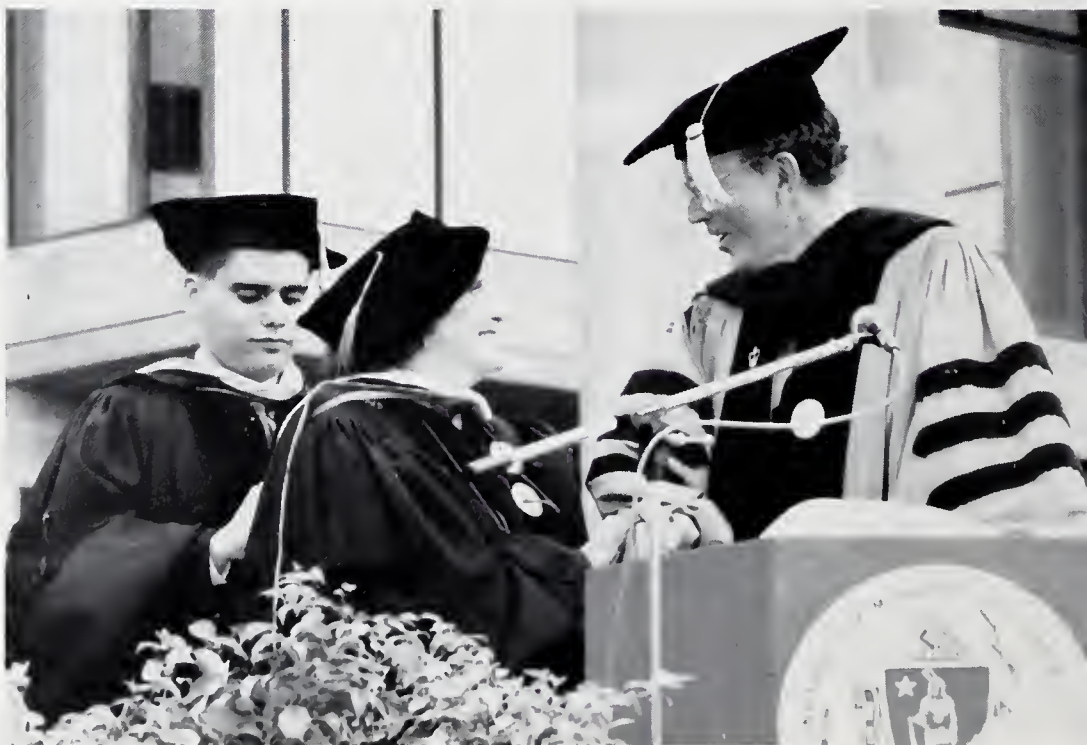
